Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall:

Dear Sir—The Citizens' Water Supply Company and the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company have contracts with this Department for the supply of water to different sections of the Borough of Queens. The appropriations against which these accounts are chargeable are insufficient to meet the bills for the water to be furnished by these companies to December 31 of this year. The month's supply from the Citizens' Water Supply Company is now averaging \$10,000 to \$12,000.

This increased consumption of water is due to the rapid development of that borough as a residential district, and it has been necessary, in fact, for a few years past, to meet the deficiencies on these appropriation accounts by transfers.

There are no available balances on any other account from which a transfer could be made, and it therefore becomes necessary that the expense which will be incurred for the supply of water be met by an issue of Special Revenue Bonds. The estimated amount is \$35,000.

I respectfully request that you present this application at the next regular meeting of the Board.

AN ORDINANCE amending section 282 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, regulating rents and extra charges to be collected by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
Section 282 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

The minimum annual rents, meter rates and extra charges to be collected by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall be as follows, to wit:

All rear buildings on any lot or lots, with front buildings thereon, shall pay an annual frontage rate of \$5 for each 25 feet front, or fraction thereof, but this provision shall not apply to buildings erected on corner lots, each of which buildings shall pay the regular rates as stated in the foregoing subdivisions.

The apportionment of the regular frontage rates upon dwelling houses is on the basis that but one family is to occupy same, and for each additional family or apartment, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Bath tubs in dwelling houses shall be charged at \$3 per annum; in bathing establishments at \$5 per annum; combination stationary wash tubs capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bath tubs. One bath tub to each house supplied free of charge.

Waterclosets and urinals, of every description, \$2 each, per annum; one water-closet in each house supplied free of charge.

Liquor and lager beer saloons shall be charged an annual rate of \$10 each. An additional charge of \$5 per annum shall be made for each faucet or wash box.

Stalls—For each stall, \$1 per annum.

Dining saloons shall be charged an annual rate of from \$5.

Fish stands shall be charged \$5 per annum each.

Laundries shall be charged an annual rate of from \$8.

Barber shops shall be charged from \$5 per annum; and an additional charge of \$5 per annum for each public bath tub therein.

Bakeries shall be charged from \$3 per annum.

Soda or mineral water fountains shall be charged \$5 per annum.

Wash Drill or Caisson Sinking—Water supplied at the rate of 10 cents per hundred cubic feet.

Steam engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power as follows: For each horse-power up to or not exceeding ten, the sum of \$10 per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of \$7.50 each, and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of \$5 each.

Boilers furnishing steam for drilling rock and for excavating purposes, shall be charged \$5 per month each.

Baptistries shall be charged at the rate of \$10 per annum.

Florists shall be charged at the rate of \$5 per annum.

Milk depots (for the purpose of washing cans) shall be charged \$7.50 per annum.

Bottling establishments shall be charged \$10 per annum.

Photograph galleries shall be charged at the rate of \$5 per annum.

Horse Troughs—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, \$20 per annum, each trough to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

Fire risks (not metered) shall be charged \$50 each per annum.

For wetting down buildings in course of demolition, a charge shall be made equal to one-fourth of the annual frontage rate charged against each building.

Building Purposes—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone work to be measured as bricks, 10 cents per thousand. For plastering, 40 cents per one-hundred square yards, openings not included. For concreting, fireproofing or terra cotta partitions, 5 cents per cubic yard.

Pile drivers and hoisting engines, per month, \$5.

Boilers for coal diggers, etc., per month, \$5.

Floating engines, per annum, \$25.

Steam barges, per annum, \$25.

Steam pumps, per annum, \$25.

Steam derricks, per annum, \$25.

Oyster boats, per annum, \$20.

Dredges, per month, \$10.

Steam lighters and tug boats, high pressure, per annum, \$90.

Steam lighters and tug boats, low pressure, per annum, \$45.

Steam yachts, per month, \$5 to \$10.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Request is hereby made for an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the purpose of making alterations to the brownstone building in the City Hall Park, to the extent of providing and equipping therein additional parts of the City Court and quarters to accommodate the increased number of Justices to be elected in November next, pursuant to an act of the last Legislature.

This office has had under consideration for some time past the question of providing the necessary additional space, and has reached the conclusion that from the standpoint of economy and convenience of the public the object can be best attained by increasing the height of the top story of the brownstone building from ten to fifteen feet. The estimate contemplates other changes, such as interior walls, fire escapes, steam heating, possible additional fireproofing and furnishings.

There are inclosed copies of reports of the Commissioner of Public Works and the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices explaining more in detail the amount and necessity for this work.

Inasmuch as the new work must be completed and ready for occupancy on January 1, 1908, it is necessary that prompt action be taken.

