Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending February 18, 1882.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Chamberlain Brothers to retain the sign now on the awning in front of their place of business, No. 190 West street; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 7, 1882.
Approved by the Mayor, February 13, 1882.

Resolved, That permission and the same is hereby given to Geo. Theiss to lay crosswalk in front of his premises, Nos. 134 and 136 East Fourteenth street, to the opposite side of said street, work to be done at his own expense and under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; said permission to continue during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 7, 1882.
Approved by the Mayor, February 13, 1882.

Resolved, That permission and the same is hereby given to Geo. Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 91, article 16, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks be and are hereby authorized and empowered to procure, in open market, and without contract, an elephant for the use of and to be added to the zoological collection of the department, at a cost not exceeding two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and to be paid for out of the appropriation made for "Zoological Department" for 1882.

Resolved, That a ferry be and is hereby established to run from a point at or near the foot of Liberty street, North river, in the City of New York, to and from Communipaw, or to some street or avenue contiguous or adjacent thereto, as the purchaser of the franchise may elect, in Hudson County, State of New Jersey, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and directed to sell, at public auction, to the highest bidder or bidders, as provided by law, the right to operate the ferry so established, on such terms and conditions and subject to such restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by said Commissioners.

Resolved, That Order 23397, on premises 29 East Sixty-third street, be and is hereby extended to April 1, 1882.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the following plans, for light and ventilation of tenement-houses, be and are hereby approved upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 1339-2, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 95 feet by 106 feet, on a lot of the same dimensions, at No. 553 Grand street, to be occupied by seventeen families.

Plan No. 1342, for one four-story tenement, 26 feet by 74 feet on the first story, and 26 feet by 54 feet, with an extension 5 feet by 6 feet above the first story, on a lot 26 feet by 74 feet, on the southeast corner of First avenue and Eighty-fourth street, to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 1355, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 60 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 1089 First avenue, to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 1346, for one four-story tenement, 19 feet by 72 feet, with an extension 12 feet by 9 feet, on a lot 19 feet by 99 feet 11 inches, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 381 feet west of Sixth avenue, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1347, for one five-story tenement, 36 feet by 61 feet, on a lot 36 feet by 77 feet, at Nos. 3 and 5 Baxter street, to be occupied by thirty families.

Plan No. 1348, for one five-story tenement of irregular dimensions, at Nos. 137 and 139 Chatham street, and Nos. 3, 5, and 7 Roosevelt street, to be occupied by twenty-one families.

Plan No. 1349, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 75 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 90 feet, at No. 333 East Sixth street, to be occupied by eleven families.

Plan No. 1350, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 59 feet, above the first story, with ten feet at the rear of the one-story extension, on a lot 25 feet by 95 feet, on the west side of Third avenue, 75 feet south of Forty-fourth street, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 154, one tenement, at No. 1089 First avenue.

Weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of houses in course of construction were received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 11, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,724, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 602 tenement-houses, 124 private dwellings, 50 other dwellings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 22 stables, 40 slaughter-houses, 14 lodging-houses, 2 piers, 1 stock yard, 1 mill, 16 sunken and vacant lots, 1 stream, 1 public sewer, 93 yards, courts, and areas, 153 cellars and basements, 227 waste-pipes and drains, 301 privies and water-closets, 46 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 2 cess-pools, and 5 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 465.

During the past week 168 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 57 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

80 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 350 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 292 houses, 292 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

50 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 472 births, 50 still-births, 206 marriages, and 839 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 11, 1882; this shows a decrease of 53 births and 10 marriages, and an increase of 8 still-births and 42 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a decrease of 48 births and 10 still-births, and an increase of 36 marriages and 130 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 10; diphtheria, 10; croup, 5; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; inanition, 9; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 7; heart diseases, 11; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles 11; whooping cough, 7; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 21; pneumonia, 11; marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, 10; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and pretermatural births, 4; and suicide 5. The number of deaths from erysipelas and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 173 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 266 under two years, 406 under five years, and 52 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 12 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 48.39 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 163 were in institutions, 433 in tenement-houses, 221 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 17 were on the basement floor, 152 on the first, 234 on the second, 157 on the third, 80 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 835 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents; 97 were stated to be single, 179 married, 72 widowed, and the condition of 491 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 839; still-births, 50; bodies in transit, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 76 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 472 births; 206 marriages; 50 still-births; 839 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 74 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 36 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Feb. 11, 1882, was 33.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.921, the mean humidity was 82, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,550, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.99 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 760 deaths and still-births, or 85.49 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 336; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 98; Greenwood (undenominational), 51; Lutheran, (undenominational), 116; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 28; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 34; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 11.</

