Made—4 clothes-racks, 2 splints, 6 closets, 3 trays, 2 door-saddles, 5 shelves, 6 wash-stands, 1 oval frame, 1 cradle, 1 knife tray, 12 towel racks, 1 drop shelf, 1 half-door, 1 letter rack, 1 bulletin board, 125 bed stands, 30 coffins, 1 air duct for centre building, 300 square feet narrow flooring put down, 1 new water-closet, 1 new bath-tub. Repaired—1 desk, 20 windows, 6 water-closets, 2 bedsteads, 8 benches, 2 skylights, 2 doors, 3 pairs of blinds, 2 step-ladders, 1 mat stand, 4 laundry racks, 3 stair railings, 2 tables, 5 locks, 64 stools, 74 chairs, 34 lights glass put in, new cord in 15 windows.

Bath-rooms, water-closets, and wash-rooms have been painted and kalsomined; cellar has been whitewashed and kalsomined; and painting done in various parts of the hospital.

In gas-house, 748,000 feet of gas has been manufactured for use of New York City Insane Asylum and this hospital.

At bone mill, 645 barrels of bone-dust have been made.

The out-door labor has been meagre on account of the season, still a large number of convalescent patients have been occupied with light work. In the female department the patients have done considerable sewing, mending, etc.

HART'S ISLAND HOSPITAL.

Carpenter's Work—Making closets, doors, clothes-bins, dining-tables, sashes, hand-barrows, foot-scrapers, bench, medicine-closet, wash-stand, panel doors, document boxes, window frames, new beams, etc., etc. Repaired—flooring, park benches, windows, bed springs, chairs, and many minor articles.

Coopers—Making bathing-tubs and clothes-tubs. Repaired—40 water casks.

Plumbers and Tinsmiths—Making 43 iron caps for stove-pipe. Repaired roof of office building, ank kept in repair all pumps, water-closets, kitchen utensils, and stove-pipes.

Painters—Painted stoops, tables, closets and shelves, foot-baths, pump-house, windows, hand-barrows, bread wagon, rooms, park benches, pails, doors, etc.

Sewing Room—Made 149 and repaired 840 articles of apparel.

Carpenters—Making 113 adults' coffins, 114 children's coffins, 95 benches, 20 settees, large ice box, drawing board, 5x6 feet, and trestles, apparatus for telegraph wire, 4 boxes for stop-cocks, 2 saddles for doors, yarn-reel, 1 desk, 4 boxes for shelves, 4 record boxes, 1 frame for screen, 1 bench, 1 fan-light, 1 pavement rammer; 114 days' work of wheelrights on carts, wagons, trucks, etc.; 95 days' work of carpenters on Maternity Hospital, 54 days' work of carpenters on railings and repairs Central Office, 43 days' work of carpenters, repairing fences, buildings, etc.; bottoming and repairing 51 chairs; handling 2 stone-hammers, 2 stone-hooks, sledge and pick; turning and boring pump bucket; repairing 6 doors, 5 chairs, 5 tables, 4 washboards, 1 bedstead, 1 bread-crate, 1 sash and 1 stool; putting in 46 sash-cords, blocks on 41 scrubs.

Blacksmiths—Putting on 232 horse-shoes, making 76 fan-light openers, 350 handles, 500 ears and 370 rivets for pails, 290 bolts and nails, 150 spikes, 90 staples, 1 set of irons for telegraph-wire reel, hydrant-wrench, weather-vane, plate and steel screws for steam pump, 2 fire-hoes and slice bar, irons for swings, new hinge for iron door, 9 parting sockets, 47 rivets, new, 14 keys for stays, 2 large bolts and nuts, 1 large bolt and 8 spikes, 4 skimmer handles, 2 root forks, drawing rake for gas-house, 4 hooks, 2 rings and draught chain, 3 iron straps and grate bar, 2 coal hammers, 19 hooks and 6 pokers, 2 fire-hoes, 4 grate bars, 4 stone-hooks, 2 shakers, hoop for pavement rammer, irons for yarn reel; repairing irons of carts, wagons, drays, etc., irons of 23 bread barrels, fire irons of gas-house and Lunatic Asylum, Blackwell's Island, 3 stays, stove and 2 locks, wagon jack, 11 hand-trucks, 3 iron wheelbarrows, 8 wheelbarrows, 2 platform scales wiring-machine, and 6 punches, 4 pairs hames, 3 whiffletrees and saddle, 18 iron bedsteads, 14 locks, butcher's cleaver and poker; cleaning and repairing 15 clocks; sharpening 12 pairs cutters' shears, and 17 pairs scissors.

