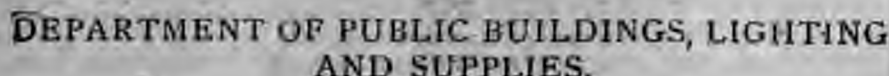

Certificates were issued for the installation of 100,230 incandescent and 1,129 arc lights, 34 generators of a total of 3,105 3/4 kilowatts capacity and 922 motors of a total of 4,240 1/4 horse power capacity; 3,376 certificates were issued for interior wiring.

6,619 miles of overhead wire were removed from the streets, and 14,495 inspections were made by the Inspectors during the quarter.

## OFFICE OF ASSISTANT ENGINEER.

Five thousand (5,000) new street gas-lamp burners of an improved pattern have been installed throughout the Borough of Manhattan by the several gas companies, and comparative photometric tests show that the new burners, with the same consumption of gas, give about 20 per cent. more light than new burners of the old type.

## DOCUMENT "C."

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS, LIGHTING AND SUPPLIES,  
BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES, NOS. 13 TO 21 PARK ROW,  
NEW YORK, May 15, 1901.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNEY, Commissioner, Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

Sir:—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1901.

## CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

The usual orders for cleaning the glass in the windows and doors were renewed. Plumber's supplies, carpenter's supplies, janitor's supplies, engineer's supplies and electrical supplies were furnished. 8 barrels of soap powder also furnished. 12 galvanized iron screens about 7 feet long, 3 feet wide, wired all around with quarter-inch rod and 9 screens about 7 feet long, 2 feet 6 inches wide, wired all around with quarter-inch iron rod were furnished and put in place on third floor of above building; also galvanized iron collars placed on four ring poles. The 2 flag-poles on the above building were painted with two coats of paint composed of linseed oil and Atlantic white lead. The walls, ceilings, iron-work, etc., in the prison pens of the Police Court in above building, also Sergeants' and Officers' rooms, were washed off, bleached, varnished and woodwork rubbed down. The marble work in the rotunda of the above building was cleaned off and pointed up. One 3-pint double-feed automatic lubricator, also 24 galvanized iron fenders made from No. 28 iron and wired with 1/4-inch wire rod all around, dimensions as follows: 5 fenders 7 feet long 4 feet high; 10 fenders 7 feet long, 3 feet high; 9 fenders 7 feet long, 2 1/2 inches high, furnished and put in place.

Louvre slats were made and erected on the windows on each side of prison pen on the Franklin street side of above building.

Cartage was furnished for the removal of railings, desks, lumber and articles of furniture from the Elm street side of first floor of above building and placed as directed. On account of the recent fire in the above building, the following repairs, cartages, etc., were made necessary to put the building in proper condition:

Trucks, labor, permits and dumping privileges were furnished to remove rubbish from the attic of the above building. The iron roof of the above building was shored, all damaged iron removed, the same repaired and straightened and properly replaced. Mason and stone work and fireproofing on roof of above building repaired; old material was used as far as practicable and new material where necessary. Also repaired damaged carpentering work on roof and lay a temporary roof on the Elm street side of the above building on the first floor; about 2,800 square feet of yellow pine flooring was laid.

In the rooms recently vacated by the District Attorney, on the third floor of above building, the wood and glass partitions were removed, reconstructed, repaired and set up in the offices prepared for the Coroners on the first floor.

A toilet-room on the first floor of the above building was fitted up for the use of the Coroners, consisting of three toilets, urinals and wash-basins with marble slabs, backs, partitions, etc.

The system of heat regulation in the above building was repaired and put in complete working order.

The copper and tile roof of above building damaged by fire was repaired; also skylight on above building replaced.

An order was issued for a water-tight canvas covering for temporary use on roof of above building during the month of March, 1901. Orders were issued to keep electrical clocks in order; also cleaning skylight.

The Elevators.—The following repairs were made to elevators: No. 1. The front bearing of operating lever renewed, shaft of same secured, bottom of operating cable renewed, cut-off valves repaired. No. 2. Cut-off valves repaired, main operating valve stem renewed and the automatic stop-valve adjusted. No. 3. The operating lever thoroughly overhauled, and front bearing of same put in good condition. No. 4. The four main lifting cables renewed and the automatic cut-off thoroughly overhauled. No. 5. Automatic cut-off renewed and main operating valve stem renewed. The electric bells in all the elevators were repaired.

Matron's Room.—One toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

Coroners' Office.—The plastering in the above office was repaired. The walls and ceilings were washed off, prepared and kalsomined, also the woodwork cleaned off, bleached and varnished. 24 clean towels were furnished weekly.

District Attorney's Office.—One Underwood typewriter furnished and 31 typewriters repaired. About 95 yards of velvet carpet was furnished and laid. 150 linear feet of iron railing, with the necessary gates, Yale locks, spring hinges, hand hules, glass shelves, etc., all finished in gold bronze, was furnished and erected. 34 drop-lights, 2 cluster lights of 4 each and 2 cluster lights of 2 each, with panel switch-board to control system, installed.

Court of Special Sessions.—3 toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished.

