

Section 191 of the Consolidation Act provides as follows:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City for the term of one year from November 1, 1891, at the yearly rental of ten thousand five hundred dollars (\$10,500) upon the same terms and conditions as the existing lease, for certain rooms, offices, or apartments, now occupied by the Counsel to the Corporation in the New Yorker Staats Zeitung Building, situated in Tryon Row, at the intersection of Centre and Chatham streets (now Park Row), in the City of New York, designated and known as and by the entire third floor or story and the rooms numbered 1, 2 and 3, on the fourth floor or story of said building, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

On motion, the Comptroller was authorized to pay the rent of the offices now occupied by the Counsel to the Corporation in the Staats Zeitung Building until May 1, 1892, at the rate of \$10,500 per annum.

The Comptroller was instructed also, to inquire and report whether more commodious offices can be hired for the Law Department and the Department of Taxes and Assessments, satisfactory to the Counsel to the Corporation and the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments.

The following application was received from the New York and Westchester Water Company: The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, New York:

The New York and Westchester Water Company has been unavoidably delayed in completing the water line between the mainland to Hart's Island, from the mainland by way of City Island. the water line between the mainland to Hart's Island, from the mainland by way of City Island. The delay in the line through the public parks, and a change of route made at the suggestion of the Engineer brought the laying of the pipe in much deeper water than was expected, to get above the anchorage of boats between City Island and Hart's Island, and necessitated the making of an extra heavy interlocking joint pipe of the new Ward patent, which is now being laid.

The old Ward joint, similar to water crossing at Brother's Island and Blackwell's Island could have been completed within the time limited, to January I, but would have been open to the danger of leaks and breakage which has twice rendered other lines used by the City useless (notably to Blackwell's and Brother's Island).

Blackwell's and Brother's Island).

The Hart's Island line being over a mile in length, the company has gone to many thousand dollars of extra expense, and much extra time in securing a pipe with an interlocking ball and socket joint that cannot be broken or affected by any of the things that would affect the ordinary ball and socket joint. It will take about fifty days longer time to manufacture and lay the balance of the pipe. The contractor has notified us that he hopes to do it in thirty days, and that the winter gales on the Sound will prevent his working except in fairly calm weather. Under the circumstances and owing to the unavoidable land delays, and the great extra expense and trouble, the company has taken in the water crossing to insure the supply from the city to Hart's Island, we respectfully ask that a formal extension of fifty days be granted. The company, meanwhile, is proceeding with its work with all diligence and dispatch, and has completed turning on water through the upwards of seven miles of supply pipes which reach to the water crossing line.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN-At a meeting of this Board on the 23d of October last, I presented a protest from Hon. John Jeroloman, Justice of the Eighth District Civil Court, against the further leasing of the loft on the southwest corner of Twenty-second street and Seventh avenue for court purposes, which was referred to the Comptroller. The lease of the present premises expires January 1, 1892, and it is considered advisable to locate the court-rooms elsewhere.

Since the matter was referred to the Comptroller, the Engineer of the Finance Department has examined the premises on the corner of Seventh avenue and Twenty-third street, which are offered to the City at the rental of \$3,000 per annum. He has also examined another location offered at the same rental in the second story of the Grand Opera House, corner of Eighth avenue and Twentythird street, which he reports to be well suited for the purposes of a district court, and which are superior to any other from the fact that they are so far ready for occupancy that the court could be held on January 2, 1892; whereas the first location mentioned would require probably a fortnight to make suitable alterations. The expenses of the alterations in the Grand Opera House site are estimated at \$600, and would consist in the new arrangement of the furniture and fittings of the present court to suit the different dimensions. The place is easy of access, being one story above the street, with wide and easy stairs, and also an elevator. The light is ample, and the ventilation all that could be desired; the chandeliers in place are sufficient to afford ample means of lighting with gas; and steam heat is furnished without additional cost. No repairs of any kind are proposed. The rooms can be leased until May I, 1896, the present lessees having a lease of them until that date. The area of the room is 6,300 square feet, the main court-room being 68 x 64; the rooms are all on the same floor with the Judge's room and record rooms to be partitioned off so as to adjoin the court-room. The premises seem to be admirably suited for the purposes of this court in every way, and the rental of \$3,000 per annum is considered fair and reasonable, and I submit a resolution for adoption to authorize the lease of the above-described premises until May 1, 1896.

