The Committee on Streets, to whom was referred the annexed resolution in favor of permitting the Metropolitan Traction Company to lay a thirty-inch iron pipe for conducting salt water from the Harlem river, through West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, to the premises of said company, northwest corner of Lenox avenue and West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe such permission should be granted. They therefore recommend that the said annexed resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Metropolitan Traction Company to lay a thirty-inch iron pipe for conducting salt water from the Harlem river, through West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, to the premises of said company, situated on the northwest corner of Lenox avenue and West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, as shown on the accompanying diagram, upon payment to the City as compensation for the privilege such amount as may be determined an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, provided the said Metropolitan Traction Company shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the City harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the exercise of the privilege hereby given, during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said pipe, the work to be done at the expense of the company, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned, residents of Harlem, beg to call your attention to the fact that, when arriving here on the New Haven Road (from Boston, etc.) or on the limited express trains of the Hudson River Railroad, we are compelled to pass our very doors and go down to Forty-second street, five miles beyond our homes, and then take a tedious ride back, which not only costs a great deal of time (this return trip taking fully three-quarters of an hour), but also causing the greatest and certainly justified dissatisfaction, this being the only city in the United States, say in the world, where travelers are subjected to such an intolerable imposition, when a two minutes' stop in Harlem would be sufficient to let off such passengers as desire to alight, while baggage could go on to the depot. We think that we are entitled to a prompt relief from the autocratic rule of the Harlem River Railroad, the management of which no doubt forbids the stopping of New Haven trains in Harlem, and most earnestly request the Honorable Board of Aldermen to take such action, which will compel the stopping of all trains, without exception, in Harlem, either One Hundred and Thirty-eighth or One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

For the "construction, care and management of the fire-alarm telegraph system" alone, without reference to the other duties imposed upon the Bureau by section 517½ of the Consolidation Act, enacted in 1892, \$26,945 was allowed for the current year. The estimate for this branch of the Department is the same as the one submitted last year, and amounts to \$11,276 more than was allowed for this year. The increase is entirely for additions to the mechanical force, which are very urgently needed. During the last ten years the number of fires has increased more than sixty per centum, while the appropriation for this branch of the Department has been increased in that time less than twenty per centum. \$400,000 was allowed for "Apparatus, Supplies, etc.," for the current year. The above estimate is therefore \$41,000 more. The principal items of increase are for "Buildings—Repairs and Alterations," about \$15,000; for "General Supplies," \$13,000; "Horses," \$7,000; "Forage," \$5,000; "Hose," \$5,000. This comparison is with the allowance made by the Commissioners for these several items out of the gross appropriation of \$400,000 made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The amount allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the present year was very low, and an inspection of the houses of the Department shows the necessity for the increase during the coming year.

For the item "General Supplies" the increase is required to enable the re-furnishing of a number of company houses which very much need it.

The increase for "Horses" is, as a recent inspection of all the horses of the Department shows, an absolute necessity.

The price of forage has already advanced, and is expected to advance still more, which renders the increase for this purpose necessary.

The additional amount for the item "Hose" is also needed.

(Section 52, New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; chapter 74, Laws of 1884; chapter 292, Laws of 1887; chapters 397 and 408, Laws of 1892.)

By section 79 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the sum to be appropriated for salaries for clerks and other officers of the Board of Aldermen, including the Clerk, is limited to \$25,000. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in 1888, 1889, 1890, 1891 and 1892, specified the officers and fixed their salaries at \$22,100. In making their Final Estimate for 1893, however, they added the sum of \$1,200, to be applied to the payment of the salary of a Stenographer and Typewriter in the office of the Clerk of the Common Council, making the amount \$23,300, which will be ample for the ensuing year.
