#### MOTIONS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Nicoll asked and obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following:

No. 515.

Whereas, The Court House Commission has reported to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment plans for a new County Court House, to be situated in City Hall Park, in the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, The same is on the calendar of the Board of Estimate for next Friday, March 18; and

Whereas, The plans proposed will occupy the entire front block on the south side of Chambers street, between Broadway and Centre street, overshadowing the City Hall, and will tower above it many stories in height; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York respectfully request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to refer the said plans to a sub-committee of the said Board so that an opportunity for a free and fair discussion may be given to the people of the City interested in its improvement and in the preservation of the City Hall and City Hall Park.

Dear Sir—Referring to the resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted February 8, 1910, requesting the Public Service Commission to establish a shelter at the intersection of Fulton street and Jamaica avenue, East New York, I beg to advise that a careful investigation has been completed by our Transportation Engineer. It is found that the transferring at that point is considerable, but could be largely avoided if passengers would board through cars in the first instance. The practice of taking the next car that comes along necessitates a good deal of transferring, which is unnecessary and which the company ought not to be called upon to encourage by the construction of a waiting room. A shelter or waiting room would, of course, be a convenience, but the same physical conditions exist at hundreds of other points along the lines of the street railway companies and furnish arguments equally good for the supplying of such shelters.

At the large transfer points on the rapid transit lines in outlying districts where passengers must wait long intervals for scheduled trains, and while so waiting are exposed to the elements, the Commission has insisted upon waiting rooms in certain instances. The Commission, on the contrary, does not believe that the policy of requiring the surface street car companies to establish such waiting stations along the lines in built up districts would be warranted. So far as known it has never been the practice anywhere to furnish such stations. The result of our investigation shows that there are no unusual conditions at the point in question which would warrant an order requiring the company to construct and maintain the waiting room requested.

Both matters will be followed up and the final action taken will be communicated to you.

Dear Sir—Referring to a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted February 8, 1910, requesting the Public Service Commission to compel the Metropolitan Street Railway Company to operate all its cars on Amsterdam avenue through to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, and discontinue the switching of cars at One Hundred and Sixth street, I beg to advise that after a careful investigation, it appears that the conditions do not warrant an order upon the company requiring such change in operation.

There are relatively few passengers who are compelled to change from the Sixth and Amsterdam avenue cars at One Hundred and Sixth street. Practically all the passengers transfer to or from the One Hundred and Sixteenth street crosstown line, which terminates at that point. The Broadway-Amsterdam avenue cars, which serve Amsterdam avenue north of One Hundred and Sixth street, carry an average of only about twelve passengers per car.

As to the switching in One Hundred and Sixth street, investigation shows that cars are not left standing in the street for any length of time. Practically no stand time is taken by the cars switching at that point either on the Sixth and Amsterdam avenue line or the One Hundred and Sixteenth street crosstown line. Such switching as is necessary does not create appreciable congestion in the street for the reason that the street is 100 feet wide, which leaves ample room on both sides of the tracks for other street traffic.

It might be doubted whether an attempt to regulate the traffic as requested, by an order of the Commission could be sustained.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, Manhattan, New York City:

Dear Sir—As counsel for the Building Trades Employers' Association of this City, I beg to call your attention to proposed ordinance No. 280 which was reported by the Committee on Laws and Legislation on Tuesday last, March 8.

Under this ordinance no one may place a show board bearing his name and business in front of his place of business, unless he first get the indorsement of the Alderman of his district, and then get a license, for which he is to pay \$2. Electric signs, however, may be put up without any restriction.

It is difficult to conceive any good reason why electric signs should be permitted without any restriction, or why a man should be obliged to get the indorsement of the Alderman of his district, or pay a license fee to put a plain sign board in front of his premises bearing his name and business.

I respectfully request that you use your influence to prevent the passage of this ordinance and have it recommitted for a public hearing and amendment, if the ordinance is otherwise necessary.

