Dear Sir—In submitting a report of the Steamboat Bureau for the year 1908, I beg to state that all of the boats have been kept in first-class running order, and that several minor changes have been made from time to time to meet the requirements of the Department of Commerce and Labor Bureau of Steamboat Inspection.

The two large boats ("Massasoit" and "Minnahanonck") are in excellent condition and are running on the same daily schedules as they did last year. Considering the age of the "Minnahanonck," I think the Department is very fortunate in getting as much service out of it as it does.

Very few reports have been received regarding the two new boats being built for this Department. The completion of these boats would greatly relieve present conditions and improve transit facilities between the different islands.

The launch "Mohican" has been thoroughly overhauled, and is, at present, in good navigable condition. It pleases me to state that the crew of the launch "Mohican," are deserving of worthy commendation for good work done on several occasions in rescuing a number of persons from drowning; detailed reports of these rescues are part of the Department records.

The launch "Sweep" has been doing satisfactory work on the ferry service between Rikers Island and the mainland. This launch belongs to the Street Cleaning Department, and was kindly loaned to this Department.

On several occasions the Department's boats have transferred coal carts, horses, tackle, etc., from the City to North Brother Island, and vice versa, on the request of the Health Department officials.

The employees of the Steamboat Bureau have performed their duties faithfully and satisfactorily. Their careful handling of freight, provisions, etc., is deserving of special mention.

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit herewith the annual report of this institution for the year 1908.

The annexed tables show the number of prisoners received and disposition of same; the amount of fines received and to whom said moneys were paid, also the daily average census for each month during the year. The enclosed per capita statement explains in detail form the expenditures made.

During the year 1908 there were 18,861 prisoners received, which was an increase of 1,517 over the preceding year.

The classification of prisoners has been given careful consideration, and it has been one of my strict rules to separate the youthful offenders from the older ones. Male prisoners under 21 years of age, and female prisoners under 18 years of age, are kept under the constant supervision of the officers. The female prison is officered by Matrons only.

The health of the prisoners has been excellent, which speaks well for the sanitary condition of the institution. The sanitary condition of the prison has been given especial attention, and I feel confident in saying that it is as good as can be found in any institution of its kind. The floors and cellars have been cleaned daily; the walls and ceilings have been painted, the blankets have been washed regularly, and every thing possible has been done to keep the place in a clean and healthy condition.

There has been a large amount of carpentering, plumbing and miscellaneous work done by paid and unpaid labor, which has been reported to the office weekly and quarterly.

The meats, fish, vegetables, milk, etc., received during the year were good in quality and of sufficient quantity; they agreed with the specifications in every instance and were received regularly. A plentiful supply of poultry, pies and apples was received for the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, and the extra provisions were very much enjoyed.

The conduct of the employees has been excellent. Strict attention has always been paid to the rules and regulations. Whenever occasion required extra service on the part of the Keepers they were always found willing and obliging at all times. I am pleased to commend them for their hearty co-operation shown me in the discharge of my duties.

The religious wants of the prisoners have been faithfully attended to by the Clergymen of the different denominations and the lay missionaries.

The following are some of the improvements made during the year just passed:

One hundred and sixty additional cots installed on upper tiers in new building; dynamo repaired and put in first-class working order; roofs and leaders on all buildings repaired; new clothes lockers installed on various tiers; private telephone system installed, and various other minor changes.

It is intended to make the following improvements during the year 1909, and I strongly recommend that they be carried out, namely:

To install another 160 additional cots on lower tiers in new building, and to make all necessary repairs to the Protestant chapel, the kitchen and the laundry plant.

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the annual report of the district prisons for the year 1908.

The alterations and improvements made during the last year to boilers and steam-heating apparatus and the installing of new plumbing have added greatly to better the sanitary conditions of the prisons. A summary of the work and improvements made I will attach to an annexed statement.

The number of prisoners received during the year was 60,703; an increase of 30 per cent. over the preceding year.

The total amount of fines collected at the various institutions was \$25,817.25, which amount was paid over to the City Chamberlain.

The requisitions for food and supplies were regularly received. Having introduced the system of weighing and reweighing the articles received directly from the contractors, I have greatly added to the economy of the institutions and am glad to say that, at the present time, the just and proper amount of supplies allotted to each prison is duly received.

The continuous substitution from canvas cot bottoms to iron spring beds has proved an innovation toward cleanliness and the banishment of vermin.

The installing of new electric lighting systems in some of the district prisons has proved beneficial, and the same will be gradually continued in other prisons, with the co-operation of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The classification of prisoners has been strictly adhered to; boys of sixteen have been kept in cells by themselves. The female prisoners are officered by matrons only and young girls are kept in separate cells apart from those of older age and under constant supervision of the Matrons in charge.

A plentiful supply of poultry, pies and eating apples was received for Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners and the prisoners appreciated the extra diet.

Since the last annual report a large amount of plastering, painting, plumbing, carpentering and miscellaneous work has been done, detailed reports of which I have transmitted to you quarterly.

