New York Food Distributors' Association—Protest Against the Operation and Further Maintenance of the Bureau of Public Markets.

New York Food Distributors' Association, Matlage Building, 97 Warren Street, New York, April 8, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—Whereas, Under the laws of the State of New York, chapter 802, known as the Farm and Market Law, there has been established a New York Bureau of Public Markets, empowered to buy and sell food and fuel during such times as emergencies exist; and

Whereas, The said Bureau of Public Markets has been in operation since January, 1918, and it is a well known fact that its work and usefulness have been practically negligible; therefore be it

Resolved, That the New York Food Distributors' Association earnestly protests against the operation and further maintenance of this Bureau for the following reasons:

1—Every line of business, especially where the sale and distribution of food products is concerned, is under the direct supervision of the United States Food Administration, and from motives of pure patriotism, merchants are willingly making the greatest sacrifices ever known in the history of commerce.

2—Taxation in various forms, frequently oppressive, and the adjustment of so-called reasonable profits, tend to make the conduct of legitimate business a positive hardship.

3—It is therefore entirely unnecessary and extravagant on part of The City of New York, to further maintain this Bureau and compete with taxpayers already overburdened, when it is clearly understood that no emergency exists to buy certain articles of food which are now in abundant supply and selling at prices that yield but a small margin of profit to the producer, wholesale merchant and retailer.

4—We are also firmly of the opinion that during war times the Government should encourage the normal channel of trade.

It has been demonstrated in the past that Government interference has signally failed to cure alleged evils in various lines of trade. We refer specifically to the conduct of the oil, milk, sugar and beef industries.

The Merchants' Association of New York, consisting of over 5,000 members, appointed a committee in April, 1917, to study and analyze the food problem.

This report shows that in the zone of 30 miles, taking New York City as the center, there are about nine millions of people to whom over ten thousand cars of food products must be distributed weekly.

It is therefore most obvious to the analytical mind that in view of the tremendous quantities of food required to feed this number of people, that any relief offered by the Bureau of Public Markets would be so infinitesimally small, that it would be of no material help to the consuming public.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Central Purchase Committee:

No. 441.

Central Purchase Committee—Request for Authority to Purchase Wheat Flour and Flour Substitutes for Various Departments Without Public Letting.

City of New York, Central Purchase Committee, Municipal Building, April 10, 1918.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—Would respectfully request your permission to purchase in the open market, without public letting, wheat flour and flour substitutes for the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Correction in an amount not to exceed \$231,851, to be subdivided as follows:

\$176,298.50 for purchase of wheat flour.
\$55,552.50 for purchase of flour substitutes.

Due to the Government taking over control of output of all flour it has been impossible to have merchants contract for it. In fact, this Committee has experienced considerable difficulty in obtaining quantities even in the open market, purchases having to be made according to supply any flour merchant might have on hand and be willing to dispose of.

According to Government regulations, 25 per cent. of flour substitute must be mixed with 75 per cent. of wheat flour in making bread. Flour substitutes are practically barley, rice, corn and rye flour.

At the present time, including outstanding orders on which deliveries have not been completed, the Departments have sufficient flour to meet their needs as follows:

Department of Correction, supply to April 15, 1918.

Department of Public Charities, Manhattan, supply to May 13, 1918.

Department of Public Charities, Brooklyn, supply to June 15, 1918.

The requirements for balance of year being as follows:

Department of Correction, from April 16th to December 31, 1918—

6,750 barrels wheat flour, at \$11.90 per barrel..... \$80,325 00

2,250 barrels flour substitutes, at \$11.25 per barrel..... 25,312 50

Department of Public Charities, Manhattan, from May 13 to December 31, 1918—

6,865 barrels wheat flour, at \$11.90 per barrel..... 81,693 50

2,288 barrels flour substitutes, at \$11.25 per barrel..... 25,740 00

Department of Public Charities, Brooklyn, from June 15th to December 31, 1918—

1200 barrels wheat flour, at \$11.90 per barrel.....	14,280 00
430 barrels flour substitutes, at \$11.25 per barrel.....	4,500 00

In all making a total approximate cost of \$231,851 for flour to meet the needs of the above mentioned Departments for the balance of the year 1918.

Dear Sir—Under date of March 13, 1917, a resolution was adopted by your Honorable Board and concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 13, 1917, authorizing an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$45,000 to provide funds for alterations to several floors in the Hall of Records Building.

The resolutions provided that all obligations incurred thereunder were to be contracted for on or before December 31, 1917.

The general work is substantially completed, with the exception of a few minor requirements which are found necessary, and in order to provide for these additional items I would respectfully request that the resolution be amended in order to extend the time for incurring obligations thereunder until June 30, 1918.

Fire Commissioner—Request for Authority to Purchase One Four-wheel Motor Tractor Without Public Letting.

Fire Department of The City of New York, April 4, 1918.
Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Bids were opened by this department on February 2, 1918, for furnishing one four-wheel tractor for a water tower. Two bids were received, one from The Front Drive Motor Company amounting to \$5,300, and the other from the Garford Motor Truck Company, Inc., amounting to \$5,627.90.

There are in the department at the present time, attached to water towers, two Garford tractors which have proven very satisfactory, and it would be to the department's best interests if the Garford tractor were made the standard for water towers.

The advantage of having one standard type, thus making parts interchangeable, cannot be too strongly emphasized. Mechanics become very familiar with apparatus when only one type is used, and usually can locate trouble and make repairs with the least cost to the City. A standard also reduces to a minimum the probability of a piece of apparatus being out of service for a protracted period. In addition to these advantages, fewer spare parts will be kept in stock than would be the case if two or more makes were in use, thus lessening the expenditure in this direction.

