In response to his request President Vreeland and Vice-President Gannon and Mr. Larkin, of counsel, representing the New York City Railway Company, Vice-President Bryan and Mr. Wickerham, of counsel, representing the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, including William Barclay Parsons, Consulting Engineer of that company, and other engineers of both companies were present. President Orr addressed them on the importance and necessity for doing the work in Lenox avenue without delay and expressed the hope that an agreement would be reached, suggesting that the Board would be glad to act as arbitrators if occasion should require. The Acting Mayor pointed out that the condition of the street was so bad that no further delay in the matter could be tolerated on the part of the City, and that unless some understanding was reached the City would immediately proceed to do the work. After some discussion it was verbally agreed between the representatives of the two companies to enter into was reached the City would immediately proceed to do the work. After some discussion it was verbally agreed between the representatives of the two companies to enter into a stipulation whereby the New York City Railway Company should immediately proceed to restore the street and its railway in Lenox avenue, the matter of payment for the said work to be determined as to each part of the work by a committee of two engineers, one from each company, any matters not agreed upon between the engineers to be left to the sole arbitration of President Orr of the Rapid Transit Board.

The Secretary reported that the President had executed consent to the reduction of the bond of the American Bridge Company and the Lawyers' Surety Company from \$450,000 to \$200,000, the same being dated the 29th day of August, 1905, as authorized.

Dear Sir—Mr. Burrows has sent us, by direction of the Board, a copy of a report from Mr. de Varona, Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, addressed to Mr. Goodwin, the Deputy Commissioner of that Department, dated September 1, 1905, in which the break in the water main on Park avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, is discussed at great length. We are requested to give "a new and final opinion" in view of the statements in this report.

Mr. de Varona discusses two questions: (1) Who is responsible for the break?

(2) Who should make the necessary repairs?

The second of these questions is the only one which is important at the present moment, and the answer to it is perfectly plain. It is this: The City of New York must make the repairs, unless it can legally compel the Rapid Transit contractor to make them.

make them.

Now if there were any evidence that the contractor had disobeyed the orders of the engineers of the Rapid Tranist Board, or had in fact done poor work or supplied poor materials, or had failed in any particular to comply with the contract of February 21, 1900, there would then be some ground for withholding part of his money until he made good the defect. The trouble is that there is no such evidence. Mr. de Varona in his report is really finding fault with the engineers of the Rapid Transit Board and not with the contractor. The engineers, says Mr. de Varona, ought not to have allowed the pipe in question to be covered up and the pavement relaid until proper tests had been made, and so on. This may all be true, and Mr. Parsons and his subordinates may have been very much to blame; but that would not make the contractor liable. tractor liable.

The contractor, of course, does not insure any pipes he relays. His contract is fully complied with when he has done his work properly in accordance with the orders of the engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission.

We see no reason to change the conclusions expressed in the letter of August 23,

1905, upon this subject.

Dear Str.—I have examined the reports of the Chief Engineer relative to requests from certain owners of property on Fulton street, Brooklyn, for permission to build show windows in connection with stations. As to Nos. 450 Fulton street (Von Dielen), 452 (Namm), 454 (Cassidy) and 456 (Riker), the Chief Engineer has reported that there is no structural objection to these windows being built, and that the question is dependent only upon the policy the Board wishes to follow. These reports were referred by the Board to counsel for opinion.

I believe that the only show windows which exist in the present subway are at the Twenty-third Street and Eighth Street Stations. I am not aware of the arrangements with the owners of the property in reference to these windows.

In Brooklyn, an agreement has recently been made with Messrs. Strauss & Charig, by which they are to be permitted to have show windows on a station platform, in

by which they are to be permitted to have show windows on a station platform, in consideration of their granting to the City an easement for a station approach lying partly within their building. This agreement, which will be found in full in the minutes of the Board, and which was made with the approval of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, regulates the right of the owners in reference to the character of the displays in their windows, etc.

I presume that in cases where conditions are similar, your Board and the construction company would approve a similar bargain. Thus in the case of the building at the southwest corner of Fulton and Hoyt streets, Brooklyn, I am now drawing a contract on the same lines which, when approved by the other parties, I will submit to

In the case of the buildings Nos. 450, 452, 454 and 456 Fulton street, I do not see that the owners offer anything, either to the City or the construction company, as a consideration for allowing the proposed show windows to be built. These windows do not seem to be of any particular benefit to the railroad, while they probably are of considerable value to the shops whose goods they display. I know of no legal reason why a bargain should not be made on the subject; but the price to be paid, and the other terms to be exacted, are matters which your Board and the construction company should consider

I would suggest that perhaps a Committee of your Board might take it up with Mr. Bryan, who is quite familiar with the subject, with a view to arriving at a definite policy to be pursued in these and other cases in future.

