The Committee on Streets, to whom was referred the annexed resolution in favor of permitting the Western Union Telegraph Company to extend vault in front of No. 12 Dey street, respectfully,

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed vault extension may be permitted without detriment to the city or its interests, numerous permits of a like character having heretofore been granted. They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Western Union Telegraph Company to extend the vault in front of their premises, No. 12 Dey street, a distance of three feet beyond the curb-line, as shown in the annexed diagram, upon payment of the usual fee, provided the said Western Union Telegraph Company shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the exercise of the privilege hereby granted during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of extending said vault; the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,
October 12, 1891.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted September 29, 1891, which provides for the flagging of both sides of Ninety-ninth street, from Second to Third avenue, four feet wide, where not already done.

The Commissioner of Public Works reports that these sidewalks have heretofore been flagged four feet wide and assessment levied therefor. No ordinance should now be passed for flagging or reflagging them except under the provisions of section 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act, as amended by chapter 569 of the Laws of 1887, and upon the certificate of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Commissioner of Public Works, to whom this resolution was referred, reports as follows thereon:

"Fifty-seventh street was paved, from Eleventh avenue to the North river, under an ordinance approved July 14, 1875, as the street then existed west of Eleventh avenue. Since that time it has been considerably extended by filling in the water-front, and it is this portion of the street which remains unpaved and should be provided for by ordinance."

"To place this watering-trough and connect it with the water-main would necessitate the tearing up of the new and expensive granite-block pavement, which concrete foundation and tar and gravel joints, and the resolution is objected to on that ground."

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board a resolution exempting the Manhattan Field from the operations of the ordinances relating to the firing of firearms, fireworks, etc.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That premises known as the "Manhattan Field," located at or near Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, formerly the New Polo Grounds, be and is hereby excepted from the provisions of article XIII of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to the firing of firearms, cannons and fireworks.

Alderman Morgan moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman Morgan, the paper was then placed on file.

By Alderman J. Morris—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to the Board a resolution permitting August Brentano to place an ornamental lamp in front of No. 5 Union Square.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to August Brentano to place and keep an ornamental lamp-post and lamp in front of No. 5 Union Square, provided the lamp be kept lighted during the same hours as the public lamps, that the post shall not exceed the dimensions prescribed by law (eighteen inches square at the base), the lamp not to exceed two feet in diameter and not to be used for advertising purposes, the work to be done and gas supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF
THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 1 o'clock P. M. on Monday, October 5, 1891.

Present—Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; and Nicholas T. Brown, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.
The minutes of the meeting held September 8, 1891, were read and approved.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS,
COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET,
NEW YORK, September 19, 1891.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 10th instant, stating that you have reliable information that there are but few men at work in the quarry from which the granite for the New Criminal Court-house is obtained, and suggesting that I ascertain how many men there are in the quarry; how many are driving trucks, and how many Cutters are actually at work there.

Under my instructions, Mr. Stevenson Towle at once proceeded to inspect the quarry and works at Keesville, N. Y., from which the granite is obtained, and he reports the following force employed:

Thirty-one Rockmen and Helpers, four Steam Engineers and two Blacksmiths engaged in quarrying stone.

Eighty stone-cutters, eighteen Helpers and five Blacksmiths engaged in cutting and dressing stone.

Three teams employed in carting stone from the quarry to stone-cutting yard.

Mr. Towle further reports: "Consulting the plans, I find that all stone of courses A, B, C to E and F have been completed, excepting one stone in F, which is now under the hammer and will be completed in one day. Course G is complete except twelve stones, five of which are quarried, leaving but seven of this course to be quarried. These are all the large blocks that are to be quarried. Six stones in Course I, for Centre street entrance, and seven for the Franklin street entrance, are yet to be quarried, but these are not delaying the work. Course H is all cut and shipped. The stock in the stone-cutting yard consists of thirty-nine pieces, ready for cutting. The stone-cutters were at work on sixty-nine stones most needed to progress the work of building, and which are being shipped as rapidly as finished. A car load was shipped on Saturday last, the 12th instant, and two more are to follow this week. Contractor Dawson, of the firm of Dawson & Archer, which has the contract for the building, was at the quarry and cutting yard, giving personal attention to finishing stones most needed. With the force now at work, all the stones can be cut in twenty days and shipped to New York."

It is true that there have been delays in the furnishing of the large granite blocks for the building, owing to the difficulty of obtaining the very large blocks unblemished by any discoloration on the face. These could only be obtained low down in the quarry after removing very large quantities of stone.

