Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, June 14, 1918.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

## PUBLIC HEARINGS.

## On Changes in the City Map.

## Borough of Manhattan.

**Hearing in the Matter of Changing the Map or Plan of The City of New York by Changing the Grades of East 41st Street and East 42d Street, from Park Avenue to Lexington Avenue; and of Park Avenue, from East 40th Street to East 42d Street, and the Grade of the Viaduct in Park Avenue, from East 40th Street to the High Level Street on the Northerly Side of East 42d Street, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 1).**

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised in accordance with resolution adopted May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 8). No one appeared in opposition to or in favor of the proposed change. The hearing was closed.

The following was offered:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 17th day of May, 1918, a resolution was adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York, so as to change the grades of East 41st street and East 42d street, from Park avenue to Lexington avenue, and of Park avenue, from East 40th street to East 42d street, and the grade of the viaduct in Park avenue extending from East 40th street to the high level street on the northerly side of East 42d street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 14th day of June, 1918, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 14th day of June, 1918; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolution and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 14th day of June, 1918; and

Whereas, All persons interested in such proposed change were afforded an opportunity to be heard thereon, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of East 41st street and East 42d street, from Park avenue to Lexington avenue, and of Park avenue, from East 40th street to East 42d street, and the grade of the viaduct in Park avenue extending from East 40th street to the high level street on the northerly side of East 42d street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to make the aforesaid change in accordance with a map or plan bearing the signature of the President of the Borough, and dated March 27th, 1918.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, and the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx—14.

**Hearing in the Matter of Changing the Map or Plan of The City of New York by Changing the Grade of West 33d Street, from 5th Avenue to 7th Avenue, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 2).**

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised in accordance with a resolution adopted May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 27).

No one appeared in opposition to or in favor of the proposed change. The hearing was closed.

The following was offered:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 17th day of May, 1918, a resolution was adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York, so as to change the grades of West 33d street, from 5th avenue to 7th avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 14th day of June, 1918, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 14th day of June, 1918; and

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, and the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx—14.

**Hearing in the Matter of Changing the Map or Plan of The City of New York by Changing the Grade of East 59th Street, from 2d Avenue to 5th Avenue, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 3).**

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised in accordance with a resolution adopted May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 28).

Clinton T. Roe, representing the estate of Roland C. Jones, appeared in opposition. Edward A. Maher, representing the Third Avenue Railroad Company appeared in favor.

No one else desiring to be heard, the hearing was closed.

**Hearing in the Matter of Changing the Map or Plan of The City of New York by Changing the Street System Heretofore Laid Out Within the Territory Bounded by Harris Avenue, the East River, Babbitt Street and Vernon Avenue, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 4).**

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised in accordance with a resolution adopted May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 112).

No one appeared in opposition to or in favor of the proposed change. The hearing was closed.

The following was offered:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 17th day of May, 1918, a resolution was adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to change the street system heretofore laid out within the territory bounded by Harris avenue, the United States pier and bulkhead line of the East River, Babbitt street and Vernon avenue, in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 14th day of June, 1918, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 14th day of June, 1918; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolution and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 14th day of June, 1918; and

Whereas, All persons interested in such proposed change were afforded an opportunity to be heard thereon, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the street system heretofore laid out within the territory bounded by Harris avenue, the United States pier and bulkhead line of the East River, Babbitt street and Vernon avenue, in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to make the aforesaid change in accordance with a map or plan bearing the signature of the President of the Borough and dated December 8, 1917.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—15.

The Secretary was directed to return, in accordance with suggestions made in the report of the Chief Engineer, resolution adopted by the Local Board of Newtown District providing for the acquisition of title to Rogers street, etc.

## On Areas of Assessment for Benefit in Condemnation Proceedings.

## Borough of Brooklyn.

**Hearing on the Proposed Area of Assessment in the Matter of Acquiring Title to Warehouse Avenue (Cottage Place), from Surf Avenue to the Mean High Water Line of the Atlantic Ocean, and to the Adjoining Courtyard Area on the Easterly Side, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 5).**

The Secretary presented affidavits of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised in accordance with a resolution adopted May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 133).

No one appeared in opposition to or in favor of the proposed area of assessment. The hearing was closed.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 970 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deems it for the public interest that the title, for the uses and to the extent thereof as herein mentioned, to the real property required for the opening and extending of Warehouse avenue (Cottage place), from Surf avenue to the mean high water line of the Atlantic Ocean and of the adjoining court yard area on the easterly side; the title to the court yard area to be acquired subject to the condition that buildings located on the court yard area shall not be disturbed by the City for a period of 20 years subsequent to the date of the entry of the order of the Supreme Court granting the City's application to condemn the property, and that during the same period this area may be fenced off, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, should be acquired by The City of New York.

Resolved, That the title to be so acquired is hereby determined to be a title in fee in such premises, subject to the aforesaid condition.

Resolved, That the compensation to be made to the owners of the real property to be acquired shall be ascertained and determined by the Supreme Court without a jury.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court to have the compensation which should justly be made to the respective owners of the real property proposed to be taken, ascertained and determined by the Supreme Court without a jury, and to have the said Court assess the cost and expense of the proceedings upon the real property within the area of assessment hereinafter determined, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title as herein determined, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public for the same purpose, to the real property that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Warehouse avenue (Cottage place), from Surf avenue to the mean high water line of the Atlantic Ocean and of the adjoining court yard area on the easterly side; the title to the court yard area to be acquired, subject to the condition that buildings located on the court yard area shall not be disturbed by the City for a period of 20 years subsequent to the date of the entry of the order of the Supreme Court granting the City's application to condemn the property, and that during the same period this area may be fenced off, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the receipt by him of a rule map and damage map, certified as having been approved by this Board.

Resolved, That no portion of the cost and expense of said proceedings, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17, of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings, the cost and expense incurred by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn in the preparation of rule, damage and benefit maps for the use thereof, and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 977 of said title, as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers that due notice was given therein that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceed-



ings herein to acquire title to the real property required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment as therein described, and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 14th day of June, 1918; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared, and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board;

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

Beginning at a point on a line midway between West 23rd street and Warehouse avenue where it is intersected by a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Neptune avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Neptune avenue, and running thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Neptune avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Warehouse avenue and West 21st street; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Warehouse avenue and West 21st street to the intersection with the northerly line of Surf avenue; thence southwardly in a straight line to a point on the southerly line of Surf avenue, where it is intersected by a line distant 130 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of West 21st street, the said distance being measured at right angles to West 21st street; thence southwardly along the said line parallel with West 21st street and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with the mean high water line of the Atlantic Ocean; thence westwardly along the mean high water line of the Atlantic Ocean to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 110 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of West 23rd street, the said distance being measured at right angles to West 23rd street; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with West 23rd street and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with the southerly line of Surf avenue; thence northwardly in a straight line to a point on the northerly line of Surf avenue where it is intersected by a line midway between West 23rd street and Warehouse avenue; thence northwardly along the said line midway between West 23rd street and Warehouse avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

#### On Franchises.

##### Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation (Cal. No. 6).

Hearing on the order to show cause why a resolution declaring forfeited the contract dated October 29, 1912, granting a franchise to the South Shore Traction Company and subsequently assigned, with the consent of the Board, to the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation, and the contracts dated July 23, 1913, and January 21, 1916, by and between The City of New York and the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation, amending said contract dated October 29, 1912, should not be adopted, and why such resolution shall not provide that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of said contracts shall not thereupon become the property of the City, without proceedings at law or in equity.

(On October 19, 1917 (Cal. No. 127), the hearing was fixed for November 9, 1917, and continued from time to time until February 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 11), March 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 16), March 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 15), March 22, 1918 (Cal. No. 4), April 5, 1918 (Cal. No. 21), April 19, 1918 (Cal. No. 5), May 3, 1918 (Cal. No. 4), May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 12), and then continued until this day.)

(The Board is restrained from taking action by injunction of the Federal Court.) (On May 3, 1918 (Cal. No. 4), the Corporation Counsel was requested to examine the Federal Judiciary Law, or any other act, and suggest any amendment which will prohibit granting injunctions estopping The City of New York from enforcing its franchise rights. The Corporation Counsel was also requested to see if a condition could not be put in contracts providing the contractor or grantee will not apply to the Federal Courts.)

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 12), a communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, transmitting copy of decision handed down by the Federal Court, restraining the Board from forfeiting the Company's franchise, and the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board by June 14, 1918, what action, if any, can be taken in the way of appeal from the decision of the Court if deemed advisable.)

No one appeared in opposition to or in favor.

The Secretary presented the following:

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, May 29, 1918.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Sirs—I received a communication from your Board dated May 3, 1918, signed James D. McGann, Assistant Secretary, reading as follows:

"At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held this day, by motion duly adopted, the Corporation Counsel was requested to examine into and suggest amendments to the Federal Judiciary Law, or any act which will prohibit granting injunctions estopping the City of New York from enforcing its contract rights.

"The Corporation Counsel was also requested to see if a condition could not be put in franchise contracts providing the contractor or grantee will not apply to the Federal Courts.

"The above action was taken by the Board while it had under consideration the hearing on the order to show cause why the franchise granted the South Shore Traction Company, and subsequently assigned to the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation, should not be forfeited."

The Judicial Code entitled "An Act to codify, revise and amend the laws relating to the judiciary, being chapter 231 of the Laws of 1911, passed March 3, 1911," provides:

"Section 266. [Injunctions based upon alleged unconstitutionality of State statutes; when and by whom may be granted.] No interlocutory injunction suspending or restraining the enforcement, operation, or execution of any statute of a state by restraining the action of any officer of such State in the enforcement or execution of such statute, [or in the enforcement or execution of an order made by an administrative board or commission acting under and pursuant to the statutes of such State,] shall be issued or granted by any justice of the Supreme Court, or by any District Court of the United States, or by any judge thereof, or by any circuit judge acting as district judge, upon the ground of the unconstitutionality of such statute, unless the application for the same shall be presented to a Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, or to a circuit or district judge, and shall be heard and determined by three judges, of whom at least one shall be a justice of the Supreme Court or a circuit judge, and the other two may be either circuit or district judges, and unless a majority of such three judges shall concur in granting such application. Whenever such application as aforesaid is presented to a justice of the Supreme Court, or to a judge, he shall immediately call to his assistance to hear and determine the application two other judges; *Provided, however*, That one of such three judges shall be a justice of the Supreme Court or a circuit judge. Said application shall not be heard or determined before at least five days' notice of the hearing has been given to the governor and to the attorney general of the State, and to such other persons as may be defendants in the suit: *Provided*, That if of opinion that irreparable loss or damage would result to the complainant unless a temporary restraining order is granted, any justice of the Supreme Court, or any circuit or district judge, may grant such temporary restraining order at any time before such hearing and determination of the application for an interlocutory injunction, but such temporary restraining order shall remain in force only until the hearing and determination of the application for an interlocutory injunction upon notice as aforesaid. The hearing upon such application for an interlocutory injunction shall be given precedence and shall be in every way expedited and be assigned for a hearing at the earliest practicable day after the expiration of the notice hereinbefore provided for. An appeal may be taken direct to the Supreme Court of the United States from the order granting or denying, after notice and hearing, an interlocutory injunction in such case. [It is further provided that if before the final hearing of such application a suit shall have been brought in a court of the State having jurisdiction thereof under the laws of such State, to enforce such statute of or order, accompanied by a stay in such State Court of proceedings under such statute or order pending the determination of such suit by such State Court,

all proceedings in any court of the United States to restrain the execution of such statute or order shall be stayed pending the final determination of such suit in the courts of the State. Such stay may be vacated upon proof made after hearing, and notice of ten days served upon the attorney general of the State, that the suit in the State courts is not being prosecuted with diligence and good faith.] [36 Stat. L. 1162, as amended by 37 Stat. L. 1013.]"

An amendment of the above quoted section, so that it would apply to municipal officers and boards in the same manner as it now applies to the officers of the State of New York, is the most the City could expect to obtain by way of federal legislation.

Your Board may also insert in franchise contracts a condition providing that the franchise may be forfeited by the City on the appointment of a receiver in equity or a receiver or trustee in bankruptcy proceedings. Such a provision should read as follows:

The grantee covenants and agrees not to assign or mortgage the whole or any part of the franchise granted without written consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. If the grantee shall at any time during the term of this grant become insolvent, or if proceedings in bankruptcy shall be instituted by or against said grantee, or if a receiver or trustee shall be appointed custodian of the property, or if this grant shall by operation of law devolve upon or pass to any person or corporation other than this grantee, then and in each of said cases it shall and may be lawful for the City of New York, acting through its Board of Estimate and Apportionment and at the election of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to enter into and upon said franchise and said property of said grantee or any part thereof and to declare the said franchise forfeited, and all of the property of the said grantee used in the operation of said franchise be property of the City of New York, as provided in this franchise contract.

A covenant, similar to the one proposed above, was held valid and enforceable in a lease and there is no reason to believe that a similar covenant in a franchise contract would not also be valid and enforceable. In *re Frazin & Oppenheim*, 174 Fed. Rep., 713 (District Court, S. D., N. Y., November 18, 1909), Judge Holt said:

"There can be no doubt, under the authorities, that a covenant by the lessee, in a lease, not to assign, mortgage, or pledge the lease, or underlet, without the lessor's consent, is not violated by the lessee's bankruptcy. *Gazlay v. Williams*, 147 Fed., 678, 77 C. C. A. 662, 14 L. R. A. (N. S.), 1199; affirmed 210 U. S., 41, 28 Sup. Ct. 687, 52 L. Ed. 950; *Re Pennwell*, 119 Fed. 139, 55 C. C. A. 571. The covenant, however, providing that, in the case of the lessee's insolvency, or the institution of bankruptcy proceedings by or against him, or the appointment of a receiver or trustee of the lessee's property, or the devolution upon any person, by operation of law, of the lessee's occupancy, the lessor may re-entr, is violated by the occurrence of any of the acts specified. The rule is well stated in *Jones on Landlord and Tenant*, sec. 466, cited with approval in *Gazlay v. Williams*, 210 U. S. 41, 28 Sup. Ct. 687, 52 L. Ed. 950, where it is said that an ordinary covenant against subletting and assigning is not broken by a transfer of the leased premises by operation of law, but the covenant may be so drawn as to expressly prohibit such a transfer, and in that case the lease would be forfeited by an assignment in operation of law. \* \* \*

This decision was approved on November 14, 1910, in *re Frazin*, 183 Fed. Rep., 28. In *re Georgalas Bros.*, 245 Fed. Rep., 129 (District Court, N. D., Ohio, E. D., September 11, 1917), it was held that a lease may be so framed that a transfer by operation of law will avoid it at the lessor's option.

Your Board has specifically requested an opinion as to whether a condition could not be put in franchise contracts, providing the contractor or grantee will not apply to the Federal Courts. A provision to that effect would be void as it would result in ousting the Federal Courts of jurisdiction. (*Meacham vs. Jamestown F. & C. R. R. Co.*, 211 N. Y., 346; *United States Asphalt R. Co. vs. Trinidad Lake P. Co.*, 222 Fed. Report 1006; approved in *Aktieselskabet K. F. V. Roderikiebolaget Atlanten* 232 Fed. 403, 405 and *The Bros* 241 Fed. 186, 191.)

Gas & Electric Securities Company, Plaintiff, against Manhattan & Queens Traction Corporation, Defendant. In the matter of the Petition of William R. Begg and Arthur C. Hume, Receivers of Defendant, relative to the Franchise and property of Defendant.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Sirs—I received a communication from your Board dated May 31, 1918, signed by James Matthews, Assistant Secretary, reading as follows:

"Your communication dated May 28, 1918, enclosing copy of an opinion rendered on May 25, 1918, by Judge Chatfield of the United States District Court, for the Eastern District, in the proceeding entitled 'Gas and Electric Securities Company, Plaintiff, against Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation, Defendant; in the matter of the petition of the Receivers for injunction, pending further order, against The City of New York and the Board of Estimate, with relation to resolution declaring franchise forfeited,' was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting on May 31, 1918, and the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board on or before June 14, 1918, what action, if any, can be taken to protect the City's interest and what action can be taken in the way of appealing from the decision if deemed advisable."

On May 28, 1918, I transmitted to your Board a copy of the opinion of Judge Chatfield in the above entitled proceedings handed down on May 25, 1918.

As directed by your Board, I obtained an order to show cause dated February 13, 1918, returnable February 13, 1918, at 2 p. m., why the preliminary stay obtained in the above entitled proceedings on December 19, 1917, should not be vacated and set aside. This order to show cause was obtained upon the papers upon which the stay was granted. This motion was denied from the bench, and an order denying the same entered on February 16, 1918. This order is not appealable.

On March 11, 1918, I obtained an order to show cause returnable March 13, 1918, why the petition of the Receivers should not be dismissed on the ground of lack of jurisdiction of the court to proceed. This motion came on for argument at the same time at which the motion was set down for the argument of this matter on the merits, to wit, on March 20, 1918. This motion was denied and an order denying same was entered on May 17, 1918.

Before proceeding with the argument of these proceedings on the merits, I filed preliminary objections on the ground that the Court was without jurisdiction to proceed to hear this matter on the merits. These objections were immediately overruled.

The attorneys for the Receivers served a proposed form of order with notice of settlement for June 3, 1918, and objections to the form of this proposed order having been made, Judge Chatfield set down the settlement of this order for June 10, 1918. On June 10, 1918, a proposed form of order was submitted, and certain errors having been pointed out, the attorneys for the Receivers served on June 11, 1918, an amended proposed form of order, with notice of settlement for June 13, 1918, at 10.30 a. m. I have also submitted a proposed form of order and a memorandum pointing out the reasons why my proposed order should be signed.

I will at once take an appeal from the order entered and filed on May 17, 1918, refusing to dismiss the petition on the ground of lack of jurisdiction of the Court, and will also at once appeal from the order granting the injunction after the argument of these proceedings on the merits, when the same is entered and filed and a copy thereof served on me.

The United States Circuit Court of Appeals has adjourned for the summer, and will not sit again until the 7th day of October, 1918, and I will undoubtedly be able to have my papers on appeal filed in time so that both appeals in this matter will be heard in the month of October, 1918.

On June 11, 1918, Judge Chatfield signed an order to show cause, returnable on the 12th day of June, 1918, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of that day, why the United States District Court for the Eastern District of New York should not make an administrative order permitting the Receivers of the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation to charge a fare of six cents for one ride in any one direction on the main line of the traction corporation, and why, after the six cent fare is put into effect, the Receivers should not be authorized to increase the present rate of wages of motormen, conductors, shopmen and other laboring employees of the traction corporation, ten per cent. This application of the Receivers has been set down for argument on the 14th day of June, 1918, and I will strenuously oppose it.



I have now fully advised you as to the status of this matter to date.

The hearing was continued until October 25, 1918, and the matter referred to the Committee on Franchises.

#### Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation (Cal. No. 7).

Hearing on the application of the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation for an extension of time of six (6) months from the date when it shall receive the necessary material with which to build and put into operation that portion of its street surface railway from the intersection of Sutphin road and Lambertville avenue to the intersection of Central avenue and Springfield road, in the Borough of Queens.

(On October 26, 1917 (Cal. No. 61), a resolution was adopted fixing November 2, 1917, as the date for public hearing, and the hearing was continued from time to time until February 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 12), March 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 17), March 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 16), March 22, 1918 (Cal. No. 5), April 5, 1918 (Cal. No. 22), April 19, 1918 (Cal. No. 6), May 3, 1918 (Cal. No. 8), May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 13), and then continued until this day. No one appeared in opposition to or in favor.)

The hearing was continued until June 28, 1918, and the Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board whether it is restrained by any order or injunction from denying the application.

#### Miscellaneous Hearings.

#### Hearing in the Matter of the Relocation of Tracks of the New York Railways Company, Central Park West, Between Columbus Circle and Cathedral Parkway, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 8).

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised in accordance with a resolution adopted May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 117).

(On March 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 96), the Board adopted a resolution authorizing the Mayor, pursuant to chapter 692 of the Laws of 1917, to file a complaint with the Public Service Commission relative to the operation of the railroad on this street.)

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 117), a communication from his Honor the Mayor requesting the Board to fix a date for a public hearing in the matter, was presented and a resolution was adopted fixing June 14, 1918, as the date for such hearing.)

Henry J. Smith, Attorney for New York Railways Company and Stewart Browne appeared in opposition to relocating the tracks. William L. Ransom, Counsel for Public Service Commission, appeared in favor of remedying present conditions.

No one else desiring to be heard the hearing was continued until October 18, 1918.

#### REPORTS.

##### From Standing Committees.

##### Committee on Franchises.

#### Union Railway Company of New York City (Cal. No. 9).

Application of the Union Railway Company of New York City, requesting the Board to cancel contract granting said Company a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from West 207th street and Amsterdam avenue, along Amsterdam avenue to Nagle avenue, to Dyckman street, to the easterly line of the right of way of the New York Central Railroad at the foot of Dyckman street, Borough of Manhattan, and return to said Company the sum of \$1,000, paid under said contract, or consent to certain modifications of the contract.

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 2), this matter was referred to the Committee on Franchises.)

