DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Regulations for the Operation of Lodging Houses.

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held July 11, 1911, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the rules and regulations of the Department of Health relating to the operation of Lodging Houses in The City of New York, which were adopted by the Board of Health March 27, 1907, and amended February 7, 1911, be and the same are hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

1. The applicant must file with this Department, in duplicate, a written application, dated, signed by himself, and correctly setting forth:

(a) The full name and address of the proprietor of the lodging house and of the owner of the premises

(e) Other ventilation, if any, in each sleeping room.
(f) Number of waterclosets on each floor.

(g) Number of set washbasins on each floor.

(h) Number and description of all bathing apparatus on each floor.

Number of Lodgers Permitted. No keeper of a lodging house containing rooms in any one of which there are more than three beds for the use of lodgers, or in which more than six persons are allowed to sleep, shall receive lodgers therein without displaying continuously and conspicuously in each sleeping room a card issued for said room by the Department of Health, setting forth the greatest number of lodgers it is permitted to accommodate in said room, and also a copy of these and such other rules and regulations as the

No keeper of a lodging house shall accommodate in any sleeping room thereof a number of lodgers greater than the number set forth on the card issued for said room by said Department, nor shall he accommodate any lodger in any room in which a said Department may require to be thus displayed. card, duly issued therefor, is not displayed as above described.

Ventilation. In every lodging house each room shall be adequately ventilated as required by law and to the satisfaction of the Department of Health.

In every sleeping room there shall be provided not less than 400 cubic feet of air space per bed.

Neither side of any bed shall be at any time nearer than two feet to the side of any other bed. All beds shall be so arranged that the air shall circulate freely under each of

In the case of all lodging houses for which permits are for the first time applied for after the year 1910, no beds or bunks shall be placed one above another.

Airing, etc. Except when extreme severity of the weather prevents, all windows of sleeping rooms, waterclosets, washrooms and bathrooms shall be kept open not less than one

foot at the bottom and one foot at the top at least four hours daily. Beds occupied at night shall be vacated by 10 a. m. or 12 m. and the bedding thereof shall be turned over and exposed to the air from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m. or from 12 m. to 4 p. m. daily, as shall be prescribed by the permit issued for each lodging

For the accommodation of lodgers working by night, special beds or rooms shall be set apart for their use during the day, but the bedding of such beds must be turned over and exposed to the air in a room with outside windows, open as above pre-

scribed, for at least four consecutive hours daily. Only servants at work or day sleepers that work at night shall be allowed in sleeping rooms between 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. or 12 m. and 4 p. m.

Beds and Bedding. In every lodging house there shall be provided for each lodger a separate bed with bedstead, bedding and bed clothes satisfactory to the Department of Health.

All mattresses shall be provided with waterproof coverings, and shall be so ar ranged so as to be at all times easily capable of thorough inspection. All beds, bed clothing, mattresses and pillows shall always be kept clean and

free from vermin. Sheets and pillowcases shall be kept in a condition clean and satisfactory to the

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies work or business to tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated bearing are in all respects true. herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by

the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or con sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be in-

closed in the envelope containing the bid or esti mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope, addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the

work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract warded to any person who is in arrears to The city of New York upon debt or contract, or who

s a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any bligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates it it is deemed to be for the

nterest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids r estimates in addition to inserting the same in