While the advantages of having one standard make are very important, I would not consider purchasing a Garford tractor at a cost greater than the low bid received at the opening referred to. I took the matter up with the Garford Company, and they agreed in writing, under date of April 3, 1918, to furnish a four-wheel tractor for \$5,300, so that the cost will be no more to the department than if the tractor were procured from the Front Drive Motor Company.

It is requested, therefore, that permission be granted to purchase one four-wheel tractor according to Fire Department specifications for \$5,300 without the formality of public letting.

There has been in the repair shops for several months a water tower which only requires a tractor to make it fit for service. I have refrained, however, from taking the necessary steps to purchase a tractor until I had personally investigated and become convinced it is necessary. While the department has gone through the winter without the services of the water tower which it is proposed to tractor, I consider it unwise and unsafe to be permanently without its use.

The Apparatus Board of the last administration recommended and urged the purchase of a complete new water tower, the cost of which is estimated at \$19,000. It is my intention to take no action on this recommendation. By the proposed purchase of a tractor at \$5,300 a first-class water tower would become available and no further purchase of this type of apparatus will be made, thus saving \$19,000.

I might add that at the present time I am personally working on a proposition in connection with motor apparatus which will result in saving more than \$150,000 on forty-two pieces, and have reason to believe it will be brought to a successful conclusion. Respectfully,

Board of Education—Request for Authority to Complete Repairs to the Plumbing and Heating Plants in Sundry School Buildings Without Public Letting.

Snyder, Superintendent of School Buildings (copies enclosed), requesting the Board of Aldermen to authorize the completion of repairs to the heating and plumbing plants in sundry school buildings, and the resolution attached thereto was adopted. Subject: Repairs to plumbing and heating pipes, various schools.
To the Board of Education:

Ladies and Gentlemen—During the last week in December, 1917, and the first week in January of this year, owing to the severe cold weather, there were a number of school buildings in which the heating plants and also the plumbing systems were frozen up to such an extent that considerable damage was caused through the bursting of pipes.

In some instances this was caused by lack of coal, as is well understood, while in others it was due to the fires in heating plants being practically withdrawn during holiday week.

We have made sufficient repairs to have the buildings re-opened, but it will require a considerable amount of additional work to put the plants back in their original condition.

We have in almost every instance reached our limit under the law providing that all work exceeding \$1,000 shall be let by contract.

In nearly every case the plumbing pipes and steam pipes are covered or encased so that it is practically impossible to write specifications to replace the damaged work, and I am convinced that, if such specifications were prepared and the work advertised, the contractors, in estimating on the same, would figure on installing entirely new pipes and fittings, which would be a very expensive proposition, as I feel quite sure that, after the covering is removed, a large portion of the pipes would be found in good condition.

I would, therefore, recommend that this Board request the Board of Aldermen to permit us to complete repairs at each of these buildings at the approximate cost given, without public letting, as I deem it for the best interests of the City.

The following resolution is offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Board of Education and the Superintendent of School Buildings to complete the repairs to the heating and plumbing plants in the following-named school buildings, at the approximate cost given in each case, without public letting:

Whereas, The City of New York is the owner of certain premises located on Lafayette, Leonard, Baxter, Park, Duane and Pearl Streets and City Hall Place, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, which were purchased for the purpose of having erected thereon a new county court house for New York County; and

Whereas, The City has been the owner of a portion of said premises since March 1, 1913 and the remaining portion since May 6, 1915, and since acquisition thereof nothing has been done to improve said premises, same being vacant and unemployed, bringing no income to the City, but on the contrary have been the source of tremendous expense, and incidentally by reason of the present condition of the premises are an eyesore in a locality where land is extremely desirable and valuable; and

Whereas, The City paid for said premises the sum of \$12,031,562.36, for which amount up to December 31, 1917, corporate stock was allotted; and

Whereas, The estimated annual interest at four per cent. on said sum amounts to \$481,262.49, and the estimated taxes lost through city ownership of the premises amounts to \$600,000; and

Whereas, That inasmuch as the proposed new court house will not be erected for many years to come, owing to the City's impoverished financial condition and considering the enormity of the interest bearing charges and taxes lost per annum, which together amount to about half a million of dollars, by reason of the city ownership of said site, both of which have to be paid and stood for by the taxpayers of The City of New York, and further considering the high tax rate for the ensuing year; therefore be it

Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

1. That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York be and it hereby is respectfully requested to take all necessary and proper measures, not in conflict with any legislative, judicial or other act relating to the use of said site, either to improve said site for the purpose of temporarily housing some of the City departments, boards, commissions or other municipal bodies, to house which large sums of rent are now being paid by the City to private owners, or to lease said site or parts thereof to private parties for adequate rent, upon proper terms and for periods which will not interfere with the original purpose for obtaining said site.

Resolution for the Appointment of a Special Committee to Investigate the Organization and Activities of the Department of Health.

By Aldermen Lee, Calman, Braunstein, Vladeck, Wolff, Beckerman and Held—

Whereas, Certain statements recently made public by the Mayor and the President of the Civil Service Commission indicate a desire on the part of the present administration to abolish certain bureaus and grades of positions within the Department of Health, and have cast doubt upon the legality of the existence of certain bureaus in the said department and upon the qualifications of the incumbents of such positions to hold office; and

Whereas, The work of these bureaus, especially the Bureau of Preventable Diseases and the Bureau of Child Hygiene, has been such that their existence is a matter of gravest concern to the working people of the city as well as to the public at large; and

Whereas, The secrecy which attends the investigation now being conducted by the Municipal Civil Service Commission and the Commissioner of Accounts into the organization and activities of the Department of Health renders it impossible for the Board of Aldermen and the people of New York to be advised of a matter which vitally affects the lawful jurisdiction of the said Board under the City Charter and the welfare of all the city's inhabitants; therefore be it

Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

(1) That a special committee of five members elected to the Board of Aldermen be appointed, pursuant to section 54 of the Greater New York Charter, and that such committee be and it is hereby authorized and empowered to inquire whether the laws and ordinances of the city relating to the Department of Health are being faithfully observed, and the duties of the officers and employees of such department are being faithfully discharged; and also to examine whether there are any unnecessary, inefficient or unfit employees, any excessive salaries or compensations paid, and generally in respect of any and all matters which will conduce to the orderly and economical administration of the affairs of the said department in the interests of the people of the City of New York.