Dear Sir—I received a call the other day from several of the Judges of the City Court in connection with the establishment of new court rooms in the "brownstone building." I have taken this matter up with the Building Bureau, and they, acting on several suggestions of mine, have agreed to pass the plans so that the attic of the present City Court building can be changed, and thus make the additional rooms required for the Judges.

I inclose you a report just received from Mr. Stewart, Acting Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, and would request that you ask for the amount of money mentioned therein at once, as the Judges wish to have their offices finished by the first of January, and it will be almost impossible to finish this building on time unless everything connected with it is pushed to the limit.

As soon as you receive this appropriation I will take up the matter of appointing an architect with you and rush the work through.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In accordance with your suggestion to increase the height of the top story of the City Court Building (Brown Stone Building) for accommodation of new parts to said court, created by recent Legislature, I wish to report as follows:

The horizontal dimensions of said building are 106 feet by 73 feet, and the present height of the top story is 10 feet. You suggested raising this story to a height of 15 feet. Therefore the cubical contents to be built will amount to 106 feet by 73 feet by 15 feet—116,070—and, at 50 cents per cubic foot, would amount to \$58,000. I take a unit price of 50 cents per cubic foot, as the construction will involve other parts of the building besides the upper story, such as interior walls, fire escapes, steam heating and possibly additional fireproofing, and it also includes furnishings.

I consider the construction practicable in conjunction with the building laws, as it is an isolated building and it will not be occupied many years, as arrangements are now being made to place the City Court in the new Municipal Building.

I would recommend, therefore, that an appropriation of \$50,000 be obtained and arrangements be made to have an architect appointed immediately so as to avoid all delays.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—In a letter dated October 11, 1907, the Hon. John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan, asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation of \$50,000 Corporate Stock for the purpose of making alterations to the Brown Stone Building in City Hall Park, Borough of Manhattan, to provide additional court rooms for the increased number of Justices in the City Court.

The matter has been taken up in detail with the Presiding Justice of the City Court, the Clerk of that court and the Acting Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices of Mr. Ahearn's office, and it is my opinion that the scheme suggested, that of putting an additional story upon the present building, is unwarranted and unwise. My estimate of the cost is such that the room provided thereby would be secured at an excessive expenditure, and the quarters provided would be more or less unsatisfactory to those who are to occupy them. It would seem that for various reasons it might be well to provide temporary rented quarters for the three additional Justices, but I have reason to think that any scheme which would result in isolating any of the Justices from the others would result in confusion and trouble to lawyers and litigants in this court.

My opinion is that the needs of the court and the public would best be conserved by the erection of a detached building of a purely temporary character in the City Hall Park fronting on Chambers street, just east of the present Brown Stone Building. If built of brick without ornamentation, with a flat roof, interior trim of yellow pine, two plain fireproof staircases and other features in harmony with the foregoing, the building would serve the court purposes exceedingly well for so long a time as it would be necessary to use it.

The building should be of two stories, with a cellar under only a small portion; and if built simply and plainly, along the lines indicated above, should not cost more than \$40,000, including architect's fees.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$40,000 for the purpose of providing for a building adequate to house three additional parts of the City Court in City Hall Park, Borough of Manhattan.

To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—On October 19, 1906, your Honorable Board authorized the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York in an amount not to exceed \$6,000 for the purpose of removing two of the supporting columns of the Brooklyn Bridge Station at the intersection of Sands and Washington streets, Borough of Brooklyn, with a view to providing freer access to the roadways of the bridge.

Bids for the work to be done have twice been received and rejected because in each instance the lowest bid submitted exceeded the amount of the fund available. On June 13, 1907, the lowest bid received was that of the Cooper & Evans Company, \$7,665, and on July 23, 1907, the lowest bid received was for \$10,870, from the same company.

If your Honorable Board deem it necessary to proceed with the removal of the said columns, I would respectfully request the authorization of additional funds for that purpose, not to exceed \$6,000, making available a total fund of \$12,000.

Sir—Hon. James W. Stevenson, Commissioner, Department of Bridges, in communication dated October 7, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$6,000 to provide additional funds for the removal of two supporting columns of the Brooklyn Bridge Station at the intersection of Sands and Washington streets, Borough of Brooklyn, with a view to providing freer access to the roadways of the bridge.

On October 5, 1906, the Commissioner of Bridges requested an issue of \$6,000 Corporate Stock for the above purpose, and on October 19, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of the amount requested. It has been found, however, that the cost of the work will exceed the original estimate and the present request is made in order to increase the total fund available for the purpose, \$12,000.