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

STR—There were 839 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 11, 1882, which is an increase of 42, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 130 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending February 4, 1882, was 826, which is 272.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 33.96 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,264,644.

From William Ryan—Application for reinstatement as night watchman in the Department. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief for examination and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Report on Secretary's Order No. 2275, as to Union Ferry Company not having removed the piles driven between the ferry rack and Pier 21, East river, as directed by the Board.

From N. Y. Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—For permission to fill in on the North river, between Seventy-second and Seventy-sixth streets, to make additional track within the lines of the company's property. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Mahoney Brothers—Asking for extension of time to complete contract for building a new wooden pier, at North Brother Island. Referred to President and Treasurer.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order, No. 2191, as to grants of land under water on the East river between Third and Fifth streets, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on the table to await action, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by Commissioner Laimbeer, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and hereby is requested to give his opinion to this Board, respecting the right of this Department to take possession and receive and collect the revenue or income from wharfage, etc., accruing thereat, of the premises known and described as follows: Bulkhead along the water-front between Third and Fifth streets, East river. The premises between Third and Fourth streets is claimed to be the property of John Dimond, and between Fourth and Fifth streets C. H. Fay (executor of Stephen Smith), and this Board being of the opinion that the title to the said premises is vested in and properly belongs to the Corporation of the City of New York.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2282, as to grants of land under water on the North river, between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on the table, to await action, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by Commissioner Laimbeer, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund having, as it appears by the records of their proceedings, adopted resolutions authorizing the issue of grants for land under water to the following named parties, to wit:

1st. March 17, 1851, to Dennis Harris, between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets, North river, at \$3 per running foot.

2d. December 13, 1852, to Shephard Knapp, from One Hundred and Sixty-second to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth streets, North river, at \$3 per running foot.

3d. November 8, 1858, to Plume and Lamont, from One Hundred and Sixtieth to One Hundred and Sixty-second streets, North river, at \$5 per running foot.

4th. December 27, 1865, to Bartolome Blanco, from One Hundred and Fifty-eighth to One Hundred and Sixty-first streets, North river, at \$50 per running foot.

5th. May 14, 1869, to William A. Wheelock, from One Hundred and Fifty-seventh to One Hundred and Fifty-ninth streets, North river, at \$10 per running foot; and

Whereas, It appears that the grants so authorized have not been issued, and that the aforesaid parties have failed to comply with the terms and conditions in said authorized grants mentioned by the payment by them of the consideration therein expressed; therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are respectfully requested to rescind and annul the resolutions heretofore adopted by them, authorizing grants to be issued to the said parties, to wit:

1st. March 17, 1851, to Dennis Harris, between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets, North river, at \$3 per running foot.

2d. December 13, 1852, to Shephard Knapp, from One Hundred and Sixty-second to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth streets, North river, at \$3 per running foot.

3d. November 8, 1858, to Plume and Lamont, from One Hundred and Sixtieth to One Hundred and Sixty-second streets, North river, at \$5 per running foot.

4th. December 27, 1865, to Bartolome Blanco, from One Hundred and Fifty-eighth to One Hundred and Sixty-first streets, at \$50 per running foot.

5th.—May 14, 1869, to Wm. A. Wheelock, from One Hundred and Fifty-seventh to One Hundred and Fifty-ninth streets, North river, at \$10 per running foot.

And to declare the grants for lands under water, so authorized to be made, null and void and of no effect, the said grantees having failed to comply with the terms of said grants, by the payment of the sums conditioned to be paid therefor.

From John Hooper—Requesting that Board procure his appointment as a Commissioner of Deeds, to facilitate the transaction of the business of the Department under his charge.

