The President announced that Alderman Herold had been excused from attendance.

The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the stated meeting of December 2, 1907.

On motion of Alderman Moffitt, further reading was dispensed with, and the minutes were approved as printed.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor, which had been received too late to be presented at the last meeting, and was printed as an appendage to the minutes of December 2, 1907:

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, }
December 2, 1907.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, with my disapproval, an ordinance adopted by your Honorable Board on the 19th of November, 1907, entitled "An Ordinance authorizing the issue of \$40,000 Corporate Stock for temporary Court Building in City Hall Park."

While this ordinance is somewhat ambiguously worded, in that it fails to specify whether the building to be erected in City Hall Park is to be an independent structure or an addition to the existing brownstone court house, it appears from the report of the Chief Engineer of the Comptroller's office that the erection of an entirely independent building is proposed on the northeast corner of City Hall Park.

To such a plan I am unalterably opposed. Had I understood that this was the purpose of the ordinance, I should never have voted for the resolution in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

There is no question but that the recent increase in the number of City Court Judges calls for greater accommodation, but I am informed by the City Architect and by the Commissioner of Public Works that this demand may be met readily and feasibly by the addition of an extra story to the existing court house. The Chief Justice of the City Court has stated that such an addition will answer the needs of the Court. I see no necessity therefore for diverting a part of the City Hall Park, which even now is far too crowded, from the purpose to which it was originally dedicated.

I accordingly return this ordinance, without my approval, for such amendment by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen as may be necessary to confine the proposed alterations exclusively to the existing structure.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on October 22, 1907 (Minutes, page 218), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock, \$40,000, for City Court Building, Borough of Manhattan, respectfully

REPORTS:

The details of this application are set forth in the annexed report, and Chief Clerk Smith of the City Court appeared before the Committee and stated that it was proposed to erect a two and one-half-story temporary structure immediately east of the present City Court House. The Committee regret that it is necessary to erect such a structure in City Hall Park, but as it is only to be temporary, and as some immediate action must be taken to carry out the provisions of the law increasing the number of Judges of the City Court, and as the City Court Judges state that this is the only practical proposition that can be adopted at this time, your Committee recommend the adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to provide means for the erection, furnishing and equipment of a building in City Hall Park, fronting on Chambers street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the City Court of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 18, 1907, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to provide means for the erection, furnishing and equipment of a building in City Hall Park, fronting on Chambers street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the City Court of The City of New York; and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Gentlemen—As a resident of this City, I have learned with much concern, in common with all others who have at heart the cause of pure morals and the consequent good order of the City, that there is a concerted and well organized movement on foot, either to abolish the existing law regulating the observance of the Sabbath, or to so alter or amend it as to render it practically inoperative.

In the exercise of the privilege, which belongs to every citizen, and which in such a case as this rises into the higher plane and assumes the character of an imperative duty, I respectfully submit, that while it is not necessary nor perhaps possible to condemn the particular interests affected by the present law, as absolutely and necessarily pernicious per se, it is a fact too well attested to admit of question, that the history alike of nations and civic communities reveals them to have been through all the centuries, instead of being in alliance with the cause of religion and morals, they have ever been in close alliance with, if not the most active and potent instigators of the forces of evil which seek to overthrow both.

In my judgment, it is not necessary to inquire whether the universally admitted fact that the theatre, the dance hall and the saloon are the fruitful sources of the disorders that occur in the City is necessarily in the nature of cause and effect, or their evident connection only an accidental one, but the existence of the fact lays upon your Honorable Board as the trusted guardians and conservators of the moral as well as the material interests of this great City, the responsibility of curbing these, as of all other dangerous forces to the extent of your ability.

But while this question may of course be considered simply as a matter of good order and sound political economy, upon which divergent views may be entertained according to the degree of enlightenment concerning it, I submit that there is a broader and deeper basis for its consideration involving the principle of an imperial duty, upon which there can rightfully be no question and no diversity of views, and which in its paramount authority must govern the thought and determine the attitude of every right minded person in regard to it, and I should be derelict in my duty as a Christian if I did not base my claim for the sanctity of the Sabbath upon this alone, regardless of all other and inferior ones.