Court of General Sessions.—1 ten-drop Monitor switchboard set of telephone instruments, consisting of one trunk line connected with exchange and five exchange stations connecting courts with switchboard were furnished for use of above office; 1 special clock, 1 silver pen wiper, 2 silver ink wells, 1 silver pen tray, 1 silver bell, 1 silver paper knife, 1 silver letter opener, 1 silver eraser, 1 silver platter, 1 silver moustache bottle, 1 silver writing pad, extra large; 1 silver calendar holder, 1 silver seal wax check, 1 silver letter seal, 1 silver spoon holder and the following law books were furnished: 1 copy of the laws of the State of New York for 1900 and Volume 17 of the American and English Encyclopedia of Law; about 173 yards of best Brussels carpet, with best paper lining, furnished and laid in Part I. in the above court; about 42 linear feet of iron railing, 3 feet 2 1/2 inches high, with gate, spring hinges, secret lock, oak hand railing, etc., all finished in gold bronze, made and erected in above court.

Defective parts of Walsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 1 patent safety oil cabinet (200 gallons) complete was furnished. 1 eight-inch electric pump operated from push buttons located at north porch door, installed in the above building. The plastering in the halls, closets and stairways on easterly side of above court-house was repaired. All the damaged tile on the first floor of above building were taken up, repaired, re-rubbed and the same reset; new material used where necessary. An order was issued to regularly inspect and keep in repair the electro pneumatic automatic temperature regulating apparatus during the year 1901.

1 new set of 1 1/4-inch cold-rolled steel piston-rods, and 2 new brass stuffing-boxes for same, piston, valve and stuffing boxes were repacked, also a new brass bushing on the traveling sheave and a new operating cable of the best Swedes iron-wire tiller-rope furnished and put in place on the elevators in the above building.

County Clerk.—The usual orders were renewed for telephone connected with exchange and extension desk set, and for electric current to operate fan motors were furnished. 1 double-plate field regulator for size 56 generator was furnished and put in place in the above office.

Surrogates' Office.—Orders were issued for one set of telephone instruments connected with exchange for the use of above office during the year 1901.

The iron railing in the above office was taken down, repaired, reset and finished in gold bronze.

Supreme Court.—The order for the use of telephone instruments was renewed and one volume of "Law Journals" bound.

## HARLEM COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. Orders for cleaning glass in the windows and doors of the above court-house were renewed. All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. 25 shades made of nonpareil shade-cloth, hung on Hartsburg spring rollers, were furnished and put up. All the shades throughout the building were repaired where necessary. The locks on the above building were overhauled and repaired, also handle of safe repaired.

## WEST FIFTY-FOURTH STREET COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. The orders for cleaning glass in the windows and doors of the above court-house were renewed. Two steam domes of boilers and the smoke-stack in the above building were covered with wire netting and asbestos cement, also about 100 square feet of steam pipe was covered with sectional cement. One stuffing box was placed in pump in the above court-house. One 2-inch hot water meter was repaired. All the defective steam pipes connected with the boilers in the above building were removed and replaced with new pipes, valves, unions and other connections.

## THIRD DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

Clinton Market—Old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. West Washington Market—The steel rolling shutters were repaired, scraped and painted at the following stands: Nos. 21, 43, 44, 46 and 48 Grace avenue; Nos. 53, 55 and 57 Loew avenue; Nos. 36, 38, 42, 54, 56 and 58 Bloomfield street; Nos. 1, 13, 21, 27, 31, 37, 39, 41, 43, 45, 47, 49 and 51 Gansevoort street; Nos. 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 16 Thirteenth avenue; Nos. 14 and 15 West street; Nos. 33, 35 and 37 Thompson avenue; Nos. 25 and 27 Lawton avenue (2 shutters each); and Nos. 60 and 62 Hewitt avenue. The plastering on stands Nos. 34 to 42 Thompson avenue (inclusive) was repaired. The leaders were repaired and painted over the following stands: No. 18 Bloomfield street; Nos. 17, 13 and 7 Grace avenue; Nos. 19, 47 and 63 Loew avenue; No. 33 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 5, 28 and 43 Lawton avenue; also the gutter over tool-house, corner Gansevoort street and Lawton avenue.

The corrugated galvanized-iron awnings and lantern on shed over sidewalk on West street side of above market, was repaired.

Jefferson Market—The galvanized iron awnings on the Greenwich avenue side of the above market, was repaired. All worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts.

## ARMORIES.

First Brigade Headquarters—2 quartered-oak saddle-cases made and erected in accordance with plans on file in the office of the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, having plate-glass panels, bronze butts, bronze drawer-pulls, cylinder, etc.

Fifth Brigade Headquarters—Orders were renewed for use of telephone connected with exchange in above armory. Five gallons turpentine, 5 gallons kerosene, 2 gallons sperm oil, 2 gallons orange shellac, 50 pounds white lead, 50 pounds burnt sienna and 1 dozen sponges S. W. were furnished.

Seventh Regiment Armory—All worn-out and old parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. The order for supply of electric current to operate motors in the above armory during the year 1901 were renewed; also order given for small electrical supplies that may be required during the year 1901. The plumbing work, iron and glass partition in connection with shower baths on the top floor of above building was taken down, reconstructed and reset, also concrete flooring was removed and replaced with new material and necessary connections, etc., made. The old brick arches in the four boilers of above building were removed and replaced with new brick arches. One Swift American damper, also one lock damper regulator were furnished and applied to latter of 2 boilers; and 1 set of Imperial single web S. O. dumping grate bars were furnished and set up in furnaces under boilers. An order was issued for making repairs to the frictional electric gas and electric gas-lighting apparatus in the above armory.