On motion, the report was laid ever, and the Comptroller was authorized to hire temporary quarters for the Court until a permanent location is secured.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works, relative to the present condition of the work on the New Criminal Court Building:

> DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS—COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE,) No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET, NEW YORK, December 16, 1891.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

DEAR SIR—Having, from personal observation for some weeks past, come to the conclusion that satisfactory progress was not being made with the construction of the New Criminal Court Building, I called upon the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies to make a full and detailed report of the present status of the work, and after receipt of his report I communicated its substance to Mr. James W. Wilson, architect of the building, with the request that he carefully examine and consider the statement of the present condition of the work and the estimate of the force and time required to complete it with reasonable speed, and to report to me thereon, in writing, at the earliest possible moment.

The condition of the work at the time of the report of the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, November 27, ultimo, was as follows:

Of the five hundred working days within which the building should be completed according to Of the five hundred working days within which the building should be completed according to the contract, four hundred and one days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, and days on which the work could not be prosecuted on account of stress of weather had been consumed. The mean height of the building on its four street fronts, from the street level to the parapet, is to be 112 feet. The Elm street front, which is the farthest advanced, was 49 feet below the parapet; the White street front, from 57 to 65 feet below the parapet; the Franklin street front, from 73 to 75 feet below, and the Centre street front, from 75 to 80 feet below the parapet, with the granite work still incomplete. Of the 19 interior brick partition walls, nine and a part of a tenth were built to within 46 feet of the roof level, and the others were from 65 to 80 feet below the required height. Two stories of the marble interior arcade are finished, leaving two stories yet to be built. Of the eight tiers of iron beams required, five were in place on the Elm street front, four on about half of the interior space of the building, and only two on the Centre street front. The iron work, heating apparatus and plumbing are advanced as far as the state of the masonry work permits.

It is evident from this condition of the work that it is a physical impossibility to complete it

It is evident from this condition of the work that it is a physical impossibility to complete it within the contract time. The Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies concluded his report with the following estimate and recommendation as to the further progress of the work: That the masonry, stone and terra cotta work could and should be completed in sixty-four days by the continuous employment of not less than thirty bricklayers and five stonesetters; that after the building is under a roof a force of thirty plasterers could do the plastering of the one hundred and sixty-nine rooms in seventy days; the other interior work, such as heating apparatus and plumbing, to be progressed as heretofore as rapidly as the progress of the masonry work permits.

In the reply of Mr. James W. Wilson, the architect, he agrees with the report of the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies as to the state of the work. He adds that the contractors were preparing the ornamental plastering work so that there would be no delay on that account when the building is ready for plastering; that Contractors Dawson and Archer informed him that as soon as the first floor above the second court story shall be in place they will cover it with water-proof material and go on with the plastering and other interior work below, and that he (Mr. Wilson) thinks it safe to say that the entire building will be up to the height of the Elm street front before

thinks it safe to say that the entire building will be up to the height of the Elm street front before January 10, proximo.

Acting upon these reports, I notified Contractors Dawson and Archer, in writing, under date of 12th inst., requiring them to put on the work at once the force recommended by the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, and that otherwise it would become necessary to take such summary measures as are provided for in the contract in case of its violation by unnecessary delay in the prosecution of the work.

I have deemed it proper to place these circumstances before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their information and consideration.

The following communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, advising compromise of the claim in suit of William M. Kingsland, trustee, etc:

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, December 21, 1891.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Department of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—Mr. Albert B. Boardman, of counsel in the suit of William M. Kingsland, as sole surviving trustee, etc., against the Mayor, has expressed to me his willingness to compromise the claim and thus end the litigation, on payment to his client of five hundred dollars per running foot with interest thereon from the date of the taking of the property by the City from his client, to wit, from the 1st of August, 1880.

Which was accepted.

I desire to submit this proposition to your bodies respectively, and await your instructions. The plaintiff in August, 1880, owned one hundred and four feet of bulkhead on West street, adjoining the Hudson river, at the foot of Charlton street.

He brought his action in June, 1883, substantially to recover damages because the City in August, 1880, under and pursuant to chapter 570 of the Laws of 1871, destroyed his bulkhead by filling in the land under water in front of his bulkhead out to the line of solid filling established by the latter act. By this filling in the bulkhead became entirely confiscated, and from the time of such filling the property has been in the possession of the City and has been rented.

A new pier, which is now known as Pier No. 37, has been built at the foot of Charlton street, and has been since the 30th day of April, 1883, rented to C. P. Huntington at a rental of \$70,000 per annum, and on the filled in land at the north and south sides of the pier sheds have been constructed, which are used by the said Huntington in connection with his pier, and a rental has been received therefrom of \$3,500 per year.