The two columns mentioned are undoubtedly an obstruction to traffic and their removal will be of value in relieving the congestion of the traffic on the bridge roadways by allowing vehicles to enter the roadway from Sands or Washington street without interfering with the trolley cars and will also allow longer trolley cars to cross the bridge.

The contract lately made by the City for trolley railway approaches at the Brooklyn Bridge, in the Borough of Brooklyn, provides that part of the elevated tracks shall be hung from the girders which are intended to take the place of these two columns.

If these girders are not put in an alteration in the plans for the trolley railway approaches will be necessary.

The work being, in my opinion, advisable, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$6,000 for providing additional funds for doing all work in connection with removing two of the supporting columns of the Brooklyn Bridge Station at the intersection of Sands and Washington streets, Borough of Brooklyn.

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held September 20, 1907, communications were presented to the Board from the President of the Borough of Queens, requesting the acquisition of property located at No. 142 Eighth street, Borough of Queens, as a site for a public bath, and the issue of \$3,400 Corporate Stock for the purpose of providing means therefor, which matter was referred to you for consideration and report.

It seems that the President of the Borough of Queens, in a communication dated August 8, 1907, addressed to the Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, stated that in the matter of a public bath in Queens Borough, which was authorized on December 21, 1906, that he had selected a lot on Eighth street, near Vernon avenue, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as a site upon which to erect a public bath building, and transmitted a diagram of the lot; that preliminary approval of the plans had been given by the Municipal Art Commission, and in order that the project may be proceeded with, he requests that the necessary steps be taken for the acquisition of this property, either by private sale or by condemnation proceedings, and to

that end he transmitted a form of resolution authorizing the issue of \$3,000 Corporate Stock, under sections 47 and 169 of the Greater New York Charter, together with a technical description of the property, and under date of August 29, 1907, he states that there was an error in the appraisal; that the appraisal was given for \$3,000, while the owners refused to sell for less than \$3,400, and with his communication of August 29 he transmitted a resolution, together with a description of the property, the resolution covering \$3,400, instead of \$3,000.

The description of the lot as given in the resolution is incorrect. The lot which the President desires to acquire is known on the tax maps, for the purposes of taxation, as Lot No. 32, in Block 46, and is located on the south side of Eighth street, 125 feet west of East avenue—not on the west side of Eighth street, north of East avenue, as stated in the resolution. The lot is 25 by 100 feet, and has on it a small one-story frame dwelling. It is assessed in the name of P. O'Hare; land, \$1,500; building, \$100; total, \$1,600. I am of the opinion that the lot alone is worth from \$2,700 to \$3,000. The building located thereon is merely a "tax payer," that is, it brings in sufficient rental to cover the expenses of carrying the lot, and when one takes into consideration the cost of the property to the City by condemnation proceedings, I am of the opinion that the price asked for the property, \$3,400, is not, under the conditions, excessive. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the request of the President of the Borough of Queens and adopt two resolutions, one authorizing the Comptroller to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the property at private sale, at a price not exceeding \$3,400, and the other authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$3,500; that is, \$3,400 to acquire the property and \$100 for expenses incurred in the examination of the title and surveys.

Sir—In the matter of a communication from the Board of Education requesting the fixing of the salary of the position of Automobile Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies, at \$1,500 per annum, which communication was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, I beg to report as follows:

It appears that Mr. John D. Smith was regularly appointed to the position of Automobile Engineman by the Board of Education and that he went to work in said capacity on July 24, 1907. His name first appeared in a supplementary payroll for July and August, received in the Department of Finance on August 28, 1907. This payroll was returned to the Board of Education because the salary of said Smith had not been fixed in accordance with the provisions of Section 56 of the Charter.

At a meeting of the Board of Education held September 11, a resolution was adopted requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board of Aldermen that the salary attached to the position of Automobile Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies be fixed at the sum of \$1,500 per annum; but as no action has yet been taken in the matter, Mr. Smith's salary is still withheld, and your Examiner has been informed that the Board of Education is now in danger of losing the services of a very valuable employee unless favorable action is taken at an early date.

As to the rate of salary proposed for the position herein considered, it is higher than is paid for such services in some other City departments, but it would appear that the Committee on Supplies felt justified in offering higher compensation than is usually paid in order to obtain the services of Mr. Smith, because of his peculiar ability to meet the potential needs of the Board of Education. Although at the present time, Mr. Smith's work is confined to running the one auto truck used by the Bureau of Supplies, he has been employed with the understanding that he is to instruct and supervise the additional men to be employed hereafter, at a lower rate of wage, to run the auto trucks which the Board of Education expects to have for delivering its supplies as soon as its proposed Supply Depository is completed. It is stated that the Committee on Supplies intends to have its own machine shop where all repairs can be made, and Mr. Smith, who is a thorough mechanic, is to have charge of said shop.

