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## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Thursday, November 9, 1911.

### PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchel, President, Board of Aldermen; George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan; Lewis H. Pounds, Acting President, Borough of Brooklyn; Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx; Maurice E. Connolly, President, Borough of Queens, and George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

The President of the Board of Aldermen, Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, presided at the request of his Honor the Mayor.

After disposing of the Financial and Franchise calendars, the following Public Improvement matters were considered:

CHANGING THE MAP OR PLAN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK BY LAYING OUT FORCE TUBE AVENUE, FROM JAMAICA AVENUE TO DINSMORE PLACE, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

(At the close of the public hearing given on November 2, 1911, this matter was laid over for one week.)

The Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn offered the following resolution:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 5th day of October, 1911, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out Force Tube avenue from Jamaica avenue to Dinsmore place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board, to be held on the 2d day of November, 1911, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 2d day of November, 1911; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 2d day of November, 1911; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New

York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Force Tube avenue from Jamaica avenue to Dinsmore place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to make the aforesaid change in accordance with a map or plan bearing the signature of the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough, and dated October 3, 1911.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

### ABROGATION OF THE EXISTING HARBOR LINES AROUND GREAT AND LITTLE MILL ROCKS IN HELL GATE PASSAGE, EAST RIVER.

284 By fixing the lines and grades of Atlantic boulevard, between Grandview avenue and Channel avenue, Borough of Queens.  
285 By changing the lines and grade of Knox street, between Stebbins avenue and Market street; changing the lines and grades of Market street, between Burger avenue and Broadway, and changing the grade of Knox street between Stebbins avenue and Richmond terrace, Borough of Richmond.

### PLANS FOR BRIDGE TO CARRY 8TH AVENUE ACROSS THE TRACKS OF THE SEA BEACH RAILWAY COMPANY, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn asked and obtained unanimous consent for the present consideration of this matter, and presented the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 10278.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, Office of the Chief Engineer, 277 Broadway, November 8, 1911.

Hon. WM. J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—On July 6, 1911, the Board adopted a plan fixing grades for 8th avenue, between 61st and 62d streets, Borough of Brooklyn, in order that the said avenue might be carried across the tracks of the Sea Beach Railway Company, and transmitted the same to the Public Service Commission for the First District for a determination by the Commission as to the manner in which the street should cross the railroad, and for an order on the part of the Commission for the construction of the necessary bridge. On October 3, 1911, a hearing was held before Mr. Commissioner Eustis, acting for the Commission, and on October 27 last a final order and determination was made providing that the avenue should be carried across the railroad at the elevation indicated on the plan, and that the bridge should be so constructed as to make a connection with the bridge to be built by the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission for carrying 8th avenue across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad, which adjoin those of the Sea Beach Railroad, and providing also that before the construction of the bridge is begun, detail plans and specifications, approved by the Chief Engineer of the railroad company, and by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, together with an estimate of the expense of the proposed changes, should be submitted to the Public Service Commission for approval.

The action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was taken in order to facilitate the improvement of 8th avenue, the continuity of which is now broken by the cuts in which the Long Island Railroad and the Sea Beach Railroad are located, and also in order to make it possible to grant a franchise for a surface railroad in 8th avenue, application for which has been pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for some time. The order of the Public Service Commission definitely established the manner in which the street should be carried across the railroad tracks, but did not specifically order such construction to be undertaken in the immediate future. In view of the necessity for this improvement, I would recommend that the Board call upon the Sea Beach Railroad Company to present to it plans for the bridge across the tracks of the said Company to connect with the bridge to be built by the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission over the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company, such plans to be submitted not later than January 1 next. It is also recommended that the Company be requested to advise the Board whether it will undertake to prepare and submit the plans by or before that date. A resolution to this effect is herewith submitted.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment did on July 6, 1911, approve a plan fixing the grades of 8th avenue between 61st and 62d streets, in order that the said avenue might be carried across the tracks of the Sea Beach Rail-



way Company, and did on the same date request the Public Service Commission for the First District to approve said plans and order the construction of the bridge; and