I am pleased to state that the general appearance of the interior of the prisons is good on account of the continuous painting of same, and at the same time giving full and proper attention to the cleanliness and sanitary condition of the prisons.

From reports received of the State Commission of Prisons, while its members were visiting the institutions, I feel complimented to report to you that their findings regarding sanitary conditions and cleanliness were most favorable.

The Keepers, Matrons and other employees have performed their duties satisfactorily.

The Department Physicians have been prompt and attentive to the wants of the prisoners and in making visits to employees.

The religious wants have been fully attended to by the Reverend Clergymen and Lay Missionaries of the different religious denominations.

The improvements and excellent condition of affairs existing at the different institutions are partly due to your Honor's wise instructions and prompt action in all reasonable requests and recommendations made by me.

In conclusion, I beg to thank you sincerely for your kind assistance given me in the discharge of my duties.

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to forward the annual report for the year 1908. The accompanying tables give all statistics regarding prisoners, the "Per Capita Statement" shows the amount expended during the year, and the "Statement of Work Done" in the various workshops shows what has been accomplished by the mechanics confined here. There is a separate report for the manufacturing industries.

Attention is called to the census report which shows that there were 383 more prisoners received during the year 1908 than there were during the preceding year.

All the prisoners have been constantly employed in the different branches of the institution. Some have been employed in the workshops and the manufacturing bureau, while others have been engaged in different occupations, such as quarrying stone, kitchen help, runners, cleaners, etc.

The class of mechanics (prisoners) received has been poor, very few able workmen amongst them; but notwithstanding the difficulties to contend with, a large quantity of new work and repairing has been performed for this Department and the Department of Public Charities.

A good deal of credit is due the officers in charge of the various workshops and branches of the manufacturing bureau for the amount of work accomplished with the material at hand.

The female prisoners have been employed at sewing, washing, scrubbing and general prison work.

Supplies, provisions, etc., were up to the standard in every instance. The prisoners enjoyed very much the extra diet allowed on Thanksgiving and Christmas days.

Hospital care for the prisoners has been a most important subject and one that was given special attention. The medical service has been very satisfactory. The efficient services rendered by the Visiting Physicians of the Medical Board and the members of the house staff were deserving of high praise and commendation. Hospital reports have been forwarded weekly to your office.

The entire prison, male and female, wore a clean and orderly aspect, which of course, added materially to discipline and general sanitary conditions. The health of the prisoners has been excellent, which in a measure, was due to the good sanitary conditions and careful attention of the Physicians.

Religious services have been held regularly by the chaplains of the different denominations; they have been faithful in attending to the religious wants of the prisoners, and have frequently visited the prisoners in their cells and in the hospitals.

The employees have always aided me in my endeavor to discipline the institution and have at all times shown a willingness which is commendable.

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith a report of the operations of the above named institution for the year ending December 31, 1908.

A series of tables hereto appended give in concise forms the details of the institution's history during the year.

The year commenced with a population of 1,162 inmates, comprising 649 males and 513 females, and at the close of the year 1,423, comprising 890 males and 537 females, remained.

The daily average census for the year was 829 males and 541 females; total, 1,370. The daily average number of prisoners admitted was 39 males and 17 females; total, 56. Average discharges were males, 28, and females, 16; total, 44.

The fines collected at this institution for year amounted to \$6,539.

The improvements for the past year are as follows: A new tin shop, 22 feet by 100 feet, was built and new machinery installed, thereby increasing the output of manufactured tinware; new carpenter shop, 22 feet by 100 feet, was built; a new cement walk was laid from dock to Charities storehouse and from firehouse to Correction storehouse.

New oil shed for storehouse and cement floor laid under same; new stone walk, 25 feet by 100 feet, laid; new wire swinging cots provided on four tiers in female hall, balance of female hall and male hall to be fitted with similar cots as soon as possible; new dock built on east side of island, 50 feet by 30 feet.

The institution has been kept clean and wholesome throughout the year, and every precaution has been taken by the officers and employees to keep the prison in good sanitary condition.

It affords me much pleasure to state that good discipline has been maintained in this institution throughout the year, and that the officers and employees generally have discharged their duties in a faithful and efficient manner.

Department of Correction,
Branch Workhouse, Rikers Island,
New York, January 12, 1909.

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith a report of the work accomplished by the prisoners under my care in the several departments on Rikers Island during the year ending December 31, 1908.

The census on December 31, 1907, was 213 male prisoners. During the year we received 1,039 male prisoners and returned to the Workhouse, Blackwells Island, 980 male prisoners, leaving on December 31, 1908, 272 male prisoners.

Improvements have from time to time been made in the frame buildings used as dormitories, and they have been painted inside and outside, including the wash rooms attached thereto.

The work on the sea wall has engaged a large number of prisoners for the greater part of the year, and the work has progressed very satisfactorily, there being built 91 cubic yards (dimensions as follows: 12 feet in height, 14 feet in width at base, and 3 feet in width at top). In the construction of the sea wall 5,150 cubic yards of earth was removed from bank and used to back up same, and there was made 1½ acres of ground.