Eighth Regiment Armory—All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Order was renewed for use of telephone connected with exchange in the above armory. An order was issued to make repairs to the frictional gas-lighting apparatus in the above armory. Ten gallons of Brilliant metal polish, 15 gallons black iron varnish, 15 gallons of mason japan paint and 10 gallons white paint were furnished. About 137 yards of Brussels carpet with the best paper lining were furnished and laid in Surgeon's rooms, two ante-rooms and passageway in above armory; also about 3 yards of tannery with binding furnished and laid. The lockers in the Field Marshal's room were removed and the same with 16 additional lockers placed in the band-room of the above building, making a total of 60 lockers in the aforesaid room; also 12 additional lockers placed in Hospital Corps room. Plumbing work, marble work, etc., in connection with urinals on first floor of above building was removed, and 6 shower baths with all necessary connections furnished and erected in the above-mentioned floor. The plastering in the Field Marshal's room on the top floor and the shower-bath room on the first floor was repaired, Italian marble work in connection with shower-bath room was constructed and put in place. On the administration part of building the newly made valleys were covered with tin and the same painted.

Ninth Regiment Armory—All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Order was renewed for the use of telephone connected with exchange in the above armory. An order was issued for a supply of electric current to operate motor during year 1901; also, order for making repairs to electrical gas-lighting apparatus during the year 1901; also, order for a supply of small electrical supplies that may be required during the year 1901. The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. Five gallons turpentine, 5 gallons refined alcohol, 2 gallons of bronze liquid, 3 gallons cosmoline oil (for rifles), 10 pounds bronze, 50 pounds sal ammoniac, 1 barrel Marvin's floor dressing, and 1 barrel of furniture polish furnished; about 140 yards of terry Brussels carpet was furnished and laid; also, 1 Smyrna rug, 6 by 2 feet. About 2,050 square feet of pipe, covered with one thickness of asbestos paper, one thickness of hair felt, one thickness of rosin-sized paper, and came covered with 8-ounce canvas, neatly sewn. Steam boilers were repaired and drips connected to pump. Defective main steam pipes, valves, etc., over boilers of above armory, were removed and the same repaired and replaced. The roof, leaders, leader box, etc., of lantern on roof of above armory was repaired and painted.

Twelfth Regiment Armory—All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Order for use of telephone connected with exchange in above armory was renewed. The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. An order was issued to repair the electrical gas-lighting apparatus in the above armory. 100,000 No. 23 1/2 U. M. C. primers, 7 oak roll-top desks, 5 feet; 2,000 pounds of pig lead, and 8 hair fender-mats, as follows: Two 12 by 5, two 8 by 5, four 3 by 5, filled with an inch hair felt, and covered with 8-ounce duck, to be stuffed, with all necessary ropes, etc., furnished. Also, about 200 Yale locks, keys all different, made in three master-key series, with the necessary master-key. Also, about 208 locker keys, keys all different, made in three master-key series, with necessary master-keys, to be used in Colonel's room, Company E room, and room of Company K, furnished; 16 lockers, made of ash, doors hung with bronze hinges, having Corbin locks, made and erected. Also about 25 linear feet of ash partition made and erected. Also 9 lockers, constructed of same material and of the same design as lockers heretofore erected in said room with hardware, etc., to match were furnished and erected in the above armory. The walls and ceilings in the Surgeon's and Recruit rooms of the above armory, were washed off, prepared and calcimined; and the lockers in the Surgeon's rooms were filled and varnished, and all woodwork in both rooms was washed off, touched up and varnished. An order for a supply of electric current during the year 1901 was issued.

Twenty-second Regiment Armory—An order was issued for a telephone connected with the exchange in the above armory. All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. One pair blocks and fall, 2 gross flour soap, 1 dozen ostrich feather dusters, 1 wire fine brush 2 1/2 inches were furnished. A system of two telephones between the firing point and the butts in the rifle range was installed in the above armory. The ceilings and walls of the Headquarters room and room occupied by the Quartermaster in the above armory were cleaned off, prepared, calcimined and painted. The work was washed off, bleached and varnished where necessary, and the railings in Headquarters were bronzed. The two upper main hallways were also washed off, prepared, and the ceilings calcimined and the walls painted as directed. The woodwork was cleaned off, bleached where necessary, varnished and rubbed down. A brick wall was built in the Magazine room of the above building. An order was issued for a supply of electric current to operate motors, also repair electrical gas-lighting apparatus in the above armory during year 1901.

Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory—An order was issued for the use of one set of telephone instruments connected with exchange in the above armory. All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. One barrel of Antozoon disinfectant was furnished.

Seventy-first Regiment Armory—All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Cleaning supplies, 20 gallons Brilliant metal polish, 20 gallons Miller's harness dressing and 40 gallons Walter's harness oil, 17 1/2 dozen camp chairs with slat seats, 26 1/2 dozen camp chairs with veneer seats, and 42 dozen camp chairs, wooden backs, perforated wooden seats and one cocoon mat were furnished. The final blown from the tower at corner of Thirty-fourth street and Park avenue of above building was repaired and reconstructed, and same replaced in its former position; also necessary repairs made to slate roof, flashings, etc. The two towers over the Park avenue side of above armory were secured and braced. The plastering on ceilings and side walls of gymnasium were repaired. An order was issued to make repairs to the electrical gas-lighting apparatus in the above armory.

