

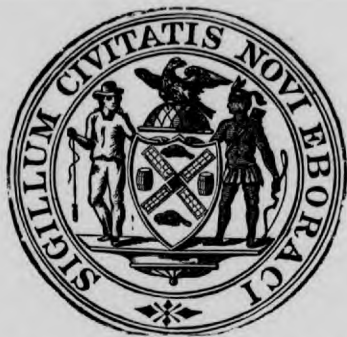

NEW YORK, March 7, 1882.

The Board met this day.

Reports.

Resolved, That Order 2415, on premises 267 Mulberry street, be and is hereby extended one month.

Resolved, That Order 2063, on premises south side East Seventy-fifth street, 80 feet west of Lexington avenue, be and is hereby suspended until April 1.

Resolved, That — Buffum be and is hereby an Assistant Sanitary Inspector, temporarily, with a salary at the rate of \$100 per month.

Resolved, That the Attorney be and is hereby authorized and directed to adjourn Suit 1785, on premises 288 Front street, for two weeks, and the same referred to the Sanitary Superintendent for reinspection and report.

Resolved, That Order 1027, on premises 329 West Forty-fifth street, be and is hereby suspended two weeks.

Resolved, That on and after the 1st day of April all applicants for registration as master plumbers or journeymen plumbers be referred to the Board of Examiners to enable them to demonstrate their right to registration.

Resolved, That the Board of Examiners for applicants for registration as master plumbers or journeymen plumbers, under chapter 450 of the Laws of 1881, shall consist of one engineer or sanitary engineer of this Board, to be assigned to this duty by the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee and of one registered master plumber and one registered journeyman plumber, who are to be selected by the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee.

Resolved, That the master plumbers and journeymen plumbers who shall serve on the Board of Examiners shall be paid four dollars each for every day devoted to this service.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the following plans for light and ventilation of tenement-houses be and are hereby approved upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 1349-3, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 73 feet, with an extension 3 feet by 12 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 90 feet, at No. 333 East Sixth street, to be occupied by eleven families.

Plan No. 1368, for three four-story tenements, each 26 feet 8 inches by 62 feet, on lots 26 feet 8 inches by 102 feet, on the south side of Eighty-fifth street, 120 feet west of First avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1375, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 96 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the southeast corner of Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 1376, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 54 feet 4 inches, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 180 Mulberry street, to be occupied by nine families.

Plan No. 1377, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 60 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 432 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1378, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 61 feet, with an extension 21 feet by 23 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet 5 inches, on the south side of Fifty-seventh street, 200 feet east of Second avenue, each to be occupied by eleven families.

Plumbing and Drainage of New Houses.

Plan No. 180, one tenement, northeast corner of Fourth avenue and Eighty-fourth street.

Plan No. 181, four tenements, north side of One Hundred and Tenth street, 125 feet east of Third avenue, conditionally.

Plan No. 182, two tenements, north side One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 275 feet west of Seventh avenue.

Plan No. 183, nine tenements, north side One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, 250 feet east of Third avenue.

Plan No. 184, five tenements, south side One Hundred and Twentieth street, beginning southeast corner Fourth avenue.

Plan No. 185, six dwellings, south side West Forty-sixth street, Nos. 240 to 250 West Forty-sixth street.

Plan No. 186, one tenement, north side of East Forty-first street, 67 feet west of Third avenue, conditionally.

Plan No. 188, one stable, west side of Renwick street, feet south of Spring street, conditionally.

Plan No. 190, one tenement, No. 52 West Houston street, conditionally; and

Plan No. 191, six dwellings, three north side One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and three south side One Hundred and Thirtieth street, respectively, 275 feet east of Eighth avenue.

Resolved, That the applications of James Hall to this Board to modify the conditions on which Plan No. 183 was approved, so far as to allow earthenware drain-pipe to be used from the front wall to the street sewer, be and is hereby denied.

The weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of houses in course of construction were received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 4, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,660, as follows, viz.: 613 tenement-houses, 95 private dwellings, 57 other dwellings, 10 manufacturing and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 23 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 11 lodging-houses, 1 mill, 1 stock yard, 1 railroad station, 11 sunken and vacant lots, 90 yards, courts, and areas, 131 cellars and basements, 223 waste-pipes and drains, 259 privies and water-closets, 69 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 6 smoky chimneys, 3 cesspools, 6 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 502.

During the past week 153 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 42 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

82 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 339 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 292 houses, 292 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

39 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital and 3 dead bodies to the morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 592 births, 50 still-births, 220 marriages, and 814 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 4, 1882; this shows an increase of 22 births and 48 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births, and 26 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 72 births, 7 still-births, 20 marriages, and 97 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 5; erysipelas, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; inanition, 5; alcoholism, 2; cancer, 4; heart diseases, 7; marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; apoplexy, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 12; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; scarlatina, 7; whooping cough, 2; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 11; bronchitis, 7; pneumonia, 14; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; convulsions, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 22; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; premature and preterm births, 1; suicide, 1; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from diphtheria, croup, and typhoid fever was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 164 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 241 under two years, 388 under five years, and 52 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 33 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 47.67 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 161 were in institutions, 441 in tenement-houses, 201 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 152 on the first, 223 on the second, 131 on the third, 101 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 6 on the sixth. 810 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents; 107 were stated to be single, 159 married, 84 widowed, and the condition of 464 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 814; still-births, 50; bodies in transitu, 18; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 65 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 502 births; 220 marriages; 50 still-births; 814 deaths; 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 79 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 2 of marriage, and 40 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 4, 1882, was 46.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.918, the mean humidity was 67, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,752, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.14 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 751 deaths and still-births, or 86.92 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 19; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 357; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 90; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran, (undenominational), 123; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 24; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 13; Union (Methodist Protestant), 0; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 8; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending Feb. 25, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 8; Second, 0; Third, 8; Fourth, 16; Fifth, 14; Sixth, 13; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 27; Ninth, 38; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 34; Twelfth, 81; Thirteenth, 24; Fourteenth, 26; Fifteenth, 16; Sixteenth, 29; Seventeenth, 51; Eighteenth, 21; Nineteenth, 127; Twentieth, 51; Twenty-first, 47; Twenty-second, 76; Twenty-third, 17; Twenty-fourth, 9.

The actual mortality for the week ending Feb. 25, 1882, was 773; this is 78 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 202.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,266,774.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 24.62; Brooklyn, 23.31; St. Louis, 14.8; Baltimore, 18.37; New Orleans, 24.30; San Francisco, 26.65; Buffalo, 27.1; Cleveland, 23.43; Charleston, 30.16; Savannah, 34.00; Lowell, 19.23; Worcester, 14.73; Cambridge, 24.65; Fall River, 25.47; Lawrence, 7.96; Lynn, 21.73; Springfield, 21.83. Monthly returns—New Haven, 16.2; Milwaukee, 14.34; Salt Lake, 34.67. SIR—There were 814 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 4, 1882, which is an increase of 48, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 97 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending February 25, 1882, was 773, which is 202.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,266,774.