During the summer months a large gang of prisoners have been employed on the farm in weeding, hoeing and other work connected with the care of the crops.

The amount of vegetables raised on the farm is shown in the accompanying statement, and, I believe, shows a very satisfactory result.

The Keepers' quarters have been thoroughly cleaned and painted throughout, and such repairs as were needed were made by the prisoners.

The prisoners unloaded five barges of ashes from the Penitentiary, Blackwells Island, and loaded five barges with sand from the beach and sent it to Blackwells Island.

The roads and lawns were kept in good condition by the prisoners during the year.

A gang of prisoners were employed frequently during the summer months disinfecting that portion of the island being filled in by the Department of Street Cleaning, which, when completed, will be a valuable addition to the island, and, as stated in previous reports, the refuse from City is being used to fill in the crib work around the island, and, besides enlarging same, also provides a convenient dumping place for the Department of Street Cleaning.

The prisoners have been constantly employed in building sea wall, keeping roads in good repair, doing farm work, and such mechanics among the prisoners, as blacksmiths, masons, carpenters, tinsmiths, plumbers and painters, have done everything necessary toward keeping the buildings and quarters in a sanitary condition. The general health of the prisoners has been good, and such medical aid as was needed was furnished by the resident Physician.

Religious services have been held regularly by the Catholic and Protestant Chaplains, and at intervals by a visiting Jewish Rabbi.

I also transmit tables showing cause of commitments, sentences, ages of prisoners, nativities, social conditions, statements of work done and product of the farm during the year 1908.

Statement of Work Done by Prisoners on Rikers Island During the Year 1908.

Blacksmiths.

Repaired 1 furnace, 326 cots, 2 office chairs, 3 hasps, 1 harrow, 2 wagons, 10 hooks, 5 crowbars, 6 carts, 5 punchbars, 26 picks, 11 tongs, 96 drills, 4 sledges, 2 hoes, 7 wrenches, 1 eyebolt, 3 pipe cutters, 28 feathers for drills, 2 carpenter's bars, 3 lawn mowers, 44 chains, 150 chisels, 1 cultivator, 1 planter, 1 hot water boiler, 3 lamps for launch "Sweep," 3 axes, 5 axes, 4 hammers, 3 striking hammers, 2 saddles, 2 horse axles, 1 hook and clutch for boat. Shod 32 horses. Heeled and toed 20 pairs horse shoes. Put bottoms on stone boats. Repaired kitchen range, all wagons and shafts, and sharpened all tools.

Made and forged 4 boat irons, 1 boathook, 1 poker, 1 cot frame, 1 pair tongs, 1 hammer, 3 links, 1 stove lifter, 40 rivets, 1 wrench, 18 wedges for stone gang, 1 cold chisel, 24 drills for sea wall gang, 1 boat chain, 24 plugs and feathers, 1 milk dipper for storehouse, 1 standard for exhaust pipe on launch "Sweep."

Carpenters.

Repaired doors and closets in hospital and doctor's office. Laid 80 square feet flooring in Keepers' kitchen, door in chicken house, 9 water closet seats, fence between dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, 59 wheelbarrows, handles for axes, sledges, hammers and picks, floor in launch "Sweep," 5 doors, 5 shelves, 8 cuspidors for dormitories, 1 street broom, ladle and 4 dippers for mess hall, 3 locks, 4 knobs on dormitory doors. Caned 6 chairs. Repaired northwest corner of stable, used 6 feet white pine and 9 feet lumber, latticework on porch of Keepers' quarters, door in office and parlor of Head Keeper's house, flooring in Head Keeper's house, screens on storehouse, dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, church, Head Keeper's house, Keepers' house and mess hall and fitted doors on same, office desk. Raised rowboat landing, flooring in dining room. Placed 8 joists under same; stoop on north side of Head Keeper's office, ladders and oars, carts and wagons, 24 tallies for cots, gangplank for gutter crossings; stone boats, stoops and railings and doors of dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3; church, mess hall, ice-house, shoe shop, Painters' and Carpenters' shops, Head Keeper's house and Keepers' quarters and sash cord in windows; hull, deck and cabin of launch "Sweep." Boxed in steampipes; garret door in Head Keeper's house, 2 locks on doors in Keepers' house, 6 barrel covers. Removed screens from windows of dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, office, Head Keeper's house, hospital, mess hall and Keepers' quarters. Placed storm doors on office, Head Keeper's house, hospital and Keepers' quarters and general repairs.

Made 3 shelves in hospital, drawers in doctor's office, box for laundry, bookcase for office, clothes chest for hospital, crossbar for dump cart, hanging closet door in Head Keeper's residence, roof of chicken house, lamp-post 8 feet high, plover boom, 5 feet of 6-inch new oak; coat hangers for Keepers' quarters, 4 bases for 8 pumps, 10 hoe handles, 15 scrubbers, 3 bread trays, 6 cuspidors, oak handle for stone hammer, 3 hammer handles, 1 toilet seat, icebox for kitchen, new cover for meatbox, 2 wheelbarrows, new shutter and doors for stable, table for mess hall kitchen, wagon shed, gangways, drawing board and easel for church, backs of Barber's chairs.