The present condition of the work, as reported by Mr. Towle, appears to guarantee that there will be no further cause for delay in the construction of the Criminal Court Building on this account.

The Comptroller presented the following report in regard to the delay of the contractors in furnishing the granite for the new Criminal Court Building:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 5, 1891.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At the meeting of this Board of September 8, 1891, the report of Architect Wilson on the request to him of August 3, 1891, in reference to the supply of granite for the Criminal Court Building, was referred to the Comptroller for examination and report and for such suggestion as the Comptroller may make in reference to the forfeiture of this contract. The subject has been by my direction carefully examined by the Engineer of the Finance Department, and he reports that in his judgment the walls of the building will not be completed all around higher than the top of the first court story before the 20th of November. There will then be left to be built one court story and two upper stories, which will take at least three months; the roof can then be placed, the iron-work of which will require at least six weeks, and the tiling and other covering six weeks more. The building will not therefore be roofed before May 20, 1892, and probably later, as no allowance is made for cold weather during which no work could be done. From all the facts as they exist, and granting the most favorable conditions of weather during the winter, the building cannot be completed before the end of December, 1892.

On the 5th of September, 1891, 358 working days had been charged to the contractors, leaving 142 days to their credit on the time bid, which time will expire on or about April 5, 1892.

The undoubted cause of the delay is the failure of the granite supply, and the various strikes have occasioned no loss of time, for the reason that the main work could not be any further advanced than it is now, for want of the granite courses. If the energy now displayed had been earlier manifested, no trouble would have occurred, as the work has progressed as fast as possible without the basement stone.

I fail to see how the city can regain the lost time by declaring the contract forfeited—the work must be done and the stone must come from the same quarry; the effect of such a proceeding would be a very large additional loss of time, without any prospective gain.

For default in completing the work on time, the contract prescribes a penalty of one hundred dollars a day for every day the work remains incomplete after the expiration of the time fixed therein, viz.: five hundred days, and in my view the Board must insist upon the strict and unswerving enforcement of the contract, without favor.

On motion of the Mayor, the Comptroller was authorized to procure the testimony of experts, if necessary, with a view to the enforcement of the penalty prescribed for the non-completion of the building within the time limited by the terms of the contract.

The Comptroller presented the following report and resolution to authorize the issue of \$1,000,000 Dock Bonds:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 5, 1891.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At the meeting of this Board on June 8, 1891, I presented a communication from the President of the Department of Docks, dated May 29, 1891, requesting that the Comptroller be directed to prepare and issue one million of dollars of Dock Bonds for the uses and purposes of that Department, which was laid over. By resolution of the Dock Board, at its meeting of July 10, 1891, the above request was amended to read three millions of dollars of bonds to be issued, which was referred to the Comptroller, and on August 25, 1891, the Comptroller received from the Department of Docks a memorandum of the items of the expenses proposed by the Dock Board and amounting to \$2,725,000, which was presented to this Board August 3, 1891, and was also referred to the Comptroller.

The memorandum above mentioned was, by my direction, carefully investigated and studied by the Engineer of the Finance Department, and while, without doubt, the work therein proposed to be done by the Dock Department would be of incalculable value to the city, I am of opinion that the issue at the present time of the larger amount of bonds asked for would be inexpedient, I recommend, however, the issue of one million dollars of bonds, as requested by the original resolution of the Dock Board of May 28, 1891.

I offer the following resolution for such action as this Board may deem advisable.

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of Docks adopted a resolution on May 28, 1891, requesting this Board to direct the Comptroller to prepare and issue one million dollars of Dock Bonds for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks; and

Whereas, The said resolution was amended at the Dock Board meeting of July 10, 1891, to read three million dollars of Dock Bonds; therefore,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 143 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as may be required, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks, at a rate of interest not exceeding three per cent. per annum, Dock Bonds of the City of New York, to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), under a resolution adopted July 10, 1891, by the Commissioners of Docks, making requisition for the issue of bonds for three million dollars, said bonds to be exempt from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of provisions of section 137 of said Consolidation Act, and an ordinance of the Common Council passed October 2, 1880, and as hereby authorized and directed.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Recorder called up the preamble and resolution to approve change of lines of Pier, new 50, North river, laid over at the meeting of September 8, 1891:

Whereas, The Board of Docks, at its meeting of August 20, 1891, adopted a resolution advising the change of the location of Pier, new 50, at the foot of West Twentieth street, North river, from the location as laid down on the plans determined by the Board of Docks on April 13, 1871, and adopted and certified to by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 27, 1871, and requesting the consent and approval of this Board to the change; and

Whereas, The change recommended is: That the northerly line extended of Pier, new 50, to be in the continuation westerly of the northerly line of West Twentieth street. The southerly line of Pier, new 50, to lie in the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of West Twentieth street, and to be parallel to and distant sixty feet southerly from the northerly line of said Pier, new 50, and the side lines of Pier, new 50, to form an angle with the established bulkhead line of seventy-seven degrees five minutes and forty-two seconds on the northerly side of said lines. The length of said Pier, new 50, to be three hundred and fifty-four and ninety-two one-hundredths feet on the northerly side and three hundred and forty-three and twenty-three one-hundredths feet on the southerly side thereof, extending from the bulkhead-line established in 1871, to the pier-head line determined by the Department of Docks July 3, 1890, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund July 24, 1890. The width of said Pier, new 50, to be sixty feet instead of one hundred feet, as on the aforesaid plan of 1871, all of which is shown on the plan submitted herewith in duplicate by the Engineer-in-Chief; therefore,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby consent to and approve of the change in length, width and location of the new pier at the foot of West Twentieth street, North river, to be known as Pier, new 50, from the lines and location therefor as laid down on the plans determined by the Board of Docks April 13, 1871, and adopted and certified to by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871, which new location is shown on a map or plan herewith attached, and designated in red lines on said map.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following application of the Commissioner of Public Works for a renewal of the lease of the building No. 31 Chambers street, with a report and resolution to authorize a lease :

GENTLEMEN—The work under contract for the construction of the New Criminal Court Building is progressing, and the means are required to pay the contractors from time to time, for work done and materials furnished according to the terms of the contracts.

A resolution is herewith submitted to authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) for the purpose of providing the necessary funds for the payment of the expenses of the construction of the building as provided by law. Bonds to the amount of three hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars have heretofore been issued under the authorization of this Board, and the proceeds have been nearly all expended.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 8 of chapter 371 of the Laws of 1887, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby authorize and direct the Comptroller to issue bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to the amount of two hundred

and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), to be known as "Criminal Court-house Bonds," payable from taxation, and redeemable in not less than ten nor more than twenty years from the date of issue, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three per cent. per annum, the proceeds of which shall be applied to the payment of expenses incurred, and to be incurred, in the construction of the new Criminal Court Building ; provided, also, that said bonds shall be exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of the authority of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 and an ordinance of the Common Council passed October 2, 1880.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following :

Whereas, Certain bonds and stocks of the City of New York, payable from taxation, as provided by the laws authorizing their issue, amounting to the sum of three million six hundred and twenty-two thousand one hundred dollars (\$3,622,100), become due and payable on November 1, 1891, a portion of which, amounting to two million seven hundred and thirty-two thousand nine hundred dollars, is held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the remaining portion amounting to eight hundred and eighty-nine thousand two hundred dollars (\$889,200) being outstanding and held by the public ; and

Whereas, Section 176 of said Consolidation Act authorizes the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to pay from the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," any portion of the bonded debt of the city, provided such payment shall not in any way impair the preferred claims thereon, as specified in section 175 of said Consolidation Act ; therefore,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby authorize and direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to pay and redeem the stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, outstanding and held by the public, becoming due and payable on the first day of November, 1891, and amounting to the sum of eight hundred and eighty-nine thousand two hundred dollars (\$889,200), as follows :

Goldsticker, for rent due for first loft of premises No. 182 Fulton street, from July 23d to August 23d, of this year, I have to say that in the letter of July 23d, last, addressed to the Sinking Fund, asking authority to lease the premises in question, the time of beginning was inadvertently omitted. The fact is that the premises were placed at the disposal of the Department on July 23d, and that they were occupied as soon thereafter as it was practicable, to wit, on July 26th.

Upon this statement I have to request that the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be amended so as to cover the date of the voucher, which is herewith returned.

Resolved, That the Comptroller is hereby authorized to pay the above sum for such rental to the owners, L. and M. Goldsticker, upon the proper voucher of the officers of the Fire Department." Which resolutions were unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following :

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—On September 8, 1891, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen granting permission to Henry Clausen and Son to lay a ten-inch iron pipe for conducting salt water from the East river to their premises on the north side of East Forty-eighth street, beginning at a point one hundred and seventy-five feet east from Second avenue. The resolution became adopted on September 21st, without the approval of the Mayor. It appears that a pipe was laid without charge for a similar purpose and in this same place some years since, before the fixing of the annual charge was in the hands of the Sinking Fund Commissioners. This pipe has now become useless from the effects of salt water and corrosion, and the present application is for the purpose of replacing the old pipe with a new one.