Squadron "A" Armory—Order was issued for use of telephone connected with exchange in above office. All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Cleaning supplies, 6 dozen brass rifle brushes, 1 gallon Three in One oil, 125 tons of tan bark, 2 barrels of disinfectant and 1 six-gallon mahogany-jacket porcelain-lined water-cooler and stand was furnished. The decayed tan bark in drill room was removed. One fireproof safe, 61 inches high, 84 inches wide and 31 inches deep, outside measurements, with combination lock, inside doors with flat key lock, interior arrangements as directed, and lettered "Squadron A." The roof, gutters, skylights, etc., were repaired and repainted. Partitions and closets in office were constructed, 2 pairs of doors hung, with necessary hardware, etc., for storm-shed; also 20 target frames; gate repaired at entrance to ring, and 1 sash pulley with sash cords were furnished where required in the above armory. One white pine storm-door was constructed. An order was issued for making repairs to the electric gas lighting apparatus in the above armory.

First Battery Armory—Order was renewed for use of telephone connection with exchange in the above office. All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Cleaning supplies, 50 yards of huck toweling, 2 dozen huck towels, 2 dozen corn brooms, 1 dozen whisk brooms, 1 barrel of disinfectant and 1 barrel of "Forma Carbol" liquid soap and disinfectant were furnished.

Second Battery Armory—Order was issued for use of telephone connected with exchange in the above office. All old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Twenty gallons Brilliant metal polish, 20 gallons Miller's harness dressing, and 10 gallons Miller's harness oil were furnished. Order was issued for making repairs to electrical gas-lighting apparatus in the above armory.

First Naval Battalion—One No. 8 long carriage Remington typewriter was furnished. One electric call bell and 1 electric buzzer was installed.

Headquarters National Guard—About 65 yards of Brussels carpet was furnished and laid, 1 fireproof safe 61 inches high, 34 inches wide and 31 inches deep outside measurements, with combination lock, inside door flat key lock, interior arrangements as directed and lettered "Headquarters National Guard, New York."

First Signal Corps—An order was issued for use of telephone connected with exchange in the above office. 6 gallons Miller's harness dressing, 1 dozen Miller's No. 0 harness oil, 10 pounds of Horner's soap, 100 yards heavy cotton flannel, 1 rung ladder, 12 feet; 1 rung ladder, 24 feet; 10 gallons kerosene oil, 5 gallons grain alcohol, 5 gallons naphtha, 5 gallons turpentine, 1-lb silicate black paint for blackboards, 5 gallons sperm oil, 1 lb pound cans orange enamel, four 1-pound cans black enamel, two 1-pound cans white enamel, 1,000 feet 3/8-inch manila rope, 500 feet 1-inch manila rope, 1,000 feet 3/8-inch manila rope, 500 feet 1/2-inch manila rope, 1 hand-saw, 24 inches; 2 hand-saws, 26 inches; 2 poles, 37 feet long, 5 inches at top; 4 poles, 37 feet long, 2 inches at top, 5 inches or over at butt; 40 poles, 8 feet long, 2 inches at centre; 4 poles, 20 feet long, 2 inches at centre; 6 poles, 9 1/2 feet long, 4 inches at centre, were furnished. Hon. HENRY S. KEARNEY, Commissioner, Department Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

SIR—I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the quarter ending March 31, 1901.

In Exhibit "A" will be found a statement showing the amounts expended on vouchers for a supply of illuminating gas, etc., to the various public markets, court-rooms, offices, armories, etc., and for fitting up, lighting and maintaining the public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the Appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting," and this shows an expenditure during the quarter of three hundred and twenty-seven thousand one hundred and eighty-eight dollars and thirty-three cents (\$327,188.33), with liabilities amounting to sixty-nine dollars (\$69.00).

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the Lamp Account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued by each gas and electric light company during the quarter: 25 new gas lamps, 3 new Welsbach naphtha lamps have been lighted; 180 old gas lamps have been relighted; 45 electric lamps, 21 naphtha lamps and 422 gas lamps have been discontinued. The total number of public lamps lighted March 31, 1901, was 23,408 gas, 1,508 ordinary naphtha, 744 Welsbach naphtha lamps and 4,843 electric lamps, making a total of 30,503 lamps.

Exhibit "D" is a statement showing the average illuminating power of the gases supplied in the Borough of Manhattan by the various gas companies during the quarter.

The following statement shows the average amount of impurities found in the gases of such of the companies as have gas mains on the lines of our Photometric Stations, as determined by the analyses by Dr. E. G. Love, Ph.D., our Gas Examiner in the Laboratories of this Bureau:

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions I submit herewith a report of the transactions of this office for the quarter ending March 31, 1901.

Men have been employed in routine work of office, draughting-room, cement testing laboratory, and in the general annual inspection of street lamps. In the Borough of Manhattan maps have been prepared to show the position of gas street lamps whose burners gave a small or defective flame, and as a result some 5,000 new burners of an improved pattern have been installed by the gas companies. Comparative photometric tests show that these new burners, with the same consumption of gas, give about twenty per cent. more light than new burners of the old type.

Maps of the several boroughs have been corrected to March 31, 1901, and show the street-lighting system of the City, as given in Table "A," with a grand total of 60,502 lamps.

In the laboratory, tests of Portland cement for the new Hall of Records have been in progress. Six carloads of cement have been accepted as conforming to the specifications, and two rejected. Further tests have been made of each lot of cement as delivered on the work. The average results of tests on cement which was accepted are given in Tables "B," "C," and "D."

During the year 1898 you placed Welsbach lights and gas governors in the principal public buildings. Table "E" shows a saving over the average consumption of preceding years of over 2,500,000 cubic feet.