Repairing 248 pieces of tin ware.

Coopers—Making 390 new pails, 8 new bread barrels. Coopering 3,900 flour barrels, 507 barrels. Repairing 52 bread barrels, 59 pails and 5 tubs.

Painters—Painting passengers' waiting room, shoe shop, oil house, engine house, mechanics' shops, dead house, straw house, coffee-roasting house, coffins, carts, wagons, truck, etc. Glazing where necessary.

Plasterers—Patching ceilings in seventeen wards.

Tailors—Making 147 winter jackets, 383 pairs winter pants, 33 vests, 126 summer jackets, 134 pairs summer pants, 2 suits clothes. Repairing 215 winter jackets, 644 pairs winter pants, 50 vests, 184 summer jackets, 297 pairs summer pants.

Sewing Room—Making 160 women's dresses, 377 women's aprons, 202 women's chemises, 100 women's night-gowns, 100 women's caps, 3 pairs women's drawers, 380 men's shirts, 62 men's aprons, 3 pairs men's drawers, 302 sheets, 204 pillow-cases, 100 bed ticks, 50 pillow ticks, 50 adult shrouds, 40 shroud caps. Knitting 792 pairs men's socks. Repairing 388 dresses, 172 petticoats, 356 chemises, 1,185 shirts, 771 sheets, 82 pillow cases, 38 blankets, 71 bed ticks, 15 spreads, 195 undershirts, 1,014 pairs socks.

Wash House—95,860 pieces of clothing.

Shoemakers—Making 1 pair new and repairing 630 pairs old shoes.

Engineer—Repairing roof of Lodge and Retreat, running gas-pipe in six new rooms for nurses at Lodge; kept in repair steam, gas, and water pipes; water-closets and sewers; Main Building, Lodge, Retreat, and Pavilion; also the general work of this department.

Painter—Painting drug-store, closets, rooms, ceiling, partitions, windows, bath-room, water-closet passages, doctor's office, rooms, in halls, etc.; painting and varnishing tables, chairs, bureaus, wardrobes; painting walls and woodwork in pavilions, closets, settees, rooms in Lodge; whitening ceilings and glazing throughout the buildings, etc.

Carpenter—Making grape-arbor, platforms, closets for wash-house, book-case, tables, wash-stands, bureaus, wardrobes, picture frames, meat-chest, coffins; repairs to pavilions, lodges, Medical Superintendent's house and office, retreat, main building, dead-house, wheelbarrows, chairs, settees, benches, etc.

Knitting-Room—Knit 556 pairs men's socks and 68 pairs women's stockings.

Sewing-Room—Made 300 chemises and 100 night-gowns.

NEW YORK CITY ASYLUM FOR THE INSANE,
WARD'S ISLAND, April 6, 1878.

SIR—I have the honor to report amount of labor performed by the inmates of this Institution for quarter ending March 31, 1878:

Out-door Improvement—Working on new wing, cutting and storing ice, carting sand, and loading barge with same for Blackwell's Island, cleaning exercise yards of ice and snow, unloading and carting coal for both institutions, repairing roads and walks.

Carpenter's Department—Making coffins, table, closets, shelf, fitting up rooms for attendants and fireman, renovating wards. Repairing tables, wheel-barrows, carts, benches, doors, windows, bath tubs, water closets, locks; glazing, whitewashing, painting, and general repairs.

Engineer and Blacksmith—Making drills, slice bars, hoes, hasps, staples, keys, chisel, scrapers, braces, dressing drills; repairing hoes, bars, carts, wagons, bedsteads, shoeing horses, repairing steam tables, water closets, bath tubs, kitchen boilers; overhauling gas and steam pipes, and general repairs.

Sewing Room—Making shrouds, repairing 5,467 cotton and 2,845 woolen articles.

SIR—Annexed I beg to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending March 31, 1878.

The number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the results accomplished by such labor during the quarter.