From the report of the Engineer of the Finance Department, the distance is eleven hundred and sixty-eight feet, and the amount of annual compensation to be paid the City has been fixed at two hundred dollars and based on amounts paid by others for similar long-distance privileges.

I offer the following resolution for such action as the Board may deem proper.

Resolved, That the compensation to be paid to the City by Henry Clausen and Son for the privilege of laying a ten-inch iron pipe, in lieu of the pipe already laid, for conducting salt water from the East river to a point on their premises on the north side of East Forty-eighth street, distant one hundred and seventy-five feet easterly from Second avenue, shall be fifty dollars (\$50), to the Department of Public Works, for a permit to open the street for laying such pipe, and that the compensation to be paid annually and every year thereafter while such pipe shall be in use the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), the opening of the street and relaying of the pavement to be done at the expense of the said Henry Clausen and Son, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and subject to such conditions as he shall prescribe; provided, also, that the said Henry Clausen and Son shall give a satisfactory bond for the faithful performance of all such conditions, and as prescribed by the resolution of the Board of Aldermen passed September 8, 1891, and adopted September 21, 1891, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, said bond to be approved by the Comptroller and filed in his office; and further provided that the right be reserved to revoke such permission at any time if necessary in the interest of the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented a report on the insurance of the market buildings, as follows :

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller begs to report, that since the matter of the insuring of the market buildings was referred to him, numerous conferences have been held with the market-men, who have been fully alive to the advantages of such a system, and who have aided the Comptroller in the development and accomplishment of a plan which is herewith submitted to this Board. The market-men have themselves, and at no cost to the city, effected an insurance of \$200,000 on the New West Washington Market, for three years, in the two following companies : Phoenix Insurance Company of Hartford, Conn., \$50,000; Insurance Company of North America, Philadelphia, \$150,000; and on Fulton Market, an insurance of \$125,000 has been effected for three years in the German-American Company.

These policies are now on file in the Comptroller's office, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, insuring this market property against all loss or damage by fire.

These two cases are the only ones I have to report upon at present; but doubtless at the next meeting others will have followed the example which has been thus set.

The following communication was received from the Hon. Simon Stevens, relative to cribbing Riker's Island :

OFFICES OF SIMON STEVENS, No. 61 BROADWAY, }
NEW YORK, September 30, 1891.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—Referring to my letter of June 17, 1890, in relation to "cribbing Riker's Island" and making 400 acres of new land in Flushing Bay for use of Commissioners of Public Charities "and Correction and save our harbor from destruction," which, on the 25th of June, 1890, was referred to the Comptroller for examination and report, I now have to say, that the New York Harbor Line Board, appointed by the Secretary of War, for the establishment of the Harbor Lines of New York Harbor and its adjacent waters by Special Order No. 49, Headquarters Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., Washington, D. C., October 5, 1888, in accordance with section 12, Act of August 11, 1888, made a report to the Chief of Engineers on the 23d of December, 1890, limiting the pier and bulkhead lines around Riker's Island to less than one-quarter in territorial extent of that claim by the City, under grant from the Legislature of the State of New York.

I am not aware that any one in behalf of the City appeared before the Harbor and Line Board to advocate the extension of solid filling around Riker's Island, hence the Army Board fell back to the old line of 1857.

Now I beg to suggest that an official communication from the City of New York shall be sent to the Secretary of War, providing your Board is in favor of enlarging Riker's Island, making a request that the matter shall be reopened, and that an order shall be issued to the Harbor Line Board to give a hearing to New York City officials as to the feasibility of establishing a new and extended line around Riker's Island, say on the eight or ten feet contour line, instead of twelve feet as heretofore suggested.

I am inclined to believe that if such action as I have suggested shall be taken by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the Army Board will be pleased to reconsider their former action and adopt an extended line which, if allowed to be filled in, will give some 250 or 300 more acres for a new dumping ground for dirt and ashes gathered by the Street Cleaning Department, instead of dumping into the bay or off the mouth of the harbor.