Tinsmiths and Plumbers.

Cleaned out sewer of kitchen and repaired plumbing in dormitory No. 3, repaired 9 coffee cans, 10 dippers, 34 buckets, 3 water coolers, 3 lamps, 8 lanterns, 18 oil cans, 22 kettles and can on launch "Sweep," pots in Head Keeper's kitchen, boiler, ventilator tops, roof of Head Keeper's house, tinware, Keepers' and prisoners' kitchen; range and chimney of Keepers' house, 21 faucets in dormitories, flushing tanks in dormitories, waste pipe, sprinklers in bathroom, kettles in Keepers' and prisoners' kitchen, 50 pots, 130 pans, icebox in Head Keeper's office. Laid 4 feet of 6-inch earthen pipe to sewer from Head Keeper's house; closet on launch "Sweep." Painted cornices of dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, also skylight on dormitory No. 1; cleaned drains; repaired and painted gutters and roofs of dormitories and church; repaired hot water boiler; set up smoke-stack for hot water boiler and making elbow for same; placed sheet iron around stove in waiting room on dock, 4 new lights of glass in waiting room, sheet iron in magazine, using 20 sheets iron, 1 box bright tin, 6 pounds roofing nails, 40 pounds solder, 20 bags charcoal; repaired 25 lamps for roads, 3 lamps for Keepers' quarters.

Made 1 stovepipe for Head Keeper's kitchen, Keepers' and hospital kitchen, 1 bread box, galvanized leader from kitchen roof, 10 feet; galvanized leader on paint shop, 8 feet; galvanized leader on mess hall, 11 feet; galvanized leaders on dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, 12 feet; new leader between dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, 12 feet; leader on Head Keeper's house, 10 feet of 4-inch pipe used; 2 new leaders on north and south sides of mess hall building, 13 feet 4-inch pipe and 11 feet 4-inch pipe used, respectively; making and putting leader on dormitory No. 3, 12 feet 4-inch pipe used; stove pipe for waiting room on dock, 8 feet 5½-inch pipe used.

Masons.

Built 55 brick piers in cellars of church, mess hall, carpenter shop and dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3; used in building same 11,330 bricks and 9 barrels of Portland cement; unloaded 317 tons of coal, whitewashed cellars in dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, hospital, Head Keeper's residence, shops and kitchens, Keepers' quarters, foundations of church, dormitories, mess hall, storehouse, ice house, hospital, Head Keeper's house and Keepers' quarters, and pointed up all masonry on the different buildings.

Shoemakers.

Repaired 900 pairs of shoes.

Upholsterers.

Renovated 18 mattresses, 18 pillows; made 2 cushion seats for launch "Sweep."

Cot Tailors.

Repaired 500 cots.

Painters.

Painted interior of dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, church, mess hall, Keepers' kitchen and dining room, stoops at mess hall (dimensions of these buildings 30 feet wide, 100 feet long and 50 feet high), 12 beds, 12 pairs springs, used 2,000 pounds white lead, 2 barrels boiled oil, 25 pounds burnt sienna, 30 pounds burnt umber, 30 pounds

drop black, 2 pounds asbestos, 1 barrel turpentine, 15 gallons Japan dryer, 5 pounds shellac, painted Head Keeper's house and office outside, including roofs of same, also the inside of office and 4 rooms in Head Keeper's house; painted Keepers' quarters inside and outside, also roof of same, 14 rooms in hospital building inside and outside, also boatman's house inside and outside, including roof; mess hall inside and outside; also Keepers' dining room and kitchen, and prisoners' kitchen inside and outside; painted dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, including bathhouse inside; used 2,150 pounds white lead, 2 barrels oil, 1 barrel turpentine, 30 pounds drop black, 5 pounds emerald green, 15 pounds venetian red, 1 gallon shellac, 3 gallons Japan dryers, 1 barrel metallic paint.

Painted roofs and gutters of dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, church, stable, hospital and Doctors' quarters, launch "Sweep" bottom, sides, deck and cabin; used 1,000 pounds white lead, 1 barrel turpentine, 1 barrel metallic paint, 1 barrel raw oil, 1 barrel boiled oil, 12 pounds turkey red, 12 barrels indian red, 7 barrels common lime; painted 360 cot frames, grained desk in office, floor in Keepers' quarters, stoop back of mess hall, roofs of dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, church, Head Keeper's house, Keepers' quarters, hospital and office; used 1,500 pounds white lead, 1½ barrels metallic paint, 10 gallons Japan dryers, 1 barrel oil, 1 barrel turpentine.

Labor Gang.

Built sea wall for Department of Street Cleaning, wall at southerly end of island, 100 feet long, 6 feet wide at base, 3 feet at top, and 5 feet high. At northwest end of island 80 feet long, 6 feet wide at base, 3 feet at top, and 5 feet high.

Unloaded five barges from the penitentiary and loaded five scows of sand from beach, and sent same to Blackwells Island.

