### BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

### TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

### MINUTES.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 P. M., July 28, 1898, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

Present-President Haffen, Councilman Hottenroth and Councilman Murray. Minutes of meeting held July 7 last read and adopted.

Webster Avenue, Paving with Vitrified Brick, between Southern Boulevard and Mosholu Parkway.

Petition of Noah C. Rogers and others, was read, and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth,

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that the work be done. Adopted.

East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street, Regulating, Grading, etc., from Jerome Avenue to Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

The following communication was read:

DAVID LEWIS WOODALL, No. 717 TREMONT AVENUE,

"Joseph P. Hennessy, Esq., Secretary, etc., Third avenue and One Hundred and Seventyseventh street:

"DEAR SIR-In relation to grading One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Jerome avenue to Concourse. We are being fixed up so nicely in macadamizing, hardly necessary to urge petition sent in for grading. Think it best to let it take its proper course.

On motion of Councilman Hottenroth, the petition was laid over until further information could be had.

### Metrose Avenue Viaduct.

Petition of H. Stoker was read, and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was'
Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of
Public Improvements that Melrose Avenue Viaduct improvement be extended so as to include the
whole of premises known now as Ward No. 46, in Block (1301) 2391, as indicated on a diagram
submitted by the petitioner and which accompanies this resolution, and that this strip or plot of
land be included in the proceedings already initiated to acquire title to the land necessary for the
Melrose Avenue Viaduct.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street Bridge over Harlem River.

The following preamble and resolution were presented by Councilman Murray and adopted: Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, held on July 6, 1898, it was "Resolved, that a hearing be had after the opinion of the Corporation Counsel is received" relative to the proposed change in the approaches of the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street Bridge; and

Whereas, The opinion of the Corporation Counsel was submitted to the Board of Public Improvements at its meeting on July 13, last, and action taken at the same meeting changing the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the approaches to the bridge aforesaid without

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, hereby respectfully requests the Board of Public Improvements to fix a date for a hearing relative to the proposed change of the approaches at the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street bridge, in accordance with its resolution of July 6, last, and that it rescend, at least for the time being, its resolution of July 13, last, making the proposed changes in question.

Sidewalk in Front of No. 681 East One Hundred and Forty-seventh Street.

Communication dated July 21, 1898, from Commissioner James P. Keating, of the Department of Highways, was read, in reference to alleged defective sidewalk in front of above premises, and was referred to Councilman Hottenroth, committee, to report at next meeting.

Park Avenue, East (Vanderbilt Avenue, East), (Railroad Avenue, East), from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth to One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Street, and from One Hundred and Seventy-seventh to One Hundred and Eighty-first Street, Gas-mains, etc.

Resolution of the North Side Board of Trade was read, and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that the work be done.

Adopted.

The following resolution of the North Side Board of Trade was also read:
Resolved, That the North Side Board of Trade approves of the general design for a street system in the part of the Borough of The Bronx east of the Bronx river, as laid out and shown on maps submitted by Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York.

Resolved, That the Committee on Street Openings and Sewers of the North Side Board of Trade be requested to attend the public hearings to be given by the Board of Public Improvements and urge the adoption of said street system

In view of the fact that the general design above mentioned had not been submitted to the Local Board and that a hearing was proposed to be held by the Board of Public Improvements on Wednesday, August 3, next, the above resolution was placed on file.

### Nicaragua Canal.

President Hassen announced that he was in receipt of a communication from the North Side Board of Trade approving the construction of the Nicaragua Canal and that he thought it advisable for the Local Board to take some action, and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was Resolved, That the Local Board of the Twenty-first District of The City of New York (Borough of The Bronx), hereby recommends to Congress the speedy passage of a measure authorizing the construction of the Nicaragua Canal, the importance of which waterway, aside from its commercial value, has been made so apparent during the present war of the United States with

Resolved, further, That a copy of the above resolution be transmitted to our representatives in Congress

Third Avenue, Asphalt Strips, St. Ann's Avenue to Boston Road. The following communication was received from the Department of Highways and placed on file:

JULY 25, 1898. Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President, Borough of The Bronx: DEAR SIR-With a letter, dated June 24, from your Secretary, I received a copy of a resolu-

tion adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of the Bronx, recommending that asphalt strips be laid on both sides of Third avenue, from St. Ann's avenue to Boston road.

The Deputy Commissioner of Highways for the Borough of The Bronx reports that this is a desirable improvement, but at present there are no funds to pay for it.
