

Approved Papers for the week ending April 2, 1887.

Resolved, That to enable the Commissioner of Public Works to carry out with the least possible delay certain alterations and improvements in the room of the First District Police Court, which are necessary to the proper ventilation of the court-room, the said Commissioner is hereby authorized to make such alterations and improvements without advertisement and public letting, as required by section 64 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the cost of said work not to exceed the sum of six thousand dollars, and to be charged to the appropriation "Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs," for 1887.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable
this Department to detect and check the useless and unterminates of the consent of the consent of the content of an element so valuable and essential
to the health and comfort of all the citzuens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for
the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through
meters are a lien against the respective premises, and
the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all
further applications for reduction of water rents, no
cocurring through leaks, from defective service pipes, or
