On account of the large attendance of the Regular Troops from Governors Island, and Sailors and Marines from the Brooklyn Navy Yard, the Militia of the National Guard, the Naval Militia, and many other organizations who participate in the annual exercises and parade of the Army and Navy Union on Memorial Sunday, May 30, 1909, at the United States National Cemetery, Jamaica Avenue, Brooklyn, we find that the annual appropriation of seven hundred dollars (\$700), allowed us by the City will not cover the expenses for the proper observance of Memorial Sunday, and Memorial Day in Manhattan, by this organization on account of the increased cost of the movement of troops, decorations, etc.

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith certified copies of five (5) resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, April 16, 1909, authorizing the issues of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, as follows:

\$45,000 for the erection and completion of a new Comfort Station on Riverside Drive, west of the Park Walk and the Grant Tomb, Borough of Manhattan, to replace the present wooden structure.

\$500,000 for the erection and equipment of a new building for the Normal College of The City of New York on the block bounded by Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, Fourth and Lexington avenues, Borough of Manhattan.

1,380,000 for the erection and completion of the Sea View Hospital on Staten Island, Borough of Richmond.

75,000 for furniture and for the equipment of the new Headquarters Building for the Police Department, located at Grand and Centre streets, Borough of Manhattan.

7,500 for the preparation of plans and specifications for the erection of Refuse Destructors, Engineers' Houses, Stables, etc., in the Borough of Richmond.

I also enclose copies of reports of the Comptroller relative thereto, together with forms of ordinances for adoption by the Board of Aldermen to indicate its concurrence therein.

Sir—Hon. Henry Smith, Commissioner, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in communication under date of February 20, 1909, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) for the purpose of building a new comfort station on the Riverside drive west of the park walk and the Grant tomb, Borough of Manhattan, to replace the wooden building now used for said purpose. I would report:

Accompanying the request are blue prints showing plan, elevation and location, also photographs of a dilapidated building now in position.

It is proposed with the amount asked for, if same be provided, to prepare the ground and construct a new comfort station on the location described on the Riverside drive, west of the park walk, a short distance from Grant's Tomb. At the point referred to there now stands an old wooden structure, used as a comfort station, but it is not only inadequate, but is also unsightly and not at all in keeping with the surrounding improvements.

The comfort station which it is proposed to construct, as shown by the plans, is to be granite, Greek-Doric in architectural design; its height to be one story, the top being on a level with the sidewalks on the westerly side of the drive. The top of the station, on a level with the sidewalk, is to be surrounded with monolithic columns, in keeping with the tomb, and is to serve as a shelter house or resting place.

The entire structure, in its construction and character, is to be in full conformity and keeping with the tomb, a very important adjunct of which it will really be. The size of the station is to be 36 feet by 62 feet.

In preparing the ground it will be necessary to excavate and remove about ten thousand (10,000) cubic yards of earth, or other material, to construct suitable stairways, approaches, and to lay out the surrounding park generally in conformity with the changes made necessary by the erection of the building.

Upon inquiry at the Department of Parks, I was informed that an estimate of the actual quantities of work that will be necessary have been made. Plans and specifications, however, have been prepared, and on these a bid for the work, lump sum, was secured, a reputable firm of contractors offering to do all of the work in conformity with the said plans and specifications (plumbing, heating and lighting excepted) for the sum of forty-two thousand seven hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$42,725).

In view of this bid and also considering the amount and character of the work to be done as compared with other stations, I am of the opinion that the amount asked for is not excessive.

A comfort station at the location referred to, in my opinion, is urgently needed, and, when built, the structure and its accompaniments should conform with its surroundings.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) to provide for the erection and completion of a new comfort station on the Riverside drive, west of the park walk and the Grant tomb, Borough of Manhattan, to replace the wooden building now used for said purpose.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—Under date of February 25, 1909, Mr. A. Emerson Palmer, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Normal College of the City of New York, forwarded a resolution of the Board of Trustees of the Normal College to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, asking for an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$500,000, to be applied towards the erection of a new building for the Normal College. I would report:

I have looked into the matter with some care and have conferred with those interested in the proposition and I find that it is proposed to begin the erection of a new Normal College upon the block bounded by Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, Fourth and Lexington avenues, Borough of Manhattan, the block being that upon which the present Normal College and Training School now stand. The present buildings cover less than one-half of the block, and the new building proposed is planned to cover practically the entire block.

The sketches prepared for the new building show that it is to be five story and basement, of limestone, fireproof throughout, and the total estimated cost of the entire building is \$2,000,000. It will contain fifty-five (55) classrooms on each floor, in addition to Principal's room, toilet rooms, etc.

At the present time the Normal College is seriously overcrowded, and the increasing number of applicants each year make it more difficult to provide for the students. At the present time there are in the college eight hundred (800) students; the college preparatory department, eighteen hundred (1,800) students, and in the elementary department, nine hundred (900) students.

The college will graduate this year about one hundred and eighty (180) teachers, practically all of whom will find employment as teachers in the City of New York. I am informed that as to the standing of these Normal College graduates at the present time one-third of the women Principals of Public Schools in this City are graduates of the Normal College.

Furthermore, the present graduates of the Normal College are not sufficient to supply the annual demand for new teachers in the City.

In view of the importance of this question and the present condition of the old buildings on this property, it seems to me that the inauguration of this project is expedient and wise.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$500,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the erection and equipment of a new Normal College on the block bounded by Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, Fourth and Lexington avenues, Borough of Manhattan.

I have examined this proposal with a good deal of care, and have gone over the items therein with the Architects in charge of the work, and I beg to report as follows:

On March 16, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, gave the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities \$200,000 Corporate Stock, for tents, heating plant, etc., for consumptive patients on Staten Island; and on October 29, 1905, the Board made a further appropriation of \$800,000 for the erection of a Tuberculosis Hospital on Staten Island.

The report of this Bureau recommending such an appropriation stated specifically that the amount recommended would provide for four hospital wards, power house and plant, ambulance station, connecting passageways and tunnel, Nurses' Home and dining hall.

Instead of contracting for such a group of buildings which would have provided a complete working hospital, the Commissioner of Charities awarded a contract for six typical pavilions, without heating arrangements or plumbing fixtures, at a cost of \$916,650.

In order therefore to make available for hospital use, the buildings now under construction, it will be necessary to make a further appropriation.

I have gone over the plans of the proposed buildings with the Architect, and in co-operation with him prepared the following list of buildings and structures, together with their equipments, which will provide a complete working unit of the hospital.

George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond, in communication under date of February 24, 1909, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to provide for the construction of two refuse destructors, one at Tottenville and one at Clifton; two engineer's houses at destructor works and for a new stable at Clifton, Borough of Richmond. I would report:

Accompanying the request of President Cromwell is a copy of a report bearing date February 18, 1909, addressed to Mr. Louis L. Trilau, Commissioner of Public Works, by the Superintendent of the Department of Street Cleaning, Borough of Richmond.

In this report, the Superintendent explains the necessity for the construction of the destructor plants and other buildings, stables, etc., required in the scheme of garbage and ashes disposal, as planned and outlined in the said report, to provide means for which the said amount named above is now asked.