Have built 91 cubic yards sea wall, 14 feet at base, 3 feet at top and 12 feet high. The prisoners have also removed 5,150 cubic yards of earth from bank and used same to back up sea wall, and have made during the year 1½ acres of ground.

During the summer a gang of men were employed disinfecting that portion of the island being filled in by the Department of Street Cleaning. A large gang were constantly employed in plowing and tilling the soil and in sowing, weeding, caring for and reaping the crops. There was gathered from the farm 500 bushels tomatoes, 50 barrels potatoes, 5,000 head of cabbage, 100 bushels Lima beans, 150 bushels string beans, 50 bushels green peas, 4,500 ears of corn, 300 cucumbers, 75 barrels turnips, 25 barrels spinach, 50 barrels onions, 200 quarts strawberries, 300 bunches rhubarb and 300 bunches asparagus. From our farm we supplied the Workhouse, Blackwells Island, with 42 crates tomatoes.

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner:

Sir—I herewith respectfully forward a report of the chief work performed by the inmates of this Institution during the year ending December 31, 1908.

This work will be found tabulated under appropriate heads, but I would offer a few remarks by way of general description. The greater part of the work, aside from new building performed under contract, has consisted of repairs where needed to the existing buildings and in road making. Pavilion No. 1 has received extensive improvements, a portion has been refloored and the inside repainted throughout. Pavilion No. 5 has been refloored where necessary and the inside repainted and improvements introduced where necessary in all of the minor buildings.

The condition of the various roads on the Island has been constantly kept in mind. The amount of traffic by trucks and carts in the hauling of supplies, coal and other material is considerable and much work has been necessary to keep the roads

in a serviceable condition. For this purpose the new stone broken at the stone shed has been hauled and placed where required, and in this connection I would state that our only means of getting stone is from the surrounding shores, and this does not give us a sufficient amount to keep the inmates busy to supply the stone necessary for road repairs.

The largest repairs have been done on the steep hill leading from the stable to the "Hill," or north end of the Island, a distance of 866 feet long and 27 feet wide, and from the dock at the south end of the kitchen, a distance of 895 feet long and 23 feet wide. In the hopes that some way may be provided to furnish us with a greater amount of stone, our intentions are to devote special attention to the continuance of road making, as stated before. With constant usage and heavy storms this matter needs a great amount of care. In the City Cemetery twelve trenches, each 45 feet long, 15 feet wide and 7 feet deep have been dug, filled and sodded; also two large trenches each 30 feet long, 20 feet wide and 10 feet deep.

A large portion of the prisoners' work has been in carting and loading ice for shipment to storehouse Blackwells Island to be distributed to the different Institutions.

Tables are appended showing all statistics relative to prisoners' labor during the past year.

I desire in conclusion to tender my thanks to the Honorable Commissioner and his Deputies for their hearty co-operation in rendering all the assistance necessary to the carrying out in a most beneficial manner the Institution under my charge.

Made 240 new hammer handles, 60 racks and shelves, 19 pairs of shafts, 10 whiffletrees.

Put on weather strips on churches, hospital and women's prison.

Made new extension to stable 10 feet wide, 10 feet high and 20 feet long; new extension to rear of Overseer's cottage, 10 feet by 14 feet; 5 stoops with rails and balusters for Pavilion No. 5.

Put in new sash in engine room and 2 new windows in boiler house.

Put up 3 new buildings for fire hose apparatus, 9 feet by 10 feet by 12 feet each.

Made 4 closets for dock house, toilet on dock, new runways for ice plant, Harts Island and City Island docks landing.

Fitted up new storeroom on steamer "Massasoit," new steamfitter's shop.

Made 20 frames for steamer "Massasoit."

Hung and fitted 28 pairs of sashes for steamer "Massasoit."

Put in 12 window frames and sashes at Overseer's cottage.

Made 4 shutters.

Put new shingle roof on Morgue cemetery, new shingle roof on Pavilion No. 1 and put roofing boards on same, frames on all ventilators around island.

Put in 12 new window screens at Overseer's cottage.

Put up 6 new rooms with new doors and sashes, etc., at Overseer's cottage.

Put in new base boards at Overseer's cottage.

Made and placed 12 doors and made new ice box, Overseer's cottage; new storm doors, Overseer's cottage; 3 wheelbarrows, 12 bread boxes, 6 meat boxes and 2 gang planks.

Built one room in hospital.

Put up scuttles on five roofs.

Completed new fire escapes and made 3 mortar boxes.

Repairs.

Repaired steam launch "Mohican," 1 naphtha launch, 5 rowboats, all doors and windows in women's prison, doors and windows in Pavilion No. 1.

Overhauled woodwork at ice plant building.

Women's Prison, painted 2 halls, 2 mess halls, 1 dining room, 1 bath room, 2 toilets, 2 closets and 3 employees rooms.

Painted 664 beds, 3 tables, 15 chairs, 20 radiators, 25 closets, 12 benches, 14 bureaus, 10 washstands, 6 ice boxes and 2 desks; also put in glass and did other sundry work around the island.

Tinsmith's Report.