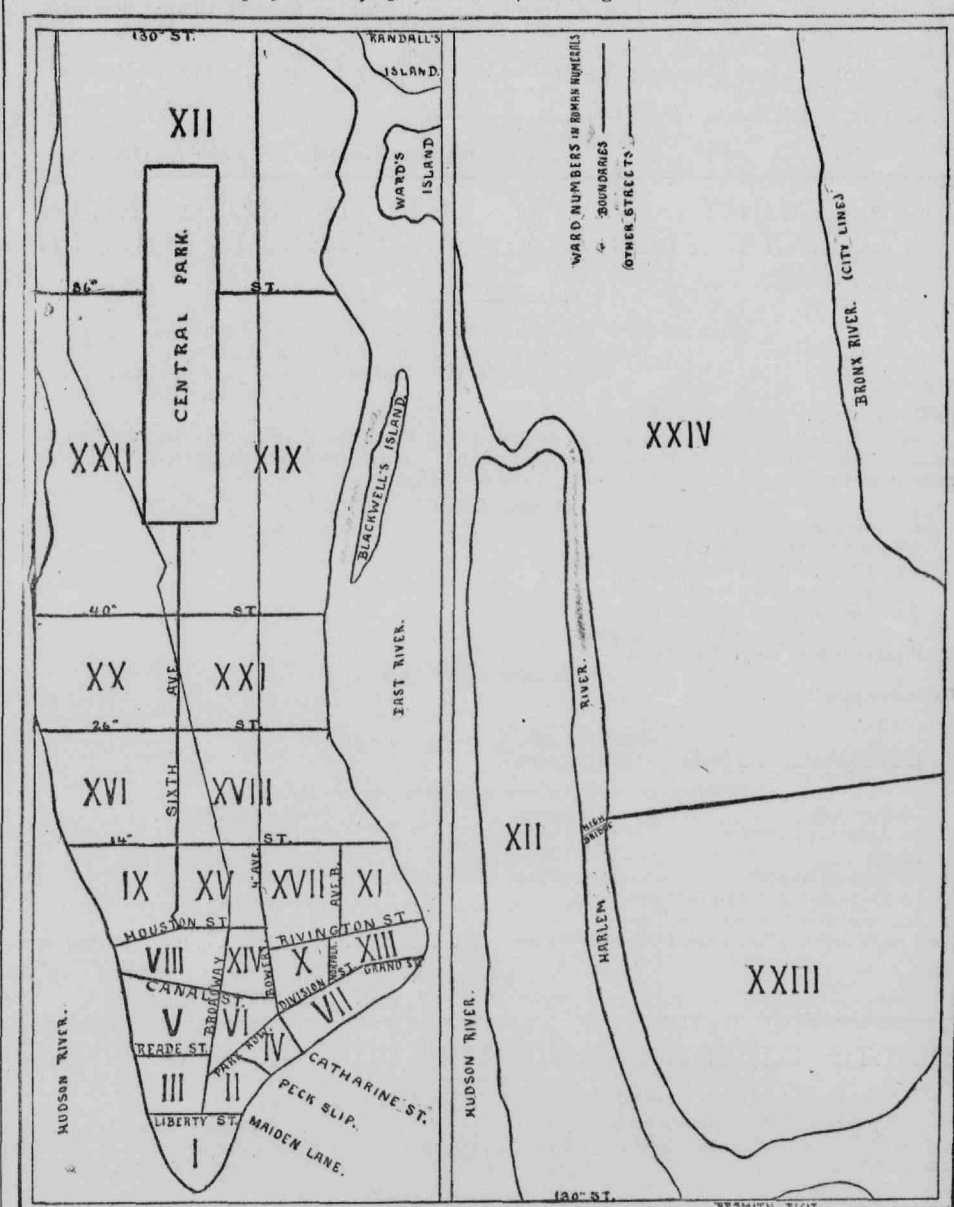

The 737 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.70, against 25.00 for the previous week and 20.63 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever being respectively 75, 38, 48 and 65, against 68, 48, 64 and 92 for the previous week. Diphtheria increased noticeably between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, elsewhere decreasing or remaining almost stationary. Measles increased between Division and Rivington streets, the Bowery and Norfolk street, and between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, West, elsewhere, as a rule, decreasing. Scarlet fever showed a marked increase between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, and a slight increase between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, West, the decrease being most noticeable between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West. Typhoid fever was most prevalent above Fortieth street, 27 out of 65 cases being in that locality, and 22 of the remaining cases being below Fourteenth street; 7 cases were in the annexed district, and of the remaining 9, between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets, 6 were on the east side and 3 on the west.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is

authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