Your Examiner would therefore recommend that the salary of the position of Automobile Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies, Board of Education, be fixed as requested, at \$1,500, according to the resolution attached hereto.

That the society finds itself in the housing and exhibiting of their bears in a very serious dilemma. They have in their possession eight valuable animals for which at present they have no suitable accommodations. These animals are all too rare and valuable to give away or sell. The temporary quarters in which the bears are now confined are neither safe nor adequate and constant anxiety is felt for fear of the bears breaking out. If the usual delays which are occasioned by public letting were to follow, it would be a year or more before the bear cages could be built. The need of haste is apparent and your committee therefore recommends the adoption of said resolution.

Resolved, That, on account of existing emergencies, the New York Zoological Society be hereby authorized to erect forthwith in the New York Zoological Park, without a public letting of a contract, a series of ten small bear cages, in accordance with the plans approved on October 4 by the Park Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx, at an estimated cost of \$4,500, the cost of the same to be paid only from funds already available.

No. 2134.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred, on June 11, 1907 (Minutes, page 1185), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock, \$2,200,000, for the improvement of the water supply system, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, respectfully

REPORTS:

Deputy Commissioner Goodwin and Engineer Bull appeared before the Committee and explained the details of this application, which are set forth in the annexed report. In view of the present money conditions and also in the interest of economy, the Committee suggested that several of the items could be cut down and some of the improvements contemplated could be delayed for the present. Acting on this suggestion, the Department officials went over the items and have presented the annexed communication showing wherein a reduction could be made from \$2,200,000 to \$1,768,243. The Committee have carefully considered this new report and believe that the improvements, which consist of the laying of new water mains throughout sections of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx are both necessary and urgent. To make this appropriation legal, however, it will be necessary to reject the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment providing for \$2,200,000 and recommend to said Board that in lieu thereof they provide Corporate Stock for the purposes set forth in the report of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated October 14, for the sum of \$1,768,243. The Committee therefore recommends the rejection of the ordinance for this purpose.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of two million two hundred thousand dollars (\$2,200,000), to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, as set forth in section 178 of the Charter.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 7, 1907, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes set forth therein:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of two million two hundred thousand dollars (\$2,200,000), to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, as set forth in said section 178 of the Charter, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Cor-

Sir—In the matter of the request for an appropriation of \$2,415,000 for the extension of the distribution system, which was granted by the Board of Estimate for \$2,200,000, and forwarded to the Board of Aldermen for concurrence.

In compliance with the request you advised me was made by the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen to eliminate all items which could be deferred for the present, I send you herewith a revised list showing the locations where it is necessary these water mains be laid at once. While all the water mains asked under the original schedule should be laid at the earliest possible moment, still, in view of the request made by the Finance Committee, and of the delay of two or three months incident to necessary negotiations with the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company before we can cross their tracks at One Hundred and Sixtieth street, I have eliminated from the original list three of the larger items for trunk mains, for which, however, funds shall have to be asked some time in the near future, thus reducing the amount originally asked from \$2,415,000 to \$1,768,243, as now submitted.

Dear Sir—Application is hereby made for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$2,415,000 to provide for the laying of water mains in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and for the employment of the necessary force to make up four repair companies to attend to the maintenance of hydrants and water mains within these boroughs. The items for which this appropriation is intended are as follows:

One 48-inch water main in Southern boulevard, from Boston avenue to Hunt's Point road, \$135,000.

This is to carry the low-service supply to that section of the Borough of The Bronx which is rapidly being built up, and in order that there will be a supply on hand, to be later extended to Barretto Point, which, from the present indications, is to become a manufacturing centre.

Two 48-inch mains from Jerome Park Reservoir down Heath avenue and Boston avenue to Bailey avenue, \$150,000.

Before improvements can be made to the north end of the Jerome Park Reservoir, it becomes necessary to extend from this basin two 48-inch water mains, so that the water from the west section can be utilized, and in anticipation of the Department abandoning the new drop well on the northerly section of the reservoir.

One 36-inch water main from Jerome avenue, at Kingsbridge road, down Aqueduct avenue, to and across High Bridge, to connect the pumping stations at Jerome avenue and High Bridge, \$250,000.

In case of a serious breakdown to the machinery at either the Jerome Park or the High Bridge pumping station, a certain section of the City would be without a sufficient supply of water, and the fire hydrants connected along the line of mains in the streets affected would be perfectly useless until such time as the engines could be repaired. To avoid any such mishap, it is the purpose of this Department to lay a 36-inch main down Jerome avenue, across High Bridge, to connect these two stations.

