Of the large number discharged during the past two years it is gratifying to say after a careful investigation that less than four per cent. was returned to other institutions by the Courts; hence it can be stated with certainty that the great object for which this institution was established is filling its mission of reform as a semi-criminal institution for the reformation of a class of children found unfit for association with children destitute or deserted, and not accused of crime in any degree, and committed to public expenses to religious and elegencewnary institutions principally supported by at public expense to religious and eleemosynary institutions principally supported by

at public expense to religious and eleemosynary institutions principally supported by charitable contributions or endowments.

"The fact is so well founded that the depraved will be far more likely to contaminate the innocent than that the innocent will uplift and improve the depraved; if for no other reason, this is true because the latter are always in large majority."

It is not the spirit or intention of your Board of Management to tabulate the various offences for which the children are committed, or record in this report the depravity and neglect of their parents, who should be, and are to some degree, held responsible by the experienced and humane judges of the Children's Courts. A merciful discrimination is made in favor of the children, and the commitments are made to read "Disorderly Conduct" or "Vagrancy" to cover the more serious grades of crime in favor of the youthful offender; and their spirit of magnanimity is encouraged and practiced in our reformative effort with results at once encouraging and satisfactory.

All semblance of a prison has been excluded from our plan of discipline. It is impressed upon their young minds that their assignment to this institution is to correct evil habits, cure physical defects, and encourage a spirit of manliness by the development of the body and education of the mind. Substantial reward is received for good conduct, and prison cells are unknown in the discipline of the school. The character of each ward is made a study, and all are classified carefully in subdivisions according to age, character and conduct. A commendable spirit of rivalry exists in all departments to win a place on the record for preferment, and on those lines depends the winning of their recommendation for advancement and discharge. Equal rights to all, and special privileges to none, is fundamentally the principle that all enjoy, and when discipline is found necessary it is meted out in full accord with the gravity of the offense, after a careful investigation that leads to substantial proof.

Religious instruction is administered by clergymen of each denomination, trade schools in many branches, and an ample pro rata of recreation hours during the day. The spirit of American boyhood is encouraged to a high degree, and all is founded on a correct understanding of military discipline, as laid down in the United States Army Code.

correct understanding of military discipline, as laid down in the United States Army Code.

Parental responsibility is encouraged by the liberal rules of the Board of Management, which permits them to visit the institution daily at established hours and at intervals to harmonize, as a reward to their boys for good conduct. This privilege has won great favor in the Courts, as it tends to preserve the relationship between the parent and the child. The Children's Court of this borough, from whom we receive the largest number of these commitments, has within the short period of its establishment revolutionized conditions in bringing back to parents their responsibility to the body politic, the care and training of the child. The amended provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure empowers the court to examine the parents of a child committed to the institution to ascertain their ability to contribute toward its support, and it can be stated that a sum of nearly four thousand dollars has been collected by the City from this enactment of law in the Borough of Brooklyn. It will at once be admitted that much is being done in relieving the City in a financial way, as well as tending to preserve the self-respect of the parents, and above all, it has impressed them with a sense of their responsibility for the future good conduct of the child when returned to his home, after a sojourn in the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys of a few months. It is a remarkable fact that we have no record of a boy being returned to this institution by the Court out of the large number discharged, whose parents were compelled by the law to compensate the City to some extent during the term of his commitment, though a large number of those who were returned to their homes were under the school age of 14 years; hence we should conclude that the wisdom of the Court should be accredited with a trend of reform greater than ever existed before, and establishing a sure cure which is found a good cure in administering the law, not only

and establishing a sure cure which is found a good cure in administering the law, not only to the criminally inclined boy, but to the preserving of the relationship that should exist between the parents and the child.

The Disciplinary Training School for Boys between the ages of 7 and 14, committed by Judges of the Children's Court, is recognized as a kindergarten in the criminal jurisprudence of our City, and is the only institution of its kind under its entire control and dependent for support and maintenance on the municipal government. Hence, in the fullest sense, it is a City department. Its location is in the suburban territory of the Thirtieth Ward, in the District of Bay Ridge, Borough of Brooklyn, on Eighteenth avenue, between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-eighth streets, Borough Park, distant five miles from the City Hall, Manhattan, and reached by three lines of electric railroad. The area of land is 9¼ acres, and the structures thereon, while old and to some extent dilapidated, are sufficient to accommodate a population of about 250 boys, as well as the employees necessary for the proper conduct of the same. The buildings are composed of a brick structure of 7,125 square feet, three stories, basement and cellar; or 351,000 cubic feet. In the basement of this building is a dining hall, kitchen, store room, seamstress's sewing room and laundry. On the first or main floor are situated the Executive Offices, Visitors' Reception Room, a large Chapel Hall, used for religious services and lectures, south of which is the Printing Department. On the second main floor east of the main hall is a dormitory for the accommodation of 50 boys, composed of the Third and part of the Fourth Companies, between the ages of 10 and 12 years, west of which are the male employees' rooms, seven in number, and north is a spacious library well equipped with standard volumes, numbering about one thousand, and is used as a meeting room for the Board of Management. Directly south are the private apartments of the Superintednent. The thi

the south is the shoe department, in which is manufactured the footwear of the wards, and the output of which is figured at close to 2,000 pairs per annum. Every modern appliance is used for their manufacture, and propelled by electric power.

On the easterly end is a room 20 by 30, used for the accommodation of the boy guards and officers and as an assembly room for our boy soldiers. On the first main floor is a large study hall, 20 by 80 feet, well furnished with desks and blackboards. Here the entire family are instructed in night studies preparatory to instructions and examinations in the day class. North and across the main hall is a carpenter shop. Here instructions are received in carpentry and wood turning.

On the westerly end of this floor will be found a tailoring department, in which the entire raiment for the institution is manufactured. The second floor is occupied by two school rooms for day exercises, 20 by 30 feet each, and the east end is used in three divisions as a hospital, dispensary and detention ward. The attic of this structure is used for the lodging of the female help, under the supervision of the House Mother, and the remaining portion is used for storage of supplies necessary for the dormitories. for the dormitories.

East of the building is ample drill and recreation ground, in which over 100,000 square feet is divided into three yards, each of which is used to classify the boys during recreation; the main yard being used as a drill ground, where all assemble in four companies in daily drill and set-up exercises.

At the northeast corner of these grounds is a modern frame carriage house and stable, the front portion of which is occupied for the daily instructions in music of

stable, the front portion of which is occupied for the daily instructions in music of our band of 53 pupils.