It is proposed, according to the report of the Superintendent of the Department of Street Cleaning, Borough of Richmond, to build one refuse destructor serving the Stapleton district to be constructed at the Tumpkins avenue yard, Clifton, Staten Island.

The capacity of this plant to be 90 tons, two units each, 45 tons per 24 hours, the estimated cost of which is as follows:

As regards the necessity or demand for the outlay proposed, I would say: Staten Island is approximately 8 by 14 miles in size and embraces some 57 square miles of territory. The population is about 80,000.

There are but three or four public docks on the water-front of the island and to build dumping basins and keep scows alongside until filled on account of long haul and scant population would prove costly and altogether impracticable. The necessity for separation and extra carts also would tend to make the cost prohibitive.

A plan was considered some years ago of building a crematory at an isolated location near Howland's Hook, but, upon investigation, this plan was also found too costly. The single item of transporting the garbage (by trolley lines) upon calling for bids, resulted in a price of \$1.25 per ton. This did not include the cost of collecting, separating and handling and was deemed altogether too expensive. This project was therefore abandoned.

After long study and experiments, looking to the total destruction of all kinds of refuse and all matter collected by the carts of the Street Cleaning Department, the destructor now in operation at West New Brighton was built, and it is claimed by the officials in charge, has proved highly successful. This destructor, with furnaces 60-ton capacity, now takes care of the New Brighton section or district, i. e., extending from Howland's Hook to St. George, on the north shore of the island.

The Street Cleaning Department, in removing material from the large area included in the remaining sections of the island, has been depending entirely on dumping places at isolated localities where filling was required and where it was far enough removed from habitations to be unobjectionable. These places now, however, it is claimed by the Superintendent of the Street Cleaning Department, are rapidly being filled up, and, in a short time, will be absolutely unobtainable.

The necessity, therefore, of providing some means of disposing of or destroying refuse, garbage, ashes, etc., in the districts referred to in the Borough of Richmond, is apparent.

The destructor at West New Brighton has proved successful, not only from a standpoint of sanitation, but also from that of an economical or expensive method of disposing of mixed refuse.

In view of existing conditions, it is my opinion that actual necessity will compel the taking of steps in the near future, to provide means for the disposal of refuse, garbage, etc., in the districts referred to, in the Borough of Richmond.

The destructor plants proposed are not an experiment, but are to be identical with one now in successful operation. I believe the plan as outlined will prove an advantageous method of disposing of garbage and refuse in the said districts of Staten Island, and that it should be adopted.

The amount asked for, viz.: \$200,000, is not needed at the present time, and will not be until detailed plans, specifications, contract forms, etc., have been prepared.

In the preparation of the said plans, specifications, etc., a considerable amount of work will be involved for which an appropriation in the small sum should be made available. For this purpose, seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500) should be ample.

The construction of additional refuse destructors in the Borough of Richmond should eventually receive favorable consideration, but the appropriation of the amount asked for, two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), may for the present be deferred.

In order, however, that the preparation of plans and specifications for this work may be proceeded with, I recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500) to provide means for the preparation of plans and specifications for the erection of refuse destructors, Engineers' houses, stables, etc., Borough of Richmond.

I would report that in addition to any furniture that can be brought from the present Police Headquarters, it is estimated that the new building will require: 379 chairs, 131 desks, 48 settees, 1 bench, 32 tables, 267 lockers, 5 wardrobes, 80 filing cases, 17 showcases, etc., 2 cabinets, 3,396 square feet of rubber matting, 2 couches, 2 rugs, 8 dozen cuspidor mats, 6 coal scoops, 6 wheelbarrows, 2 work benches and tool closets, 20 beds, 5,002 linear feet shelving, 100 linear feet shelving and lockers, 377 feet of railing, 682 feet of partition, 3 platforms, 50 electric fans, 172 feet of counter, 154 sections of bunk case, 22 bases and 22 tops, 2-ton hoist and chain, 1 blackboard, 600 square yards cross matting, 216 window awnings, 1,100 yards wilton carpet, red cedar moth proof room for furs, 9 feet by 14 feet; closet under bunk rack for stationery, cage for assistant bookkeeper, 321 windows fitted with safety window cleaning devices and six belts; 7,335 yards battleship linoleum; installation of electric and mechanical appliances for indicating and furnishing record of pistol practice; with safety devices, automatic indicating targets, etc., for two alleys, complete; installation of electric cable conduits; furnishing gymnasium, with equipments; installation of interior telephone system; furnishing room for meeting of Commissioner, Deputy Commissioners and Inspectors; electrically lighted screen arrangement to surround the detectives in the shadow, while the criminals are exposed in a strong light. Miscellaneous: Trucks, stepladders, coolers, brushes, cocoa mats, waste baskets, mirrors, lumber for shelving and step covers, installation of electrical time system, etc.

Seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) is not too much to expend for the above furniture and equipment.

Sir—In regard to a communication presented in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Secretary of the Board of Health on March 19, 1909, transmitting copy of resolution adopted by said Board of Health on March 11, 1909, requesting an appropriation of \$11,000 to defray necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health for the care and treatment of persons exposed to danger from infectious diseases in the employment of additional help at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville, which matter was referred to you for consideration and report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

Dr. Herman M. Biggs, General Medical Officer, stated to your examiner that owing to the steady growth of the Sanatorium the additional help asked for was necessary to administer the institution. On January 1, 1908, with a census of 100 pa-

tients in the Sanatorium, three hospital physicians were employed to care for inmates, and the same number were employed in 1907, with a smaller census. No increase in the staff was allowed for in the Budget for 1909. The number of beds to accommodate patients on April 5, 1909, was 218. Within six weeks 89 additional beds will be available, and by July 1 40 more will be ready, or a total on that date of 347 beds for patients. There are 30 women and 20 men now on the waiting list at the Health Department headquarters. These will be accommodated as rapidly as sheds are finished.

Women were admitted to the Sanatorium this year. A separate unit for women is being constructed. So far 25 have been housed at the institution, and Dr. Biggs states that before July 1 there will be accommodations for 100 women. The proportion of women applicants for treatment has largely increased since it has been learned that rooms will be found for them at the Sanatorium.

There are only 16 non-tubercular cases among the employees. The patients are utilized in the work wherever possible. Cases of incipient tuberculosis only are received at the Sanatorium.

At present one Hospital Physician receives \$1,800 per annum, and two Physicians \$1,200 each. One Hospital Physician at \$1,800, to have charge of the women, is requested, and two at \$1,200, to assist in the treatment of the largely increased number of patients. The total annual salaries of the other added help requested amount to \$11,100.

The total amount allowed in the Budget for 1909 for salaries and wages at the Sanatorium was \$48,276. The annual salaries for additional employees requested amount to \$15,300, an increase of nearly 32 per cent. over the Budget allowance. Of the \$42,276 allowed in the Budget, \$25,200 was for Laborers. As the Department is doing its own construction work, a large force of laborers is required on the grounds.

While recognizing the steady growth of the Sanatorium, an increase of nearly 32 per cent. over the Budget allowance for 1909 appears to be unreasonable, and I therefore recommend that the request of the Board of Health be granted to the following extent:

"In any year prior to the date of the certificate of the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen of the aggregate amount of the Budget for such year, the amount thereof shall be added to such final estimate, and included in the tax levy in such year."