Either the Sabbath is of divine origin and comes to us with all the sanctions of divine authority, or it is not and does not.

If not, we may properly dismiss it as an ancient myth undeserving the serious regard of any intelligent man, and on precisely the same level as the other days of the week, for if it has no claim to divine authority, it has no other.

But if it is of divine origin, and is sustained by divine authority, it becomes instantly an obligation of such supreme and imperial consequence as neither individuals nor communities may without guilt and peril neglect or ignore.

The Sabbath law has never been repealed, and unlike human laws it has not and cannot become obsolete, either by the lapse of centuries or widespread or even universal desuetude—nor is its authority in the least lessened because multitudes have presumed to set this aside, who would not dare in the same manner to limit the authority of the others.

It stands to-day as one of the laws of God, shoulder to shoulder with the law against theft and against murder and adultery, and no human power whether of individuals or governments can abrogate or nullify it.

It has been loudly and perseveringly claimed that as this is a cosmopolitan city, with great numbers of different religious beliefs, the gates should be thrown wide open and all permitted to do as they list concerning it.

There is but one word necessary to be said concerning this claim—that while the Sabbath law along with the others is committed to one people, it is necessarily as much as they of universal application, and that this enactment alone includes within itself the express provision that it shall be the law also for "The Stranger that is Within Thy Gates."

I apprehend that none will claim that it can make any difference whether "The Stranger" may be counted by units or millions.

At the monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, held Thursday, December 5, 1907, the following preamble and resolutions reported by the Committee of the Chamber on Insurance were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York passed the following resolution March 5, 1907, viz.:

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 407 of the Greater New York Charter, the following experts in their respective callings, each of whom is a resident of The City of New York and has been engaged not less than five years in his said calling, are hereby appointed a commission to prepare and report, in conjunction with the Committee on Buildings of this Board, a 'Building Code' in amended and revised form, providing therein for all matters concerning, affecting or relating to the construction, alteration and removal of buildings or structures erected or to be erected in The City of New York"; and

Whereas, The commission thereby created has completed its report and the proposed revised "Building Code" of The City of New York is now in the hands of the Board of Aldermen for consideration; and

Whereas, This Chamber believes that the revised "Building Code" is calculated to throw added safeguards around the lives of the citizens of Greater New York, to make for improved hygienic conditions, to minimize the loss of life and property from fire, to reduce the chances of a sweeping conflagration which would bring disaster to The City of New York and shock the commercial credit of the whole country, and, further, to materially lower the cost of fire insurance.

Resolved, That this Chamber hereby urges the speedy adoption and enactment into law of the provisions of the said revised "Building Code."

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and resolution be sent to His Honor, the Mayor, and to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

Hon. and Dear Sir—This organization includes over 250 churches of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond. They are combined to help, by co-operation, the spiritual, physical, educational, economic and social interests of the city's family life, and to represent its religious sentiment in regard to moral issues. Roman Catholics and Protestants of over twenty communions co-operate in its efforts, support and direction. The churches on its rolls represent many races. When it speaks, it speaks out of a knowledge of twelve years' study and service of the neighborhoods, nationalities and social factors of New York.

For these reasons you are most respectfully asked to give earnest attention to the following resolutions, unanimously passed on Saturday, December 7, 1907, and which I am directed to transmit to you:

Whereas, It is reported that the police authorities have interpreted the decision of Mr. Justice O'Gorman in extreme terms; and

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen has the power, by repealing section 1481 of the City Charter, to permit Sunday concerts and lectures to be given by theatrical managers who in the past have worked their employees seven days a week, and who have given shows of a demoralizing nature; and

Whereas, At present it devolves upon the police authorities to determine what is legitimate or illegitimate, moral or immoral, in public entertainments; and

Whereas, It is desirable that that large class of citizens who adhere neither to the Puritan nor to the Continental Sabbath shall be heard; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the Executive Committee of the Federation of Churches and Christian Organizations in New York City, appoint a sub-committee, which shall request the Board of Aldermen, before its meeting to be held on Tuesday, December 10, to take no steps for the repeal of section 1481 until the matter has been referred to a Special Committee of the Board of Aldermen with instructions that that Committee shall give a public hearing to consider the plan of having a Sunday Public Concert Commission, which shall permit or provide for the people, with a small admission fee to cover expenses only such Sunday concerts as are free from immorality and financial gain, and as can be produced without impairing the rights of musicians or other employees to a weekly day of rest.

