

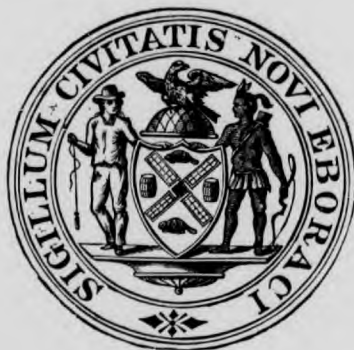

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 7, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,550.  
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,145.  
 During the past week 346 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.  
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 74 permits.  
 There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 3 permits.  
 There were issued, to remove manure from stables in the city, 37 permits.  
 There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 27 miscellaneous permits.  
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks 97 permits.  
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 244 visits were made, and 240 disinfections, and 168 fumigations were performed.  
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital, was 28.  
 The number of vaccinations performed was 2,373 of which 1,036 were primary, and 1,337 revaccinations.  
 There were seized and condemned 11,355 pounds of meat and 52,850 pounds of fish; 190 cans of canned goods and 1,500 pine apples.  
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 51; the number of analyses of same made, was 1; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 93, and the number of arrests made was 3.

The certificates of 570 births, 56 still-births, 262 marriages and 760 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 7, 1887. This shows an increase of 17 births and 31 deaths, and a decrease of 1 still-birth and 70 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 1 birth, 47 marriages and 101 deaths and the same number of still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 2; diphtheria, 4; croup, 7; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 3; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 3; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 5; erysipelas, 7; cerebro-spinal fever, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 8; rheumatism and gout, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; heart diseases, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; premature and preterm births, 8; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 4; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from whooping cough was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 156 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 218 under two years; 279 under five years; and 54 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 28 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 36.71 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 152 were in institutions, 426 in tenement-houses, 156 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 17 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 143 on the first, 182 on the second, 128 on the third, 96 on the fourth, 32 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 747 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 13 non-residents; 111 were stated to be single, 213 married, 84 widowed, and the condition of 352 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 760; still-births, 56; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 68 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 570 births; 262 marriages; 56 still-births; 760 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 135 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 15 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 97 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 7, 1887, was 59 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.036, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 998, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.14 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.



The disposition of 732 deaths and still-births, or 89.71 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 18; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 290; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 107; Greenwood (undenominational), 54; Lutheran, (undenominational), 106; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 30; Evergreen (undenominational), 45; Woodlawn (undenominational), 32; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 20.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending April 30, 1887, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 0; Third, 6; Fourth, 12; Fifth, 9; Sixth, 14; Seventh, 28; Eighth, 12; Ninth, 27; Tenth, 26; Eleventh, 24; Twelfth, 111; Thirteenth, 18; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 20; Seventeenth, 42; Eighteenth, 38; Nineteenth, 136; Twentieth, 42; Twenty-first, 58; Twenty-second, 51; Twenty-third, 19; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending April 30, 1887, was 727; this is 43 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 42 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.64 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,474,618.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

*Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, May 11, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.*

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works. The Secretary being absent, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, Auditor J. C. Lulley was elected Secretary pro tem.

The minutes of the adjourned meeting of May 9 were read, amended and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit, through its Chairman, William Dowd, reported their examination and audit of vouchers Nos. 2613 to 2627 inclusive, being estimates for work done by contractors during the month of April; also of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 2628 to 2642 inclusive, and on his motion the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works, of this date, submitting final plan sheet and property maps of Double Reservoirs 1, including Kishowana lake in the town of South East, Putnam County, New York, as modified and amended, being Exhibit "F F No. 2"; upon which maps are laid out and numbered the various parcels of real estate in, over or through which the said reservoirs are to be constructed and maintained, or which may be necessary for the prosecution of the work authorized by law, and upon which maps are the natural and artificial division lines existing on the surface of the soil at the time of the survey, and also the highways and railroads now existing upon said parcels of lands, and adjacent thereto, and upon which are plainly indicated the parcels of which the fee is to be acquired for the purposes above-named. Whereupon, the Committee on Real Estate, through its Chairman, James C. Spencer submitted the following report:

The Commissioner of Public Works having prepared and submitted to you the modified and amended plans and maps of the lands required for the construction of the East Branch Reservoirs or Double Reservoirs 1, and for the changes in location of parts of the highways and the railroad adjacent to said reservoirs, this Committee has caused to be prepared, and now recommend the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions for the approval and certification of said plans and maps, and the commencement of proceedings to acquire the fee in the lands shown upon said maps.

Whereas, On the 5th day of May, 1886, the Aqueduct Commissioners approved, adopted and certified six similar maps of the lands then intended to be acquired for the construction of the dams and reservoirs upon the east branch of the Croton river, in the town of South East, in Putnam County, and known as the "East Branch Reservoirs" or "Double Reservoirs 1"; and

Whereas, Subsequently to such approval, adoption and certification of said maps, it became apparent that further property, rights and privileges would be required for said purposes, and for certain changes in the location of parts of the adjacent highways and railroad tracks; and

Whereas, The said maps were thereafter recalled by the said Commissioners for modification and amendment; and

Whereas, Modified and amended plans were thereafter prepared and submitted to us by the Commissioner of Public Works, showing all of the additional lands, rights and privileges required for the aforesaid purposes, which plans were submitted to public hearing on the 8th day of September, 1886, due notice of such hearing having been given and full opportunity to be heard having been thereat afforded to all persons interested; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Public Works has since prepared and now submits to us six similar maps so modified and amended as to show all the lands, rights and privileges now required for the purposes above named; and now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the approval and adoption, on the 5th day of May, 1886, of the six similar maps first above named be and the same is hereby revoked, and the certification thereon is hereby directed to be canceled.