Consequently, the allowance of \$7,600 in Revenue Bonds in this case would be chargeable to the tax levy of 1909.

Dear Sir—I respectfully beg to transmit herewith request for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to an amount of ten thousand dollars for the purpose of constructing a wooden box drain through the low lying ground, and a 24-inch pipe sewer through the upland, in Whitestone, Third Ward, Borough of Queens.

In support of this request I respectfully beg to transmit herewith copy of a report of our Engineer of Sewers; also copy of a presentment returned by the Queens County Grand Jury in June, 1908.

Presentment of the Grand Jury of the County of Queens, June, 1908. Term of the County Court, in Relation to a Certain Sewer in the Former Village of Whitestone, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens.

June 29, 1908.

The Grand Jury of the County of Queens, in attendance upon the June, 1908. Term of the County Court, do hereby present and report:

That, acting upon numerous complaints from taxpayers and improvements associations within the lines of the former Village of Whitestone, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, as to a certain public nuisance, long existing in such locality, and made the subject of this presentment, we find:

That the main sewer in Whitestone used by the residents in the northwest section empties into a small pool or basin where Fifth avenue is intersected by the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company, that from this point to Powells Cove, that inlet of the East River which is the final depository of the sewerage and sewerage water which flows through said main sewer, a distance of thirty-three hundred feet, the noxious, filthy and offensive sewer refuse passes through an open ditch or drain, created by nature, shallow and winding in its course.

That from evidence adduced before this body it is clearly apparent that the physical conditions prove and show the utter inadequacy of this ditch to more than partially carry this refuse material to the sea, and that since the existence of this condition, a long period of years, the sewage has overflowed and continues to overflow the banks of this drain and is distributed broadcast throughout the surrounding property, accumulating in large quantities and in a myriad of places, and that from this festering, stagnant and decaying material there arise at all times noxious gases and offensive odors, creating thereby a continuing public nuisance, interfering with the repose and comfort of a large number of families in the immediate vicinity, and endangering hourly their lives and health.

The vested property rights have been unjustly decreased in value and use to a point where they are menaced with a prospect of becoming worthless in the future, in a locality which, with the abatement of this nuisance, would by natural location and circumstances be a flourishing and healthful community.

That the testimony of the physicians in this locality, reputable men and significant of all the details, heard by this body, and representatives of the Department of Health of The City of New York, it is clear that the health and lives of the residents in the immediate vicinity of this ditch have from its existence been not only menaced but actually injured, and such testimony further shows that this spot is a veritable nest of disease germs, breeding pestilence and sickness through the community and daily imperiling the health and lives of a large number of citizens in this section, which by natural growth must, irrespective of this impending evil, become in the near future a closely built up section of the County, or comparatively so.

That the Department of Health of the Board of Health of The City of New York have continually complained of the conditions in connection with the existence of this disease-breeding spot, and long since declared it to be, in their judgment, a public nuisance and an actual injury and constant menace to the health and lives of the residents in the immediate section.

Further evidence shows that the only remedy to effectually destroy this public nuisance is the immediate construction of a sewer main, beginning at the source of the ditch or drain and continuing along the lines projected by the Sewer Department of The City of New York, which provides for a continuation of the old sewer where it first empties into this ditch direct to the sea.

That the Department of Sewers of The City of New York has long ago recognized the necessity of such a sewer and has, past and present, striven to do all, with the power at their command, looking to the abatement of this nuisance, to the end that plans have already been drawn and the lines of the proposed sewer projected and permanently settled. That the apparent failure to complete the project and complete this sewer is due to the fact that the necessary appropriation by The City of New York cannot be had to carry out and consummate this urgent and important work.

That, in conclusion, we believe the existence of this ditch a public nuisance, unjustly damaging the property rights of a large body of taxpayers and citizens, daily injuring their vested interests, and, above all, forcing them to live under a condition to which in common justice they should no longer be subjected, victims as they are of a dangerous public nuisance, which is not a theoretical but an actual and ever-present injury and menace to the lives and health of themselves and their families.

We heartily recommend and vigorously urge the immediate construction of the proposed sewer as laid down on the maps of The City of New York, as the only relief by which this dangerous and detrimental nuisance may be absolutely eliminated and this menace and injury to the health and lives of a considerable portion of our citizen body swept away.

Dear Sir—Replying to your request to prepare a statement as to the existing condition of the open drain which acts as an outlet for the sewerage system of part of Whitestone, Third Ward, I most respectfully report that under the old Drainage Commission of the Town of Flushing sewers were constructed and discharged into a brook running to Powells Cove. These sewers were built between 1870 and 1890, and since then many other sewers have been constructed discharging into this brook, until now it is the outlet for about two-thirds of the sewage of Whitestone.

Immediately after consolidation complaints began to come in about the condition of this outlet from citizens, physicians, the Board of Health, etc. Nothing has been done to remedy this condition, although last year plans were prepared to construct a sewer partly along the line of this ditch and partly through high ground, but as this sewer discharged into Powells Cove and was only temporary in character it was disapproved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as being too small to be of a permanent character, and besides they did not deem it advisable to discharge sewage into the shallow waters of the bay. The estimated cost of this sewer was \$35,000.

Plans have been prepared for the construction of a sewer in Fifth avenue, from the open ditch to the East River, but have not yet been approved. This sewer is designed to receive the sewage from an area of 820 acres, but, owing to the time required in obtaining title to streets, awarding contracts and in construction, this sewer will probably not be in operation for at least four years.

In June of 1907 a complaint was received from the property owners along the line of this ditch requesting that immediate action be taken in regard to this matter, as they were afraid that disease or ill health might result therefrom. It was at this time that surveys were made and plans prepared to take care of this sewage. This plan was submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval in May of 1908, but was disapproved, as stated above.

In June of 1908 the Grand Jury of the County of Queens returned a presentment stating "It is clear that the health and lives of the residents in the immediate vicinity of this ditch have, from its existence, been not only menaced but actually injured, and such testimony further shows that this spot is a veritable nest of disease germs, breeding pestilence and sickness through the community, etc."

Herewith please find a copy of this presentment.

A complaint was received from the Board of Health in June of 1908 stating "The entire ditch is in a very filthy condition, and sewage matter clinging to the stones, the odor of which is most unbearable and a menace to the health of the residents of this community." Herewith please find a copy of the report on this complaint (letter of June 16, 1908).

It is possible to remedy this condition by constructing a wooden box drain through the low lying ground and a 24-inch pipe sewer through the upland. This construction is necessarily very temporary in character, but will last until such time as the main trunk sewer in Fifth avenue can be built.

The estimated cost of this box drain and pipe sewer is \$10,000.

Dear Sir—Replying to the complaint received from the Board of Health referring to the open ditch which acts as the outlet for a large part of the sewers of the old Village of Whitestone, Third Ward, I will state that this open sewer was authorized by the Sewerage Commission of the old Town of Flushing.

Numerous complaints have been received by this Department ever since consolidation, and the Department has done and is doing all in its power to keep the ditch free from obstructions, so that the flow would be unobstructed and there would be as little deposit as possible. While recognizing fully the seriousness of this condition and the justice of the complaints, owing to the fact that no one would submit a petition for the construction of a sewer in this place, it was impossible to relieve this condition, as the Department could not proceed on its own initiative.