From Aaron Raymond—In reference to repairing bulkhead between Ninetieth and Ninety-first streets, East river, as directed by the Board.

From Department of Public Works—As to pavement approach to Pier 44, East river, and that same would be repaired without delay.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2194, as to the condition of Piers 51, 51½, and 52, East river, the repairs required thereto and the estimated cost thereof. Secretary to notify the lessees of the east half of Pier 51, Pier 51½, and the west half of Pier 52, and the owners of the west half of Pier 51, and the east half of Pier 52 to repair same within ten days, under supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will have the same done and charge the cost thereof to them.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 1839, that no dredging had been done in the slip south of Pier, old 39, North river, under the permit granted to A. Van Santvoord and H. P. Farrington lessees. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to have soundings taken and report if dredging is required to give proper depth of water thereat.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2278, as to condition of Pier 55, East river, and the damage occasioned thereto by the ferry-boats striking against and jarring it.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2190, that the shed erected on the bulkhead between Piers, new 20 and new 21, North river, by the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Co., under permit by the Board, has been completed.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 1012, that the New York, Alexandria and Washington Steamship Co., has not erected the shed on Pier 41, East river, as authorized by the Board, under permit of July 3, 1878. Permit revoked, and Secretary directed to notify the company of the action of the Board in relation thereto.

23d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2279, as to location of dumping board on Pier at Thirty-seventh street, North river, and appending a tracing thereof, as requested by Department of Street Cleaning. The Secretary having stated that he had transmitted same to the Department of Street Cleaning, his action was approved.

From James Fitzpatrick, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting that vessels could not get into berth at the pier at Nineteenth street, North river, in consequence of a bar formed about twenty feet from the outer end of the pier. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to have an examination made and report thereon.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief in reference to performance of work by the Surveyors in taking soundings and surveying at Eighty-sixth street, East river, and requesting the Board to authorize the payment of the necessary expenses for car fares, etc., incurred in the prosecution of the work, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and,

On motion of Commissioner Vanderpoel, the Engineer-in-Chief was authorized, in this special case, to approve proper vouchers for such expenditures.

A communication from Frederick Schecker, lessee, in reference to Pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following preamble and resolution, offered by Commissioner Laimbeer in relation to the occupancy of the Pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, by Frederick Schecker, the lessee thereof, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, By virtue of the terms and conditions of a public sale held March 22, 1881, there was granted and assigned to Frederick Schecker, he being the highest bidder therefor, for the term of one year, from the said 1st day of May, 1881, at a yearly rent or sum of \$3,350, all the wharfage and craning privilege arising or accruing from the use and occupation of that certain wharf property known and designated as Pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, in the City of New York, and

Whereas, In and by the indenture agreed to be made by said Frederick Schecker, between the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting through its Department of Docks, of the first part, and himself of the second part, it is expressly agreed and provided between the parties thereto, that in the event of the said yearly rent or sum of money, or any part thereof, remaining unpaid for the space of ten days after the same should have become due and payable in accordance with the terms thereof, it should be lawful for the said Department of Docks to serve, or cause to be served, upon the said Schecker a notice in writing, declaring that the said grant and assignment so made as aforesaid had become utterly null and void; and thereupon to have again, repossess, and enjoy said wharfage rights and premises in all respects and in like manner as though such grant and assignment to said Schecker had never been made or executed; and

Whereas, The said Schecker has failed and neglected to pay the said rent or sum of money in and by said proposed indenture agreed to be paid in accordance with the terms thereof, and is now in arrears to this Department on account thereof; therefore it is

Resolved, That the said grant and assignment to the said Schecker as aforesaid, be and the same is hereby declared utterly null and void from and after February 1, 1882, and that notice in writing of such action and determination of this Board on behalf of the Mayor, etc., of the City of New York, to have again, repossess, enter upon, and enjoy said wharfage rights and premises from and after the aforesaid date be and is hereby served upon the said Frederick Schecker, in conformity to the terms and conditions of said indenture agreed to be executed.

And the Secretary was directed to notify the Corporation Wharfinger to collect the wharfage accruing from vessels berthing at said pier, from and after February 1, 1882.

The communication from John J. Astor, in reference to Pier at Thirteenth street, North river, and proposing to dispose of his interest therein to the city was,

On motion, taken from the table and placed on file, together with the report of Commissioner Laimbeer, to whom the matter had been referred, and in connection therewith the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation respecting the title to and ownership of the said pier was received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, after being properly recorded by the Secretary, and the following preamble and resolution, offered by Commissioner Laimbeer in relation thereto, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, Because of the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, given to this Board in answer to letter of January 13, 1882, in relation to the Pier at West Thirteenth street, North river, one half of which has been claimed by the estate of J. J. Astor, Esq., and the rents and income which have been collected by Astor estate, before and since 1850, continuously; and

Whereas, The Counsel to the Corporation says the title is in the city, and we have the right to demand and collect all income therefrom; therefore

Resolved, That the Treasurer be directed to call for and obtain from the Astor estate an account of all money received by them for or on account of this pier in question, and that the Wharfinger be directed to collect from this date any and all wharfage from said pier, and that the firm of Delamater & Company be notified by the Secretary, that all rents must be now and hereafter paid to this Department.

Commissioner Laimbeer presented to the Board, in reference to communication from the Counsel to the Corporation of January 13th, instant, statements respecting several parcels of property on the water-front of the city, the title to which is believed to be in the city, but which is claimed by, and is at present in the possession of, various parties, who collect the revenue and rent derived therefrom, and have not accounted to the city for the same. The several parcels are described, as follows:

No. 1. Premises on the East river, between Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth streets, from original high-water mark to bulkhead line.

No. 2. Premises next to Pier 1, North river, occupied by the Pennsylvania Railroad Co.

No. 3. Premises on the East river, between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, from original high-water mark to bulkhead line.

No. 4. Premises on the East river, between Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth streets, from original high-water mark to bulkhead line.

No. 5. Premises on the East river, on the northerly portion of the block between Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets, from original high-water mark to bulkhead line.

No. 6. Premises on the East river, from a point 46 feet 3 inches south of the southerly side of East Thirty-sixth street, to the centre line of East Thirty-ninth street, from original high-water mark to the bulkhead line.

And offered the following resolution in relation thereto:

Resolved, That the papers and information prepared and herewith submitted, relating to property on North and East river fronts, together with maps of said property and numbered (No. 1), (No. 2), (No. 3), (No. 4), (No. 5), be forwarded to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion and instruction as to our duty, in order to obtain a proper income from the same, should he decide it to be within the power of this Board so to do; and we desire to say that the Department will devote any time and give any attention that may be required by the Counsel to the Corporation, in order to have those several questions decided upon by him.

The President offered the following resolution as a substitute therefor:

Resolved, That the communication presented by Commissioner Laimbeer to the Board this day, in reference to certain pieces of property therein specified, and numbered from 1 to 6 inclusive, be received, and the Secretary directed to transmit the same to the Counsel to the Corporation as emanating from Commissioner Laimbeer, in response to the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation addressed to the President calling for information as to the unlawful possession of city property by other parties, and that the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to advise this Board as to its rights and duties in relation to such property.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The President and Commissioner Vanderpoel.

No—Commissioner Laimbeer.

Commissioner Laimbeer offered the following resolution in relation to premises at Seventh and

Eighth streets, East river, occupied by the East River Ferry Company, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That all papers in the Department, as also the opinion received from the Counsel to the Corporation upon the subject of property on the East river, and now used by the East River Ferry Company, be referred to Commissioner Voorhis, to report his opinion as to what this Board should do in the matter.

The President offered the following resolution in relation to rebuilding Pier, new 37, North river, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the plans prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for rebuilding Pier, new 37, North river, be and hereby are approved; and that the printed form for the contract and specifications for doing the work submitted this date, in conformity with the draft therefor prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, and presented at meeting held the 14th ultimo, be and hereby are approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have proper advertisements, inviting bids for doing said work, inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

Henry L. Hoguet appeared before the Board, and was heard in reference to the filling in on the water-front between One Hundred and Fortieth and One Hundred and Forty-second streets, North river, and in accordance with his request the consideration of the matter of revoking the permit heretofore granted was laid over.
