That after January 1, 1895, all swill, shop-fat, soap-grease, bones, etc., must be placed in
properly covered wooden or metallic receptacles, which shall be tightly covered inside the premises,
and not opened until they reach their destination.
That at least two of such receptacles be kept for each place from which such articles are collected, and that each receptacle, after having been used, shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected in a manner satisfactory to the Board of Health, before being used again.
That all wagons used for transporting swill, shop-fat, soap-grease, bones, etc., must be tightly
covered and enclosed with wood front and rear, and shall be kept thoroughly cleaned and disinfected at all times. fected at all times.
