“Resolved, That the lists so submitted shall be open to public inspection, and when a full list is prepared for one or more Assembly Districts, the same shall be published in the CITY RECORD, and public scrutiny invited, and objections (if any exist) considered, before a final selection is made.

"Resolved, That in the preparation of such lists for publication, the Chief of the Bureau of Elections is hereby directed to omit therefrom the name of any person whose business or reputation is of an immoral or disreputable character, or who has employment under the Federal, State, or City governments, or any of the departments thereof;" and

Whereas, On August 15 Commissioner Wheeler submitted to the Board a communication, of which the following is a copy:

"The undersigned Commissioners of Police in the Board of Police of the City of New York, who are the representatives, in said Board, of the political minority on State issues in the City and County of New York, hereby, pursuant to section 13 of chapter 675 of the Laws of 1872, name the following persons to be appointed to serve as Inspectors of Election in the City and County of New York, for the year ending September 30, 1880, to represent the party in political minority on State issues in the said city and county, two of them in each election district in said city and county, as designated opposite the said several names.

And Whereas, In pursuance of the said resolution of July 29, 1879, the said persons so named by Commissioners Wheeler and French have been referred, and the examination of a portion thereof has been made by the Chief of the Bureau of Elections, and the result has been reported to this Board; therefore

Resolved, That the persons so reported upon and named by Commissioners Wheeler and French be and are hereby selected and appointed Inspectors of Election, to serve in the Election Districts respectively indicated, as Inspectors appointed to represent the party in political minority on State issues in the City and County of New York.

Commissioner Morrison moved that the resolution be laid over. Lost—Commissioners MacLean and Morrison voting aye; Commissioners Wheeler and French voting no.

The original question was then lost—Commissioners Wheeler and French voting aye; Commissioners MacLean and Morrison voting no.

Resolved, That the resolution just offered be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation with the request that he will promptly advise this Board as to its duty, with reference to the appointment of Inspectors of Election to represent the political minority on State issues in this city, and especially to state whether or not the Commissioners representing the political minority having named certain persons as Inspectors of Election, and the persons so named having been referred to the Chief of the Bureau of Elections for examination, under the resolution of the Board, and he having reported the result of such examination, and the said Commissioners Wheeler and French having again named such persons and requested their appointment, whether it is not the duty of this Board to appoint them. Carried—Commissioners Wheeler, MacLean, and French voting aye; Commissioner Morrison voting no.