Gentlemen—It has been the City's custom for several years, since the passage of a special act by the Legislature, to charge the greater part of the topographical survey of The City of New York to a Corporate Stock issue, rather than the Budget appropriation. Usually final action has not been taken on the Corporate Stock issue until either the close of the current calendar year or early in the next year following. At the ratio of expenditure which has been in force during practically the whole of this current year the whole of this year's appropriation and Corporate Stock issue will have been exhausted to meet the December payroll and expenses; so that it becomes essential to secure the new authorization so as to have same available for the 1st of January.

The following figures show the existing status and the estimates of 1908:

On September 1, 1907, the total balance on hand was approximately \$58,600, and our payroll expenditures for August amounted to a little over \$12,700. Our estimate, therefore, for the four remaining months of this year is approximately as follows:

Therefore, as compared with the balance on hand September 1, 1907, there would apparently be a small balance left on December 31, 1907, of \$1,900, or a practical exhaustion of our funds by December 31, 1907.

Now for 1908. Based on the same expenditures as incurred during 1907, which expenditures will all be necessary in order to properly carry on our work, there will need to be authorized in combined Budget and Corporate Stock approximately \$180,000.

If, therefore, the request of \$30,000 which has been made in our departmental estimate should be allowed there would need to be in addition a Corporate Stock issue of \$150,000; or if the Budget appropriation should be less than \$30,000 asked for, the Corporate Stock issue should be increased in same ratio.

I would urge the earliest possible action in this matter, so that there need be no delays after January 1 next, as might be occasioned by taking the matter up with a new Board of Aldermen whose members may not be familiar with the situation.

Sir—Hon. George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond, in communication dated September 9, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$180,000, for the work of the Topographical Bureau of the Borough of Richmond, of which amount \$30,000 was requested by him in the departmental estimate of the Budget for 1908.

As there has been no Budget allowance for topographical work in the Borough of Richmond for 1908, the total expenses of the Topographical Bureau will have to be met by the issue of Corporate Stock.

The unexpended balances of previous appropriations have increased the funds available during these years; the expenditure in 1906 was \$152,650.40, and in 1907 it will probably be \$161,800, leaving a balance on hand January 1, 1908, of \$1,943.16.

The topographical map of the Borough of Richmond is being made with care, and is somewhat over one-third completed.

In my opinion the work of the Topographical Bureau of the Borough of Richmond is progressing satisfactorily, and no large increase in the present force appears necessary for the ensuing year of 1908.

I would therefore suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$165,000 for the work of the Topographical Bureau, Borough of Richmond; that is to say, the making and completing of maps within said borough.

Dear Sir—Under clause 10 of the contract with Silas W. Titus for the establishment of two driven well stations from which a supply of water is to be obtained to be pumped into the distributing mains in the Borough of Brooklyn, the following is provided:

"The City will extend its present mains, if necessary, to the nearest legally opened street to the site of the pumping plant."

One of the proposed stations is to be located on Trotting Course lane somewhere between Metropolitan and Myrtle avenues, Borough of Queens. The most advantageous

point to deliver water from this proposed station is at the corner of Myrtle and Cypress avenues, where the City at present maintains a 48-inch pipe. The distance from this point is 17,000 feet and the delivering mains should be at least 30 inches. Figuring on this style of pipe, the cost for furnishing and laying same will be \$170,000. I would respectfully ask that you provide the necessary funds to cover this work by the issue of Corporate Stock, as provided by section 178 of the revised Charter.

Sir—Hon. John H. O'Brien, Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in communication under date of October 7, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$170,000 for the construction of a delivering main from the proposed pumping station on Trotting Course lane, between Metropolitan and Myrtle avenues, Borough of Queens.