Early in the present year the Malla Land Company and others submitted a petition for the construction of a sewer in the Boulevard, Fourth avenue, Twenty-first street, etc., for the purpose of closing this ditch and doing away with this nuisance. This petition was reported upon favorably by this Department, and was approved by the Local Board at its regular meeting on June 3, 1906.

If favorable action be taken on this matter by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment there is no reason why this sewer cannot be constructed during the present summer.

Dear Sirs—Pursuant to resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment directing that a copy of the report of the Department of Finance be sent to each Department affected, in the matter of prevailing rate of pay for Blacksmiths, wherein it is recommended that the Departments establish the rate of \$4.50 per day for Blacksmiths, and apply to your Honorable Board for Revenue Bonds for a sum to accomplish this purpose, application is hereby made for the sum of three hundred and four dollars and fifty cents (\$304.50), Revenue Bonds, for this purpose.

This Department has three Blacksmiths employed, who are now receiving \$4 per day, prescribed in the Budget, and the sum of \$304.50 is necessary from May first for the balance of the year to increase the rate of pay to \$4.50 per day.

I inclose herewith a copy of the report of the Finance Department wherein it is stated that the failure to provide in the Budget for 1909 for the payment of \$4.50 per day to Blacksmiths was apparently an oversight, and recommending that Departments apply, as above: the application of this Department is, therefore, submitted.

Sir—In regard to communications presented in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from various Departments relative to the number of Blacksmiths employed therein, and the amount required for the year 1909, to pay the prevailing rate of wages, \$4.50 per diem, which matter was referred to you for consideration and report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The Commissioner of Public Charities states that there are five men employed in that Department as Blacksmiths, and that it would require the sum of \$6,435 to pay them \$4.50 per diem, for 286 working days, during the year 1909.

Mr. William L. Parker, business agent of Defender Union No. 1, American Brotherhood of Blacksmiths, stated to your Examiner that his organization is quite familiar with the facts that employees designated as "Hospital Helpers" are acting in the capacity of Blacksmiths; that there may be no regular employment for five competent Blacksmiths in the Department of Public Charities; that "Hospital Helpers" do many trifling jobs that might not require the services of a qualified journeyman; but that the Blacksmiths ask recognition to the extent that at least one regular Blacksmith be provided for in the Department of Public Charities, which would call for the expenditure of \$4,287 for the full year, instead of \$6,435 for five Blacksmiths, as stated by the Commissioner.

I recommend that one Blacksmith at \$4.50 per diem be allowed for in the Department of Public Charities, and that the Commissioner be requested to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the establishment of the position.

The following Departments responded to the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for information as to the number of Blacksmiths employed therein and the amounts required to pay at the rate of \$4.50 per diem:

In a report to you from this Bureau, dated February 15, 1909, these facts were related:

That the scale of wages of Blacksmiths of \$4.50 per diem went into effect on July 20, 1908, the date of payroll on which salary estimates for 1909 were based by Departments.

That figures presented by the Chief Statistician of the State Department of Labor showed that the majority of organized blacksmiths received \$4.50 per diem, or more.

That it was the intention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in the preparation of the Budget for 1909, to provide for the payment of the prevailing rate of wages to mechanics in City employ.

That the failure to provide in the Budget for 1909 for the payment of \$4.50 a day to Blacksmiths was apparently an oversight.

The following sums would be required by the different Departments to provide for the increase of the pay of Blacksmiths to \$4.50 per diem, for nine months of the year, beginning April 1, 1909:

It will be noted that the amount required for the proposed increase of wages of Blacksmiths to \$4.50 per diem in some of the Departments is small. Your Examiner has also learned that provision for the increase might be made by transfer from one fund to another.

As \$4.50 per diem seems to be the prevailing rate of wages for Blacksmiths, I recommend that provision be made for the payment of said rate to those employed in City Departments; that means be provided to meet deficiencies in Budget allowances to the various Departments, either by the transfer of funds or the authorization of the issue of Revenue Bonds to replenish said Budget allowances for 1909, the additional amounts so allowed to be applied to the payment of increases of salaries of Blacksmiths to \$4.50 per diem, for the remaining nine months of 1909, beginning April 1.

I further recommend that the heads of said Departments be requested to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the necessary transfer of funds wherever possible, or for the authorization of the issue of Revenue Bonds to the extent that may be required for the payment of Blacksmiths in their employ at the rate of \$4.50 per diem, for nine months of the year 1909, beginning April 1.

Sir—I have the honor to request that your Honorable Board grant this Department authority to purchase, by contract, without public letting, one gasoline fire engine, horse drawn, the cost thereof not to exceed \$5,000. Its use will result in quite a saving as compared with the cost of the maintenance of a steam fire engine. With the latter it is necessary to keep about 20 pounds of steam in boiler at all times, and besides the consumption of canal coal while working at fires, excelsior and kindling wood are also used every time the apparatus responds to a station. In the case of the gasoline engine, which will do the same work as the steam fire engine, the cost of the maintenance will be very small as fuel (gasoline) will be used only when working at fires. Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held April 14, 1909, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Complaint has heretofore been made to this department that a certain sewer located on Amstel boulevard (which was formerly Amstel Canal), and which receives the sewage from Arverne, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, is obstructed, defective and not properly graded and does not freely carry off the sewage discharged into it; and

Whereas, The Bureau of Sewers for the Borough of Queens has refused and neglected to remedy the defects existing in said sewer on the ground that the same has not been constructed in compliance with the plans submitted and the said bureau has refused to accept the said sewer as the same has been laid in a faulty manner; and

Whereas, Complaint has been made by a committee of citizens of Arverne in regard to the unsanitary conditions existing by reason of said defective sewer which is laid through a public place or street; and the State Commissioner of Health has caused an examination to be made, and found conditions to exist as alleged in the complaint, and characterizes the same as "deplorable"; and

Whereas, This Board has caused an inspection and examination of the said sewer to be made, and find and sewage flood the streets and highways of Arverne in the Borough of Queens aforesaid by reason of the defective condition of the said sewer, and in the opinion of this board the residents of said place are in the presence of great and imminent peril, and pestilence may result from the sewage which covers the streets and avenues at Arverne aforesaid by reason of the defective conditions existing throughout the entire length of the said sewer aforesaid; now, be it

Resolved, That this Board having taken and filed among its records what it regards as sufficient evidence to authorize its declaration of great and imminent peril by reason of the defects existing in the said sewer and the discharge of sewage matter therefrom into the streets and avenues of Arverne in the Borough of Queens aforesaid; that the public safety and health of the residents of Arverne in the Borough of Queens demand that said sewer be repaired and the defects therein be remedied at once for the preservation of the public health and to avert impending disease and pestilence; and it is further hereby

Resolved, That the work aforesaid of making the necessary repairs to said sewer be proceeded with by and under the direction of this Board, and that the Board of Aldermen be and are hereby requested to exempt any contract for such work from public letting.

Sir—Under a recent contract held by James Shewan & Sons, for repairing the Municipal Ferry boats as such repairs became necessary, one of the Staten Island ferryboats, the "Manhattan," was delivered to the contractors. In the progress of the work on this boat it was found that the moneys authorized to be expended under the contract would not permit the completion of all the repairs needed; and the boat is now in such condition that it cannot be used, owing to repairs needed to two of her boilers.

