Resolved, That the Board of Local Improvements of the Nineteenth District of the Borough of Manhattan call the attention of the Board of Health to the dangerous condition of the crossing at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, over the tracks of the New York Central Railroad, and recommend that the company be directed to place gates at the same.

## BOARD OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

## FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

The Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, met at the Borough Office in the First National Bank Building, at St. George, in said borough, on Thursday, July 27, 1899, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names :

Councilman Bodine, Councilman O'Grady, Alderman Vaughan and President Cromwell.

The minutes of the meeting of June 27, 1899, were duly approved.

President Cromwell reported that he had had several conferences with parties representing the Staten Island Water Supply Company and the Crystal Water Company and with the Commissioner of Water Supply of The City of New York ; but, as yet, no definite conclusion as to the form of the proposed amendment to the resolution of the Board of Public Improvements passed on the 24th day of August, 1898, affecting the various private water companies in The City of New York, had been agreed upon.

After general discussion of the matter by the members of the Board the following resolution was offered by President Cromwell and unanimously adopted :

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby respectfully urges the Board of Public Improvements to amend its resolution passed on the 24th day of August, 1898, affecting private water companies located in the various boroughs of The City of New York, so as to exclude from the operation thereof the several private water companies doing business in the Borough of Richmond, and to further amend said resolution by providing that permission to extend water-mains or erect hydrants by that private water company doing business in the Third Ward of said borough be granted only upon condition that water be furnished from six additional hydrants in said ward for the purpose of sprinkling the streets of said borough, said hydrants to be designated by the Commissioner of Highways and said water to be paid for by the City.

President Cromwell further reported that several citizens had called upon him and complained to him of the deplorable condition of affairs existing in the neighborhood of the Arrietta street brook, and that he had written to the President of the Board of Public Improvements urging that something be done, if only of a temporary character, to relieve the condition of affairs existing in that part of the borough.

The following resolution was offered by President Cromwell and was unanimously adopted :

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby again respectfully calls the attention of the Board of Public Improvements to the resolution of said Local Board of the 29th day of November, 1898, respecting the establishment of a sewer to relieve the condition of affairs in the vicinity of the Arrietta street brook ; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board earnestly requests the Board of Public Improvements to push to an early completion that portion of the map and plan of the Borough of Richmond that embraces the territory in question.

On motion, petitions numbered respectively 38 and 39 were laid over indefinitely.

The Secretary then read the letter of John H. Mooney, Esq., Secretary of the Board of Public Improvements, dated July 24, 1899, notifying the Local Board that orders had been issued by the Commissioner of Buildings, Lighting and Supplies for the lighting of St. Paul's avenue at the intersection of said avenue with Trossach road, and of Fisher, Wood and Johnson avenues, and of Church, William and Center streets, between Amboy avenue and Broadway.

On motion, Petition No. 43 was laid on the table.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Bodine and was unanimously adopted : Whereas, An application made by the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company for the privilege of stringing wires and of erecting poles across this borough has been under consideration in this Board for some time, and

Whereas, A proposed ordinance has been submitted to this Board by said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, a copy of which is hereto annexed, marked "Exhibit A," and made a part hereof ; therefore be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Local Board of the First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, that it interpose no objection to the passage by the Municipal Assembly of such proposed ordinance.

## EXHIBIT A.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company right to construct and maintain its telegraph lines along certain streets in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, with resolutions in relation thereto.

Be it Ordained by the Council of The City of New York :

Section 1. That the right be and the same is hereby granted to the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, its successors and assigns, to set poles, string wires, and operate and maintain lines of telegraph, including all poles and guys, cables, wires and fixtures thereon, along and over certain streets of this Borough of Richmond, as follows, to wit :

Commencing at a point near the Health Office, at the foot of Nautilus street, thence over and along Nautilus street to New York avenue, thence over and along New York avenue to High street, thence over and along High street to Summer avenue, thence over and along Summer avenue to Lyman avenue, thence over and along Lyman avenue to Tompkins avenue, thence over and along Tompkins avenue to Richmond avenue, thence over and along Richmond avenue to Sand lane, thence over and along Sand lane to Fingerboard road, thence over and along Fingerboard road to Grassmere avenue, thence over and along Grassmere avenue to Richmond road, thence over and along Richmond road to Clove road, thence over and along Clove road to Little Clove road, thence over and along Little Clove road to Richmond turnpike, thence over and along Richmond turnpike to Old Stone road, thence over and along Old Stone road to Merrill avenue, thence over and along Merrill avenue to South avenue, thence over and along South avenue to Washington avenue, thence over and along Washington avenue to Old Place road, thence over and along Old Place road to its end near Old Place creek.

Sec. 2. The poles so to be erected by said company shall, as far as possible, be of uniform size, style and height, neat and symmetrical, properly dressed and firmly set in the ground.

Sec. 3. The said poles shall, as far as practicable, be erected on the same side of the street, adjacent to and just within the curb-lines, at such points or places as may be indicated by the Deputy Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and, where it is possible to do so, shall be placed opposite lines of property division, which places shall not be more than 150 or less than 100 feet apart. All poles, wires and apparatus shall be so set, placed and arranged as to be of the least possible obstruction in case of fire.