Hon. J. PURROY MITCHEL, New York City:

Dear Sir—I see in to-day's paper that the Board of Aldermen, over which you have the distinction of presiding, is contemplating the passing of an ordinance, to the effect as follows:

"Be it ordered, That no person shall run a motor vehicle in the streets or highways of The City of New York, which emits from the exhaust or muffler therefrom, offensive quantities of smoke, gas, or other disagreeable odors."

The foregoing is all right, and should be vigorously enforced, but it will be like a great many more orders that are on the calendar; they are never enforced, and as far as I can see, there is no provision in the wording of above order, as to how and by whom the offenders are to be apprehended.

There should be passed with the order, such instructions to the police force, also the officers of the Board of Health, or in fact, two or more reputable citizens, to make an affidavit of complaint against the driver of a vehicle, who is so careless and ignorant as to permit the lubricating oil to run in the cylinders to such an extent that it ignites with the firing of the gas explosions, and causes the sickening and injurious smoke to be emitted from the exhaust.

Any man who has the slightest practical knowledge of the subject knows that any gas engine is made inefficient, and eventually worthless, by the burning and caking of the cylinder oil within the port holes and outlets of the cylinder. Unfortunately, the experience of the majority of the cheap chauffeurs who are permitted to run machines, in the City, has been gained at bootblack stands, or washing dishes in a restaurant.

I would suggest the following clause in the ordinance: "That all motor cars, etc., licensed to traverse the streets of New York, shall be compelled, within sixty days, to have the outlet from the exhaust pipe or muffler, placed so as to shoot the explosions, smoke, etc., up in front of the car, instead of behind."

This will positively, in my opinion, be more effective as a cure for the smoke nuisance, than a fine or a threat of a fine or imprisonment.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to erect and place two drinking fountains for horses in front of the headquarters building of the society, No. 30 Madison avenue, Borough of Manhattan; the said fountains to be paid for by the said American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and to be of a pattern and design approved by the Art Commission of The City of New York; the said drinking fountains are to be erected under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the water therefor shall be supplied by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity without expense to the said society. Dear Sir—I transmit herewith certified copies of five resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 11, 1910, authorizing the issues of corporate stock, as follows:

For the purpose of defraying the expenses of making studies and plans for the elimination of grade crossings of steam railroads in the Borough of Richmond, \$5,000.

For the purpose of providing means for completing the One Hundred and Seventy-second Precinct station house, Lawrence avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, under the jurisdiction of the Police Commissioner, \$2,100.

For the purpose of providing means for the use of the Topographical Bureau of the Borough of Queens in preparing and completing maps, and monumenting all territory within said Borough, \$50,000.

For the purpose of providing means for the use of the Topographical Bureau of the Borough of Richmond in preparing and completing maps, and monumenting all territory within said Borough, \$26,000.

For the purpose of providing means for the use of the Topographical Bureau of the Borough of The Bronx in preparing and completing maps, and monumenting all territory within said Borough, \$20,000.

I also transmit copies of reports of the Comptroller relative thereto, together with forms of ordinances for adoption by the Board of Aldermen to indicate its concurrence therein.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 21, 1910, your Board referred to the Comptroller a communication of the President of the Borough of Richmond requesting the authorization of an issue of corporate stock amounting to \$5,000 to provide the means for the preparation of plans and for studies in the matter of eliminating grade crossings in the Borough of Richmond. In connection therewith I submit the following report:

On January 3, 1910, the President addressed a communication to the Board of Aldermen requesting the issue of \$5,000 special revenue bonds for the purpose of making a special study of the proposition of eliminating grade crossings and making plans accordingly. In his communication the President stated that the Public Service Commission had been in consultation with the Borough authorities and that the Commission felt that it is absolutely necessary, in the interest of public safety and convenience, to change from present level crossings to those of "under" or "over" grade at a number of places.

The President further states that since the preparation of the departmental estimates for 1910 the special phase of the work had become more peremptory, and he urges that the issue of special revenue bonds be granted to cover the cost of the preliminary engineering and technical work in this connection for the year 1910.