In December, 1884, the matter was referred to the late Hamilton Cole, Esq., to assess the damages, and in April, 1886, Mr. Cole filed his report to the effect that the plaintiff was entitled to judgment for \$104,000, assessing the value of the plaintiff's bulkhead at \$1,000 per foot, with interest on that sum from August 1, 1880, together with costs, and upon this report judgment was regularly entered. An appeal was taken from this judgment, and in June, 1887, the judgment was

regularly entered. An appeal was taken from this judgment, and in June, 1887, the judgment was reversed and a new trial ordered.

Vide 45 Hun, 198.

The report of Mr. Cole was reversed because, as Judge Daniels said in the General Term opinion: "A further and important element, however, entered into the allowance of compensation "by the referee in this action, that was placed upon the fact that permission was obtained by John "G. Dale, as agent of the lessee, to extend the structure westerly of the platform made under the "resolution of the Common Council of 1851 a further distance of about sixty or sixty-five feet into "the Hudson river beyond the westerly line of the preceding platform and to erect a shed over it for the convenience of the business of the lessee. This privilege was expected to be secured before the lease of the bulkhead was taken and the amount of the rent reserved by the lease was greatly increased by that circumstance.

On an appeal subsequently taken by the plaintiff to the Court of Appeals, the order granting a new trial was affirmed.

The Court of Appeals in its opinion, among other things, said:
"What shall be the measure and basis of that compensation is the question now presented and

" ascertained and fairly measured, the wharf owner should recover, but not for any value resulting " from his platform and shed."

The case, therefore, came back for a new trial, and was tried before Judge Lawrence and a jury in June, 1890, and after a trial occupying nearly two weeks, during which a large number of real estate experts and steamboat and steamship owners and managers were examined pro and con, the jury rendered a verdict for the plaintiff assessing the value of the bulkhead at \$90,000, or on a basis of about \$865 per running toot, and to this sum was to be added interest from the 1st of August, 1880. On the 24th of June, 1890, judgment was entered in favor of the plaintiff for \$146,190.56, which included \$ for interest and \$ for costs and allowance.

which included \$ for interest and \$ for costs and allowance.

From this last-named judgment an appeal was, on the 28th day of June, 1890, taken to the General Term, and on the 26th day of June, 1891, the last-named judgment was reversed for errors in the rulings by the learned Judge in the course of the trial.

The main contention of this office in support of the last-named appeal taken by the City was that the damages were excessive and were brought about by the erroneous rulings of the Trial Judge, giving to the plaintiff as an increment of value a preferential use to European steamship companies, it being contended by this office that such preference was confined to domestic steamboat lines plying up the Hudson river and Sound. We did not prevail as to that point, the General Term saying in its opinion: "The question as to whether it was the intention of the Court of "Appeals to construe the act of 1858 as giving to an adjoining transatlantic or coastwise steamship "line with the owner of the bulkhead a preferential use of the same can only be authoritatively "determined by that Court."

This inability to determine the question by the General Term was brought about by the circumstance that when this case was before the Court of Appeals that court seemed to have held that under the act of 1858 such preferential use was not limited to steamboat lines, lessees of adjacent piers, plying in the waters of the Bay, Hudson river, East river, Long Island Sound, the rivers entering into the Sound, Narragansett Bay and the bays adjacent thereto which are mentioned in the act; but that transatlantic and coastwise steamship lines were entitled to undisturbed facilities for the transaction of their business under the provisions of this act of 1858.

No other steps have been taken in this action since the reversal by the General Term, except that the matter of the propriety of compromising upon a reasonable basis has frequently been before me, and I have given to the matter careful reflection, and it is my judgment that in view of the circumstances that when the case was first tried damages were awarded upon the basis of \$1,000 per running foot; that upon the second trial, after the objectionable element of the shedding had been eliminated, a jury, in the face of all the evidence that could reasonably be procured which would shed a light upon the subject, assessed the value at about \$865 per running foot, and in view of the fact that there was a lease of the bulkhead to the Inman Steamship Company at a rental of \$5,000, with the privilege of renewal at a rental of \$7,500 for an additional ten years, existing at the time the City took possession of this bulkhead, and of the further fact that the bulkhead is in the midst of the European steamship locality and in connection with Pier No. 37 is at present rented to C. P. Huntington for \$73,500 a year, I am of the opinion that an adjustment upon the basis of \$500 per running foot with interest from August I, 1880, would be a judicious settlement for the City, and therefore I recommend it.

The increase of 89 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 7 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 8 from heart disease, of 61 from pneumonia, of 14 from violence, and of 31 from influenza. There was a decrease of 10 in the deaths from scarlet fever, and of 11 from phthisis.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards, and

from scarlet fever in the Twelfth Ward.
