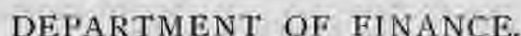

LOCAL BOARD.

TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 p. m., June 27, 1901, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—President Haffen, Alderman McGrath, Councilman Murray, and Alderman Geiger.

HEARINGS.

Arthur Avenue, Paving with Granite Blocks, from Tremont Avenue to One Hundred and Eighty-seventh Street and from One Hundred and Eighty-seventh Street to Pelham Avenue.

Petition of M. Stonebridge and others was read, as was also protest of Mrs. Kate Walsh and others. The petition in favor of granite blocks represented an ownership of about 1,234 feet. The protest represented an ownership of 1,784 feet.

The majority of owners who appeared at the hearing were in favor of having the roadway of Arthur Avenue macadamized, the same as was being done between One Hundred and Eighty-second and One Hundred and Eighty-seventh streets. Those who appeared at the meeting opposed to paving with granite and who were in favor of macadam pavement, were as follows:

Those who were at the meeting and favored granite-block paving were Mr. C. Stonebridge and Mrs. J. F. Cronin.

On motion of Alderman Geiger, the matter was laid over for thirty days, or until the petitioners would send in a uniform petition to the Local Board.

Belmont Place (One Hundred and Eighty-fourth Street), Paving with Sheet Asphalt, between Third Avenue and Arthur Avenue.

Petition of Margaret Stonebridge and others was read. Mr. Charles Stonebridge appeared and stated that Dr. Jones of the Home for Incurables gave him authority to say that the Home for Incurables was in favor of having Belmont place asphalted.

On motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Belmont place (One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street) be paved with sheet asphalt on a concrete foundation, between Third Avenue and Arthur Avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Extension of Third Avenue across Fordham Square.

Petition of Rev. George A. Pettit, S. J., President of St. John's College, William Stonebridge, A. G. Hopfe and others was read.

Mr. E. Vreeland, Joseph I. Berry, Charles H. Edgar (representing attorney of Woodlawn Cemetery) and others appeared in opposition, stating that they believed this improvement to be a scheme similar to that introduced recently asking for the change of name of "Webster Avenue" to "Third Avenue."

Many of the property-owners present believed that if the station of the Harlem Railroad was moved to the north side of Pelham Avenue, and the railroad cut bridged under authority of chapter 21 of the Laws of 1897 (State of New York), that that would give a straight roadway from Third Avenue into Webster Avenue.

Mr. Alexander U. Mayer appeared and gave a very lengthy argument as to why he believed the petition he presented should be granted.

The matter was finally laid over to be taken up in executive session, as was also the petition presented by Alexander U. Mayer for the enlargement of Fordham square.

Assessment for Public Place at the Junction of Tremont Avenue, Burnside Avenue and Kree Avenue, Twenty-fourth Ward.

Petition of Charles R. Barigau Ward and others was read, and on motion of Alderman McGrath, seconded by Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that the entire cost and expense of acquiring title to the public place at the junction of Tremont Avenue, Burnside Avenue and Kree Avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, be borne by The City of New York, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Assessment for Opening Mohawk Avenue, from Hunt's Point Road to Bronx River.

This matter came to the Local Board on the following letter from the office of the Board of Public Improvements, viz:

MAY 24, 1901.

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFEN, President, Borough of The Bronx:

DEAR SIR—At the hearing had before this Board on the 22d instant, in the matter of petition for a reduction of assessment for the opening of Mohawk Avenue, from Hunt's Point Road to the Bronx River, the matter was referred to you for the purpose of having the Local Board make a recommendation in the matter.

I inclose herewith copies of the two petitions, and also copy of report made by the Chief Topographical Engineer.

Charles H. Brush, counsel for the Faile Estate, was represented by Mr. Usheritz, and the reasons he gave, for asking a reduction of the assessment, were embraced in the papers submitted by the Board of Public Improvements.

On motion of Alderman McGrath, the hearing was closed. Councilman Murray moved that the matter be taken up in executive session. Adopted.