One of the boats of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, the "Castleton," was damaged on the 14th inst., necessitating her temporary withdrawal from service for a short time; and another ferryboat, the "Stapleton," is undergoing repairs. This leaves the Department without a spare boat on either the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry or the Staten Island Ferry.

To complete the repairs to the boilers on the ferryboat "Manhattan" will involve an expenditure in the neighborhood of \$1,500, and I respectfully request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen, authorizing me to issue an order for this additional work, at an estimated cost of \$1,500, otherwise than by contract after advertisement, in order that the boat may be placed in commission with the least possible delay.

Proposed Ordinance Establishing a Scale of Water Rents and Charges.

AN ORDINANCE amending section 282 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York regulating rents and extra charges to be collected by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 282 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

The minimum annual rents, meter rates and extra charges to be collected by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall be as follows, to wit:

All rear buildings on any lot or lots, with front buildings thereon, shall pay an annual frontage rate of \$5 for each 25 feet front, or fraction thereof, but this provision shall not apply to buildings erected on corner lots, each of which buildings shall pay the regular rates as stated in the foregoing subdivisions.

The apportionment of the regular frontage rates upon dwelling houses is on the basis that but one family is to occupy same, and for each additional family or apartment one dollar per year shall be charged.

Bath tubs in dwelling houses shall be charged at \$3 per annum; in bathing establishments at \$5 per annum; combination stationary wash tubs capable of use for bathing shall be charged the same as bath tubs. One bath tub to each house supplied free of charge.

Water Closets and Urinals—To each building on a lot one water closet is allowed without charge. Each additional water closet will be charged two dollars (\$2) per annum. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars (\$2) for each seat per annum, whether in a building or any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars (\$2) per annum each.

Liquor and lager beer saloons shall be charged an annual rate of \$10 each. An additional charge of \$5 per annum shall be made for each faucet or wash box.

Stalls—For each stall, \$1 per annum.

Dining saloons shall be charged an annual rate of \$5.

Fish stands shall be charged \$5 per annum each.

Laundries shall be charged an annual rate of \$8.

Barber shops shall be charged \$5 per annum; and an additional charge of \$5 per annum for each public bath tub therein.

Bakeries shall be charged \$3 per annum.

Soda or mineral water fountains shall be charged \$5 per annum each.

Wash Drills or Caisson Sinking—Water supplied at the rate of 10 cents per hundred cubic feet.

Baptistries shall be charged at the rate of \$10 per annum.

Florists shall be charged at the rate of \$5 per annum.

Milk depots (for the purposes of washing cans) shall be charged \$7.50 per annum.

Bottling establishments shall be charged \$10 per annum.

Photograph galleries shall be charged at the rate of \$5 per annum.

Horse Troughs—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, \$20 per annum, each trough to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

Fire-risks (not metered) shall be charged \$50 each per annum.

For wetting down buildings in course of demolition a charge shall be made equal to one-fourth of the annual frontage rate charged against each building.

Building Purposes—For each 1,000 bricks laid, or for stone work to be measured as bricks, 10 cents per thousand. For plastering, 40 cents per one hundred square yards, openings not included. For concreting, 5 cents per cubic yard. Fire-proofing or outside terra cotta and terra cotta partitions and floor arches, 20 cents per hundred cubic feet.

All steam plants (excepting buildings in which are located house-heating boilers for steam or hot water supply only) having unmetered supply of water and which are not provided for elsewhere in this schedule, will be charged for water according to the rated boiler horse-power as follows:

For each boiler horse-power up to and including ten (10) a charge will be made at the rate of ten dollars (\$10) per annum.

For boiler horse-power above ten (10) and up to and including fifteen (15) a charge will be made of one hundred dollars (\$100) per annum plus seven dollars and a half (\$7.50) per annum for each horse-power above ten (10) and up to and including fifteen (15).

For boiler horse-power above fifteen (15) a charge will be made of one hundred and thirty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$137.50) per annum plus five dollars (\$5) per annum for each horse-power above fifteen (15).

In estimating the boiler horse-power the heating surface of the boiler will be the measure employed. The heating surface will be defined as that surface, or those surfaces, of the walls of the boiler, or whatever form, which are in contact with water on one side and fire or heated gases on the other. Where these walls are curved or of irregular form, the larger area will be the one employed.

The following units will be used in estimating boiler horse-power from heating surface:

Gasoline and all other internal combustion engines on boats, using unmetered cooling water and wasting same in part, or in whole, will be charged for at the rate of eight dollars (\$8) per brake horse-power per annum.

In estimating the brake horse-power the maximum actual output of the engine will be taken.

Special Rates for Hoisting and Dredging Machines, etc.

The rates for hoisting, dredging, erecting, hauling, pile driving, derricks, diggers, conveyors and all floating or portable steam plants, except boats or tugs, will be as follows:

Up to and including 25 horse-power, \$5 per month.
Up to and including 50 horse-power, \$8 per month.
Up to and including 75 horse-power, \$12 per month.
Up to and including 100 horse-power, \$15 per month.
Above 100, at the rate of 15 cents per horse-power per month.

Oyster boats per annum, \$20.
Water supplied to barges and canal boats for domestic use, per annum, \$5, and an additional charge of \$5 per annum where water is furnished for stable purposes.

Steam lighters and tug boats, in addition to paying the regular fixed charges, shall pay an extra charge of \$100 per annum when engaged or employed in furnishing water in the testing of boilers in other boats.

Water boats supplying shipping shall be charged by tank capacity, as follows:

Dear Sir—I would respectfully suggest that, pursuant to the provisions of section 188 of the Charter of The City of New York, your Honorable Board will request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$5,000 to enable me to carry out the provisions of chapter 90 of the Laws of 1902. By section 488 of the Code of Criminal Procedure the duty of executing the judgments of the Court of Special Sessions of the First Division of The City of New York devolves upon the Sheriff of New York County and the creation of an additional part of this Court made it necessary for me to appoint six Special Deputy Sheriffs on April 5, 1909, to serve until November 30, 1909. The duties of these Special Deputy Sheriffs will be to take the prisoners from the Court Rooms at the corner of Second Avenue and First Street to the City Prison or the Penitentiary, and in other cases, where the prisoners are remanded for sentence, to re-transport them back to the Court for judgment.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. That sections 317 and 318 of chapter 7, title 2, article 3 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York be and they hereby are rescinded and repealed, and that the following new sections 317 and 318 be substituted therefor:

Sec. 317. No hackney coach, carriage or cab which shall be specially licensed by virtue of the provisions of this ordinance shall make use or come upon any stand that is now or may be hereafter designated as a hackney coach stand, or at any other place in The City of New York, except in front of or adjacent to any hotel or hotels, or any other building where there is necessity therefor which may be designated by the Mayor, and which may be used as a stand, with the approval and consent of the persons occupying the premises in front of which said coaches, carriages or cabs are to be permitted and allowed by the authority of the Mayor, as aforesaid, provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit nor take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of the guests of said hotel or hotels, or the occupants of said other buildings.

