Bureau of Elections.

Whereas, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 397, Laws of 1892, the Board of Aldermen met on the 19th day of July, 1892, and apportioned the City and County of New York into Assembly Districts, as follows:

First District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, Broadway, Park Row, Spruce street, Gold street, Ferry street, Peck Slip, East river, Hudson or North river, and Governor's Island, Bedlow's and Ellis Islands.

Second District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Grand street, Bowery, Division street, Pike street, Pike Slip, East river, Peck Slip, Ferry street, Gold street, Spruce street, Park Row, and Broadway.

Third District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Prince street, Bowery, Stanton street, Ludlow street, Grand street, Orchard street, Division street, Bowery, Grand street, and Broadway.

Fourth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Grand street, East river, Pike Slip, Pike street, and Orchard street.

Fifth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Stanton street, East river, Grand street, and Ludlow street.

Sixth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fourteenth street, East river, Stanton street, Clinton street, and Avenue B.

Seventh District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Eighth street, St. Mark's place, Avenue A, Seventh street, Avenue B, Clinton street, Stanton street, Bowery, Prince street, and Broadway.

Eighth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Christopher street, Greenwich avenue, Seventh avenue, West Fourteenth street, East Fourteenth street, Broadway, Spring street, and Hudson or North river.

Ninth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Nineteenth street, Seventh avenue, Greenwich avenue, Christopher street, and Hudson or North river.

Tenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Seventeenth street, East river, East Fourteenth street, Avenue B, Seventh street, Avenue A, St. Mark's place, Eighth street, Broadway, East Fourteenth street, and Fourth avenue.

Eleventh District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fortieth street, East Fortieth street, Fourth avenue, East Fourteenth street, West Fourteenth street, and Seventh avenue.

Twelfth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Twenty-ninth street, East river, East Seventeenth street, and Fourth avenue.

Thirteenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Thirty-first street, Seventh avenue, West Nineteenth street, and Hudson or North river.

Fourteenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-fourth street, East river, East Twenty-ninth street, and Fourth avenue.

Fifteenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fortieth street, Seventh avenue, West Thirty-first street, and Hudson or North river.

Sixteenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-ninth street, East river, East Forty-fourth street, Depew place, East Forty-fifth street, Fourth avenue, and Blackwell's Island.

Seventeenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-seventh street, Seventh avenue, West Fortieth street, and Hudson or North river.

Eighteenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-fourth street, Ninth avenue, West Fifty-third street, Seventh avenue, West Forty-seventh street, and Hudson or North river.

Nineteenth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Seventy-second street, Eighth avenue, West Fifty-ninth street, Seventh avenue, West Fifty-third street, Ninth avenue, West Fifty-fourth street, and Hudson or North river.

Twentieth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Seventy-third street, East river, East Fifty-ninth street, and Lexington avenue.

Twenty-first District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Transverse road across Central Park, at or near East Eighty-sixth street, East Eighty-sixth street, Lexington avenue, East Fifty-ninth street, Fourth avenue, East Forty-fifth street, Depew place, East Forty-second street, Fourth avenue, East Fortieth street, West Fortieth street, Seventh avenue, West Fifty-ninth street, and Eighth avenue.

Twenty-second District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Eighty-second street, East river, East Seventy-third street, and Lexington avenue.

Twenty-third District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Twenty-second street, and line running through Riverside Park, Boulevard, West One Hundred and Twentieth street, Seventh avenue, West One Hundred and Tenth street, Eighth avenue, West Seventy-second street, and Hudson or North river.

Twenty-fourth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Eighty-ninth street, East river, East Eighty-second street, Lexington avenue, East Eighty-sixth street, and Fifth avenue.

Twenty-fifth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Tenth street, Fifth avenue, East One Hundred and Fifth street, Harlem river, East river, East Eighty-ninth street, Fifth avenue, Transverse road across Central Park, at or near East Eighty-sixth street, and Eighth avenue.

Twenty-sixth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Harlem river, East One Hundred and Fifth street, Fifth avenue, West One Hundred and Tenth street, Seventh avenue, and Ward's Island.