The Secretary presented the following:

Committee on Franchises of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, June 12, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—At the conclusion of the public hearing held May 24, 1918, upon the petition of the Union Railway Company of New York City for the cancellation or amendment of the contract dated May 18, 1917, authorizing a street surface railway extension upon and along Amsterdam and Nagle avenues and Dyckman street, Borough of Manhattan, the matter was referred back to the Committee on Franchises.

The Company, in its petition, requests that the contract be cancelled and the initial payment of \$1,000 returned, or, as an alternative proposition, that the contract be modified and amended in relation to the term of grant, underground electric system, rate of fare, transfers, compensation and other particulars. It is also requested in the petition that, pending the decision of the Board as to which of the above courses is to be pursued, the Company be granted an extension of time for the commencement and completion of construction.

Your Committee has considered this matter and is of the opinion that the Company should live up to its agreement for the construction of the extension and that the amendments to the contract requested are not of such a nature that the Committee can recommend them to the Board for favorable action. The Company is now technically in default for failure to construct its lines within the time fixed by the contract, although such time was extended for the full period allowed by said contract. Any further extension of time will require a modification of the original grant.

As the Company claims that it has been impossible to construct this extension within the time fixed, by reason of existing conditions as to labor and materials, and as there appears to be an urgent necessity for the construction of the line, your Committee recommends:

First. That the Company be granted extensions of time of six (6) months each for the commencement and completion of construction.

Second. That so much of the petition of March 18, 1918, as relates to cancellation or amendment of the contract be denied.

Two resolutions are herewith submitted, one fixing July 12, 1918, as the date for hearing upon a form of contract amending the times for commencement and completion of construction and the other denying those portions of the petition relating to cancellation and modification of the Company's contract of May 18, 1917.

Respectfully, JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, for the Committee on Franchises.

Herbert J. Bickford, of Evarts, Choate & Sherman, Counsel for the Company, appeared and stated the Company would accept an extension of time to complete construction for a period of six months after the duration of the war, with the understanding that the Board would take up the modifications requested, especially elimination of underground construction, limitation of transfer privileges and the payment of no compensation other than required by law. Benjamin L. Blauvelt appeared on behalf of the Washington Heights Taxpayers Association in favor of the construction of the railway. William L. Ransom, Counsel for the Public Service Commission for the First District, appeared and stated the Company refused to accept the original franchise if the Public Service Commission exercised its statutory power and compelled the exchange of transfers at Broadway and Dyckman street.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, June 13, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Sirs—I received a communication from you, dated June 12, 1918, signed John A. McCollum, Acting Chief of Bureau, reading as follows:

"I transmit herewith a proposed form of contract between The City of New York and the Union Railway Company of New York City, amending the contract dated May 18, 1917, authorizing said Company to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway extension upon and along Amsterdam and Nagle avenues and Dyckman street, Borough of Manhattan. The amendment consists in an extension of time in which to commence and complete construction of the railway. The proposed form of contract is submitted for your approval as to form.

"By direction of the Committee on Franchises, this matter has been placed upon the calendar of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its meeting to be held Friday, June 14, 1918. I would, therefore, be indebted if your approval of the contract could be received prior to said meeting.

"Two copies of the contract are enclosed, in order that one copy may be retained in your files.

"I am also enclosing herewith a copy of the original contract between the City and the Company."

The said contract is herewith returned, approved as to form.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the petition dated March 18, 1918, of the Union Railway Company of New York City, for a modification or cancellation of contract granting said Company a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway, from West 207th street and Amsterdam avenue, along Amsterdam avenue to Nagle avenue, to Dyckman street, to the easterly line of the right of way of the New York Central Railroad at the foot of Dyckman street, Borough of Manhattan, be denied in all respects, except in so far as said petition applies for an extension of time to commence and complete construction of said railway.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

The following resolution was offered:

Whereas, The Union Railway Company of New York City has, by a petition dated March 18, 1918, made application to this Board for a cancellation or certain modifications in and to the contract dated May 18, 1917, granting the said Company the right to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway extension upon and along Amsterdam and Nagle avenues and Dyckman street, from West 207th street to the right of way of the New York Central Railroad Company, near the foot of Dyckman street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and for an extension of time within which to commence and complete construction of said street surface railway; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905 and chapter 467 of the Laws of 1914, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on May 10, 1918, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as May 24, 1918, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "New York American" and "New York Evening World," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the proposed modification and amendment of said contract of May 18, 1917; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the consent or right applied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to certain modifications in the terms and conditions of the said contract of May 18, 1917, such modified terms and conditions being fully set forth and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying such terms and conditions as modify or alter said contract of May 18, 1917, which said contract otherwise remains unchanged as to all the other terms and conditions expressed therein, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

#### Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made and executed, in duplicate, this day of , 1918, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City, a domestic corporation (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, By a contract dated May 18, 1917, by and between the City and the Company, said Company was granted the right to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway extension upon and along Amsterdam and Nagle Avenues and Dyckman Street from West 207th Street to the right of way of the New York Central Railroad Company near the foot of said Dyckman Street, Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, Section 2, Eighth, of said contract of May 18, 1917, provides for the commencement and completion of construction of said extension and placing the same in full operation by certain fixed dates; and

Whereas, The Company, on August 18, 1917, filed with the Board consents of abutting property owners for the construction and operation of said extension; and

Whereas, Under said Section 2, Eighth, the time for commencement of construction expired September 18, 1917, and the time for completing said extension and placing the same in full operation expired November 18, 1917; and

Whereas, By a resolution adopted by this Board September 21, 1917, and approved by the Mayor October 5, 1917, the Company was granted an extension of time in which to commence construction up to and including March 18, 1918, and an extension of time in which to complete construction and place said extension in operation up to and including May 18, 1918; and

Whereas, The Company has, by a petition dated March 18, 1918, applied to this Board for a cancellation of said contract of May 18, 1917, or for certain amendments and modifications in and to said contract, and that pending the decision of the Board as to the cancellation or modification of said contract, that the Company be granted an extension of time for the commencement and completion of construction.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) to be paid by the Company to the City on or before September 1, 1918, and of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The parties hereto hereby consent, subject to the provisions and conditions hereinafter set forth, that said contract of May 18, 1917, be modified and amended, as follows:

Section 2, Eighth, of said contract, as amended by said resolution approved October 5, 1917, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway hereby authorized on or before September 18, 1918, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation on or before November 18, 1918; otherwise this right and privilege shall cease and determine, and all sums which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City as liquidated damages for failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board, the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings."

Section 2. It is mutually understood and agreed that, except as expressly provided herein, nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to affect in any manner the provisions of the contract entered into between the City and the Company, dated May 18, 1917, as amended by said resolution approved October 5, 1917, and the Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in such contract of May 18, 1917, as modified by said resolution and as further modified or altered by the provisions of this instrument.



Section 3. This contract shall take effect on the date of the execution thereof by the Mayor.

In Witness Whereof, The party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, before authorizing any contract for the consent of the City to certain modifications and amendments in and to the terms and conditions of the said contract of May 18, 1917, such modifications and amendments being fully set forth and described in the foregoing form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, and before adopting any resolution authorizing such contract, will, at a meeting of said Board to be held in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on Friday, July 12, 1918, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., hold a public hearing thereon, at which citizens shall be entitled to appear and be heard.

Resolved, That a notice of such hearing, stating that copies of the proposed contract and resolution of consent thereto may be obtained by all those interested therein at the Bureau of Franchises, Room 1307, Municipal Building, Centre and Chambers streets, Borough of Manhattan, shall be published at least twice at the expense of the proposed grantee during the ten (10) days immediately prior to Friday, July 12, 1918, in the "New York American" and the "New York Evening World," the two daily newspapers in which the petition and notice of hearing thereon have been published.

A., requesting an emergency permit be granted to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company for a temporary track connection at 1st avenue and 63d street, Borough of Brooklyn, connecting the two tracks of the Bush Terminal Railroad Company in 1st avenue with tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company in the railroad yard immediately south of 63d street.

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 74), this matter was referred to the Committee on Franchises.)

Denial of the joint application of the New York Consolidated Railroad Company, South Brooklyn Railway Company and Bush Terminal Railroad Company, for permission to install, maintain and operate two tracks at the intersection of 1st avenue and 63d street, Borough of Brooklyn.

(On September 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 273), this matter was referred to the Committee on Franchises.)

Subject—Permit for railroad connection at 63d street and 1st avenue, Brooklyn.

1. In the development of the Army Supply Base, South Brooklyn, it becomes necessary that a temporary track connection be made between the Long Island Railroad and the two tracks of the Bush Terminal Railroad Company, at present located in 1st avenue, near 63d street.

2. The work in question is required by the War Department in its emergency construction and request is hereby respectfully made that a temporary emergency permit be granted the Bush Terminal Railroad Company covering same.

Committee on Franchises of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, June 11, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held May 24, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on Franchises a petition dated May 9, 1918, by Major H. S. Crocker, of the Constructing Quartermaster's Department, War Department, U. S. A., requesting that an emergency permit be granted to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company for a temporary track connection at First avenue and 63d street, Borough of Brooklyn, connecting the two tracks of the Bush Terminal Railroad Company in First avenue with tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company in the railroad yard immediately south of 63d street.

The petition states that the connection between the said railroads has become necessary in the development of the army supply base now in process of erection on the land situated between 58th and 63d streets, Second avenue and New York Bay. Your Committee is informed that the tracks are to be used for the delivery of materials and equipment in connection with the construction of the army supply base, which it is anticipated will be completed in about one year.

The Bureau of Franchises reports that the administrative Departments of the City having jurisdiction have no objection to the track. The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requests that a provision be incorporated in any consent which may be granted, allowing that Department access at all times to the portion of the street crossed by the track for the purpose of installing new mains or repairing existing ones; the track to be shored up by and protected at the expense of the grantee during such work. A provision to that effect appears in the form of resolution granting consent, herewith submitted.

Your Committee has examined into the matter, and recommends that consent be granted in the customary revocable form, but not to extend beyond eighteen months after the date of approval by the Mayor, and that the consent provide that the connection shall be used solely for the purpose of operating cars to and from the army supply base.

In accordance with the procedure of the Board in granting privileges for war purposes only, and where any costs in connection with such privileges would be paid by the United States Government, the customary compensation is expressly waived in the resolution granting consent, herewith submitted for adoption.

The New York Consolidated Railroad Company, the South Brooklyn Railway Company and the Bush Terminal Railroad Company presented a joint petition dated January 4, 1917, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a railroad track at this same location, connecting the Bush Terminal Railroad Company's tracks in First avenue with tracks of the New York Consolidated Railroad Company in the freight yard south of 63d street. The petition was referred to the Bureau of Franchises on February 9, 1917, and a report by that Bureau was presented to the Board at the meeting held June 29, 1917, and at the request of the petitioners, the matter was laid over until September 21, 1917, on which latter date it was referred

to the Committee on Franchises. At the meeting held December 28, 1917, it was referred back to the Bureau of Franchises, and since that date the petitioners have not progressed the matter.

The track now petitioned for by the War Department will interfere with the track requested in the petition of January 4, 1917, and in consequence, your Committee recommends that the petition of that date be denied. A resolution denying the petition is herewith submitted. Respectfully,

Whereas, By ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York January 31, 1905, which duly became effective February 14, 1905, consent was granted to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company to construct, maintain and operate a double track surface railroad in, upon and along certain streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, including 1st avenue, from 41st street to 63d street; all as shown on a plan accompanying the application of said railroad company and entitled:

"Map showing plan of tracks of Bush Terminal Railroad Company on application for franchise from City of New York"

—and dated July 19, 1904, and signed Irving T. Bush, President, and E. P. Goodrich, Engineer; and

Whereas, Section 1 of the said ordinance provides that additional switches, crossovers and spurs may be permitted by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and

Whereas, The War Department, Office of the Constructing Quartermaster, by Major H. S. Crocker, presented a petition dated May 9, 1918, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting that permission be granted to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company to construct, maintain and operate tracks at the intersection of 1st avenue and 63d street, Borough of Brooklyn, connecting its tracks in 1st avenue with tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company in the railroad yard immediately south of 63d street, said tracks to be used to operate cars to or from the Army Supply Base now in process of erection between 58th and 63d streets, 2d avenue and New York Bay; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company to construct, maintain and operate tracks at 1st avenue and 63d street, Borough of Brooklyn, connecting the two tracks of the Bush Terminal Railroad Company in 1st avenue with tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company in the railroad yard south of 63d street, the said tracks to be used solely to operate cars to and from the Army Supply Base between 58th and 63d streets, in order to facilitate and expedite the erection of the supply base.

The tracks hereby authorized are to be shown on a plan entitled:

"Plan of temporary connection, 62d-63d streets and 1st avenue for South Brooklyn Army Supply Base to accompany application of Bush Terminal Railroad Co., Brooklyn, N. Y., to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of New York. Drawing No. 1459. May 13, 1918."

—and signed, R. G. Simmonds, Vice-President, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof upon the following terms and conditions:

1. This consent shall continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and shall be revocable upon sixty (60) days' notice in writing to the grantee, but in no case shall it extend beyond eighteen (18) months after the date of the approval of this consent by the Mayor and thereupon all rights of the grantee in said avenue, by virtue of this consent, shall cease and determine.

2. In accordance with the procedure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in granting privileges to be used for war purposes only, and where any cost in connection with such privilege would be paid by the United States Government, the customary compensation is expressly waived.

3. Upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent, the grantee shall cause the tracks hereby authorized to be removed and all of said streets to be restored to their proper and original condition, if required so to do by The City of New York or its duly authorized representatives, and the entire cost of such work shall be borne by the said grantee. If the tracks hereby authorized shall not be required to be removed, it is agreed that they shall become the property of The City of New York.

4. In the event of the City desiring to make repairs to existing substructures or to construct new substructures in the said streets, the grantee shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks hereby authorized, together with their appurtenances, in such manner as may be directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such work and so as to avoid interference with the work of repairing or installing the said substructures.

5. The right to install, maintain and operate the said tracks is subject to the hereinabove set forth terms and conditions and to all the terms and conditions contained in the ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen January 31, 1905, which duly became effective February 14, 1905, granting consent to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company to construct, maintain and operate its said railroad, as hereinabove recited.

6. This consent shall be null and void unless the said grantee shall duly execute an instrument in writing, wherein said grantee shall accept this consent and shall promise, covenant and agree to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained and file said instrument with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York within thirty (30) days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

And the said grantee shall promise, covenant and agree in said instrument to hold The City of New York harmless from all damages to persons or property which may result from the construction, use, maintenance or operation of the tracks hereby authorized.

Resolved, That the said petition be and it hereby is denied.

#### **Cornelius J. and John V. Gleason (Cal. No. 11).**

Denial of application of Cornelius J. and John V. Gleason for a franchise to operate a bus line from Fordham road and Webster avenue to Pelham Bay Park, Borough of The Bronx.

(On March 28, 1918 (Cal. No. 69), this matter was referred to the Committee on Franchises.)

The Secretary presented the following:

Committee on Franchises of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, June 7, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board held March 28, 1918, there was referred to this Committee the application of Cornelius J. and John V. Gleason, individuals,



for a franchise to maintain and operate a bus line between the corner of Fordham road and Webster avenue and the main entrance of the Naval Reserve Training Station at Pelham Bay Park. Your Committee thereafter directed the Bureau of Franchises to take this matter up and obtain from the Corporation Counsel an opinion as to the power of the Board to grant a franchise for a bus line to individuals.

Accordingly, the Bureau of Franchises requested the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board on this point, and in an opinion dated May 21, 1918, the Corporation Counsel holds that while the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has power to grant franchises to individuals, the provisions of the laws governing such matters are such as to make it inadvisable for the Board to make such grants. The following is quoted from the opinion:

"Notwithstanding that such is the power of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as a matter of sound policy, based largely upon legal considerations, I am of the opinion that it is decidedly preferable, and in that sense necessary, for your Board to require applicants for franchises of this class to incorporate as a condition of making a grant to them. Such has been the well established policy of your Board with regard to the grant of franchises generally within The City of New York. (See opinions of the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York, March 10, 1910, September 2, 1911, February 2, 1912.)"

In view of this opinion, your Committee recommends that the Board deny the application of Messrs. Cornelius J. and John V. Gleason, without prejudice to a future application to be made when a corporation has been formed under chapter 142 of the Laws of 1854, the only law for the incorporation of omnibus companies applicable to The City of New York. Respectfully,

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

#### Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements.

**Sickles Street, from Sherman Avenue to Broadway, and from Arden Street to Broadway, and New Street (Dongan Place), from Broadway to Arden Street, Borough of Manhattan—Closing, Discontinuing and Laying Out (Cal. No. 12).**

(On February 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 18), a plan showing the closing of Sickles street and the laying out of Vermilyea avenue, from Dyckman street to Broadway, was referred to the Borough President, with the recommendation that the portion of Vermilyea avenue between Dyckman and Arden streets be omitted.)

(On April 19, 1918 (Cal. No. 50), this matter was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated April 8, 1918, from the Secretary, Borough of Manhattan, transmitting for approval map showing proposed change; and the following report of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

June 5, 1918.

#### Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on April 19, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a communication from the Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan presenting for approval a map showing the proposed discontinuing and closing of Sickles street, from Sherman avenue to Broadway, and laying out a new street designated as Dongan place, between Broadway and Arden street, Borough of Manhattan (Calendar No. 50).

At a meeting held on February 8, 1918, a plan showing the closing of Sickles street, between the limits named above and laying out Vermilyea avenue, from Dyckman street to Broadway, was, after consideration, referred back to the Borough President with the recommendation of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements that it be amended by excluding the portion of Vermilyea avenue, between Dyckman and Arden streets.

The plan now presented is in conformity with the general recommendation of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements, but includes a further modification in the treatment of Vermilyea avenue by giving it a somewhat different position and designating it as Dongan place.

In the opinion of the Committee the new plan is preferable to the one suggested by the Committee in its previous report inasmuch as it results in a better subdivision of the abnormally large irregular block bounded by Broadway, Arden street and Sherman avenue, and it is believed that it will permit a better and more economical development of the property within the block.

The Committee, therefore, recommends approval of the plan after the necessary public hearing. Respectfully submitted,

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 20th day of September, 1918.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

**Guion Place, from St. Lawrence Avenue to Beach Avenue, Borough of The Bronx—Establishing Lines and Grades (Cal. No. 13).**

(On April 19, 1918 (Cal. No. 56), this matter was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated April 9, 1918, from the President, Borough of The Bronx, transmitting for approval map showing proposed change; and the following report of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

June 5, 1918.

#### Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on April 19, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, submitting for approval a map showing lines and grades for Guion place, from St. Lawrence avenue to Beach avenue (Cal. No. 56).

Guion place is intended to subdivide the block bounded by St. Lawrence avenue, Merrill street, Beach avenue and Tacoma street, having a length of about 400 feet and a depth of 237 to 282 feet. The plan shows the street 40 feet in width for a distance of 120 feet from St. Lawrence avenue, and a width of 45 feet for a distance of about 92 feet, from Beach avenue, the north side of the street being a straight line, while on the southern side there is a section not parallel with the opposite side

of the street, forming a transition from a width of 40 feet to a width of 45 feet. The purpose of the additional width near Beach avenue is to make the straight line correspond with a property line, avoiding thereby consequential damage or the payment for property not actually included within the street lines.

While this irregularity in line would be objectionable in a street of greater length or one which would be likely to become a traffic artery, the Committee considers it unimportant in this instance, and recommends the approval of the plan after the necessary public hearing. Respectfully submitted,

**Harlem River Terrace, Between Cedar Avenue and a Point 480 Feet South of Fordham Road, and Cedar Avenue, from Harlem River Terrace to a Point 390 Feet South of West 182d Street, Borough of The Bronx—Changing Grades (Cal. No. 14).**

(On April 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 151-A), this matter was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated April 17, 1918, from the President, Borough of The Bronx, transmitting for approval map showing proposed change; and the following report of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

June 5, 1918.

#### Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on April 26, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated April 17, 1918, submitting for approval a plan showing a proposed change in the grades of Harlem River terrace between Cedar avenue and a grade point about 480 feet south of Fordham road, and of Cedar avenue from Harlem River terrace to a grade point 390 feet south of West 182d street, Borough of The Bronx (Calendar No. 151).

Under the grades heretofore adopted for Harlem River Terrace a rate of grade of nearly 6 per cent. was planned for about 150 feet north of Cedar avenue. It is now proposed to raise the grade at the angle point north of Cedar avenue 4.6 feet, resulting in decreasing the rate of grade to less than 4 per cent. The plan also includes a slight adjustment in the platform at the intersection of Cedar avenue and Harlem River terrace.

Cedar avenue has been regulated, graded and macadamized, but the abutting property is unimproved. Harlem River terrace adjoins the right of way of the New York Central Railroad but the street is not in use and is at an elevation considerably below grade. The effect of the proposed change will be to increase somewhat the cost of improving the street but in other respects the modification is clearly desirable.

The Committee recommends that a public hearing be given upon the plan and that it be approved if favored by those interested, but with the understanding that the physical improvement of the street will be deferred until such time as it is shown that the expense will not be greater than can be met by local assessment.

#### Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

**Lexington Avenue, Easterly Side, Between 24th and 25th Streets, Borough of Manhattan—Amendment of Building Zone Resolution (Cal. No. 16).**

(On May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 43), this matter was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements.)

The Secretary presented a petition dated April 8, 1918, of the Empire Trust Company and Lextwill Realty Corporation, in this matter; and the following report of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 17, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a communication from the Empire Trust Company and the Lextwill Realty Corporation requesting an amendment to Use District Map, Section No. 8, so as to change from a business to an unrestricted district the block on the east side of Lexington avenue, between East 24th and East 25th streets, Borough of Manhattan (Calendar No. 43).

The Committee referred this matter to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, who, on May 29th, gave a hearing in his office, notice of which was served upon the property owners interested. The Borough President reports that at this hearing the original petitioners were represented but nobody appeared in opposition.

The present Use District plans restrict Lexington avenue, between East 22d and East 34th streets to business, while the sections immediately north and south are residential. The cross streets on both sides of Lexington avenue, from East 22d to East 34th streets are also restricted to business with the exception of East 24th street, which is unrestricted from Lexington avenue to the East River. The petitioners desire to erect a garage fronting on Lexington avenue next to the property on the southeast corner of East 25th street, with a wing extending to the last named street. While this block of 25th street has been, as above noted, restricted to business, a large portion of it is occupied by the Fiss, Doerr and Carroll horse market. It is said that when the building of a subway in lower Lexington avenue was about to be undertaken, the construction of a high class apartment house was begun on the property in question, and that when this part of the Lexington avenue line was abandoned the building operations were stopped and, although the plot was excavated and a certain amount of steel had been erected, nothing more has been done, and in its present condition it is unsanitary and an eye sore.

In view of the absence of any opposition to the proposed change at the time of the hearing given by the Borough President, the Committee recommends that the Board give a public hearing on a proposed amendment to Use District Map, Section No. 8, so as to change the easterly side of Lexington avenue, between 24th and 25th streets from a business to an unrestricted district. Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 25, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a petition of N. H. (On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 137), this matter was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements.)

The Secretary presented a petition, verified December 1 and 3, 1917, from Katherine Becker and others in this matter; and the following report of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held

on January 11, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a petition of Katherine Becker and others, requesting an amendment to Use District Map Section No. 13, so as to change from a business to a residence district both sides of Bushwick avenue between Myrtle and DeKalb avenues, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 137).

This petition had been presented to the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which Board, on December 14, 1917, laid the matter over until January 11th, following.

The petition alleges that the buildings fronting on Bushwick avenue have been for many years and still are almost exclusively used for residential purposes, with the exception of two small stores. It is said that the dwellings are used by private families and that there is no demand for the use of the property in this district for business purposes, it being situated but one block distant from Broadway, the main business thoroughfare.

Your Committee referred this petition to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, who advises the Committee that he has given a public hearing in his office, at which there was one appearance in opposition and five in favor of the petition, and the Borough President advises that the petition be approved after a public hearing by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Your Committee therefore recommends that the Board fix a day for a public hearing on a proposed amendment to Use District Map Section No. 13, so as to change both sides of Bushwick avenue, between Myrtle and DeKalb avenues, from a business to a residence district. Respectfully submitted.

No. 19).**

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. Nos. 58 and 141), the requests in this matter were referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements.)

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Newtown District on December 13, 1917, and a communication, dated January 4, 1918, from Hon. Charles Haubert, Alderman, 63d District, Brooklyn, transmitting petition of Leonard W. Drenkard and twenty-six property owners in this matter; and the following report of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 11, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a petition of L. W. Drenkard and others for the amendment of Use District Map, Section No. 13, so as to change from a business to a residence district both sides of Irving avenue, from Palmetto street to Halsey street, and Woodbine street, Madison street and Putnam avenue, between Irving avenue and Ridgewood place, and to change from an unrestricted to a residence district Cornelia street, Jefferson avenue, Hancock street and Weirfield street, between Irving avenue and the line between the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, all of these changes being in the Borough of Brooklyn (Calendar No. 58).

There was also referred to your Committee on the same date a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Newtown District of the Borough of Queens, recommending an amendment to Use District Map, Section No. 13, by changing from an unrestricted to a business district both sides of Wyckoff avenue, between Putnam avenue and Halsey street, and from an unrestricted to a residence district Putnam avenue, Cornelia street, Jefferson avenue, Hancock street and Weirfield street, between Wyckoff avenue and the line between the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, except the right-of-way of the Long Island Railroad (Cal. No. 141).

These two changes affect the same district and will be considered as a single change, the borough line at this place passing diagonally across the blocks affected.

The petition relating to the portion of this district in the Borough of Brooklyn was referred to the President of the Borough, who gave a hearing at his office, at which it appears that there was no opposition to the proposed change and the Borough President has recommended approval of same.

The Queens petition, as already stated, has been approved by the Local Board of the Newtown District.

The portion of Wyckoff avenue covered by the petition and all of the streets between Wyckoff avenue and Irving avenue, with the exception of the portions of Palmetto, Woodbine and Madison streets and Putnam avenue, between Irving avenue and Ridgewood place, are entirely unrestricted. Irving avenue, together with the portions of Palmetto, Woodbine and Madison streets and Putnam avenue, last referred to, and the southerly side of Ridgewood place, are restricted to business. It is now proposed to change Wyckoff avenue from an unrestricted to a business street; Irving avenue from a business to a residence street; the four unrestricted blocks of Cornelia street, Jefferson avenue, Hancock street and Weirfield street, between Irving avenue and Wyckoff avenue, from unrestricted to residence streets; Woodbine street, Madison street and Putnam avenue, between Irving avenue and Ridgewood place, from business to residence streets, and the portion of Putnam avenue, between Wyckoff avenue and the borough line, from an unrestricted to a residence street, leaving a short section of this street, between Ridgewood place and the borough line, still unrestricted, while the north side of Ridgewood place and the portions of Woodbine and Madison streets, between Ridgewood place and Wyckoff avenue, would remain unrestricted as at present.

The Committee is convinced that these changes are universally desired by the property owners in this neighborhood and that the proposed classification is substantially in harmony with the use to which the property is now put, and recommends that the Board give a hearing on the proposed change. Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 10, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated April 30, 1918, submitting for approval a proposed modification in the drainage plan for Sewerage District No. 23-O (Cal. No. 92).

The Committee finds that this plan relates to the two blocks of Chambers street between Greenwich and West streets. The existing sewer appears to have been built before 1850, and is in such condition as to require reconstruction. Under the plan now presented, it is proposed to substitute a sewer of slightly smaller size, but ample for the needs of the district. Plans under consideration for the future interception and treatment of sewage for this district will, if carried out, permit a sewer about three feet lower than the one now proposed, but in case the deeper sewers are later desired in order to meet the sanitary needs of the territory, the sewer to be built in the immediate future can be utilized for surface water.

The plan appears to the Committee to be a proper one, and its approval is recommended. Respectfully submitted,

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 2, 1918, from the Acting President, Borough of Brooklyn, transmitting map showing proposed modification; and the following report of the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

June 5, 1918.

#### **Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 10, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated May 2, 1918, requesting approval of a modification in the drainage plan for Map DD, District No. 50 (Calendar No. 96).

The Committee finds that this plan relates to one block of Carroll street, between Troy and Schenectady avenues, in which, under the existing sewer plan, a summit was to be introduced coinciding in position with a summit in the street grade. In order to provide sewerage facilities for this block it would, therefore, be necessary to provide outlets in both Troy and Schenectady avenues. The change consists in carrying the sewer outletting in Schenectady avenue to a point 100 feet east of Troy avenue, rendering it unnecessary to build any sewer in the westerly 100 feet of the block. This will result in a substantial saving in sewer construction and will permit the installation of sewerage facilities without waiting for an outlet sewer in both avenues.

The Committee believe the plan to be a proper one and recommends its approval. Respectfully submitted,

#### **Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 17, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated May 8, 1918, submitting for approval a proposed modification in the drainage plan for Sewerage District No. 43-G-6 (Cal. No. 60).

The Committee finds that this plan relates to sewers in portions of Wheeler, Elder, Boynton, Close, Evergreen and Westchester avenues. The changes are based upon the discontinuance of summits located in each of the blocks, except Westchester avenue, and carrying the drainage entirely in one direction, making it possible thereby to omit a portion of the sewer at one end of each block. The plan will result in a substantial saving in sewer construction.

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 15, 1918, from the President, Borough of The Bronx, submitting statement of preliminary work performed in this matter; and the following report of the Committee on Finance and Budget:

#### **To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On May 24, 1918 (Calendar No. 91), your Board submitted to the Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated May 15, 1918, from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, submitting statement of the preliminary work performed in the matter of a sewer in Schofield street from City Island avenue to the proposed bulkhead line of Long Island Sound, together with all work incidental thereto, in the Borough of The Bronx, for which preliminary authorization was granted by the Board on April 26, 1918 (Cal. It is also recommended that title be vested in the City on August 1, 1918, to the sewer easement along the prolongation of Schofield street, from the mean high water line of Long Island Sound to a point about 378 feet easterly therefrom.

**Jersey Street, from Its Intersection with the Northerly Terminus of the Dedicated Portion of Jersey Street at a Point About 212 Feet North of Richmond Terrace to the Pier and Bulkhead Line, Borough of Richmond—Acquiring Title (Cal. No. 26).**

(On May 3, 1918 (Cal. No. 74), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted April 23, 1918, by the Local Board, Staten Island District, herein; and the following report of the Committee on Finance and Budget:

June 11, 1918.

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 3, 1918, there was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget a resolution of the Local Board of the Staten Island District, Borough of Richmond, adopted on April 23, 1918, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to the undedicated portion of Jersey street, extending from a point about 212 feet north of Richmond terrace to the pier and bulkhead line.

On June 7 a resolution was adopted by the Board fixing June 28 as the date for a public hearing in the matter of laying out Jersey street, from Richmond terrace to the pier and bulkhead lines, at which time the arguments of the property owners and residents of the locality in favor of and against the plan will be presented.

The property to be acquired for the proposed extension of the street is now being improved, and, if the street is to be given recognition, it would seem desirable that the plan be put into effect at the earliest date practicable, in order to avoid payment for new structures which would have to be removed.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that a hearing be also given by the Board on June 28th, concerning the district of assessment on which the cost of acquiring the street will be placed, and that, in case the street plan is approved, a resolution be adopted initiating proceedings for acquiring a fee title to that portion of the street described by the Local Board, with provision for placing the entire expense upon the area shown upon a diagram herewith presented. 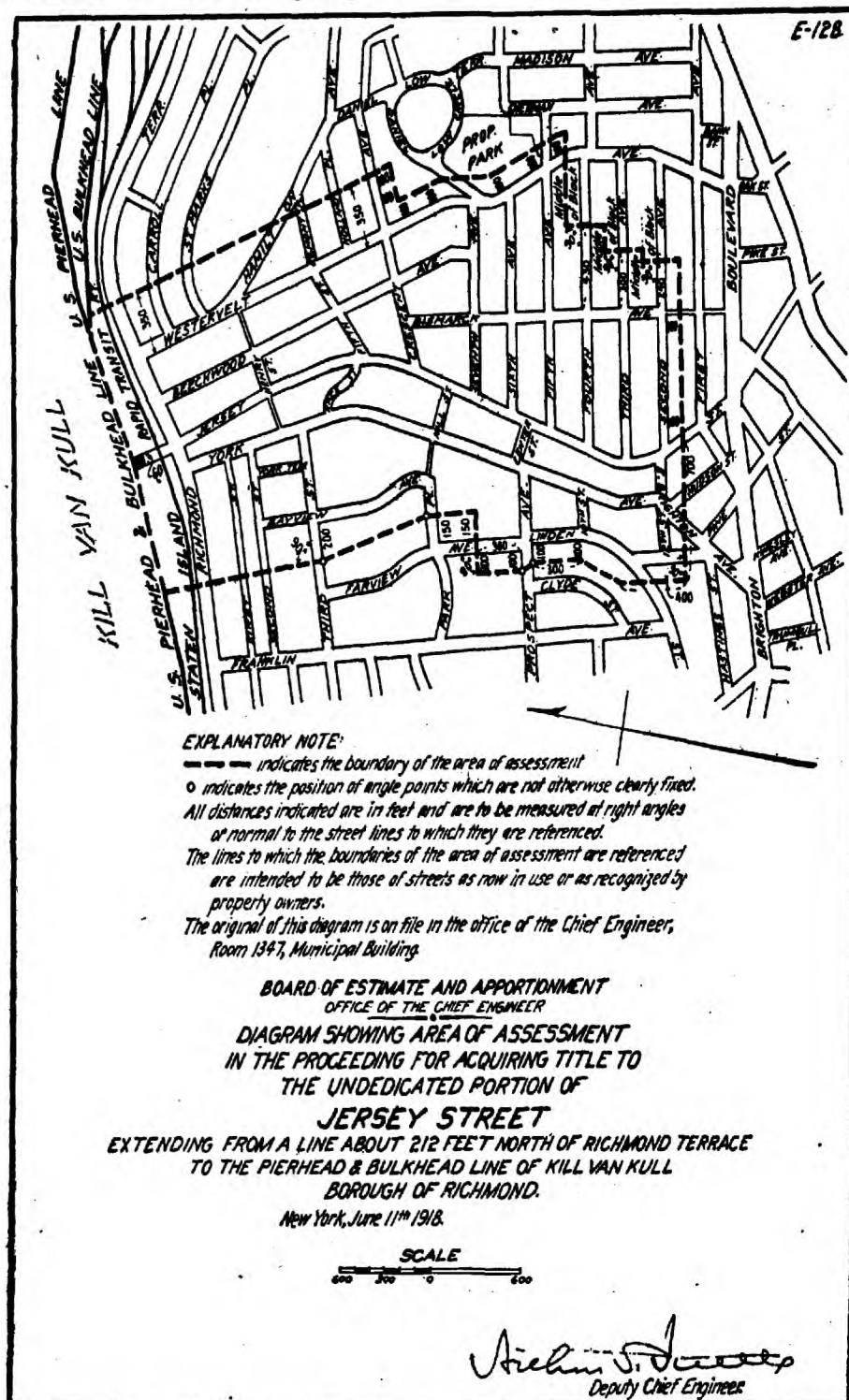

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 22, 1918, from the Fire Commissioner herein; and the following report of the Committee on Finance and Budget:

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 135), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated May 22, 1918, from the Fire Commissioner, transmitting for approval plans and specifications for alterations and repairs to quarters of Hook and Ladder No. 109, located at 633 Fourth avenue, Brooklyn, at an estimated cost of \$3,200.

From a report made to your Committee by an Engineer attached to the Secretary's office, the following appears:

"The building which it is proposed to alter and repair was formerly a 'Volunteer' house, is built of brick, two stories high, with a one-story brick extension, has a wooden apparatus floor, a dirt cellar floor, no heating plant and is lighted by gas.

"The work proposed consists of a new concrete apparatus floor, a concrete cellar floor and steps, pointing up all exterior walls and painting same, installation of new and larger entrance doors, new skylight on extension, painting on first floor, repairs to windows and other minor repairs. No work on the interior of the second story is contemplated at this time.

"The alterations as proposed are necessary and will put the exterior and the lower portion of the interior in good condition and will better adapt the building for the use of the motor vehicles.

"The plans and specifications are satisfactory and the estimate of cost, \$3,200, is reasonable. There is a sufficient balance in the funds to which the cost is to be charged, as follows:

C. F. D.—21, Fire Department, Sites and Buildings, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens .....	\$1,600 00

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 71), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated May 23, 1918, from the Fire Commissioner requesting approval of expenditure of \$841.81 from corporate stock funds to provide for the installation of brass numerals on 226 independent post doors and 1,320 twin post doors of fire alarm boxes.

From a report made to your Committee by an Engineer attached to the Secretary's office, the following appears:

"On May 31, 1918, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the purchase of 5,700 cast brass numerals one inch in height, with studs for riveting to fire alarm box doors of the new fire alarm telegraph system in the Borough of Manhattan for the purpose of numbering them. In order to fasten the proper numerals to the doors of the boxes it will be necessary to drill two holes through the cast iron door for each numeral and to rivet the numeral in place by means of the studs cast on its back.

"The estimate of cost is not excessive and there is a sufficient unencumbered balance in the corporate stock fund entitled 'C. F. D.—3-B, Fire Alarm Telegraph, Borough of Manhattan, Installation of New System,' to provide for the proposed expenditure."

Your Committee at its meeting on June 10, 1918, determined to recommend the granting of the request.

**Department of Public Charities—Approval of Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 29).**

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 116), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated May 20, 1918, from the Commissioner of Public Charities herein; and the following report of the Committee on Finance and Budget:

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 116), your Board submitted to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated May 20, 1918, from the Commissioner of Public Charities, transmitting for consideration specifications for furnishing all labor and materials required for painting all plaster walls, ceilings, etc., in the bedrooms of the Male Dormitory at Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island, at an estimated cost of \$449.60.

From a report submitted to your Committee by an Engineer attached to the Secretary's office, the following appears:

"The contract for the construction of the building did not include the painting of the plaster walls and ceilings. All except 39 bedrooms in this building have been painted since the building was completed. This request is for painting the walls and ceilings of the 39 bedrooms. Painting is usually included in the construction contract. The department has obtained informal bids for this work, the lowest being \$523."

It is reported to your Committee that the past practice has been to meet expenditures of this character by the sale of long term corporate stock, and such a recommendation has been made to your Committee in this case. Your Committee, however, is of the opinion that the expense of this work should be met from the budgetary appropriation of the Charities Department.

At its meeting held June 3, 1918, your Committee determined to recommend the granting of the request upon that basis.

**Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Approval of Contract, Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 30).**

(On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 75), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated May 31, 1918, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity herein; and the following report of the Committee on Finance and Budget:

June 11, 1918.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 75), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated May 31, 1918, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, transmitting form of contract, specifications, etc., for furnishing, delivering, unloading, stacking and storing valves in Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, at an estimated cost of \$5,760.

From a report made to your Committee by an Engineer attached to the Secretary's Office, the following appears:

"The proposed contract provides for the purchase of 200 six-inch and 20 eight-inch valves, to be used in connection with new extensions of small mains.

"Valves of these sizes are in constant demand because most of the small extensions are of eight-inch diameter, and a six-inch valve is required for every new hydrant connection.

"A contract for materials, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in 1918, provided for valves to be used in Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, but no materials for Manhattan and The Bronx were requested from corporate stock funds at that time, owing to the fact that there were not sufficient funds available.

"The quantities requested are moderate; the estimate of cost is based on latest bid prices, and the form of contract is standard.

"The cost is to be charged against the corporate stock fund 'C.D.W. 39D, Water Supply System, All Boroughs, Improvements and Extensions,' which was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in an amount of \$197,000 on May 3, 1918, which is practically intact."

Your Committee at its meeting on June 10, 1918, determined to recommend the granting of the request.

**Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Approval of Contract, Plans, Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 31).**

(On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 76), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 29, 1918, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity herein; and the following report of the Committee on Finance and Budget:

June 11, 1918.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 76), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated May 29, 1918, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, transmitting for approval, form of contract, specifications, etc., for hauling and laying cast and wrought iron water mains and appurtenances across Alley Creek, at Jackson Avenue, Borough of Queens, at an estimated cost of \$5,585.30.

From a report made to your Committee by an Engineer attached to the Secretary's Office, the following appears:

"The proposed new pipe line consists of about 85 feet of eight-inch wrought iron pipe on pile foundation, crossing Alley Creek about six feet below mean low water level, and connected by twelve inch cast iron pipe to the existing line in Jackson Avenue.

"This line is to be the main feed to Little Neck and Douglaston, which sections are too high to be reached by the Catskill pressure, and are, therefore, dependent on assistance from the Bayside pumping station.

Alley Creek is now crossed by a twelve-inch, flexible jointed, submerged pipe line, but the leakage in this line is excessive, and owing to the very soft ground, it cannot be maintained in reasonably tight condition.

"The quantity of water required in Little Neck and Douglaston is about 300,000 gallons daily, but the present pipe line shows a leakage of over 1,000,000 gallons daily, so that it is necessary to waste both fuel and water.

"To reduce the cost of operation and to conserve fuel, a Pelton wheel, to be run by Catskill water, was installed at the Bayside station in 1917, but the wheel

has not sufficient capacity to make up for the leakage in the main, and it has been necessary to continue the steam pumps in service.

"If the proposed new line be installed, the old line will be kept as a reserve line, the leakage will be practically eliminated, the Pelton wheel may be put into service and a saving in cost of fuel and personal service of about \$20 a day effected. Also there will be a saving of water of which the City is very much in need.

"The form of contract, plans and specifications are satisfactory, and the estimate of cost is based on existing market prices.

"The cost of the work is to be charged against the corporate stock fund 'C.D.W. 14, Water Fund, Borough of Queens,' which was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in an additional amount of \$85,000 on May 11, 1917, and in which there is an unencumbered balance of \$19,000."

