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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

ACTIONS OF THE COMMISSIONER OF DOCKS, APRIL 6, 1906.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the City Clerk (66522)—Transmitting resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen February 20, 1906, requesting the Commissioner of Docks to advise said Board as to the feasibility of constructing and maintaining a recreation pier in the lower part of the Borough of The Bronx, on the Harlem river, at either Brook avenue, Alexander avenue or Willis avenue. Notified that it would be impracticable to locate a recreation pier at any of the streets named.

From the Comptroller (67037)—Asking whether this Department has under its jurisdiction any property which it does not require that could be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to be assigned for Departmental purposes. Notified that the Department has no property to be surrendered at present, but that in the near future there may be a parcel between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, East river, to be surrendered for the use of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

From the Corporation Counsel (67085)—Transmitting certified copy of order of the Supreme Court taxing bill of costs at the sum of \$2,949.58, and granting an allowance of \$500 to each of the three Commissioners in the matter of acquiring title to Piers (old) 19 and 20, East river, and bulkhead between. Vouchers ordered drawn for payment of the amounts.

From the President of the Borough of Manhattan (67117)—Requesting consent to the transfer to his office of William Clifford, Dock Laborer in this Department. Consent granted.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1 (66951)—Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Financial Clerk in this Department. New list requested, all of the persons certified having declined appointment to the position.

2 (67119). Approving the reassignment of Thomas E. O'Neil, Oiler. Filed.

From the Bellevue Hospital (67110)—Requesting to be advised as to the rate of pay which Firemen are receiving in this Department. Notified that in this Department the work of Firemen is performed by Stokers, who receive 43 1/4 cents per hour, and by Marine Stokers, who receive \$90 per month.

From the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices for the Borough of Brooklyn (66997)—Requesting permission to place a public bath at the pier foot of Noble street, Brooklyn, during the coming summer. Permit granted to place the bath on the north side of the pier.

From the Clyde Steamship Company (67047)—Requesting permission to make repairs to Pier 36, North river. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—

1 (67048). Requesting permission to make repairs to the outer end of Pier 38, East river. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines.

2 (67049). Requesting permission to make repairs to its ferry racks and transfer bridges at Oak Point, East river, Borough of The Bronx. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines.

From the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company (67056)—Requesting permission to make repairs, when necessary, to its ferry racks and bridges at the foot of Whitehall street, Manhattan, and at the foot of Thirty-ninth street, Brooklyn. Permits granted upon the usual terms, to continue until December 31, 1906, unless sooner revoked.

From the Sea Gate Association (66080)—Requesting permission to land its steamboats "A. J. Phillips" and "Atlantic" at the Battery Landing during the season of 1906. Privilege granted to continue during the season of 1906, rental to be at the rate of \$300 per month, payable monthly at the end of each month to the Cashier.

From the New York and Long Branch Steamboat Company (66517)—Requesting permission to make landings at the Battery wharf during the season of 1906, and submitting time schedule for approval. From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey (66087)—Requesting permission to occupy surface area of the northerly half of the West Twenty-second street pier, North river, for a distance of 400 feet in length, commencing at the inshore end and going offshore. Privilege granted to continue until April 30, 1906, unless sooner revoked, rental to be at the rate of \$400 per month, payable monthly at the end of each month to the Cashier.

From the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company (67038)—Requesting that the Department raise the grade of the bulkhead wall between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river. Notified that the wall will be brought to grade by the force of this Department.

From John O'Neil, Marine Engineer (67139)—Requesting that he be placed on the monthly pay-roll on the same basis as the Engineers employed on the tug boats of the Department. Salary fixed at \$125 per month, to take effect May 1, 1906.

From the Superintendent of Docks (67138)—Recommending that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be requested to permit this Department to use the hydrants on the new made land between Cortlandt and Gansevoort streets, and between West Twenty-third and Thirtieth streets, North river, and on the new made land between East Eighteenth and Twenty-fourth streets, East river, for sprinkling purposes, as heretofore. Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested to issue permit for the use of the hydrants.