(2) That such committee shall have access to whatever books and records of the City are pertinent to the subject of its inquiry, and in particular to the records of the proceedings of the said investigation of the Department of Health now being conducted by the Municipal Civil Service Commission and the Commissioner of Accounts.

(3) That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter XXI, sections 19 and 23, of the Consolidated Laws, such committee shall have the power to compel and enforce by subpoena the attendance of witnesses.

(4) That the hearings of said committee be open to the public.

(5) That the said committee report as soon as practicable to the Board of Aldermen their findings in the matter, together with any recommendations for action by the Board of Aldermen which they deem necessary or advisable to the end that the said Department may be organized and administered in a way consonant with the welfare and best interests of the people of New York.

Dear Sir—The Present per diem rate for foreman dock builder in this department is \$5; this rate is for an eight hour day and six day week, making \$30 per week for 48 hours' work.

The prevailing rate of wages paid since January 1, 1918, by firms constituting the Contracting Dock Builders' Association is, I am informed, \$6 per day, for an eight hour day and a six day week, with an allowance of four hours off on Saturday, making wages paid by these firms to foremen dock builders \$36 per week for 48 hours' work.

The rate paid by this Department at the present time has been in effect since January 1, 1915. In the meantime the wages of dock builders have been increased within the past year from \$4 to \$4.50 per day, and the present wages of engineer pile drivers are \$5.50 per day or 50 cents per day more than the foreman dock builder who is in charge of the work of the whole gang, including the engineer pile driver.

As this Department must depend very largely upon the ability and trustworthiness of the foreman dock builder in prosecuting the construction and maintenance work of the Bureau of Engineering, I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution establishing the position of Foreman Dock Builder in this Department at the prevailing rate of wages for that position, viz.: \$6 per day.

Gentlemen—On April 2, 1917, I requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue corporate stock for the acquisition of land adjoining the Jamaica Disposal Plant, under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Sewers. Restoring old curb on concrete, per linear foot, and old bridging per square foot	70
Restoring new flagstone, per square foot	40

2. Areas in excess of 10 square yards. The fees for such excavations in the borough of Richmond shall be such as may be determined by the President of the borough or his representative. The area of surface to be repaved shall in all cases be computed by the president of the borough or his representative, from the diagram in the application as verified or corrected by comparison with the maps and records on file.

3. *Inspection of back filling.* The fee for the inspection of the back filling of any trench in a street in the borough of Richmond shall be as follows:

For trenches not more than 4 feet in depth, nor more than 30 feet in length	[\$2 00]	\$3 00

Gentlemen—I desire to bring to your attention that for some time past this department has realized that the charges heretofore collected for the restoration of pavements and the supervision over the refilling of trenches in the Borough of Richmond have been inadequate, due to the increased cost of highway material and the great increase in wage rate.

The present ordinance governing connections with sewers, etc., certain use of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and restoration thereof in this Borough was enacted a number of years ago when the prevailing rate for labor was \$2 a day and highway material forty per cent. cheaper than at the present time. Under the existing ordinance this department is simply a collection agency for all pavement under guarantee where open market orders are issued to the pavement companies for the restoration of pavement while under maintenance. As this ordinance governs, all moneys collected in connection with the fund known as "Special Fund Restoring and Repaving," no allowance is appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for three employees whose services are required in connection with said fund; to be more explicit, it must be self sustaining.

In consequence thereof, I respectfully request that chapter 23, article 9, section 97 be amended to read as per schedule hereto attached.

Trusting that you will give this matter immediate attention as it is vitally important to put those charges in operation at the earliest opportunity.

That, having examined the subject, your Committee believes the emergency repair wagons of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity should have the right of way in consequence of the nature of the work performed.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 15 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "traffic regulations," and particularly to "right of way."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 2 of section 15 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "traffic regulations," is hereby amended to read as follows: § 150. Right of way.

2. Vehicles having precedence. The officers and men of the fire department and of the fire patrol, with their apparatus of all kinds, when going to, or on duty at, or returning from a fire; all ambulances, whether of public or private character, and all other vehicles when employed in carrying sick or injured persons to hospitals or other places for relief or treatment; vehicles of the police department; vehicles of the several bureaus of buildings; emergency [wagons] *vehicles of the department of water supply, gas and electricity* and of public service corporations, and vehicles of all physicians who have a police permit shall have the right of way in any street and through any procession, except over vehicles carrying the United States mail. The police department is hereby empowered to issue a permit for such right of way to any duly registered physician, making application therefor, which permit shall not be transferable.

An Ordinance to amend subdivision 2, section 15 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—The auto trucks and horse-drawn wagons of this department which are used in transporting the labor force attached to the division having charge of the care and maintenance of water mains, and also for the carrying of supplies and materials used by such force, are required to respond as quickly as may be to all calls where breaks in water mains occur or to other parts of the City's water supply system. The matter of a few minutes delay in arriving at the scene of the accident may cause considerable damage to property.

Bearing this in mind several years ago the department started to substitute automobiles for horse-drawn vehicles. Under the ordinance vehicles of public service corporations are accorded a right of way. Many times when the vehicles of the public utilities companies appear to be in haste they are responding to calls to protect gas pipes and other subsurface structures which have become damaged as a result of a break in a *water main*. It seems rather strange that the auto trucks and horse-drawn vehicles of this department which are responding to the same emergency call should be held to traffic regulations. The inconsistency of this is so obvious that it would appear unnecessary to advance any further reasons for granting a right of way to the auto trucks and horse-drawn vehicles of this department.