Blacksmith's and Tinsmith's Shops—Made 508 new and repaired 63 iron bedsteads, 177 steel hand-drills, 34 pitching tools, 207 points, 144 chisels, 13 stone axes, 25 stonecutter's hammers, 124 plugs, 136 feathers, 2 derrick bands, 49 tub handles, 98 bucket handles, 130 straps, 900 rivets, 50 cover posts, 50 spindles, 50 braces, 172 bucket ears, 16 hooks, 5 tongs, 36 bolts, 125 spikes, 38 feet stove pipe, 5 elbows, 2 butcher knives; repaired broom, sewing and cutting machines, grates, bath tubs, tinware, etc.

Repairs on Wagons, Ambulances, Carts, etc.—Of tires, clips, braces bolts, tires reset, half springs, new tires, new bolts, wheel-truck, axle arm, stays, spring blocks, chain, spokes, repair on light-top wagon, tire reset, bolts, cap plate, check strap, jack clips, repairs, etc., etc.

Tinsmiths—1,525 new tin mess pans, 200 new tin water cups, 100 new tin dust pans, 50 new tin dish pans, 12 new large tin dippers, 24 six-gallon soup kettles, 4 new sheet iron bread pans, new boiler with copper bottom, 3,650 square feet tin roofing on Insane Asylum, 875 square feet tin roofing on Homeopathic Hospital, all on Ward's Island, 525 square feet tin roofing on Penitentiary Hospital, Blackwell's Island; and all necessary repairs to cell doors, locks, keys and all iron works around the prison have been made, and all tinware and utensils kept in proper order for use, all tools used on the island have been repaired and sharpened, and many repairs have been done for steamboats.

At the Carpenters' and Painters' Shop—219 window blinds painted, 2 signs painted, 36 garden signs made, 14 tubs and 12 buckets painted, 2 guard boats painted, 52 iron bedsteads, 2 arm chairs, and 3 dirt carts painted; making 30 snow shovels, 197 hammer handles, 3 chisel, 4 pickaxe, 6 axe, 13 stone-ham-

mer, 99 sledge, 124 stone-breaker handles, 3 boat-hooks, 111 coffins, 34 new tables, 52 new buckets, 3 new wash kettles, 242 new brush backs, 39 new stools and 97 stools repaired, 27 new tubs, 17 tubs repaired, 3 new clothes horses, 12 benches, 6 new wheelbarrows, 77 wheelbarrows repaired, 14 new hand barrows, 9 washstands, 21 closets, 1 cupboard, 6 shelves, 1 table, wood bedstead, 1 dresser front, doors, framing panels, 1 large closet, 30 window frames, 1 bedstead, 2 mattresses, 1 cupboard, etc., etc., for Maternity Hospital; 2 sign boards, for Central Office; 30 new window sashes and 4 window frames for workhouse boiler room, 2 doors for same, new roof on soap house, 227 new straps, 3 new guard houses for W. I. Asylum, closet repaired, 2 water closets for female hospital, 1 water closet for prison hospital, 1 storm house and platform for coal bridge, 4 sets oarlocks, 1 guard-boat repaired and painted, boat-house repaired and painted, 1 water tank, 103 pine doors. Lunatic Asylum, B. I.—1 water tank for sewing room.

Carpenter's Shop—Spokes and felloes for dirt cart, cushions and curtains to buggy wagon, truck repaired, bread wagon, 3 ambulances repaired and trimmed throughout, 2 wheels for hand carts, repairs to buggy and six ambulance wheels repaired, etc. All needful repairs and alterations and varnishing throughout the prison and adjacent buildings, etc., to furniture, fixtures, utensils, and all necessary glazing has been done.

At Tailors and Coat Makers—There have been made 243 woolen jackets, 116 pairs pants, 75 vests, 260 pairs men's mitts, 242 new coats; repaired, 1,363 jackets, 2,206 pairs pants, 974 vests, 19 caps, 116 coats.

The Broommakers and Brushmakers have made 280 dozen brooms, 212 dozen scrub brushes, 1 1-3 dozen whitewash brushes, 283 rope mats.

At the Shoemakers' Shop have been made 2,390 pairs men's shoes, 51 pairs boys' shoes, 9 pairs men's slippers, 233 pairs women's shoes, 14 pairs women's slippers, and repaired 1,662 pairs men's shoes, 106 pairs women's shoes.

