General Order No. 49—

I have this day established a bureau in connection with this Department to be known as the "Street Traffic Regulation Bureau," the office of which will be located in the Central Office, No. 300 Mulberry street. This bureau will be in charge of a member of the Police Department above the rank of Sergeant, who will be designated by the Police Commissioner.

It will be the duty of the officer in command of this bureau to investigate all matters pertaining to the regulation of street traffic and the protection of life and property on all streets, avenues and highways in all boroughs in the Greater City of New York, excepting those thoroughfares under the jurisdiction of the Park Department.

You will furnish the officer in command of this bureau with any information he may desire in reference to the matters under his immediate jurisdiction, and will render him every assistance in your power that may be necessary to enable him to properly perform his duties.

To All, All Boroughs:

Inspector Donald Grant has been assigned as Inspector in charge of the "Street Traffic Regulation Bureau," the office of which is located at Central Office, No. 300 Mulberry street.

On reading and filing opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated April 22, 1904, relative to awarding of contracts for delivering printing, books, blanks and lithography, and stating that if the Commissioner desires to award contracts upon the bids opened April 5, 1904, he should obtain from bidders an agreement to comply with the provisions of the existing Labor Law, viz.:

"The contractor agrees that he will comply with the provisions of chapter 415 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, known as 'The Labor Law,' so far as they are constitutional and applicable to this contract. He further agrees, in conformity with the provisions of the said law, that no laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the contractors, sub-contractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or a part of the work contemplated by the contract, shall be required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life or property."

Ordered, That the lowest bidders on proposals for furnishing the Police Department with printing, books, blanks and lithography be notified of such opinion, with copy of section of the Labor Law referred to, and that they be asked if they will agree in executing contracts to comply with the provisions of the existing Labor Law. DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES DURING THE WEEK ENDING APRIL 7, 1904.

Actions Taken April 7, 1904, Unless Otherwise Noted.

The following permits were granted:

April 4. The Brighton Pier and Navigation Company—

To repair the Pier near the foot of West Eighth street, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines.

To place a telephone cable on the sotheasterly corner of the shed on Pier, new 56, North river, upon condition that the requirements of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Board of Fire Underwriters be first complied with, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The said bonds and stock are free and exempt from all taxation in the State of New York, except taxation for State purposes, pursuant to the provisions of section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended. The principal of and interest on said bonds and stock are payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, pursuant to resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted June 9, 1898, and April 18, 1904.

#### CONDITIONS OF SALE.

As provided for by the Greater New York Charter.  
 1. Proposals containing conditions other than those herein set forth will not be received or considered.  
 2. No proposal for stock shall be accepted for less than the par value of the same.

3. Every bidder, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of his proposal, shall deposit with the Comptroller in money, or by a certified check drawn to the order of said Comptroller upon a solvent banking corporation, two per cent. of the par value of the stocks or bonds bid for in said proposal.

No proposal will be received or considered which is not accompanied by such deposit.

All such deposits shall be returned by the Comptroller to the persons making the same within three days after the decision has been rendered as to who is or are the highest bidder or bidders, except the deposit made by the highest bidder or bidders.

4. If said highest bidder or bidders shall refuse or neglect, within five days after service of written notice of the award to him or them, to pay to the City Chamberlain the amount of the stocks or bonds awarded to him or them at their par value, together with the premium thereon, less the amount deposited by him or them, the amount or amounts of deposit thus made shall be forfeited to and retained by said City as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal, and shall thereafter be paid into the Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt.

5. Upon the payment into the City Treasury by the persons whose bids are accepted of the amounts due for the stock or bonds awarded to them, respectively, certificates thereof shall be issued to them in such denominations provided for by the Charter as they may desire.

6. It is required by the Charter of the City that "every bidder may be required to accept a portion of the whole amount of stock bid for by him at the same rate or proportional price as may be specified in his bid; and any bid which conflicts with this condition shall be rejected, provided, however, that any bidder offering to purchase all or any part of the bonds offered for sale at a price at par or higher may also offer to purchase all or none of said bonds at a different price, and if the Comptroller deems it to be in the interests of the City so to do, he may award the bonds to the bidder offering the highest price for all or none of said bonds; provided, however, that if the Comptroller deems it to be in the interests of the City so to do, he may reject all bids." Under this provision, the condition that the bidder will accept only the whole amount of bonds or stock bid for by him, and not any part thereof, cannot be inserted in any bids, except those for "all or none" offered by bidders who have also bid for "all or any part" of the stock or bonds offered for sale.

7. It is also provided by the Charter that these bonds, if issued in registered form, may be issued in denominations of ten dollars or any multiple thereof; and that "preference shall, so far as practicable, and without pecuniary disadvantage to the City, be given to applicants for the smallest amounts and smallest denominations of said bonds in issuing the same."

8. The proposals, together with the security deposits, should be inclosed in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Proposals for Bonds of The City of New York," and said envelope inclosed in another sealed envelope, addressed to the Comptroller of The City of New York.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