Sec. 4. Said company, at its own expense, shall restore all streets, avenues, alleys and sidewalks, pavements, curbs, or gutters thereon, disturbed by it for the purpose of setting its poles, to a condition equally good as before said poles were set, and all surplus dirt due to the setting of said poles shall be removed.



Sec. 5. The erection of said poles, stringing of wires and the restoration of the streets shall be at all times subject to the supervision of the Departments of Highways and of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies to thoroughly and carefully inspect all said poles erected by said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, and if any of said poles shall be found defective or dangerous from any cause he shall notify the said company, which shall, without delay, so repair, reset or replace such pole as to make it safe.

Sec. 7. The Borough of Richmond reserves the right, at its own expense, to place upon the said poles at any time such wires as may be necessary for police or fire alarm purposes without any expense to the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company for the use of such poles, provided such police and fire alarm wires can be so placed without injury to or interference with the wires of said company. The said Borough of Richmond shall maintain its police and fire alarm wires in such a manner as not to interfere with the maintenance and operation of the company's wires upon said poles, and the said company shall maintain its wires in such a manner as not to interfere with the maintenance and operation of the fire alarm and police wires on said poles.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to injure or deface any of said poles, or wires, fixtures or apparatus thereon, or to post bills or notices thereon or to use said poles as hitching posts for horses, or for any purpose whatever other than the support of electrical wires and apparatus.

Sec. 9. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, pay a fine of not more than \$500 nor less than \$25.

Sec. 10. The said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company shall, in every and all things done by it, well and truly comply with all the terms, conditions and restrictions of this and all other ordinances of said City of New York, so far as the same are consistent with law.

Sec. 11. Said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company shall pay the reasonable cost of the printing and publication of this ordinance.

Sec. 12. The acceptance in writing of this ordinance duly executed by the proper officers of the said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, and with the corporate seal of said company thereto duly affixed and attested, shall be filed with the Clerk of said City of New York prior to the commencement of the construction of said lines, and said acceptance shall be attached to this ordinance and recorded in the book in which the ordinances of The City of New York are recorded.

Sec. 13. This ordinance shall be in force from and after the date of its passage and the filing, in the office of the Clerk of said City of New York, by the said company, or its written acceptance thereof.

On motion of Councilman O'Grady, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the Local Board of the Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, that the management of the Western Union Telegraph Company be requested to make such arrangements as will enable the receipt and delivery of dispatches continuously during the entire twenty-four hours of each day of the year, including Sundays."

On the recommendation of Hon. Henry P. Morrison, Deputy Commissioner and Chief Engineer, the following resolution, offered by Alderman Vaughan, was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, It seems to this Board that it is for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of Bay street, from a point fifty feet northerly from the north house-line of Maple avenue to a point twelve hundred feet southerly therefrom; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that it favor the change of grade on the aforesaid streets, as follows:

"1st. Beginning at a point distant 50 feet northerly from the north house-line of Maple avenue, the elevation to be 5.5 above mean high-water line as heretofore.

"2d. Thence to a point 300 feet southerly, the elevation to be 3.5 feet above mean high-water line.

"3d. Thence to a point 100 feet southerly, the elevation to be 4 feet above mean high-water line as heretofore.

"4th. Thence to a point 350 feet southerly, the elevation to be 5.6 above mean high-water line as heretofore.

"5th. Thence to a point 290 feet southerly, the elevation to be 4.3 feet above mean high-water line, and

"6th. Thence to a point 160 feet southerly, the elevation to be 7.7 above mean high-water line as heretofore."

The Secretary then read the letter of E. A. Delaney, writing for the estate of Ellen Delaney, asking for permission to replace a tie-post at the edge of the sidewalk on Red lane.

On motion of Councilman O'Grady, the matter was referred to the Deputy Commissioner and Chief Engineer, with power.

The matter of the application of Mr. for permission to erect poles for an awning at No. 95 Broad street, in the Second Ward of the borough, was referred to the Deputy Commissioner and Chief Engineer, with power.

The application of Albert C. Lorey on behalf of the Columbia Fishing Club, addressed to the Board of Supervisors of the Borough of Richmond and asking them to recommend to the Fish and Game Protectors of Albany, New York, the appointment of George Werfelman and himself as Special Protectors of Fish, etc., and dated July 24, 1899, was, on motion, referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to the power of the present Supervisors of the county to take action in the premises.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman O'Grady and was unanimously adopted: "Whereas, The several boroughs of The City of New York, with the exception of the Borough of Richmond, already have or are contemplating the construction of a public building for the accommodation of the respective departments; and

"Whereas, The people of the Borough of Richmond will be called upon to contribute their share of the cost of construction of said buildings, we feel that the other boroughs should reciprocate by co-operating with us in bearing their proportionate share of the cost incident to the construction and maintenance of such public building; be it, therefore,

"Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies be and he hereby is requested to prepare plans to be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the construction of a Municipal Building in the Borough of Richmond."

On motion, the meeting adjourned.