The Fifth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Fifth avenue, from Flushing Bay to Fifteenth street; the westerly side of Fifteenth street, from Fifth avenue to Sixth avenue; the southerly side of Sixth avenue, from Fifteenth street to Twenty-first street; the westerly side of Twenty-first street, from Sixth avenue to Seventh avenue; the southerly side of Seventh avenue, from Twenty-first street to Twenty-third street; the westerly side of Twenty-third street, from Seventh avenue to creek; centre line of creek, from Twenty-third street to Flushing Bay, and Flushing Bay.

Bergen; thence southerly along said dividing line, from line dividing the former towns of Flushing and Jamaica to Hempstead and Jamaica Plank road; thence southerly along a line dividing the Delemeter property and G. Habitzer's farm, from Hempstead and Jamaica Plank road to Hollis avenue; thence southerly along a line running through Ditmars and Remsen property, from Hollis avenue to Central avenue; the northerly side of Central avenue, from above-mentioned line to Merrick road, the easterly side of Merrick road, from Central avenue to Jamaica Village line; the easterly side of Jamaica Village line, from Merrick road to Hamilton avenue; the easterly side of Hamilton avenue, from Jamaica Village line to Lincoln avenue; and the easterly side of Lincoln avenue, from Hamilton avenue to the line dividing the former towns of Flushing and Jamaica.

The Twenty-seventh Election District is bounded by and within a line dividing the former towns of Flushing and Jamaica, from the dividing line of the property of C. Vanderveer and J. S. Bergen to line dividing the former towns of Hempstead and Jamaica, along said line to Central avenue; the northerly side of Central avenue, from above-mentioned line to line of the Abraham Remsen property; thence in a northerly direction along the easterly line through Remsen and Ditmars property, from Central avenue to Hollis avenue; thence northerly on a line dividing Delemeter property and G. Habitzer's farm, from Hollis avenue to the Hempstead and Jamaica Plank road; thence northerly on a line dividing the property of C. Vanderveer and J. S. Bergen, from the Hempstead and Jamaica Plank road to the line dividing the former towns of Flushing and Jamaica.

#### PURCHASE OF FRAUNCK'S TAVERN, MANHATTAN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, June 15, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, recommending that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to the property known as "Fraunce's Tavern" and such parts of the lands adjacent as indicated on the accompanying diagram, I wish to state that before title can be acquired to said property a map has to be adopted and filed, laying out the same as a public place.

I submit for this purpose for adoption and a public hearing a map entitled "Map or Plan showing the locating and laying out of a public place on the property known as 'Fraunce's Tavern,' at Pearl street and Broad street, and the Lots Nos. 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 37, 38, adjacent thereto, in the First Ward, Borough of Manhattan."

The valuation made by the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the land proposed to be taken for the public place is \$185,000.

The technical description can be copied directly from the title, which describes the public place correctly.

#### OPENING ANDERSON AVENUE, BRONX.

Sir—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, recommending that a date be fixed for the vesting of title to Anderson avenue, between Jerome avenue and the north side of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx, I have to state as follows:

The draft damage map in this proceeding was forwarded April 5, 1900, and no request was made as yet for the final damage and benefit maps.

The buildings on this street are an old shed and an out-house; the area of the land is 43,300 square feet or 17½ city lots, of which about 6½ city lots are designated as unknown street.

The purpose for vesting title prior to the confirmation of the proceedings is probably because extensive improvements are being made along this avenue and no sewer can be constructed before the City has title to the street.

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CORPORATION COUNSEL.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was placed on file:

LAW DEPARTMENT,

NEW YORK, June 18, 1901.

To the Board of Public Improvements:

GENTLEMEN—I have your communication of March 20, 1901, requesting my opinion as to the constitutionality of the act entitled "An Act to incorporate the Newtown and Flushing Canal Company," being chapter 439 of the Laws of 1898, and as to the effect of the carrying out of such law, by the incorporated company, upon the right of the City to adopt a map or plan of a system of streets for a portion of the old Town of Newtown, now in the Second Ward of the Borough of Queens, which plan shows a city canal occupying a similar route to that authorized by said act.

Your communication refers to a former communication from you of November 15, 1899, also asking these questions. Upon that former communication I asked for certain information that would bear materially upon the consideration of the questions asked, but no response was made by you to this request until your communication of March 20, 1901. The information thus asked for has not been furnished to me by you, but in view of your urgent request for an opinion I shall discuss the subject without further delay.

Various constitutional objections to the act under consideration suggest themselves.

It might be contended that the act violates the provisions of section 16 of article III. of the Constitution, which reads:

"Sec. 16. No private or local bill, which may be passed by the legislature, shall embrace more than one subject, and that shall be expressed in the title."

It might plausibly be argued that the title to this act, which purports to incorporate a canal company, would not include under that designation the right to condemn a large tract of land along either bank of a canal, amounting in the aggregate to nearly half a mile in width and along the entire canal, for the purpose of building wharves, piers, warehouses, bridges and other structures, and authorizing the company to sell or lease for valuable consideration any other property acquired under the authority of the act not actually used for the purposes of a canal for manufacturing, dwelling sites or other lawful purposes.