An unattractive store-house has been remodeled into a structure to resemble the home of William Shakespeare, and has been converted into an armory. This completes all that is available for the housing and instructions of our population, and while perfect sanitation exists, it can be stated that no institution, civic, religious, or elecmosynary, within the bounds of our great City or State, is so poorly equipped with madequate buildings to perform so important a work as the saving of children assigned to this institution from a life of criminality.

Ample lands are possessed by the City, covering over an area of four acres west of the buildings, and east of Eighteenth avenue, on which could be erected a sufficient number of cottages to accommodate 400 wards in segregation, using the present buildings for trade and school purposes. North of our grounds are five acres of land for ale at real value, and the City should avail itself of the opportunity to purchase the same if it ever contemplates the improvement of the present conditions as they exist.

To reform criminal youth is a civic responsibility, and at no time in the past was the fact so clearly defined or understood as since the establishment of the Children's Courts. The old theory was—that the punishment should be fitted to the offense—to serve so many years of imprisonment for each grade of crime.

The new system adapts the punishment to the offender, with the purpose of keeping him from association with hardened criminals. In its application to penology the old proverb stands, that "An ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure," and the result attained justifies in its application as a step forward, to keep the restless at work and reduce the criminally inclined from support in prisons. Prevention, not punishment, is the trend of scientific penology of our time.

Commissioner of Corrections Hines, during the Low administration, realizin

The control of this institution, supervisory and advisory powers, will be vested so that it will bring the Board of nine managing members in close touch with the administration of the institution and the prisoners, giving full power of granting of paroles,

that it will bring the Board of nine managing members in close touch with the administration of the institution and the prisoners, giving full power of granting of paroles, and the appointing of suitable persons in any part of the State to receive paroled prisoners and revoke such appointments at pleasure.

The Commissioner of Correction, I am informed, is to be a member of the Board, and among the names mentioned are Robert J. Wilkin of the Children's Court of Brooklyn, and John B. Mayo, City Magistrate. With such experienced members of the bench, associated with others appointed by your Honor, the success of the institution is beyond a doubt established. The object to be accomplished is not to punish youth for crime, but to rescue them from it when the charge is other than felony.

What higher commendation could be given to your Honor's administration than the establishment of this reformatory on Hart's Island for the reformation of the young men assigned by the courts, and certainly nothing could appeal with more certainty of consideration than the fact that the lines on which it is to be conducted, and the prospect of its future success is a City responsibility, as clearly illustrated by the benefits obtained by a more youthful class, the return to society by the discipline and education of the Brooklyn Training School for Boys during the past seven years of its life, and during which time it has never failed in its effort to accomplish the highest civic purpose for which it was founded.

Hence we appeal with new hope to your Honor's administration for a favorable consideration of the necessary improvements to meet the constantly increasing demands on the present inadequate structures hereinbefore described, and so often referred to in the innumerable visits and reports of grand juries, civic societies and the State Board of Charities, a few of which are published in this report for your Honor's information.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE BROOKLYN DISCIPLINARY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR BOYS, EIGHTEENTH AVENUE, BETWEEN FIFTY-SIXTH AND FIFTY-EIGHTH STREETS.

Borough of Brooklyn, November 1, 1904.

Gentlemen—I take pleasure in presenting my annual report as Superintendent, for the fiscal year ending November 1, 1904.

The usual statistics for the year 1904 are respectfully submitted, and I trust will be accepted and made part of this report.

It is gratifying to state that the general health of the inmates of the institution for the year has been excellent. A single death only is recorded during the life of the institution, now entering on its ninth year, and it is a rare occurrence to have more than a single how as a patient in our hospital.

single boy as a patient in our hospital.

The religious instruction of the boys has been faithfully conducted by the chaplains of the different denominations—Protestant, Catholic and Hebrew.

Population.

It is particularly gratifying to be able to report that the great liberality exercised by your Honorable Board in the discharge of your wards during the past year has materially encouraged the children and parents alike, and this plan of commutation for good conduct, education and discipline has met favor from the courts, by the large assignments received during the year, which exceed in number those sent to any other institu-tion from this borough.

A comparative statement of population, discharges and expenditures for salaries and merchandise, the equipment of shops and schools, and repairs for each year since 1897, with the per capita cost, including ordinary and extraordinary expenses, is herewith

This statement is surely illustrative, and at least confirms the oft-repeated reports, that while suffering under many disadvantages compared with more favored institutions under State and City control, the expenditures will be found favorable to your institution in per capita cost, and could be considerably reduced below the present rate with increased facilities and a larger population. (See records of State Boards of Charities for per capita cost for institutional support in this State.)

Education-Military.

A most commendable progress has been made in this special branch of education, and when it is remembered that we do not possess a gymnasium or an armory, and are dependent on open air exercises in our drill yard in all conditions of weather, it is especially noteworthy that under such conditions our troops have been awarded a percentage of 85 in the manual by actual test, and this was conceded by one of the highest military authorities in the metropolis.

It is a real pleasure to witness the Saturday afternoon full dress battalion drill of two hundred and fifty boys, fully equipped with guns and other necessary accourtements, marching and countermarching to the martial music of our school band of forty-five instruments

They have attracted visiting members of the judiciary and other public officials, from whom they have received many complimentary words of encouragement.

The results attained by these daily drills are manifested in the general bearing of the boys—an erect and manly presence that wins regard of those who have witnessed the accuracy of each movement in drill—as well as the consideration of a physical development to be acquired by exercise in company and battalion drill. There is nothing more attractive to a boy than soldiery—the carrying of arms, bayonet and setting-up exercises, and on these lines all departments of the institution are founded.

Educational—Scholastic.

This important department has received a large share of attention from your Com-This important department has received a large share of attention from your Committee on Education, and a number of new exercises have been introduced in the curriculum, that has contributed to the advancement of your wards, and no boys ever assigned to a school room needed mental instruction more than they, or responded to its influence with greater aptitude.

Weekly tests have been made by the lady Principal in charge, and monthly reports of progress presented at each monthly meeting of your Honorable Board.

Two new sessions have been formed for dull and backward boys in the primary branches, and a special night class is again established for Guards and Captains of shops.

shops.

A ten-minute discourse is daily addressed to the boys at noon by your Superintendent, and great interest is taken in the weekly entertainment in Chapel Hall, a portion of which is devoted to geography, history and manufactures, all of which are illustrated like stereopticon views, with descriptive lectures.

Our Class in Band Music.

