Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held March 18, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Paulding and Stern, Trustees, and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused, Messrs. Farley, Robbins and Sachs.

Bids were received for the supply of fresh meats, provisions and poultry for the three months ending June 30, 1913, and for the supply of coal for the nine months ending December 31, 1913. The lowest bid received in each case was accepted.

The minutes of the meeting of March 4 were held as read and approved. Bills amounting to \$47,930.78 were approved.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The resignation of Isaac Workman, Assistant Investigator assigned to Governor, is reported, he having accepted a position in the Department of Health. Mr. Lawrence J. Hodges has been appointed Assistant Investigator from the Civil Service list.

Some time ago the Board of Health issued orders directing that all cases of venereal diseases in the hospitals or the dispensaries be reported to them on cards provided for that purpose. We were able

to do this from the wards, but unable to comply with the same in the dispensary, because of the large numbers. The Board of Health recently changed the system of reporting these cases, substituting a book for the cards. The physicians of the out-patient department are unable to keep these records, owing to the additional amount of clerical work involved, and if we are to comply with the order of the Board of Health it will be necessary to employ an additional Clerk at Bellevue Hospital for this purpose.

A request has been received from the auxiliary, through Miss Noyes, for an additional helper on the boat "Southfield." It is necessary to have some one to do this work, and authority is requested to appoint a Hospital Helper at \$15 a month to this position.

A communication has been received in regard to the appropriations, and calling attention to the necessity of having additional funds to meet our expenditures during the remainder of the year. It is therefore requested that revenue bonds be asked for to meet this anticipated deficit of \$56,836.

A request has been received from the Board of Managers of the Training School that the Nurses' residence be painted. An approximate estimate for this work is \$12,000.

An estimate for the new tile floors at Gouverneur, which are so very much

needed, is \$7,000. If this work is undertaken this year it will be necessary to request revenue bonds, as there are no funds available for this purpose.

Action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The acceptance of the resignation of Isaac Workman and the appointment of Lawrence J. Hodes as Assistant Investigator were approved.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to appoint a Hospital Helper at \$25 per month to do the clerical work in connection with reporting cases of venereal disease, it being the duty of the hospital and not of the physicians to comply with the resolutions of the Board of Health.

The appointment of an additional Hospital Helper for the boat "Southfield" at \$15 per month was approved.

The request for revenue bonds to meet the anticipated deficit of \$56,836 was referred to the Finance Committee for investigation and report.

It was resolved to direct the General Medical Superintendent to have such painting done in the Nurses' residence at Bellevue Hospital as it is possible to have performed by the employees of the department, and to include a request for funds for this purpose in the departmental estimate for 1914.

Action on the request for revenue bonds for the repair of the tile floors at Gouverneur Hospital was deferred until next meeting.

Reports of Committees.

The Committee of the Month at Gouverneur Hospital called attention to certain repairs required on the boat "Westfield" and suggested the installation of clothes closets for the convenience of the patients. These matters were referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his attention.

A communication was presented on behalf of the Building Committee in regard to the claim of the L. J. Wadsworth Construction Co., and after consideration it was resolved to empower Mr. Farley to take such measures as will expedite the proper disposition of this matter.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Henry L. Sherman and Dr. Louis Marton as Assistant Surgeons to Out-Patients, Dr. Robert W. Reid as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients and Dr. George C. Albee as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients (nose and throat). This report was approved and appointments made as recommended.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Morris Grossman as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients and Dr. H. M. Francisco as Assistant Visiting Pathologist. This report was approved and Dr. Grossman and Dr. Francisco appointed accordingly.

Communications.

A communication was presented from the Municipal Civil Service Commission certifying John J. Kenny as General Inspector from a preferred list, and disapproving of the reinstatement of Louis C. Frees. The Secretary submitted a copy of a letter which he had sent to the Civil Service Commission under date of March 12 protesting against this action. This protest was approved and the matter was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication was presented from the Department of Health requesting information as to the facilities offered at the Bellevue School for Midwives for the instruction of at least one hundred and fifty applicants a year, which will be necessary if the rules which that department has in contemplation are added to the regulations governing the practice of midwifery. The President reported that he had replied to the effect that at present the School for Midwives can accommodate twenty students; that a request has been made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the lease of an additional house, which, with the one now in use, would provide for about fifty students, or, as the course of instruction covers a period of six months, one hundred students a year, and that should another house be needed to accommodate additional applicants, it could probably be obtained. This reply was approved.

A communication was presented from the Department of Health calling attention to the neglect of physicians in the Bellevue dispensary to report cases of venereal disease to that department. As this matter had already been considered in connection with the report of the General Medical Superintendent, it was resolved to inform the Department of Health of the decision to appoint a Clerk for the purpose of preparing the reports required by that department and to direct the General Medical Superintendent to inform the physicians in the out-patient departments of the necessity of complying with the resolutions of the Board of Health.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White stating that they had not been able to find sufficient reason for granting the request of J. M. Knopp

for an extension of time on his contract for the construction of additional balconies on pavilions A and B. This communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication from the Chairman of the Hospital Conference was presented requesting co-operation in opposing Senate bill No. 943, introduced by Mr. Seeley, entitled "An act to amend the Public Health Law in relation to the practice of nursing." It was resolved to approve the attitude of the Hospital Conference in opposing this bill on the ground that it centers such large powers on a board of examiners who represent the nurses themselves, the Trustees being of the opinion that the ultimate control of the discipline and training of Nurses should be in the hands of a representative board of the medical profession and hospital trustees, as well as the Nurses themselves.