I am of opinion, however, that this act is unconstitutional on another ground, which appears to me to be unassailable. Section 2 of article XII. of the Constitution classifies all cities in the State into three classes: the first class includes all cities having a population of two hundred and fifty thousand or more; the second class, all cities having a population of fifty thousand and less than two hundred and fifty thousand; the third class, all other cities; and provides that laws relating to the property, affairs or government of cities, and the several departments thereof, are divided into general and special city laws; general city laws being those which relate to all the cities of one or more classes, special city laws those which relate to a single city or to less than all the cities of a class. The section then provides that "special city laws shall not be passed except in conformity with the provisions of this section. After any bill for a special city law, relating to a city, has been passed by both branches of the legislature, the house in which it originated shall immediately transmit a certified copy thereof to the mayor of such city, and within fifteen days thereafter the mayor shall return such bill to the house from which it was sent, or, if the session of the legislature at which such bill was passed has terminated, to the governor, with the mayor's certificate thereon, stating whether the city has or has not accepted the same. \* \* \* Whenever any such bill is accepted as heretofore provided, it shall be subject, as are other bills, to the action of the governor. Whenever during the session at which it was passed any such bill is returned without the acceptance of the city or cities to which it relates, or within such fifteen days is not returned, it may nevertheless again be passed by both branches of the legislature, and it shall then be subject, as are other bills, to the action of the Governor. In every special city law which has been accepted by the city or cities in which it relates, the title shall be followed by the words 'accepted by the city' or 'cities,' as the case may be; in every such law which is passed without such acceptance, by the words 'passed without the acceptance of the city' or 'cities,' as the case may be."

A special city law, then, is a law which relates to the "property, affairs or government" of a single city. Is the act now under such consideration such a law?

Neither the words "accepted by the city" nor the words "passed without the acceptance of the city" appear under the title of the act, so it is to be assumed that the act was never transmitted to the Mayor of The City of New York. (Exempt Firemen's Assn. vs. Trustees, 34 App. Div. Reports, 138).

The larger part of the territory covered by the canal and the docks, basins, wharves, piers and other works and buildings is comprised within the jurisdiction of the City of New York, and the question to be determined is, whether the things authorized to be done by the act are matters relating to the "property affairs or government" of the city.

By the Greater New York Charter, the Department of Docks and Ferries is given exclusive charge and control, subject in some particulars to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of the wharf property belonging to the Corporation of The City of New York, including all the wharves, piers, bulkheads and structures thereon and waters adjacent thereto, and all the slips, basins, docks, water-fronts, land under water and structures thereon, and the appurtenances, easements, uses, reversions and rights belonging thereto which are now owned or possessed by the said corporation, or to which said corporation is or may become entitled, or which said corporation may acquire; and the said Board is given exclusive charge and control of the repairing, building, rebuilding, maintaining, altering, strengthening, leasing and protecting said property and every part thereof, and of all the cleaning, dredging and deepening in and about the same; and the said Board is also invested, except as otherwise expressly stated in the Charter, with the exclusive government and regulation of all wharf property, wharves, piers, bulkheads and structures thereon and water adjacent thereto, and all the basins, slips and docks, with the land under water in said city not owned by said corporation (Section 818).

All the wharfs, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks, slips, exterior streets, etc., must be laid out, built and rebuilt in conformity with a plan adopted, or to be adopted, by the Department of Docks and Ferries and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund (section 819).

Whenever such plan shall include the widening of an exterior street or avenue, or the opening and construction of a new exterior street or exterior avenue, or the abandonment or closing of such street or avenue already in existence, the power to widen, open, construct, abandon or close the same shall exclusively reside with the said Board of Docks, which is hereby authorized to take such steps as may be necessary in that regard, and, after the same shall have been so widened or opened, the right to maintain the widened portion of a street or avenue already opened, and such new street or avenue shall also reside with the said Board of Docks; but such street or avenue so widened to the extent of the part so widened, or such new street or avenue opened under this plan, shall not be a public street, but shall be a marginal wharf, and shall be used in that regard in such manner from time to time as the Board of Docks shall, by resolution, determine (section 819).

By section 595 of the Charter, the Commissioner of Bridges is given cognizance and control of the construction, repair and maintenance of all bridges that are or may be in whole, or in part, a public charge, not included in public parks, within the territory of The City of New York.

By section 48 of the Charter, the Municipal Assembly is given power to provide by ordinance for the building of bridges over any stream or waterway within or adjoining the limits of the city.

These matters then are plainly matters relating to the "property, affairs or government" of the city.

The act incorporating the Newtown and Flushing Canal Company authorizes, in the first place, the "constructing, cutting, maintaining and operating a canal, with all the necessary and proper basins or other works or appendages connected therewith, commencing at a point in Newtown creek, or English Kills, in the Borough of Queens, New York City, north of the Grand Street Draw-bridge; thence easterly, northeasterly or southeasterly, as far as practicable, along and following the line of any existing or former line of natural water-course to Flushing creek at a point south of Flushing Bay, subject to the modifications as provided herein" (section 1).

This route is all included within The City of New York.

The company is authorized to construct its canal along any stream, water-course, highway, plank road, turnpike or across any of the highways which the route of the canal may intersect or touch, and it is directed to build steel or iron bridges to connect such intersecting highways, of a type or style to permit of opening for the purposes of navigation and to be sufficiently strong to accommodate all ordinary travel. These bridges are to be deemed part of the public highways so intersected by the canal (section 5).

For the purpose of cuttings and embankments, lands for buildings and basins and necessary approaches to basins and wharves, additional lands may be acquired, by purchase or by the right of eminent domain, not exceeding twelve hundred feet in width, along the entire route or line of the canal.