I would report that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at meeting of July 8, 1907, authorized the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to enter into a contract with Silas W. Titus for the establishment and operation of two driven well stations for improving and developing the water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn for a term of five (5) years, and that, pursuant to said resolution, the Commissioner on July 15, 1907, did enter into said contract, and on October 10, 1907, he directed Mr. Titus to commence work.

Pursuant to clause 10 of said contract:
"The City will extend its present mains, if necessary, to the nearest legally opened street to the site of the pumping plant."

One of the proposed stations is to be located on Trotting Course lane, between Metropolitan and Myrtle avenues, Borough of Queens, and the Commissioner states that the most advantageous point to deliver water from this proposed station is at the corner of Myrtle and Cypress avenues, where the City at present maintains a 48-inch pipe. The distance from this point is 17,000 feet and the delivering mains should be at least thirty (30) feet.

It is proposed to lay the main in Myrtle avenue, from Cypress avenue to Trotting Course lane, thence northerly in and along Trotting Course lane to the vicinity of the proposed pumping station. Myrtle avenue is a legally opened street as shown on a map entitled "Myrtle avenue and Jamaica plank road, between Division avenue, Brooklyn, and the Jamaica plank road, 5½ miles in length," which map was filed at the office of the County Clerk of Queens County, June 15, 1854, as map No. 563, and at a subsequent date this avenue was graded and paved and a map signed by the contractor, who did the work, and the Supervisor of the Town of Newtown is on file in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens. Trotting Course lane is paved with macadam and is opened for public use, and the City undoubtedly has an easement in same, but I am unable to find that said road has been legally opened.

The legality of said road being in doubt, I would suggest that the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be requested to enter into an agreement with the Long Island Railroad Company, the owner of the abutting property, and in the event of the closing or abandonment of said road the pipe line shall not be disturbed and shall remain the property of The City of New York.

In order to carry out the contract with Silas W. Titus, the City must extend its mains; therefore, I think, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 178 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$170,000 to provide for the construction of a delivering main from the proposed pumping station on Trotting Course lane, between Metropolitan and Myrtle avenues, Borough of Queens, to the main located at the corner of Myrtle and Cypress avenues, Borough of Queens; and I would further recommend that you advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be requested to enter into an agreement with the Long Island Railroad Company relative to the pipe line in Trotting Course lane, as suggested above.

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 507 of the Laws of 1903, as amended by chapter 603 of the Laws of 1904, and the requisition of the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission by resolution adopted July 16, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the purpose of providing means to meet the proportionate cost of the improvements to be borne by The City of New York in connection with the abolishing of grade crossings of highways and railroads, pursuant to said chapter 507 of the Laws of 1903, as amended by chapter 603 of the Laws of 1904, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Report of Committee on Laws and Legislation—

No. 2562.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on November 12, 1907 (Minutes, page 571), the annexed ordinance in favor of amending the Code of Ordinances in relation to City Surveyors, respectfully

REPORTS:

A number of surveyors appeared before the Committee and explained the reasons for an increase in the compensation to be paid for City work. They especially urged the adoption of a provision authorizing agreements with the Borough Presidents in advance of doing work of a character for which there might be no special provision for payment. Such a clause would avoid delay and complications arising from the performance of work which has been ordered, but for which under present conditions there is no definite authority for making payment.

Chief Engineer Withington, of the Department of Finance, also appeared before the Committee and approved the proposed increase, agreeing with the surveyors on all points except as to the charge for duplicate lists and maps to be furnished when required.

As to this matter, after deliberation, the Committee determined that two cents a linear foot would be fair compensation.

Your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following substitute Ordinance:

SUBSTITUTE ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE amending sections 277 and 280 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, adopted October 30, 1906, and approved November 8, 1906, relating to Surveyors' fees:

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 277 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, adopted October 30, 1906, and approved November 8, 1906, hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 277. The City Surveyors employed by any Borough President shall receive compensation (therefor) for their services as follows: (nor shall any) and no Surveyor's bill shall be paid unless the same be first certified by the Borough President (so) employing him:

For a preliminary survey in regulating a street or avenue or for making a country road, for the first line of levels (three) five cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street, avenue or road, and for each additional line of levels (one cent) one and one-half cents per linear foot, to be measured in the same manner.

(For a preliminary survey in filling sunken lots, one dollar and a half per lot of twenty-five hundred square feet.)

For grading, when done alone, (five) eight cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter, when done under the same contract, (eight) twelve cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving when done under the same contract (eleven) fourteen cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For setting curb and gutter alone (three) four cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

For setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving, when done under the same contract, but not in connection with the grading, (nine) twelve cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For flagging, when done alone, (three) five cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

(For setting stakes, making final survey, etc., in the filling of sunken lots, one dollar and a half per lot of twenty-five hundred square feet.)

For fencing, including preliminary survey, (three) five cents per linear foot.

For making a country road (ten) fourteen cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the road.

For establishing a new grade line (one cent) one and one-half cents per linear foot, measuring along the line.

For making the necessary surveys and furnishing all necessary copies of damage maps in street opening proceedings, three cents per linear foot, measuring along the exterior line of the street or avenue, and along all interior boundary lines of each parcel included within said street or avenue lines; and for assessment lists and maps for street openings or other improvements, three cents per linear foot of map front; and for every additional copy of list and map required, two cents per linear foot of map front. (It being understood that the Surveyor shall, in every case, furnish quadruple lists and maps without additional charge.)

(A Surveyor employed by either of the said Borough Presidents to make a survey, the compensation for which is not otherwise provided, shall receive such compensation as shall be certified by the Borough President so employing him.)

A Surveyor employed by one of the Borough Presidents to make a survey, the compensation for which is not otherwise provided, shall receive such compensation as shall be agreed upon in writing between the Surveyor and said Borough President, before the survey or work be undertaken, and after the completion of the said survey or work the Surveyor's bill shall be certified by the Borough President in accordance with the terms of such agreement.

Sec. 2. Section 280 of said Code of Ordinances hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 280. A Surveyor shall be entitled to receive (ten) fifteen dollars for every certificate for payment to a contractor on any work done by contract made upon public advertising and letting, which shall be paid by the Borough President making the contract, and except as herein otherwise provided, no Surveyor shall be entitled to any payment for a certificate to a contractor.

The amount so paid for a certificate shall be deducted from the payment to be made to the contractor on account of the work certified to be done.

Sec. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith hereby are repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sec. 277. The City Surveyors employed by any Borough President shall receive compensation therefor as follows, nor shall any surveyor's bill be paid unless the same be first certified by the Borough President so employing him:

For a preliminary survey in regulating a street or avenue or for making a country road, for the first line of levels (three) five cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street, avenue or road, and for each additional line of levels (one cent) one and one-half cents per linear foot, to be measured in the same manner.

(For a preliminary survey in filling sunken lots, one dollar and a half per lot of twenty-five hundred square feet.)

For grading, when done alone, (five) eight cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter, when done under the same contract, (eight) twelve cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving when done under the same contract (eleven) fourteen cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For setting curb and gutter alone (three) four cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

For setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving, when done under the same contract, but not in connection with the grading, (nine) twelve cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For flagging, when done alone, (three) five cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

(For setting stakes, making final survey, etc., in the filling of sunken lots, one dollar and a half per lot of twenty-five hundred square feet.)

For fencing, including preliminary survey, (three) five cents per linear foot.

For making a country road (ten) fourteen cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the road.

For establishing a new grade line (one cent) one and one-half cents per linear foot, measuring along the line.

For making the necessary surveys and furnishing all necessary copies of damage maps in street opening proceedings, three cents per linear foot, measuring along the exterior line of the street or avenue and along all interior boundary lines of each parcel included within said street or avenue lines, (and for assessment lists and maps for street opening or other improvements, three cents per linear foot of map front,) it being understood that the Surveyor shall (in every case), if required, furnish quadruple lists and maps without extra charge

(A Surveyor employed by either of the said Borough Presidents to make a survey, the compensation for which is not otherwise provided, shall receive such compensation as shall be certified by the Borough President so employing him.)

