DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Monday, June 3, 1901, at 2 o'clock P.M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held May 31, 1901, were approved.

William R. Corwine, representing the Merchants' Association of New York, and W. L. McCarty, Commissioner of the New York Trade and Transportation Bureau, appeared in relation to the proposed removal of the Providence Line of boats from the North to the East river. They were informed that Pier, new 36, North river, had already been leased to William P. Clyde & Co.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

John Egan, to place a bath about one hundred feet west of Corleau street, on the East river, said bath to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

Lawell M. Palmer, to repair the pier foot of Freeman street, Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From William A. Jenner, attorney—Requesting on behalf of the Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn that a new lease of the franchises of the Hamilton, South, Wall, Fulton and Catharine ferries be offered for sale at an upset price of 3½ per cent. per annum on the gross receipts, and that the new franchises provide for an increase in the charge for foot passengers to two cents.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Meyer, Commissioner Murphy voting in the negative, the report of the President recommending that a new lease of the franchises of said ferries be offered for sale at public auction at an upset price of 4½ per cent. per annum on the gross receipts for a term of ten years, and that no change be made in the charges for foot passengers was placed on file, said recommendation approved and the Secretary directed to prepare terms and conditions of sale of the ferries, and to transmit same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

From the Erie Railroad Company—Giving notice of its intention to take advantage of the privilege of a renewal lease of Piers, new 20 and 21, and 500 feet of bulkhead north of the northerly side of Pier, new 10, North river. Secretary directed to request the Erie Railroad Company to appoint an arbitrator in act in conjunction with one to be appointed by this department for the purpose of fixing the rental to be charged under the new lease.

From A. L. & S. F. Jacobs, attorneys—Withdrawing the offer of James G. Wallace to sell to the City the property owned by him between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river.

From M. B. Martin—Requesting an extension of time in which to vacate the northerly half of the pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-third street, North river.

On motion, the time in which to vacate said premises and remove the dumping-board was extended to July 1, 1901.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the permits granted Garrett May and Archibald Watt to maintain a boat and yacht respectively on the southerly side of the pier foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, be revoked, to take effect immediately. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the application of the United States War Department for a lease of Pier 15, East river, be denied, but that permission be granted to occupy the premises during the pleasure of the Board at a rental to be hereafter fixed. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged George Rae for the privilege of maintaining a boat and house at the foot of Tiffany street, Borough of The Bronx, be fixed at the rate of \$20 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.
