Resolutions.

That Order No. 2509, on 139 and 140 West street, be suspended, and the communication of A. H. Brower in respect thereto referred to the Sanitary Superintendent for investigation and report.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized and directed to furnish to the Police Department, on requisition from the Chief Clerk, a supply of disinfectants for Police Stations and stables.

That the salary of Wilbur F. Lane, M. D., Physician in charge of the Reception Hospital and Assistant Sanitary Inspector, be fixed at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, from May 1.

That the proposition of Mr. William J. Best, to settle the claim against the Eighth National Bank on a basis of twenty-one per cent., and the circular of Mr. Albion Man, Receiver, relating thereto, be transmitted to the Comptroller, for such action as he may deem expedient in the premises.

That the subject of abattoirs and slaughter-houses be referred to the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee and the President.

That the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee be requested to consider and report upon the subject of prohibiting the driving of cattle, sheep, and hogs in the streets of this city.

That a permit be granted to the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction to boil bones on Blackwell's Island.

Edward G. Janeway, M. D., presented certificate of appointment as Commissioner of Health for six years from May 1, 1875, in place of Stephen Smith, M. D., whose term has expired, and took his seat as a member of this Board.

On motion of Commissioner Vanderpoel, Commissioner Janeway was elected Chairman of the Sanitary Committee.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 1, 1875. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Inspectors was 1,410, as follows:

4 public buildings, 604 tenement houses, 82 private dwellings, 141 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 5 stores and warehouses, 36 stables, 53 slaughter-houses, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 2 manure dumps, 1 henery, 1 public sewer and drain, 34 sunken and vacant lots, 68 yards, courts, and areas, 40 cellars and basements, 47 waste-pipes and drains, 121 privies and water-closets, 44 street-gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns and cesspools, 1 piggery, 7 other nuisances, together with 100 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 589.

During the past week 50 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

59 permits have been granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 95 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 83 houses, 83 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

65 cases of small-pox were removed to Hospital, and 3 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending May 1, 1875:

Typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 3; scarlet fever, 37; measles, 10; diphtheria, 84; small-pox, 93; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 3.

3 tanks and 4,371 cans of night-soil were removed by the night scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, viz.: cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 36 carcasses; hogs, 4 carcasses; beef, 110 pounds; veal, 40 pounds; and fish, 200 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending May 1, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 556 burial permits for city deaths, 27 for bodies *in transitu*, and 54 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 556 deaths, 208 marriages, 464 births, 54 still-births, 27 applications for transit permits, and 52 returns from Coroners. There were 25 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth-record, 2 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau; 2 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.