Put in floor, drain and sink and reset top covers in cellar and overhauled drainage at New York City Reformatory; galvanized croton main at main office, new drips and machine fittings in engine room and put new machine fittings in subway.
In boiler room, kitchen and laundry put in machine fittings, check valves in croton, supply to hot water tank, put in 22 new gaskets and 14 valves.
Connected steam whistle in boiler room, cleared strainers in croton main.
Put new belt in laundry engine, installed 120 feet of 1/4-inch pipe and 12 sink cocks.
Put in 22 new gaskets, recovered mangle and overhauled engine.
Cleaned toilets, floor drains and built manholes.

Pavilion No. 1, put in check valve in croton supply to hot water tank and installed 4 new radiators; fitted sink in cellar, put in 5 new cocks in steam coils, cleaned urinals, floor drains and water closet traps.

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor herewith to submit the third annual report of this institution, the period covered being the year ending December 31, 1908.

While conditions have not greatly changed since the date of my last report, I have reason to believe that we are making fair progress in the face of many difficulties and in the absence of adequate facilities. I feel also that the institution, to a certain extent, is accomplishing that which its name implies, that it is, within its limited strength, doing a work of actual reformation.

I have had numerous letters from former inmates and have had personal calls from others, all telling of the new and better lives they are leading, and attributing the change to the good done them during their detention here. A typical case is that of a young man who was a confirmed drunkard and thought by his parents and even the committing Magistrate to be hopeless. He has not taken a drink since having left the institution, has secured profitable employment, is active in church matters and engaged to be married to the daughter of a family of high standing.

Another encouraging and typical case is that of a young man who, since his release, has established a successful plumbing business of his own. A young Austrian came to us absolutely illiterate. He was taught the alphabet, and I have recently received from him in his own handwriting a grateful letter excellent in penmanship and admirable in its English.

I have said that these are typical of what we are doing.

Nevertheless, we are not, nor can we do under present conditions, all that we should do.

The institution is not accomplishing to the fullest extent the purpose for which it was established. There is danger that the work of reformation, as distinct from punishment, will become of necessity a mere incident. It is vitally and primarily necessary that we should have more buildings. We need them for enlarged dormitories, when the inmates can be properly classified; for the proper teaching of trades and for our scholastic development. It is most discouraging to realize the wonderful possibilities of this institution, the first and only one of its kind in this country, and yet to know how impotent we are to accomplish even a half of those possibilities because of a lack of facilities and the proper financial support.

I earnestly ask that there be a complete separation of this institution from all other institutions on this island. Three years of experience have confirmed my original belief that the present unavoidable intermingling of our inmates with those of the Branch Workhouse and Reform School is a distinct menace to the work of reformation. The northern portion of Harts Island, comprising many acres, on which now are only long abandoned and dilapidated structures, affords an ideal site for the buildings we require and one that would completely isolate our inmates from all other inmates on the island.

With the stock we will have on hand early this spring, and with the addition of two more brick machines, we could manufacture sufficient cement blocks to erect one or two buildings that could be occupied by fall, and shortly thereafter we would have an institution that would be creditable to The City of New York.

This plan, if carried out, would virtually mean a new institution as regards its buildings and its scope of work along the lines originally intended by its originators. It would mean increased trade industries, adequate schoolrooms, and a reinforcement of the instructors in both the workshops and the scholastic department. A single teacher and one classroom for our entire body of inmates is, of course, an absurdity,

when it is considered that education is most serviceable in the work of reformation in our American penal institutions.

I have repeatedly recommended that the reformatory be placed upon a strict military basis, and experience has strengthened my belief that this is essential to our success.

There should be a military instructor, uniforms, guns, a parade ground and a hall sufficiently large for drills and in connection therewith a gymnasium.

I should like very much to have gardening added to our industries. This could be established at a little more expense than the salary of an instructor. It would be healthful for the boys, would give some of them a profitable vocation after their release and would be the means of improving the appearance of the island.

Of the industries already established that of tailoring is most greatly in need of enlarging. A competent instructor should be placed in charge. At present we are dependent upon the uncertain chance that among our boys there may be a few having some knowledge of the trade and capable of teaching others. This is certainly a condition unworthy of our aims and discreditable to the City. The industry should be so enlarged as to be capable of making all the uniforms for the inmates and everything needed in the way of clothing.

We are now manufacturing all the shoes and tinware for the institutions under the charge of the Department of Correction. Details as to our production of these and other necessities will be found in the tables herewith attached while other tables carefully compiled by the Secretary of the Board of Parole will give you minute information as to our inmates, their offenses, nativity, etc.

The New York Public Library has aided our work by supplying us with one hundred and fifty (150) volumes of good literature, these being exchanged for a similar number at our request. In many instances our inmates have for the first time come in contact with good books.

The increase of the minimum sentence from three to six months which went into effect on the 10th of last November, I hope and expect will greatly increase the possibility of bringing about the permanent reformation of those committed to our care, of giving them a fair amount of rudimentary education and of teaching them a trade. None of these could be brought about under the former minimum sentence of three months.

