## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, at 12.30 o'clock P. M., on Monday, Feb. 15, 1915.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain; George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen; Henry H. Curran, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

There was no calendar, all matters being brought up by unanimous consent.

### Investment of \$23,000,000 in General Fund Bonds of The City of New York.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

February 15, 1915.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903 as amended, entitled "An Act to amend the Greater New York Charter relative to the Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt, by adding a new section to be known as section Two Hundred and Twenty-two, providing for the issue of additional bonds of the City of New York, to be called General Fund Bonds, and by amending section One Hundred and Sixty-nine of said Charter," provides:

First—"The Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in the year 1903, and in each year thereafter until all of the bonds and stock which are redeemable from the fund known as the 'Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt' shall have matured, shall set apart out of the revenues and income of said Sinking Fund, except the income and accumulation thereof derived from assets held by said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1903, and except also the income and accumulation thereof derived from the amount to be thus annually set apart, a sum, which, with the accumulation of interest thereon, together with the said assets of said Sinking Fund and the earnings and accumulations thereof, shall be sufficient to redeem at maturity all the bonds and stock of the City of New York which are redeemable from said Sinking Fund."

Second—"At least two weeks before the meeting of the Board of Aldermen in each and every year for the purpose of receiving the Assessment Rolls required to be delivered by the Board of Taxes and Assessments to the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may, in its discretion, certify to the Board of Aldermen the amount, as estimated by said Board of Commissioners, of revenues or income from all sources of 'The Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt' during the then calendar year, and also the amount required by this section to be set apart for such calendar year out of such revenues and income for the redemption of bonds and stock."

Third—"If in any year the said estimated amount of revenues or income of said Sinking Fund, excepting the income and accumulation thereof derived from the assets held by said Sinking Fund on January first, nineteen hundred and three, and from the amounts annually set apart for the redemption of bonds and stock as by this section required shall exceed the amount required to be set apart in such year as in this section, provided, the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may, in its discretion, at the time of making said certificates



to the Board of Aldermen, determine to invest the whole or any part of the amount of such excess in General Fund bonds of the City of New York for the account of the 'Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt,' but such investments shall not be made in any year until the amount required by this section to be set apart for such year, as provided herein, shall have been so set apart."

Fourth—"The Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall then notify the Board of Aldermen and the Comptroller of the amount it has determined to invest in General Fund Bonds during the current year, and the Comptroller shall include said amount in the certificate of estimated revenues of the General Fund required to be by him made to the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to section Nine Hundred of this Act."

As a result of an actuarial examination of the accrued amortization or reserve requirement of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), which was embodied in a report of the Comptroller dated December 10, 1913, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, said Commission, at a meeting held on December 17, 1913, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That there shall be set aside and retained in the 'Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1,' the sum of \$77,999,066.26, consisting of (1) the amount of the balance held on January 1, 1913, of the accumulation of the assets held by the said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1903, viz.: \$77,894,497.08, and (2) the sum of \$104,569.18 required to be retained out of the revenues of the said Sinking Fund, other than the revenues derived from the investment of the assets held by the said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1903, to provide for the redemption of the obligations of said Sinking Fund outstanding on January 1, 1913, said amount, \$77,999,066.26, so set aside to be invested at a rate of interest not less than 3 per cent. per annum, said sum and its accumulations to the extent of 3 per cent. per annum to be applied solely to the purposes of the redemption at their several maturity dates of said obligations, amounting to \$97,782,459.05, outstanding on January 1, 1913, as provided in Chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903."

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on January 21, 1914, a supplemental communication from the Comptroller, dated January 13, 1914, with regard to the surplus accumulations of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1) was ordered printed in the minutes. Said communication stated that the reserves at January 1, 1914, necessary, with compound interest at three per cent. (3%) per annum to retire at maturity the bonds secured by Sinking Fund No. 1, amounted to \$72,797,222.87.

An actuarial computation shows that the interest accruing during 1914 on said \$72,797,222.87 aggregated \$2,163,951.58, giving a total reserve of \$74,959,174.45. On November 1, 1914, \$4,074,394.80 of bonds matured and were redeemed and cancelled by the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1, thus reducing the actuarial reserve required by the fund as of January 1, 1915, to \$70,886,779.65.

I beg to submit herewith for the information of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the following statement of the estimated amount of receipts on account of the revenues and other income from all sources of the "Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt" (No. 1) for the year 1915, viz.:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York hereby determine to invest from time to time during the year 1915, for account of the "Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt" (No. 1), the sum of Twenty-three Million Dollars (\$23,000,000) in General Fund Bonds of The City of New York, bearing interest at three (3) per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on May 1st and November 1st, the principal maturing November 1, 1930. The investment thus determined in General Fund Bonds is out of the revenues or income of the year 1915 of the said Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt in excess of the income and accumulation thereof derived from the Reserve of \$70,886,779.65, held by said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1915, and necessary to be set apart to redeem at maturity the bonds secured by this fund.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby is directed to notify the Board of Aldermen and the Comptroller of the amount that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have determined to invest in General Fund Bonds of The City of New York, pursuant to the foregoing resolution.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

#### Police Department—Approval of Plans and Specifications for the Construction of a New Station House and Garage for the 61st Precinct.

The following communication was received:

January 7, 1915.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to transmit herewith for your approval, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 350 of the Laws of 1892, as amended by Chapter 495 of the Laws of 1893, plans for the construction of a new station house and garage for the 61st precinct, on the ground and premises in the City of New York, southwest corner of Brook avenue and 142d street, Borough of The Bronx, the estimated expense, including architect's fees, not to exceed \$147,000, the cost to be paid from the appropriation made to the Police Department by the issue of Corporate Stock entitled "C. P. D.—2a, Police Department: Fund for Sites and Buildings." I also transmit herewith printer's proof of the form of contract and specifications for the said building.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report of the Director of the Bureau of Contract Supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

February 9, 1915.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On January 8, 1915, there was referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a communication from the Commissioner of Police, dated January 7, 1915, requesting the approval of plans and specifications for the erection and completion of the new station house and garage for the 61st Precinct, located on the southwest corner of Brook Avenue and 142nd Street, Borough of The Bronx, in the City of New York.

These plans and specifications were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 22, 1915. These approved plans and specifications with the report by this bureau to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are transmitted herewith for your approval, under section 320 of the Greater New York Charter.

P. S. It is estimated that the amount to be expended on this contract, including architect's fees, will not exceed \$140,000.

January 19, 1915.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 8, 1915, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication from the Commissioner of Police, dated January 7, 1915, requesting the approval of plans and specifications for the erection and completion of the new station house and garage for the 61st Precinct, located on the southwest corner of Brook avenue and 142d street, Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York.

The plans as submitted provide for a four-story and cellar brick and stone building, covering an area of 6,750 square feet. The foundations and column bases are supported by steel grillage, designed to carry the loads which will be superimposed thereon. This type of construction is made necessary by the unstable nature of the soil at this location.

The floors are designed to carry a live load of ninety pounds per square foot.

In the main cellar provision is made for a record room, store room, boiler room, coal bunker, toilet, vacuum cleaner, clothes dryer, hot water tank and an electric ash hoist. In the cellar under the garage there is an oil separator, and a gasoline tank, the latter buried under the cellar floor, as required by law.

On the first floor there is a muster room, patrolman's sitting room, Captain's bedroom, office and bath room, detectives' room, clerical room, record room, lavatory, morgue and garage, with a self-measuring pump and a turntable.

The second floor contains a Lieutenant's bedroom and bathroom, two large dormitories and a lavatory with shower baths for the patrolmen.

On the third floor are two Sergeants' bedrooms, with a connecting bathroom between, and two large dormitories and a lavatory with shower baths for patrolmen. On the fourth floor are two large dormitories, a lavatory and shower baths.

The frame work of the building will be of steel, the exterior walls of the building are for the lower story of cut cast stone and granite, and the upper stories of tapestry brick. The floors of the entire building will be of fireproof construction; all partitions are of hollow tile and the roof is constructed of tile, with copper flashings.

The window frames and doors are all metal covered and the shelving provided in the record rooms is of metal.

The building is equipped with a low pressure steam heating apparatus, amply large for heating the structure; the lighting is by electricity and gas.

The approximate estimate, exclusive of architect's fees, as submitted by the architect, is as follows:

A careful examination and study has been made of the plans and specifications, and changes and omissions suggested by this bureau have been agreed to by the architect, as follows:

Cellar—The omission of the vacuum cleaner and the oil separator and the reduction of the size of the boilers. The apparatus omitted is not necessary for a building of this type and the reduction in size of boilers from two at 6,500 square feet radiating surface capacity, to two at 4,000 square feet of radiating surface capacity, will still leave ample provision for the heating of the building, at a reduced cost for maintenance.

First Floor—In place of marble wainscoting in the muster room, tile has been substituted. In the lavatories throughout the building soapstone has been substituted for marble as being more serviceable. Sanitary bases of the same composition as the floors have been substituted for marble throughout the building, with the exception of the muster room and entrance.

The turntable in the garage has been omitted and a suction type gasoline pump has been substituted for the self-measuring type specified. Provisions have been made to build the side walls of the garage of enameled brick to a height of seven feet above the floor instead of to the ceiling and a glass slab has been substituted for the marble slab in the morgue. Enameled brick specified for the inside walls of the shaft in the centre of the building beginning at the second floor level, has been omitted, and common brick substituted.

On the second and fourth floors the panel boards were eliminated and the circuits originally intended to be connected to these two panel boards was transferred to a 12-circuit panel board on the third floor. This change caused a reduction in the number of lighting feeders and switches on service board from four to two. The power feeder for the vacuum cleaner, together with its switch on the service board was also omitted.

The gas risers supplying gas to the brackets in the sitting room, lieutenants' room, sergeants' rooms and the dormitories, were relocated so that the bracket outlets would come at points near the doorways. This change will slightly lessen the cost of the gas fitting and at the same time place the outlets in more useful locations.

After a careful tabulation of the various items, it is estimated that the building, exclusive of architect's fees and with the changes above noted, can be built for \$130,900, as follows:

Upon this estimate the cost would approximate twenty-five cents per cubic foot. The plans have been approved by the Municipal Art Commission, and the gas and electric work, as changed by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The cost is to be paid from the corporate stock funds entitled "C. P. D.—2A, Police Department Fund for Sites and Buildings," and "C. P. D.—14, Acquisition of Land and Erection of Building, 61st Precinct, Bronx." On January 18, 1915, there remained in the fund C. P. D.—2A an unencumbered balance of about \$105,083, and in fund C. P. D.—14 an unencumbered balance of \$75,000.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the plans and specifications as amended, at an estimated cost of \$130,900. Respectfully,

Resolved, That in the event that the aggregate sum of the lowest bids received for the three items exceeds the aggregate sum of the three items herein approved no award for either item shall be made and the amount of such estimated cost upon the bids so received may be reconsidered, in its discretion, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or by any official designated by the Board, provided that any of such bids is within the amount authorized and available for such work.

#### Park Department, Brooklyn—Proposed Construction of a Pier on the Dreamland Site at Coney Island.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn, with reference to an offer received by him from George Robinson, of 201 Maple Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the lease of a pier to be built in front of the Dreamland site at Coney Island, and suggesting that the matter be referred to some one experienced in dock matters to work out the details along the line approved by the Commissioner of Docks, and that an appropriation for construction be then asked for.

Which was referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a report to be ready for consideration by the Commissioners at its next meeting.

##### Parcel 2, Manhattan Bridge

Lands under the Manhattan Bridge lying between Division and Madison Streets, in the Borough of Manhattan.

##### Parcel 3, Queensboro Bridge.

#### Public Markets—Assignment for, of Sites at Williamsburg Bridge, Manhattan Bridge, Queensboro Bridge and Third Avenue Bridge, in the Borough of Manhattan, to Be Established and Maintained by the Comptroller, as Are Other Public Markets in the City of New York.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, offered the following:

Whereas, a communication under date of February 15th, 1915, has been received from the Commissioner of Bridges, reading as follows:

"To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:

"I, Frederick J. H. Kracke, Commissioner of Bridges of The City of New York, do hereby certify that the property and lands hereinafter described as follows, to wit:

##### "Parcel 1, Williamsburg Bridge.

"So much of the lands heretofore acquired for bridge purposes as lie within the following bounds: Northerly by the northerly side of bridge approach; southerly by the southerly side of bridge approach; easterly by Columbia Street; westerly by Ridge Street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

##### "Parcel 2, Manhattan Bridge.

"Lands under the Manhattan Bridge lying between Division and Madison Streets, in the Borough of Manhattan.

##### "Parcel 3, Queensboro Bridge.

"Land bounded as follows: On the west by the easterly side of First Avenue; on the south by the northerly line or curb of East Fifty-ninth Street to a point at right angles to the center line of anchorage pier; by line running thence northerly parallel to First Avenue to the southerly line or curb of East Sixtieth Street; by line running westerly along said line or curb of East Sixtieth Street to the westerly line or curb of First Avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan.

##### "Parcel 4, Third Avenue Bridge.

"All lands beneath and under the Third Avenue Bridge bounded by the interior walls under said bridge on the east and west from the bulkhead line on the north; Third Avenue and East One Hundred and Thirtieth Street on the south, to the curb line thereof.

Also reserving unto the Commissioner of Bridges the right to resume jurisdiction, possession and control of and over all or any of said above described parcels of land for the purposes of the Department of Bridges upon and after ninety days' notice in writing of intention to resume such jurisdiction, possession and control given to the head of any department to or for the purposes of which such lands, or any part thereof, may have been applied or assigned, and as to each and all of the parcels of land above described, the Commissioner of Bridges reserves the right to enter thereon and do or cause to be done any work or thing proper or necessary to be done for or in and about the maintenance and repair of any of said bridges or anything thereto pertaining or applying.

Resolved, That each and every of the four parcels of land and property in the above mentioned communication recited, subject, however, to all the exceptions, reservations, limitations, and restrictions in said communication set forth, be and is hereby assigned to the uses and purposes of the Department of Finance as a site for a public market to be established and maintained thereon, subject to the jurisdiction and control of the Comptroller as are other public markets of The City of New York.

#### Discontinuance of the Open Market on the Marginal Wharf Adjacent to the Fort Lee Ferry, on West 129th St., Borough of Manhattan.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

February 15, 1915.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Under date of February 11, 1915, the Corporation Counsel advised this Department that the use of the marginal wharf area for market purposes is contrary to law.

I have accordingly written to the President of the Borough of Manhattan and issued an order directing the removal of the structures erected on the property of The City of New York under the jurisdiction of this Department between West 129th and West 130th Streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, and to discontinuing the maintenance on said marginal wharf, or any portion thereof, of a market for the sale of foodstuffs.

Consent was given the Borough President of Manhattan to allow farmer wagons carrying produce to use temporarily the unoccupied portion of the marginal wharf between West 129th and West 130th Streets, which at that time was not required for the purposes for which it was designated by law, and, as a matter of fact, between West 129th and West 130th Streets stands were erected and are in process of building, some of which are of steel construction and evidently intended for permanent use.

The piers at West 129th, 131st and 132nd Streets and the ferry at West 130th Street are used to an enormous extent during the season for passengers and freight for Hudson River points, Coney Island, Rockaway and New Jersey resorts, and at times the congestion is very great. Protests have resulted from tenants occupying these properties and paying large rents to the City, to the obstructions to and interference with the access to these piers.

I enclose copy of order to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and I beg to request that the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be given thereto. Very truly yours,

Order.

To Hon. MARCUS M. MARKS, President of the Borough of Manhattan, Municipal Building:

You are hereby directed to remove, or cause to be removed, all structures erected on the property of The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries known as the marginal wharf between West 129th Street and West 135th Street, Borough of Manhattan, and to discontinue the maintenance on said marginal wharf or on any portion thereof, of a market for the sale of foodstuffs.

This order is issued upon the advice of the Corporation Counsel of the City, who has rendered an opinion that the use of said marginal wharf for market purposes is contrary to law.

In the event of your failure to remove, or cause the removal of said structures prior to Monday, March 1st, 1915, the same will be removed by me under the provisions of law governing the removal of encumbrances.

The Commissioner of Docks was heard in regard to the matter, and requested approval of his proposed action.

Discussion followed.

The following resolution was then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the order of the Commissioner of Docks directing the Hon. Marcus M. Marks, President of the Borough of Manhattan, to remove or cause to be removed, prior to Monday, March 1, 1915, all structures erected on property of The City of New York, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, known as the marginal wharf between West 129th and West 135th Streets, Borough of Manhattan, and to discontinue the maintenance on said marginal wharf, or any portion thereof of a market for the sale of food stuffs.

Which resolution was adopted by the following vote:

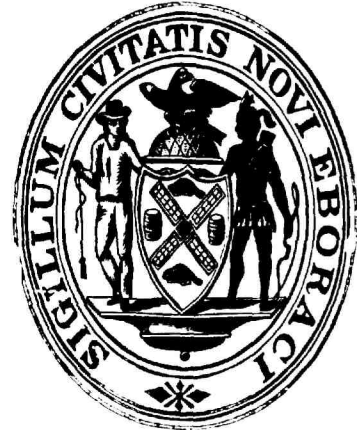

First. That by a contract between The City of New York and your petitioner dated December 16, 1909, as amended October 29, 1912, The City of New York granted to your petitioner the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets and avenues in the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of the Bronx lying west of the Bronx River, for the purpose of maintaining and operating an electrical signaling system for the calling of messengers, an electrical burglar alarm system and a fire alarm system, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Second. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to the City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