From John J. Herrick, Mechanical Engineer (67136)—Submitting corrected proof of contract for securing 5,000 tons of bituminous coal, and recommending that same be printed and advertised. Ordered advertised as Contract No. 997.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1 (66998). Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Topographical Draughtsman. The persons certified having failed to accept the appointment, the Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to submit a new list.

2 (67128). Stating that the proposed transfer of Robert Gere, Frank J. Butler and William J. Fay, from the position of Collector to that of Clerk cannot be approved for the reason that said persons have not qualified for the position through examination, and suggesting that the Department request an examination for promotion to seventh grade Clerk in which the Collectors might participate. Municipal Civil Service Commission requested to hold an examination for promotion of Collectors to seventh grade clerkship.

From the President of the Borough of Manhattan (67082)—Stating that he is in receipt of a complaint from James Shewan & Sons relative to the condition of Tompkins street, between Stanton and East Houston streets, East river, and requesting this Department to give the complaint consideration. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines and within the property owned by the ferry company.

From the Anchor Line (67113)—Requesting permission to cover turrets at the gateway of Pier 64, North river, with asbestos filling and to place twenty-eight new skylights in the roof of the shed on said pier. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From William Schuette (67165)—Requesting permission to occupy plot of ground near Broad Channel Station, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens. ACTIONS OF THE COMMISSIONER OF DOCKS, APRIL 9, 1906.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the Mayor (67118)—Transmitting a communication from John Thomson, Librarian of the Free Library of Philadelphia, asking whether the Department has a report in relation to the Municipal Ferry, and a communication from Ernest Bohm, Secretary of the Central Federated Union, stating they are in receipt of a complaint from the Firemen and Engineers, employed on the Municipal Ferry, in relation to the charge of \$2 made by the Department for a badge. Thomson notified that the Department has thus far published no report in regard to the ferry; Bohm notified that the \$2 payment is merely a deposit, which is refunded to the employee on the surrender of the badge.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund (67133)—Transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted April 4, 1906, as follows: (a) authorizing the establishment of ferry from and to the foot of Ocean avenue, Sheepshead Bay; thence to Plum Beach; thence to Barren Island; thence to various points on Rockaway Beach, stopping en route when required at the various houses in Jamaica Bay, used for boating and fishing purposes, and (b) authorizing a lease by private agreement to P. Howard Reid, of a franchise to operate the above-mentioned ferry. Ferry established by the Commissioner (67160); Corporation Counsel requested to prepare form of lease; Reid notified of the adoption of the resolutions.

From the Comptroller (67131)—Stating that on March 26 the sum of \$216,112.80 was deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Dock Fund. Filed.

From the Department of Education—

1 (66896). Requesting to be advised as to the localities in the Borough of Brooklyn at which canal boats are usually berthed, in order that it may determine whether children of school age reside on such boats. Notified that canal boats are moored in large numbers in the Atlantic, Erie and Wallabout basins at various times.

2 (67146). Advising that the request of this Department for information as to whether the Board would require the use of the East Third street recreation pier for school purposes after the close of the present school year had been referred to the Committee on Elementary Schools, and that a decision would probably be rendered by the committee at its meeting on April 10. Filed.

From the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Manhattan (67130)—Submitting report of Chief Engineer of Sewers, stating that surveys are being made and plans prepared in order that contract may be let to replace old box sewer with one of brick at the foot of West Twenty-third street, North river, as soon as the filling in in rear of the bulkhead wall thereat is completed. Notified that the filling will be completed in time to permit the rebuilding of the sewer as soon as the contract therefor is let.

From the President of the Borough of Manhattan (67129)—Advising that the transfer of James E. Clifford, Foreman Laborer, to his Department has become effective. Clifford's name dropped from the list of employees of this Department.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission (67116)—Advising that the request of the Department for the amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class, by which the line "Assistant Superintendent of Ferries" may be changed to read "Four Assistant Superintendents of Ferries," was laid over and stating that further argument on same will be heard on April 11, 1906. Filed.

From Mrs. Margaret Fisher (67059)—Requesting permission to maintain a float in front of the bulkhead on the south side of the pier foot of North Second street, Brooklyn. Permit granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than the summer season of 1906, rental to be at the rate of \$2.50 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master.