Our class in band music the past year has made great progress, being composed of forty-five members. It can be said that the character and conduct of the boys deserve the highest commendation, not alone for the progress they have made in a musical education, but a commendable rivalry which exists in each division (of which we have four), composed of drummers, buglers and a fife corps—all of whom are eligible for admission to a position in our brass band, among which are many aspirants for distinction in a musical field. tinction in a musical field.

Two lessons are given daily (morning and afternoon) by a competent teacher, who has graduated in the institution, under the tuition of a professor, who visits the school and instructs them in sessions of two hours three days in each week.

This instruction and the practice afforded by the daily drill and evening entertainments in Chapel Hall, Wednesdays and Saturdays, has developed into a most attractive and satisfactory condition.

Fire Drill.

Fire Drill.

Great progress has been made in this department by training during the past year, and the marked success attained is due to the enjoyment, encouragement and interest taken by a number of Fire Chiefs. The present Deputy Commissioner has visited our fire brigade on a number of occasions during the past year.

We have had, I regret to say, more than one occasion for fire drill since my last report, when it was necessary to test the efficiency of the boys with a real fire of an incendiary origin, and it is most gratifying to say that they were not of long duration, for on each occasion their efforts succeeded, satisfactory discipline and order prevailed, all of which was governed under strict rules and regulations, which are printed and distributed amongst our employees and wards alike, and all are compelled to understand their post of duty, in strict conformity with the published rules.

Daily examination of all appliances is made, and a weekly drill is practised as a test of the intelligence of the entire family of the institution.

At a stroke on a fire gong, a call from a bugle, or a sound of a drum, they all assemble, disperse or descend from the interior of the building by the established exits, with precision and order, to a point of safety, by the fire-escapes.

Wednesday of each week is recorded on the daily schedule for fire drill, which is under the direction and control of an efficient officer of the institution. Tests are made of mains and hose, and every precaution is taken to insure safety to the population, as well as the protection of public property assigned to our custody.

All are expected to understand the printed rules and regulations, and to respond with alacrity and report to the officer in charge the location of a fire.

It may be interesting to quote from the lines of the State Charity Inspector's report

It may be interesting to quote from the lines of the State Charity Inspector's report after a visit to the institution on a recent date:

"Fire drill is well organized. It is practised weekly." Inspector's test on the 11th

inst., made without previous notice, passed a very favorable inspection.

The boys in the house dismissed and reported in the yard in fifty-five seconds from the time of the alarm. The hose wagon was brought out and connection made with the main fire pump, and a stream of water thrown over the picket fence in two minutes and forty-five seconds. The indoor fire squad unreeled hose and were ready to throw a stream of water in one minute and ten seconds.

The moral training and discipline of the school has advanced under the guidance of your visiting committees and the earnest efforts of our staff officers.

Still there is no doubt that more satisfactory results could be attained were it possible to establish a better classification of your wards. All that could be accomplished in this important direction has been carefully exercised considering the present inadequate structures, old and uninviting as they are, and never adapted to the purpose for which they are used pose for which they are used.

It is at least compensating to know that every suggestion and order given by the Board of Health has been promptly complied with, when responsibility was chargeable to your Honorable Board.

The health records of the school can be classed among the best; and, as stated in previous reports, it can be said that only a single ward died in the institution since 1897, and it is of rare occurrence to find more than a single ward in our hospital at a time.

pital at a time.

Admission to the school for inspection is permitted from 7 A. M. to 8 P. M., daily, to those interested in reformatory work. And it is gratifying to say that outside of structural defects, adverse criticism has not been made against your administration in the general management, education, disciplining and restoration of our youthful incorrigibles to a brighter future than was hoped for in the past.

Synopsis of Distribution to Schools, Shops, etc.

The following synopsis of distribution to shops and industrial departments of the institution shows that all inmates are receiving much needed mental and manual training, and the high percentages shown in each of the monthly reports of the progress in the various departments indicate success that deserves the high commendation expressed by members of the Grand Juries and others.

A daily record of each ward's progress is kept by the instructor in each department, from which a monthly report is made of his standing in class, shops and drill; the average per cent. is credited and published in the School Journal for distribution.

All understand the importance and value of a good record, not alone in good conduct but in each subdivision of employment. Many look forward to the monthly report to discover how the record stands in some special branch in which they have not succeeded in previous reports. Understanding that everything comes to him who exercises effort in school, shop and drill, the boy attaining 75 per cent., qualified by age, which is usually placed at 14 years, finds little difficulty in obtaining a discharge to his parents or employment, if they are found competent to assume the responsibility after due investigation by your Committee on Discharge.

Industrial.

Preliminary training of hand and eye is encouraged in each educational class and sub-division. Each session has its period of black-board exercise, and here the first instructive step is made in free-hand drawing. Genius is soon observed and the boy is permitted to formulate any plan or design pleasing to himself on paper. Subjects are introduced in mechanical figures, and drawings where accuracy is required. Our pupils soon discover the importance of their efforts when advanced to the wood-carving class, and here the hand is directed in the use of the necessary tools to produce by scale the subject of his drawing. The interesting exhibits displayed in our Sloyd elementary school will be accepted as a preliminary training to the higher branches in any of our trade shops.

Carpenter Shop.

Our school of carpentry is the centre around which all other branches of trade assemble. The genius of the industrious has here ample opportunity to found a future in the world of trades, in which the demand for geniuses is larger than the supply.

The progress made in this branch of trade has been materially advanced during the past year, and great credit is due to the present instructor. The manual and arithmetical exercises are now conducted on the lines of the Sloyd system. In primary classes mathematical and off-hand drawing is a progressive branch, and here also will be found many creditable exhibits in wood-carving, in which the boys have attained a degree of efficiency which has won for them high commendations. efficiency which has won for them high commendations.

Carpentry and Wood-Turning.

Many artistic novelties in this art have been produced during the year; the advanced class has attained an efficiency in wood turning and general construction in advanced carpentry most creditable to their intelligence, application and industry. It can be stated with certainty that they are qualified to undertake the erection of frame strucstated with certainty that they are qualified to undertake the erection of frame structures, from modern plans, a number of which they have executed, and are on exhibition in this department. Late in the fall of this year the advanced carpentry class organized to prepare plans for the establishing of a Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys on the segregate (cottage) plan. What was then suggested as educational practice in architectural plans and drawings, from which was to be constructed models of each building on mathematical scales, has developed to be real art in symmetrical proportions. Not alone is their adaptability for the purpose, as working models and general design, but the accuracy of the interior, which is build in quarter sections, to illustrate each room and hall, from cellar to attic, of each building, and all harmonizing with what is considered the essential requirements to accommodate forty boys on the with what is considered the essential requirements to accommodate forty boys on the accepted and improved principles of classification in so-called segregation in institutional life. Here will be found the executive administration building, there the large drill room and armory, the hospital and detention ward building, industrial and school building, the chapel hall building, for religious service and entertainments, the conservatory, drill yard, recreation ground and gardens, all harmonizing in detail with what is considered best adapted to modern education and disciplining in future development of this institution. ment of this institution.