Under date of January 20, 1910, the President addressed the Board of Estimate and Apportionment changing his request from one for special revenue bonds to one for a corporate stock issue, it having been determined that whereas the engineering work involved is designed essentially for improvements that would be of permanent benefit to the public, the cost could in this way be more equitably distributed over a term of years.

In his letter of January 20, 1910, the President describes at length the history and character of steam railroad development in the Borough of Richmond since 1885, and appears to fully justify the statement that at certain main crossing points a very serious interference with ordinary business exists and that in spite of safety devices, automatic switches and the operation of gates, many accidents have occurred, as well as delays to ordinary traffic.

For several years in taking up topographical work, the President has considered the ultimate changes of grade of streets and railroads so that all grade crossings might be finally eliminated, but none of these studies have included designs for the physical work of carrying out the necessary physical changes.

Two crossings in particular on the road to Tottenville have been productive of accidents and constant danger, one near Giffords and the other near Huguenot. From topographical conditions the President states it has been obvious that in the former case the highway would have to be carried over the railroad and in the other instance the highway beneath the railroad. From statements made by the President it is apparent that the steam railroad company is quite in accord with the project with particular relation to the two crossings referred to.

The procedure in this matter is prescribed in the railroad law of the State of New York, chapters 60 to 67, and upon the allegation of the Mayor, Common Council of any city, etc., in which any street, avenue or highway crosses or is crossed by a steam surface railroad at grade, or any steam surface railroad company, whose road crosses or is crossed by a street, avenue or highway at grade, may bring their petition in writing to the Public Service Commission, therein alleging that public safety requires an alteration in the manner of such crossing. Upon any such petition being brought the Public Service Commission shall appoint a time and place for hearing the petition, etc. After a hearing the Public Service Commission shall determine what alterations and changes, if any, shall be made, etc.

The further procedure as to acquisition of necessary land or easement at crossing; repair of bridges, etc., at crossing; expense of constructing near crossings and other matters are all fully provided for in the railroad law, but the essential point in the request now under consideration is the question of putting the President of the Borough of Richmond in a position where he may be able to justify a petition to change grades supported by plans and specifications whereby he can satisfy the Public Service Commission as to the adequacy of the method proposed for removing the condition sought to be remedied. The railroad law provides for an apportionment of the actual expense incurred in making the change of grade between the railroad company, the municipal corporation and the State, the work to be done by the railroad corporation under the supervision and approval of the Public Service Commission.

The President in his request suggests that the engineering force necessary to properly undertake the problem would consist of:

One Assistant Engineer.....	\$2,400 00
Transitman, about half time.....	725 00
Draftsman.....	1,350 00
Rodman, half time.....	525 00

It appears to me that the President has justified the necessity for an appropriation to provide for the preliminary expenses in this matter there being no funds available therefor in the Budget appropriations. I accordingly suggest that your Board approve the request for a corporate stock issue of \$5,000 for the purpose aforesaid.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of corporate stock of The City of New York in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), for the purpose of defraying expenses of making studies and plans for the elimination of grade crossings of steam railroads in the Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 11, 1910, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the purpose of defraying the expense of making studies and plans for the elimination of grade crossings of steam railroads in the Borough of Richmond, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000) the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Hon. William F. Baker, Police Commissioner, in communication dated February 9, 1910, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board of Aldermen the issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$3,000 for the purpose of completing the Seventy-second (now One Hundred and Seventy-second) Precinct station house, the amount of the appropriation made for the construction thereof by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 3, 1904, being insufficient. I would report:

On February 27, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized an appropriation of \$2,000 for preliminary expenses, and on January 15, 1904, authorized an appropriation of \$88,000 for the construction of the Seventy-second Precinct Police Station; premiums on bonds sold amounted to \$1,651.85, making a total amount available of \$91,651.85.