From the Long Island Railroad Company (67030)—Requesting permission to build a single-track trestle across Flushing creek, Queens Borough, southerly of the present track trestle. Permit granted, in so far as such permission from this Department is necessary, the approval of the Federal authorities to be first obtained; the work is to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From William A. Thomas & Co. (67170)—Requesting permission to erect a temporary shanty on the bulkhead between Third and Houston streets, East river. Permit granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, the work to be done under the

supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, who is to report whether any portion of the structure is on City property, in order that proper compensation may be charged therefor.

From the Oak Point Land and Dock Company (67168)—Submitting plans and specifications for the construction of a bulkhead platform and filling in rear of same, and for the construction of four piers between Cabot and Tiffany streets, Borough of The Bronx. Notified that the plans as amended are satisfactory, and that the pier may be constructed in accordance therewith, the work not to be commenced on City property until the lease of the land under water to be covered by the piers and owned by the City is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From Edward J. Shriver (67115)—Suggesting the placing of a letter-box on the Municipal Ferry, in which passengers might place suggestions or complaints with reference to the ferry. Filed.

From the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company (67034)—Stating they anticipate being able to move into their new East Shore Terminal at St. George, Borough of Richmond, within a week's time. Filed.

From the Greenpoint Business Men's Association (66986)—Transmitting resolution adopted by the Association expressing appreciation of the action of the City authorities in providing for the establishment of a public dock at Newtown and Whale creeks. Filed.

From the New England Navigation Company (66928)—Acknowledging receipt of communication from this Department in relation to the proposed lease to the company of the East Twenty-second street pier, and calling attention to the repairs required to the pier, and to the fact that the ferry rack of the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company, adjacent to the north side of said pier, is so poorly constructed that it is continually striking the side of the pier and causing damage thereto. Filed.

From John D. Birmingham (67158)—Protesting against the appointment of a Foreman Painter while there are veterans in the Department eligible for promotion to the position. Filed.

From Henry Shafer (67144)—Requesting this Department to sell to him the unused Dock Master's office, located at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Port Morris, Borough of The Bronx. Notified that condemned property can only be disposed of at public auction, and that the house in question is to be removed to the Chelsea section.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1 (67167)—Recommending that L. J. Halloran, Ship Carpenter, be placed on the weekly pay-roll of the Department for a period not exceeding four weeks, with compensation at the rate of \$24 per week, he having been injured while in the service of the Department by an explosion on the launch "Kills." ACTIONS OF THE COMMISSIONER OF DOCKS APRIL 10, 1906.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the Mayor—

1. (66790). Transmitting communication from W. E. Streeter in which he asks that before final decision is rendered, careful consideration be given his request for the use of the old Staten Island ferryboats and one of the slips at the foot of Whitehall street for a ferry between the Battery and Coney Island, during the summer season. Streeter notified that the City is planning to operate three ferries between the foot of Whitehall street, Borough of Manhattan, and the Borough of Richmond, and that the two slips at the Manhattan terminal will be required for the Staten Island ferries.

2. (66927). Transmitting communication from A. Cary Smith, stating that as yet he has received no compensation for his services rendered in connection with the preparation of plans and specifications for the new Staten Island ferryboats for use on the Municipal Ferry, and requesting that the matter be given consideration. Smith notified that the matter has been referred to the Corporation Counsel both by this Department and by the Comptroller.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment (67156)—Transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted April 6, 1906, approving of issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$4,100,000 for the uses and purposes of this Department. Filed.

From the Comptroller (67183)—Requesting consent to the substitution of the National Surety Company in the place of the Illinois Surety Company on the proposal of the Northeastern Construction Company, for the construction of waiting rooms, etc., at the Whitehall terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, under Contract No. 986. Consent granted.

