BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

City Hall, Monday 2 p. m., Jan. 27, 1902.

The Hons. Seth Low, Mayor; George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, and Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, met this day.

The minutes of the meeting of January 22, 1902, were approved as printed.

The Supervisor submitted for the consideration of the Board the following reports: (I.) As to advertising agents. (II.) Recommendations as to samples and sample books from departments. (III.) Recommendation that city advertising be done through the Supervisor.

On motion of the Mayor and by concurrent action of all members of the Board the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Supervisor be directed to communicate to all heads of city departments the request of the Board that all advertising notices be transmitted to him for insertion in the papers; that he thereupon assign a competent clerk or clerks to the charge thereof, under him, and endeavor to so manage the same as to procure all necessary advertising to be placed as economically as possible, in regard to both space and rates; any rebates from schedule rates, if allowed, to be deducted directly from the bills.

On motion of the Mayor and by concurrent action of all the members of the Board the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That there be added to the duties of the position of examiner, now vacant in the Bureau of the Supervisor of the City Record, the duties of advertising agent, to carry out the provisions of the foregoing resolution, under the direction of the Supervisor; and

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission be requested to authorize a temporary appointment to this position, under section 14, subdivision L, of the Civil Service Laws, it being urgent to fill this vacancy immediately.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Water Supply asking for authority to publish notices to citizens before cutting off the water supply in any part of the city.

The Comptroller asked how would he be authorized to draw warrants for such advertising unprovided for by the Greater New York Charter.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel and by concurrent action of all the members of the Board the letter from the Commissioner of Water Supply was referred to the Mayor, with power to act.

The Supervisor presented the following communication:

City of New York—Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office,

January 22, 1902.

To the Board of City Record:

Gentlemen—Although I have verbally requested the Supervisor of the City Record, in the management of his office, to observe in part the regulations suggested in the resolutions accompanying this communication, I have thought best to present the same for formal action by this Board.

I therefore recommend the adoption of the resolutions submitted herewith.

Yours truly, EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller.

On motion of the Comptroller and by concurrent action of all the members of the Board the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That all orders awarded by the Supervisor of the City Record for work or supplies, otherwise than under contract after advertisement, shall be awarded to the lowest bidder after bids have been solicited from a number of responsible firms, and after the lapse of a reasonable time permitting such bids to be made.

Resolved, That in soliciting bids upon all orders the Supervisor of the City Record shall permit sealed bids and, in his notice to bidders, fix the day, hour and minute at which said bids shall be opened, and bidders shall be privileged to retain possession of bids until the time limit fixed is about to expire, as is the custom in receiving bids on contracts let after advertisements.

Resolved, That the foregoing regulations shall be waived only upon the written certification of a member of the Board of City Record that the work or supplies in any case are so urgently needed as to preclude the observance of said regulations.

On motion of the Comptroller and by concurrent action of all the members of the Board the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Supervisor of the City Record communicate with the Appeal Printing Company, Evening Post Job Printing Office, Burgoyne, Middleditch and Martin B. Brown Company and ask at what rate per law page such houses will undertake to do the printing for the Law Department of the City of New York for the year 1902, and to report their proposals to this Board.

The Supervisor presented to the attention of the Board the matter of paying Thomas J. Douglas, of No. 60 Fourth place, Brooklyn, \$2 per week for delivering the morning and afternoon papers to the office of the City Record.

A communication in reference to this matter was presented from Walter M. Hawley, President of the Association of City Hall Reporters, stating that it would be a great favor to the worthy boy employed if he could retain his employment; that there was no politics in the arrangement.

On motion of the Comptroller and by concurrent action of all the members the matter was duly referred to the Mayor, with power to act.

On motion of the Mayor the Board adjourned to meet on Monday, February 3, 1902, at 2 p. m.

During the Quarter ending September 30, 1901.

The Sanitary Bureau is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools.