Your Committee at its meeting on June 10, 1918, determined to recommend the granting of the request.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 77), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated May 23, 1918, from the Commissioner of Correction, requesting approval of increased estimate of cost of \$15,400 for repairing the steamboat "Correction," in order that the contract may be awarded to the lowest bidder.

On April 26, 1918, your Board approved an estimated cost of \$12,000. Bids have been received, the lowest of which is \$15,400. On information received by your Committee, it appears improbable further advertising will result in lower bids. The repairs are urgent.

Your Committee at its meeting on June 10, 1918, determined to recommend the granting of the request.

**Department of Docks and Ferries; Department of Plant and Structures—Transfer of Employees and Appropriation; Establishment of Additional Grades of Positions and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 33).**

(On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 78), the matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 31, 1918, from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, communications dated June 4 and 11, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks herein; and the following report:

June 13, 1918.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—The Committee on Finance and Budget, at its meeting on June 10, 1918, considered two communications, which were referred to it on June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 78), from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, dated May 31, 1918, and the Commissioner of Docks, dated June 4, 1918, calling attention to chapter 646, Laws of 1918, which provides for the transfer of jurisdiction over ferries from the Department of Docks and Ferries to the Department of Plant and Structures, to take effect July 1, 1918, and which authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the funds and employees affected thereby.

The subject was referred to the Secretary of the Board. Since then, on June 11, 1918, the Dock Commissioner submitted a list of the positions which he recommends for transfer to the Department of Plant and Structures.

The Secretary reports that the proposed transfer of funds from "other than personal service" accounts will be submitted by the Commissioner of Docks later in the month.

From the information submitted, it appears that, in the case of the proposed transfer of certain individuals and groups, which were not specifically allowed in the budget for "ferry" purposes, further study will be required to determine whether such are necessary for the maintenance and operation of the ferries.

It is, therefore, recommended by the Secretary that action be deferred on the following items of the request of the Dock Commissioner, dated June 11, 1918:

## Department of Street Cleaning—Expenditure of Corporate Stock Funds (Cal. No. 34).

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 139), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated May 20, 1918, from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, requesting permission to expend the sum of \$2,100.25 out of corporate stock funds to provide for the purchase of machine and hand tools to be used in the machine shop in the Model District Garage, on the pier at the foot of East 19th street, East River, Borough of Manhattan.

The Committee on Finance and Budget reports that the matter had been withdrawn.

The Secretary was directed to return the request to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

## City and County Funds for Salary and Wage Accruals; Various City and County Departments—Transfers of Appropriations (Cal. No. 35).

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 99), the matter was laid over until June 7, 1918, on which date (Cal. No. 91) it was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.) The Secretary presented the following report, the recommendation of the Comptroller being concurred in by the Committee on Finance and Budget:

April 16, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:  
Gentlemen—When the Tax Levy Budget for 1918 was adopted, the following resolution was approved by your Board:

"Second (f)—There shall be credited to the 'Fund for Salary and Wage Accruals from Schedule-Supported Appropriations to Be Expended as Provided in the Budget Resolutions Herewith,' established in this budget for The City of New York and for each of the five counties therein, as soon as practicable after the expiration of each salary or wage period, the accruals during such period of 'Salary, Regular Employees,' and 'Wages, Regular Employees,' but these credits shall be made only upon the submission of reports thereon by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment pursuant to section 237 of the Greater New York Charter."

In accordance therewith, a list of apparent accruals in appropriations for salaries and wages, regular employees, for February, 1918, has been prepared. The various Departments affected were informed of the intention of the Comptroller to recommend the transfer of these accruals, as provided in the above resolution, unless the Departments dissented therefrom.

The resolutions herewith give the details of the proposed transfers as follows:

"Second (g). Salary and wage accruals during the year 1918, resulting from deductions made from the regular rates of salary and wages provided herein for employees of the City and Counties on war service, corresponding to the amounts received by said employees as compensation for such war service, shall be reported by the Comptroller monthly to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for transfer, as provided in section 237 of the Charter, to the 'Fund for the Compensation of Substitutes for City Employees on War Service, who, under the provisions of the State Military Law, continue in the City employment and are carried on the payrolls for the excess of their civil salaries over their military salaries,' established in this budget for The City of New York and for each of the five counties therein."

A statement of accruals for the month of February, 1918, resulting from deductions made from the regular rates of salary and wages for employees of The City of New York and the several counties therein on war service is submitted herewith, and it is recommended that the total amount thereof be transferred from the funds for salary and wage accruals to the funds for the compensation of substitutes for city and county employees on war service:

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 100), the matter was laid over until June 7, 1918, on which date (Cal. No. 92), it was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented the following report, the recommendation of the Comptroller being concurred in by the Committee on Finance and Budget:

May 17, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—When the Tax Levy Budget for 1918 was adopted the following resolution was approved by your Board:

"Second (f)—There shall be credited to the 'Fund for Salary and Wage Accruals from Schedule Supported Appropriations to Be Expended as Provided in the Budget Resolutions Herewith,' established in this budget for The City of New York and for each of the five counties therein, as soon as practicable after the expiration of each salary or wage period, the accruals during such period of 'Salaries, Regular Employees,' and 'Wages, Regular Employees,' but these credits shall be made only upon the submission of reports thereon by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 237 of the Greater New York Charter."

In accordance therewith a list of apparent accruals in appropriations for salaries and wages, regular employees, for March, 1918, has been prepared. The various departments affected were informed of the intention of the Comptroller to recommend the transfer of these accruals, as provided in the above resolution, unless the departments dissented therefrom.

**Department of Street Cleaning—Authority to Fill Vacancy and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 52).**

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, dated June 5, 1918, recommending approval of requests made by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for permission to fill a vacancy and for modification of two temporary and two regular wage schedules, involving a transfer of \$85,000; and stating that it is proposed to fill a vacancy in schedule No. 2325 of Clerk at \$1,500 per annum, due to the retirement of Vilma Goodman, by increasing rate for Harry A. Haufl from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum; that the purpose of the modification is to provide in temporary wage schedule No. 2344 additional lines of Driver at \$3.25 per day (30,625 1-2 days), \$99,532.60; Hostler at \$3.25 per day (1,550 days), \$5,037.40; and Stableman at \$3 per day (1,600 days), \$4,800. Funds are to be provided by reducing the line Loader (Refuse Collector) in the same schedule by \$25,000 and the transfer of \$84,370 from accruals in regular wage schedules Nos. 2340 and 2341; and this modification is necessary, as the department has been unable to secure its full quota of regular Drivers, Hostlers and Stablemen, and is, therefore, compelled to fill such vacancies by the employment of emergency help.

In schedule 2345 it is proposed to provide an additional line of Boardmen at \$3.25 per day (378 1-2 days), \$1,230. Funds are to be provided by reducing the line Laborer at Dumps in the same schedule by \$600, and the transfer of \$630 from schedule 2340.

This modification is necessary, as the contractor has failed to fulfill his contract of disposing of ashes at temporary land dumps, the Department was compelled to assign extra Boardmen at these dumps to check the number of loads of ashes and the time of arrival and departure of carts.

**Various City Departments—Establishment of Additional Grade of Position and Payment of Prevailing Rate of Wages for Stonecutters (Cal. No. 55).**

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 122), this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 15, 1918, from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, advising that his department has been notified by the Granite Cutters' International Association of America that the prevailing rate of pay for Stonecutters on May 1, 1918, became \$5.50 a day; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

June 5, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Plant and Structures on May 15, 1918, transmitted a communication stating that the Granite Cutters International Association had notified him that the prevailing rate for Stone Cutters was \$5.50 per diem (No. 122, Calendar of May 24, 1918). The Commissioner requested consideration of the matter, and if the Board decided that the Stone Cutters employed by the City were entitled to the \$5.50 rate in place of the \$5 rate now paid, he asked for funds and for modification of budget schedules to provide \$166.25 for the wage increase of Stone Cutters employed in his Department.

The prevailing rate for Stone Cutters is \$5.50 per diem. This rate went into effect May 1, 1918, in accordance with agreement made between 85 individuals and firms employing over ninety per cent. of the Stone Cutters in the Greater City, and the Granite Cutters' International Union.

The Secretaries of the General Contractors' Association and the Building Trade Employers' Association state that all members of those organizations employing Stone Cutters have paid the \$5.50 rate since May 1, 1918.

The Business Agent of the Granite Cutters' International Union states that Ninety-seven per cent. of the Stone Cutters in Greater New York are members of the Union, and are receiving the \$5.50 rate.

There are no funds available in the Department of Plant and Structures to meet the mandatory increase. The increased cost for fixing the \$5.50 mandatory rate in the other City Departments for the last eight months of 1918, will approximate \$600.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request of the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, and fixing the compensation of Stone Cutters employed by the City at \$5.50 per diem, effective as of May 1, 1918.

The Committee also recommends that the Comptroller issue special Revenue Bonds, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to provide for the increase in the wages of Stone Cutters employed by the City. Respectfully,

#### Department of Docks and Ferries—Establishment of Additional Grade of Position and Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 56).

(On May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 100), this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 8, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks, submitting for consideration the petition of the Ship Carpenters in the Department of Docks and Ferries herein; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

June 5, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Docks on May 8, 1918, presented a petition from the Ship Carpenters employed in the department for an increase in wages from \$4.50 to \$5.60 per diem and requesting consideration of the matter by the Board.

This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades. (No. 100, Calendar of May 17, 1918.)

The prevailing rate for Ship Carpenters is 70 cents an hour for an eight hour day, or \$5.60 per diem. This rate was fixed on April 6, 1918, by the Wage Adjustment Board of the United States Shipping and Navy Department Emergency Fleet Corporation and made retroactive as of March 11, 1918. Under its decision all Ship Carpenters employed in the North Atlantic ship yards on government work are entitled to \$5.60 per diem for eight hours work, with extra compensation for overtime and holiday work from March 11, 1918.

The \$5.60 rate is also the rate now paid to Ship Carpenters employed by ship builders having private contracts. There are at the present time over 6,000 Ship Carpenters employed in and around Greater New York who are receiving the \$5.60 rate. They represent over eighty-five per cent. of Ship Carpenters in Greater New York. Over 40 ship building and boat building firms in Greater New York are paying the \$5.60 rate.

The increased cost involved for advancing the wages of 16 Ship Carpenters employed in the Dock Department from \$4.50 to \$5.60 per diem from April 1 to December 31 will amount to \$3,949.

There are no funds available in the department to meet the mandatory increase and it is recommended that the Comptroller provide the necessary amount by issue of special revenue bonds, under subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter.

Authority to establish a new rate for Ship Carpenters is vested in the Board of Aldermen under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter.

The Committee recommends that the compensation of Ship Carpenters employed in the Dock Department be fixed at \$5.60 per diem, effective as of April 1, 1918, by the adoption of the attached resolution. Respectfully,

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 124), this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 15, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks, submitting for consideration of the Board, petition of the Tinsmiths and Roofers in the Department of Docks and Ferries for an increase in compensation from \$5 to \$5.60 per day; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

June 5, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Docks on May 15, 1918, presented a petition from the Tinsmiths and Roofers employed in that department for payment of wages at the prevailing rate of \$5.60 per diem.

This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades (No. 124, Calendar of May 24, 1918).

The rate for Tinsmiths and Roofers in City departments has been established at \$5.60 per diem, effective as of Jan. 1, 1918. There is at present no request from the department before the Committee for funds to pay them that rate, or for modification of the schedules to meet the necessary line changes.

The Committee recommends that the Secretary of the Board be directed to



return the communication relating to the rate of pay for Tinsmiths and Roofers to the Dock Commissioner, with the request that the necessary action be taken by him that will permit the providing of the amount required and the revision of the Budget schedules. Respectfully,

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 123), this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 17, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks, submitting for appropriate action by the Board, request of the International Union of Steam Operating Engineers (Local Union No. 84), that the Pile Driver Engineers employed in the Department of Docks and Ferries be paid at the rate of \$7.50 for an 8-hour day, which is said to be the prevailing rate of wages; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

June 5, 1918.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Docks, on May 17, 1918, presented a petition from Local Union No. 184 of the International Union of Steam and Operating Engineers, stating that the prevailing rate for Engineer Pile Drivers had been fixed at \$33 per week, of 44 hours work, and \$7.50 per diem, broken time, and requesting consideration of the matter by the Board.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades (No. 123, Calendar of May 24, 1918).

The prevailing rate for Engineer Pile Drivers in private employ has been at the rate of \$33 per week, 44 hours work, since May 1, 1918. This is at the rate of 75 cents per hour.

The Secretaries of the General Contractors' Association and the Building Trade Employers' Association and the President of the Dock Builders Employers' Organization state that the \$33 per week rate was agreed to between the employers and the local Union of Steam and Operating Engineers, and that over 90 per cent. of Engineer Pile Drivers employed in Greater New York are being paid that rate. Investigation shows that 34 individuals and firms engaged in dock building and other construction work are paying the \$33 per week rate.

The 10 Engineer Pile Drivers employed in the Dock Department are paid at the rate of \$5.50 per diem and are classed as temporary employees. They work 6 days a week, 8 hours a day, or a total of 48 hours a week. The compensation at \$5.50 per diem amounts to \$33 per week, while the prevailing rate for men of the same trade who work only 44 hours a week, or 4 hours less, is also \$33 per week.

The per diem rate for Engineer Pile Drivers employed at private work is really \$6 per diem, as they are employed 44 hours a week, or 5 days of 8 hours at 75 cents an hour and Saturdays 4 hours. The Dock Department men work full time Saturdays.

The fact that Dock Builders and other mechanics in the Dock Department are paid at per diem rates and work 8 hours a day, 6 days a week, would seem to necessitate that the Engineer-Pile Drivers, who work in conjunction with Dock Builders, should continue to work the same number of hours, namely, 48 hours a week.

The rate per hour really paid the Dock Department Engineer-Pile Drivers at the present time is 68¾ cents, which is 6¼ cents an hour and 50 cents a day less than the prevailing rate when compared with the \$33 per week for 44 hours work paid by private employers. There is no broken time rate of \$7.50 per diem in operation in the Dock Department.

The increase in wages of the Engineer-Pile Drivers from \$5.50 to \$6 per diem is mandatory. The cost will be \$833.50, and as there are no funds in the department available to meet the increase, it is recommended that the Comptroller provide the necessary amount by issue of special revenue bonds, under subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter.

Authority to establish a new rate for Engineer-Pile Drivers is vested in the Board of Aldermen under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter.

The Committee recommends that the compensation of Engineer-Pile Drivers employed in the Dock Department be fixed at \$6 per diem, effective as of May 1, 1918, by adoption of the attached resolutions. Respectfully,

On May 28, 1918, Mr. McCormack was examined by the Board of Medical Examiners. The report of the said Board is attached hereto, and states in conclusion:

"In our opinion applicant is permanently unfit for duty and we therefore suggest that you recommend his retirement."

Mr. McCormack's original appointment and subsequent changes in title and rate of compensation were as follows:

Feb. 9, 1903, compensation changed to \$1,500 per annum.

In an affidavit dated May 13, 1918, Mr. McCormack stated that he had never filed a claim or brought suit against The City of New York for the payment of salary or wages or for any other claim, except that about eight years or more ago he filed a claim for services as Commissioner of Deeds; but that he never recovered under said action; and that he has not heard anything regarding the same.

A search of the records in the Law Department discloses that on Aug. 1, 1899, Mr. McCormack was removed from his position as Commissioner of Deeds Clerk in the office of the City Clerk; that on Nov. 27, 1899, he instituted proceedings for reinstatement; that a peremptory writ of mandamus was granted by order entered Dec. 4, 1899; and that this order was certified to the Comptroller for compliance with the provisions of the same on Dec. 8, 1899.

The records of the Law Department also show that on Dec. 30, 1901, Mr. McCormack instituted an action against The City of New York to recover \$344 for alleged services in taking acknowledgments while employed in the City Clerk's Office, which action was discontinued by an order entered in the Supreme Court, New York County, on May 20, 1918.

An examination of the Register of Claims in the Bureau of Law and Adjustment of the Department of Finance shows that on Nov. 14, 1901, he filed claim No. 5275 for the sum of \$344 for compensation as Commissioner of Deeds.

For the period from June 1, 1915, to May 31, 1918, Mr. McCormack's compensation as provided for in the budget and the compensation which he actually received was at the rate of \$1,500 per annum.

I recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution retiring Patrick McCormack from active service and awarding and granting him an annuity of \$750; being fifty per centum of his average annual rate of compensation for the past three years. Respectfully submitted,

#### Police Department—Retirement of Patrick Dockery, Caretaker (Cal. No. 68).

(On April 5, 1918 (Cal. No. 80), the request of the Police Commissioner for the retirement of this employee was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated March 27, 1918, from the Police Commissioner, requesting the retirement from active service, pursuant to chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911, as amended, of Patrick Dockery, Caretaker in the Police Department; and the following report of the Comptroller:

June 6, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held April 5, 1918, there was submitted a communication from the Police Commissioner dated March 27, 1918 (Cal. No. 80), recommending the retirement of Patrick Dockery, a Caretaker in the Police Department.

The Commissioner's communication was as follows:

"Under the provisions of sections 165, 166 and 167 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911, and chapter 479 of the Laws of 1912, I have the honor to ask that Patrick Dockery, Caretaker, be retired from active service in the Police Department and granted an annual sum or annuity of an amount equal to 50 per cent. of his annual compensation for three years preceding the taking effect of such retirement.

"This application is made for the reason that he is physically incapacitated further to perform his duties as Caretaker, and that the interests of the public service require such retirement.

"This man is 65 years of age and has been employed in this Department since Sept. 1, 1882. His compensation as Caretaker is \$3 per diem for 365 days.

"I enclose herewith his application, with endorsement thereon of the Chief Surgeon, as to his physical condition."

On May 28, 1918, Mr. Dockery was examined by the Board of Medical Examiners. The report of the said Board is attached hereto, and states in conclusion:

"In our opinion, applicant is permanently unfit for any laborious work whatever, and therefore suggest that you recommend his retirement."

Mr. Dockery's original appointment and subsequent changes in title and rate of compensation were as follows:

Sept. 1, 1882, appointed Hostler, Police Department, at \$12 per week.  
Feb. 1, 1884, compensation changed to \$50 per month.  
Jan. 1, 1900, compensation changed to \$2 per diem.

July 1, 1904, compensation changed to \$2.50 per diem.  
Jan. 1, 1916, title changed to Caretaker, at \$840 per annum.

Jan. 1, 1918, compensation changed to \$3 per diem.

In an affidavit dated April 17, 1918, Mr. Dockery stated that he had never filed a claim or brought suit against The City of New York for the payment of salary or wages or for any other claim.

A search of the records in the Law Department discloses no evidence of any action brought by Mr. Dockery.

An examination of the Register of Claims in the Bureau of Law and Adjustment of the Department of Finance shows that he has filed no claim.

#### Police Department—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds (Cal. No. 69).

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 133), this matter was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 21, 1918, from the Acting Police Commissioner, requesting \$1,500 special revenue bonds to reimburse claimants for the loss due to the defalcation of a Clerk in the office of the Assistant Property Clerk in the Police Department, Brooklyn; and the following report of the Comptroller:

June 10, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Police Commissioner, in a communication dated May 21, 1918 (Calendar No. 133, May 31, 1918), addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requested that an appropriation of special revenue bonds be made to the Police Department in the sum of \$1,500, to reimburse claimants for losses due to the defalcation of a Clerk in the office of the Assistant Property Clerk, Brooklyn, in the Police Department. This request was referred to the Comptroller.

The defaulting Clerk was a Patrolman, assigned about three years ago to assist the Assistant Property Clerk in the Brooklyn office. The force of this office consisted of the Assistant Property Clerk in charge, who was a civilian and under bond, and two Patrolmen detailed to said office, who were not under bond.

The appropriation requested is for \$1,500, while the claims listed at the office of the Assistant Property Clerk when this request was made amounted to \$1,597.87, as follows:

Since these claims were presented two other claims, for \$83 and \$15, respectively, have been reduced to judgment, making the total claims to date \$1,695.87, of which \$990.45 is represented by judgments.

The total defalcation, money and valuables, is expected to reach \$8,000 or \$9,000. While other claims will doubtless be presented many claims will probably never be made.

The Assistant Property Clerk, in charge of the office when the thefts occurred and who has since resigned, stated that he had two assistants, both Patrolmen, that it was necessary for him at time to leave the office to visit various storage points with claimants seeking stolen property, and that it was necessary to leave with his assistants the keys of the vault containing valuables and money so that they could produce them in court when required.

The new Assistant Property Clerk is bonded for \$10,000 and his two assistants, both Patrolmen, have also been put under bond.

To pay the claims set forth the Chief Auditor of Accounts of the Department of Finance has been directed to issue special revenue bonds as requested by the Police Commissioner in an amount not exceeding \$1,500, pursuant to subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, and a resolution providing for your approval of this action is herewith submitted for your consideration. Respectfully,

#### Hunter College of the City of New York—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 70).

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller, dated June 5, 1918, recommending the transfer of \$2,000 within the appropriation made to Hunter College for the year 1918, and stating that the purpose of this transfer is to replenish the account for general repairs, against which an expense of \$2,000 was incurred for making a connection with the street main of the New York Steam Company, through which the college is to obtain heat in the future, thus obviating the closing of the institution on account of coal shortage.