In closing permit me to recapitulate our pressing needs:

1. The removal of the Reformatory to the north end of the island and the erection there of new buildings, including a drill hall and gymnasium.

2. Increased trade industries, the enlarging of our tailoring industry, the teaching of gardening, the employment of instructors in the scholastic department and the employment of instructors in the tailoring and gardening industries.

3. The placing of the institution upon a strictly military basis and the employment of an instructor in military tactics.

In conclusion I desire to gratefully acknowledge the interest shown by the Department in bettering conditions and the faithful and efficient work of Keepers and officers in bringing about results so far obtained.

Spiritual Welfare.

The spiritual welfare has been faithfully cared for by the Catholic, Protestant and Hebrew Chaplains of the Department of Correction, and attendance at religious service has been usually large, though not compulsory.

Scholastic Education.

In the school connected with the Reformatory there have been two sessions each day. The average attendance at each session has been about forty-three (43). The course of instruction has been of an elementary character, and confined mostly to reading, spelling, writing, composition, history and geography. In addition to these, however, an effort has been made to teach grammar, civics, drawing, physiology and hygiene. Many of the inmates have attended public and parochial schools of The City of New York, and hence they represent the various grades from the primary to the high school.

Some of the inmates over sixteen years of age, born in New York City, claim they have never attended school at any time in their lives. Again there are quite a number who cannot speak English, and are also unable to read or write. Many of these illiterates are anxious to learn, and it is gratifying to state that although we have them but a short time, there are very few, if any, who on leaving the institution are unable to read and write. In addition to this, they are in possession of such a knowledge of arithmetic and other subjects as will enable them to fill any ordinary position in a business house.

It has been the aim of the school to give instructions of a practical character, such instruction as will fit them for positions in which they will be able to earn an honest livelihood, thereby removing to a great extent the temptation to steal.

While the above has been the principal object, the moral and ethical sides have not been neglected. A study of the inmates will soon convince anyone that errors which have brought most of them to the institution, have not been the result of viciousness so much as weakness of the will and bad training. Every effort, therefore, is made to develop moral character, the idea being "to transfer the seat of authority from without to within."

During the past year, the work of the school has been greatly aided by the addition of new text books and apparatus, and also by the improvements to the school itself.

Overseer Van De Carr's house, painted throughout on inside and outside two coats of paint, including ceilings, side walls and woodwork. Floors stained and varnished.

Female prison and Matron's quarters; length of building, 200 by 40, two coats of paint.

School room ceiling, walls and woodwork painted with two coats of paint.

School room desks and seats scraped, sand papered and varnished and iron frames of same given a coat of black paint.

Four closets and four bedsteads given three coats for Keepers of building No. 1.

Ceilings, walls and woodwork painted and floors stained in two Keepers' rooms, building No. 5.

Bedstead, bureau, table and closet in building of No. 5 given two coats of paint; bedsteads for hospital one coat of paint and one of enamel.

Foundation of shoe shop whitewashed.

Office building and Branch Workhouses given two coats of paint and one of enamel.
Warden's house finished outside, three coats of paint and one of enamel.
Outside of building No. 1, one coat.
Among our inmates we frequently find representatives of almost every trade, such as barbers, electricians, plasterers, plumbers, etc., and usually there is work enough to keep each employed in his own line. Other inmates were employed during the year in dormitory and mess-hall work, in excavating, hauling dirt, stone, sand and cement so that when the weather was favorable for outside labor all were kept busy at work of some kind.

Department of Correction, Borough of Brooklyn,
Office of City Prison,

Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I most respectfully submit to your Honor the first annual report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the year ending December 31, 1908.

The Legislature of 1907 enacted chapter 637, which amended section 695 of the Greater New York Charter, thereby causing the transfer to the Commissioner of Correction from the Sheriff of Kings County, of the building with all its appurtenances, then known as the Kings County Jail.

On January 1, 1908, as Warden, with a force consisting of one Head Keeper, eight Keepers and three Matrons, I assumed charge of this institution by orders of the Department of Correction.

I desire to here detail as briefly as possible the sad and deplorable state in which I found the buildings and surroundings and general poor conditions there existing.

The census on January 1, 1908, was 221 males and 29 females, detained for various crimes and awaiting trial in the Magistrates', County and Supreme Courts.

The males were confined in dark, foul-smelling cells, with no light whatever, except that furnished from the flicker of a candle, a luxury to be enjoyed by those who had the means to procure the same at an exorbitant price.

The odor arising from the cells was almost unbearable, all caused by the utter disregard for the cleaning of the floors and cells daily and even weekly.

This general unsatisfactory condition of affairs prevailed for a number of years in every department of the institution.

In the female prison, some 80 years' old, in which on January 1 twenty-nine women were confined, the conditions were largely the same that I found in the quarters occupied by the men.

A small, poorly lighted, ill ventilated office for Clerks was in harmony with the other sad conditions. The keeping of the books and records, such as we were able to locate, were all in perfect accord with the foregoing state of affairs.