The contract expenditures and liabilities against this sum are as follows:

Paid to Thomas G. Carlin on account of his original contract.....	\$16,129 60
Daniel Ryan's contract for the completion of the building.....	67,320 00
Architect's contract .....	4,200 00
Surveys .....	45 00
Portion of judgment for Thomas G. Carlin charged against this fund...	4,032 40

Excess of payments and contract liabilities over funds available..... \$75 15

This deficit may be wholly or partly made up by premiums on the \$17,500 of bonds yet unsold.

The architect wishes to install a better grade fixture than was originally contemplated in this contract. The contract specifies that the contractor shall allow \$700 for the lighting fixtures. It would appear to me that suitable fixtures should be obtained by the City by increasing the amount originally allowed in the contract by fifty per cent.

The front stoop of the building as constructed now extends to within five feet of the outside of the curb line, and it would appear advisable to move the stoop into the building in order that the sidewalk may be unobstructed.

The contract does not provide for a Sergeant's desk or bookcase.

In my opinion, the sum of \$2,100 should be sufficient to satisfactorily complete this building, estimated as follows:

For additional expense of electric light fixtures.....	\$350 00
Sergeant's desk .....	235 00
Bookcase behind Sergeant's desk.....	328 00
Change in front entrance.....	980 00

Total.....	\$1,893 00
Architect's fee (5 per cent.).....	94 65
To meet excess of liabilities over appropriation.....	75 15

Grand total..... \$2,062 80

The expenditure being necessary, I would advise that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, to issue corporate stock to the amount of \$2,100 for the purpose of completing the One Hundred and Seventy-second Precinct Station House, Lawrence avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 4, 1910, there was referred to the Comptroller by your Board the matter of provision by the issue of corporate stock for topographical work throughout the several Boroughs of the City.

In connection therewith I would report that there is now in progress in this Department a complete investigation of the subject, and a plan for the future conduct of the work is in process of formulation, under my direction, by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics. Provision for the carrying on of a part of the work during the present year has been made by resolution of your Board, on February 4, 1910, which approved an allowance to the extent of \$50,000 for the Borough of Queens, and on the same day \$11,000 for the same purpose for the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The examination now in progress by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics will not be completed for some time, and it is evident that the funds so far provided will not be sufficient to cover the probable necessary expenditures until the report is made. I would, therefore, suggest that your Board provide additional funds for topographical work for the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond, to the extent of \$50,000 additional for Queens, and \$26,000 additional for Richmond.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx also advises me that the conditions are such in the Topographical Bureau under his jurisdiction that all work will have to be shut down for want of funds unless the same are forthcoming immediately. The sum of \$20,000 should be provided temporarily. These amounts will be sufficient to provide for the continuance of the work in the three Boroughs mentioned until about the 1st of June next. Transmitted herewith are three resolutions for adoption.

## The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Two communications presented to your Board on January 28 and February 4, 1910, respectively, from the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, requesting the establishment of various positions and grades of positions in the Department were referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration.

The requests are for the establishment of the following positions and grades of positions:

We would report that requests for the establishment of seven of the above positions were made by the Board of Trustees on August 14 and 24, 1909, respectively, but no action was taken thereon by your predecessors. The reasons for the present requests are given in detail by the Board of Trustees in their communications attached to this report.

From information furnished your Committee, it is obvious to the visitor to the office of the General Medical Superintendent that, as stated by the Board of Trustees:

"The duties of the General Medical Superintendent are so numerous and so varied that it is a physical impossibility for him to give adequate attention to the work of his office."

The request of the General Medical Superintendent for assistance in his office seems reasonable, and we would recommend the establishment of the grades of position of Assistant Medical Superintendent, with salary at the rate of \$3,500 and \$2,500, respectively, per annum.