Tailoring Department.

Every opportunity is afforded the pupils of this department to become efficient the manufacture of clothing. The mechanical appliances are up to date in every particular and the sewing machines, thirteen in number, are propelled by electric power; the boys are here instructed in the technical branches of the trade—arithmetical and measurement, pattern grading, busheling and repairing, and operating on power machines. Uniform and fatigue suits, composed of coats, trousers, vests, shirts, caps, underwear and other articles of raiment are here manufactured. The advanced class manufacture uniforms, and the output is estimated at 500 dress uniform suits (military) 500 fatigue suits, 1,000 shirts, 500 caps and 500 sets of underwear. This output could be labeled that the dress of floor coats. doubled had we increased floor space.

Aside from the great service rendered by the boys in this department, the furnishing of the entire raiment of the school, it is most gratifying to know that a term of six months' service in this branch of trade fits the pupil to fill a position as operator in any shop needing his services. We are informed of a number who have found employment in this branch of trade, and satisfactory reports are received from these employers for industry and intelligence. The output of our tailor shop furnishes us with our dress parade suits and fatigue suits for each ward for winter wear and two suits each for summer wear, changed weekly. Each hold individual ownership in two suits of underwear, two dress shirts, two night shirts, stockings, sweaters, towels, etc., all of which are manufactured in the school, at a cost to the City less than any other State or city institution, and all are clean and comfortably provided for in clothing.

Shoe Department.

The boys assigned to this Department are employed during the morning and afternoon sessions. One-half the number of boys attend school in the morning and work in the shop in the afternoon; while the other half work in the shop in the morning and attend school in the afternoon, thus equalizing the work, and relieving them of any monotony in the daily routine. They manufacture and repair all the shoes worn by the

wards of the Institution, and are thoroughly instructed in every branch of the trade. Many new appliances have been added to the excellent equipment of machinery, most of which is propelled by electrical power. A substantial education in the trade is given in this department by a most competent instructor, who has the responsibility of furnishing the entire footwear of your wards, amounting in round figures to close on two thousand pairs per annum, outside the necessary repairs. The young Crispins of this department have distinguished themselves in military discipline, and are known as the officers of the guard. Don't try to pass their post if you are not in possession of the countersign, or your arrest will follow. After shop hours, morning and afternoon, they will be found on guard duty on the grounds, or halls of the interior of the buildings. They are proud of being members of the guard, dignified in demeanor and looked up to by the rank and file of our little army of soldiers.

The Printing Shop.

The Printing Shop.

The course followed in this department is conducted with a view to educational direction, reading and correcting compositions, spacing, distribution, making-up, lessons at the type case, stone-work and instructions at the press. Many creditable samples of the progress made in this school are on exhibition, and this report will be accepted as a sample of the work produced by the boys in this department. To obtain a position in the printing shop it is necessary for the applicant to be qualified by an educational test and pass an examination satisfactory to the Foreman Printer in charge; and the education of the wards in this branch of trade. The average age of the boys in this department is thirteen years, and a boy of that age, fitted by education in class to win a position in the printing shop, rarely serves more than six months when he is found qualified by discipline, education and good conduct to win a recommendation to the Committee on Discharge of your Honorable Board, if his parents or next of kin are found qualified to assume the responsibility, after due investigation. A few have found employqualified to assume the responsibility, after due investigation. A few have found employment in printing establishments, but it can hardly be claimed that this was accomplished on account of their practical education in the trade.

Laundry.

Few changes are made in the boys assigned to this important department. The Few changes are made in the boys assigned to this important department. The instructors seem to take a motherly interest in their welfare, and it is of very rare occurrence to have a ward arrested who works in the laundry. The occupation is clean and healthful, and each of the boys here employed is distinguished in drill and school class, and some of whom are qualified by age and intelligence to be discharged to employment or their parents, if they are found to be able to assume the responsibility. Their service is valuable to the City, but this is never considered, if opportunity presents itself in the interest of the boy. Every modern appliance that economizes labor is operated in this department. Mangles, extractors, wringers, ironing and washing machines are propelled by steam power.

And the clothing and general house wash of the institution is completed, and is seldom less than 1,500 pieces per week. Employment is easily obtained for a boy who has served his term of a year in this department.

The Dormitories.

The capacity of the dormitories, of which we have three—a large domitory covering the entire top floor space of the main building, certified to accommodate 200 boys; one next in size on the second floor, fitted to accommodate 55 boys, and one for the younger children of 12 beds. The detention ward has six beds, and the hospital five, making in

children of 12 beds. The detention ward has six beds, and the hospital five, making in all 278 beds.

Toilets are ample on each floor, and are built with a view to privacy and modern sanitation. Your wards are compelled to make visits in company file night and morning, and at each assembly for inspection, of which there are three. Washing troughs are fitted to the walls in retired parts of each dormitory, and water, hot or cold, flows from many openings; individual towels and soap, of which there are ample to meet the demand of service three times each day, with baths from shower sprays on Saturday of each week in winter and an entire change of underclothing weekly. In summer two baths are taken, Wednesdays and Saturdays, and each ward is furnished with a clean wash suit and necessary under dress. Each bed is equipped with a modern wire spring, on which rest a corfortable mattress, a woolen blanket, a cotton comforter and white quilt. Pillow slips and sheets are changed weekly, and night shirts are supplied to each ward, of which he has two. Each dormitory has the night service of a paid officer of the institution, and reports are made by him every fifteen minutes during the night. A institution, and reports are made by him every fifteen minutes during the night. A record by electricity is kept on a dial clock, which is duly examined by the officer in

charge.

Rising in the morning and going to bed at night has to be observed with the same military precision found at our daily exercises in drill. Each movement of dress and undress is made at the sound of a bugle, in conformity with strict military discipline.

House Painting and Decorating Class.