A communication was presented from the Associated Out-Patient Clinics recommending the preparation and publication of statements showing the actual cost of conducting out-patient departments as distinguished from the hospital proper, in accordance with the resolution adopted by this association. It was resolved to inform the Executive Secretary of the Associated Out-Patient Clinics that the Trustees are in accord with this resolution, and that this department has published in its annual report for the past four years a statement giving this information.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on March 1 were presented. The nomination of Dr. W. C. Halstead as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients was referred to the Conference Committee; the members of the Bellevue Conference Committee, Mr. Paulding and Mr. Stern, were authorized to confer with the committee of the Medical Board with regard to nominations for the orthopedic service; action was deferred on the nomination of Internes for the 1st Division, and Internes were appointed to the 3d and 4th Divisions.

The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on March 12 were presented. Dr. Brannan and Mr. Paulding were appointed a committee to meet the Executive Committee, in order to formulate an arrangement for operating on a larger number of tonsil and adenoid cases. The granting of the written request of the United States Public Health and Marine Hospital Service to make the tests of Dr. Friedmann's so-called cure for tuberculosis in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was considered. The President reported that he had received a telegram from Surgeon-General Blue as follows:

"It has become necessary in interest public health for Federal government to inquire into Friedmann's claims; request that such facilities of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals as may be necessary and practicable and your co-operation be extended officers of the Public Health Service in this work."

That, after communicating with the other Trustees by telephone and obtaining their approval, he had telegraphed to the United States Public Health and Marine Hospital Service as follows:

"Your telegram received; Trustees will gladly furnish facilities in Bellevue Hospital for test of Friedmann treatment and co-operate with you in every way."

A communication was presented from the Municipal Civil Service Commission calling attention to the fact that Trained Nurses not actually serving in the hospital should be appointed from regular competitive eligible lists. As this referred particularly to Nurses employed in the social service departments, it was resolved to inform the Municipal Civil Service Commission that it is the opinion of the Trustees that it would be most unfortunate to insist upon the appointment of the Nurses engaged in this work from a competitive list, as the qualifications required of a Social Service Nurse cannot very well be measured in mathematical quantities in establishing an eligible list.

A communication was presented from Joseph Di Benedetto, contractor for the roof ward at Fordham Hospital, requesting a further extension of time of forty-three days to complete the contract. This communication was referred to the Building Committee.

An application for a leave of absence from May 1 to October 1 was received from Dr. L. E. LaFetra. This request was approved.

A communication was received in regard to the nose, throat and ear service at Gouverneur Hospital, and in connection therewith the name of Dr. William W. Carter was presented for appointment as Laryngologist.

It was resolved to appoint Dr. Carter, subject to the approval of the Conference Committee, as Laryngologist to Gouverneur Hospital.

A communication was presented from the Municipal Civil Service Commission excepting from examination the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Co. to be employed to conduct fire drills, etc., during the year beginning March 1, 1913,

at a compensation not to exceed \$1,900. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting copies of two resolutions adopted on February 27, (1) transferring to the funds of this department \$3,364.34 from the appropriations of the Borough President of Richmond and \$5,300 from the appropriations of the Department of Parks of Brooklyn, and (2) revising the schedules for 1912 to include these amounts.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on March 6 recommending the establishment of the grade of Supervising Nurse, Social Service, at \$1,200 per annum.

A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment calling attention to a resolution adopted on March 6 relative to specifications for window glass. This communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

Copies of three resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 25 were presented as follows: (1) Issuing corporate stock to the amount of \$46,000 for the purchase of a site near Gouverneur Hospital for a new dispensary, power house and Nurses' home; (2) amending resolution issuing corporate stock for pavilions I and K of the new Bellevue Hospital to make the amount authorized \$1,700,000; and (3) authorizing the purchase without public letting of the fresh fruits and vegetables required during the year 1913 for the employees in the various hospitals of the department at a cost not to exceed \$11,200.

Unfinished Business.

Consideration was given to the bids received on March 4 for the supply of gauze and the contract awarded to Johnson & Johnson, the lowest bidders.

New Business.

The President referred to the failure to use representation cards in the out-patient departments of Bellevue and Gouverneur Hospitals. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to use representation cards of the form approved by the State Board of Charities in the out-patient departments of all the hospitals of the department.

The President referred to the condition of several baths at Harlem Hospital, which had been in need of repairs for some time. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to have these baths put in proper working order as soon as possible. Adjourned. J. K. PAULDING, Secretary.

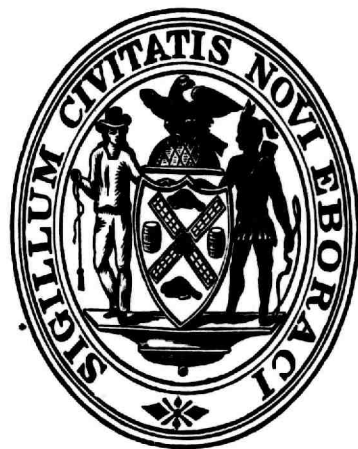

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