Whereas, The Public Service Commission did on October 27, 1911, make a final order and determination as to the manner in which 8th avenue should be carried across the said railroad tracks, this determination being in conformity with the grade plan adopted by the Board on July 6, 1911; and

Whereas, The said order of the Public Service Commission required that before the construction of the improvement is begun, detail plans and specifications, approved by the Chief Engineer of the Railroad Company and by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, should be submitted to the Public Service Commission for the First District for its approval; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby directs the Sea Beach Railway Company to prepare and submit to the said Board on or before December 31, 1911, detail plans and specifications for the bridge by which 8th avenue would be carried across the tracks of the Sea Beach Railway Company; said bridge to connect with the bridge to be built by the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission to carry said 8th avenue across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company; and be it also

Resolved, That the Sea Beach Railway Company be requested to advise this Board by or before November 20 whether it will undertake to prepare and submit to the Board the detail plans and specifications for the said bridge as herein provided.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

On motion of the Comptroller, the Board then adjourned to meet Thursday, November 16, 1911, at 10.30 a. m.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated October 17, relative to the request of the President of the Borough of Queens, dated October 16, that the examinations for promotion to Chief Inspector, Bureau of Highways, and Chief Clerk, Fourth Grade, Bureau of Street Cleaning, be postponed, and recommending that, as no action had been taken by the Commission in regard to the said examinations, the papers be filed. A communication was presented from the Corporation Counsel, dated October 20, with reference to the proposed increase in salary of G. F. Lecrun, an Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry in the Board of Education, from \$33 a week to \$36 a week (\$1,716 per annum to \$1,872 per annum), and stating that the proposed increase in salary would amount to a promotion within the meaning of the Civil Service Law and, consequently, could not be effected without examination. The communication was ordered filed.

On motion, the application of Daniel Gibbons, of 1118 Girard street, Philadelphia, for the position of Storekeeper was rejected for non-citizenship.

The following reports of Departmental Boards of Examiners for positions in the Non-Competitive Class were approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner:

"That the request that the titles of Messrs. Tierney and Robertson be changed to Inspector of Blasting be denied, for the reason that the examination for Oil Surveyor did not appear to be the equivalent of the examination for the position of Inspector of Blasting."

Assistant Foreman, at \$3 per day, to Assistant Foreman at \$4 per day, to be open to all Assistant Foremen, Grade 1, who have served for not less than six months in the grade and who are otherwise eligible (Rule XV., paragraph 10).

Bureau of the Chief Engineer—From Typewriting Copyist, Grade 2, to Stenographer and Typewriter, Grade 2, to be open to all Second Grade Typewriting Copyists who have served in the position for not less than one year and who are otherwise eligible (Rule XV., paragraph 8c). From Clerk, Grade 2, to Clerk, Grade 3, to be open to all Clerks who have served for not less than three years in the grade and who are otherwise eligible (Rule XV., paragraph 8a). From Clerk, Third Grade, to Clerk, Fourth Grade, to be open to all Third Grade Clerks in the Bureau who have served for not less than three years in the grade and who are otherwise eligible (Rule XV., paragraph 8a).

Borough of Queens—Clerk Second Grade, to Clerk, Third Grade, to be open to all Second Grade Clerks who have served for not less than three years in the grade and who are otherwise eligible (Rule XV., paragraph 8a). Clerk, Third Grade, to Clerk, Fourth Grade, to be open to all Third Grade Clerks who have served for not less than three years in the grade and who are otherwise eligible (Rule XV., paragraph 8a).

All Boroughs—Clerk, Fourth Grade, to Clerk, Fifth Grade, to be open to all Fourth Grade Clerks who have served for not less than three years in the grade and who are otherwise eligible (Rule XV., paragraph 8a).

Report of the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated October 20, recommending that the Commission defer action on the request of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the following promotion examinations, pending the receipt of additional information from the Department:

## TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

Report of the work done during the quarter:

The Topographical Bureau is charged with the following duties:

To make topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following work, viz.:

The preparation of a design of a street system in those parts of the Borough of Queens, where a design is not yet adopted, and making surveys and maps showing changes in adopted street systems and grades.