Here boys are taught to ply a paint brush in its application to house painting, and the compounding and mixing of colors, to profit by the exercises taught in school class by the use of colored crayons. A simple suggestion is made by the teacher in class of a subject to incite rivalry among those who aspire to a place in the painting class, and this simple test on the blackboard displays a correctness of figure line and the harmonizing of colors, which win for the successful boy the place he so much desires. The proper care of a paint brush is first taught; the second test is in its use in priming work, woodfilling and rubbing down, prior to its application in first coat work. Mixing and compounding, finishing, varnishing and graining are mastered, and many neat designs are cut and filled in, stenciling.

Glazing is made a branch of study in this department.

Glazing is made a branch of study in this department, and the boys are experts at breaking windows, without any doubt. The rewards received from these efforts in painting, however, in this branch of education more than compensate us for any damage they perpetrate, which is seldom done with intention. Much of the order and cleanliness found in the interior of the institution is due to their ever-willing efforts.

Electrical and Steam Engineering.

Wards over the age of fourteen are afforded an opportunity in this department to build a future in electrical and steam engineering. Only those who are able to pass a physical and educational test are eligible. They are usually drawn from our class in Sloyd, where they have attained some knowledge of mechanical drawing and become proficient in the care and use of the machinery employed in wood-turning, as well as practice of tools. They soon adapt themselves to the cleaning of the switchboard and the many intricacies of currents and wires. The batteries have many attractions for a boy, and while they are not permitted to exercise their inquisitorial minds or hands on the mechanisms of the motor when in motion, they can become instructed in the parts and purposes under the supervision of competent instructors. In pipe-fitting they are competent to make many repairs, and in cleaning they are of great service to the engineer. It is much to be regretted that lack of floor space does not admit of introducing the kindred branches of plumbing and iron working—two branches of trade that would give this class of boys a start in life as mechanics' apprentices, as well as the benefits to be derived by their services in repairs needed in this institution. Education in this department is well adapted to the class of boys this institution. Education in this department is well adapted to the class of boys committed to your charge.

Storeroom.

All assignments of supplies from the successful bidders on our annual schedule of supplies are here received, and it can be stated that it needs more than ordinary intelligence to successfully conduct this important branch of our business administration. Experience, good judgment, tact and integrity are four important factors in the renewing and accepting of supplies, for some are found for reasons not always easy to explain, disposed to make mistakes in quality and quantity in their delivery. Each of the thousand and one things has to be scrutinized in weight and measurement, not alone in receiving, but in distributing to meet the daily demands of each department in the institution. Waste and extravagance have to be guarded against. Certain order and cleanliness are imperative virtues in a well regulated and properly conducted storeroom, and this order and cleanliness do exist. It is gratifying to say that a single complaint has never been made by any one of the innumerable Inspectors from the Finance Department whose duty it is to check each bill submitted to that efficient department of City government for payments, and in few instances have fractional inaccuracies been found in bills rendered. Here the wards assigned can with certainty lay a foundation in a commercial education, in that which pays the highest reward for integrity—intelligence and business tact, aside from the opportunity of learning rudimentary lessons in bookkeeping, weights and measures, and a general store education in dry goods, hardware, groceries and innumerable other branches of trade.

Refectory.

During the past year the Department of Buildings and Offices has made many important changes in our dining hall and kitchen, which are located on the basement floor of the main building. The odor of cooking was more than once complained of by State and City Inspectors. A much improved condition now exists, the department having placed a vent that reaches the dining hall and culinary department, ascending to and discharging on the roof of the building, and a free and healthy current of air circulates. Any improvement that can be made will never remove the dingy appearance of this room. Light is insufficient, being some four feet below the grade of the yard; even on bright days it fails to meet conditions that should exist. Many changes have been made during the year in the discipline during meal time, and others are contemplated which cannot fail to improve your ward in table manners. They are apt and prompt in responding to new rules, and I feel the incoming new year will show a number of improvements in this department.

Recreation.

Health and development in growth largely depends on proper recreation periods, of which there are a little over three hours daily. "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy," and sometimes a bad boy. Picture the condition that exists with our good boys, numbering close on three hundred at some seasons of the year, housed under the veranda of our old frame building, with two feet of frozen snow covering the only available space for recreation, in our extensive drill yard. Think of the long winter days and evenings, of the buoyancy of youth to be restrained, or vigor to be encouraged. Is the glow of health and physical development to be curtailed when mental improvement can only be attained by the health of body for strength of mind? The youth of our time needs recreation to meet the battle of the future more than ever existed in the past generations, and our duty of the present is to secure conditions

ever existed in the past generations, and our duty of the present is to secure conditions that will to some degree meet the obligation due in helping those on whom the great future of our country will have to depend in a future generation.

Armory.

Armory.

We have one undeserving of the name. Two years ago there stood an old and dilapidated frame barn in the northeast corner of what was then called the cabbage garden. A clever drawing and plan was made of William Shakespeare's house at Stratford-on-Avon, in England, by one of the advance carpenter boys, and by general consent the old barn was turned over for practice to his class. Patching and painting went on windows of an antique form, moldings and trims developed till the plan found shape and proportions conforming with the original structure of the past. Ceilings and floors were made from old lumber found around the grounds, and when complete it was captured by the first and second companies of our army, and is still held by them as shelter for their guns and other equipments. The army's title to its possession is disputed with vigor, and a counter claim is set up "that might is right" and to the victor belong the spoils. An appeal is now made to the Committee on Buildings and Repairs of your Honorable Board, to reimburse the rank and file by the building of an armory and gymnasium, thus affording a place of shelter and exercise during the many months of winter.

The first lesson on the sewing machine is here taught, of which there are five in daily operation. It is considered essential to instruct the junior class of operators the use of the treadle in foot-power machines for only those who exercise on lighter work would be later qualified for advancement to the tailoring department, where the machinery is propelled by electric power. The work in this department is alternated morning and afternoon session, that each assignment of boys may have equal opportunity to learn cutting from graded patterns in sizes of shirts for day and night wear, underclothing, making and hemming of sheets, quilts and pillow covers; towels, table cloths and repairs. And all repairs are made here on wash goods of all descriptions. The entire output from the laundry is here delivered for examination before assigning them to reserve closets or delivery to departments; and while we always had doubt if darning and patching was just the kind of work for a manly boy, we are assured by many lady visitors that their good work would put many of their sisters to shame, when compared with their sewing and darning, if tested with our boys' industry and skill. Friday and forenoon of Saturday is known as bundle days, from the fact that every ward in the school receives an entire change of raiment and this includes all requirements in the dormitories and work rooms. This department contributes largely to the order and cleanliness found in all subdivisions of the institution.

