

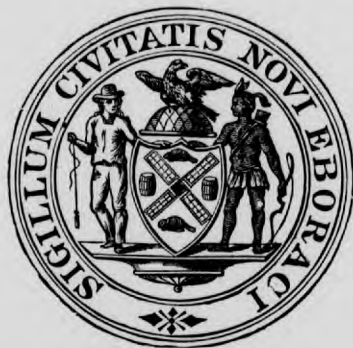

Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, January 19, 1887, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish.

The Commissioners met to open the bids received for the construction of the new Gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in the City of New York, in pursuance of the public notice, published daily for fifteen consecutive days commencing December 24, 1886, in the CITY RECORD and "New York Tribune," and for the same number of days in the "New York Star," commencing December 27, 1886.

After reading the aforesaid notice, the bid-box was opened by the Commissioners, and the following bids, upon which the required deposit had been made, were opened and read aloud by the Secretary:

Resolved, That the bids and checks of the bidders received for the construction of said gate-house are hereby referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for examination, and report to the Commissioners as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by the bidders.

The Commissioners then adjourned, to meet at 3 o'clock P. M., the hour fixed for the regular stated meeting of the Commissioners.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, January 19, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway, and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church; and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of the 12th instant were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported that at a meeting of the Committee held on the 18th instant, Commissioner Dowd was unanimously elected Chairman of said Committee and Commissioner Baldwin Vice-Chairman. The report of the Committee was approved and ordered filed.

The Committee next reported that they had examined the bills of W. H. McQuail for services and expenses as an expert in examination of the ventilation and lighting of the shafts and headings of the New Croton Aqueduct, and recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the bills of W. H. McQuail, for services (\$400), and expenses (\$63.41) as an expert in examination of the ventilation and lighting of the shafts and headings of the New Croton Aqueduct, be approved by the Commissioners, and that a proper voucher be certified to the Comptroller for payment. Adopted.

The Committee next reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 2324 and 2335 inclusive, and on motion of Commissioner Dowd the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction reported that at their meeting of the 14th instant a Weekly Progress Report of the Chief Engineer was read, which embodied a recommendation that twenty Inspectors of Masonry be examined and appointed at the earliest moment, to be afterwards assigned to duty as the work demands; and in connection therewith, the Chief Engineer verbally recommended that the number of Inspectors to be so examined and appointed be increased to forty; which recommendation was approved by the Committee, and it was decided to recommend to the Commissioners that such appointments be made. Recommendation of the Committee adopted.

Also, that at their meeting of the 17th instant, a communication was received from the Chief Engineer recommending that George Endicott, Rodman, be granted six months leave of absence, without pay, from January 1, 1887, on account of ill health, and it was decided to recommend to the Commissioners that Mr. Endicott be granted such leave of absence. Recommendation of the Committee adopted.

The Special Committee appointed November 8, 1886, consisting of Hamilton Fish, Jr., C. C. Baldwin, and William Dowd, made report as follows:

The Committee appointed to examine into the recommendation made by the Committee on Construction on November 8th, in favor of the appointment of Frederick W. Frost as Assistant Engineer, respectfully report: That they have made an examination of his testimonials, and find that Mr. Frost is competent to fill the position for which he was recommended by the Committee on Construction.

On motion of Commissioner Ridgway, the report was referred to the Committee on Construction.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending that an appropriation of \$150 be made for the purchase of one Y level for use on the Fourth Division of the New Croton Aqueduct. The recommendation was approved and the appropriation made.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, stating that Mr. William D. Kelley was eligible for appointment as an Assistant Engineer, and recommending that he be temporarily appointed at a salary of \$1,800 per annum. The recommendation of the Chief Engineer was adopted and Mr. Kelley temporarily appointed.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, stating that one additional Axeman and one additional Laborer were needed for the Southern District of the Aqueduct, and recommending that Henry U. Quinan be appointed an Axeman at \$60 per month, and John Kelly a Laborer at \$3 per day; and also recommending that John Gorman be promoted from a Laborer to an Axeman at a salary of \$60 per month. A vote was taken separately on each of the recommendations contained in said communication, which resulted in the adoption of the recommendations of the Chief Engineer.

A communication was received from the Comptroller, dated 13th inst., stating that upon the requisition of the Aqueduct Commission of October 20, 1886, for the issue of \$2,000,000 Additional Water Stock, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have taken a further sum of \$500,000 at par, and the amount has been deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the "Additional Water Fund." Ordered filed.

A communication was received from Arthur B. Sinclair, respectfully asking for an increase of salary to \$40 per month.

On motion of Commissioner Ridgway the same was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit.

Commissioner Spencer then moved that when the Commissioners adjourn they adjourn to Saturday next, 22d inst., at 3 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of canvassing and considering the bids received and opened this day, for the construction of the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, which was carried, and the Commissioners then adjourned.

**APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE** heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc. etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