2. (67050). Asking that as a petition has been filed in his office by Emily M. Roemer, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to release to her certain lands between the northerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and the southerly side of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, on the Hudson river, in the Borough of Manhattan, he be furnished with a diagram of the locality in question, together with whatever information the Department may have in relation to same. Information and diagram furnished, with the statement that the question of the City's title to property in the locality is at present somewhat involved.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1. (66971). Calling attention to the resolution adopted by the Commission providing that hereafter all promotion examinations will be held only during the months of May and November of each year, and requesting to be advised as to what promotion examinations the Department is desirous of having held for its employees. BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room on Wednesday, March 28, 1906.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Stern, Tack, Robbins, Tierney, Sachs and Paulding, trustees.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

During the week ending March 24, twenty-seven operations were performed at Bellevue, nine at Gouverneur, two at Harlem and four at Fordham, at all of which the attending Physicians or Surgeons were present.

Attention is invited to a former recommendation that an X-ray photographer be appointed at \$1,200 a year. Recently two sets of rectifiers in the X-ray apparatus were destroyed because members of the house staff left the apparatus without turning off the current, thus causing a loss of fifty dollars. Until an experienced operator is employed it will be necessary to allow the house staff to use the apparatus.

A study of the plans for the furniture of the new Fordham Hospital kitchen indicates that these should be changed. The range as located does not permit the expansion needed should new wards be built, the coffee boilers are too small, there should be steel instead of wooden tables, there should be dish washing machines instead of wash tubs, and other changes to have an up to date equipment. The architect, Mr. Almirall, and the sub-contractor for the apparatus, Messrs. Duparquet, Huot & Moneuse Company have been consulted, and they offer to substitute the fixtures that are required in place of the apparatus originally approved at a cost of \$1,597. It is recommended that these changes be authorized and that the present sub-contractor do the work because an allowance should be made between the cost of the desired apparatus and that called for by the original plans.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That action on the matter of appointing an X-ray photographer be deferred.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of the kitchen equipment of the new Fordham Hospital be referred to the Building Committee for investigation and report.

Communications.

A communication dated March 26 was received from Messrs. Horgan & Slattery on the matter of installing sterilizers in the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the Superintendent for investigation and report.

A communication dated March 26 was received from Messrs. P. J. Carlin & Co. on alterations to slop sinks, etc., at new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That this estimate be not accepted and that an advertisement be inserted in the CITY RECORD calling for bids on the work.

A communication dated March 28 was received from Mr. R. F. Almirall on the matter of furnishing a steam siphon ejector at Gouverneur Hospital instead of an electric pump called for by the specifications.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this suggestion was approved by the Board.

A communication dated March 27 was received from Mr. E. H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, in regard to a bill for the retirement of officers, employees, etc., in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the President with instructions to give the information requested.

A communication dated March 26 was received from the Sisters of St. Francis Hospital at One Hundred and Forty-second street, between Brook and St. Ann's avenues, asking the privilege of calling on Harlem Hospital occasionally for an ambulance.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the Superintendent with instructions to grant the request provided it can be done without detriment to our own service.

A communication dated March 27 was received from Mr. N. Taylor Phillips, Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assigning to the trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals the new made ground in the rear of the new bulkhead wall between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets, East river.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

A communication dated March 27 was received from Dr. A. F. Brugman, Secretary of the Executive Committee and Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, recommending that an Out Patient Staff be appointed at Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital.

The communication from the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital nominating Dr. John Aspell as Visiting Physician to Fordham Hospital, was again referred to the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Tierney reported that the Building Committee, accompanied by Mr. Heberd, Dr. Armstrong and Mr. Almirall, visited the new Fordham Hospital on Saturday, March 24. The following report was presented by the Committee:

"Upon looking over the ground and taking into consideration the fact that a great part of it will be used for purposes directly connected with the hospital, your committee is of the opinion that it is not necessary to employ a landscape architect, as the work of laying out the grounds can be done by the architect at present employed in connection with the construction of the hospital.

"Your committee examined the work done by the plumbing contractors (Messrs. McManus & Welch) and complained of by the John H. Parker Company as having been done in such a manner as to seriously interfere with the latter in the carrying on of its work. It appears to the committee that there is cause for complaint, but we cannot see grounds sufficient upon which to base a claim for the granting of an extension of five months' time to the contractor.

"Owing to the changes that have been made in the manner of handling the coal at the hospital building, there will not be any use for the track and car that were called for in the contract for the purpose of delivering coal at the vault. Your committee recommends that the track be taken up and along with the car be removed to the Harlem Hospital, where they can be used to bring the coal from the storage to the boiler.