It does not require any argument to show that these matters relate to the affairs and government of the city. The act interferes with or affects the streets, avenues or highways which the canal may intersect; it authorizes the building of bridges, which are to become part of those highways, and the acquisition of a strip of land on either side of the canal which may be deemed by the city or its proper authorities to be necessary for marginal streets or avenues, and it authorizes the interference with streams which are under the jurisdiction of the city.

These matters at least relate to the affairs and government of the city as much as did the act which was condemned in the Exempt Firemen's case above cited.

In the case of People ex rel. Elmshead v. Mayor (4 App. Div., at p. 192) the Court says, in speaking of the constitutional provision now under discussion: "The circumstances which led up to the adoption of it are well known. It had not been unusual for laws to be passed seriously affecting the local interests and property of cities without notice to the authorities of such cities and without any opportunity for them or inhabitants to be heard upon the subject. That had grown to be a great crying evil, and the provision of the Constitution was intended to remedy it."

It is difficult to see how a law could be passed which would affect more materially the property, affairs and government of The City of New York than the act now under examination. I think therefore that this act should have been submitted to the Mayor of The City of New York for his approval or disapproval, in accordance with the constitutional provision, and that not having been so submitted it is unconstitutional and void.

Section 13 of this act provides that "if the said corporation shall not within one year after this act shall take effect begin the construction of said canal and work, and expend thereon ten per centum of its capital, or shall not finish the said canal so as to admit of the regular passage of vessels through the entire length thereof within five years after the time of this act taking effect, its corporate existence and powers shall cease."

The time for beginning the said construction and for the completion of the work was extended for a period of one year from April 22, 1899, and of five years from said date respectively, by chapter 171 of the Laws of 1899.

I have caused an examination to be made of the records in the office of the County Clerk of Queens County, and it appears from such examination that no map or plan of the proposed canal has been filed, in accordance with the provisions of section 8 of the act, and as this filing and proceedings in connection therewith are a necessary prerequisite to the construction of any part of the canal, it is fair to be assumed that no work has been commenced thereon. This raises a grave question as to whether, under the provisions of section 13 above cited, the corporate exist-



ence and powers of the Company have not ceased and determined so that no further action can be taken under its charter.

Whether the act is constitutional or not, and if the corporate powers still exist, no legal objections can be raised against the adoption of the map or plan which is the subject of your communication. This map or plan shows a proposed city canal occupying substantially the same territory as that laid out in the act. This is merely tentative and would give the City a right at some future time, if it was fit, to lay out and build its canal, wharves, basins, piers and other structures in connection therewith. If in the meantime the Newtown and Flushing Canal Company had legally acted under its charter and had built its canal and acquired other rights and property the City would have authority to acquire the same under the provisions of section 822 of the Charter.

DEAR SIR—From report made to me by the Chief Engineer of this Department I find it necessary that water-mains be laid in One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Broadway and Amsterdam avenue, and in Fourth street, from Lewis street to the East river, Borough of Manhattan, there being 6 houses and 2 factories requiring water supply and fire protection, on a distance of 2,000 feet; estimated cost \$2,700, to be paid from the appropriation "Laying Croton Pipes, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx," for 1901.

I inclose herewith the draft of a resolution for adoption by your board, authorizing the laying of these mains, and recommend that a corresponding resolution or ordinance be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for adoption.

DEAR SIR—The Local Board of the First District, Borough of Richmond, adopted on June 2, 1901, a resolution recommending that proceedings be initiated to open, regulate, grade, curb, gutter and macadamize a street 60 feet in width between Richmond turnpike and Ward avenue, in the Second Ward of the Borough of Richmond—the southerly line of said street to begin at a point on the easterly side of Richmond turnpike, 443 feet, more or less, northeasterly from the intersection of the northerly line of Lewis street with the said easterly line of Richmond turnpike, and said southerly line of said proposed street to extend thence in a straight line southeasterly and along the northeasterly line of the property of Louis De Jonge & Co. to a point on Ward avenue, distant 378 feet, more or less, northeasterly from the intersection of the northerly line of Lewis street and the westerly line of Ward avenue; provided that said proposed improvement is not inconsistent with the map and plan of that section of the Borough of Richmond, in The City of New York, now in process of preparation by the Topographical Bureau of the Board of Public Improvements.

I understand that, in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Public Improvements February 27, 1901, Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in this matter have been appointed and have filed their costs of office.

It is more than a year and a half since these proceedings were initiated, and it is necessary that a contract for the improvement be entered into without further delay.

By awaiting the receipt of the resolution of the Local Board in the usual manner considerable time would be lost, and I have therefore determined to make my report and recommendation in the matter in advance so that the improvement may be authorized at the meeting to-morrow.

The estimated cost of the work provided for in the resolution of the Local Board is \$11,500, including six months' maintenance, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$65,900.

I recommend that the work be authorized.

## REPORTS FROM TOPOGRAPHICAL ENGINEER.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was referred to the Corporation Counsel:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, June 15, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the Commissioner of Sewers, with copy of a communication from the



American Dock and Trust Company and copy of a letter from the Deputy Commissioner of Sewers of the Borough of Richmond, in relation to the discontinuing of the construction of the outlet of the Arrieta street sewer at the face of the present dock of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, I have to state as follows:

The Deputy Commissioner of Sewers recommends that the Board of Public Improvements pass a resolution authorizing the discontinuing of a contract for the construction of part of the outlet sewer.