The actual demarcation on the ground by monuments on the lines of the adopted avenues, streets, etc., and the resetting of monuments where necessary.

The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets, etc.

Filing maps and records of all matter pertaining to the work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau.

Making reports of the physical condition and the legal status of streets upon petitions for legal opening and for improvement.

Making examinations, maps and reports upon miscellaneous matters referred to the Engineer in charge.

## Work Done by the Field Force.

Making a topographical survey with plane table, in the neighborhood of Rosedale and Rockaway Peninsula.

Locating street lines and subdivisions for tentative map purposes in the third and Fourth Wards.



Running additional levels and surveys in connection with the studies for changes in grades and street lines.

Monumenting and readjustment surveys were continued in Long Island City, adjacent to Second Ward line, for purpose of completing final map sheets.

Monumenting surveys in North Beach section, and setting of monuments were completed during the quarter.

Surveys preliminary to monumenting the Aqueduct map when adopted, and likewise in Rockaway Beach, were completed during the quarter.

Drilling and readjusting monuments were continued in Corona, Woodside and Elmhurst.

Final traversing was done in the North Beach section, and in Steinway, adjacent thereto. Also in vicinity of Sunnyside Yards. Triangulation tie lines established from Hunters Point to Steinway.

Damage surveys started during the quarter and not completed: Rockaway boulevard, Eldert's lane to Ocean avenue. Linear feet involved in above, 7,670. Researches in the State laws for the authority for the opening of old highways and the laws under which they were acquired by and opened to the public.

Engaged on study of the grades for the Jamaica section of the Borough.

Engaged on tentative map of the Third Ward; also engaged on the amended tentative map of the Aqueduct section.

## TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

The Topographical Bureau is charged with the following duties: To make topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following work, viz: The preparation of a design of a street system in those parts of the Borough of Queens where a design is not yet adopted, and making surveys and maps showing changes in adopted street systems and grades; the actual demarcation on the ground by monuments on the lines of the adopted avenues, streets, etc., and the resetting of monuments where necessary; the making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions and profiles for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets, etc.; filing maps and records of all matter pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; making reports of the physical condition and the legal status of streets upon petitions for legal opening and for improvement; making examinations, maps and reports upon miscellaneous matters referred to the Engineer-in-Charge.

## Work Done by the Field Force.

Locating street lines and subdivisions for tentative map purposes in the Third and Fourth Wards.

Running additional levels and surveys in connection with the studies for changes in grades and street lines.

The final traversing in that portion of the First Ward adjacent to the Second Ward line was continued.

The monument points have been set for the Broadway widening from Cemetery Lane, Flushing, east to the City Line, and the final traversing of it is well under way.

The setting of monument points on Rockaway Boulevard is well under way.

The approximate location for tentative map purposes of property layouts in the Third and Fourth Wards were completed.

The following surveys for alterations or additions have been completed or are well under way: Woodside avenue, Isabella place, Grout avenue, Cooper avenue, Weil place, Homer Lee avenue, Rapelje avenue, Lexington avenue and Scott street, Forest avenue, Cameron terrace, Betts avenue, Park place and Proctor street.

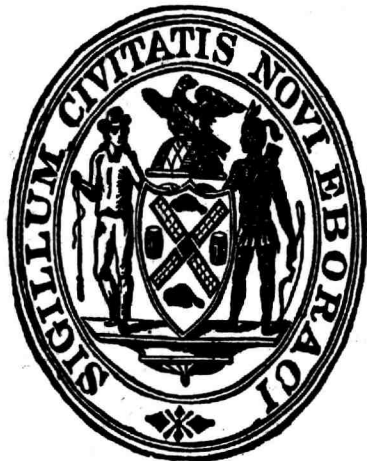

#### Franchise Matters.

**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT** at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The New York Magnaphone and Music Company has under date of June 29, 1911, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege or franchise to lay, construct, maintain and operate electric wires with the necessary branches under and along the streets, avenues and public places of The City of New York for the purpose of distributing music and matters of general interest and amusement electrically by means of a magnaphone;

