Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

DEAR SIR—I herewith respectfully transmit quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor during the quarter ending December 31, 1899, to wit:

## CARPENTERS' WORK.

At Fourth District Prison—Putting in cells of male prison 7 new glazed windows; in female prison, 1 new glazed window; material used: 1 dozen small hinges, 1 dozen window butts. Construction of a closet for general use, size 6 feet by 6 feet, 10 feet high; material used: 24 pieces 1-inch thick tongue and grooved boards, 1 gross 1 1/4-inch screws, 1 jack-plane, 3 door-knobs, 2 spring locks and keys. Repairing chair, 1 perforated chair bottom; putting in new sash-cord in 3 windows; repairing roof of coal shed, 3 pieces of joist, 3 inches by 4 inches.

At Third District Prison—Putting in 2 panes of glass (14 inches by 20 inches) on windows, male prison.

At Fifth District Prison—Putting in 4 panes of glass (15 inches by 18 inches), female prison; 3 panes of glass (15 inches by 14 inches), 10-day house and dining-room.

## PLUMBING AND TINSMITHING.

At Second District Prison—By unpaid labor: Repairs on stoves, putting in new stove pipe; material used, 10 6-inch joints; 1 grate for a "Veto" range, 2 grates for "Mott's Scorchers No. 14," also 2 swivels for same.

At Third District Prison—By unpaid labor: Repairs on stoves, putting in new stove pipe; material used, 4 5-inch joints, 1 5-inch by 3 1/2-inch taper joint; putting in 2 grates on "scorchers" No. 10 and No. 14.

At Fourth District Prison—By unpaid labor: Repairs on stoves; material used, 10 lengths 6-inch stove pipe (20 feet), 3 6-inch elbows; putting in 2 grates and swivels on "scorchers" No. 21, also 2 grate rests and 2 shakers.

At Fifth District Prison—By unpaid labor: Putting in on Mott's "Defiance" range No. 9, 1 new pair of jamb-bricks, 1 long and 1 short cross pieces and 6 covers.

At Second District Prison—Engine room; general repairs; material used: 1 length of 1-inch pipe, 1/2 length of 1 1/4-inch pipe, 1 1-inch union, 1 1/4-inch union, 1 1/4-inch elbow, 1 barrel fire-clay and 150 fire-bricks.

At Third District Prison—By paid labor: Furnishing and putting in new trap at sink (kitchen), repair of waste-pipe from sink to tub, putting in new faucets in wash-trays, repairing hot-water boiler, repairing leak at connection of sediment, etc., repairing sink and tub faucets; material used: 1 2-inch S trap, 1 2-inch brass ferrule, 20 pounds 2-inch waste-pipe, 1 washer for iron union, 4 3/4-inch rubber top-washers, 4 3/4-inch compressed washers, 30 pounds of cement, 3 pounds of okum, 4 pounds of putty, 1 3/4-inch F. & T. faucet; repair of faucet, cell No. 12, material used, 1 rubber top-washer and 1 compressed washer; repairing valves of water-closet, cells Nos. 14 and 20, material used, 4 rubber washers for valves and 2 rubber top-washers; repairing faucets in cells Nos. 25 and 26, material used, 4 rubber top-washers; repairing valves and faucets in water-closet, cell No. 30, material used, 2 rubber washers for valve and 2 rubber washers for faucet; repairing valve and faucet in water-closet of cell No. 1, material used, 1 rubber washer for faucet and 1 for valve; repairing valve of water-closet and faucet in cell No. 5, material used, 2 rubber washers for valve and 2 for faucet; repairing valve of water-closet and faucet in cell No. 4, material used, 2 rubber washers for valve and 1 for faucet; furnishing and putting in new water-closet seats in cells Nos. 1 and 4, also furnishing and putting in new cap on valve in cells Nos. 1 and 4; repairing faucets in cells Nos. 1 and 6, material used, 2 water-closet seats to order, 1 cap for hopper valve and 2 2-inch rubber stoppers; repairing drip-cock attachment, placed in gas supply-pipe in yard of prison.

At Fourth District Prison—By paid labor: Repairing mortise and leading in same, on gate, on street entrance. By unpaid labor: putting 2 new brass faucets in cells of male prison; repairing 5 closets in cells on second tier, putting in 1 dozen new rubber washers; repairing lock in cell on first tier.