Sec. 318. The owners of hacks specially licensed shall in addition to the lawful fees hereinbefore provided, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "Public Hacks and Hackmen."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Title 2, subdivision 3, section 317, is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. Section 318 of the same title and subdivision is hereby re-enacted and the section number in the Code of Ordinances changed to 317, and said section 318 substituted for section 317.

Sec. 3. New section 318. The owners of hacks specially licensed shall, in addition to the lawful fees hereinbefore provided, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I herewith call your attention to that part of the Code of Ordinances which deals with the licensing of special hacks, and recommend that the subject be taken up by you to the end that any seeming omissions or contradictions may be corrected by the passage of an amendment to the ordinances.

On May 22, 1899, an ordinance was adopted, entitled "A general ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York."

Under the heading "Public Hacks and Hackmen" it was provided:

"Sec. 12. None but licensed hacks shall use the designated public hack stands in the city. The owner of any hack not intended to use the public stands and having the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises, in the discretion of the Mayor or the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, may be specially licensed and permitted to use temporarily a portion of the street in front of said premises as a stand, and shall be confined to carrying passengers from said premises."

"Sec. 13. The owners of hacks specially licensed shall in addition to the lawful fees hereinbefore provided, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand."

It will thus be seen that provision was made for the licensing of a special hack stand in front of private premises and imposing a license fee of \$25 for each hack allowed the special hack stand.

On April 25, 1905, there was introduced at a meeting of the Board a proposed ordinance, entitled "An ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen." Sections 2 and 3 of the proposed ordinance were identical with sections 12 and 13 of the general ordinance of May 22, 1899. The resolution was referred to the Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, which made the following report on October 31, 1905 (page 225), wherein sections 2 and 3 of the proposed ordinance were continued as identical with sections 12 and 13 of the general ordinance of May 22, 1899. In the minutes of the proceeding of the Board of Aldermen of said date, October 31, 1905 (page 230), it was stated that the report was ordered on file. Then followed the statement:

"Reports of Standing Committees Resumed."

"Report of Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers."

"The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to which was referred on October 17, 1905 (Minutes, page 127), the annexed ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen, respectfully report:

"That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted, with the following amendment: Substitute for section 3, Article 1, the words:

"Sec. 3. No hackney coach, carriage or cab, which shall be specially licensed by virtue of the provisions of this ordinance, shall make use or come upon any stand that is now or may be hereafter designated as a hackney coach stand, or at any other place in The City of New York, except in front of or adjacent to any hotel or hotels, or any other building where there is necessity therefor which may be designated by the Mayor, and which may be used as a stand, with the approval and consent of the persons occupying the premises in front of which said coaches, carriages or cabs are to be permitted and allowed by the authority of the Mayor, as aforesaid, provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit nor take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of the guests of said hotel or hotels, or the occupants of said other buildings."

The Board accepted said later report and adopted the ordinance.

An examination of the whole subject clearly shows that a clerical error was made in the report. It recommended a substitute for section 3 of the proposed ordinance before the Board, while it manifestly appears that it was intended to recommend a substitute for section 2 of the proposed ordinance. The proposed substitute concerned the subject covered by section 2.

In the establishment of a private hack stand, permission of the owner or lessee of the premises was essential; the substitute provided only for the permission of the persons occupying the premises. Section 2 permitted only the use temporarily; the substitute eliminated such restriction. Section 2 provided that the special licensed hack shall be confined to carrying passengers from said premises, while the substitute made other and different provision and provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit or take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of said guests of hotel or hotels.

The ordinance as printed in approved proceedings, November 6, 1905, contains these two inconsistent provisions (page 575). The Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, approved November 8, 1906, compiled by the Committee on Codification of Ordinances of the Board of Aldermen in chapter 7, title 2, the granting and regulation of licenses, article 3, special regulations and rates, repeated the same error in sections 317 and 318 which are identical with the language of sections 2 and 3 of the ordinance of November 6, 1905.

I, therefore, recommend the passage of an ordinance whereby the provisions of section 318 of the present Code of Ordinances be substituted for those of section 317, and that the original provisions of section 13 of the general ordinance of May 22, 1899, providing for a license fee of \$25 for each hack be substituted for the present provisions of section 318 of the Code of Ordinances.

That it believes the proposed ordinance would inevitably expose the city to actions for damages in cases where alleged offenders might be discharged by the courts.

and that the practical confiscation of personal property during more or less lengthened periods is inadvisable.

It therefore recommends that the said proposed ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 475 of the Code of Ordinances relative to penalties for violations of the Rules of the Road.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 475.

Section 1. Penalties for Violations.—Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or by competent testimony, may be fined for such offense any sum not less than one dollar and not exceeding ten dollars, and in default of payment of such fine, may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same is paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days. If the person arrested is the owner or driver of an automobile or motor driven vehicle and the charge is for exceeding the speed limit, the automobile or motor vehicle shall be detained in the corporation yards from the time of the arrest until the discharge or conviction of the accused.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of Committee on Police—

No. 1456.

The Committee on Police, to which was referred, on December 8, 1908 (Minutes, page 1460), the annexed resolution concurring with findings of the Kings County Grand Jury in opposition to centralization of the police system, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it agrees with the conclusions and recommendations of said Grand Jury of Kings County, and asks the Board of Aldermen to submit to the Legislature of the State of New York for consideration and adoption the herewith proposed amendment to the Greater New York Charter, which, in the opinion of the committee, will remedy the evils complained of:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby joins in the findings of the Kings County Grand Jury respecting the police situation, and the maintenance of a Police Headquarters in the Borough of Brooklyn, copy of which findings are herewith appended:

Proposes to Deny Brooklyn Efficient Police Service.

"In our opinion, the Police Commissioner of Greater New York intends to centralize police powers at the Manhattan headquarters to the extent that the Borough of Brooklyn will be without an efficient police service. We seriously question the wisdom of his action along this line. We believe that proper police protection should not be sacrificed for the sake of economy.

"In our judgment—and after due deliberation, based upon personal observations and investigations—there is urgent need for a restoration of full police powers at Brooklyn, in order to provide for an efficient police service for the Borough's population of nearly a million and a half of people. We therefore recommend:

"First—That a deputy police commissioner shall be placed in charge of Brooklyn police headquarters, who shall preside at all times over all police matters affecting this borough. He should have complete administrative powers and absolute jurisdiction, subject to review by the Police Commissioner.

"Second—That the premises on State street at present leased and used as an alleged police headquarters are inadequate and unfit for such purposes, and we recommend that provisions be promptly made for the purchase of a site and the erection of a suitable building for all purposes. This can be done in time for removal, and before the present lease expires.

"Third—That a person charged with crime, and held for trial, shall not be photographed for police purposes, nor shall the Bertillon system of measurement, etc., be applied at Police Headquarters until a conviction has been secured. Thus the discharged persons will not suffer an unwarranted humiliation, nor will the keeping of records annoy or hinder complete vindication of the accused.

"Fourth—That a room be set aside at Police Headquarters for newspaper reporters as heretofore. Such a room is provided at the County Court House. In this manner the publicity of police work is encouraged and the people of Brooklyn are advised of the police situation at all times.