A Surveyor employed by one of the Borough Presidents to make a survey, the compensation for which is not otherwise provided, shall receive such compensation as shall be agreed upon in writing between the Surveyor and said Borough President, before the survey or work be undertaken, and after the completion of the said survey or work the Surveyor's bill shall be certified by the Borough President in accordance with the terms of such agreement.

Sec. 280. A Surveyor shall be entitled to receive (ten) fifteen dollars for every certificate for payment to a contractor on any work done by contract made upon public advertising and letting, which shall be paid by the Borough President making the contract, and except as herein otherwise provided, no Surveyor shall be entitled to any payment for a certificate to a contractor.

The amount so paid for a certificate shall be deducted from the payment to be made to the contractor on account of the work certified to be done.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the matters provided for in section 1481 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, known as the Greater New York Charter.

Section 1481 being one of the sections specified under the title "The Second Schedule."

"Section to remain in force until changed by the Board of Aldermen."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. It shall not be lawful to exhibit on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, to the public, in any building, garden, grounds, concert room or other room or place within The City of New York, the performance of any tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, farce, negro minstrelsy, negro or other dancing, wrestling, boxing with or without gloves, sparring contest, trial of strength, or any part or parts therein, or any circus, equestrian or dramatic performance or exercise, or any performance or exercise of jugglers, acrobats, club performances or rope dancers. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit at any such place or places on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, sacred or educational vocal or instrumental concerts, lectures, addresses, recitations and singing, provided that such

above mentioned entertainments shall be given in such a manner as not to disturb the public peace, or amount to a serious interruption of the repose and religious liberty of the community. Any person wilfully offending against the provisions of this section, and every person knowingly aiding in such exhibitions, except as herein provided, by advertisements or otherwise, and every owner or lessee of any building, part of a building, grounds, garden or concert room, or other room or place, who shall lease or let out the same for the purpose of any such exhibition or performance, except as herein provided, or assent that the same be used for any such purpose, shall be subject to a penalty of Five Hundred Dollars, which penalty the Corporation Counsel of said City is hereby authorized, in the name of The City of New York, to prosecute, sue for and recover; and on the recovery of a judgment for the penalty herein provided for against any manager, proprietor, owner or lessee consenting to or causing or allowing, or letting any part of the building for the purpose of any exhibition or performance prohibited by this ordinance, the license which shall have been previously obtained by such manager, proprietor, owner or lessee is of itself vacated and annulled.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, November 13, 1907, at 10 A. M.

Present—President William F. Baker and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Frank L. Polk.

The President, Mr. William F. Baker, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the exempt class, under the heading "Board of Estimate and Apportionment," the following:

This contract, made the day of 1907, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of the said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Seaboard Refrigeration Company, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The Board did, on June 15, 1906, adopt a resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute, in the name and on behalf of the City, a contract between the Company and the City, granting to the Company the right or franchise to construct, maintain and operate a conduit, with the necessary branches and connections therefrom, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, under and along cer-

tain streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

Whereas, On the 6th day of July, 1906, the Acting Mayor did execute, in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, a contract granting to the Company such right, which contract was dated the 22d day of June, 1906; and

Whereas, On September 14, 1906; November 9, 1906; April 26, 1907, and May 10, 1907, by resolutions duly adopted by the Board and subsequently approved by the Mayor, the Company was granted various extensions of time up to and including May 1, 1908, in which to comply with the provisions of "Section 2, Third," and "Section 2, Twenty-second" of the aforesaid contract; and

Whereas, The Company, in a communication dated May 3, 1907, requested that the payments provided for in "Section 2, Third," and "Section 2, Twenty-second" of the aforesaid contract be reduced; that the term of the franchise be extended; and that the various dates for the completion of a certain amount of pipe line be extended; and

Whereas, On the 1st day of November, 1907, the Board held a public hearing upon the proposed modifications, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, such hearing being held after due publication; and

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
