Sir—Referring to my conversation with President McGowan of the Board of Aldermen, and the Comptroller at the City Hall yesterday, I beg leave to submit the following application for the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$960 to provide heating apparatus in the building located at One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Brook and Washington avenues, occupied by this court and to be occupied by the Sixth District City Magistrate's Court, on and after October 20th instant.

This application is made under the provisions of the Charter, the purpose of this expenditure being the betterment of the building which is owned by the City. There is at present no provision for heating any part of this building. There is an engine and boiler which can be used for the generation of steam.

I have had estimates made by competent steam engineers for the placing of risers and radiators and other appliances in accordance with certain plans made by Michael G. Garvin, architect, the lowest of which amounts to the sum of \$960. Unless some provision is made for heating this building, it cannot be used after the cold weather commences. I urge that this emergency be provided for as soon as possible.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—Under date of October 6, 1906, the Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock, to the amount of \$960, to provide heating apparatus in a building at One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Brook avenue, Borough of The Bronx, which building is now occupied by the Second District Municipal Court and is soon to be occupied by the Sixth District City Magistrates' Court.

The matter has been looked into and the situation is this: The building in question is a three-story and basement brick, standing on a plot which was acquired by the City some time ago for park purposes. Since taken over by the City several streets and avenues bounding it have been widened to such an extent that there is left almost no land at all for park purposes beyond the walls of the building.

The structure is substantially built and in fair condition; and it would, in my opinion, be a great mistake to tear it down for the sake of the land on which it stands while there is need in that vicinity of just such City office quarters as it may supply.

It follows then that money spent in the permanent betterment of this building would be in the line of true economy and therefore advisable.

It is proposed to make use of the boiler now in the building and also of the steam mains and risers, coils and radiators.

The estimate submitted appears little enough for the work which ought to be done; but if the specifications be prepared with care, taking advantage of every part of the present equipment fit for use, the amount asked for should be enough. That amount, however, should not be spent upon anything short of the full and adequate equipment with heating apparatus of the entire building.

I am of the opinion, therefore, that you may properly advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, Corporate Stock to the amount of \$960, to provide for the full heating equipment to be used for City purposes at One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Brook and Washington avenues, Borough of The Bronx.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. James W. Stevenson, Commissioner, Department of Bridges, in communication under date of October 5, 1906, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$6,000, for the removal of the supporting columns of the Brooklyn Bridge station at the intersection of Sands and Washington streets, Borough of Brooklyn, with a view to providing freer access to the roadway of the bridge at this point. It is proposed to substitute for the columns removed, two new columns on the east side of Washington street, and to erect deep girders which will run from the top of these columns to the side of the station building, carrying the load at present supported by the columns to be removed.

I would report that as shown on the accompanying sketch, the removal of column marked "A" will make it possible for a vehicle to turn from Sands street into the roadway of the bridge without interfering with the trolley cars. The other column marked "B" is between the car tracks in front of the entrance to the east roadway of the bridge, and is undoubtedly an obstruction to traffic.

I consider the estimate of \$6,000 approximately correct for the purpose of an appropriation.

The work being, in my opinion, advisable, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$6,000, for the purpose of doing all work in connection with removing two of the supporting columns of the Brooklyn Bridge station, at the intersection of Sands and Washington streets, Borough of Brooklyn, with a view to providing freer access to the roadway of the bridge at this point.

To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—During the past summer the Municipal Art Society has called the attention of the Hon. Moses Herrman, Park Commissioner for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, to the deplorable condition of the parkway on Broadway, above Fifty-ninth street.

This parkway offers better opportunity for decorative planting than any other street in the City, but since the construction of the subway and the removal of the trees consequent thereto, this street has been sadly neglected.

It is the opinion of the society that the path at present laid out in the centre of this parkway will never be used, on account of its exposed position, the impossibility of planting large trees and the location of the ventilating holes from the subway; and that the best solution of the problem can be found in the experimental block between Eighty-seventh and Eighty-eighth streets, now planted, fenced and cared for through the generosity and public spirit of Mrs. Potter.

President Herrman has expressed his approval of the proposed improvement, but has stated that he has no appropriation for carrying out the work.