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 130), the request for this transfer was referred to the Comptroller.)

Stewart Browne appeared in opposition.

The matter was laid over one week (June 21, 1918).

#### Department of Parks, Borough of Queens—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 71).

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 106), this matter was referred to the Comptroller.) The Secretary presented a communication dated May 20, 1918, from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, herein; and the following report of the Comptroller:

June 3, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, in a communication dated May 20, 1918, Calendar No. 106, May 24, 1918, requested the modification of the schedule lines in Code 1400, 1918, reading:

Driver with team and vehicle at \$5.50 per day (1,550 days).

Driver with team and vehicle at \$6 per day (175 days).

—to read:

Driver with team and vehicle at \$5.50 per day (387 days).

Driver with team and vehicle at \$6 per day (1,241 days).

The above represents a decrease of 97 days' service between that provided for in the budget and the modification now requested. No additional funds are required. The Commissioner states that it has become almost impossible to hire drivers with teams for \$5.50 per day. The department has recently been compelled to pay \$6 per day, the number of teamsters obtainable at that rate being limited.

#### Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Transfer of Appropriation and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 72).

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 131-C), the request for this transfer was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 13, 1918, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity herein; and the following report of the Comptroller:

June 4, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication dated May 13, 1918 (Calendar No. 131 C, May 24, 1918), referred to the Comptroller, requested the transfer of \$2,800 from Code 2169—1917, Salaries Temporary Employees, Water Supply, Collection and Storage, to 1917 Code 2293TW, Communication.

This transfer is necessary to meet the final 1917 bills of the New York Telephone Co. The unpaid bills due this company aggregate \$2,781.95. Of the original tax levy allowance for "Communication," \$32,191, there remains unencumbered but \$70.38. It is thought best to provide a small balance over the present apparent need in case further bills are presented. There is a sufficient balance in account 2169 to permit of the proposed transfer therefrom.

The auditor of the department states that the need for the additional funds for telephone costs arises out of (1) the natural increase in the telephone service; (2) the assumption of part of the service of the Board of Water Supply in connection with the Catskill system, and (3) the military forces in the Croton and Catskill regions.

**Fire Department—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 74).**

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Fire Commissioner, in a communication dated May 17, 1918 (Calendar No. 131-B, May 24, 1918), referred to the Comptroller requested transfer

of \$1,250.15 from 1917 Code No. 1655, Salaries Regular Employees, Fire Fighting, Extinguishing Fires, Operation, to Code 1698, Communication, Telephone Service.

The original 1917 appropriation for telephone service for the Fire Department was \$20,000, from which transfers were made in November, 1917, of \$650, making \$19,350 available for the year. The expenditures from the account aggregate \$19,141.16. The unpaid bills of the New York Telephone Co. are \$170.13 for November and \$1,288.85 for December, a total of \$1,458.98, to the payment of which may be applied the available balance of \$208.84, making necessary a transfer of \$1,250.14. There is a sufficient balance in Code 1655 to permit of the transfer therefrom of this amount.

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 20, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks, herein; and the following report of the Comptroller:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—At its meeting on May 24, 1918, your Board referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Commissioner of Docks, dated May 20, 1918 (Cal. No. 131-F), requesting the transfer of funds within the appropriations made to his office for the year 1918, as follows:

The amount appropriated in the 1918 Budget for Office Equipment is \$386. By resolution of your Board adopted May 3, 1918, this sum was increased by the transfer of \$200 from Code 2859, Telephone Service, making the total amount appropriated to date for Office Equipment \$586. Against this sum, vouchers have been drawn and encumbrances registered aggregating \$572.80, leaving an unencumbered balance at the present time of \$13.20.

The Commissioner states that the pending request is made for the purpose of providing in Code 2840, Office Equipment, funds sufficient to meet the cost of three new typewriters at \$83.03 each, total \$249.09, required for work in the department's Bureau of General Administration, and to provide a balance of approximately \$163 for the purchase of other office equipment during the remainder of the year 1918.

It is stated at the office of the Dock Department that the machines it is proposed to displace are generally in poor condition, require constant repairing and cannot be efficiently operated. Two of these typewriters have been in constant use nearly eight years, the other nearly six.

The Commissioner in a communication under date of June 1, 1918, states that there is at present in Code 2850, Repairs and Replacements, an unencumbered balance of \$29,812, a portion of which will have to be transferred to the Department of Plant and Structures when that department takes over the operation of the municipal ferries, but that he is of the opinion that there will remain after these transfers sufficient funds in Code 2850 to meet the requirements of the department to December 31, 1918.

The amount appropriated in the 1918 Budget for Code 2850, Repairs and Replacements, was \$62,125. Of this sum \$4,000 was transferred on May 10, 1918, to Code 2841, Motor Vehicles and Equipment, to provide for the purchase of an automobile. The expenditures and obligations against the account, as shown by the books of the Department of Finance, aggregate \$28,271, leaving a balance of \$29,854. The approval by your Board of the request of the Commissioner of Docks for the transfer of a further \$400 will reduce the sum available to meet the cost of repairs and replacements for the remaining seven months of the year to \$29,454.

Appended hereto is a resolution which, if adopted, will effect the requested transfer. Respectfully,

**Various City and County Departments—Rescission of Unencumbered Balances in Special Revenue Bond Authorizations (Cal. No. 76).**

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller:

June 8, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Gentlemen—An examination has been made by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance of the present status of existing special revenue bond authorizations. The object of the examination was to determine the amounts of such authorizations no longer required for the specific purpose for which the bonds were authorized and therefore available for rescindment.

The various departments and offices having the administration of these funds were notified that it was the intention of the Comptroller to present to your Board a statement of the unencumbered balances of authorizations with a recommendation that the amounts originally authorized be reduced to the amount of bonds issued or to be issued to provide for outstanding obligations.

Responses to this notice have been received from all the departments concerned and, as a result, it is now possible to recommend to your Board the rescindment of special revenue bond authorizations aggregating \$70,745.60.

The following summary will show by departments the total amounts of the unencumbered balances of authorizations it is proposed to rescind.

**Department of Finance—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds (Cal. No. 77).**

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted June 4, 1918, by the Board of Aldermen, approved June 10, 1918, by his Honor, the Mayor, requesting an issue of \$25,000 special revenue bonds, the proceeds whereof to be used by the Comptroller for the purpose of continuing the audit of the accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears; and the following report of the Comptroller:

June 14, 1918.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On June 4, 1918, the Board of Aldermen adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) dollars, the proceeds whereof to be used for the purpose of providing additional funds for the continuance of the audit of the accounts, to March 31, 1918, of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears now being made to December 31, 1916, as required by



section 154 of the Greater New York Charter. All obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1918."

Mr. Daniel Moynahan, who had been Collector of Assessments and Arrears since August 20, 1906, died on March 31, 1918. Section 154 of the Charter provides that:

"Whenever a receiver of taxes or any deputy receiver, or a collector of assessments and arrears or any deputy collector shall cease to hold office, and within one year thereafter, it shall be the duty of the comptroller to examine the accounts of such receiver or collector or deputy, and if found correct to cause a certificate to that effect to be filed with the bond of such officer, and such certificate so filed shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the condition of such bond and the lien or liens thereby created. \* \* \*

Mr. Moynahan's death and the requirements of the Charter quoted make it now imperative upon the Comptroller for such an audit and examination of the late Collector's accounts down to the date of his death to be made as will enable a certificate to be given which shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the conditions of the Collector's bond and the lien or liens thereby created. To enable this to be done most effectively and at the least possible cost to the City it is very desirable that the present organized staff of temporary bookkeepers and clerks, who have been engaged in the work of auditing the accounts of the office of the Collector, extending back in many instances to tax rolls and assessments which were levied long prior to consolidation, be kept together and the work continued without any interregnum.

A close and careful estimate of the amount necessary to complete the audit down to March 31, 1918, indicates that approximately \$25,000 additional will be required. I therefore requested the Board of Aldermen, through its President, to authorize the issuance, under subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter, of \$25,000 special revenue bonds for this purpose. In accordance with said request the Board of Aldermen adopted the resolution hereinabove set forth on June 4, 1918.

On May 18, 1918, a report was made to me by Duncan MacInnes, Chief Accountant; Robert B. McIntyre, Supervising Statistician and Examiner, and H. H. Rathyn, Auditor of Receipts, of the Department of Finance, with respect to the audit referred to and the necessity for the appropriation requested, copy of which is appended to this communication.

The approval of the attached resolution, concurring in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting the issuance of \$25,000 special revenue bonds, is hereby requested. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—The undersigned Committee, which was appointed by you early in January to consider and report upon the continuance of the audit of the books and accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears, hereby respectfully reports that the audit of these accounts to December 31, 1916, is approaching completion in all of the Boroughs with the exception of the Borough of Brooklyn, as will be more particularly specified in a subsequent report which will fully describe the work that has been done and the period covered, which in many instances of taxes and also of assessments has gone back for years prior to consolidation.

Mr. Moynahan Died March 31, 1918.

Mr. Daniel Moynahan, Collector of Assessments and Arrears, died on March 31, 1918. He was appointed to the office on August 20, 1906. Mr. Moynahan's death makes it necessary that the audit of the accounts of his office be continued covering the period down to March 31, 1918, inclusive.

Section 154 of the Charter provides that:

"Whenever a receiver of taxes or any deputy receiver, or a collector of assessments and arrears or any deputy collector shall cease to hold office, and within one year thereafter, it shall be the duty of the comptroller to examine the accounts of such receiver or collector or deputy and if found correct to cause a certificate to that effect to be filed with the bond of such officer, and such certificate so filed shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the condition of such bond and the lien or liens thereby created. \* \* \*

In the report which we made to you under date of January -15, 1918, we stated that the continuation of the audit then recommended contemplated the attainment of the following results:

- (1) The verification of all transactions from January 1, 1910, to and including December 31, 1916, as shown on the tax rolls and assessment lists, and the absolute reconciliation of the lists and rolls transmitted during said period with the related accounts kept in the Borough Ledgers.

This means that with respect to all tax rolls (which also include water rents), and all assessment lists transmitted for collection to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears since January 1, 1910, not only will all the transactions affecting such rolls and lists be verified but also that the amount of unpaid items will be absolutely established.

- (2) With respect to tax rolls and assessment lists transmitted to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears prior to January 1, 1910, and subsequent to January 1, 1898, the work contemplated will result in the verification of all transactions that occurred between January 1, 1910, and December 31, 1916, and in addition thereto the securing, with respect to each separate list and roll, of a statement showing the unpaid liens as of December 31, 1916.

As previously stated herein, this work is drawing to a close with the exception of the Borough of Brooklyn, where the complexities of the situation and the very large number of assessments have made the work more difficult and time occupying. Attention was called to this situation in our previous report, wherein we pointed out that the additional time which would be required to complete the audit in the Borough of Brooklyn, was due to the records in use in that Borough being substantially different in procedure from those used in any of the other four Boroughs, and to accomplish the same results as will be elsewhere attained will require the greater time indicated. The reconciling and adjusting entries to bring the controlling ledger accounts into agreement with the outstanding taxes, assessments and water rates as established on the rolls would be subsequently completed by Accountants of this Department.

Additional Appropriation of \$25,000 Needed to Complete Audit.

To complete the work of auditing the accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears down to the date of Mr. Moynahan's death, an examination, which is made mandatory by the provisions of section 154 of the Charter, will require an additional appropriation of approximately \$25,000. It will only be possible to complete the work stated in the thorough manner in which it should be and keep within the appropriation stated by the use of the present organization, the personnel of which has become, through the experience gained during nearly twelve months past, expert in this particular and important work.

This approximation of the expenditure which will be required, is based on a close estimate of the number of Bookkeepers and machine operators, the number of machines, the cost of paper and cards, and the time which will probably be required to complete the audit. To do this work in the most effective and expeditious manner, and at the least possible cost, it will be necessary to augment the present temporary staff from 24 to 27 Bookkeepers, these to be paid \$4-per diem to increase the number of Tabulating Operators from 10 to 19, to be paid \$2.50 per diem, and to rent 7 punching machines, 6 tabulating machines, and 6 sorting machines—an increase of 5 machines over the number at present in use. It is estimated that the work will take five months to complete, and the total personal service, the rented machines, the cost of paper and cards, etc., will approximate \$25,000.

Annual Collections Aggregate from \$27,000,000 to \$31,000,000.

During last year the Collector of Assessments and Arrears was charged with accounting for \$79,224,485.20 of taxes, assessments and water rates, and the collections thereon, as reported by him and deposited with the Chamberlain, aggregated \$25,184,010.13, with approximately \$2,000,000 more for interest on these arrears. The cancellation of these liens reported during the year amounted to \$1,395,798.20.

In 1916, the collections of taxes, assessments and water rates reported by the Collector of Assessments and Arrears and deposited with the Chamberlain amounted to \$29,139,721.27, and the cancellations reported aggregated \$2,221,298.05, with approximately \$3,000,000 additional as interest.

There are upwards of 8,200 lists in the Collector's offices in the different Boroughs, and every year's tax levy since consolidation has still unpaid items, together with unpaid items of levies preceding 1898.

Comparatively Small Cost of Audit.

The foregoing figures will give some indication of the comparatively small cost of making a thorough audit, which under all circumstances should be made, and which is evidently contemplated by the Charter, which provides that if, after the examination of the accounts of the Collector, the Comptroller finds these to be correct he shall cause a certificate to that effect to be filed with the bond of the Collector:

"\* \* \* and such certificate so filed shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the conditions of such bond and the lien or liens thereby created."

This audit, when completed to March 31, 1918, will establish absolutely the outstanding and unpaid balances of taxes, assessments, and water rates appearing on the rolls as of said date thus not only setting forth the assets of the City consisting of these liens, but determining the basic figures upon which future, and preferably continuing current audits of the offices of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears and also of the Receiver of Taxes should be conducted.

We therefore respectfully urge in the interest of economy that provision be made for continuing the present organization, which has been making the audit of these accounts, until the completion thereof by bringing the work down to the date hereinbefore stated, viz., March 31, 1918. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on June 4, 1918, and approved by the Mayor on June 10, 1918, requesting the issue of special revenue bonds, the proceeds whereof to be used by the Department of Finance for the purpose of providing additional funds for the continuance of the audit of the accounts to March 31, 1918, of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears, be hereby approved of and concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and for the purpose of providing means therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds of the City of New York to an amount not exceeding twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) dollars, redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue.

Various City and County Departments—Additional Appropriation to Meet Annuities Granted to Veterans Retired Under Chapter 768, Laws of 1917, Etc. (Cal. No. 78).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller:

June 7, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—In the budget for 1918, an appropriation of \$22,000 was made in account No. 3073, for annuities for veterans retired under chapter 758 of the Laws of 1917. This allowance was based upon the annuities in effect when the budget was prepared, and the considerable number of annuities since granted have made the allowance inadequate. Up to June 3, 1918, the expenditures made from the account amounted to \$17,703.86, leaving a balance of \$4,296.14, which will be practically exhausted by the June payroll.

On the basis of the pension payments for the month of May, an additional appropriation of approximately \$22,000 must be made to meet the annuities now in force for the balance of the year, and to this sum \$3,000 has been added to cover annuities which may be granted during the remainder of the year. I have accordingly directed that special revenue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$25,000 be issued under subdivision 7, of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to replenish account No. 3073, Annuities for Veterans Retired under chapter 768 of the Laws of 1917.

Gentlemen—On December 31, 1917, there appeared on the fund ledgers of this Department, to the credit of the account entitled "T20, Unclaimed Warrants," the sum of nine thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine dollars and nine cents (\$9,929.09), which sum comprised 155 items dating from 1911 to 1917, contained in Register of Unclaimed Warrants, No. 2, of this Department, folios 3 to 9.

On June 8, 1917, your Board adopted a resolution transferring to the General Fund of the City for the Reduction of Taxation, the sum of three hundred and twenty-five dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$325.38). This amount represented unclaimed warrants dated during the year 1910, and as they were at least six years and thirty days old on January 31, 1917, their payment was barred by the Statute of Limitations.

Gentlemen—On December 31, 1917, there appeared on the fund ledgers of this department to the credit of the account entitled "T-19, Unclaimed Salaries and Wages," the sum of one hundred and eighteen thousand five hundred and twenty-one dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$118,521.87). This sum comprised about 18,000 items, entered from Jan. 1, 1911, to Dec. 31, 1917, in the Register of Unclaimed Salaries and Wages, No. 6, Part 1, of this department.

On June 8, 1917, your Board adopted a resolution transferring to the General Fund of the City for the Reduction of Taxation, seventeen thousand six hundred and fifty dollars and sixty-five cents (\$17,650.65), this sum representing salaries and wages due and payable on Dec. 31, 1910, and prior thereto, which appeared on the books of this department on Jan. 31, 1917. Gentlemen—The District Attorney of New York County, under date of May, 1918, requested an issue of special revenue bonds, in amount \$14,927.24, to provide for the payment of increases in the salaries of the professional and administrative forces of that office for the balance of 1918, in accordance with the provisions of chapters 618 and 652 of the Laws of 1918.

Chapter 618 of the Laws of 1918, which became effective May 11, 1918, provides that the District Attorney shall appoint an Assistant District Attorney at a salary of \$10,000, and 13 Assistants at \$7,500 each, instead of 14 Assistant District Attorneys at \$7,500 per annum each. This chapter also provides that:

"Process servers in the office of the district attorney of the county of New York shall receive a minimum salary of twelve hundred dollars. The district attorney of the county of New York may, however, notwithstanding the provisions of any other law, fix the salary of any process server at a greater amount, not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars per annum, and the salary of the chief process server at not to exceed two thousand dollars per annum."

Chapter 652 of the Laws of 1918, effective May 13, 1918, increased the salaries of the administrative force by ten percentum of their present annual amount.

Inasmuch as the increases indicated above are mandatory they should be paid from special revenue bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 7, section 188 of the Charter. The increases amount to \$14,861.61. I am therefore directing the Chief Auditor of Accounts to issue special revenue bonds in the above stated manner and amount and to apply the proceeds to the payment of the salary increases indicated.

The increase as provided for includes three Stenographers to the Grand Jury, who are provided for in the 1918 Budget at \$10 per day, and paid while actually employed. The increase provided for makes the per diem rate \$11. Inasmuch as the number of days they will be employed during the balance of the year is undeterminable, an estimated yearly allowance of \$500 and \$317.67 for the balance of this year is suggested.

The adoption of the attached resolution will approve the schedules as revised and express your approval of my action in providing for the increases by the issue of special revenue bonds as stated. Respectfully,

**Miscellaneous, Kings County—Transfer of Funds (Cal. No. 83).**  
(On April 5, 1918 (Cal. No. 95), this matter was referred to the Comptroller.)  
The Secretary presented a communication, dated March 22, 1918, from the County Clerk, Kings County, herein; and the following report of the Comptroller:  
June 4, 1918.

*To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:*

Gentlemen—On April 5, 1918 (Cal. No. 95), your Board referred to the Comptroller, a communication dated March 22, 1918, from the County Clerk, Kings County, requesting that the funds for the printing of calendars for the Supreme Court and the Appellate Division, which were included in the appropriation for the Borough President, Borough of Brooklyn, for the year 1917, be transferred to the appropriation for the County Clerk, Kings County. An opinion of the Corporation Counsel dated June 1, 1917, states that "the duty of printing the calendar of the Supreme Court is expressly placed upon the Clerk of the County where that supply shall be furnished, save in the County of New York, and the expenditures involved therein shall be audited as a County rather than a City charge."

An examination of the above matter made by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, disclosed that the appropriation for the year 1917 for printing of the court calendars for Kings County was allowed to the office of the Borough President of Brooklyn. As the appropriation to a City Department cannot properly be transferred to a county office, and as the opinion of the Corporation Counsel makes these expenditures a County rather than a City charge, it is proposed that \$330.63 be transferred from Code No. 3511, Rent, Kings County, in which appropriation there is an available balance, to Code No. 3514, Contingencies, the County of Kings, for the payment of the above mentioned charges.

**President, Borough of Queens—Acquisition of Site for Disposal Plant (Cal. No. 85).**

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 98), a communication from the Acting President, Borough of Queens, advising of the selection of the site by the Board of Aldermen for a disposal plant was referred to the Comptroller and to the Chief Engineer for report, under rule No. 35.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated May 11, 1918, from the Acting President, Borough of Queens, in the matter; and the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 17619.

June 5, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 98), your Engineer was directed, pursuant to the provisions of Rule 35 of the Board, to submit a report concerning the relation to the City Plan of a proposed site for sewage disposal purposes adjacent to the Jamaica Disposal Plant situated on Atfield avenue near Stanley avenue, in the Borough of Queens, which was selected for this purpose by the Board of Aldermen under a resolution adopted on April 16, 1918.