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of the 5th inst., inclosing a copy of a letter from the Vice-President of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, in which he states that owing to unforeseen obstacles that company has not been able, with reasonable diligence, to complete the entire railroad within three years from the date of the delivery of the contract, and he requests the Board to extend the period to four years as provided in the contract.

The language of the contract in this respect is as follows:

"The entire railroad shall be completely constructed and equipped ready for immediate, full and continuous operation within three (3) years from the date of the delivery of this contract; provided, that such period shall be extended to four (4) years if, in the opinion of the Board, the contractor shall not be able, with reasonable diligence, to earlier complete its work. The construction of the portions of the railroad not under the East river shall be completed within two and one-half (2½) years from the date of delivery hereof."

The contract further provides how damages shall be fixed for delay in the case.

The contract further provides how damages shall be fixed for delay in the case, first, of failure to complete the whole road and, second, of failure to complete the portion not under the East river. The date for completion must be extended in case the contractor has been delayed by injunctions, strikes or interference of any public

The contractor has entirely failed to complete the portions of the road not under the East river within the period limited, and I am not prepared to say that the damages provided in the contract are not payable separately in regard to that failure.

So far as the entire road is concerned, it is apparent from the language of the contract that the Board, before extending the time, must be satisfied that the contractor could not, with reasonable diligence, complete the work sooner. That is, of course, a matter on which the Chief Engineer must be consulted; but so far as the work in Joralemon street is concerned, I should suppose that the evidence showed a total lack of diligence.

The matter seems to me to be one which calls for considerable care, and I think before the Board acts it ought to have from the Chief Engineer a full and detailed report on two points, viz.: (1) whether the contractor has exerted "reasonable diligence" up to the present time, and (2) whether the work can be finished with "reasonable diligence" before September 11, 1906.

If, however, the Board is ready to act now, then the inclosed form of resolution

may be used. I may add that I think the Board can lawfully extend the time for completion even if such action is taken after the 11th of September, where, as in this case, the request for extension was made before that date.

Under a permit of the old City of Brooklyn, and at great expense to the owners, this vault was built to receive four immense boilers, also a large coal receptacle, the removal of which from the present location would entail vast expense in addition to a serious injury to the boilers. The matter was so serious that as long ago as on June 23 last we addressed a letter to the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners and we beg to inclose a copy herewith. As no reply to this letter has been received, we have felt justified in thus communicating with you as Chairman of the Board, and we would respectfully urge upon you the advisability of referring it to your Counsel to the end that the legal rights of all parties, including the owners, tenants and the City, may be protected before serious injuries or damages have arisen.

Opinion of counsel on the bill submitted by the New York Times Building Company for \$21,628.85 for waterproofing under that section of the subway which passes through the basement of that building was read as follows, and a copy ordered forwarded to that company:

DEAR SIR—The Board has referred to us a letter from the New York Times Building Company, dated August 9, 1905, in which that company submits a bill amounting to

\$21,628.85, covering the cost from July 26, 1904, to July 6, 1905, for waterproofing under that section of the subway which passes through the basement of the Times Building at Forty-second street and Broadway.

This matter has been the subject of correspondence between the engineers of architects of the Times Building and the Engineers and officers of the Rapid Transit Commission at various times between March 9, 1904, and September 30, 1904, but has not previously been submitted for consideration of counsel for the Board.

The situation at this point is peculiar. The Times Building is so designed that the subway passes through it, and the press rooms or basement are made to extend below and under the subway structure. In 1902 there seems to have been some correspondence between Mr. Parsons, on the one side, and Mr. Purdy, Chief Engineer of the George A. Fuller Company, and Mr. McKenzie, architect of the Times Building, on the other, in relation to these plans. Mr. Parsons at first objected to the plans submitted to him, for the reason that the heavy girders supporting the subway were too high, encroaching upon the space for the subway floor to such an extent as to leave room for a bare covering of concrete over the girders. We are informed by the present Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission that it was self-evident from these plans that waterproofing would have to be omitted, if they were to be carried out. However, the building company wanted all possible head room over their presses, and as no particular harm could result to the subway at this point by the omission of the waterproofing, and as the heavy mass of concrete between the girders provided a suitable floor for the subway, the plans were finally accepted by Mr. Parsons.