"Fifth—We recommend that a copy of this presentment be forwarded to his Honor the Mayor. Also that a copy of same be forwarded to the Charter Revision Committee."

An Act to amend section two hundred and seventy of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter four hundred and sixty-six of the Laws of nineteen hundred and six, and the acts amendatory thereto, relating to the police department.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Chapter two hundred and seventy of the Greater New York Charter is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 270. The head of the police department shall be called the police commissioner, who shall be appointed by the mayor, and shall, unless sooner removed, hold office for the term of five years, and until his successor shall be appointed and has qualified. The said commissioner may, whenever, in the judgment of the mayor of said city or the governor, the public interests shall so require, be removed from office by either, and shall be ineligible for reappointment thereto. The successors in office of the said commissioner shall also be appointed by the mayor of the city within ten days after any vacancy shall occur, and shall be removed by either the mayor or governor whenever the public interests so require. The salary of said police commissioner shall be seventy-five hundred dollars a year. The said commissioner shall have the power to appoint, from the citizens of the United States and residents of the said city, and at pleasure remove, three deputies, to be known as first deputy commissioner, second deputy commissioner and third deputy commissioner. The first deputy commissioner shall, during the absence or disability of the commissioner, possess all the powers and perform all the duties of the commissioner except the power of making appointments and transfers. In the absence or disability of both the commissioner and the first deputy commissioner, the second deputy commissioner shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of the commissioner except the power of making appointments and transfers. In the absence or disability of the commissioner, the first deputy commissioner and the second deputy commissioner, the third deputy commissioner shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of the commissioner

except the power of making appointments and transfers. In addition to the main headquarters of the police department, which shall be located in the borough of Manhattan, the police commissioner shall maintain a headquarters in the borough of Brooklyn in charge of a deputy police commissioner, and, in his discretion, may maintain a headquarters in the borough of The Bronx, the borough of Queens and the borough of Richmond, or either of them. The commissioner shall define the duties of the deputy commissioners, and may delegate to either of them any of his powers except the power of making appointments and transfers. The salary of each of such deputy commissioners shall be four thousand dollars a year. The comptroller shall, without the concurrence or approval of any other officer, board or department, raise the said salary of the third deputy commissioner by the issue of special revenue bonds as may be required to pay said salary of the said deputy commissioners during the current year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO EXAMINE THE CONDITION OF THE NEW YORK FIRE DEPARTMENT RELIEF FUND.

New York, March 15, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—The undersigned, having been appointed an Auditing Committee by your Honor, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 8, section 789, title 5, chapter 15 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901 (the Greater New York Charter), to examine the condition of the New York Fire Department Relief Fund and to audit the account of Hon. Nicholas J. Hayes, Fire Commissioner and Trustee of said fund, beg leave to submit the following report, viz:

We have examined the books, papers, vouchers, checks, receipts, accounts and all other data relating to the receipts and disbursements of all moneys of said fund for the year 1908, and have carefully tabulated same and find that the accounts of receipts, disbursements and balance on hand, as set forth by the said Trustee in his Annual Report of the New York Fire Department Relief Fund for the year 1908, is substantially true and correct, and in conformity with the receipts, disbursements and balance on hand, as set forth and shown by the books and accounts of said fund in the possession of said Trustee in the headquarters of the Fire Department of The City of New York and examined by your Committee.

We have examined and find the Bonds and Corporate Stock, as set forth and described in Schedule "A" of the report of the Trustee to be correct and on deposit in the safe deposit vaults of the Garfield Safe Deposit Company, northeast corner of Twenty-third street and Sixth avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

We have examined and find the real estate bonds and mortgages, as set forth and described in Schedule "B" of the report of the Trustee, to be correct, in the possession of the Trustee, and in the safe of the Fire Department, in the headquarters of that Department.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, held at the Commission's Offices, No. 259 Broadway, on Wednesday, March 17, 1909, at 10 a. m.

Present—President Frank L. Polk and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Arthur J. O'Keefe.

The President, Mr. Frank L. Polk, presided.

Shallow, Esq., Associate City Superintendent, Board of Education, also appeared and requested that the title "Laundryman" be included in the non-competitive class. Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, addressed the Commission, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

T. Byrne, No. 350 Fulton street, Brooklyn, and inform them that their names had been dropped from the roster of the Commission, their services as Examiners (except class) being no longer required.

On motion, it was
Resolved, That the appointment of Miss Maud March, of Columbia University, as an Expert Examiner to conduct the physical examination of candidates for the position of Police Matron, at a compensation of ten dollars (\$10) a day while employed be and the same hereby is approved.

The President, to whom arithmetic papers Nos. 460 and 461 in the examination for Clerk, Board of Water Supply, had been referred, recommended that the candidates be marked not qualified and that they be called upon on the completion of the examination for an explanation as to how their answers came to be identical. The recommendation was adopted.

The President, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, recommended that John De Martino, No. 56 Van Brunt street, Brooklyn, candidate for Patrolman, be permitted to correct the date of birth given in his application to correspond with that in the baptismal certificate furnished. The recommendation was adopted.

The President, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, recommended that the request of Thomas E. Loughman, No. 102 East One Hundred and Seventh street, New York City, candidate for Third Grade Clerk, for permission to correct the date of birth appearing in his application to conform to the baptismal certificate furnished be granted. The recommendation was adopted.

On the recommendation of the President, to whom the matter had been referred for consideration, the request of Joseph L. Rien that his name be removed from the black list and his application for the position of Third Grade Clerk accepted was denied.

On the recommendation of the President, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, the following persons were designated as a Board of Promotion for the Municipal Civil Service Commission:

On the recommendation of the President, the Secretary was directed to communicate with Michael Padlan, No. 367 West Eleventh street, and direct him to appear before the Commission on Wednesday morning, March 24, to show cause why his name should not be placed upon the black list for having attempted to deceive the commission as to his age.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated March 15, stating that the request of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning that the examination for promotion to Assistant Stable Foreman be open to Acting Assistants to Stable Foremen, Hostlers, Stablemen and Drivers, seemed to be reasonable, since it would confine the examination to men who had been engaged in a similar line of work. The request was granted and the Secretary was directed to proceed with the examination accordingly.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, in relation to the request of the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Queens, that an examination be held for promotion from Driver to Messenger in his Department. The matter was referred to the Secretary for a report as to whether the promotion examination had been requested in order to adjust a discrepancy between the said employee's title and the duties which he had been performing.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated March 15, relative to the request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries that an examination be held for promotion from Stoker to Marine Engineer in his Department, and stating that the examination might be ordered open to all Stokers who had served for not less than three years, in accordance with Rule XV., clause 11. The request for the examination was granted, and the Secretary was directed to inquire of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries for what grade of the position of Marine Engineer he desired the examination to be held.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated March 15, in relation to the request of the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities for authority to assign Miss Helen D. Bengtson, Supervising Nurse, to the position of Deputy Superintendent of the Training School, pending the result of the promotion examination which had been ordered for that position. After consideration of the report, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Department and state that since there was a vacancy there could be no objection to the assignment of Miss Bengtson as Acting Deputy Superintendent of the Training School in the absence of an eligible list for the position, but that she could not be permanently appointed until her name had been certified as a result of examination, and that her title on the payroll would have to remain Supervising Nurse.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated March 15, in relation to the request of the Department of Finance that non-competitive examinations be held to qualify John D. Collins for second grade Clerk, and Clemens C. Kreider for third grade clerk. On motion, the request was denied, without prejudice to a renewal of same in the month of October, the time set apart for the holding of promotion examinations in the clerical service.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated March 15, in reference to the coming examination for Engineer of Steamer, Fire Department, as follows:

"Heretofore this examination has always been regarded as a promotion examination, and in consequence the seniority and records of the candidates have counted as 80 per cent. of the examination. My report regarding the weights of the examination, which was adopted at the last meeting of the Commission, was based, therefore, on all precedents. Since that time, however, a careful study of the rules has convinced me that the practice hitherto followed has been based upon misapprehension and that the examination for Engineer of Steamer should not be regarded as a promotion examination within the meaning of the rules. My reasons may be briefly stated as follows:

"Firemen (of the first grade, as defined by section 740 of the City Charter) and Engineer of Steamer are both in Grade 1 of Part IV. of the Competitive Class.