The proposed site is bound on the north by the lands of the Jamaica Disposal Plant as now in use, and by the easterly prolongation of its northerly line, on the east by the center line of Baker avenue, on the south by a line 250 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Stanley avenue, and on the west by the center line of Atfield avenue, in the section south of Stanley avenue, and by the easterly line thereof and its southerly prolongation in the section to the north of Stanley avenue, comprising an area of about 5.3 acres.

All of the streets in this vicinity have been laid out upon the final map of the City and no information is at hand to indicate that changes are contemplated in their lines. Title to Stanley avenue east of Atfield avenue and to Atfield avenue from the southerly line of Stanley avenue northwardly to the land now used for sewage disposal purposes, has been legally acquired.

The technical description of the additional area to be acquired is drawn in such a way as to include all rights of the abutting owners to the land extending to the center lines of Baker avenue and to Atfield avenue, where title has not heretofore been acquired, and it also includes two short blocks of Stanley avenue and a length of 250 feet of Nebraska avenue, which occupy a position such as to separate the tract into three independent areas. In case the use to be made of the property which falls within the street lines can be construed as of a temporary character not involving the construction of buildings or structures inconsistent with street use, the site may be considered as a proper one, but otherwise its boundary should be amended in such a way as to adapt it to the street requirements.

**From City, County and Borough Officials.**

**Public Service Commission for the First District—Construction of Viaduct at East 241st Street and East 238th Street Across the Tracks of the New York Central Railroad Company and the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company (Cal. No. 86).**

(On May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 50), this matter was referred to the President, Borough of The Bronx.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 8, 1918, from the Secretary of the Public Service Commission for the First District, submitting memorandum relative to the postponement of the construction of the viaduct at East 241st street and East 238th street, across the tracks of the New York Central and the New York, New Haven & Hartford Company; and the following report of the President, Borough of The Bronx:

June 11, 1918.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, Borough of Manhattan, New York City:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 17, 1918, the memorandum of the Public Service Commission, as submitted by its Secretary under date of May 8, 1918, relative to the postponement of the construction of the viaducts at E. 241st street and E. 238th street, crossing the tracks of the New York Central Railroad and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, was referred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

According to this memorandum, adopted by the Public Service Commission on May 7, 1918, in deference to national emergency, the railroad companies have been advised that the Commission does not intend to take any steps during the present year to compel the said companies to proceed with the actual construction work under Order No. 1929, relative to the E. 241st street crossing, and Order No. 2253, relative to the E. 238th street crossing.

It is stated therein, however, that it is not intended to relax the proceedings for the judicial determination of the validity of the order in relation to the E. 238th street bridge, an appeal therefrom having been taken by the railroad company, and the Commission advises the companies that preliminary work should not be abated, to the end that when the present emergency shall have passed, the companies shall have disposed of all work necessary to clear the way for actual construction.

This action of the Commission is in response to a communication from the attorneys of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and the New York Central Railroad Company, under dates respectively of April 8 and April 9, 1918, and presented upon advice of the Chairman of the Budget Committee of the U. S. Railroad Administration, requesting that the construction of one or both of the proposed viaducts be formally deferred to some time subsequent to the year 1918.

The memorandum of the Public Service Commission goes into the various phases of both orders with considerable detail, and reference is made therein to a suggested compromise between the parties interested, for the elimination of one or the other of the proposed crossings.

This suggestion comes at a time when it is practically impossible to arrive at an agreement, for the reason that, as Order 1929 antedated Order 2253, all work of advantage to the railroad companies, such as the laying of additional tracks, the extension and relocation of facilities and the closing of public highways has already been accomplished.

Quite naturally the question which would arise in consideration of such a compromise would be whether the railroad companies in consideration of the rescindment of the 241st street order would agree to give adequate compensation for the benefits derived through the said order.

Our past experiences in attempting to obtain fair consideration in controversies of this kind have led me to set aside the idea of obtaining any fair degree of compensation where the railroad companies are already in possession of the benefits they desire.

Ample evidence of the disregard of these companies for the requirements and rights of the general public with regard to these orders is clearly shown by the said companies having taken the fullest advantage of the order relative to E. 241st street, where of benefit to themselves alone, and with no complaint on their part as to the expenditures involved in connection with actual right-of-way improvements.

They have entirely disregarded the provisions of the said order which provides for the viaduct proper, which was the primary object of the Commission's action and of actual benefit to the public.

They have neglected to make any provision for the viaducts at either location, in the budgets to the Railroad Administration, and no attempt was made to confer with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or the borough authorities regarding the propriety of omitting for the present items necessary to carry out the provisions of either order.

In the absence of any information regarding the intent of the railroad companies to delay the fulfillment of their obligations, plans were prepared in this office early

this year showing a proposed change of grades in E. 241st street, which will produce better traffic gradients than those now established. This proposed modification has been the subject of many conferences with the officials of the City of Yonkers, resulting in the joint approval of the proposed change of grade by the Yonkers city officials and those of Bronx Borough.

Under even date a communication has been addressed to your Board submitting the revised plan for approval.

Further, in anticipation of the continuance of construction work by the railroad companies, the Local Board of Chester at its meeting in January of this year adopted a resolution for acquiring title to E. 241st street to its full width. The transmittal of this resolution has been withheld pending the completion and approval of the aforesaid modified plans.

It is our wish to co-operate with the Federal Government in its administration of railroad affairs, but it must be borne in mind that the general public should also be afforded its proper degree of benefit, and in view of the very apparent lack of good faith on the part of the railroad companies, as indicated by their self-interested activities under Order 1929, I would recommend that, while in sympathy with the instructions issued by the Director General and concurring in the Commission's memorandum, in so far as it relates to the vigorous prosecution of all preliminary work required in advance of actual construction, consisting of plans, specifications, etc., the Board of Estimate and Apportionment request the Public Service Commission to issue a supplemental order or memorandum to the railroad companies, to be effective the beginning of 1919, directing the completion of all work at E. 241st street under Order 1929 and the actual construction of the viaduct at E. 238th street under Order 2253, which order has recently been affirmed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court. William L. Ransom, Counsel for the Public Service Commission, also appeared. The matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget, and the Secretary directed to request the Chief Engineer to report to said Committee.

**East 51st Street, Between a Line 100 Feet East of Beekman Place and the Westerly Line of the Exterior Street, Borough of Manhattan—Closing and Discontinuing (Cal. No. 87).**

(On May 3, 1918 (Cal. No. 57), this matter was referred to the President, Borough of Manhattan.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated April 27, 1918, from Ellison Crawford, attorney, making application herein on behalf of the Beekman Estate; and the following report of the President, Borough of Manhattan:

June 6, 1918.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, New York City:

Dear Sir—On May 3, 1918, the Board of Estimate referred to the President of the Borough of Manhattan a communication dated April 27, 1918, from Ellison Crawford, making application on behalf of the Beekman Estate for closing and discontinuing East 51st street between a line 100 feet east of Beekman place and the westerly line of the exterior street.

Transmitted herewith is a print of a map showing the closing and discontinuing of East 51st street from a point 100 feet east of Beekman place and the westerly line of the exterior or marginal street, laid out pursuant to chapter 286 of the Laws of 1889.

The natural topography along the shore of the East River at East 51st street forms a precipitous drop of about forty feet between the east end of the street, as now improved, and the water level. The street grade as originally established was planned to meet the pier level at the bulkhead line, but in 1851, presumably to avoid heavy excavation, it was changed in such a manner as to require a high retaining wall across East 51st street about 100 feet east of Beekman place. Title to East 51st street to the bulkhead line vested in the City in February, 1839. That part of East 51st street which lies east of the retaining wall is at a level of about five feet above mean high water and is entirely unimproved. It is accessible from the easterly end of East 51st street, as now improved, by means of a stairway and is used for street purposes only by the Volunteer Life Saving Corps, who use a City-owned platform by permission of the Dock Commission, which, we are informed, is revocable.

Should the Board approve the map change, the way will be clear for the sale of the land within the bed of the street to the abutting owners.

**Public Service Commission for the First District; Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Authority Under Lockwood Law (Chapter 586, Laws of 1918) for Completion of Rapid Transit Construction Work (Cal. No. 89).**

(On May 17, 1918 (Cal. No. 130), a communication from the Public Service Commission relative to the enactment of the Lockwood Law was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

(On May 31, 1918 (Cal. No. 116), on motion, the Public Service Commission was requested to take up with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company and the New York Municipal Railways Corporation the suggestion made by the Comptroller in the statement presented by him that day and to report back to the Board at a meeting to be held on June 4, 1918; and the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board as to the validity of the proposed action.)

Dear Sir—Referring to my letter to you of June 3, 1918, transmitting this Company's consent in the form suggested by the Comptroller in his letter to you of June 1, 1918, that any moneys paid out by the City in accordance with the statement of memorandum of the Comptroller of May 31, 1918, may be included in the City's contribution to the cost of construction under Contract No. 3, it is assumed that the City will not expect to make any profit on the money advanced to pay the increased cost of labor, and that therefore such contribution will not receive a return equal to 8.76 per cent, but will receive a return on the same basis as money expended by the City upon its share of the cost of construction of additions, as set forth in subdivision 11 of article XLIX. This is all that the Company can claim for money furnished by it to meet extra cost, and both parties will thus be upon the same basis, which is what the contract contemplates.

You may deem it advisable that a modifying agreement be entered into to cover this matter. If so, and you will have such an agreement prepared, I will be glad to arrange for its execution on behalf of this Company.

*To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, Municipal Building, New York City, New York:*

Gentlemen—This Commission has been keenly aware of the difficulties which stand in the way of completing subway and elevated lines in this time of war, and has tried in every possible way to enlist the active, helpful co-operation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to that end. Every course of action known to this Commission or suggested by you has been followed with all possible speed.

Perceiving the emergency at hand, the Commission prepared the Lockwood bill to meet it. We were unable, in advance of its introduction or before its enactment, to obtain from your Board or the Corporation Counsel any suggestions for its improvement, or for a substituted plan of dealing with the situation. You would not help us improve it, and the Mayor signed it as drawn, after conferring with his colleagues of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

As soon as the Lockwood bill became law, the Commission puts its staff at work to gather from the contractors' books and its own engineering records the data on which its action and that of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would of necessity be based in part.

Recognizing that there were many details as to procedure and plan of action as to which agreement and accord between the Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would be necessary if weeks and months of precious time were to be saved, the Commission, on May 16, 1918, suggested formally to your Board that conferences be held, between the two Boards or committees thereof, to thresh out fundamentals of procedure which otherwise will take much time, if this Commission must prepare the Lockwood law applications without knowing the wishes of your Board in that connection, or even whether your Board is willing to act under the Lockwood Law at all. This suggestion was rejected by your Board, and we have been denied that obvious means of saving time and getting results. The report of the Committee on Finance and Budget, appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, directed that

"\* \* \* a communication be sent by the Secretary to the Public Service Commission, informing them that, should they desire to take any proceedings to suspend, cancel or modify any contract or contracts for rapid transit construction work, under the provisions of the so-called Lockwood Bill, that the particular contract or contracts so to be suspended, cancelled or modified should be submitted by the Public Service Commission to your Board in the usual manner heretofore followed in regard to modifying construction contracts under the Rapid Transit Act, and that, with the proposed suspension, cancellation or modifying agreement or agreements, the Commission should be requested to furnish to your Board all of the information available to the Commission with respect to the particular contract proposed to be suspended, cancelled or modified, and the work done, or to be done, thereunder, and any other contract or contracts of the same contractor for rapid transit construction work heretofore completed or in process of completion."

"With this information before your Board, you will be in a position to determine the merits of each particular suspension, cancellation or modification which it is proposed to make, pursuant to the provisions of the Lockwood Bill, and, in the light of the information then available, to approve or disapprove of the proposal of the Public Service Commission."

Compliance with the foregoing as to nearly 30 contracts, without preliminary conferences, has, of course, taken time, and will take more time, but the Commission has been going ahead along these lines with all possible speed.

To avoid duplication of work and the doubling of the time required before relief could be actually afforded a contractor, under the Lockwood Law, the Commission has, on several occasions, suggested that Finance Department Accountants work simultaneously with our own. This suggestion has not been acted upon.

When the labor emergency became acute, even sooner than was anticipated, the Commission realized that something needed to be done, to give the contractors a basis for paying the increased wage scale demanded by their workmen, on which an answer had to be given before midnight on June 1, 1918. Accordingly, the Commission, on May 27, 1918, sent a further communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, asking an expression of general willingness and policy, as to putting on an actual cost, no profit basis the subway work remaining to be done. If

the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had approved the expression of general policy recommended by this Commission, the labor situation would have been met, and no further emergency would have arisen.

Your Board declined to join in such a policy, or even to discuss it. In lieu thereof, a report of the Comptroller was adopted, on May 31, 1918, which proposed to deal with the labor emergency, at least pending the applications under the Lockwood Law, as follows:

"Assuming the validity of the Lockwood Law and that any necessary consent will be given by the Interborough and the New York Municipal Railways Corporation (B. R. T.), the present situation may be met in the following manner:

"Existing contracts for subway construction shall remain in force unmodified; to be supplemented, however, under the authority of the Lockwood Law by an additional contract, by which the City of New York will advance from week to week the moneys necessary to make the payment of the increase in wages which the workmen insist they must have, and which the contractors say is just."

The one thing this Commission was asked by this report was to procure the indicated "consent" of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company and the New York Municipal Railway Corporation (B. R. T. Co.). On May 31, 1918, a proposed form of this "consent" was informally submitted to the Comptroller. At noon on Saturday, June 1, 1918, he submitted an alternative form which he preferred. On Monday, June 3, 1918, this Commission transmitted to your Board the "consent" of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company in the form suggested by the Comptroller, and the attested willingness of the New York Municipal Railway Corporation to execute a similar consent as to each construction contract, when presented.

Contrary to the impression which, no doubt unintentionally, has been permitted to become prevalent, the plan recommended by the Comptroller does not mean that the City assumes or pays the increased wage costs involved in completing subway work now, even the additional cost under the wage scale granted on June 1st. The plan of the Comptroller is only that the City shall advance or loan the money to contractors, who are unable now to get it from their banks. The Lockwood Bill, which became law with the Mayor's approval, recognized and explicitly declared the increased costs of completing subway work since the beginning of the war as "a just and equitable claim against, and a moral obligation of, the City of New York." The Lockwood Law calls for modification of existing contracts, so that the City will assume and pay these increased costs; the plan of the Comptroller calls for an advance or loan by the City to contractors in financial difficulties. Nothing in the Lockwood Law sanctions such an "advance," which could hardly do more than "tide over" some of the situations temporarily until Lockwood Law applications can be presented in the comprehensive form required by the above quoted action of your Board.

As to any way which the Corporation Counsel may approve as lawful for the carrying out of the plan proposed by the Comptroller, I am authorized to say to you that, up to the limits of its powers, this Commission will co-operate with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Comptroller in any lawful way of making moneys available to the contractors who need it, in advance of the times specified in the present contracts.

It is urged by the contractors that, as to several of their number now engaged on very essential work, there is the utmost urgency in making money available to them for meeting the increased labor and other costs, and, if, through any plan for immediate advances to contractors found thus in need, relief can be afforded until such time as the data you insist on for action under the Lockwood Law can be brought together, the Commission will, of course, welcome such action and assist it in any lawful way.

On June 1, 1918, Counsel to the Commission sent to the Comptroller a letter, a copy of which is hereto annexed, the concluding paragraph thereof being as follows:

"I take it that, if you and the Corporation Counsel have it in mind that any form of modifying agreement or action by this Commission shall precede, or be the basis for, the advances to contractors in pursuance of your report to the Board of Estimate of yesterday, you will advise the Commission as to what papers, if any, your department will wish, so far as the Commission is concerned, before you make any advances pursuant to your plan."

No suggestions or information have been received, but the expression of our willingness to co-operate in any desired way is reiterated.

With respect to the transmission to the Comptroller of vouchers for the paying out of money in connection with rapid transit construction, this Commission is by statute limited to the contract prices as set forth in the contract in force, and also by the unexpended balance of the appropriation theretofore made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for paying for work under such contract. Within the limits thus imposed, this Commission will, of course, be glad to co-operate in any lawful way. If, contrary to what was said in the Comptroller's report of May 31, 1918, modifying agreements are now desired, we will draw and submit such agreements as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may indicate that it desires and the Corporation Counsel will approve as to legality. If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Corporation Counsel are of the opinion that anything other than or beyond this can advisably be undertaken, the Commission will be glad to have definite information as to what it is believed that action may be. The Commission knows of no other plan available under the law, unless and until you are willing to proceed under the Lockwood Law.

The Commission meanwhile, as you have been repeatedly advised, is proceeding with all possible speed to complete the requisite data for action under the Lockwood Law. We asked your Board to approve placing future work on an actual cost, no profit basis, leaving until audits now in progress are completed the adjustment as to work since April 6, 1917. Contracts could be put on an actual cost basis for the future without waiting for such audits, but your Board has refused to take such action. Therefore, the data which you have a right to insist upon before acting is being prepared.

Nevertheless, we shall shortly submit for your consideration several of the most urgent situations, for your action under the Lockwood Law. Until that is done and your Board acts thereon, we shall be glad to co-operate as to any way of meeting the situation meanwhile. Very truly yours,

My Dear Mr. Comptroller—I received your letter of June 1, 1918, shortly before noon to-day, and at once transmitted the form of consent proposed by you to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company and the New York Municipal Railway Corporation. I had sent to them yesterday afternoon a form drawn by the Law Department of the Commission, but following the receipt of information that you were proposing an alternative form of consent, it has been impossible to-day to locate the officers of the respective companies who would have power to act in the matter. I am promised, however, that prompt action will be taken on Monday morning, and you will be advised thereof during the day.

I am quite clearly of the opinion that the form of consent and approval, with mutual consideration, which I transmitted to you yesterday is preferable to the substitute which you suggest. The matter is, however, one which the Board of Estimate is entitled to decide as to the form, and I hope that the necessary signatures can be obtained on Monday morning.

I take it that if you and the Corporation Counsel have it in mind that any form of modifying agreement or action by this Commission shall precede, or be the basis for, the advances to contractors in pursuance of your report to the Board of Estimate of yesterday, you will advise the Commission as to what papers, if any, your Department will wish, so far as the Commission is concerned, before you make any advances pursuant to your plan. Gentlemen—The Public Service Commission for the First District is of the opinion that by reason of circumstances and conditions arising out of the existence of a state of war between the United States and the Imperial German Government, and the need for the expeditious completion of construction of rapid transit railroad works and utilities during the period of the war, the public interests will be served by the cancellation and annulment of certain of the contracts heretofore made and entered into between The City of New York and the contractors therein named, for the construction of indicated portions of rapid transit railroads now being built, and



by the making of a new arrangement, pursuant to chapter 586 of the Laws of 1918, for the completion of the work still to be done thereunder. As you have been several times advised, the Commission has been proceeding with all possible expedition to prepare recommendations in suitable form for your consideration, to the end that essential work now going forward on an inadequate basis may be expedited. As soon as the requisite data for your action can be gathered, contracts will be submitted for the joint approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under the Lockwood Law.

Pending such submission, valuable time can be saved, and the present emergency the sooner met, if the members of your Board and the Corporation Counsel will meanwhile consider the form and substance of the papers which have been drawn for the purposes of proceeding immediately to place future work on an actual cost, no profit basis under the Lockwood Law, leaving until audits have been completed the consideration of all questions as to adjustments for the period from April 6, 1917, to the date of the execution of the new contract. The draft forms herewith submitted for your consideration, criticism and suggestion, are believed to be set forth on an acceptable basis for prompt action by the Commission and by your Board along these lines.

The papers of which blank forms are sent you herewith include:

1. A proposed form of notice to the contractor, under the Lockwood Law.
2. A proposed form of agreement with the contractor, to accompany such notice.
3. A proposed form of resolution by the Commission approving such notice and agreement.
4. A proposed form of stipulation by the contractor pursuant to the Lockwood Law.
5. A proposed form of consents by the sureties upon the contractor's bond and by the operating company (the Interborough Rapid Transit Company or the New York Municipal Railway Corporation).

If any member of your Board or the Corporation Counsel has any suggestion as to the substance or the form of any of these papers, the Commission will be glad to be advised of such suggestions. The papers are also at the same time being submitted to the contractors to ascertain their willingness to sign in the form thus indicated.

The draft forms now sent you will be perfected and adapted to the requirements of the particular contracts to be dealt with, as soon as any desired suggestions as to their general tenor have been received.

As soon as approved by The City as to form, and as soon as the Commission is informed as to what data, over and above that now in the hands of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Comptroller, are deemed requisite for action upon contracts for future work, along the lines herein suggested, Lockwood Law applications covering the more urgent situations will be formally sent to you for action just as soon as the data so indicated can be procured.

Meanwhile, the Commission's examination of the books of the various contractors is progressing with all possible expedition.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—On May 27, 1918, the Public Service Commission for the First District asked and urged that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment join with the Commission in a declaration of the general purpose and policy of the Board and the Commission to put upon a basis of completion at actual cost, without profit, under the Lockwood Law, such construction contracts as were jointly deemed to cover essential lines and as, upon full audit and investigation, were found to present facts warranting the application to them of the remedial provisions of the Lockwood Law.

