DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING MAY 24TH.  
CITY HALL, May 24th, 1873.

In pursuance of the provisions of Sec. 110, Chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Department of Public Works makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending this day.

In the Bureau of Water Purveyor 688 men and 40 carts, have been employed in repairs and renewal of pipes, and stop-cocks, laying Croton water pipes, and repairing stone pavements. \$943.00 were received for permits to construct vaults.

The Bureau of Sewers has received \$151.20, for Vitriified Sewer Pipe sold to Contractors, and \$590.00, for permits to make sewer connections. Five skilled laborers were employed in cleaning sewers.

The Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, has employed 82 men in repairs and maintenance of the Aqueduct, 229 men in alterations of the Aqueduct on Tenth Avenue, and 53 men in the Pipe yard. Croton water has been introduced in 111th, 112th and 113th streets, from Avenue A. to 1st Avenue, 36th street from 1st Avenue to East River, 59th street from 5th to 8th Avenues, 5th Avenue from 58th to 59th streets, and in 55th street from Madison to 4th Avenues.

The Water Register has collected for water rent \$28,452.50, for penalties \$79.50, for water through meters, \$3,573.75, and for tapping pipes \$131.00, making a total of \$32,236.75. There were employed in the Bureau 1 tapper, 2 water cutters, 2 measurers and 15 laborers.

On the Boulevard, Streets and Avenues north of 59th street, there were employed 1013 men on construction, 65 men on maintenance, and 152 men on 72d street, Telford McAdam pavement.

The Superintendent of Streets has employed 19 men in the care of unpaved roads.

There were employed 11 men and 30 women in cleaning public buildings and offices, 2 keepers

of Corporation Yards, 1 Steam Engineer, and 2 watchmen at Public Baths, all under the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies.

In the Bureau of Lamps and Gas 40 lamps have been ordered removed and discontinued, 2 old lamps replaced, and new lamps erected in 104th street, from 8th Avenue to the Boulevard, 3 painters of public lamps, and 9 lighters of markets were employed.

The Bureau of Encumbrances has received 22 complaints, and issued 100 permits for builders, street signs, and awnings.

Eleven certificates of assessments were issued as to the cost of improvements completed, to wit: one for paving; two for sewers; and eight for Receiving Basins.

The total amount of requisitions drawn on the Comptroller during the week by the Department is \$81,178.52.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING MAY 31ST.  
CITY HALL, May 31, 1873.

In pursuance of the provisions of section 110, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Department of Public Works makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending this day:

The Bureau of Water Purveyor has employed 10 foremen, 699 laborers, mechanics, &c., and 56 carts in repairing and renewal of pipes and stopcocks, laying Croton pipes, and repairing stone pavements; also 10 inspectors on new pavements under contract. The sum of \$121.68 was received for permits to construct vaults.

The following contracts for new pavements were executed: Paving with Belgian blocks in Seventieth street, from Fourth to Fifth avenues; Eighty-third street, from Third to Fifth avenues; and Eighty-seventh street, from Second to Fourth avenues; for all of which Edward Bradburn, of 349 East Eighty-sixth street, is contractor, and Bernard Maloney, of Ninety-second street and Fourth avenue, and John Ryan, of 44 Prince street, are sureties; also paving with Belgian blocks Eighty-sixth street, from Third to Fifth avenue; contractor, Edward Bradburn, of 349 East Eighty-sixth street, sureties, Bernard Maloney, of Ninety-second street and Fourth avenue, and James Pettit, of Manhattan street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues.

The Superintendent of Streets employed 1 foreman, 9 laborers, 4 carts, 1 scraper, 1 roller, and 7 sprinklers, in maintaining unpaved roads.

In the Bureau of Sewers, 1 foreman and 34 inspectors and laborers were employed in inspecting and cleaning sewers; \$630 was received for permits to make sewer connections.

Under the Bureau of Lamps and Gas new lamps have been ordered erected in Fifty-fifth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues; in Sixty-eighth street, between Madison and Fourth avenues; and in Twentieth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues; 9 lighters of markets and 3 painters have been employed.

Under the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, there were employed 11 men and 30 women in cleaning public buildings and offices, 2 keepers of corporation yards, 1 steam engineer, and 2 watchmen at public parks.

The Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct has employed 328 men and 3 teams in repairs and maintenance and alterations of the aqueduct and 53 men and 6 trucks at the pipe yards. Croton water has been introduced into Fifty-eighth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues; Thirty-seventh street, from 11th avenue 400 feet west; and Sixtieth street, 150 feet west, and 450 east from 11th avenue.

On construction and maintenance of Boulevards, Roads and Avenues, there were employed 1,054 men in various capacities, and on construction of Telford McAdam pavement on Seventy-second street, 154 men.

The Water Register has collected for Croton water rent \$25,567.65; for penalties, \$58.50; for water through meters, \$2,043.94; for tapping pipes, \$109.50—making a total of \$27,779.59. 1 tapper, 2 water cutters, 2 measurers and 15 laborers were employed in stopping leaks and cutting off water.

The Bureau of Encumbrances issued 48 permits to place building materials on the street, 3 permits to erect signs, and 1 permit to erect an awning, and received 28 complaints.

The total amount of requisitions drawn by the Department on the Comptroller during the week is \$53,427.50.

In pursuance of the provisions of Sec. 110, chapter 335, laws of 1873, the Department of Public Works, makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending this day.

The force employed in the Bureau of Water Purveyor was as follows: On repairs and renewal of pipes and stop-cocks, 44 men and 5 carts; in laying water mains and replacing pavement after laying mains 508 men, and 29 carts, and 1 team; in repairing 6 foot Aqueduct pipe 39 men and 1 cart; in replacing stone pavements 116 men and 24 carts; inspecting new pavements under contract 10 Inspectors; the receipts for permits to construct vaults were \$735.92.

Under the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct there were employed: On repairs and maintenance of the Aqueduct 76 men and 3 teams; on alterations of the Aqueduct on Tenth Avenue, 264 men, 16 carts and 8 teams; at the Pipe Yard, receiving, testing and delivering pipes, 47 men and 6 trucks.

In the Bureau of Sewers were received from sale of Vitriified Sewer Pipe, \$331.85, and for permits to make sewer connections \$490.00. A contract was made June 2d, 1873, for the con-

struction of a sewer in Pearl street, beginning at Old Slip, and running 180 feet south; the contractors are Thomas Crimmins of 262 East 60th street, and John D. Crimmins of 248 East 61st street; the surety is Thomas E. Crimmins of 246 East 61st street. 25 Inspectors have been employed on the constructions of sewers and drains, under contract, and 12 Inspectors and laborers and 1 cart on repairing and cleaning of sewers. 201 receiving basins have been cleaned.

On construction of Boulevard, Roads and Avenues. There were employed 2 general foremen, 23 foremen, 832 laborers, rockmen and mechanics, 57 teams, 65 carts, 2 horses and wagons, 2 four horse teams and 1 eight horse team. On 72d street, Telford McAdam pavement, 4 foremen and 177 men. On maintenance of Boulevard, Roads and Avenues, 3 foremen, 38 men, and 25 carts, and teams.

The Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies employed 11 men and 30 women in cleaning public buildings and offices, 2 keepers of Corporation Yards, 1 steam engineer, and at the Public Baths, 1 Superintendent, 4 Assistants, 2 watchmen and 3 keepers.

Under the Superintendent of Streets there were employed in repairing and maintaining unpaved roads, 1 foreman, 9 laborers, 5 carts, 1 scraper, 1 roller and 7 sprinklers.

The Bureau of Lamps and Gas, had a new lamp erected in Exchange Place, and four extra lamps removed and discontinued. 9 lighters of public markets and 3 painters were employed.

The Water Register collected for water rent, \$40,495.55, for penalties \$108.30, for water through meters, \$4,480.47, for water for sprinkling streets, \$772.08, and for permits to tap pipes, \$139.00; total, \$45,995.40. 1 tapper, 2 water cutters, 8 measurers and 9 laborers were employed in cutting off water and stopping leaks.

The total amount of requisitions drawn on the Comptroller during the week is \$148,702.85.

In pursuance of the provisions of Section 110, Chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Department of Public Works makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending this day.

In the Bureau of Water Purveyor there were employed: in repairing and renewal of pipes and stopcocks, 3 foremen, 36 laborers, 5 horses and carts, 2 pavers, 3 rammers, 1 toolhouse keeper. In laying croton mains 6 foremen, 8 assistant foremen, 131 rockmen, 302 laborers, 45 caulkers and blasters, 29 horses and carts, 1 double team, 2 watchmen, 20 pavers, 10 rammers. In repairing six foot pipes 1 foreman, 1 assistant foreman, 48 laborers and caulkers, 1 horse and cart. In repairing stone pavements 1 general foreman, 10 belgian pavers, 15 cobble stone pavers, 10 rammers, 80 laborers, 24 horses and carts. On new pavements under contract 13 inspectors. The receipt for permits to construct vaults were \$2,995.29.

In the Bureau of Street Improvements 34 inspectors were employed on works under contract.

In the Bureau of Streets and Roads 1 foreman, 9 laborers, 1 scraper, 1 roller, 5 horses and carts, and 7 sprinklers, were employed in repairing and maintaining roads.

The Bureau of Incumbrances issued 20 permits to place building material on streets, and received and corrected 17 complaints.

Under the Engineer in chief on construction of boulevards, roads and avenues there were employed 2 general foremen, 914 men, 56 double teams, 2 four horse teams, 1 eight horse team, and 2 horses and wagons. In constructing Tilford McAdam pavement on 72d street, 1 general foreman, 108 men, 32 horses and carts, and 2 double teams. On maintenance of boulevards, roads, and avenues, 3 foremen, 24 men, 10 horses and carts and 16 double teams.

Under the Chief Engineer of the croton aqueduct 8 keepers, 1 foreman, 70 laborers, and mechanics, and 4 teams were employed on repairs and maintenance of the aqueduct; 1 general foreman, 8 foremen, 283 men, and 24 teams and carts on alteration of the aqueduct on tenth avenue: 1 Superintendent, 1 foreman and 45 men in receiving, testing and delivering water pipes at the pipe yard, 24th street and east river. Croton water has been introduced into 78th street, between the boulevard and 11th avenue, on the boulevard east side, between 72d and 75th streets, on kingsbridge road from Inwood street to kingsbridge, and on Inwood street from kingsbridge road to the Hudson river.

In the Bureau of sewers there was received from sale of vitrified sewer pipe the sum of \$693.88 and for permits to make sewer connections \$330.00. 478 receiving basins were cleaned, and 15 basins and 7 sewers repaired: 20 sewers, 5 drains and 2 basins are in course of construction under the supervision of 21 inspectors, 1 foreman, 6 inspectors, 5 skilled laborers and 1 cart, are employed in the repairing and cleaning of sewers.

By the Bureau of Lamps and Gas new lamps have been recommended to be placed on 46th street, between 1st and 2d avenues, in 59th street, between 4th and 5th avenues, and in 66th street, between 4th and Lexington avenues; new lamps have been ordered, placed and lighted in 46th street, between 1st and 2d avenues, in 59th street, between 4th and 5th avenues, and in 7th avenue, between 129th and 141st streets east side. 17 old lamps were removed and discontinued, and 200 new street lamps received. 9 lighters of markets and 3 painters have been employed.

The Bureau of Repairs and Supplies has employed 5 men and 30 women, in cleaning public buildings and offices, 2 keepers of Corporation yards, 1 steam engineer, 2 superintendents of Public Baths, 4 assistants, 2 watchmen and 3 keepers.

The Water Register has collected for water

rents \$28,745.75, for water through meters \$196.59 for penalties \$84.45, for water to sprinkle streets, \$535.64, and for permits to tap pipes \$116.50, making a total of \$29,678.93. 1 Tapper, 2 Water Cutters, 2 Measurers, 9 Laborers and 1 Horse and wagon were employed in cutting off water and stopping leaks.

The total amount of requisitions drawn on the Comptroller by this Department during the week is \$42,814.50.