Hope was expressed in a previous report that a more liberal appropriation would be granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1904, to meet many contemplated improvements, among which was the building of a conservatory for the cultivation of flowers and plants by the boys of the advance carpenter class, the plans and model of which can be seen in the school, and the expected funds are still in the Treasury of the City. The class is composed of those discharged from the detention ward, and is made the first step in the direction of physical development and discipline. The junior class is composed of the latest assignment, and receives two hours instruction in the forenoon, while they receive school education in the afternoon. The second class is employed in the afternoon and attend the morning school session. From this department all branches of manual training are recruited. Grading, sodding, the care of lawns and flower beds are the services rendered in this department. Will the future bear better fruit? The small amount necessary should be found, as the attaining of this improvement and contribute largely to the health and development of the boys interested in this attractive branch of education.

In Chapel Hall religious service is held, twice in each subdivision, Hebrew, Roman Catholic and Protestant, weekly. Instruction in each subdivision is given by clergymen of these faiths. Services are held on Sunday, Tuesdays and Fridays of each week, for which the visiting clergyman receives a compensation of \$120 per annum, each being civil service employees. Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays of each week are days on which religious instruction is given under the direction of a monitor. Sunday evening is devoted to lectures on history, travel and mechanics, illustrated with views by the stereopticon, closing with reading and songs which inspire a spirit of patriotism, and this commendable spirit prevails among our little army of soldiers—for all are soldiers to no ordinary degree—for their knowledge of drill and calisthenics is rarely to be found in youths of their age.

Department, How and Where Employed.

The new arrival is assigned to the Record Clerk, who collects the following information for statistical purposes, and which is carefully filed with the commitment, health certificate and other records of identity:

Number, name, residence, date of birth, place of birth, color, cause of commitment, date, committing Judge. Boys' connections—mother's and father's name, and how em-

ployed, religion, age, birthplace, nationality; brothers' and sisters' age, occupation and residence.

After which interrogatories the boy is introduced to your Superintendent, and interviewed. Here we get the character and real condition. Confidence is soon established all fear for the future is removed, and the history of the past is truthfully told, with few exceptions. The lad is assured there will be no-breach of confidence, and he is cautioned not to inform others of the cause of his commitment. He is impressed and encouraged that he is not a bad boy, and new hope is at once aroused in his sad heart; that there are many privileges to be won and ultimate discharge to his home and parents as a reward for good conduct, and it can be said with certainty that his struggle with himself during his term in the detention ward of eighteen days is marked carefully as the first step in the direction of character and discipline, and little difficulty is found in classifying him with those of his age, character and class in education. His first impulse is to be a soldier in the ranks; to receive his new regimentals, gun and other equipments, which he understands is his individual property, and he is held responsible for their proper care, and his personal order and cleanliness at each inspection, of which there are four daily. Ten days' test in the awkward squad fits the average recruit for a place in company file. An equal term on the farm or drill ground qualifies him for examination for school and shop. Positions in the latter are usually obtained by his personal application, which must meet the approval of the Yard Captain, and consent of the Instructor in charge of the trade shop he desires employment in. Once established, the power of transfer cannot be granted except on the application of the Instructor, and audited by the Superintendent. No special task is imposed as to amount of production, but every effort must show accuracy in proportion to standing in class. Daily, weekly

and monthly reports are made of each ward's standing in all departments of drill, shop and school, and due credit is given in percentage, and debits are deducted for any breach of discipline, after careful investigation of written charges made by any officer or ward, and punishment cannot be given in any degree except on written order of the Superintendent. But all officers have the power of arrest and none the power of discharges

charge.

It is gratifying for me to be able to say that our official staff gives first consideration to the boys assigned to their charge. They are faithful, thoughtful and inspire energy and efficiency in the boys assigned to their instruction.

By means of these views, the boys are given a knowledge of the different countries of the world, their attention called to famous and interesting subjects of history by your Superintendent, who delivers the lectures, and explains the subject represented by each view. Prior to the lecture and illustrations the boys are exercised in singing the national songs, accompanied by the school brass band, whose efficient playing is a subject of great comment by all who have had the pleasure of hearing it, and of which the school may be justly proud. school may be justly proud.

School Curriculum.

I take pleasure in presenting to your Honorable Board the following brief report of progress made in each of the educational departments during the year ending November 1, 1904, the details of which have been presented at the regular monthly

November 1, 1904, the details of which have been presented at the regular monthly meeting of your Honorable Board.

The class schedule is composed of six classes—two in the morning and two in the afternoon, with an average attendance of fifty-four boys in each class; night class of two hundred and fifteen boys and special night class of fifty-six boys. The day classes cover a period of five hours—two and one-half hours A. M., two and one-half hours P. M. session; the boys alternating class work with trades shops. All the ordinary branches of a common school education, as shown in the curriculum are taught here. There has been a considerable increase in promotions during the year as compared with that of any previous year, the boys showing remarkable interest in their work and desire for advancement. A great deal of individual work has been done, and the boy who was inclined to be dilatory in his class work was urged on by strenuous efforts to compete with those who successfully reached the top.

As a tule the boys are quite responsive to the interest manifested in them, and it is a very rare occasion in which any other measure than that of moral suasion has to be resorted to to insure perfect discipline and good feeling in the class room.

The study of history and geography is very much facilitated by the stereopticon views given at the Sunday evening entertainments—the lines followed during the week on those subjects, and the current historical events are closely in touch with the views given.

given.

In addition to the regular day classes a special class has been instituted for backward boys whose education had been seriously neglected previous to their entering the school and whose talents are not up to the ordinary standard. Those boys receive special coaching—two sessions each week—on those subjects in which they are most deficient. Particular attention has been given to original drawings and the improvement made in this branch is quite satisfactory. Marked progress has been made in the ordinary branches of education as shown by the result of examinations by the Committee on Education held periodically during the year.

Study Hall Exercises—Two hours each night are devoted to the preparation of lessons for the day following. The studies for each day are written on the blackboards and careful supervision is brought to bear on the students to insure the best results. This exercise has borne good fruit, as when the boys present themselves in class they have a fair knowledge of the school work for that day.

The class exercises are begun and ended with the "Salute to the Flag."

Report of the Attending Physician.

During the year 1904 the following cases have been under treatment. The health of the inmates of the institution has been excellent, and a case of contagion is of rare occurrence. A late examination of the boys' eyes convinced the Inspector that the much dreaded disease trachoma was unknown in the institution.