On behalf of this request for such an avowal of policy, the Commission said, in its letter of May 27, 1918:

"The Commission understands that if, by the joint action of the Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, prompt assurance of procedure along these lines is given to the contractors, the contractors will put in force, as of May 15th, the scale of increased wages recently filed by the labor representative with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Commission. In the event this scale of increased wages is put in force, the Commission understands from the labor representatives that they will be able to hold together the present labor forces and add substantially to their number for the completion of work now most urgent."

At the meeting of your Board on May 31, 1918, this recommendation of the Commission was scarcely discussed, and a substitute plan was adopted, pursuant to a report by the Comptroller. Instead of modifying contracts to place them on a Lockwood Law basis, this plan contemplated keeping "the existing contracts in force unmodified," and the making of "advances" by the City to the contractors "from week to week" of "the money necessary to make the payment of the increases in wages which the workmen say they must have, and which the contractors say is just."

At the conference held later on the same day in the office of the Comptroller, representatives of the Commission pointed out that the plan of advances or temporary loans to contractors seemed illegal and impracticable, but that the Commission would gladly co-operate in any lawful way of meeting the situation if the Comptroller and Corporation Counsel could find and suggest a valid way of doing what the Comptroller had recommended.

In reliance upon the assurances of the Comptroller that a way would be found of making these advances to them, the contractors on that day put in force the increased wage scale demanded by their men.

On Thursday, June 6th, the same contractors were obliged to notify their employees that "the assurances given have not yet materialized," and that "unless action is taken by the public authorities immediately, we shall be compelled to return to the old scale of wages."

For the purpose of avoiding the indefinite cessation of subway work which such a return to the old wage scale would bring about, the Commission has to-day adopted a resolution, in which it most earnestly asks your concurrence.

The Commission is in receipt of certified statements of expenditures, costs and City payments, with respect to the uncompleted contracts listed in this resolution. These statements are declared by the contractors who submit them, to show, with substantial accuracy, the cost of the work done on these contracts and the gross amounts allowed by the Public Service Commission and the City for such work under the existing contracts.

If these statements, on full audit and inquiry, prove to be accurate, and if the producing cause of the losses claimed is found to be conditions within the purview of the Lockwood Law, the Commission believes that, at the least, future work under these contracts ought to be put on a Lockwood Law basis of City payment of actual cost. To that end, your concurrence in the accompanying resolution is requested.

The Commission is informed by the President of the Contractors' Association, in behalf of its members, that the adoption and approval of this resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will represent a sufficient assurance and guarantee to the contractors named, so that they can and will thereupon obtain the necessary credit to secure funds to continue the payment of the wage scale now demanded by the labor employed on their contracts, pending action as to them under the Lockwood Law. It is also believed that the approval of the Commission's resolu-

tion will tide over the immediate emergency until Lockwood Law action can be taken as to the other contracts.

Whereas, Such statements show or purport to show, on their face, substantial and considerable losses, in and about the performance of the said contracts, and said losses are claimed by the said contractors to be due to increased costs of the actual doing of the work, arising from and by reason of the circumstances and conditions arising out of a state of war, within the meaning of the said Lockwood Law; and

Whereas, The work remaining to be done under the said contracts above listed is not now progressing with satisfactory expedition, and the Commission is of the opinion that for the purpose of enabling their completion, and the operation of the rapid transit railroad to which such work appertains, at the earliest possible time, and for the purpose of meeting emergency conditions as to wages, the cost and supply of labor and materials and other factors arising out of a state of war, now threatening to postpone indefinitely the making available of the transportation facilities whose operation depends on work now in progress, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York and the Commission ought promptly to utilize, and proceed pursuant to, the powers conferred upon the Board and the Commission jointly by the said Lockwood Law; and

Whereas, This Commission is of the opinion, and hereby certifies, that the completion and operation of all the rapid transit lines of which some part is now under construction under the contracts above listed, are desirable and essential in the public interest; therefore, be it

Resolved, That, for the purpose of enabling the labor emergency to be immediately met, the Commission hereby announces and declares that in the event that upon such detailed and complete audits of the books and accounts of the said contractors as are now in progress or as may hereafter be determined upon and required by either the Commission or the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it shall appear that the said statements above referred to are substantially accurate and that such financial losses and increased costs so shown and claimed are in fact due to conditions within the scope and purview of the said Lockwood Law, the Commission will thereupon take the proper steps, pursuant to the said Lockwood Law, for the cancellation and annulment of each such contract as to which such facts appear, and the completion of the work upon an actual-cost no-profit basis, such cancellation and completion to be pursuant to notices, agreements and stipulations satisfactory in form and substance to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Commission, of which the details may be hereafter determined; and be it further

Resolved, That, for the purpose of enabling the labor emergency to be immediately met, this Commission hereby requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to concur and join in the foregoing declaration of intent and policy.

Under date of June 7, 1918, this Commission transmitted to your Honorable Board certified statements from certain rapid transit contractors engaged in the construction of municipal rapid transit lines on eight contract sections, together with resolutions adopted by this Commission asking your Honorable Board to concur in the resolution of the Commission to proceed to the cancellation of such contracts if the official audit now under way by this Commission should verify the certified statements submitted by such contractors and establish as a fact that the losses incurred were due to war conditions. The contractors in question are: The Cranford Company, The Degnon Contracting Company, Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, Intercontinental Construction Corporation, Newman & Carey Subway Construction Company and Litchfield Construction Company.

The Commission today is in receipt of additional and supplemental data from the contractors named in my communication of June 7 and above referred to, such data referring to the same contracts considered in said communication and resolution. The additional and supplemental statements contain the estimates of these contractors as to the probable cost of completion in each instance of the work under existing prices for labor and materials; and also the contractors' estimates of the moneys already authorized and available towards meeting the indicated estimated cost of completion.

These statements are transmitted to your Honorable Board for your consideration at the same time that they are given consideration by this Commission.

Stewart Browne, Warren Leslie, William L. Ransom, Counsel, Public Service Commission for the First District; Henry Jarvis, Franklin Nevius, Counsel for contractors, and Matthew A. McConville, representing subway workers, appeared in reference to the above matter.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment do not approve or concur in the resolution submitted by the Public Service Commission for the First District, under date of June 7, 1918, in relation to the cancellation and annulment of certain contracts for rapid transit railroad construction.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby reiterates its approval of the plan presented in the opinion of the Corporation Counsel on June 7th, 1918, for the relief of the contractors of subway construction by a speedy settlement and payment of their just claims by the Comptroller, and it is suggested that the Public Service Commission be requested to co-operate with this Board to that end and that such relief shall be without prejudice to any application that may be made by any contractor, under the Lockwood Law.

Resolved, That this Board does not favor a general cancellation and annulment of existing subway construction contracts and the release of the sureties on the bonds of such contractors, but that it will consider the claim of any particular contractor for relief because of war conditions, when presented by the Public Service Commission with the necessary facts and particulars, in the manner heretofore outlined by this Board.

Resolved, That, it being the earnest desire of this Board to secure the speedy completion of the subways, that the workmen employed thereon receive just compensation and that the interest of the people should be fully protected, the Board submits this statement of its policy to the earnest consideration of the Public Service Commission and of the contractors, and invites their co-operation to carry it into effect.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—15. Present and Not Voting—The President of the Borough of Richmond—1.

It was moved that the Board meet in conference with the Public Service Commission in this matter at 9.30 o'clock, Saturday morning, June 15, 1918.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

It was also moved that the Corporation Counsel and the Counsel to the Public Service Commission be requested to confer on the subject and attend the conference to be held on June 15, 1918.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

#### Union Railway Company of New York City (Cal. No. 90).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Public Service Commission for the First District, transmitting communication from William H. Hampton, relative to the operation of the Dyckman street extension of the Union Railway Company of New York City.

Which was referred to the Committee on Franchises.

#### Public Service Commission for the First District—Appropriation to Meet Additional Work in Connection with Contract of D. Donegan & Company for Construction of a Sewer to Connect an Existing Storm Drain with the Existing Sewers at Rawson Street Station, Queensboro Subway Rapid Transit Railroad (Routes Nos. 36 and 37, Section No. 3) (Cal. No. 91).

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 6, 1918, from the Public Service Commission for the First District, requesting that an additional sum of \$98.43 be appropriated to meet additional work in connection with the contract of D. Donegan & Company, for the construction of a sewer to connect an existing storm drain with the existing sewers at the Rawson street station of the Queensboro Subway Rapid Transit Railroad (Routes Nos. 36 and 37, Section No. 3).

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

#### Pacific Streets, Both Sides, Between Smith Street and Boerum Place, Borough of Brooklyn—Amendment of Building Zone Resolution (Cal. No. 92).

The Secretary presented a petition, verified June 10, 1918, from the Seebear Corporation and five other property owners, requesting the amendment of the Building Zone Resolution, so as to change from an unrestricted district to a business district both sides of Pacific street, between Smith street and Boerum place, Brooklyn.

The Secretary presented a communication from the 28th Ward Taxpayers Protective Association, Inc., of Brooklyn, urging the appropriation for the acquisition of a site at the northwest corner of Irving avenue and Woodbine street, opposite the Bushwick High School, Brooklyn, for a Carnegie library building.

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 10, 1918, from the New York Civil Service Society, Inc., requesting a hearing to submit arguments in favor of increasing the salaries of employees in the civil service of The City of New York, and a communication dated June 11, 1918, from the Secretary, Civil Service Forum, also requesting a hearing in this matter.

#### National Defense Emergency Fund—Appropriation for Contingent Expenses of Mayor's Second Red Cross War Fund Industrial Campaign Committee (Cal. No. 97).

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 8, 1918, from his Honor, the Mayor, making requisition for the sum of \$2,138.91 from the budget account No. 3081, National Defense Emergency Fund, to be placed to the credit of the Treasurer of the Mayor's Second Red Cross War Fund Industrial Campaign Committee, for printing, postage and other contingent expenses incurred and to be incurred by said Committee.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.

#### National Defense Emergency Fund—Appropriation for Expenses of Mayor's Committee of Women on National Defense in Connection with Establishment of Proposed Food Kitchen (Cal. No. 98).

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 6, 1918, from his Honor, the Mayor, making requisition for the sum of \$5,000 from budget account No. 3081, (National Defense Emergency Fund), to be placed to the credit of the Mayor's Committee of Women on National Defense, for expenses in connection with the establishment of a proposed food kitchen.

The nature of the work contemplated and a statement of the equipment necessary is set forth in detail in a communication from the Chairman of the Dock Committee of the Mayor's Committee on National Defense.

#### Netherland Avenue, Southerly Side of West 239th Street, Borough of The Bronx—Acceptance of Deed of Cession Conveying Easement for Sewer Purposes (Cal. No. 99).

(On December 14, 1917 (Cal. No. 100), the Board adopted a resolution authorizing the Corporation Counsel to accept deed of cession by the Stadacona Company, conveying easement, provided title is adequate for the purposes.)

The Secretary presented the following, which was ordered printed in the Minutes and filed:

#### Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby concur in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at meeting held December 14, 1917:

Whereas, The President of the Borough of The Bronx, under date of December 1, 1917, submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a deed of cession executed on the 19th day of November, 1917, by the Stadacona Company, conveying to The City of New York an easement for sewer purposes within the lines of Netherland avenue on the southerly side of West 239th street, in the Borough of The Bronx; be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, subject to the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, hereby authorizes the Corporation Counsel to accept, unconditionally, the aforesaid deed of cession, provided that the title to be conveyed is, in his judgment, adequate for the purposes, and if satisfactory to cause the instrument to be registered and filed in the proper offices.

A true copy of resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 6, 1918.

#### President, Borough of Brooklyn (Bureau of Sewers)—Retirement of Reuben J. Peters, Inspector of Sewer Connections (Cal. No. 102).

#### Street System Bounded by the City Line, White Plains Road, East 240th Street and the Bronx River, and East 241st Street, Between Bronx Boulevard and the Bronx River, Borough of The Bronx—Changing Lines and Grades (Cal. No. 103).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 11, 1918, from the President, Borough of The Bronx, submitting for approval map showing the changes of grades within the territory bounded by the City Line, White Plains road, East 240th street, and the Bronx River, and change in the lines of East 241st street between Bronx boulevard and the Bronx River (amendment to section 29), dated May 29, 1918.

**President, Borough of The Bronx—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds (Cal. No. 106).**

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted May 28, 1918, by the Board of Aldermen, approved June 4, 1918, by his Honor the Mayor, requesting an issue of \$6,000 special revenue bonds to provide for the purchase of coal by the President, Borough of The Bronx, for the remainder of the year 1918.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget and the Secretary directed to report to said Committee.

**Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond—Use of Arsenal Building in Central Park by American Museum of Safety for Exhibition Purposes (Cal. No. 107).**

The Secretary presented a communication from the President, Board of Aldermen, relative to the application of Mr. Lewis B. Gawtry, Chairman of the Building Committee of the American Museum of Safety, for the use of the Arsenal Building in Central Park, stating that this question has been submitted to the Corporation Counsel, who advises that the use of the Arsenal Building for the purpose indicated constitutes a legitimate park use and that each Commissioner of Parks is vested with administrative control over parks, etc., situated in the borough in which he has jurisdiction, but subject to general rules and regulations as shall be established by the Park Board, and that the power to grant this permit is with the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond; that he has given the application careful consideration and in order to facilitate the granting thereof, recommends the adoption of a resolution approving of and consenting to the issuance of a permit by the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for the use by the American Museum of Safety of the City of New York of the Arsenal Building in Central Park as a place for an exhibit of its safety devices, and in order that it may carry on its corporate activities, under such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon and approved by the Corporation Counsel.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.

**Kingsland Avenue, Between Broadway and Van Dine Street, Borough of Queens—Establishing Roadway Width (Cal. No. 108).**

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 6, 1918, from the Acting President, Borough of Queens, advising of the adoption by the Newtown Local Board on May 9, 1918, of a resolution initiating proceedings to alter the final map, Borough of Queens, by changing the width of Kingsland avenue, between Broadway and Van Dine street, so as to hold the existing width of about 60 feet.

Which was referred to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements and the Secretary directed to request the Chief Engineer to report to said Committee.

**Alstyn Avenue, Lurting Street, North Railroad Avenue, Hunt Street and Junction Avenue, Borough of Queens—Constructing Sewer and Appurtenances (Cal. No. 109).**

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 7, 1918, from the Acting President, Borough of Queens, transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by the Local Board, Newtown District, April 18, 1918, initiating proceedings for the construction of a sewer and appurtenances in Alstyn avenue, from Junction avenue to Card place; Lurting street, from Junction avenue to a point 600 feet westerly; North Railroad avenue, from Junction avenue to a point 600 feet westerly; Hunt street, from Luydig place to Van Dam street, and Junction avenue, from Hunt street to Roosevelt avenue, Second Ward, Borough of Queens; also transmitting urgency report in the matter of this proposed sewer.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget and the Secretary directed to request the Chief Engineer to report to said Committee.

**Kaiser Street, from Jamaica Avenue to Ashland Street, Borough of Queens—Constructing Sewer (Cal. No. 110).**

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 5, 1918, from the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Queens, urging the granting of preliminary authorization for the construction of a sewer in Kaiser street, from Jamaica avenue to Ashland street, Fourth Ward, Borough of Queens.

(On May 10, 1918 (Cal. No. 106-B), the report of the Chief Engineer of the Board on this improvement was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget and the Secretary directed to request the Chief Engineer to report to said Committee.

**Ormond (27th) Street, Norwood Place (26th Street), Millard (25th) Street, Lawson (24th) Street, Kendall (23d) Street, Joslin (22d) Street, Inkerman (21st) Street, Hoogland (20th) Street, Grennell (19th) Street, Forbes (18th) Street; Eagles (17th) Street, Dunsing (16th) Street, Clarence (15th) Street, Jackson Avenue, State Street, Mitchell Avenue and Crocheron Avenue, Borough of Queens—Construction of Sewer and Appurtenances (Cal. No. 111).**

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 11, 1918, from the Acting President, Borough of Queens, transmitting copy of resolution adopted April 25, 1918, by the Local Board of the Jamaica District initiating proceedings for the construction of a sewer and appurtenances in Ormond (27th) street, from Crocheron avenue to the crown about 350 feet north of Crocheron avenue; Norwood place (26th street), from Crocheron avenue to State street; Millard (25th) street, from Crocheron avenue to State street; Lawson (24th) street, from Crocheron avenue to State street; Kendall (23d) street, from State street to a property line 730 feet north thereof; Joslin (22d) street, from Jackson avenue to Mitchell avenue; Inkerman (21st) street, from State street to Mitchell avenue; Hoogland (20th) street, from Jackson avenue to Mitchell avenue; Grennell (19th) street, from Jackson avenue to Mitchell avenue; Forbes (18th) street, from State street to Mitchell avenue; Eagles (17th) street, from Jackson avenue to Mitchell avenue; Dunsing (16th) street, from Mitchell avenue to a point about 370 feet south of Mitchell avenue; Clarence (15th) street, from Mitchell avenue to a point about 300 feet south of Mitchell avenue; Jackson avenue, from Joslin (22d) street to Forbes (18th) street; State street, from Norwood (26th) street to Dunsing (16th) street; Mitchell avenue, from Inkerman (21st) street to Beekman (14th) street; and in Crocheron avenue, from Joslin (22d) street to Ormond (27th) street; and urgency report relative to this improvement.

**Lotus Avenue, Wilbur Avenue, Wilton Avenue and Lincoln Avenue, Borough of Queens—Regulating, Grading, Curbing, Laying Sidewalks, Etc. (Cal. No. 112).**

The Secretary presented four communications, dated June 6, 1918, from the Acting

President of the Borough of Queens, submitting statements of the preliminary work performed in the matter of the following local improvements:

(d) Regulating, grading, curbing and laying sidewalks where necessary, together with all work incidental thereto, in Lincoln avenue, from Greenpoint avenue to Queens boulevard, Borough of Queens.

Which were referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget, and the Secretary directed to request the Chief Engineer to report to said Committee.

**South Street, from Union Hall Street to Long Island Railroad (Sutphin Place); Washington Street, from South Street to a Point 300 Feet North; Sutphin Road (Rockaway Turnpike), from Lambertville Avenue (Pacific Street) to Einstein Avenue; Waverly Place, from Metropolitan Avenue to Jamaica Avenue; North Wickes Street, from Jamaica Avenue to Wisner Place; Franconi Avenue, from 17th Street to Cemetery Lane, Ingleside; Windom Street, from Westerly Side of Racket Street to Shaw Avenue; and North Morris Avenue, Jamaica Avenue to Fulton Street; Borough of Queens—Rescission of Resolutions Initiating Proceedings for Regulating, Grading, Opening, Etc. (Cal. No. 113).**

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 4, 1918, from the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Queens, transmitting eight resolutions adopted by the Jamaica Local Board on April 25, 1918, rescinding resolutions initiating proceedings as follows:

(a) To regulate and grade South street, from Union Hall street to the Long Island Railroad (Sutphin place), together with all work incidental thereto. Adopted April 12, 1911.

(g) To legally open Windom street from the westerly side of Racket street to Shaw avenue. Adopted December 2, 1909.

(h) To legally open North Morris avenue from Jamaica avenue to Fulton street. Adopted April 5, 1906.

The original resolutions initiating the proceedings above set forth were referred to the Chief Engineer.

The matters were referred to the Chief Engineer.

**Wave Street, from the Rapid Transit Railroad Eastwardly to the Southerly Boundary Line of Property of T. and H. K. S. Williams, the Said Line Extending Diagonally Across Wave Street at and Near Its Intersection with Front Street, Borough of Richmond—Regulating, Grading, Constructing Curb, Laying Sidewalks (Cal. No. 114).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 29, 1918, from the President, Borough of Richmond, advising that on May 28, 1918, the Local Board of Staten Island District rescinded two resolutions adopted October 9, 1917, initiating proceedings (1) for regulating, grading and paving, etc., Wave street, from Bay street to the Rapid Transit Railroad; (2) regulating and grading Wave street from the Rapid Transit Railroad to Front street, Second Ward, Borough of Richmond.

A new resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Staten Island District on May 28, 1918, initiating proceedings for regulating, grading, constructing concrete curb with steel guard, laying concrete sidewalks, and paving the roadway with granite blocks (permanent pavement) in Wave street from the Rapid Transit Railroad eastwardly to the southerly boundary line of property of T. and H. K. S. Williams, the said line extending diagonally across Wave street at and near its intersection with Front street, together with all work incidental thereto, Borough of Richmond, was submitted.

(On April 5, 1918 (Cal. No. 37), Local Board resolutions (1) and (2) were referred back to the Borough President.)

The matters were referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget, and the Secretary directed to request the Chief Engineer to report to said Committee.

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment (Bureau of Franchises)—Request of Stenographer and Typewriter for Six Months' Leave of Absence (Cal. No. 115).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 4, 1918, from John A. McCollum, Acting Chief, Bureau of Franchises, transmitting for appropriate action by the Board, application of Miss Florence B. McQueeney, Stenographer and Typewriter in said Bureau, for a leave of absence for six months, on account of illness, stating that it will be necessary to secure the services of a Stenographer and Typewriter to take the place of Miss McQueeney while absent, and requesting authority, therefore, to employ one in her place.

