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

The Committee next reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 2324 and 2335 inclusive, and on motion of Commissioner Dowd the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction reported that at their meeting of the 14th instant a Weekly Progress Report of the Chief Engineer was read, which embodied a recommendation that twenty Inspectors of Masonry be examined and appointed at the earliest moment, to be afterwards assigned to duty as the work demands; and in connection therewith, the Chief Engineer verbally recommended that the number of Inspectors to be so examined and appointed be increased to forty; which recommendation was approved by the Committee, and it was decided to recommend to the Commissioners that such appointments be made. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc. etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer.