The request for the establishment of the grade of position of Physician to Out-Patients at \$600 per annum has been made for the reason that Physicians are required at the tuberculosis clinics to treat poor patients. The Board of Trustees claim that volunteers for this work can no longer be secured, as the younger physicians desire hospital experience of more varied character, and that the number of patients continues to grow. In order that these poor patients may be guaranteed proper care and treatment, and further in view of the fact that the necessary funds have been allowed in the Budget for 1910 for this purpose, we recommend that the request be approved.

The Board of Trustees state in their communication that the position of Investigator is asked for because—

"The Board feels the need of having some competent person investigate the financial condition of all applicants for admission to the hospital. It is believed that many persons present themselves for treatment and are admitted and receive treatment without charge while they are well able to pay for their care here or in some other institution."

There is a general impression abroad that charities supported by The City of New York have been abused by this undeserving class of persons, and we recommend the establishment of the position of Investigator at \$1,200 per annum.

The position of General Storekeeper is asked for, as there is now no competent supervision of the storehouses in the four hospitals of the Department. With a General Storekeeper to supervise, there would be greater expedition in the performance of the work of the stores and proper distribution and deliveries of supplies. General supplies for this Department cost the City \$450,000 a year, and a competent man should be in charge of their distribution. We recommend the establishment of the position of General Storekeeper at \$1,200 per annum.

The Board of Trustees say of the request for the establishment of the position of Egg Candler:

"In past years the eggs, butter and cheese were examined by the Mercantile Exchange, but in the contract for 1910, provision has been made to have these supplies passed upon by the Department's own Inspector. This arrangement will be cheaper and more satisfactory."

It appears that in the Department of Public Charities provision is made for the payment of \$1,200 a year to an Egg Candler. The President of the Board of Trustees states that during the month of January hundreds of dozens of eggs have been rejected by the employee at present temporarily engaged in this work. We recommend the establishment of the position of Egg Candler at \$1,000 per annum.

The grade of position of Stenographer at \$900 per annum is requested. Stenographers are appointed in this Department at \$750 per annum. The Trustees state that as no increase has been awarded for length of service or efficiency, the Department has lost the services of several Stenographers through transfer to other Departments. The Stenographer for whom this increase is asked has been in the Department since 1904. We recommend that this request be approved.

The Butcher, for whom an increase of \$120 is asked, was formerly on the payroll at \$720, but was reduced when it was found that that grade had not been established. We recommend that the grade of position of Butcher, at \$720 be established.

The Trustees claim that the appointment of a Typewriting Copyist has become necessary through the constantly increasing work in the Payroll Bureau, and because it is the desire of the Trustees to send out lists of changes in the help more promptly than in the past. We recommend the establishment of the position of Typewriting Copyist at \$600 per annum.

The reasons for the request for seven Anaesthetists are given in the communication of the Board of Trustees accompanying this report. They are, in effect, that it is desired to secure proper instruction of the house staffs of the different hospitals in the practice of anaesthesia, in which the lives of patients may be jeopardized. Expert Anaesthetists have been appointed from time to time, but the Trustees say this plan has been only partly successful, as it is impossible to retain the services of good men continuously without pay. We recommend that the request for the establishment of the position of Anaesthetist be approved, with the proviso that five incumbents be allowed instead of seven, as requested.

On April 1, 1909, the Board of Trustees applied to your Board for the establishment of the grade of position of Pathologist in the Department, at the rate of \$2,100 per annum. No action was taken on the application. They now ask for the establishment of the position at \$1,800 per annum for two incumbents.

The President of the Board of Trustees stated that the two Pathologists for whom an increase is asked of \$300 each from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per annum, have been in the service of the Department since 1905, without advance of salary; that both have received offers from other institutions, but have remained on the assurance that an effort would be made to increase their salaries. In the departmental estimate for 1910, request was made for \$2,100 per annum for those two men, and, in view of the fact that they maintained themselves outside of the hospital, an allowance was made to them in the Budget for 1910 of \$1,800 per annum. We recommend the establishment of the grade of position of Pathologist at \$1,800 per annum.