At a meeting of the Rapid Transit Board held on January 8, 1903, the proposed deed to the City of the right of way through the Times Building was submitted by counsel and approved (Minutes, pages 1916 to 1922). This deed provides for the payment of \$59,000 by the City in c

There is nothing in the language of the deed and nothing in the drawings annexed to it which shows any waterproofing at this point.

On March 9, 1904, after the work was well advanced toward completion, Mr. McKenzie, the architect for the Times Building, first wrote to Mr. Parsons in reference to waterproofing the work. As above stated, considerable correspondence ensued on the subject, the conclusion of the Rapid Transit Engineers being that the owners of the Times Building ought to take care of their own work for their own protection, and that they might be permitted to do such waterproofing as they should believe necessary.

Under date of September 23, 1904, the New York Times Building Company wrote that they had taken up the matter in great detail with their engineers and counsel, and that they were firm in their conviction that the demands made upon the Board to waterproof the structure were "in every way correct and proper." The Building Company, however, did not give their reasons for this conclusion, and we have not been favored with any expressions of opinion from their attorneys as to the legal grounds upon which it could be based.

There is certainly nothing in the deed conveying the easement to the City which in terms requires waterproofing to be done, and we do not perceive anything from which a duty to do it can be inferred.

It is unnecessary to consider whether there is any appropriation under the control of the Board from which a bill of this character could be paid, and whether the amount of the bill is just and reasonable. As at present advised, we recommend that the payment of the bill be declined.

To the Honorable the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners:

The undersigned, lessee of the premises at No. 317 West Thirty-third street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, New York City, respectfully shows to your Honorable Board:

First—That in the franchise given by your Honorable Body to the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, certain rights and privileges were granted to said railroad company, and among them to excavate on Thirty-third street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, Borough of Manhattan, New York City, in accordance with the plans and specifications approved by your Board; that by said plans and specifications said railroad company was authorized to excavate for a terminal station to within 30 feet of the building line of the property owned and occupied by your petitioner. Said plans and specifications also provided that within said 30 feet a retaining wall should be erected, but the width or thickness of said wall is not stated in said plans and specifications.

plans and specifications.

Second—That your petitioner has consulted competent engineering authorities and is reliably informed and verily believes that a retaining wall of from 16 to 18 feet is ample for the requirements of the situation. Whereas the said railroad company threatens to excavate the entire 30 feet adjoining and in front of the properties owned and occupied by your petitioner, thereby depriving your petitioner of the use of his property and unnecessarily rendering an incalculable and irreparable damage to him; that on the premises above referred to your petitioner conducts a boarding-house, and the business of your petitioner will be utterly ruined if the railroad company destroys the sidewalk or makes the excavation in front of his premises in the manner threatened by said railroad company. by said railroad company.

Third—Your petitioner fully realizes that this is a great public work and he has no desire to unnecessarily impede its progress, but that said work can be accomplished satisfactorily without taking up sidewalks, or interfering with them in any way, on the north side of Thirty-third street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues.

Fourth—That on the 23d day of June, 1905, the President of the Borough of Manhattan granted to said railroad company a permit "to take up the pavement and exca-

vate such portion as may be necessary of Thirty-third street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, for the purpose of erecting a retaining wall in accordance with the plans and specifications approved by the Rapid Transit Commission." Your petitioner respectfully asserts that said permit does not give the right to remove the sidewalks, and under the plans approved by your Board, any interference with the sidewalks on the north side of Thirty-third street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, is absolutely unprecessory. lutely unnecessary

Fifth—That under the franchise granted by your Board to said railroad company it is provided

"All plans for and the method of doing the work shall, from time to time, be subject to the approval of the Board.

Your petitioner respectfully submits that under the plenary powers given your Honorable Body by the Legislature of this State, reserved by your body in its contract with said railroad company, your Board has the right and power, and owes to your petitioner as a taxpayer and citizen of this City the duty, to provide and insist that said railroad company shall perform its part of said contract with as little damage as possible to the rights and property of your petitioner, and that there shall be no taking up or interference in any way with the sidewalk on the north side of Thirty-third street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues.

Wherefore your petitioner respectfully asks your Honorable Board to prevent said

Wherefore your petitioner respectfully asks your Honorable Board to prevent said railroad company from performing the threatened illegal and unnecessary acts and to provide that there shall be no taking up or interference with said sidewalks, or any



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