Resolved, That we, the Aqueduct Commissioners, do hereby approve and adopt the modified final plan prepared and submitted to us by the Commissioner of Public Works, pursuant to section 2, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, upon which modified plan is shown all the lands now to be taken in fee for the construction of the dams and reservoirs upon the east branch of the Croton river, in the town of South East, in the County of Putnam, and known as the "East Branch Reservoirs" or "Double Reservoirs 1," or which are necessary for the prosecution of the work authorized by said act and acts amendatory thereof, and we direct the said modified plan to be certified and filed as "Final Plan, Sheet F F 2"; and we do also hereby approve and adopt the six similar property maps prepared and now submitted to us by the Commissioner of Public Works, pursuant to section 4 of the aforesaid act, whereon is shown all the lands included in the aforesaid Final Plan Sheet F F 2, and now required to be taken in fee for the purposes above named; and we direct the adoption of the said maps to be duly certified thereon, and that the Secretary then transmit the said maps to the Counsel to the Corporation, pursuant to said section 4 of said act.

Resolved, That said Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to take, at as early day as practicable, the required proceedings for the appointment of Commissioners of Appraisal, and the acquirement of said lands by the City in fee. Adopted.

The Committee on Real Estate next reported, that upon the lands taken by the City for the New Aqueduct in the towns of Mount Pleasant, Ossining and New Castle, in Westchester County, the assessors of those towns levied taxes on a valuation so excessive, when compared with the valuation of adjoining property of private owners, that said taxes could not be certified to the Comptroller for payment as "reasonable and proper;" but the Committee has reason to believe that some, if not all, of such disputed taxes can now be adjusted with those towns upon an equitable basis, and therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution empowering them to make such an adjustment of said taxes:

Whereas, Certain lands taken by the City, in fee, for the New Aqueduct, in the towns of Mount Pleasant, Ossining and New Castle, in the county of Westchester, have heretofore been taxed by the Assessors of said towns at an excessive valuation, for which reason the payment of said taxes has been withheld; and

Whereas, This Commission has reason to believe that an equitable adjustment of such taxes can now be made; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Committee on Real Estate is hereby authorized and empowered to adjust with the representatives of the aforesaid towns of Mount Pleasant, Ossining and New Castle all unpaid taxes for the years 1885 and 1886, upon such terms as the said Committee deems equitable and just.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes the resolution was adopted.

A communication was received from Charles Pugsley, Principal Assistant Engineer, dated May 10, tendering his resignation of the position of Principal Assistant Engineer, to take effect May 31, 1887.

The communication was read, and on motion of Commissioner Ridgway, was referred to the Committee on Construction.

Commissioner Newton offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Whereas, The By-laws of this Commission provide for the office of Deputy Chief Engineer; therefore

Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed by the President to take the matter into consideration, and report to the Commissioners the name of a suitable person or persons for appointment to the position of Deputy Chief Engineer; and said Committee shall also report to the Commission any facts or views pertaining to the subject matter that they may deem important in the premises; and said Committee shall report at the meeting of the Commissioners on the 25th instant.

Commissioner Barnes seconded the resolution, and the same was adopted.

The President then appointed as such Committee Commissioners Newton, Dowd and Barnes. The Commissioners then adjourned.

From East River Bathing Company—Requesting permission to locate floating bath at the bulkhead, between Water and Cherry streets, East river, as per diagram submitted, and inclosing consent of Lawrence & Co., owners of a portion of said bulkhead. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Samuel Hanna—Requesting permission to connect premises No. 383 West Eleventh street with sewer pipe to cross the street and empty into the North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

**AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH**  
of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, May 19, 1887, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 95 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 95. That it shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee and occupant of any and every building, or place of business in the generally built-up portions of the City of New York, forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, suitable and sufficient boxes, barrels or tubs for receiving and holding without leakage, and without being filled to within four inches of the top thereof all the ashes, rubbish, garbage, and liquid substances, of whatever kind, that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee or occupant; and every such box, barrel and tub designed to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal. That a separate vessel shall be provided for ashes and rubbish, and another for garbage and liquid substances; and ashes and rubbish shall not be placed or kept in the same vessel with garbage and liquid substances; and all ashes, rubbish, garbage and liquid substances that should be removed from such buildings and place of business, or from that part for which said receptacles were provided, and none other (without the proper consent) shall be placed therein, and no such box, barrel or tub, before or after it is emptied, shall be placed or permitted to remain upon the open sidewalk between the curb and the area or stoop-line, or in any other public place, but may be kept within and between the stoop or area-line and the house-line of the premises to which it belongs, until removed therefrom for emptying by the authorized employees of the Department of Street Cleaning, and by them returned to the place whence it was taken.

### NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