He has further stated that an appropriation would be requested for this purpose in the autumn.

The Municipal Art Society therefore respectfully requests that such an appropriation be granted. The undersigned further requests that he be informed of the time when the matter will be considered by your honorable body in order that the Municipal Art Society may be represented at the hearing.

Dear Sir—I beg to indorse herewith a copy of a letter recently addressed by me to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which explains itself.

Since the letter was written President Herrman of the Park Board has informed the Municipal Art Society that he has included in his Budget for the coming year a request for an appropriation of \$50,000 for the improvement mentioned in my letter.

He has also informed me that the fencing of this parkway is under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Highways of your Department, and as this fencing is an absolutely necessary part of the scheme, if it is to be of any permanent value, our society requests that you include in the Budget for your Department for the coming year an item for the proper fencing of these parkways, to the end that same may be properly protected from the damage from which they are bound to suffer unless so inclosed.

Our society also respectfully requests that the design of these fences, when erected, be of such character that will not only enhance the appearance of the parkway but will also be of sufficient strength to withstand the rough usage they will be subjected to, particularly at the intersections of Broadway with the other avenues.

As Chairman of the Committee on Street Fixtures of the Municipal Art Society, and as an architect, I would be glad to offer my services, without compensation, in designing this fence should you wish to avail yourself of said service, and in any case our society would appreciate it if you would inform us of your intentions in this matter in order that we may appear at the proper time before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to urge any appropriation for which you may see fit to ask.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Sir—I am in receipt of a letter from Secretary Downing dated March 27, 1906, in which advice is desired upon the questions raised in the communication of Superintendent Scannell to the Commissioner of Public Works, dated March 22, 1906, which reads as follows:

"I beg to recommend that the following question be submitted through the Borough President to the Corporation Counsel, as to under whose jurisdiction are the parkways along the centre line of Broadway, from Fifty-ninth street to Manhattan street.

"These parkways are continually a cause of complaint due to the grass plots not being kept in proper condition, the railings surrounding the same being always in need of repair, and the picking up of debris and papers which happen to gather there.

"It seems to me that according to the Laws of 1902, chapter 453, which is entitled 'An Act to extend the jurisdiction of the Park Board of The City of New York to the preservation, planting and cultivation of trees and vegetation in the streets thereof for the purpose of improving the public health,' these parkways should come under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks."

The question arises, to what extent chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902, entitled "An Act to extend the jurisdiction of the park board of the city of New York to the preservation, planting and cultivation of trees and vegetation in the streets thereof for the purpose of improving the public health," as amended by chapter 253 of the Laws of 1903, confers jurisdiction on the Park Board over the space called the pathways along the centre line of Broadway, from Fifty-ninth street to Manhattan street.

Section 1 of said Act of 1902 provides:

"On and after the passage of this act, all trees and other forms of vegetation then and thereafter planted, and growing in the streets of the city of New York, shall be under the exclusive care and cultivation of the commissioners of parks of said city, except as hereinafter provided. * * *

The Park Board is empowered to pass ordinances for the protection of street trees and vegetation.

In my opinion it is the duty of the President of the Borough of Manhattan to repair the railings surrounding the grass plots in said space if they need repair.

The care and cultivation of trees and vegetation along the said pathway or centre line of Broadway, including the care of the grass plots comes within the jurisdiction of the Park Board.

I also am of the opinion that debris and papers which happen to gather there should be picked up by the employees of the Park Department.

Sir—In compliance with your request I have caused an inquiry to be made into the request of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, under date of September 13, 1906, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the Board "recommend to the Board of Aldermen the adoption of a resolution establishing the grade of Foreman Dock Builder in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and fixing the salary thereof at \$1,800 per annum."