One 48-inch water main in Two Hundred and Fourth street, from end of present main already laid to Mosholu Parkway South; thence down Mosholu Parkway South to Webster avenue; thence down Webster avenue to Burnside avenue; also a 48-inch water main in Burnside avenue, between Webster and Jerome avenues, \$450,000.

One 48-inch water main in Webster avenue, from Burnside avenue to Park avenue; thence down Park avenue to One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street; thence through One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street to Courtlandt avenue; thence down Courtlandt avenue to Third avenue; thence down Third avenue to Lincoln avenue, to and across the Harlem river to Second avenue; thence down Second avenue to One Hundred and Third street, \$600,000.

These two mains are for the purpose of utilizing the water to be drawn from Jerome Park Reservoir and adding to the pressure of water in the lower section of The Bronx Borough and in the easterly section of Harlem. Both districts are at present inadequately supplied, and the Department is constantly in receipt of letters from real estate owners' associations of those districts complaining of the extra expense to house owners in being obliged to provide additional pumps and other fittings enforced by the tenement house regulations. The City at the present time is not able to furnish water only at the low pressure.

Also for 12-inch mains, to be laid in place of the existing 6-inch water mains, in the tenement section bounded by Houston and Thirtieth streets, Third avenue and East river, \$450,000.

The 12-inch mains to be laid in the tenement section east of Third avenue, between Thirtieth and Houston streets, are for the purpose of providing better protection against fire, as many of the existing 6-inch pipes in that section have been laid for sixty years and are badly corroded. Recent reports from the Supervising Engineer of the Fire Department on the pressure obtained at hydrants at which engines were working proves the necessity of removing these small service mains and providing an additional force of water.

For local mains in Manhattan and The Bronx and east of The Bronx not already provided for, \$300,000.

All money available for laying water mains has been charged against contracts to be let shortly, and there is still to be provided for local mains in a number of streets which have recently been improved, and in several instances building operations

have been suspended due to the fact that the Department has not been in a position to promise the builders when a water service would be introduced into the streets.

Four floating repair companies, \$80,000.

The four repair companies to have in charge the care of the water mains and the setting of fire hydrants throughout the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx to be made up as follows:

4 Foremen, each, per day.....	\$5 00
4 horses and trucks, each, per day.....	3 50
12 horses and carts, each, per day.....	3 50
16 Caulkers, each, per day.....	3 50

Sir—Hon. John H. O'Brien, Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in communication under date of April 10, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$2,415,000 to provide means for the laying of water mains in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and for the employment of the necessary force to make up four repair companies to attend to the maintenance of hydrants and water mains within these boroughs.

Commissioner O'Brien in his communication, states very fully the reasons which necessitate the use of the several lines of water pipes, the cost of which goes to make up the aggregate sum of money required.

Mr. Bull, Engineer in charge of laying water pipes for the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, gives me further information, the sum of which may be stated as follows:

Item No. 1. One 48-inch main in Southern boulevard, from Boston avenue to Hunt's Point road, \$135,000.

This 48-inch pipe, which is to connect with one now laid through East Two Hundred and Fourth street and down the Southern boulevard to the Boston road, is to be continued from that point to Hunt's Point road. This pipe is to carry the low-service supply to a section of the Borough of The Bronx, which is rapidly being built up, and also in order that there will be a supply on hand to be later extended to Barretto Point, which, from present indications, is likely to become a manufacturing centre. In my opinion, this main should be laid in the near future.

Item No. 2. Two 48-inch water mains from Jerome Park Reservoir down Heath avenue and Boston avenue to Bailey avenue, \$150,000.

It is stated in communication of Commissioner O'Brien that before improvements can be made to the north end of the Jerome Park Reservoir, it will become necessary to extend from this basin two 48-inch mains so that water from the west section can be utilized, and also in anticipating the Department abandoning the new drop well on the northerly section of the reservoir.

The route selected, down Heath and Boston avenues, was for the purpose of avoiding deep cutting and to get as near the Harlem river as possible, as it is intended to carry one of the 48-inch lines across the Harlem river to supply the upper end of Manhattan Island and Marble Hill.

The estimated cost of this pipe is about \$20 per linear foot for each line.

Item No. 3. One 36-inch water main from Jerome avenue at Kingsbridge road down Aqueduct avenue across High Bridge to connect the pumping station at Jerome avenue and High Bridge, \$250,000.

This main is intended to connect the two pumping stations, so that should a break occur in either (if this main is adopted) the lines will still be in use and pressure not entirely taken off.

It is intended to cross High Bridge in the present conduit with two 20-inch mains, and as the flooring at High Bridge will soon have to be relaid, it is the intention to place these mains while said floors are being laid, thereby saving additional expense later.