I submit herewith a draft of an amendment to subdivision 2, section 15 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, under which this department can secure the desired permission, and request that it be adopted. Respectfully,

Report of the Committee on Public Thoroughfares in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Speed."

The Committee on Public Thoroughfares, to which was referred on April 2, 1918 (Minutes, page 17), the annexed ordinance to amend subdivisions 1 and 5 of section 17, article 2, chapter 24, of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "speed," respectfully

REPORTS:

That the introducer of this ordinance advised the Committee that its purpose and object is to safeguard life and limb by reducing the rate of speed for commercial or heavy vehicles using the City's streets and highways.

It therefore recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivisions 1 and 5 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances relating to speed.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. General provisions. No person shall operate, drive or propel, and no owner thereof riding thereon or therein shall cause or permit to be operated, driven or propelled, on any street or public place, any bicycle, tricycle, velocipede, motorcycle, motor tricycle, motor delivery wagon, or motor vehicle however propelled, or any vehicle drawn by horses or other animals, recklessly or negligently, or at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger, or to be likely to endanger, the life or limb or property of any person. A rate of speed exceeding 15 miles per hour *for light or pleasure vehicles and 10 miles per hour for commercial or heavy vehicles* shall constitute prima facie evidence of a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and of a violation of the provisions of this section; a rate of speed exceeding 20 miles per hour shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section, and a rate of speed exceeding 25 miles per hour, on a public highway which passes through country or outlying sections that are substantially undeveloped and sparsely settled, shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section.

2. Turning corners. In turning a corner of meeting or intersecting highways, no person operating, driving or propelling any vehicle subject to the provisions of subdivision 1 of this section shall proceed, nor shall the owner of any such vehicle riding thereon or therein cause or permit the same to proceed at a rate of speed greater than 4 miles per hour.

Sec. 2. Subdivision 5 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

5. Congested streets. In the thickly populated residential sections *and other congested thoroughfares* of the city the police commissioner is hereby authorized and empowered to cause signs to be erected or maintained in any street thereof, at any time of the day or night when such street shall be congested by traffic or thronged by children, which shall be affixed to stanchions on the curb or other conspicuous places, and shall indicate that the speed limit in such street *or thoroughfare* shall be not more than 8 miles per hour, *or that commercial or heavy vehicles keep to the right next to the curb or both*. No person operating, driving or propelling any vehicle, subject to the provisions of subdivision 1 of this section, shall proceed, nor shall the owner of any such vehicle riding thereon or therein, cause or permit the same to proceed at a greater speed than 8 miles per hour upon any portion of any street so restricted, during the time when any such sign shall be erected and maintained thereon.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, March 5, 1918, at 3:30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Sachs, Stern, Wright, Trustees, and Mr. Coler, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, Ex-Officio. Excused: Mr. Paulding and Mr. Farley.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

In order to open the central bathroom in connection with the psychopathic and alcoholic service, it is necessary that four additional helpers, two men and two women, be appointed. The money to meet these salaries can be met from accruals or from temporary funds.

The upholstering of the furnishings in the reception room and library at the Nurses' Residence is very much in need of repair and replacement. Estimates obtained amount to approximately \$1,400. This was not asked for in the Budget, as it was not recognized as being necessary at that time. There are no funds available to meet the entire expense; perhaps part of it could be cared for at present and the remainder included in the budget for 1919.

In the budget for 1918, positions of Assistant Pathologist at \$1,200 each were allowed for Harlem, Fordham and Gouverneur by the Board of Estimate. In making this allowance the positions of Laboratory Assistant at Fordham and Gouverneur were abolished. The Board of Aldermen later disapproved of the position of Assistant Pathologist; thus these hospitals are without any paid assistants in the laboratories. The positions are very necessary and I would recommend that the Board of Estimate be asked to recreate the positions and provide the salaries from accruals.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

The employment of four additional helpers; required to open the central bathroom in connection with the psychopathic and alcoholic services was approved, and it was also resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer accruals from month to month as they take place.

After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action on upholstering the furniture in the reception room and library in the Nurses' Residence, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to obtain additional estimates and present his recommendations relating thereto at a future meeting.

After consideration, it was resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to create three positions of Assistant Pathologist at \$1,200 a year, one for each of the following hospitals: Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham; the funds to be provided from accruals.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee it was moved, seconded and carried to grant Jennings & John, contractors for the layout of the grounds at Harlem Hospital, a further extension of thirty days' time to complete the work on account of the freezing weather recently prevailing, during which masonry work could not be undertaken.

On the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board and the Conference Committee of Bellevue Hospital the following nominations were approved and appointments made accordingly: First Division—Margaret Dervas Baker as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Tuberculosis Service; Wesley C. Bowers as Adjunct Assistant Visiting Laryngologist and Otologist, Ear, Nose and Throat Service, from Feb. 1, 1918; Lee Maidment Hurd as Assistant Visiting Laryngologist and Otologist, Ear, Nose and Throat Service, from Feb. 1, 1918. Fourth Division—Barnet Joseph as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician, in the place of Anna I. Von Sholly, absent on military service.

Mr. Stern, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital, reported that at a meeting held that afternoon the following matters were considered: Action on the reappointments for the year 1918 were deferred pending further information regarding the attendance of the men nominated by the Medical Board. As the Medical Board on March 1 rescinded its previous recommendation relating to the change in the title of Visiting Obstetrician, no action will be required on the subject. The suggestion regarding the establishing of a gynaecological service at Gouverneur was discussed but laid over until a future meeting of the Committee. After consideration and discussion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, the action taken by the Conference Committee was approved.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital, recommended the appointment of Henry I. Berlowe as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Nose and Throat Clinic, which was approved.

Dr. Brannan referred to a communication, under date of Feb. 18, from Henry McCracken, President of Vassar College, regarding the proposal of that college to open its buildings and grounds this summer for the preliminary preparation of a group of college women who wish to enter hospital training schools for nurses, and requesting Bellevue to co-operate in carrying out this plan. Dr. Brannan, after conference with the General Medical Superintendent and the Superintendent of Training Schools, replied that it would be practicable to make such an arrangement and that full credit will be given in the Bellevue School for the work done under the proposed plan, and suggested that instructions be given to the nurses in one or more of the modern languages.

After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the action of the President.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported that under date of Feb. 20 he communicated with G. Straubenmuller, Acting Superintendent of Schools, Department of Education, regarding the question of underfed children attending public schools and presented a comprehensive reply dated March 1. The subject was discussed but as no reply has as yet been received on the subject from the President of the Women's Municipal League of the City of New York and as the subject has also been taken up by the Board of Aldermen, it was moved, seconded and carried to await the action of that Board.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported that on Feb. 14 he requested Borough President Dowling to pave East 29th st. from the storehouse to the river front and presented a letter relating thereto under date of March 2. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to have the subject placed on the calendar of that Board in order that the Borough President may be authorized to proceed with the work.

Representatives of the National League on Urban Conditions Among Negroes met with the Trustees in regard to the admitting to the interne staff of the hospitals of the department negroes who hold the degree of doctor of medicine from reputable schools. After discussion, the representatives were informed by the Trustees that all appointments to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals are made solely on ability and merit of the candidates regardless of race or creed and that they would not permit discrimination. If the League has or will have evidence of a concrete case of discrimination or other grievance the Trustees will be glad to be informed as the Board of Trustees is impartial in making appointments.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter, dated Feb. 28, was presented from Brainerd H. Whitbeck, Orthopaedic Surgeon at Neponsit, nominating S. Kleinberg as his assistant to cover his service during such times as he may be absent on military duty, which letter was referred to the President for recommendation.

A letter, dated Feb. 21, addressed to Dr. O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent, was presented from M. Weinstein applying for appointment as Assistant Physician to the Neponsit Beach Hospital for Children. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the President for report.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for Feb. 27 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried the following action was taken thereon: First Division—The withdrawal of Davis Stoddard Dooman from the interne staff was accepted. Second Division—Leila C. Knox was appointed substitute on the house staff

from Feb. 15, 1918, in the place of D. D. Fletcher. B. E. Lesperance was appointed Collegiate Pathologist on part time; salary to be paid by the college. Fourth Division—The appointment of I. K. Tognazzini as Resident Surgeon, Children's Surgical Service, from June 1, 1918, was approved. The nomination of W. B. Weidler, Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon, Eye Department, in place of Dr. Hubbard, was referred to the Conference Committee. Lucy Hacker was appointed interne for one year, six months on the Children's Surgical Service and six months on the Obstetrical Service. The following resignations were accepted: T. W. Stallings, Interne, Ophthalmological Service; Anna Tjomsland, Resident Surgeon, Children's Surgical Service, on account of military duty; Thomas J. Luby, Anaesthetist, on account of military duty, effective March 1, 1918.

The recommendation that Morris L. Fuchs be permitted to withdraw his resignation, which was accepted by this Board on Jan. 29, and that he be permitted to continue his service was approved, as was also the request of William B. Wood, Interne, that he be granted an indefinite leave of absence on account of military duty, and be permitted to return to the hospital without further examination and his resignation changed to an indefinite leave of absence. The report that Dr. Marcus, who received a one-year appointment from July 1, 1917, on the Tuberculosis Service, is to serve on the Medical Division for another two years from July 1, 1918, was noted.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for March 1 were presented and the following action taken thereon: The resignation of Dr. Bogan, on account of military service, was accepted with regret. The suggestion that the General Medical Superintendent send a letter to the Surgeon General of the United States Army regarding the excellent medical qualifications of Dr. Bogan was referred to Dr. O'Hanlon. The appointment of Directors of the Out Patient Department in the place of the former Out Patient Department Committee was approved as follows: Chairman, J. S. Ferguson; Secretary, J. Sheils; other members, A. E. Sellenings and Dr. Kellogg. The rule regarding absence and tardiness of physicians and surgeons in the Out Patient Department was approved. W. L. Drewry and W. R. Bracey were appointed to the sousse staff for one year. The resolution that all applications for positions on the Adjunct staff be referred to the Director of the service for recommendation to the Medical Board and the Trustees was approved, and the action rescinding the motion at the February meeting regarding the Visiting Obstetrician and the Gynaecological Service was approved.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for Feb. 19 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried the following action was taken thereon. The report from Stanley Brady, Pediatrician, in regard to the treatment of

children admitted to Harlem Hospital. The recommendation that a class in fractures be established in the Out Patient Department was approved. The resolution reading: "In view of the question having arisen as to discrimination with regard to race, creed or color in the appointment of internes at Harlem Hospital, this Board desires to go on record that no such discrimination is made in any regard" was read, and the Medical Board notified that appointments at Bellevue and all of its allied hospitals are made solely on ability and merit of the candidates regardless of race or creed.

The appointment of the following men to constitute the personnel of the various divisions was noted, approved and ordered placed on file: Surgical "A"—P. Boynton, W. Silleck, W. Vincent and C. Casasa; Surgical "B"—H. Haubold, L. Friedman, C. Farr and H. Eisberg; Gynaecology—I. Haynes, A. Stein, H. Falk and H. E. Stein.

A letter, dated March 4, was presented from M. B. Paroungian, setting forth his service in the department and making application for the position of Director of Attending Dermatologist to Bellevue Hospital. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to refer this request to a Committee consisting of Mr. Sachs, Mr. Farley and Mr. Stern to confer with Dr. Stewart, the Director of the Third Surgical Division, or with a committee from the University and Bellevue Hospital Medical College regarding this subject.

