



It having been reported and ascertained by this Board that W. Hayne Johnson, heretofore appointed by said Board to the office of Inspector of Election for the Eighteenth Election District of the Eighteenth Assembly District of the City and County of New York, is unfit for the office of Inspector of Election by reason of intoxication; therefore it is

Resolved, That the said office is, and the said Board does hereby declare the same to be vacant—all voting aye.

Charges of unfitness for office having been preferred against Edward R. Scott, Ninth Election District, Sixteenth Assembly District, heretofore appointed by this Board to the office of Inspector of Election for the Election District named, and a hearing of the evidence having been had, after a notice in writing to said Inspector; Commissioner Voorhis moved—

That the said Edward R. Scott be removed, for the reason that it has been discovered since his appointment to the Ninth Election District of the Sixteenth Assembly District for the City and

County of New York, as an unsuitable person for the office of Inspector of Election, as per reports and testimony before this Board.

Commissioner Disbecker moved the following as a substitute:

That action on this case be deferred till 4 o'clock; that Mr. Hasbrouck and Captain Tynan be directed to subpoena such witnesses as can substantiate the charge, and the accused, Edward R. Scott, be afforded an opportunity to produce his witnesses and be confronted with the witnesses against him.

Commissioner Voorhis' motion was then lost.

Commissioner Disbecker's substitute for Commissioner Voorhis' motion, lost.

Commissioner Disbecker's substitute was amended by inserting the word "further" before the word "opportunity" and unanimously carried.