At the Sewing-room female prisoners have made 558 men's shirts, 144 men's vests, 199 pairs men's pants, 100 women's dresses, 100 women's shifts, 271 pairs socks, 106 sheets, 105 pillow cases, 3 pillow ticks, 7 mattresses, 27 bed ticks, 18 towels, and have repaired 3,270 shirts, 345 dresses, 522 chemises, 137 skirts, 898 pairs socks, 150 pairs stockings, 18 sheets, 185 pillow cases, 150 pairs gloves.

By the Prisoners Employed at Out-Door Labor—40 barges of clay and dirt have been discharged, a drain 400 feet long, 4 feet deep, and 5 feet wide has been dug; a gang of 50 prisoners has been at work on grounds filling in and grading, 5,000 tons of coal discharged from barges to coal yard, 1,682 cubic feet of building stone cut and dressed, 1,356 cubic feet fine dressed stone, 172 lineal feet water table, 46 square feet flagging, by stone cutters; 4,500 cubic feet sea wall has been built, and the stone quarried and cut for same at Randall's Island; sea wall around Blackwell's Island repaired and strengthened.

A large quantity of stone has been broken by the stone breakers for building and repairing roads.

All the stone for the above purposes has been quarried by the prisoners.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 917.

SIR—In accordance with the requirements of your Honorable Board, I transmit herewith the Male and Female Labor Reports of this Institution for the quarter ending March 31, 1878.

The male inmates have performed 29,678 days' labor at the various institutions and bureaus of the Department, such as the following:

16 shoemakers have made 370 pairs new shoes, and repaired 1,439 pairs old shoes.

11 tailors have made 2,293 new garments, and repaired 532 old ones.

1 weaver has made 201 yards rag carpet.

A gang of 63 men have been employed at unskilled labor on the extension and alterations to the Lunatic Asylum building.

The female inmates have performed 22,084 days' labor in the building and to the different institutions as laundresses, cooks, waitresses, etc. 150 have been employed in the sewing-room, where 13,230 new pieces of clothing were made and 5,161 repaired.

SIR—I submit herewith my report of the workings of this institution, Branch Lunatic Asylum, and City Cemetery for the quarter ending March 31, 1878.

The average number of male help at this institution during the quarter has been 210, of which 139 have been working in the various gangs in charge of four keepers, and 71 were employed variously, i. e., 4 in shoe shop, 7 in tailor shop, 5 in bakery, 8 in kitchen, 3 in carpenter shop, etc., etc. Subjoined will be found detailed statement of the work performed by mechanics, etc.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Department of Public Works of the City of New York, or a majority of them, deem the changes (specified on the map, or plan and profile hereinafter mentioned) in the grades of the streets, roads and avenues, as laid down and established by the Commissioners appointed under the provisions of chapter 841, of the Laws of 1868, on a map of the same, filed in

the office of the Register of the County of Westchester, on the 23d day of February, 1871, to be required; therefore,

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the powers conferred on the said Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, by chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874, they do hereby alter, amend and establish the grades of the streets, roads and avenues within that part of the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, which formerly constituted the town of Morrisania, and which lies north and east of a line commencing at the termination of the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, at or in the Hudson river, running thence easterly along said southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and a prolongation of said line to the middle of Harlem river, running thence southerly along the middle of said Harlem river to the Sound north of Randall's Island; shown on a map or plan and profile entitled "Map or plan or profile showing the grade or Sedgwick avenue, from Mott avenue to Cromwell avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York," dated "New York, April 16, 1878," and signed "E. B. Van Winkle, Engineer and Surveyor, etc.," of the extent and direction that said grades are designated on said plan and profile, and that the grades so altered, amended and established are such as to the said Commissioners, or a majority of them, seem most conducive to the public good. And that the President of the Department cause to be prepared and submitted to this Board three similar plans and the profiles of the same, to be filed in pursuance of said laws above mentioned.

Resolved, That Engineer E. B. Van Winkle be and he is hereby placed in temporary charge of all the work heretofore in charge of the Civil and Topographical Engineer, without any additional compensation.

Resolved, That the application of the New York Elevated Railroad Company for permission to extend its lines on the Battery Park be and hereby is refused.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