Acquiring Title to East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth Street, from Prospect Avenue to Southern Boulevard.

Petition of Timothy McAuliffe and others was read, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, seconded by Councilman Murray, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, from Prospect Avenue to Southern Boulevard, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

East One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street, Regulating and Grading, between Prospect and Union Avenues; East One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street, Regulating and Grading, between Prospect and Union Avenues.

The above two works were petitioned for by F. G. Meres and Alexander Leicht.

The Board recommended that the petitions be returned by the Secretary with the request that the regulating and grading of the portion between Roblans and Prospect Avenues be petitioned for.

Anderson Avenue, Vesting of Title, between East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street and Jerome Avenue.

The following communication from the Board of Public Improvements was read:

JUNE 21, 1901.

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFEN, President, Borough of The Bronx:

DEAR SIR—Your communication of May 29, relative to fixing a date for vesting title to Anderson Avenue, between Jerome Avenue and the north side of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, was referred to the Board on the 19th instant, and the matter was referred back to the Local Board for the purpose of obtaining a report as to why it is desired to have the title to said Avenue vested in the City.

Communication dated June 27, 1901, from Hon. A. C. Hottelroth was also read.

Mr. A. L. Lowenstein of No. 11 Manhattan Avenue appeared at the meeting and stated that he was about to erect ten houses on Anderson Avenue between the limits named above and that he was anxious to see title vest in the City so that he could petition for the regulating and grading and paving of said Avenue, as well as for sewer construction.

On motion of Councilman Murray it was suggested to Mr. Lowenstein that he present petitions for sewer construction, regulating and grading.

Gas Lamps on Grand Avenue, from a Point 200 Feet North of One Hundred and Ninetieth Street to Kingsbridge Road.

Communication dated June 17, 1901, from Mr. Joseph H. Holland, Secretary of the Fordham Taxpayers' Association, was read, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That, on petition of the Fordham Taxpayers' Association, the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that the gas lamps formerly on Grand Avenue, from a point two hundred feet north of One Hundred and Ninetieth street to Kingsbridge road, be replaced, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

East One Hundred and Eighty-third Street, Lighting, between Grand Boulevard and Concourse and Jerome Avenue.

On motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That, on petition of the Fordham Taxpayers' Association, dated June 17, 1901, the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Eighty-third street be lighted by gas, between the Grand Boulevard and Concourse and Jerome Avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Walton Avenue, Water-mains, between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Forty-ninth Streets.

On motion of Councilman Murray, it was

Resolved, That, on petition of Mrs. B. N. Chandler, the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that a water-main be laid in Walton Avenue, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Assessment, Elton Avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first Street to East One Hundred and Sixty-third Street, and to East One Hundred and Sixty-third Street, from Brook Avenue to Third Avenue.

Petition of Samuel Cook and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Murray, seconded by Alderman Geiger it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that the assessments about to be levied for acquiring title to Elton Avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, and to East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from Brook Avenue to Third Avenue, be reduced for the reasons stated in the brief and resolution signed by Samuel Cook, John George Dautel and others, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Lillian Place, Laying Out on Map, between Boston Road and Tremont Avenue.

On motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Lillian place be laid out and shown on the map of The City of New York, between Boston road and Tremont Avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Minutes of June 27, 1901, 2 p. m. Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

Present—President Haffen and Alderman Gass.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Park Avenue Extension on Map of City, from Fifth to Sixth Street.

Communication from Secretary John H. Mooney of the Board of Public Improvements, dated May 18; report of Chief Topographical Engineer Louis A. Rice, dated May 11, 1901, and copy of petition of Charles W. Halleck and eleven others was read.

The Board directed that the Secretary of this Board communicate with Mr. Halleck and suggest to him the advisability of amending his petition in conformity with the report of the Chief Topographical Engineer, namely, that the word Eighth street be inserted instead of "Sixth street" as at present.

Columbus Avenue, Acquiring Title, from West Farms Road to Bear Swamp Road.