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn recently made application to the Municipal Civil Service Commission for the transfer of a Foreman Dock Builder from the Department of Docks and Ferries to the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. The Assistant Secretary of the Commission notified the President of the Borough on September 5, 1906, that the requested transfer could not be allowed because the position did not exist in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The present request for the establishment of that grade in the Borough President's office follows the action of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

The following reasons for the request were furnished your examiner by the Private Secretary to the Borough President:

"In regard to our conversation relative to the creation of the grade of Foreman Dock Builder in this office, I wish to say we need such an official here, because in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices is a project for the construction of the Eighth Ward Market, and before this construction work will be the filling in under water area, and in order that this may be properly done it will be necessary to build crib work and docks to retain the fill. The actual filling in and work of that kind can be done by laborers, but it is necessary to have a technical man in charge of them. The salary of the position will be charged against the Corporate Stock appropriated for the purpose of the construction of a market, and at the conclusion of that work the official appointed will be returned to the list."

The work of building cribs and docks is not usually done by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, and the Bureau is without supervisory employees with a technical knowledge of the preliminary work required in connection with the proposed new market.

It will be noted also that the transferred employee will not be a burden upon the Budget, nor is it the present purpose to retain him after this particular work is done; while during his employment he will be paid out of Corporate Stock.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend the adoption of a resolution by the Board of Aldermen establishing the grade of Foreman Dock Builder in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, at the salary of \$1,800 per annum.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, No. 111 Broadway, New York City:

Sir—It is my intention to appoint a commission for the purpose of devising some comprehensive plan for the reorganization, extension and administration of the public hospital system in The City of New York.

As you are probably aware, under the present laws the City's hospital system is administered by three distinct and independent departments; namely, the Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, who have charge of the public hospitals on Manhattan Island and in The Bronx; the Department of Public Charities, which has charge of the public hospitals in the Borough of Brooklyn, as well as those on Blackwell's and Randall's islands, and the Department of Health, which has charge of the hos-

pitals for contagious diseases. It is obvious that such a system is illogical, since no one of these departments is dependent on the other, although their work in a large measure lies along the same lines. By this method the whole system suffers in effectiveness, for it is evident that friction and extravagance result from a division of authority.

The City of New York, through its several departments, is about to expend large sums of money for the extension of its hospital service. The question of proper treatment of its consumptive patients has been widely agitated, with the result that at present both the Department of Health and that of Public Charities contemplate establishing hospitals for consumptives at great cost to the City, while the Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals also propose to care for this class of sufferers. In view of these extensive plans for the future, I consider it most important that the present system should be investigated and improved, to the end that a general scheme of administration may be adopted which will insure to the City a thoroughly practical and satisfactory method of developing its whole hospital service.

I shall ask the commission, therefore, to consider the problems presented by the existing methods of administration, and to propose such remedies as may seem necessary to correct the defects in the present system. The commission should also inquire into the future needs of the City in regard to caring for its sick and poor, so that adequate provision may be made for carrying on this important work. In short, I shall expect the commission to consider the entire hospital situation of The City of New York, to make a complete investigation of the whole subject, and, after considering it in all its bearings, to present a report upon which, if necessary, legislation may be obtained which will give the City a better system than that under which it is now compelled to work.

My purpose in writing to you at length concerning this matter is to ask whether you will accept an appointment as chairman of this proposed commission.

The items of the application are set forth in the accompanying resolution, and in addition to hearing Commissioner Darlington and Dr. Brannan, your committee personally visited the site at Otisville and made an inspection. The necessity for such an institution as that proposed at Otisville is well set forth in the annexed letter from the Committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis of the Charity-Organization Society, and your committee feels that it is in thorough sympathy with this movement which plans to deal with not only cases of incipient tuberculosis, but also as a convalescent resort for the hospitals. The committee feels that the site selected is very well suited for the purposes. It consists of 1,300 acres of high ground (altitude from 1,200 to 1,400 feet) at Otisville, which is in Orange County, about 77 miles out on the Erie Railroad. The Commissioner expects that this equipment requested will take care of 200 cases. While the committee favors this project and this appropriation, and feel that the people of this City are favorable to liberal expenditure for the saving of human life, etc., they also feel that extravagance should be guarded against. They, therefore, recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

Also that there shall be paid to the Sweepers, Drivers, Hostlers, Dump Boardmen, Stablemen, Section Station Keepers and Chief Hostlers of said uniformed force additional compensation for labor performed by them in excess of forty-eight hours in any one week, at a pro rata rate for each hour in excess of such forty-eight hours.