"Your committee recommends that the grounds be inclosed with an iron fence six feet high with the exception of that portion fronting on the Southern Boulevard where the fence will be three and one-half feet high."

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the report of the Building Committee be accepted and approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, the architect for the new Fordham Hospital, be instructed to prepare plans and specifications for laying out the grounds at the new Fordham Hospital.

Mr. Tierney presented a letter dated March 27, from Mr. J. H. Freedlander, consulting architect in charge of the work of laying out the grounds at the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That Mr. J. H. Freedlander be directed to prepare plans and specifications for laying out the grounds at the new Harlem Hospital, the coal vaults and the retaining wall, and that he be authorized to substitute granolithic for the wooden pavement.

The General Medical Superintendent, Dr. Armstrong, presented a report on the present condition of the contracts, including the amounts remaining unexpended under each contract, and additions and changes authorized by the Board on every contract during the year, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was returned to him for additional information.

Dr. Brannan reported that he had written a letter to Mr. Raymond F. Almirall on March 17 asking him to send to Messrs. J. R. Sheehan & Co. a written order for the work of widening three windows in the new wing of Gouverneur Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That this action be approved and that an expenditure of \$295 be authorized by the Board for this work. Dr. Brannan reported also that he had given directions that the radiators in the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital be placed nearer the walls as is the case in Bellevue and in the new Harlem Hospital, as they were much in the way in their present position, which is six or seven inches from the wall.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the action of the President in this matter be approved.

Unfinished Business.

Mr. Paulding moved to reconsider the action of the Board in referring to the Corporation Counsel the Communications of the City Visiting Committee incorporating the report of Mr. Hugh Bonner upon fire conditions in the various hospitals, and this action was taken by the Board.

New Business.

On motion of Mr. Tierney the Committee on Rules was instructed to prepare further rules for the guidance of the Board in the conduct of its business.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,
No. 299 Broadway,
New York, April 25, 1906.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, April 25, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

All the Commissioners were present.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the non-competitive class, under the heading "Bellevue and Allied Hospitals," by changing the line "4 Admitting Physicians, Bellevue Hospital, with compensation at the rate of \$600 per annum, without maintenance," to read "4 Admitting Physicians, Bellevue Hospital, with compensation not to exceed \$1,000 per annum, without maintenance."

Dr. John W. Brannan, President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, addressed the Commission in behalf of the amendment. There was no opposition to the same and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the non-competitive class, by including therein the position of Interpreter in the City Magistrates' Court, which hearing was continued from April 11, 1906. Hon. Charles G. F. Wahle, President of the Board of City Magistrates, First Division, addressed the Commission in favor of the amendment. Philip J. McCook, Esq., and Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., representing the Committee on Administration of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the same. The hearing then closed.

A communication was presented from J. A. Bensel, Esq., Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated April 23, withdrawing his request for the classification of "Ferry Police" in his department, for the reason that the Police Commissioner had rescinded his refusal to detail Patrolmen to duty on the Staten Island ferry. The hearing which had been advertised on the proposed amendment was therefore cancelled.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held April 18 were approved.

or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with such other authority, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable; and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last year of this original grant. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this grant then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—Upon the termination of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, all conduit lines and appurtenances thereto, constructed pursuant to this contract, shall be and become the property of The City of New York, without compensation therefor, and the same may be used by the City for any purpose whatsoever. During the third and remaining five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400), and which shall be equal to 6 per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400).

3. An annual payment of ten (10) cents for each linear foot of conduit line and two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway. The sums due shall be calculated from the day when the permit is obtained to open the streets for any section of the work.

All sums herein provided for shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments made by the terms of this franchise to The City of New York by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any

in all the streets and avenues, and upon all the routes hereby described, on May 1, 1906, all rights hereby given shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited without judicial or other proceedings, unless at least 50 per cent. of the conduit line shall then be constructed and in operation, when, in such case, the forfeiture shall affect only the Company's rights, privileges and franchises on the remaining portion of the conduit line hereby granted.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit line, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets, avenues and highways described in the routes.

Ninth—The said Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Tenth—The said Company shall bear the expense of inspection, which may be required by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, of all the work of construction required, or removal of the said conduit line, which shall be done under this grant.

Eleventh—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes laid under this grant before said pipes shall be used for the conveyance of gas or fluid under pressure for refrigerating purposes. Twelfth—The Company, its successors or assigns, shall not charge consumers more than three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) for the same amount of refrigeration which is produced by one ton of ice. During the term of this contract the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum and minimum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair. All refrigeration which may be required by The City of New York at any point along the routes herein described, shall be furnished by the Company without cost to the City.

The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person or corporation located along the routes herein authorized, shall extend its conduit to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the prices which are herein prescribed, or at which such prices may be hereafter fixed, in properly insulated compartments, under contracts containing fair and reasonable regulations for such service; otherwise this contract shall cease and determine at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It is mutually understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that in the event of any dispute arising between the company and any consumer or user of its refrigeration, as to the fairness and reasonableness of the regulations contained in said contracts, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the application of either said consumer, user or Seaboard Refrigeration Company shall have the power to pass upon and decide as to the fairness and reasonableness of such regulations, and said Seaboard Refrigeration Company hereby agrees to abide by such decision and conform such regulations thereto.

Thirteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Company, showing the exact location of all the conduit lines and manholes laid with reference to the curb lines of the streets and the street surface, and the same shall be furnished on the first day of November of each year until all conduit lines which are authorized by this grant are constructed or until the right hereby authorized to construct conduit lines along the routes described have ceased by limitation, as herein provided.

Fourteenth—The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the conduit line and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of its construction.

As a condition of this grant, the Company, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company, its successor or assigns. Due notice of any such demand shall be given to the Company.

Sixteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited or avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the said Company.

Seventeenth—If the Company has in position a conduit or pipe line in streets or avenues other than those herein described, then the Company shall remove such conduit or pipe line at its own expense, within one year from the date of signing this contract. If the Company owns a conduit or pipe line in the streets or avenues herein described, such conduit or pipe line shall be deemed to be a conduit line herein authorized, but no right is hereby given to lay or construct a conduit line in addition to that which the Company already has in such streets or avenues.

Eighteenth—The conduit line hereby authorized shall be used only by the Company and for no other purpose than for supplying refrigeration by the ammonia process or such other process as may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Nineteenth—The Company hereby agrees not to issue stock or bonds other than have heretofore issued, until a certificate of authority therefor has been issued by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or until such Board shall further certify in writing as to the amount of stock or bonds reasonably required for the purposes of the Company. The stock and bonds of the said Company shall not be issued in excess of the amount so certified.

The Company shall not increase its capital stock or its bonded indebtedness without the consent in writing of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment stating the amount of the authorized increase. For the purpose of making this determination as to the amount of stock and bonds to be issued, or the amount of the authorized increase of the capital stock and bonded indebtedness of the Company, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may take and hear testimony under oath and examine the books and

papers of the Company, and require verified statements from the officers thereof, pertaining to the value of the property and of the franchise owned or operated by the Company. 10. Statement of dividends paid during the year;
11. Number of feet of conduit now laid;
12. The total amount expended for same;
13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation;
14. The total amount expended for same;
15. Number of tons of refrigeration furnished during the year;
16. Total receipts from refrigeration and the average price per ton received during the year;
17. Amounts paid by Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation;
18. Total expenses for operation; including salaries;
19. An inventory of all the property of the Company.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board. For each failure to comply with the foregoing, the Company shall pay a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100), which may be collected by the Comptroller without notice.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of accounts of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract. The Company shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York, of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-first—If the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fails to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of such streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York may give written notice to the said Company specifying any default on the part of said Company, and requiring said Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of the Company to remedy said default within a reasonable time, said Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York a sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the said City, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinbefore provided.

In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund the said Company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Twenty-third—The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

Twenty-fourth—The Company agrees to assume and comply with any of the existing provisions or future amendments of Article V. of the Transportation Corporations Law relating to pipe lines, imposing conditions, restrictions or penalties should the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from time to time so require, in the same manner and to the same extent as if the Company had been incorporated under the said Transportation Corporations Law.