"Rule XV., clause 1, reads: 'Vacancies in positions above the lowest grade * * * shall be filled by promotion, etc.'

"Under this clause there seems to be no authority for promotions within the same grade.

"Rule XVII., clause 8, states specifically as follows: 'The position of Engineer of Steamer in grade 1 of the Fire Service, shall be filled by special competitive examination, open to all Firemen of the first grade, as defined by section 740 of the City Charter.'

"In my opinion, therefore, it was not originally intended that the position in question should be considered a promotion. It is simply a competitive examination confined to certain qualified persons with a special knowledge of the operation of steamers in the Fire Department. For these reasons, in my opinion, the record of candidates should not be considered in rating the examination. The weights and subjects would be the same as recommended in my report for the mental examination, except that with the elimination of the candidates' record, the passing mark should be 70."

On motion, the recommendations of the Examiner were adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated March 15, in reference to the request of the Board of Water Supply that Miss Elsie A. Brown be allowed to take an examination for promotion from Typewriting Copyist, second grade, to Stenographer and Typewriter. On motion, the request was denied, without prejudice to a renewal of same in the month of October, the time set apart for the holding of promotion examinations in the clerical service.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated March 15, in reference to the request of the Department of Docks and Ferries that Collectors receiving a salary of \$1,800 per annum be given an examination in which to qualify for change of title to Clerk. On motion, the request was

denied, without prejudice to a renewal of same in the month of October, the time set apart for the holding of promotion examinations in the clerical service.

A report was presented by the Certification Clerk, dated March 16, in relation to the complaint of E. M. P. Johnson against the employment of Isidor C. Karp as a temporary Clerk in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on the ground that he was not a citizen of the United States, and, furthermore, had been under twenty-one years of age at the time of filing his application. The report stated that Mr. Karp was No. 12 on the preferred list of Temporary Clerk. On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the candidate to appear before the Commission on Wednesday morning, March 24, 1909, on the charge of having deceived the Commission as to a material fact.

A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated March 15, in relation to the employment of John McClaron as a Coal Passer in the College of the City of New York from January 15 to February 15, 1909, at a compensation of \$77.50. The report stated that the Labor Bureau had not authorized such employment; that there was an eligible list of Coal Passer for the Borough of Manhattan, consisting of one hundred and thirty-four names, and as a number of appointments had been made in the College of the City of New York during the year, he (the Labor Clerk) was at a loss to understand why McClaron had been employed. On motion, the Secretary was directed to refer the report to the Curator of the College of the City of New York with a request for an explanation.

Brady, No. 445 DeKalb avenue, Brooklyn, requesting permission to amend his application for Patrolman by setting forth in answer to Question 7, the circumstances with reference to his arrest and stating that as the case had been dismissed in court he had not thought it necessary to mention it in his application at the time of filing. The Secretary was requested to direct the candidate to appear before the Commission at the next meeting in reference to his application.

A letter was presented from John M. Ryan, Business Agent of the U. S. Blacksmiths' Helpers' Union, protesting against certain alleged violations of the Civil Service Law in the assignment of a number of employees of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Fire Department and Department of Street Cleaning. The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Departments specified and request a report on the matter.

A letter was presented from George J. Turney, Prospect street, West New Brighton, N. Y., dated March 6, in reference to the examination taken by himself and two other Assistant Foremen in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond for promotion to Foreman. The Secretary was directed to reply to the communication and state that the Commission could not ignore the preferred list of Foremen for the Borough of Richmond unless the Borough President could show that such persons were not competent to perform the duties of the positions which he had proposed to fill through promotion.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to communications from various soldiers of the United States Army who were residents of other states, requesting permission to file applications for Fireman. On motion, it was

Resolved, That applications shall be received from soldiers of the regular army who are in active service and who shall have served one year in New York State next preceding the date of filing of the application, and that if serving outside of the State of New York they must show that they resided one year in the State prior to enlisting.

The following requests for restoration to the eligible lists indicated were granted: John A. Miller, Building Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry (preferred list), No. 148 Gates avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y., declined appointment in the Department of Bridges on February 4, for the reason that he anticipated reappointment in the Board of Education shortly thereafter.

Samuel E. Allcock, Financial Clerk, No. 148 Gates avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y., Statement of Tenement House Department that he declined appointment under date of December 14, 1908, incorrect.

Mary H. Conway, Stenographer and Typewriter, Board of Water Supply, No. 71 Flushing avenue, Astoria, L. I., declined appointment on the ground of temporary inability, February 10, 1909; illness in the family.

Thomas J. Denver, Financial Clerk, No. 250 Ninth street, Brooklyn. Failure to reply in answer to notice sent him by the Tenement House Department on October 27, 1908, due to absence from city.

Mary M. Ryan, Typewriting Copyist, No. 174 West Eighty-first street, Manhattan. Failed to receive notice from the Department of Health until after the four days prescribed by the rules in which to report had expired.

Henrietta Reid, Stenographer and Typewriter, Board of Water Supply, \$750, No. 904 Fulton street, Brooklyn. Request granted in view of the desire of the Law Department to appoint the candidate at the salary specified.

The request of Israel Levine, No. 89 Belmont avenue, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list of Rodman, Board of Water Supply, for appointment at \$960 per annum, was denied for laches.

A letter was presented from Anna Boylan, No. 139 Innis street, Port Richmond, N. Y., dated March 15, making application under chapter 533 of the Laws of 1905 for a non-competitive examination to qualify her for the position of Ticket Agent or Financial Clerk in the Ferry Service of the Department of Docks and Ferries. The Secretary was directed in reply to the letter and request the applicant to inform the Commission as to the reasons for her delay in making the application; also whether she had communicated with the Department of Docks and Ferries in the matter.

A letter was presented from George P. Wojciechewski, dated March 15, requesting permission to file an application for the examination of Fireman. The request was denied for lack of power, the applicant being a non-citizen.

On the recommendation of the President, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, it was ordered that George E. J. Okie, of No. 552 Broome street, New York City, be directed to appear before the Commission at the next meeting to show cause why his name should not be placed upon the black list for having attempted to deceive the Commission as to his age.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Wednesday, March 24, 1909, at 10 o'clock a. m.