Item No. 4. One 48-inch main in Two Hundred and Fourth street, from the end of the present main already laid, to Moshulu parkway, thence down Moshulu parkway south to Webster avenue, thence down Webster avenue to Burnside avenue; also a 48-inch water main in Burnside avenue, between Webster and Jerome avenues, \$450,000.

This main starts in Two Hundred and Fourth street, midway between Jerome avenue and Moshulu parkway and connects with the 48-inch pipe laid by the Aqueduct Commission some time ago. It is intended to supply what might be called the middle section of The Bronx between that point and Burnside avenue. The main laid across Burnside avenue is to connect with the Jerome avenue main now in course of construction and will be so arranged that should breaks occur, water may be supplied either from the Jerome to the Webster avenue pipe, or from the Webster to the Jerome avenue pipe. In my opinion, this main should be laid in the near future.

Item No. 5. One 48-inch main in Webster avenue, from Burnside avenue to Park avenue, thence down Park avenue to One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, thence through One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street to Cortlandt avenue, thence down Cortlandt avenue to Third avenue, thence down Third avenue to Lincoln avenue to and across the Harlem river to Second avenue, thence down Second avenue to One Hundred and Third street, \$600,000.

This main, which will connect with the one previously referred to at Burnside and Webster avenues, is intended to supply the central section of the lower end of The Bronx, and the upper end of Harlem on the East side as far south as One Hundred and Third street, and will also increase the pressure of water in the lower section of The Bronx and the eastern section of Harlem. Both these districts are at present inadequately supplied, and it is stated that complaints are frequently being made by real estate associations and others complaining of extra expense in being obliged to provide additional pumps and other fittings enforced by the Tenement House regulations, the City, at the present time, being able to furnish water only at low pressure.

I am of the opinion that this main should be laid in the near future.

Item No. 6. Twelve-inch mains to be laid in place of the existing 6-inch water mains in the tenement section, bounded by Houston and Thirtieth street, Third avenue and East river, \$450,000.

The old 6-inch supply pipes, laid some sixty years ago, are said to be badly corroded and that pressure is always insufficient in case of fire. Complaints in this section are frequent, and it is my opinion that these mains should be laid in the near future.

Item No. 7. For local mains in Manhattan and The Bronx and east of The Bronx not already provided for, \$300,000.

It is stated that all of the money available for laying water mains has been charged against contracts to be let shortly and that there is still to be provided for local mains in a number of streets which have recently been improved, and that in several instances building operations have been suspended due to the fact that the Department has not been in a position to promise the builders when water service would be introduced into the streets.

This item provides for the piping of seven streets in The Bronx, eleven streets east of the Bronx river, and four streets in Manhattan, all of which, I am of the opinion, should be laid in the near future.

Item No. 8. Floating repair companies, \$80,000.

This is for the purpose of providing for four floating repair companies for the year 1907.

In 1906, a sum of money was set aside for this purpose and three companies have been employed. It is now proposed to not only continue the employment of these three companies, but to place one more in commission.

It has been explained to me by Mr. Bull, Engineer in charge of the laying of water mains, that these men are not actually engaged in the work of repairing breaks, but rather in replacing pipes that have become worn out, connecting up water mains at different points, placing fire hydrants where required, etc., etc.

In view of the necessity of keeping the water pipes always up to a high standard of excellence and also in placing additional fire hydrants in newly built up sections and in locations where those now placed are found to be inadequate, I am of the

opinion that the request for the amount named is reasonable and should be complied with.

The amount appropriated for the purpose of laying water mains in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx in former years have been as follows:

All of the mains described in the foregoing must eventually be laid. In view of the fact, however, that no later than October 26 last, the sum of \$1,133,000 was granted the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of laying new water mains in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, I am of the opinion that the amount now asked for may be somewhat reduced without seriously hampering the Department or interfering with its normal yearly expansion.

I would therefore suggest, that, if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, I think, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, may properly authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$2,200,000 to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system of The City of New York, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred, on October 8, 1907 (Minutes, page 134), the annexed ordinance, in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock, \$10,000,000, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries, respectfully

REPORTS:

