#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February II, 1882

February 11, 1882 : The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,724, as follows, viz. : 3 public buildings, foo tenement-houses, 124 private dwellings, 50 other dwellings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 22 stables, 40 slaughter-houses, 14 lodging-houses, 2 piers, I stock yard, I mill, 16 sunken and vacant lots, I stream, I public sewer, 93 yards, courts, and areas, 153 cellars and basements, 227 waste-pipes and drains, 301 privies and water-closets, 46 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 2 cess-pools, and 5 other nuisances. The number of rapperts thereon received from the Inspectors was 465

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 465. During the past week 168 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. Permits were issued to the consignees of 57 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

So permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 350 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 292 houses, 292 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 50 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 472 births, 50 still-births, 206 marriages, and 839 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 11, 1882; this shows a decrease of 53 births and 10 marriages, and an increase of 8 still-births and 42 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a decrease of 48 births and 10 still-births, and an increase of 36 marriages and 130 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 10; diphtheria, 10; croup, 5; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; inanition, 9; alcoholism, 3; rheu-matism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 7; heart diseases, 11; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles 11; whooping cough, 7; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; cancer, 3; phthisis cough, 7; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 21; pneumonia, 11; marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, 10; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 4; and suicide 5. The number of deaths from erysipelas and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

# BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY' for the week ending February 11, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending

February 4, 1882.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 839 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 11, 1882, which is an increase of 42, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 130 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881.