The grade of position of Trained Nurse at \$1,050 per annum is asked for to provide an increase of \$150 to the Nurse in charge of the Social Service Bureau. We recommend that this request be not approved at this time.

Comstock, who receives \$600 per annum for similar services in the Brooklyn Truant School, might fill this position also without conflicting with the regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Schedule No. 991 was again modified on February 4, the amount allowed for the salary of the Cook, who bakes for this and the Brooklyn and Manhattan Truant Schools, being increased from \$600 to \$720 per annum, because it was claimed to be impracticable to fill the position at the lower rate.

Inasmuch as the schedule has already been modified, and for the reason that it seemed advisable to provide for the proposed new grades, we would recommend that they be established as requested, according to the resolution submitted herewith.

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held on January 14, 1910, a communication was presented from the Board of Health, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Health on January 5, 1910, requesting the establishment of two additional grades of the position of Hospital Physician in the Department of Health, with salaries at the rate of \$600 and \$300 per annum, which matter was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration.

We would report that the President of the Board of Health states that Physicians at the nominal salaries of \$600 and \$300 per annum are required especially in Riverside Hospital, which is now devoted to the treatment of tuberculosis cases; that there are at present over 300 patients in that hospital, many of them in the last stages of tuberculosis; that a compensation of \$600 or \$300 a year would be an inducement to young Physicians, as after they had become experienced and of value to the Department they would be in line for promotion.

No provision was made in the Budget for 1910 for Internes in Riverside Hospital for the reason that young men could not be induced to accept \$120 a year, out of which their uniforms were provided, to treat tuberculosis only, as they wanted experience in general hospital work.

Provision was made in the Budget for 1910 for the compensation of attending Physicians at the tuberculosis clinics at salaries of \$600 and \$300 per annum. It would seem reasonable that similar compensation should be allowed to Physicians treating tuberculosis in the hospitals.



The President stated that by the practice of economy in other directions, sufficient funds to provide for the payment of the salaries of these additional Hospital Physicians would be found in the Budget appropriations for 1910.

In view of the facts stated, we would recommend that the request of the Board of Health for the establishment of the additional grades of the position of Hospital Physician, with salary at the rates of \$600 and \$300 per annum, respectively, be approved.

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held July 2, 1909, a communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated June 22, 1909, requesting the establishment of the grade of Automobile Engineer in that Department at \$1,200 per annum for three incumbents. This request was referred to a select committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

Your committee would report that on December 21, 1906, your Board approved a resolution recommending the creation of the position of Automobile Engineer at \$1,200 in the Department of the President of the Borough of Richmond for one incumbent, and that the Board of Aldermen concurred in said resolution. Since the date mentioned the President has acquired several additional automobiles, which, up to this time, have been operated by Chauffeurs paid by the day.

Your committee is informed that the upkeep and maintenance of the automobiles in use in the bureaus and offices under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Richmond are taken care of exclusively by the mechanics in the Department. This includes the making of all repairs as well as the driving of the cars. In view of this fact it would seem to be economical to employ permanently Engineers competent to make repairs.

Under the existing system of compensation the Engineers are paid \$4.50 a day, and upon the basis of all the year around employment it would seem to be as economical, and more likely to insure competent service, to provide for their compensation on a yearly salary basis.

Your committee would therefore recommend that the request of the President of the Borough of Richmond be approved.

On completing his duties with the Commission, Mr. Altman entered the office of the President at the salary then provided of \$1,500, acting as the personal confidential Secretary to the President, which duties he has continued to perform.

On January 1, 1902, he was increased to \$2,000, and on September 10, 1903, to \$2,400, under the title Stenographer and Assistant Secretary, and still renders service under the same title at the same compensation. Mr. Altman is an attorney and a member of the New York City Bar Association. The President states that he can depend upon him to attend to many matters which could not be left to a less specially trained employee.

We have considered the request and would recommend to your Board the approval of the establishment of the position of Executive Clerk, at \$3,000 per annum, and transmit resolution.