The Committee have given very careful consideration to this matter, and since its introduction in the Board a subcommittee has been in conference with Commissioner Benschel almost continuously in an endeavor to see if a smaller amount would not suffice. At the committee's suggestion the Dock Commissioner has had prepared very carefully the annexed statement, showing in detail the present financial condition of the department and the items of wharf property for the acquisition and improvement of which proceedings are now pending, and which will be completed before January 31, 1908; also the ferry construction, operation and maintenance which must be provided for, and also the payrolls. The items set forth in this statement are all for improvements upon which the City has already spent large sums of money, and which, with the addition of the appropriation now requested, will be completed, and thus become not only revenue producers, but also be available for the commerce of the port. This is especially so in the case of the Chelsea piers, which are now lying idle, but which, by the construction of the sheds as authorized by this appropriation, will put leases already made in operation, and besides furnishing accommodation to the large trans-atlantic liners, will bring in a revenue of nearly one million dollars annually to the City. In many of the proceedings now pending for the acquisition of wharf property matters have so far advanced that within a very short time the City will be compelled to pay 6 per cent. interest on the awards. Part of this money is also for the purpose of paying for the property known as the Bay Ridge waterfront, the acquisition of which has already been authorized by the Sinking Fund Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Commissioner states that there is no longer any improved dockage which is not under lease, and if the City is to carry on its waterfront in a progressive manner the harbor facilities must be constantly improved, and that is the reason for the large improvements now being undertaken in South Brooklyn north of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, whereby seven or eight large piers will be constructed and thrown open to commerce. The Commissioner states that the demand for these piers is so great that although they cannot be completed for two or three years he already has applications sufficient to lease all of them. The Dock Department, with the exception of the municipal ferries, is a revenue producing department, and all of the improvements contemplated herein will bring good returns to the City not only financially but commercially. The department now has absolutely no money at its disposal, and the Commissioner states that unless immediate appropriation is made that it will be necessary for him to lay off over 500 employees.

After going carefully over the matter the committee believes that although the demand seems large, that it is not only necessary but urgent for proper maintenance and improvements of the dock facilities of this City. The committee therefore recommends the adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000), for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 4, 1907, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, and section 180 of the Charter, and the recommendation of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution adopted March 13, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding ten million dollars (\$10,000,000), for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of

The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding ten million dollars (\$10,000,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Hon. JOHN R. DAVIES, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—Noting your verbal request a short time since for a statement showing the present condition of the Department in regard to money available for work, and also referring to the ten million dollar request now before your Board for action, I beg to submit the attached sheets showing the status of the Department on September 25, when the last accounts were prepared, and the amounts which will be required for the ferries and sundry work now either under way or for which the City is committed in large measure by leases which will not become available until the property is improved. Roughly speaking, for instance, it will require an expenditure, or rather a certification by the Comptroller, in order that the contracts may become operative, of about five million five hundred thousand dollars to complete the sheds on the Chelsea section piers, in order to enable the City to receive its revenue for these piers, which in the aggregate will amount to nearly \$600,000 per year. Expenditures for the buildings necessary to complete the work now under way on the municipal ferry systems will require in round figures an amount of about one million and a quarter dollars. The remaining items, as may be noted on the attached list, are small in themselves, but in the aggregate amount to quite a large amount of money for the ordinary maintenance and development of the Department; but your attention is particularly called to the fact that the Department may at any time be in the receipt of information as to the completion of the proceedings which the City has undertaken for the acquisition of property which the City now has in its possession and which may possibly amount to over \$5,000,000.

As stated to the Board of Estimate personally when the matter was up for their action, I am of the opinion that the bills for a large amount of the above \$5,000,000 will have to be withheld and the City continue to pay 6 per cent. interest on the amount due until after January 31 next.

As shown by the list attached herewith, you may note that the Department would need to carry out the work authorized by the various governing boards of the City, most of which is partly under way, for the maintenance of the ferries and employees now working, both on construction repairs and for the operation of the ferry, an amount which in total amounts to \$6,816,000.

You are also aware that the City has authorized the offer for the property known as the Bay Ridge waterfront of Brooklyn, amounting to about six millions of dollars, which, when the offer is made, will become due; so that it may be seen that if all of the amounts shown in the attached lists should immediately be certified to, the City would need an allowance and bond issue of about fourteen millions; but, as before stated, the Comptroller will probably withhold payment of claims for the acquisition of property until the Department can secure additional funds for the coming year, or arrange by some means to certify to a contract, knowing as he must that the actual funds to be expended under the same are to take effect at some long time in the future. In other words, although the law provides that the contract is not available until certified to by the Comptroller, and, further, that it cannot be certified to unless he has the funds in hand, a large portion of the contracts for work referred to in the attached list cannot be made actually by the City for something like a year from the present time, and this refers particularly to the large contracts for steel work in the sheds of the Chelsea section. Benschel, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of September 17, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$13,725,000 in addition to the \$12,400,000 previously authorized by the Board during the year 1907, computed as follows:

On August 5, 1907, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund after a public hearing held, pursuant to section 822 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 624 of the Laws of 1903, approved of an agreement to be entered into between the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries and the owners of the following described property:

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Second avenue as laid down on the map of the Commissioners appointed by the Legislature of New York to lay out streets, avenues and squares in the former City of Brooklyn, where the centre line of Twenty-eighth street intersects said westerly line of Second avenue, and running thence southerly and along the westerly line of said Second avenue to the southerly line of Thirty-sixth street; thence westerly and along the southerly line of Thirty-sixth street and along the westerly prolongation of said southerly line to the pierhead line approved by the Secretary of War in 1890; thence northeasterly and along said pierhead line until it intersects the westerly prolongation of the centre line of Twenty-eighth street; thence easterly and along the westerly prolongation of and along the centre line of said Twenty-eighth street to the point or place of beginning.

