DEP is committed to ensuring the safety of all employees by enforcing applicable regulations and providing resources for employees to report unsafe conditions. This includes workplace violence. DEP provides information on how all employees can take steps to minimize the hazard of workplace violence at our offices. DEP employees have the rightand are encouraged-to report any workplace violence related concern without fear of retaliation.

The Employee Concern Procedure (ECP) provides another avenue to report unsafe conditions or acts. The ECP ensures that all concerns or reports that are made by employees or contractors are promptly reviewed and resolved. Commissioner's Corner



Earlier today DEP joined Trout Unlimited, a national grassroots non-profit organization whose mission is to conserve, protect, and restore North America's cold-water fisheries and their watersheds, and 50 pre-k and 4th grade students from P.S. 251, the Paerdegat School in Brooklyn, to release juvenile brown trout that the students have raised in their classrooms since October of last year. Since 2002, DEP and Trout Unlimited have worked together to educate students in New York City and watershed communities about the importance of protecting our shared water resources through the Trout in the Classroom conservation-The program. oriented environmental education program teaches young New Yorkers, ranging from pre-k to grade 12, about the connections between trout, water quality, the environment and steps they can take to improve the ecological health of the New York City watershed, which supplies over 9 million people with a reliable source of high quality drinking water every day.

This year, more than 3,000 students from schools in New York City and the upstate watersheds incubated trout eggs in their classrooms and raised them into juvenile brown trout, which are also called fingerlings. The 6-month long program culminates with students taking part in a field day, where they release the fingerlings into New York City watershed streams in April and May. Today, nearly 50 fingerlings were released into the Cross River where it passes through the Ward Pound Ridge Reservation in Westchester County.

The Trout in the Classroom Program in southern New York began in 2002 as a partnership between DEP and Trout Unlimited and has become a prototype for similar programs across the country. The program is flexibly designed to be age appropriate as well as adaptable to individual classroom needs, enabling teachers to cultivate a wide range of skills in their students, ranging from reading and creative writing to scientific observation. Participating classrooms receive trout eggs in October, giving students the opportunity to monitor water temperature, clarity, dissolved oxygen, ammonia, and PH as the eggs develop and grow into fingerlings over the course of the school year.

As an aquatic indicator species, the trout also provide students the chance to learn about water quality and the ecological importance of the streams that feed New York City's water supply and the nearby forest habitat.

The New York State Department of Conservation (DEC) supports the program and sets guidelines for raising trout in the classroom and releasing them into the New York City watershed. Last fall, DEC provided approximately 20,000 trout eggs that were distributed for free to nearly 200 classrooms. It is estimated that over 3,000 students from more than 150 schools in the southern New York area will directly participate in trout releases this year.

of Wastewater Treatment (BWT), his communication skills that he Joseph **Reddington** always ensures that safety comes first, which in practical terms means training courses, among others. he puts people first. A Queens native, Reddington was born in Flushing, grew up in Woodside and attended Delehanty High School. He studied at New York University and LaGuardia Community College and held several different jobs before joining DEP as a Sewage Treatment Worker. A few years later he became a Plant Safety Person and earned numerous OSHA training certificates, an Asbestos Inspector License and was certified as an EMT. In 2000. Joe returned to Operations as a Senior Sewage Treatment Worker at Ward's Island and obtained his NYS Wastewater Treatment Plant Operator's License. However, after a few years he was eager to return his focus to safety and he became Chief of the Safety Section.

In this role, Reddington serves as an on-call responder, reviews unsafe conditions, performs modified equipment assessments assists incident and with investigations. His extensive knowledge of plant machinery makes him a tremendous asset to EHS staff, and also informs his safety role. "You can't connect with people if you can't speak their language," he says, referring to the mechanical and technical equipment used at the facilities.

Reddington also believes that it's not only what you say, but how you say it. Prior to joining DEP he had worked in the journalism industry and he credits this

As Section Chief with the Bureau experience with helping him build uses at DEP today. This includes leading Confined Space and CPR In the early 2000s, Reddington worked with BWT staff to construct a simulator for DEP's Confined Space training. As one of the few on the East Coast that included a simulator, Reddington was instrumental in providing the training for not only DEP, but also the NYPD, Transit Authority and the FBI. "I'm always impressed by the talent at DEP and how people are able to think outside of the box to come up with creative solutions to difficult problems," said Reddington.

> "Joe is invaluable to the bureau," said Bill Yulinsky, Director of EHS for BWT. "His concern for the workers and the environment, his knowledge of EHS regulations and his credibility with employees should serve as an example for all EHS professionals."

> Most recently, Reddington has been working to ensure that his wealth of knowledge is transferred to newly hired employees, so that in the future he can feel he has not left his job here at DEP unfinished. "Safety is a personal thing. It's my job to make sure everyone goes home at night," he said.

> Reddington currently resides in Middle Village with his wife. He has owned a motorcycle for 45 years and enjoys taking Sunday morning rides on his Harley Davidson. And, as a life-long Mets fan, he is enjoying watching the team play this year and looks forward to a successful season.