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants;

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on July 6, 1911, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as September 21, 1911, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "Evening Mail" and the "Globe," newspapers designated by the Mayor and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing; and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to The New York Magnaphone and Music Company and the adequacy of the amount of compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by The New York Magnaphone and Music Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The New York Magnaphone and Music Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

#### Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ 1911 by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The New York Magnaphone and Music Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right or privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in the conduits under the streets and avenues within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan and that part of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River; such wires to connect only the premises of subscribers with the central stations of the Company and to be used for the purpose of maintaining a system whereby music and information in relation to matters of general interest may be distributed electrically from the central stations of the Company to two or more subscribers simultaneously and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The rights and privileges herein granted shall not be construed to in any way give the Company the right or privilege to engage in a business permitting communication between subscribers and this contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not in any way engage in a business which will permit communication between its subscribers or claim the right to do under this contract and the right and privilege herein and hereby granted and conferred; it being understood that this is not a grant to do a telephone business within the general accepted meaning of the term.

Second—The said right to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, without any privilege of renewal thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand dollars (\$3,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts,

if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying westerly of the Bronx River.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to The City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—The right and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein notwithstanding, and the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires, electrical conductors and other property of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires, electrical conductors and other property, or any portion thereof, constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—Said wires, electrical conductors and other property shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction shall be commenced by the Company until written permits therefor have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Eighth—All wires or other electrical conductors of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan or the portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and electrical conductors in such subways, and the City agrees to lease to the Company during the term of this contract such space as may be required for the business herein authorized.

Ninth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish its service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half (1/2) mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Tenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly indicated the number of wires which are used by the Company on the 30th day of September next preceding, and the streets and avenues in which the same are located, and also those which were put in during the preceding year.

Eleventh—The Company shall commence the operation of its system of distribution of music and matters of general interest, as herein authorized, within six (6) months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and shall have in operation the apparatus for the delivery of such service at one thousand (1,000) points upon subscriber's premises within five (5) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The Board may, by resolution, direct the Company to install its apparatus and neces-

sary appurtenances thereto in any or all of the free wards of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and in the assembly halls of any or all of the public schools within the portion of the City for which a franchise is hereby granted. Upon notice by the Board to the Company that any such resolution has been adopted the Company shall install such apparatus and the necessary appurtenances thereto, free of charge, and shall furnish service, as directed, at one-half the regular rates charged by the Company for similar service, provided that the Company shall not be required to extend its wires for the purpose of connecting with such hospitals or schools a distance greater in any case than one-half (1/2) mile.

Thirteenth—It is agreed that the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates for services rendered by the Company to subscribers pursuant to this contract, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair, but the Company shall not at any time within the term of this contract charge more than twenty dollars (\$20) per month for an unlimited music service.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of the cost to it of apparatus leased or furnished to the subscriber on his premises, and of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills shall never be charged against property unless due from the owner thereof, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Fifteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Seventeenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Eighteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at reasonable rates or at the rates herein fixed, or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Nineteenth—If, for a period of any three (3) consecutive months after the commencement of the operation of the system proposed by the Company, as herein provided, such system shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of any six (6) months out of any consecutive twelve (12) months after the commencement of operation, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity.

Twentieth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.

13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of subscribers served by the Company.

16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or security, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided, and in default of the payment of such annual charges, the City shall collect the same with interest from said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company. In case of failure by the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual state-

ments, the furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other Municipal officer, made pursuant to the terms of this contract or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such cases and in any of these events, the Company shall, except as herein otherwise provided, pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation, which sum or sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-third—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the wires and electrical conductors constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK, ACTING BY THE Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission") invites proposals to construct Section 9 of the Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

Section No. 9—Beginning at a point about 50 feet north of the centre line of East 67th street and extends thence under Lexington avenue to a point about 70 feet south of the centre line of East 79th street; with a station at East 68th and East 69th streets and a station at East 77th street.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having four tracks. THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