Also the property beginning at a point in the westerly line of First avenue, where the centre line of Fifty-ninth street as laid down on a map of the Commissioners

appointed by the Legislature of New York to lay out streets, avenues and squares in the former City of Brooklyn, intersects said westerly line of First avenue, and running thence southerly and along said westerly line to the centre line of Sixty-first street; thence westerly and along the centre line of Sixty-first street and the westerly prolongation of said centre line to the pierhead line approved by the Secretary of War March 4, 1890; thence northerly and along said pierhead line until it intersects the westerly prolongation of the centre line of said Fifty-ninth street; thence easterly and along said westerly prolongation of and along the centre line of said Fifty-ninth street to the point or place of beginning.

Since the City by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted August 5, 1907, has committed itself to the purchase by private agreement of this property, and as no money was allowed for this purpose in the former authorizations amounting to \$12,400,000, in order to carry out the agreement it will be necessary to provide for same by an additional authorization; in order that the improvements may start upon the acquisition of the property, a further appropriation will be necessary; at least \$7,000,000 should be allowed for the purchase of the property and for the starting of the improvements thereon.

Second—\$6,725,000 for work which the Department has now under way and which will be contracted for during the year.

Comparing the detailed list furnished by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries with my report of March 18, 1907, in which I recommended \$12,400,000 be allowed the Department of Docks and Ferries for various purposes during the year 1907, I find that my estimate was conservative, especially in the case of the Chelsea Section, and for the maintenance and operation of ferries, and now recommend that an additional \$3,000,000 be allowed for these purposes.

In order to carry out the provisions of the agreement approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on August 5, 1907, and to permit the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to carry on without interruption certain work now under way, I think, that, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter and section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, and pursuant to the recommendations of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution adopted March 13, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly approve of an additional issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding \$10,000,000, the proceeds to be applied to the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Sir—On January 30, 1907, this Department submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund an estimate of the moneys required for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the year 1907, amounting to \$29,070,500, and on the same date a similar communication was forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it was requested that the necessary action be taken in order that the issue of Corporate Stock be authorized to meet the requirements of the Department, as shown in detail in the exhibit which accompanied said request.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on March 13, 1907, recommended the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$29,070,500, the full amount of the Department's estimate. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, however, has thus far authorized the issue of only \$12,400,000.

There was included in our estimate of \$29,070,500 an amount necessary for the acquisition of property between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-sixth streets, and between Fifty-seventh and Sixty-first streets, South Brooklyn, which it was deemed necessary to acquire and improve in order to meet the demand for increased wharfage accommodation in those sections. When the matter came before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that Board considered that this property would probably not be required during the current year, and the amount requested by this Department for that purpose and recommended by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund was thereupon eliminated from the amount of Corporate Stock authorized. Since that time, however, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund (August 5, 1907), authorized the Commissioner of Docks to enter into an agreement with the owners of the property in question for the purchase of same at the rate of \$1.10 per square foot, amounting to about \$7,000,000.

I therefore respectfully request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock, to the amount of \$7,000,000, for this property.

I would further request the Board to authorize the issue of \$6,725,000 additional for necessary work which the Department has now under way, or which will be contracted for during the year, as follows:

Contracts for work, material and supplies.....	\$4,578,000 00
Construction of ferry terminals, building boats, maintenance and operation	1,111,000 00
Acquisition of wharf property.....	540,000 00
Weekly and monthly payrolls.....	496,000 00
Total, as above.....	\$6,725,000 00

It will be seen that the principal item is that of contracts for work, materials and supplies.

In our estimates for the year, \$8,608,000 was asked for this purpose and only \$3,045,000 allowed under the preliminary authorization. That this sum was totally inadequate, I need only mention that the sheds in the Chelsea Section will cost about \$4,700,000, or about \$1,700,000 more than was allowed for the entire contract work of the Department.

Contracts have already been awarded for sheds on five of the piers and adjoining bulkheads in the Chelsea Section at a cost of about \$3,000,000, and contracts for sheds on the remaining piers at an estimated cost of \$1,700,000 are in preparation, and the Department will soon advertise for bids on same.

The other items noted were reduced in like manner and should be allowed in order to carry on the necessary work of the Department.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