A resolution, dated Feb. 18, 1918, was presented from the Board of Aldermen, granting permission to buy fresh fruits and vegetables, to the extent of \$12,600, in the open market, which resolution was ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.

If at the expiration of this period it is shown that an emergency exists warranting a further variation, certificate is to be furnished accordingly. This variation is to take effect immediately.

Resolution Adopted.

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission appeals from orders issued by the said Division of Factory Inspection, said appeals having been filed by the parties named herein against the premises noted; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case, and on the reports submitted gives the existing conditions and recommends as follows:

1. Premises affected, Auburn, Genesee and Osborne sts.; appellants, International Harvester Co. (Sectional Building). 4—Additional exit. 2—Prohibit occupancy. Order Feb. 25, 1918. Three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; 13; above the first floor, 13; above 2d floor, 6; exits, 3rd floor horizontal exit at the north in form of a nonfireproof bridge; horizontal exit at south in form of horizontal exit leading to wood and paint shop, which horizontal exit has fire door on one side only; 2nd floor is stairway from 1st side leading to wood and paint shop. This horizontal exit is imperfect. Exits remote; safe egress from roof. Building is one of a group covering a large area. It is possible to get from any one section to another without going outside of the building.

Recommendation: Accept the stairway from 1st to 2nd floor and horizontal exits on 2nd and 3rd floors while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

2. Premises affected, Auburn, Genesee and Osborne sts.; appellants, International Harvester Co. Storehouse No. 18. 6—Additional exit. 7—Prohibit occupancy. Three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 15; above the 1st floor, 8, but not regularly; above 2nd floor, none; building used for storage of finished product; from 8 to 10 employed above the 1st floor taking material into and out of building irregularly; no interior stairways in this section; openings in east wall (without fire doors) lead to adjacent section, all floors; a straight ladder fire escape on the south and on the north sides; exits remote; safe egress from roof. Building one of a group covering a large area; it is possible to get from one to another without going outside.

Recommendation: Accept the horizontal exits into adjoining buildings and the straight ladder fire escapes on condition that said escapes be maintained structurally safe, are designated as exits, an unobstructed passageway maintained at all times to each escape, the windows leading thereto be made to open freely; conditioned on occupancy remaining unchanged.

3. Premises affected, Auburn, Genesee and Osborne sts.; appellants, International Harvester Co. Pattern Shop Building No. 4. 3—Additional exit. 4—Prohibit occupancy. Three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 41; above 1st floor, 30; above 2d floor, 20; exits, one interior stairway in machinery building on the north, extending from 2d to 3d floors; one interior stairway on the west, in pattern shop, extending from 1st to 3d floors; horizontal exit to adjacent machinery building on the north; exit from 3d floor to roof of loss section on south; stair in machinery building does not extend to grade, and horizontal exit has fire door on one side only; exits remote; safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: Accept the exits as above outlined, on condition that stairway parallel with wall between office and machinery building be extended to 1st floor, with exit at foot of same to street.

4. Premises affected, Buffalo, 446 Military rd.; appellants, The American Brass Co. (Laboratory Building). 1—Prohibit occupancy. 2—Construct stairs of incombustible material. 3—Enclose stair fireproof. 4—Construct roof of stairway enclosure of fireproof material. 5—Self-closing fire doors at openings to stairway enclosure. Two-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 42; above 1st floor, 2 blueprint men occasionally; exits, two unenclosed interior stairways with self-closing doors leading therefrom.

Recommendation: While conditions and occupancy remain unchanged, accept the two unenclosed stairways as exits, and waive orders Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

5. Premises affected, Buffalo, 2000 Elmwood ave.; appellants, Curtiss Aeroplane & Motor Corp. Building E (Orders March 5, 1918), 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12. One-story nonfireproof building, erected since Oct. 1, 1913. This building has a small enclosed balcony; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 890; factory, 90; office, 800; above 1st floor, 8. There is an interior stairway not properly enclosed, doors to which open out and are self-closing. On account of the size of this room, 25 by 18 feet, and the present arrangement of switchboard and wiring, it would be impossible, without an entire rearrangement of the room, to provide a second means of exit from the balcony; all employees located near present stairway.

Recommendation: While conditions and occupancy remain unchanged, waive orders for additional exit; prohibit occupancy above 1st floor; enclose exit stairs fireproof; fireproof passageway from foot of stairs to street; construct stairs of incombustible material; self-closing fire doors at openings in stairway enclosure.

6. Premises affected, Buffalo, 344 Oak st.; appellants, Gerhard Lang Packing & Provision Co. (Sausage Building). Additional means of exit. Three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy, 13; above 1st floor, 1; above 2d floor, none; exits, interior unenclosed stairway from 1st to 2d floors, and two wood enclosed stairs from 2d to 3d floors; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d floor in form of bridge leading to engine room; exits remote; no egress from roof.

Recommendation: Acceptance of stairway from 1st to 2d floors and two stairways from 2d to 3d floors, with horizontal exit from 2d floor to engine room while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

7. Premises affected, Buffalo, 681 Michigan ave.; appellants, Louis Witte. (Orders March 4, 1918). 1—Additional exit. 2—Prohibit occupancy. Two- and three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; exits, one stairway in three-story section from 3d floor to street; one stairway, 1st to 2d floors, in two-story section; imperfect fire escape on the rear, with nonfireproof openings 71 inches high by 27½ inches wide; exits remote; no egress from roof; occupancy, 7; no one above the 1st floor at present, but there may be five in future.

Recommendation: Accept stairway in two-story building as second means of exit if same

be extended to roof, with bulkhead, making accessible to 3d floor through exterior wall windows.

8. Premises affected, Buffalo, 821 Jefferson st.; appellant, Auto Knitter Hosiery Co. (Orders January 24, 1918). 3—Prohibit occupancy. 4—Additional exit. Three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler not installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 8; above the 1st floor, 1 occasionally; building used for storage; exits, one unenclosed interior stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; exits remote; no egress from roof; wooden ladder at rear of building, sides being 2 by 4 dressed lumber, rungs 3 inches wide, 1/2 inch thick; ladder bolted to building by bolts passing through walls.

Recommendation: Accept, so long as no one is employed above the 1st floor, the present wooden ladder if same be continued to ground.

9. Premises affected, Buffalo, 254 Court st.; appellant, Montgomery Bros. 17—Prohibit occupancy. 26—Cease employment above 2d floor. 27—Two legal means of exit from section occupied by Niagara Laundry Co. 28—Additional exit. Two means of exit from section occupied by Bellanca Macaroni Works. (Orders Jan. 1, 1918). Four-story building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy of building, 424; above 1st floor, 227; above 2d floor, 148; exits, interior wood enclosed stairway, doors to which open outwardly but are not self-closing; imperfect fire escape on front and rear of building; openings to fire escape balconies are fireproof, 7 feet high and 3 feet wide; exits remote; no egress from roof; four imperfect horizontal exits on each floor; two outside wooden stairways from ground to 4th floor on easterly side, which are unenclosed and one outside stairway from ground to 3d floor on north wall, which is enclosed in wood; all horizontal exits, except the one in the extreme west end of the building are equipped with fireproof self-closing sliding doors; the one at extreme west end has fireproof self-closing sliding doors and swinging doors, sliding, as they would obstruct the elevator; fire escapes on the rear terminate on roof of one-story building from which there is egress to 2d floor of building beyond the fire walls; wired glass on course of both fire escapes is broken; sprinkler heads on outside which make a water curtain over fire escape openings.

Recommendation: Accept above exits on condition that the wired glass in openings on course of fire escape be repaired; all fire doors at openings to horizontal exits be made self-closing and equipped with fusible link; doors in bad condition to be retinned, and stipulations to be filed with this department by owner and tenants respectively, agreeing to maintain these horizontal exits in accordance with Section 79-69, viz.: same to be kept open at all times when anyone is at work on either side of the fire wall.

10. Premises affected, Cheektowaga, William st.; appellant, International Agricultural Chemical Co. Additional means of exit. Three-story building, erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 12; above 1st floor, 3; above 2d floor 0; exits, one interior unenclosed stairway from 1st to 3d floors and one from 2d to 3d floors, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; exits remote; no egress from roof; from 2d floor there is a runway to grade.

Recommendation: Accept as second means of exit of stairway from 2d to 3d floors with runway to grade while present conditions and occupancy remain.

11. Premises affected, Jamestown, 216 West 3d st.; appellant, R. G. Roberts. 1—Prohibit occupancy. 2—Three means of exit. 3—Replace wooden stairs with stairs of incombustible material. 4—Make rear stairs 44 inches wide. 5—Enclose stairs fireproof. (Orders Feb. 8, 1918). Two-story nonfireproof brick building, erected after Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 47; factory, 34; above 1st floor, 40. There are two interior stairways enclosed with partitions of fire lath and plaster materials, doors to same open out and are self-closing; exits remote; no egress from roof; has at present 29 factory employees and proposes to add 15 to their force in the near future, this making 44 on 2d floor.

Recommendation: Accept as a means of exit an exterior screened fireproof stairway 44 inches wide, provided at 2d floor with approved fire door opening from workroom into stairway at 2d floor, and when this exit has been provided accept the two interior stairways now provided, with this exterior stairway, as three means of exit, and waive orders 1, 3, 4 and 5.

12. Premises affected, Plum Brook; appellant, Borden's Farm Products Co., Inc. Provide proper sanitary flush water closet inside of building for use of employees. This is a request for acceptance of a chemical closet in lieu of a flush water closet.

Recommendation: In view of the fact that the conditions existing make the installation of a flush water closet inadvisable, that a chemical closet of an approved type be provided.

13. Premises affected, Stittville; appellant, Borden's Farm Products Co., Inc. Provide proper sanitary flush water closet inside of building for use of employees. Request for acceptance of a chemical installation in lieu of a flush water closet.

Recommendation: In view of the fact that it would be inadvisable to install a flush water closet at this plant, accept a chemical closet of an approved type.

14. Premises affected, Syracuse, 403 South Clinton st.; appellant, Wm. H. Lynch. Install approved fire alarm signal system. Organize and maintain monthly fire drills. Four-story building; nonfireproof; open lofts; sprinkler with one source of water supply; no fire alarm signal system; exits, two interior unenclosed stairways from 1st to 4th floors; exits remote; no egress from roof; imperfect rear fire escape; 3d and 4th floors occupied by the Elite Garment Co., who have 47 employees on these two floors, most of whom are females.

Recommendation: Acceptance of a Class "B" instead of Class "C" fire alarm signal system.

15. Premises affected, Utica, 248-250 Genesee st.; appellant, Kempf Bros. Enclose stairways fire resisting. Provide additional fireproof stairway remote from existing stairway. Prohibit occupancy above 1st floor. Jan. 31, 1916. April 16, 1917. Four-story nonfireproof brick building, with wooden floors, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; premises used for mercantile and factory purposes; occupancy of building, 44, 11 of whom are at factory work; no sprinkler; no fire alarm; some combustibles; exits, a 40-inch unenclosed stairway constructed of wood, with 8-inch rise, 11-inch tread, extending from 1st to 4th floors at front of building; fire escape on rear with nonfireproof openings; stairs 55-degree pitch, 6-inch tread, 9-inch rise, 24-inch stair, railed 3 feet high, counterweighted stairway to ground; divided lofts; no egress from roof; exits remote.