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment (Bureau of Franchises)—Request of an Assistant Engineer for Five Months' Leave of Absence (Cal. No. 116).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 3, 1918, from F. P. Peirce, Assistant Engineer, Bureau of Franchises, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting on account of ill health to be granted a leave of absence for five months on such conditions as to the Board may seem best.

**Department of Health; Law Department—Nuisance Due to Acid Fumes in the Upper West Side Section of the City; Issue of Special Revenue Bonds (Cal. No. 117).**

(On February 21, 1918 (Cal. No. 84), the Board adopted a resolution by which the City intervened in the proceeding against the Barrett Company and others now pending before the State Board of Health, and the Corporation Counsel and the Commissioner of Health were instructed to take the necessary steps in connection therewith.)

(On April 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 193), a communication from the counsel of the West End Association herein was presented and referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

(On May 3, 1918 (Cal. No. 25), the Board on the recommendation of the Committee on Finance and Budget, adopted a resolution recommending that the Board of Aldermen request an issue of \$10,000 special revenue bonds for the purpose of enabling the Corporation Counsel to obtain expert testimony herein.)

The Secretary presented the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen:

*In the Board of Aldermen.*

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by Corporation Counsel for the purpose of securing expert testimony on behalf of City in proceedings to abate nuisances to residents of west side of city.



All obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1918.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen May 28, 1918, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Approved by the Mayor June 4, 1918.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 28, 1918, and approved by the Mayor on June 4, 1918, requesting the issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of securing expert testimony on behalf of the City in proceedings to abate nuisances to residents of the west side of the City, all obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1918, be and the same is hereby approved of and concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and for the purpose of providing means therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York, pursuant to subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

#### Department of Education—Acquisition of Site for School Purposes (Cal. No. 118).

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 6, 1918, from the Vice-President of the Board of Education, requesting the acquisition as a site for school purposes of property on West 19th street, adjacent to Public School No. 80, Borough of Brooklyn, selected by the Board of Education for school purposes.

Which was referred to the Comptroller and to the Chief Engineer of the Board for report under Rule No. 35.

#### Department of Education—Amendment of Resolution Selecting Site for School Purposes (Cal. No. 119).

(On April 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 160), the resolution of the Board of Education requesting the acquisition of the site herein was referred to the Comptroller; and to the Chief Engineer of the Board for report under Rule 35.)

(On May 24, 1918 (Cal. No. 60-B), the report of the Chief Engineer relative to this site, recommending the amendment of the resolution of the Board of Education in such a way as to define the depth of the block, was presented to the Board and referred to the Board of Education.)

No. 80-A), authorizing the purchase of the plant of the South Shore Water Works Company at a cost not exceeding \$10,000, so as to provide for the acquisition of the two parcels of land upon which the pumping station and standpipe are located, subject to certain restrictions set forth in the deeds.)

Dear Sir—The negotiations conducted by the last administration for the purchase of the South Shore Water Works Company's plant, including several parcels of real estate, pumping station and equipment, and distribution mains and appurtenances connected therewith, were carried out to what was evidently thought to be the point of final settlement. A report setting forth all of the facts in connection with the

necessity for this purchase, the valuation of the company's property, the advantages which would accrue to the City upon the acquisition of it, and the agreed purchase price, was addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of March 9, 1917. It now develops that by an oversight maps showing the location and description of the property to be acquired were never prepared or submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by section 486 of the Charter. Therefore, to fully complete the transaction, I transmit herewith said maps in quadruplicate. Respectfully,

Whereas, Pursuant to the provisions of section 486 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has prepared and submitted to this Board for approval maps of lands, pumping plant, standpipe and distribution system in the City of New York, Borough of Richmond, County of Richmond, New Dorp, constituting the entire water supply plant of the South Shore Water Works Company of Staten Island, said Commissioner certifying upon said maps that in his opinion it is necessary to acquire the lands, pumping plant and distribution system shown on said maps in fee and all the rights, title and interest of the South Shore Water Works Company of Staten Island, in the streets of New Dorp, for the purpose of maintaining, preserving and increasing the supply of pure and wholesome water for the use of The City of New York; now therefore be it

Resolved, That said maps be and the same hereby are approved.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

#### Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Approval of Contract, Plans, Etc. (Cal. No. 127).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 10, 1918, from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, withdrawing request for the approval of forms of contract, plans, etc., for furnishing, delivering and laying a 12-inch flexible-jointed water main across Westchester Creek at East 177th street, Borough of The Bronx, and for hauling and laying connecting mains and appurtenances, presented to the Board on June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 74), and referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.

The Secretary was directed to notify said Committee and return papers to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

#### Department of Correction—Expenditure of Corporate Stock Funds (Cal. No. 128).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated June 3, 1918, from the Commissioner of Correction requesting permission to expend \$17,123 from corporate stock funds for the construction of a root cellar adjacent to the storage building at New Hampton Farms.

#### Department of Correction—Expenditures of Corporate Stock Funds (Cal. No. 129).

#### Department of Docks and Ferries—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds (Cal. No. 131).

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen May 28, 1918, and approved by the Mayor on June 4, 1918, requesting an issue of \$2,310 special revenue bonds, the proceeds to be used by the Commissioner of Docks for the purpose of dredging the Municipal Ferry coal pockets at St. George, Staten Island.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget, and Secretary directed to report to said Committee.

#### Department of Docks and Ferries—Approval of Contract, Plans, Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 132).

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 8, 1918, from the Commissioner of Docks, transmitting for approval plans, specifications and form of contract (No. 1593) for dredging and building bulkheads in Mill Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, and work incidental thereto, at an estimated cost of \$250,000; also a memorandum relative to the situation of affairs in the event that the United States Government commandeer the dredges, tugs, scows, etc., necessary for the prosecution of the above contract.

**Register, Bronx County—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 137).**

No. 131-A), and referred to the Comptroller, requesting the transfer of \$100 to replenish the contingent account for his office for the year 1918.

**Sheriff, Kings County—Provision in 1919 Budget for Additional Employees, Etc. (Cal. No. 138).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 29, 1918, from the Foreman of the Grand Jury of Kings County, May, 1918, term, requesting that additional funds be allowed in the 1919 budget, to provide for the employment of four additional male Keepers and two female Senior Prison Helpers and two Matrons at the Raymond Street Jail; also that consideration be given to the matter of the wages paid to employees of the jail.

**District Attorney, Richmond County—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 139).**

**United Spanish War Veterans, Richmond County—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds for Memorial Day Observance (Cal. No. 142).**

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted May 28, 1918, by the Board of Aldermen, approved June 4, 1918, by his Honor the Mayor, requesting an issue of \$200 special revenue bonds, in addition to amount allowed in the budget for the year 1918, to provide for expenses of the United Spanish War Veterans, Richmond County, incidental to the observance of Memorial Day.

Modification of Wage Schedule (No. 1607) by eliminating one position of Auto Machinist at \$5 per day to provide for increasing the compensation of Painters from \$5 to \$5.50 per day.

(m) Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment—

May 29, June 6 and June 11, 1918:

**Borough of The Bronx.**

**Unnamed Street Extending from Hampden Place, Opposite Fordham Road, to Sedgwick Avenue, Borough of The Bronx—Closing and Discontinuing (Cal. No. 145).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated July 14, 1917, from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx; and the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 17624.

June 10, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, bearing date of July 14, 1917, advising that the Local Board of the Van Cortlandt District at its meeting of May 15, 1917, adopted a resolution recommending the discontinuing and closing of an unnamed street extending from Hampden place, opposite West Fordham road, to Sedgwick avenue.

This street, having a length of about 170 feet and a width of 20 feet, was placed upon the City Map under a resolution adopted on December 4, 1913, with the understanding that it would be used for the construction of steps serving to connect the adjoining area on the south and east with the University Heights Bridge and the West 207th street station of the subway, and that the property owners of the district were prepared to meet the expense of carrying out the improvement. The Board is now informed that a large percentage of the property owners who would be affected are opposed to the improvement for the reason that their interests will be adequately served through the provision of access which can be availed of by the utilization of West 182d street and Hampden place.

I see no reason why the plan should not be approved, and would recommend such action after a public hearing. Respectfully,

**Cherry (Cypress) Avenue, from 147th (Percy) Street to 149th Street (Central Avenue); Delaware Avenue, from Parsons Boulevard to a Point About 198 Feet West of 149th Street (Central Avenue), and 147th (Percy) Street, from Elm Avenue to Cherry (Cypress) Avenue, Borough of Queens—Changing Grade (Cal. No. 146).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated September 20, 1917, from the Secretary to the President, Borough of Queens, transmitting map showing proposed change; and the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 17625. June 10, 1918.  
Hon. JOHN F. Hylan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of September 20, 1917, presenting for approval a map showing a change proposed in the grade of Cherry (Cypress) avenue, from 147th (Percy) street to 149th street (Central Avenue); of Delaware avenue, from Parsons Boulevard to a point about 198 feet west of 149th street (Central Avenue), and of 147th (Percy) street, from Elm Avenue to Cherry (Cypress) Avenue.

These changes comprise a lowering of the grade of Delaware Avenue about 22 inches at its intersection with 147th street, the insertion of a summit in the block of Delaware Avenue, between 147th street and Parsons Avenue, and provision for a break in the grade of Cherry Avenue in the block between 147th street and 149th street, the latter change involving a departure from the grade heretofore fixed, to a maximum of about 1 foot.

An inspection shows that the roadway of the three streets described has been macadamized and that Delaware Avenue and Cherry Avenue serve as frontage for a large number of buildings.

Information is presented to the effect that the changes now proposed are designed for the purpose of making the legal grade conform more closely with the existing conditions than did the grades heretofore fixed.

I see no reason why the plan should not be approved and would recommend such action after a public hearing. Respectfully,

## MATTERS LAID OVER FROM PREVIOUS MEETINGS.

**Public Service Commission for the First District—Approval of Proposed Contract with William Eisenstein for Completion of Construction of Shaft No. 2, Route No. 26, of the Queensboro Rapid Transit Railroad and Issue of Corporate Stock Therefor (Cal. No. 147).**

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller, dated June 2, 1918, recommending that the request of the Public Service Commission for the consent of the Board to a proposed contract with William Eisenstein for the construction of Route No. 26, Shaft No. 2, part of the Queensboro Subway Rapid Transit Railroad, at an estimated cost of \$101,665.50, be denied.

The Comptroller reports that from the engineering reports on this subject it appears that the work of constructing said shaft is not sufficiently urgent to require immediate action, and could be deferred for several years without interfering with the operation of the Steinway tunnel.

(On May 10, 1918 (Cal. No. 88), this matter was referred to the Comptroller.)

(On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 30), a report of the Comptroller was presented and the matter laid over until this meeting, and the Secretary directed to send copy of report of the Comptroller to the Public Service Commission for its information and for suggestions.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 13, 1918, from the Public Service Commission, urging approval; and a communication of the same date from said Commission in further explanation.

The matter was laid over one week (June 21, 1918).

**Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Transfer of Funds; Issue of Corporate Stock (Cal. No. 148).**

(On June 7, 1918 (Cal. No. 32), the report of the Comptroller was presented and matter laid over until this meeting, under Rule 19.)

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller:

May 21, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In an action brought to recover damages for extra work and for breach of contract in connection with contract No. 26777, for furnishing, delivering and laying high pressure mains in the Gowanus and South Brooklyn Districts, the Cranford Company has secured a judgment against The City of New York, in the sum of \$8,248.12, which the Corporation Counsel advises me under date of May 10, 1918, "was properly obtained and is a legal charge against the Treasury" of the City.

The contract related to the improvement of the water supply system of the Borough of Brooklyn, by extending the high pressure fire service into the Gowanus and South Brooklyn Districts, to cover the cost of which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized an issue of corporate stock, in an amount not exceeding \$750,000, May 28, 1909. That authorization was credited to an account entitled "C.D.W. 9-A, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Extension of the High Pressure Water Supply for Fire Service to Gowanus and South Brooklyn Districts."

The cash balance in the above account, as at May 28, 1915 (\$599.59), was transferred by authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to account "C.F.M. 24-A, Moneys Available for Permanent Improvements for which Corporate Stock May Lawfully be Issued, Water," and the unissued portion of the corporate stock authorization of May 28, 1909, was rescinded by the Board July 1, 1915. Nothing remains to the credit of account C.D.W. 9-A, with which to meet the judgment referred to. There is, however, a credit balance in account C.F.M. 24-A of \$2,334.42, which can be transferred to the credit of account C.D.W. 9-A. This will leave \$5,913.70 to be supplied, which it appears should be provided by the issue of corporate stock.

I therefore attach two resolutions for adoption by your Board, one authorizing the transfer of \$2,334.42 from account "C.F.M. 24-A, Moneys Available for Permanent Improvements for which Corporate Stock May Lawfully be Issued, Water," to account "C.D.W. 9-A, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Extension of the High Pressure Water Supply for Fire Service to Gowanus and South Brooklyn Districts," and the other authorizing the issue of corporate stock in the amount of \$5,913.70 for the purpose of replenishing the latter account. payment of legal charges against the City in connection with the work of improving the water supply system of the Borough of Brooklyn, by extending the high pressure fire service into the Gowanus and South Brooklyn Districts of the Borough of Brooklyn, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and for the purpose aforesaid approves the transfer of said amount from the said fund to the fund entitled "C.D.W. 9-A, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Extension of High Pressure Water Supply for Fire Service to Gowanus and South Brooklyn Districts."

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York, to the amount of fifty-nine hundred and thirteen dollars and seventy cents (\$5,913.70) in addition to that heretofore authorized, to provide means for the payment of legal charges against the City, which have arisen in connection with the work of improving the water supply system of the Borough of Brooklyn, as set forth in said section 178 of the Charter, by extending the high pressure for fire service into the Gowanus and South Brooklyn Districts of the Borough of Brooklyn, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and for the purpose of providing means therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding fifty-nine hundred and thirteen dollars and seventy cents (\$5,913.70) the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond—16.

**President, Borough of Manhattan—Appropriation for Shifting Tracks of New York Railways Company (Cal. No. 149).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 13, 1918, from the President, Borough of Manhattan, requesting authority to proceed with the adjustment of the tracks of the New York Railways Company in connection with the regrading, curbing, paving, etc., of Fourth Avenue, from East 32d Street to East 34th Street, and East 33d Street, from Fourth Avenue to Lexington Avenue, and requesting an appropriation of \$100,000 to commence and complete this work.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.

**Public Service Commission for the First District—Approval of Proposed Agreement Modifying Contract with the United States Realty and Improvement Company for Construction of Section No. 2, Routes Nos. 4 and 6, and Sections Nos. 4 and 5, Routes 4 and 38 (Cal. No. 150).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 14, 1918, from the Public Service Commission for the First District, requesting the Board to consent to the proposed agreement with the United States Realty & Improvement Company, modifying contract for the construction of Section No. 2, Routes Nos. 4 and 36, so as to provide for the return of \$40,000 of retained percentages; modifying contract for the construction of Section No. 4, Routes Nos. 4 and 38 so as to provide for the return of \$20,000 of retained percentages, and modifying contract for the construction of Section No. 5, Routes Nos. 4 and 38, so as to provide for the return of \$35,000 of retained percentages.

**Fire Department—Approval of Modified Contract and Specifications (Cal. No. 151).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 13, 1918, from the Fire Commissioner requesting the Board, in pursuance of section 418 of the Charter, to release the Front Drive Motor Company from liquidated damages under its contract for furnishing aerial hook and ladder trucks; also requesting the Board to consent to the modification of the contract and specifications to the extent necessary to permit the acceptance of this fire apparatus under a satisfactory adjustment with the contractor and compensation to the City for departure from specifications.

**Various City Departments—Compensation of Marine Employees (Cal. No. 154).**

The Secretary presented a telegram dated June 13, 1918, from the National War Labor Board relative to the adjustment of rates of compensation of marine employees in The City of New York to agree with those fixed by the United States Shipping Board for similar employment in New York Harbor.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, and the Secretary directed to prepare a report thereon.

**Department of Public Charities—Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 155).**

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 13, 1918, from the Commissioner of Public Charities, requesting the modification of schedules supporting the budget allowances for steamboats, so as to provide for the payment of the prevailing rate of wages as fixed by the United States Shipping Board.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

##### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, June 18, 1918, at 2.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keefe, Farley, Stern and Wright, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Paulding and Sachs, and Mr. Coler, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, Ex-Officio.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: Some suggestion as to the extent to which we should co-operate with the new hotel regulations regarding the use of beef, as issued by Mr. Hoover, is requested. This regulation directs that beef in any form shall be served not more than four meals per week. We are gradually extending the use of wheatless bread among the staff and employees.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows: In reporting the census of the various hospitals of the Department the General Medical Superintendent was requested to present a parallel column giving the census for the corresponding period of the previous year. In discussing diphtheria, which developed in a pupil nurse reported by the General Medical Superintendent, reference was made to the Shick test made among nurses in the employ of the Department, and after discussion it was resolved to ask the Training School for Nurses and the Physician of the Training School why this test is not made and the recommendations of the Medical Board relating thereto observed. The suggestion as to the extent to which the hospitals of the Department should co-operate with the new hotel regulations regarding the use of beef was considered and the subject referred to the President and the General Medical Superintendent with power.

##### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on June 7 for butter, cheese, eggs, bread and rolls; June 10, for meats and poultry; June 13, for stock

fruits and vegetables; June 18, for fish and clams, milk and cream. On the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, premised on a report from the Purchasing Agent to the General Medical Superintendent under date of June 18, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders.

Dr. Brannan referred to a letter received from the Mayor under date of May 31, approving the appointment of Catherine R. Kelley as Electrocardiographer at Bellevue, which communication was ordered placed on file.

Reference was made to the departmental estimate for 1919, which is to be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by August 1 of this year. On motion, duly seconded and carried, Mr. O'Keefe and Mr. Sachs were appointed a Budget Committee for the preparation of the departmental estimate.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee, premised upon a report from McKim, Mead & White, under date of June 30, and the Inspector of Construction under date of June 6, the payment of the retained 2 per cent. on the contract of the H. C. Stowe Construction Company for the erection of the balconies at Bellevue Hospital was approved.

Jennings & John, contractors for the installation of screens at Fordham Hospital, requested an extension of time on account of freight congestion. A report relating thereto was presented from the Acting Supervising Engineer and on the recommendation of the Building Committee an extension of thirty days' time was granted to the contractor.

##### COMMUNICATIONS.

Letters addressed to Dr. O'Hanlon from Dr. Edgar under date of May 22 and Dr. Flint dated April 30 and June 4 regarding the co-ordination of the work of the maternity service at Bellevue with the School for Midwives and the Maternity Centre Association were presented. After discussion, on the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the plan on probation.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for June 1 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and



carried, the request of W. H. W. Knipe for an indefinite leave of absence on account of military duty, his service during his absence to be covered by E. Cook, Assistant Visiting Obstetrician, was approved. The recommendation that the former Out-Patient Department be remodeled into a Children's Admission Ward was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated June 7 was presented from Charles Norris, Chief Medical Examiner of The City of New York, presenting his resignation as Director of Laboratories of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. It was moved, seconded and carried to defer action on this letter until the next meeting. A letter dated June 12 was presented from the State Board of Charities, with a report into an investigation of Harlem Hospital of a complaint filed with Governor Whitman by Jacob Strauss regarding alleged unsanitary methods and conditions at that hospital. Mr. O'Keeffe presented a comprehensive report relating thereto and read sections of the report of the investigators, who find as a result of their inquiry that there is no positive evidence that the cases under investigation were caused by unsanitary conditions at Harlem Hospital or by neglect on the part of the Administration, and that the methods and precautions adopted at that hospital compare favorably with those employed in similar institutions. The Trustees in their desire to improve wherever possible the administration of the hospitals under their jurisdiction carefully considered the recommendations of the State Board of Charities and instructed the General Medical Superintendent to carry them out. A communication dated June 7 was presented from the Comptroller reporting that \$9,997.50 out of the \$10,000 legacy was invested in 1965 bonds of The City of New York bearing interest at the rate of 4½ per cent., which communication was ordered placed on file.

A resolution dated May 28, 1918, was presented from the Board of Aldermen approving the issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$238,550 to meet the deficits in the appropriation, which resolution was ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.

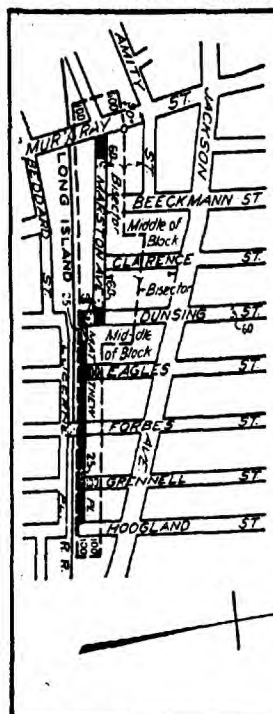

The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