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, the committee recommends that these matters be placed on file as they require no further consideration.

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit the soliciting of business in public buildings and providing penalties for the same.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That on and after the first day of June, 1906, it shall be unlawful for any person to seek, ask for or solicit business of any kind or description in any public building belonging to The City of New York or to any of its subdivisions. This ordinance, however, shall not apply to or affect the business of blacking shoes, or the business of selling newspapers and periodicals when carried on by virtue of permits or licenses lawfully granted.

Any person convicted of a violation of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine which shall not exceed \$5 or to imprisonment of a term which shall not exceed five days.

It shall not be lawful for any person, co-partnership or corporation within The City of New York, to manufacture, sell, offer or expose for sale or give away, any production, popularly and commonly called confetti, which shall be less than three-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, if circular, and if not circular, and of any other shape, shall not be less than three-sixteenths of an inch in width or length at its narrowest point.

It shall not be lawful for any person, co-partnership, or corporation within The City of New York to offer or expose for sale or give away any production commonly and popularly known as confetti in packages of any size or dimensions which contain any of such confetti of more than one color in one package.

It shall not be lawful for any person, firm or corporation within The City of New York to sweep or gather from the streets or avenues, or walks within said City of New York any confetti which theretofore had been used, and to sell, offer or expose for sale or give away or in any manner use such confetti so gathered.

It shall be presumptive evidence of the violation of this section for any person, firm or corporation in The City of New York, to have in his or its possession confetti in packages or otherwise, which contain confetti of more than one color. The City Magistrates of The City of New York shall have power, authority and jurisdiction to hear, try and determine any charge against any person, firm or corporation charged with violation of this ordinance. If any person, firm or corporation shall be found guilty of violation of any provision of this ordinance he or it shall upon conviction be sentenced as follows:

For the first offense, ten dollars fine or ten days in the County Jail or both such fine and imprisonment. For the second offense, twenty-five dollars fine or twenty-five days in the County Jail or both such fine and imprisonment. For the third or subsequent offense one hundred dollars fine or three months in the County Penitentiary or both such fine and imprisonment.

Avenue A, between Houston and Seventh streets; Park row, from New Chambers to Ann street; Centre street, from New Chambers street to Park row, and Nassau street, from Park row to Ann street, from 8 o'clock a. m. to 6 o'clock p. m.

That the Committee has carefully considered the amendments to the sections of the revised ordinances proposed by this ordinance, and is of the opinion that they are both advisable and necessary. The use of concrete, cement, and other material in the construction of sidewalks and crosswalks has become almost universal, and authority is given by ordinance for such use in the Borough of Brooklyn, although no such authority exists in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Alderman Meyers appeared before the Committee in support of the measure, and the Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 242, 248 and 249 of Article XIV. of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York of 1897.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1—Sections 242, 248 and 249 of Article XIV. of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897, in relation to "Flagging, Curbing and Repairing Sidewalks," are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 242. All streets in the [City of New York] Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, of twenty-two feet in width and upward, shall have sidewalks on each side thereof laid with granite or bluestone flagging, or artificial stone, [not less than three inches thick, and not less than two feet wide, and containing a superficial area of at least eight square feet,] in full accordance with that called for in the standard specifications for this work on file in the offices of the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Sec. 248. No sidewalk or any part of a sidewalk laid with [brick or flagging] granite or bluestone flagging or artificial stone shall hereafter be taken up or the [brick or flagging] granite or bluestone flagging or artificial stone removed therefrom, for any purpose whatever, in the [Twenty-third or Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York] Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, without the written permission of the [Commissioner of Street Improvements of said wards, or in any other part of The City of New York, without the written permission of the Commissioner of Public Works,] President of the Borough of Manhattan, or the President of the Borough of The Bronx, respectively, as jurisdiction may apply, under the penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offence; but the provisions of this section, unless such work should come within the limits of an ordinance of the [Common Council] Board of Aldermen, shall not apply to any person engaged in the necessary repairs of any such sidewalk, the resetting, when necessary, of any curb or gutter stones that may have become displaced, broken or sunken, or the necessary repair or alteration of any coal slide under any such sidewalk, nor shall a permit for any such purpose be necessary.