Under date of June 24, 1901, Mr. E. B. Levy withdrew his opposition to acquiring title to Columbus Avenue, from Bear Swamp road to West Farms road. The original petition signed by August Baerenklau and five others was taken up also. After some discussion the matter was laid over for a month.

LOCAL BOARDS.

TWENTY-FIRST AND TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICTS, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

JOINT SESSION.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Boards, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Districts, Borough of The Bronx, met at 1:30 p. m., June 27, 1901, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third Avenue.

Present—President Haffen, Councilman Murray, Alderman Geiger, Alderman McGrath and Alderman Gass.

Minutes of previous meetings (Local Boards, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Districts), were read and adopted.

Modification of the Street System in that Part of the Borough of The Bronx Bounded by Bronx Park, Webster Avenue, Flower Street, Park Avenue and Dancombe Avenue.

President Haffen stated that this was a matter taken up in executive session and that from what the members of the Local Board had heard at the previous hearings from the property-owners interested, they believed that the plan as proposed by the Board of Public Improvements, and which was presented to the Local Board, should be adopted with the exception of the layout of Olin Avenue (Gun Hill Road) which they believed should be only eighty (80) feet wide.

President Haffen put the question as to whether the Board was in favor of the Board of Public Improvements plan (with the exception as mentioned, namely, Olin Avenue (Gun Hill Road), to be an eighty (80) foot street. The Board unanimously resolved to recommend the said plan with the exception as stated.

After the matter had been passed, Mr. George Lyden asked to have the matter reconsidered. On motion of Alderman Gass, his request was granted. Mr. Lyden said that while he and some of the other petitioners believed that an eighty (80) foot street was sufficient before the trolley tracks were laid, they feared it would not be wide enough when the company would lay a double track system.

Mrs. F. Dodge, of Gun Hill road, stated that she had seen two accidents on Gun Hill road caused by the narrowness of the road; one man, she said, had his shoulder broken, and that there was a horse injured there also, because of the fact that there was not sufficient room between the curbstone and the trolley railway tracks. Mr. Tier stated that those accidents were probably caused by the roadway being covered with contractor's materials, and that as soon as the roadway was cleaned up accidents would not happen, and that he thought that this road would be wide enough, if left at eighty feet, for the next ten years.

Mr. George W. O'Connor then stated that some of the property-owners who were opposed to a 100-foot street being laid out now, would withdraw their opposition if they could be assured that the area of assessment could be extended. President Haffen stated that the Local Board could give no assurances on the question of the area of assessment.

Alderman Gass moved that the matter be taken up in executive session again. Seconded by Alderman Geiger.

East Two Hundred and Twenty-second Street (Formerly Eighth Street), from the Bronx River to Seventh Avenue.

A communication dated June 5, 1901, signed by Edward Mitchell, of the firm of Messrs. Mitchell & Mitchell, was received by President Haffen, asking for a reconsideration by the Board of Public Improvements of the action taken by it on May 15 last, in reference to the ap-

application of the Corporation Counsel for the appointment of Commissioners to acquire title to East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street (formerly Eighth street), from the Bronx river to Seventh (street) avenue, stating that it should be amended so as to provide either for acquiring title from the Bronx river to White Plains avenue, or to acquire title from the Bronx river to Pelham Bay Park, in view of the contemplated construction of a bridge over the Bronx river at East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street. Mr. Mitchell also stated in his letter that his client (Mr. Joseph Stickney) considered it an injustice to the property-owners that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited, as set forth in the Board of Public Improvements resolution of May 15, 1901. He believed that forty (40) per cent. of the cost of acquiring title be borne by the City at large.

Petition signed by Joseph Stickney, Peter Schweickert (for Maria Schweickert) and others, dated June 10, 1901, was received and read by the Secretary.

After discussion, the matter was laid over to be taken up in executive session.

The estimate must be verified by the party in possession of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent in writing of two householders of the block in the City of New York, or of a generally recognized company duly authorized by law to act as a surety, and shall contain the names and birth in the block of each bid mentioned below.