It is a rare exception to find more than one patient in our hospital, and then only for a short time, and none have been rejected out of the large number received for physical or mental defect. Our physician is untiring in his attention, and the greatest credit is due to our house mother for the efficient care of her large family of boys.

Report on Dental Surgery.

During the year each new arrival had his mouth thoroughly examined before leaving the detention ward, and semi-annually thereafter, and every tooth that can be saved is filled.

It is evidenced from the bad condition of their teeth that their parents or guardians have not taught them the importance of cleaning and caring for their teeth as a necessary requisite to good health. A marked improvement was found at last examination over that of last year, and our young patients seem to have lost all fear of the dentist, owing to the application of an anesthetic which makes extraction practically

The following dietary has been carefully considered by the visiting members of your Honorable Board, the Health Department, and the members of the Grand Juries on their monthly visits to this institution, all of whom have taken an earnest interest in the quality of food which is the best the market produces, and the quantity disfributed to each ward is regulated only by his appetite. SUMMARY.

The Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys is a City Institution, established by Act of the Legislature and accepted by the City, for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents, depending for support on an annual appropriation, awarded from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the disbursement of which is authorized by the acceptance of monthly requisitions and the auditing of bills presented at each meeting of your Board, subject however to the approval of the Comptroller, after examination by authorized Inspectors of the Finance Department. I take pleasure in submitting a detailed statement of the expenditures for 1904, on page 29 of this report. It will be noted by the Finance Committee of your management, that a substantial reduction has been made in the per capita cost for maintenance during the past year. It is especially gratifying when it can be stated that this was not accomplished at the expense of efficiency in any of the departments of the Institution.

The cost of supplies was much higher in 1904 than that of previous years, and our

The cost of supplies was much higher in 1904 than that of previous years, and our population was largely in excess, having cared for 365 boys during that period, and it can be stated with certainty that less than four per cent. of the large number of boys discharged to parents or employment during the year reached the courts for assignment to other institutions.

Of the others most favorable reports have been received, it being one of the con-Of the others most tavorable reports have been received, it being one of the conditions established by your Committee on Discharge that the parents or employer shall report of their conduct and progress monthly for a term of six months after date of discharge. Many interesting letters are received, and it is contemplated establishing a plan of investigation by periodical visits. While the strictest economy existed in each department, the food supply was regulated only by the appetites of your wards, and each was supplied with four suits of clothes during the year. Two changes of underwear and a sweater completed their requirements in raiment. If a comparison of expenditures were made with more favored institutions, in population and structural equipment, it would be found favorable to your administration. would be found favorable to your administration.

would be found favorable to your administration.

That excellent institution, the Industrial School at Rochester, with a population of 897 wards, the per capita cost will be found to be \$215.58. The House of Refuge, with its 841 wards, the per capita cost will be found to be \$203.62 during the same period. The Disciplinary Training School for Boys, with its population of 241.86 boys, will be found to be \$198.46, and a further reduction is shown for the year 1904, the amount being \$192.04 per capita, with an average population of 275.27, and it can be stated that no institution under State or City control, when the advantages in education and discipline are considered, shows better results than that obtained by your Honorable Board in management. I trust that the foregoing brief summary will be found sufficiently convincing that waste or extravagance does not exist in this Institution in the expenditure of public moneys.

The attention of the members of your Board of Management is respectfully called.

The attention of the members of your Board of Management is respectfully called to a few of many reports of visiting Grand Juries, comments on your administration by the public press and addresses made by the Hon. James McKeen, president of the Brooklyn League; Hon. George W. Brush, Hon. Robert J. Wilkin, Justice of the Children's Court; Frank H. Tyler, Esq., Samuel Rowland, Esq., and many others, on the occasion of an official visit of the Brooklyn League to the Institution. All are of the most complimentary character, and considering the experience and high standing of the gentlemen in our civic life, should be accepted as very encouraging.

It is imperative that I should again call the attention of your Honorable Board to the unfavorable condition that exists in the housing of your wards and the many disadvantages your official staff has to contend with in the exercise of duty imposed by the rules governing the management of the Institution. The buildings are inadequate and unsuited for the purpose of reformatory effort.

Classification is considered paramount in our plan of discipline, and though not

and unsuited for the purpose of reformatory effort.

Classification is considered paramount in our plan of discipline, and though not an elimination, is a most important modification in the reformation of boys in criminal institutions. There are good, bad and indifferent in all communities. There are no real bad boys, but some are better than others, hence the importance of a proper classification, to avoid evil and keep away from temptation. To save a boy, remove him from the evil association of the other boy, or the other boy from his evil tendencies. Restrictive measures are necessary, and occupation enters largely into the reformation of a boy. Habits acquired by association and environment need many corrective methods before a sense of moral elevation is aroused; hence a proper classification should exist in all reformatory work. The mental and physical development of the youthful delinquent is not the most difficult if the method used is made attractive, if the official heads of municipal government seriously consider its civic responsibility for the proper housing of the unfortunate children assigned to your responsibility and jurisdiction, it should discharge its obligations to you in a more liberal spirit of recognition for the great services rendered to them and the community alike. A single thought would incline one to the belief that the saving of one of these children from a life of criminality would return interest one hundredfold.

If this is worthy of consideration as an economic proposition, it will be at once

If this is worthy of consideration as an economic proposition, it will be at once admitted that it is better to prevent crime in the kindergarten stage by discipline and education than to pay for its punishment and support in a later stage of criminal development in jail.

To accomplish the purpose for which this school was established has long been the ambition of the members of your Honorable Board, and it is not the purpose of your Superintendent to laud the untiring efforts and personal sacrifices made, but it is a duty to say that outside of the amount placed to the credit of the school by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for education and support, nothing has been done to improve the dilapidation that exists in the housing of your population outside of sanitation demanded by the Board of Health. The structures are a blot on civic responsibility and civic pride. Year after year your earnest petitions have met no response. To relieve conditions as they exist, the temporary repairs made necessary by age and inadequateness is an extravagance and waste of public money that has strained cordial relations between your Committee on Buildings and Repairs and our Borough Superintendent of Buildings and Offices, on whom we have to de-

pend for never ending patching and repairs. Public schools rise symmetrically and beautifully in every neighboring section to meet the ever-increasing demand for a higher elementary education of the more favored children in home and environment, and the world rejoices at the great possibilities of the future in education.