These unfortunate conditions were the accumulation of years, and each monthly Grand Jury for years has made presentments to the County Courts as to their findings in their visits of inspection. The final outcome of these several adverse reports from this body resulted in the passing of the act, chapter 637, Laws of 1907.

My first efforts were bent toward the cleaning up of the place, to make it somewhat habitable, and with this end in view, during the early part of January, 1908, there were transferred from the workhouse, 30 male and 15 female prisoners, to be engaged solely in cleaning.

I caused this force to scrub and wash down all walls and sidewalls and floors of all cells and corridors. This work was continued daily and it was not long before our efforts toward cleanliness were everywhere visible.

I am pleased to say that the January, 1908, Grand Jury had, as each succeeding one has, commended our labors and have spoken highly in their presentments to the County Court of the beneficial results arising from the change in the administration of affairs of the Kings County Jail to the Department of Correction.

Contracts have been awarded and work completed for entire new plumbing in the male prison, consisting of new toilets and washbasins with running water in each of the 416 cells.

The installing of 48 marble bath-cells, 3 at the end of each tier, each equipped with showers, enabling any degree of temperature of water to be maintained, was an improvement filling a sadly felt want, as the building under the old order of things could boast of only 4 ordinary bath tubs for a population at times of 400.

Each cell is now lighted by an electric lamp thus affording the occupant at the City's expense sufficient light to engage himself in reading and writing, something which previous to this administration only those whose means would allow them to indulge in a candle light, could afford, being unfortunate enough to occupy a place of this kind.

The thorough scraping and repainting with three coats of paint and a coat of enamel of all ceilings, side walls of all cells and corridors.

The building of a new kitchen, laundry and dormitory has greatly added to the betterment of conditions, when one considers the state these so necessary requirements were found in when the institution was taken over.

Terrazzo floors now replace the old cement of all the floors and corridors, thus affording every opportunity to keep the same clean and healthy.

New locking and ventilating devices on all windows of the male prison, thereby giving ample chance to dispel all foul odors and receive fresh air, something that had been more or less foreign in the building in the past.

Contracts for the erection of a new female prison and extensive alterations in the administration building of the male prison have been awarded, and when all work on the same shall have been completed, I am pleased to say that the old Kings County Jail, under the control of the Department of Correction, and now known as the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, will be in position of equipment and beauty, second to none of its type in the State.

I herewith append a statement, showing the number of prisoners confined, December 31, 1907, number received and number discharged during the year 1908.

A statement of fines collected from Magistrates', Special Sessions, County and Supreme Courts, all of which, under the Charter provisions governing the same, I have forwarded to the City Chamberlain.

The annual per capita statement showing in detail the cost of maintaining this institution for the year 1908.

Permit me here to express my thanks to Dr. Moses Keschnor, Department Physician, attached to the City Prison, for his uniform kind and courteous treatment of all of our charges for the past year, and his kind co-operation and ever-readiness to give assistance when called on, very often at unseemly hours.

To the Chaplains, Catholic, Protestant and Hebrew, who have so faithfully attended to the religious wants of those in our care, I am extremely indebted, and desire to express my heartiest thanks.

I wish to thank the Keepers, Matrons and other employees for the attention given and the discipline maintained throughout the year.

In their behalf and for myself, I thank you for your continued kindness and encouragement in our efforts to advance the interests of the Department of Correction and the unfortunates committed to our care.

All appliances or equipment of any kind whatsoever appurtenant to or connected with said sheds (excepting doors and windows) to be furnished by and at the expense of the lessee. The lease to commence from the date of occupation which is to be given upon the completion by the Department of Docks and Ferries of improvements at the adjoining piers, West One Hundred and Thirty-second, One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, which will provide an equivalent amount of space for the business now carried on at the West One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier, and to continue for a term of ten years; a proportionate amount of rent shall be paid by the lessee in case the lessee occupies any part of the premises before the completion of the entire work. The lessee to have the privilege of a renewal for an additional ten years. The rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$9,250 per annum, and for the renewal term at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental for the first term. The lease to provide that the lessee shall at all times during

the term thereof, put, keep and maintain the said property and every part thereof, and the structures thereon, or to be erected thereon, in good and sufficient repair and condition, and that it will at all times during the said term do such painting to the structures and sheds thereon, or to be erected thereon, as may be necessary to preserve such structures and sheds in good repair and condition, and that all such repairs and painting, during the said term, shall be done at the sole cost, charge and expense of the lessee. The terminal company shall have the privilege of subletting so as to permit other companies to land at the pier to receive and discharge passengers and freight. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property with sheds now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

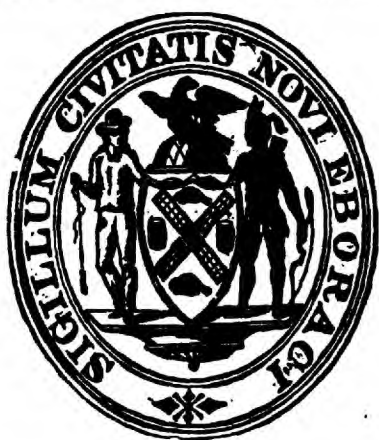

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the material set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be in closed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
