

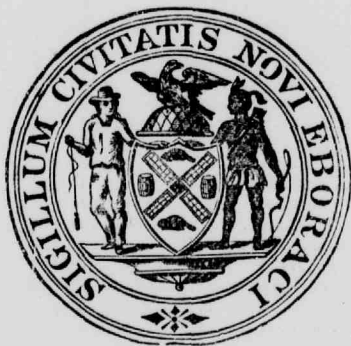
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POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1878.

To the Honorable EDWARD COOPER,
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force, for the three months ending December 31, 1878.

REPORT.

On the 31st day of December, 1878, the number of members of the Force, of the several grades including Surgeons, was 2,533.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Police Force, by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter ending December 31, 1878, and the details thereof, are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 5,852½ days.