If, indeed, the great heart of municipal responsibility throbs to an impulse harmonizing with public demand at the expense of the tax-paying minority to the great benefit of the majority, it might be worthy of the thought that one more throb of that beneficent civic heart would respond to the expending of a sum equal to the cost of one of those beautiful schools, for the proper housing of those less favored children, who, often without fault of theirs, are outcasts on the public streets, exposed to temptation that leads to a life of criminality, disgrace and suffering. Is not the proverbial ounce of prevention better than the pound of cure? Is there not a possibility that their return to a place in American boyhood would pay a profit one hundredfold, purely on economic lines, to the municipality? There is no degree of doubt on this subject from any standpoint of discussion.

If the spirit that inspires one to act in a meritorious cause of good citizenship, even after many disappointments, such as you have received, returns with new vigor to its accomplishment, the cause should be worthy of the effort, and needs only the force of public opinion to rouse lethargy when it exists, in civic responsibility and

What is true of the great City's obligations to our public school system is equally true of its responsibility to the Disciplinary Training School for Boys, with this difference: That after school sessions the responsibility of the Board of Education is assigned to home and parental love and supervision, while the City's wards for which you are responsible end only when a cure is effected qualifying them for a new start in life, made possible by untiring effort on your part and the officers of your school empowered to perform their duties under your direction and supervision. The argument has been advanced by a high official authority that the congregate (or barrack) system should not be encouraged in institutional life, and the argument, or, rather, statement, is strengthened by the fact that many public institutions under State control are directing attention to this important consideration, if they have not already secured, large areas of land for the establishment of institutions on the segregate (or cottage) plan. Among these may be mentioned that excellent State institution, the Industrial School for Juvenile Delinquents, at Rochester. The State has granted an appropriation amounting to \$125,000, under the Laws of 1903, chapter 599, for the purchase of a farm of 1,400 acres outside the city of Rochester, and a further sum is requested: requested:

The removal of the House of Refuge, situated on Randall's Island, is also under consideration. The present institution is conducted on similar lines with the Rochester school, but the structures, which are of the congregate plan, are on City property, and the management desires to follow in the lead of the Rochester institution by purchasing a farm and establishing an institution on the segregate, or cottage, plan, if the City would consider the purchase of the building they now occupy. The value is estimated at about \$300,000. Will they do it and secure for the City an island park? It does seem reasonable, when the great population of the north end of the city is considered (Harlem) is considered (Harlem).

But all that could be said about the great question in favor of segregation at this time dwindles to insignificance when compared to the model village being built by the New York Juvenile Asylum at Echo Hill, near Dobbs Ferry, on the Hudson. The directors of this institution are compelled by the great increase of population on the west side of the City to abandon the substantial cluster of stone buildings on Washington Heights and move to their new farm and the enjoyment to be afforded in real suburban life, in cottages, which are not to contain more than twenty boys in each, and cared for by a foster mother, that each family may feel the benefit of what is considered a perfect system of classification. It can be stated with certainty that the future of this institution will depend on the success of their plan in perfecting what has been, up to this time, in the experimental stage, as far as it applies to the disciplining of criminally inclined boys. But no doubts exist on the subject of the advantages of the cottage system in the training of girls. There are many reasons which favor the barrack system, founded largely on the line of discipline best adapted to children of the street in a great city like ours, and due consideration should be given to a line of training to fit them for the opportunities presented in great commercial centres. Occupation is easier obtained and at more liberal compensation.

The trend of education in school and shop is directed to fit them more for trades and other employment found in urban centres, and should they fail of opportunity, our military education fits them to fill positions in such departments as Fire or Police, the Army or Navy and many other departments of government. It is a serious consideration as to whether city bred boys are adapted to fill a position as farm hand. Experience in the past has proven that a large number of those boys assigned from institutions deserted the occupation found for them on farms and returned to their old haunts after a season of travel in the country as tramps, till opportunity was afforded for transportation on freight cars. Suburban life has few attractions for the city bred boy of our streets. The one great advantage to be obtained is classification, and this must be considered as all-important. With this in view we accept popular judgment as it should apply to institutions founded on a military system like ours, and at once proceed to present the following improvements for consideration of your Committee on Buildings and Repairs: on Buildings and Repairs:

First—If the future of the institution is to be considered seriously as a municipal responsibility, it should be placed in a condition to properly discharge its obligations to the community and the municipality alike, by improving its facilities as a reformatory school and by harmonizing with what is accepted as modern requirements in structures and equipment (in part segregation) for the reformation and education of a number, not less than six hundred boys. This would call for the expenditure of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000), a sum not largely in excess of the cost of a single modern public school modern public school.

Second—It is imperative that the defects in the present buildings should receive attention, that the laws of the Board of Health and the recommendations of the State Board of Charities be complied with and a more comprehensive and effective system

Third—That the present frame building, in which is housed many trade shops, schools, hospital, detention wards, bath and wash room, house mother and female employees' sleeping apartments, should be removed from the main building, that better security from fire may be established and its present sanitary condition improved. Ample City land is available two hundred feet distant from its present dangerous location. It should be moved at once and substantial alterations made to fit it as a detention ward and hospital, its isolation from the other buildings considerably strengthening this recommendation.

Fourth—An armory and gymnasium should be built sufficiently large to afford shelter and exercise for four hundred boys, fitted with individual closets or lockers for the protection of regimentals and other equipment necessary in military drills and

Fifth—A power house should be built, detached from the main building, sufficiently large to furnish light, heat and power. Your present electrical equipment need not be removed from the position it occupies.

Sixth—A permanent brick extension should be built, conforming in style and elevation with the present brick structure, and extend north of the present building, 200 by 70 by 60, in which could be established schools, shops, administrative offices, chapel and employees' apartments.

Seventh-Ten cottages should be built, each to house forty boys, in size 30 by 50, two-story basement and mansard, containing a kitchen, dining-room, dormitories, reading-room, baths and wash rooms and suitable apartments for a caretaker and wife and cooking assistant. Sufficient land is available on the west side of the present buildings and east of Eighteenth avenue.

Eighth—The want of a greenhouse or conservatory is felt for the raising of flowers and plants. This school of culture, like music, has a stimulating effect in the direction of refinement and better environment, and our spacious grounds could be materially improved, and your wards would find many attractions to elevate their minds and instruct their hands.

Ninth—In conclusion, the foregoing suggested improvements could be completed from the sum stated in the first recommendation. We are in a position to furnish plans, specifications and models of any one or all from our advance class in carpentry, if

I trust the foregoing will be accepted as my report for the year ending November 1, 1904



For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City. The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefo
