HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,  
NEW YORK, August 10, 1875.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Orders.

204 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

#### Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 50 cases, and for a violation of the sanitary code in 2 cases.

#### Reports Received.

Weekly report from the Sanitary Superintendent: On the operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter houses; on operations at receiving dock; on work of Disinfecting Corps; from Riverside Hospital.

Reports: On use of quinine at Riverside Hospital; on application for permits; on cancellation of certain orders; on street pavements, etc.; on resignation of Sanitary Inspector Stein; on Madison avenue stage line stables.

#### Resolutions.

That the Attorney and Counsel be directed to commence actions, in the name of this Board, against the following-named persons, for violations of the Sanitary Code:

Patrick King, at 105 and 107 East Seventy-seventh street; M. Fischel, at 130 Avenue C.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized and directed to inspect the plot of land interlying Fourth and Madison avenues, One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, New York, with especial reference to the filling and grading thereof by Messrs. Mills & Ambrose, and if such work be in all respects satisfactory and in conformity to the orders of this Board, a certificate to such effect shall be given to the said Mills & Ambrose.

That a copy of the report of Assistant Sanitary Superintendent on the use of quinine at the Riverside Hospital, be forwarded to the Department of Public Charities and Correction.

That the subject of the preparation of a report on Statistics of Small-pox, be referred to the Sanitary Committee.

That permission be granted to H. Endermann, Ph. D., to publish the results of his investigations and experiments upon disinfectants, a satisfactory explanatory statement having been made of the object of such publication.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to cause an inspection and report to be made upon street cars, particularly as to the use of cushions in the same, with the names of the companies that violate the Sanitary Code in this particular.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to report at the next meeting of this Board how far the expenses of the Riverside Hospital can be reduced.

That the complaint in respect to Oil Works on the Hudson river, near Sixty-fifth street, be referred to the President and Sanitary Superintendent for consideration and report.

That the Board of Public Charities and Correction be respectfully requested to inform this Board whether it will continue to furnish the Riverside (Small-pox) Hospital and the Reception Hospital, during the year 1876, with supplies, transportation, etc., of the same character and upon the same terms as for the present year; such information being necessary to this Board in preparing its estimate of expenditures for the year 1876, which estimate is required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on or before the 1st day of September next.

That leave of absence be granted to William Fernhead for ten days.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to report to this Board at the end of each month—

First.—The total sales of vaccine virus during the month.

Second.—Amount of cash received from such sales of vaccine virus during the month.

Third.—Amount of cash received during the month from sales of vaccine virus made in previous months.

Fourth.—Amount due and unpaid from sales of vaccine virus at date of report.

That this Board acknowledges the receipt of communication from the Board of Police consenting to the transfer of \$2,000 from the unexpended balance of the Police Fund for 1874 to the Health Fund of 1875, for the purpose of continuing gratuitous vaccination for another month, and expresses its great satisfaction that the necessity of this sanitary work has been appreciated by the Board of Police, and at its prompt action for the relief of this Board in this particular.

That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer from the unexpended balance of the Police Fund for 1874, to the Health Fund for 1875, the sum of \$2,000, for the purpose of continuing gratuitous vaccination, by the Special Vaccinating Corps, for another month, and that a copy of the resolutions of the Board of Police, consenting to such transfer, be also forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

That the complaint against Charles Brown and wife for a assault, in violation of the law, on Assistant Sanitary Inspector J. L. Perry, while in the discharge of his duty, be referred to the Attorney and Counsel, for the necessary action.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending August 7, 1875: The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,945, as follows: 2 public buildings, 389 tenement houses, 169 private dwellings, 25 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 110 stables, 51 slaughter-houses, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 2 rag-houses, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 5 manure dumps, 2 dumping docks, 4 dumping grounds, 69 sunken and vacant lots, 92 yards, courts, and areas, 143 cellars and basements, 85 waste-pipes and drains, 141 privies and water-closets, 60 street gutters and drains, 4 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns and cesspools, 2 dangerous chimneys, 1 stock yard, 1 public sewer, 1 lands, 15 other nuisances, and 38 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received was 825.

127 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for report.

81 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes.

155 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-vaults.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 54 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also infected 2,831 privy-sinks, 205 cellars, 501 yards, and 45 miles of street gutters.

30 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 3 dead bodies to Morbidity Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious disease were reported during the week ending August 7, 1875: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 19; scarlet fever, 15; measles, 9; diphtheria, 52; small-pox, 49; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1.



18 tanks and 3,742 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending August 7, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending August 7, 1875: Calves (bob), 1 carcass; beef, 214 pounds; veal, 100 pounds; poultry, 411 pounds; and fish, 350 pounds.

*Bureau of Vital Statistics.*

During the week ending August 7, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 719 burial permits for city deaths, 38 for bodies *in transitu*, and 49 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 719 deaths, 123 marriages, 528 births, 49 still-births, 38 applications for transit permits, and 71 returns from Coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth-record, 2 of marriage, and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Board of Police met on the 7th day of August, 1875.

Present—Messrs. Matsell, Voorhis, and Smith, Commissioners.

An application of Patrick Kelly for balance of salary due his brother, late Patrolman William H. Kelly, amounting to \$72.82, was referred to the Treasurer for payment, on motion of Commissioner Smith.

A bill of Joseph H. Goodwin (\$425.00), for rent of Thirty-fifth Precinct Station-house, was referred to the Chief Clerk to certify, and transmit to the Comptroller for payment.

A bill of John Theiss (\$362.50), for rent of Thirtieth Precinct Station-house, was referred to the Chief Clerk to certify, and transmit to the Comptroller for payment.

Communication from Superintendent Walling, asking that Captain Copeland be assigned to special duty in the Superintendent's office, was referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

Communication from Bernard Cassidy asking that the Patrolmen on duty at the Catholic Proctory be continued there until Wednesday, the 11th inst., was, on motion of Commissioner Voorhis, referred to the Superintendent to grant the request if practicable, having due regard to the interests of the city.

An application of E. M. Carpenter, Superintendent Juvenile Asylum, asking detail of Patrolman Samuel B. Ryer, Twenty-second Precinct, was referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

On motion of Commissioner Smith, it was

Resolved, That the Chairmen of the Committees on Repairs and Supplies and Street Cleaning be directed to present to the Board an estimate for forage for the public animals in their charge, based on an allowance per diem per capita, which may be obtained either from the forage tables of the United States Government or from the horse railway companies in this city.

Commissioner Smith submitted a draft of a letter relative to lighting piers and wharves, which was ordered to be signed by the President and transmitted to the Mayor.

The Committee on Rules and Discipline, to whom were referred various rules for correction and amendment, reported the following:

## RULE 6.

The territory of the City of New York shall be divided into four districts, which shall be respectively named the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Districts.

First District to consist of Precincts Nos. 1, 4, 6, 7, 10, 11, 13, 14, 17, 18, 21, 26, and First and Third District Courts' squads.

Second District to consist of Precincts Nos. 5, 8, 9, 15, 16, 20, 25, 27, 29, and Second District Court squad.

Third District to consist of Precincts Nos. 12, 19, 19 Sub., 23, 33, 34, and Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth District Courts' squads.

Fourth District to consist of Precincts Nos. 22, 30, 31, 32, and 35.

An Inspector of Police shall be assigned to each District, who shall have an office within the limits of his District, or at such place as the Board may determine.

Adopted—Commissioners Matsell and Voorhis voting aye; Commissioner Smith voting no.

## RULE 9.

The Police Force is divided into as many companies as there are Precincts, and such other companies and squads as the Board of Police may order.

Fifth—A record of houses of prostitution, assignation-houses, gambling-houses, and disorderly or disreputable houses of every kind in the City of New York, with the name of the owners and keepers thereof.

## RULE 45.

The Detective Force, Mounted Squad, Sanitary Company, and Harbor Police shall be under the direct orders of the Superintendent.

The Superintendent shall be authorized to detail such Captains, Sergeants or Roundsmen of the Force as the Board may approve, to aid in office and inspection duties.

## INSPECTORS.

## RULE 200.

Each Inspector shall be responsible for the preservation of the peace in his District, and for the discipline of the force therein. He shall weekly, and as often as may be necessary, inspect thoroughly each Station-house in his District, and shall make or cause to be made such inspections of the members of the Force in his District while on duty, as may be necessary to satisfy himself that the duties are properly performed. He shall receive the reports in duplicate of the Captains and other officers in command of members of the Force in his District at 9 A. M. daily, transmitting the original forthwith to the Superintendent. He shall then carefully examine the duplicate reports, and present in person his own report of the duties of himself and aids for the previous twenty-four hours, and such remarks on the Captains' and Sergeants' reports as he may deem proper, at the Central Office, at such hour as the Superintendent may direct, at which time he shall receive such orders as may affect the force within his District, and see that they are promptly and properly distributed therein.

Fourth—A record of all crimes and misdemeanors committed in his District.

Fifth—A record of houses of prostitution, assignation-houses, gambling-houses, and disorderly or disreputable houses of every kind in his District, with the names of the owners and keepers thereof.

## RULE 210.

It shall be the duty of the Inspectors to see that the Station-houses and other Police quarters in their Districts are clean and in good order; that the men are comfortably provided for, and that the books are kept in conformity to the rules, and that the officers and men are faithful in the discharge of their duties.

## CAPTAINS OF POLICE.

## RULE 240.

The Captains and Sergeants in command of companies, court-squads, etc., will report at the District Inspector's office, with the morning returns in duplicate, at 9 A. M. They will carefully examine the reports of Sergeants and Roundsmen made to the Superintendent in relation to visiting the men, will see that the reports are correctly made out, and bring them to the Inspector's office with the morning returns.

The morning returns shall be made out in manner, matter, and form as directed from time to time by the Superintendent or Board of Police; and shall contain accurate and faithful copies of reports of the entries and memoranda, each and every of them, made in the Blotter, during the preceding twenty-four hours, including the disposition by the courts of all persons arrested for offenses, and, in cases of discharge by the courts, the cause in each case of such discharge.

The officers in command will carefully examine their morning and court returns, and see that the complaints are properly entered. They shall make daily supplemental reports of the disposition by the courts of all cases the disposition of which is not reported on the morning returns.

The morning returns shall be signed by the Sergeant who makes them out, and countersigned by the Captain. When errors are discovered or explanations are needed in the Chief Clerk's office, the Sergeant who signed the returns shall be notified to attend at the Chief Clerk's office to amend or explain them.

## INSPECTORS.

## RULE 211.

Inspectors shall report in person daily at the office of the Superintendent. They shall, quarterly and as often as may be necessary, submit reports in writing to the Superintendent, setting forth the condition of each Station-house, and other Police quarters, and the manner in which the books are kept in their respective Districts, with such suggestions in regard to them as will conduce to the comfort of the officers and men, and insure a thorough performance of duty.

Night duty will commence at 6 P. M., and terminate at 8 A. M.; Sunday duty will commence at 8 A. M., and end at 6 P. M.

## INSPECTORS.

## RULE 218.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.