There is no doubt that the construction of a wooden flume sewer beyond the face of the present ferry pier will seriously interfere with the use of said pier, and the Department of Sewers had a perfect right to stop the sewer at the face of the pier, provided the Board of Health did not interfere.

This matter involves questions which can only be solved by the Law Department of the City, and I recommend, therefore, that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion.

SIR—The Topographical Bureau on April 5, 1901, made a report to the Board of Public Improvements in relation to the construction of a sewer in College avenue, between Thirteenth avenue and North Boulevard, and in North Boulevard, between Thirteenth avenue and College avenue, Third Ward, Borough of Queens, in which it was stated that a recommendation of the Local Board of the Borough of Queens for the construction of sewers could not be attended to at the present time.

This matter was taken up, however, since, and I submit for adoption a map entitled "Plan of drainage, showing location, sizes and grades of sewers in College avenue, from the East river to Thirteenth street, and North Boulevard, from College avenue to Sixteenth street, in the former Village of College Point, Third Ward, Borough of Queens."

Papers in the matter were returned with the report of April 6, 1901.

The communication of Hugo Funke, of College Point, which was received in this connection, is returned.

SIR—In accordance with requests made by the President of the Borough of Queens to expedite the plans for the sewerage and drainage systems of the Borough of Queens, the district which drains through the Horsebrook, in the Second Ward, Borough of Queens, was taken up, extensive surveys were made and a plan for the system of sewers in that part of Elmhurst, which is shown on a map filed by the Board of Public Improvements July 9, 1900, was prepared, and is herewith forwarded for adoption. The map is entitled, "Plan of drainage, showing location, sizes and grades of sewers in Sewerage District No. 8A, bounded by Broadway, Orchard avenue, Eleventh street and Ludlow avenue, Second Ward (formerly Elmhurst), Town of Newtown, Borough of Queens."

In addition to this map, a general map is transmitted, entitled, "Map or plan showing that portion of Horsebrook Watershed, Sewerage District 8, draining through Elmhurst, Second Ward, Borough of Queens."

This second map is a general map, which shows the boundaries of the watershed by blue lines, and the boundary of the watershed drained by the sewer in Elmhurst avenue by red lines. The flow lines of the sewers are shown by heavy broken dotted lines; the side lines of avenues and streets shown on the filed map of Elmhurst are shown by full black lines, and other avenues and streets which are shown on the adopted tentative plan of Newtown are shown by black dotted lines.

At the junction of Elmhurst avenue with Broadway 22½ acres are drained into the Broadway sewer from the westerly part of Elmhurst.

At the junction of Broadway and Ludlow avenue the easterly part of Elmhurst is added, making a drainage area of 78½ acres.

The whole system is designed as a separate system, of which the smallest size sewer pipes are eight inches in diameter, the sewer in Elmhurst avenue being two feet six inches in diameter.

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT FROM the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held Tuesday, February 13, 1901:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption at 115 per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 13, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN: Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 27 of chapter 27 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted from the debt-redeeming purposes of section 27 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-redeeming capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were redeemed by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority contained upon the face of the Bonds of the City of New York, issued in accordance with the provisions of section 27 of chapter 27 of the Laws of 1897.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 27 of chapter 27 of the Laws of 1897:

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 27 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 27 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 27.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the limited redemptions of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

Enacted by the City.

Because a law April 10, 1900, with the approval of the Governor, passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the City of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the limited redemptions of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of such stock so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 27 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

SEALED BIDS OR PROPOSALS FOR THE above work, indented with the above title, also with the name of the person or persons making the same, and the date of presentation, will be received at the office of the Mayor, City Hall, in The City of New York, until

TUESDAY, JULY 9, 1901,

at 12 o'clock M., at which place and upon the bids will be publicly opened by and in the presence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and read. The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at the office of the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, with the samples offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect.

*No bid will be given for the work without the aid of an estimate. No bid will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, or guilty of other delinquency upon any obligation to the Corporation.*

Bids will be received only for the whole work in gross. Bidders are required to state in their estimates, under each item, their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein, and if another person be so interested they shall distinctly state the fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making any bid or estimate for the same purpose, and that it is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Municipal Assembly, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk thereof, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work in which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. Where more than one person is interested, it is required that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting, the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householdholder or freeholder in The City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, as stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise, and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by law. Should a guaranty or surety company be offered, the consent of the said company shall be submitted. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered will be subject to the approval of the Comptroller, after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

For the nature and extent of the work to be done bidders are referred to the specifications and the plans and drawings therein mentioned, which can be seen at the office of the architect, John R. Thomas, No. 160 Broadway; said specifications, plans and drawings form part of the contract.

The entire work is to be progressed simultaneously with and finished within sixty days after the completion of the contract, dated December 17, 1901, for the "Masses Work, Fine Stone Work, Steel and Iron Work, Roofing and Sheet Metal Work and Other Work" on Hall of Records Building.

The damages to be paid by the contractor for each day that the contract may be unfulfilled after the time specified for the completion thereof shall have expired are, by a clause in the contract, fixed and liquidated at TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY DOLLARS PER DAY.

Bidders must state in writing, and also in figures, a price for the whole work complete, which price is to cover the furnishing of all necessary materials and labor and the performance of all the work set forth in the specifications and form of agreement. No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or security to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check is money must not be included in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk who has charge of the estimate box, and an estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by The City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal, but if he shall execute the contract and give the proper security within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

The amount of security required is FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS, as hereinabove specified.