Recommendation: In view of the nature of the occupancy of this building, accept as second means of exit a doorway opening onto roof of adjoining building, same to be located approximately 30 feet away from rear end of building, with access across said roof to Lyons Building, to stairway in Fort Schuyler Club Building, and as first means of exit present unenclosed stairway. Waiver of orders to enclose stairway fireproof and provide a fireproof stairway on condition that the only factory tenant be the firm

of "Ogden," whose maximum number of employees shall not exceed 11, and further conditioned on the application of the Industrial Commission's rules applicable to buildings of this character when same have been adopted.

16. Premises affected, Yonkers, 55-57 Main st.; appellant, Gazette Press. Additional exit. March 18, 1918. Three-story nonfireproof building, erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy, 52; above the 1st floor, 22; above the 2d floor, 1; exits, one interior stairway, doors to which open out, and a fire escape extending to 2d floor of building, with ladder to roof of two-story section; sprinkler heads arranged on outside of building to form water curtain over openings to fire escape; windows glazed with wired glass, set in wooden frames and sash; at foot of fire escape is balcony with rail 42 inches high in which no opening or gate is provided.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape when ladder extending to two-story section is provided with gooseneck extending above coping of roof, and opening or gateway be provided in balcony at foot of stairs, in view of the conditions and existing occupancy.

And it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardship in complying with the strict provisions of law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises noted above, and that in granting the variations called for the provisions of law and the rules of the Industrial Code will be observed and public safety secured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants has been notified that he would be given an opportunity to appear and be heard at this time and place if he so desired, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard by the Commission, therefore

Be it resolved by the State Industrial Commission that the variations set forth above be and the same hereby are granted to the appellants for the reasons noted in each case, with the understanding that said variations are to be effective during the time that the conditions remain as of this date.

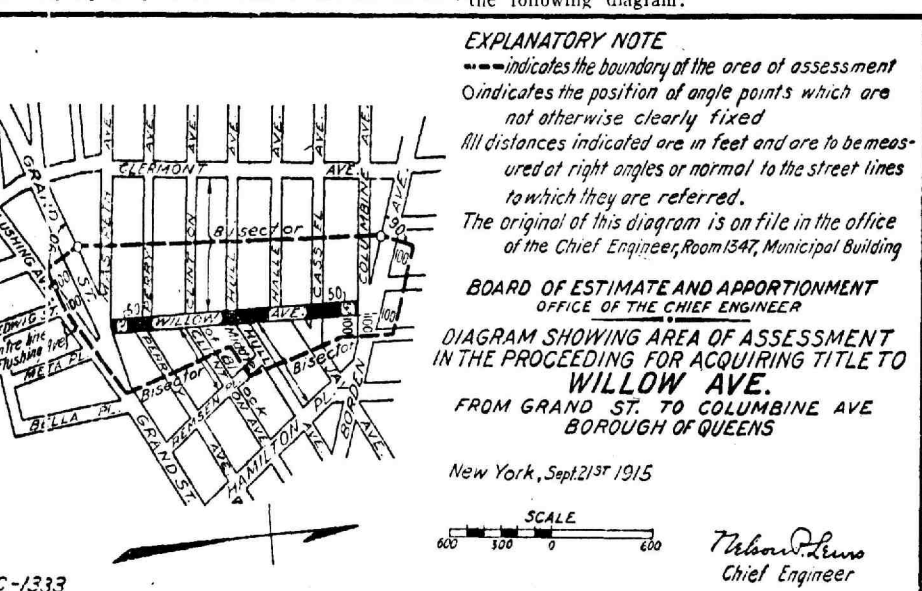

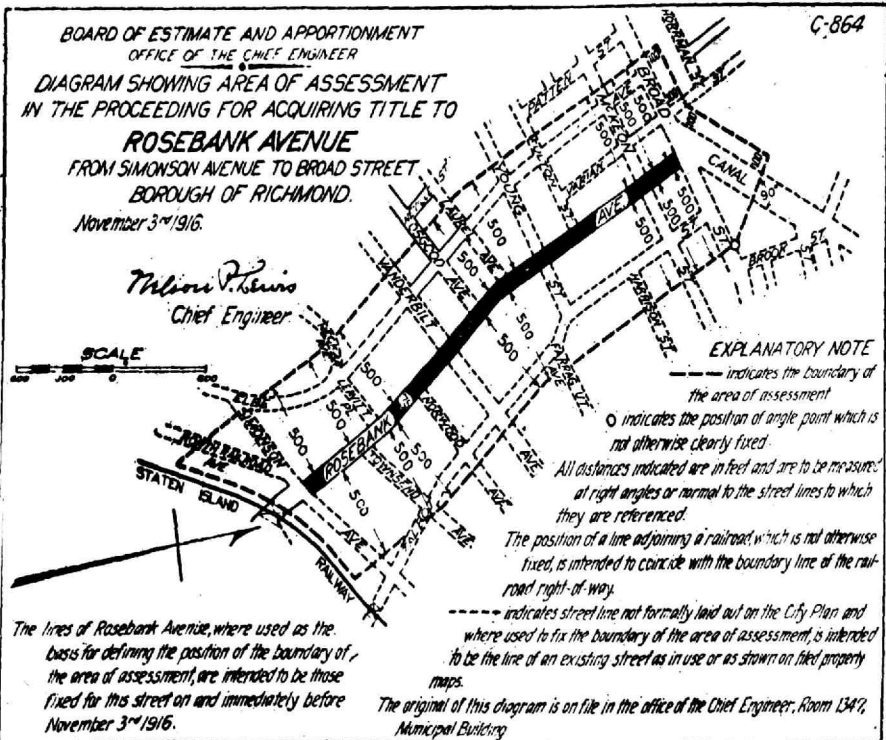

The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, the City of New York shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects true and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate. The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
