

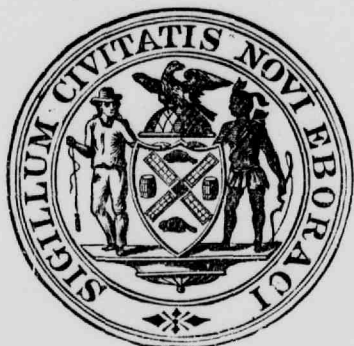

The Board of Commissioners met this day.
Present—President Vincent C. King, in the chair, and Commissioners Joseph L. Perley and John J. Gorman.
The minutes of meetings of 13th and 20th instant were read and approved.

Trials

were held with the following result:

Foreman Thomas H. Griffith, of Engine Co. No. 43, charged with "violation of Circular 3, office Chief Engineer, series 1869." Found guilty, but excusable under the circumstances, and charge dismissed.

Fireman Owen O'Rourke, of Engine Co. No. 3, charged with "conduct prejudicial to good order." Not proven and charge dismissed.

Assistant Foreman Mathew Hicks, of Engine Co. No. 25, charged with "neglect of duty" and "violation of General Order No. 16, 1868." Found guilty on both charges and sentenced to forfeit nine days' pay and be reprimanded in orders.

Assistant Foreman Terrence P. Brennan, of Hook and Ladder Co. No. 3, charged with "neglect of duty" and "violation of General Order No. 16, 1868." Not proven and charges dismissed.

Resolution

was adopted, as follows:

Resolved, That the Chief of Department be and he is hereby directed to ascertain the cause, if any there was, for the absence of the Foremen of Engine Co. No. 25 and Hook and Ladder Co. No. 3 from their companies on the occasion of the collision of the apparatus of the two companies named, on the evening of the 14th instant.

The following copy of writ of certiorari in the matter of the People ex rel. Wm. H. Vanderbilt, Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., Wm. K. Vanderbilt, and Samuel Barton, as executors of the last will and testament of Cornelius Vanderbilt, deceased, etc., against the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments of the City of New York, was received, and ordered to be transmitted to the Council to the Corporation:

The People of the State of New York:

To John Wheeler, George H. Andrews, and John N. Hayward, Esqrs., Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for the City and County of New York, Greeting:

Whereas, We have been informed by the petition of Wm. H. Vanderbilt, Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., Wm. K. Vanderbilt, and Samuel Barton, as executors of the last will and testament of Cornelius Vanderbilt, deceased, and trustees of the said several trust estates therein created, that certain proceedings were had before you in regard to the assessment and taxation of the said petitioners as such executors and trustees, for the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and that you had decided to assess the said petitioners as such executors and trustees upon and in respect to certain personal property, in the sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000), and had refused to correct said assessment or strike the same from the assessment rolls or to reduce the said assessment, and had included the same in the assessment rolls prepared by you for delivery to the Supervisors of the County of New York, and we being willing, for certain causes, to be certified of such proceedings, and of the action had, and of the decision made by you on the application of the said petitioners as such executors and trustees, do command you that you certify and return, under your hands, and as amply as the same remains before you, those proceedings with that part of the record of valuation and assessment relating to the same, and under what law, and by virtue of what power the said assessment is made, unto our Supreme Court, at a General term thereof, held in the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the first day of October, 1877, at the opening of the court on that day, or as soon thereafter as a hearing can be had, so that our Justices may further cause to be done thereupon what of right and according to law ought to be done, and have you then and there this writ.
