MISCELLANEOUS WORK.

PAINTERS AND PLASTERERS' WORK.

At Seventh District Prison—By unpaid labor: Painting office and ten-day house, also hall, material used: 2 gallons of turpentine, 200 pounds white lead, 3 gallons of oil, 2 pounds of yellow ochre, ½ gallon of dryers.

The prisons were entirely cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered of the "Columbian Insecticide Company."

The usual amount of laundrying, cooking, cleaning and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.