Twenty-seventh District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harlem river, East One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Seventh avenue, Randall's Island, and Sunken Meadows.

Twenty-eighth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spuyten Duyvil creek, Harlem river, Seventh avenue, West One Hundred and Twentieth street, Boulevard, West One Hundred and Twenty-second street, and a line running through Riverside Park, and Hudson or North river.

Twenty-ninth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within Tremont avenue, Bronx river, East river or Long Island Sound, Harlem river, Willis avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Mott avenue, Jerome avenue, and North Brother's Island.

Thirtieth District—All that part of the city bounded by and lying within the northern boundary of the Twenty-fourth Ward, Bronx river, Tremont avenue, Jerome avenue, Mott avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Willis avenue, Harlem river, Spuyten Duyvil Creek, and Hudson or North river.

Whereas, The Board of Police is required under the provision of section 1, chapter 169, Laws of 1890, "to alter or divide the existing Election Districts, whenever necessary, in such manner that each Election District shall not contain more than two hundred and fifty voters;" therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Election Districts in the several Assembly Districts of the City and County of New York (as hereinabove described and bounded) be divided, bounded and numbered as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pearl street, Old slip, East river, and Whitehall street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Wall street, East river, Old slip, Pearl street, Whitehall street, and Broadway.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Fulton street, East river, Wall street and Broadway.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park row, Spruce street, Gold street, Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Fulton street, and Broadway.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Whitehall street, East river, Hudson or North river, Battery place, Greenwich street, Bedloe's, Ellis and Governor's Islands.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place, and Washington street.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Washington street, Battery place, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Carlisle street, Greenwich street, Thames street, Broadway, Rector street, and Hudson or North river.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Cedar street, Greenwich street, Carlisle street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Fulton street, Greenwich street, Cedar street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vesey street, Broadway, Thames street, and Greenwich street.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Murray street, Broadway, Vesey street, Greenwich street, Fulton street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Duane street, Broadway, Murray street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within North Moore street, West Broadway, Canal street, Broadway, Duane street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harrison street, Hudson street, Duane street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within North Moore street, Hudson street, Harrison street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, West Broadway, North Moore street, and Hudson street.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hubert street, Hudson street, North Moore street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Laight street, Canal street, West Broadway, Beach street, and Hudson street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Laight street, and Hudson street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vestry street, Hudson street, Hubert street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Watts street, Canal street, Hudson street, Vestry street, and Hudson or North river.

Second Assembly District.

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Cherry street, Pike slip, East river, and Catharine street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Monroe street, Pike street, Cherry street, and Market street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Madison street, Pike street, Monroe street, and Market street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Henry street, Pike street, Madison street, and Market street.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Broadway, Pike street, Henry street, and Market street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Division street, Pike street, East Broadway, and Market street.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Division street, Market street, East Broadway, and Catharine street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Broadway, Market street, Henry street, and Catharine street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within south side of Henry street, from Catharine street to Market street, and the east side of Catharine street, from Henry street to Madison street.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within north side of Madison street, from Catharine street to Market street, and the west side of Market street, from Madison street to Henry street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within south side of Madison street, from Catharine street to Market street, and the west side of Market street, from Monroe street to Madison street.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within east side of Catharine street, from Monroe street to Madison street, and the north side of Monroe street, from Catharine street to Market street.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within south side of Monroe street, from Catharine street to Market street; the east side of Catharine street, from Cherry street to Monroe street, and Hamilton street.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within north side of Cherry street, from Catharine street to Market street, and the west side of Market street, from Cherry street to Hamilton street.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Water street, Catharine street, East river, and Roosevelt street.

The 1,181 deaths represent a death-rate of 33.61, against 40.83 for the previous week, and 23.61 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The decrease of 253 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 8 in the deaths from typhoid fever, of 7 from measles, of 5 from scarlet fever, of 125 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 23 from phthisis, and of 23 from other constitutional diseases, of 12 from heart diseases, and of 58 from diseases of the digestive organs. There was an increase of 70 in the deaths from sunstroke.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Eleventh, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, there being only one death in each.
