### ORDINANCES, RESOLUTIONS, &c., &c.,

PASSED BY BOTH BRANCHES OF THE

COMMON COUNCIL

AND

APPROVED BY THE MAYOR,

DURING THE WEEK ENDING MARCH 7, 1874.

Whereas, This Common Council has learned, with the most profound sorrow, of the death of Hon. Henry Smith, President of the Police Department of the City of New York. He died on Monday, the 23d inst., in this city, in the 54th year of his age; and

Whereas, In view of the many and municipal offices to which he was elected by the people of this city, it is evident that he was honored and trusted by them to an unusual degree, and that he merited this confidence is established by the fact that he retained it for a quarter of a century—from his entrance into public life, until his death—and by the sorrow manifested for this sad event. He was for many years a member of the local legislature of this city and county, as a councilman, alderman, and supervisor. He performed the multifarious and diverse duties incident to every such legislative office in such a manner as to reflect credit upon himself and honor upon his constituency: while, as an executive officer, particularly as President of the Police Department, he displayed those rare qualities of head and heart that distinguish him among his fellow-men and secured for him the friendship and good will of all with whom he became acquainted. Emphatically a self-made man, he rose by the innate force of his character, his integrity of purpose, and clear perceptions of his duties and obligations as a good citizen, from obscurity and indigence, in the humblest walk in life, to affluence, the highest place in the affections of his numerous friends, and to responsible and conspicuous places in the gift of his fellow-citizens; and

Whereas, The death of such a man imposes the imperative, yet sad duty, upon this Common Council of adopting such measures as will best manifest the universal sorrow; of sympathizing and condoling with his bereaved family and afflicted friends; of placing upon record, among the archives of the city government evidence of their appreciation of his public virtues, and of making the necessary arrangements for paying a public tribute of respect to his memory; be it therefore

Resolved, That the members of the Common Council do sincerely deplore the death of the Hon. Henry Smith, President of the Police Department, and do hereby extend to his bereaved family and sorrowing friends our heartfelt sympathy and condolence; and be it further

Resolved, That out of respect to the memory of our departed friend, this Common Council will attend his funeral in a body, with their staves of offices draped in mourning; that the Governor's room in the City Hall be appropriately draped in mourning, and tendered for the reception of the remains, there to be laid in state until Thursday next, the 26th inst., that being the day for solemnizing the funeral rites and ceremonies; that the flags on the City Hall and all the other public buildings be displayed at half-staff, from sunrise until sunset each day the body shall remain in the City Hall; the public offices be closed on Thursday next, the 26th inst., after 12 o'clock, M., and that a special Committee of five members of each branch of the Common Council be appointed to perfect the above, and make such other arrangements as to them may appear to be better calculated to manifest sorrow for the death, and respect for the memory of the deceased.

### BOARD OF EDUCATION.

#### REPORT OF EXPENDITURES FOR THE YEAR 1873.

Submitted to the Board and Adopted February 18, 1874.

Commissioner Vermilye presented a report from the Finance Committee, submitting statements of the receipts and expenditures, and of the general and special appropriations for the year 1873, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

The Finance Committee report herewith the annual statement, prepared by the Auditor of the Board, of the receipts and expenditures of the Board for the year 1873, including those of the Board of Public Instruction for that portion of the year in which they directed the Public School system.

The receipts, including the balance (\$184,580.78), transferred from 1872, were \$3,628,507.39, and the payments for Public School purposes \$3,479,011, including the sum of \$66,285.27, apportioned by the State, and paid to the corporate schools, leaving a balance to the credit of the Board to meet its liabilities of \$129,496.39.

Some of the expenditures, such as those for salaries of the teachers in Normal, Evening and Colored Schools, and for the janitors in the Ward Schools, and for fuel and gas, exceed the original estimates made for these purposes, but have been provided for by the resolutions submitted by your Committee for adoption in other reports.

The credit balances are on the appropriations for the salaries of teachers in the Ward Schools, and of the employees of the Board, for supplies, and for the incidentals for the Normal, Evening, and Colored Schools, and shop account.

Your Committee invite the attention of the several Committees of the Board having these matters in charge to these statements, with the recommendation that all propositions for the expenditure of money in any direction to receive their careful scrutiny, and only such be recommended to the Board as the system may positively require to maintain its usefulness. The large expenditures for repairs to buildings, furniture, etc., which, by the timely action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in appropriating an additional sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for this and other purposes, the Board was enabled to assume, was absolutely necessary from the condition of the buildings and furniture when transferred to the care of this Board.

During the year the buildings for Grammar School No. 22, in the Eleventh ward, Primary School No. 1, in the Tenth ward, and Primary School No. 4, in the Eighteenth ward, have been finished and furnished, new apparatus supplied to several buildings, and buildings for new Primary Schools in the Twelfth and Nineteenth wards have been hired and fitted up for use, and progress has been made in the work of erecting the Model School building. The Normal College building has been nearly completed sufficient for occupancy, and thoroughly furnished.

These items are noted for consideration in connection with the large expenditure presented for buildings and repairs.

Your Committee recommend that the statement be made part of the volume of minutes of the Board for 1873.

as the respective amounts of expenditure in excess of all receipts. And from the present number of boarders in the Asylum the probability is that for the present year the difference between the receipts and disbursements will be much greater. The average number of boarders during the year 1873 were as follows: 1st class, 14; 2d class, 19; 3d class, 14. The 1st class boarders pay \$12 per week; 2d class, \$8; 3d class, 3. After mature deliberation, I am of the opinion that the county should not be taxed for the support of inebriates, who either themselves or their friends are able to pay for their support, and can obtain similar accommodation in the State Asylum at Binghamton or at private institutions established for that purpose.

I therefore respectfully submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Board take such measures as will secure the repeal of the law of April 8th, 1864, and all amendatory acts in relation to the Inebriate Asylum, on Ward's Island, in order that said Inebriate Asylum may be closed and to be of no further expense to the county.

Resolved, That copy of the foregoing statements and resolutions be transmitted to the Hon. Board of Apportionment, and the Hon. Board of Supervisors, for their consideration.

**SUPREME COURT.—IN THE MATTER OF THE** application of the Department of Public Parks and the Department of Public Works, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to acquiring title for the use of the public to all the lands required for laying out a new street running parallel to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in an easterly direction from the Kingsbridge Road, across the Tenth avenue to the Boulevard, near the Harlem River, as laid out by resolution of the Commissioners of the Central Park, in the city of New York.