Sec. 249. All private cartways, crossing any of the sidewalks of the [City of New York] Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and all sidewalks whatever shall be paved with granite or bluestone, or artificial stone [not less in size than eight superficial feet, hewn, and laid closely together] and not with brick or with round or paving stones, under the penalty of ten dollars upon the owner and occupant of the lot in front of which such cartway or sidewalk shall be, severally and respectively.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

(1) None but licensed hacks shall use the designated public hack stands in the City. The owner of any hack not intending to use the public hack stands and having the written consent of the owner or lessee of any hotel containing fifty rooms or more may, in the discretion of the Mayor or the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, be specially licensed and permitted to use temporarily a portion of the street in front of any such hotel and not elsewhere, as a stand, and shall be confined to carry passengers from said premises.

(2) Section 3 of Article 1 of an ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen, adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 31, 1905, and approved by the Mayor, November 3, 1905, is hereby amended to read as follows: No hackney coach, carriage or cab which shall be specially licensed by virtue of the provisions of this ordinance shall make, use or come upon any stand that is now, or may be hereafter designated, as a hackney coach stand, or at any other place in The City of New York, except in front of or adjacent to any hotel specified in the foregoing section and which may be used as a stand with the approval and consent of the persons occupying the premises in front of which said coaches, carriages or cabs are to be permitted and allowed by the authority of the Mayor, as aforesaid, provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit or take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of the guests of said hotel or hotels.

(3) The owner of hacks specially licensed shall, in addition to the lawful fees provided by law, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.

(4) Section 456 and 459 of article 8 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York adopted by the Board of Aldermen March 9, 1897, and approved by the Mayor March 15, 1897, in relation to special coaches and carriages; section 12 of title 3 of an ordinance entitled "A general ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York," adopted by the Council

April 18, 1899, by the Board of Aldermen May 19, 1899, and approved by the Mayor May 22, 1899, and section 2 of article 1 of an ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen, adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 31, 1905, and approved by the Mayor November 3, 1905, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
(Section 1 is intended as a substitute for section 2 of the ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen on October 31, 1905, and approved by the Mayor on November 3 of the same year.)

The Police Department is hereby empowered to issue, upon application therefor, a permit for such right of way to any duly registered physician, which permit shall not be transferable.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,
No. 299 Broadway,
New York, September 19, 1906.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, September 19, 1906, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

All the Commissioners were present.

The public hearing on the request of the Comptroller for an amendment of the classification of exempt positions in his Department by striking therefrom the line "7 Stock and Bond Clerks," which had been adjourned from September 12, was held. The President read a communication from Comptroller Metz, dated September 13, with reference to the proposed amendment, and Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, addressed the Commission. There was no opposition, and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of Civil Service Rule XIV. (transfers). Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, addressed the Commission with reference to the proposed changes in the rule. There was no opposition, and the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held September 12 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Finance Department," as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by striking therefrom the line: "7 Stock and Bond Clerks."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the rules and classification of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, as prescribed and established December 4, 1903, be and the same are hereby amended by striking from Rule XIV. clauses 1 and 2, and inserting in their place the following:

"1. A person who has been permanently appointed to a position in the competitive class may be transferred without examination to a similar position in such class or to a position of the same grade thereof, if it be in a graded service, in any other department, office or institution; provided, that for original entrance to the position proposed to be filled by transfer there is not required by these rules, in the judgment of the Commission, an examination involving tests or qualifications essentially different from or higher than those required in an examination for original entrance to the position from which transfer is sought; or, provided that if such person entered the service without competitive examination he shall have served with fidelity for at least three years in the position held by him, or in a similar position.

"2. A person may be transferred from an exempt or non-competitive position to a competitive position, or from a position in the competitive class to a position in a different group of such class, only when the person transferred has qualified in an open competitive examination and is eligible for certification and appointment from the appropriate eligible list for the position to which transfer is proposed. Such transfer shall remove from the eligible list the name of the person transferred; but no such transfer shall be allowed when there is in existence an appropriate list of persons eligible for promotion to the position proposed to be filled by transfer.

"A person holding a position in the non-competitive class may be transferred to a similar position in the same class."

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