Gentlemen—In reference to a communication from the County Clerk, New York County, dated February 5, 1910, requesting the establishment of the following positions and grades of positions:

Four General Clerks, with a knowledge of filing, at \$1,000 each per annum;  
Four Messengers, at \$750 each per annum;  
—and for the temporary employment of a sufficient number of Clerks to bring the indexing and filing of marriage certificates up to date, which request was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration and report, we would report as follows:

The County Clerk states he desires to reorganize the office; that he has found as many as seven Clerks whose salaries range from \$1,200 to \$2,400, who have for some years past been assigned daily to work as Messengers, a condition to which may be traced more than anything else the congestion in the work of recording. It is proposed to have the additional Clerks asked for, with the assistance of the Clerks now acting as Messengers, take up the work of recording and to substitute the additional Messengers requested for the Clerks formerly assigned to duty as Messengers. In this manner the County Clerk declares that his force will be able to keep up with the current work of recording. He says it will then also be possible to introduce the improved system now in operation in the County Clerk's office in Kings County, by means of which on the receipt of the first document in every case it is given a number and adding thereafter all subsequent papers in connection with each case to the same number. This system will materially systematize and facilitate the work of the office.

Reference to the statements attached shows that the number of employees in the office in 1899 was 71; while the work has increased 50 per cent., the force to-day consists of 73 employees, two more than in 1871. Owing to this very apparent lack of proper help, the County Clerk says that although the office has been regularly charging and receiving fees for copying certain records in the Equity Department, during the past fifteen years the copying of these records has fallen behind each year, there being now about five years' work in arrears.

In connection with the proposed employment of the temporary Clerks, provision for which is requested, the County Clerk proposes applying to the Board of Aldermen for the adoption of a resolution for an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount necessary. The establishment of the additional regular positions requested will not require any increase over the 1910 Budget appropriations, as the County Clerk has eliminated three positions, viz.:

Chief Searcher, \$2,500 per annum.  
Notarial Clerk, \$1,500 per annum.  
Chief Index Clerk, \$2,500 per annum.

The position of Notarial Clerk has been vacant since January 1, Chief Searcher since February 1, and Chief Index Clerk since March 1. By the abolishment of these three positions there will be available the sum of \$5,874.93. The amount necessary to pay the salaries of four General Clerks, with knowledge of filing, at \$1,000 per annum, and four Messengers at \$750 per annum, from April 1 to December 31, 1910, would be \$4,687.50.

As no additional appropriation will be required to make the changes requested, we would recommend the approval of the request of the County Clerk.

The first item in the above list represents a proposed increase from \$2,150 to \$2,500 in the salary of A. D. Anderson, Registrar, who has rendered excellent service to the college for fourteen years.

The second represents a proposed increase of \$200 per annum for Miss Harriet L. McCarty, Secretary to the President, who also acts as Assistant Secretary to the Board of Trustees. Miss McCarty has been in the employ of the college for eight years and is highly efficient.

Item 3 represents increases of \$90 and \$150 per annum for Samuel Newman and Frank W. Wheeler, Clerks, who have been eight and six years respectively in the college.

Item 4 represents an increase of \$150 per annum each for Joshua Golubock and John F. Graff, Clerks, now receiving \$600 per annum.

Item 5 represents an increase of \$150 per annum each for Thomas F. O'Keefe and Charles T. Anderson, Stenographers, now receiving \$900 per annum.

The position of Assistant in the Library with salary at the rate of \$720 per annum (item 6), which is new, is now filled by a man employed temporarily with the permit of the Municipal Civil Service Commission. That of Assistant in the Department of Natural History (item 7), which is also new was filled temporarily, but its occupant was dismissed for want of an appropriation therefor. The new position of Assistant in the Department of Chemistry (item 8) was recommended by the Bureau of Combustibles, it being deemed necessary to have some one in charge of the storeroom.

Items 9 and 10 represent new grades of the position of Mechanician at \$900 and \$480 per annum, both of which are now temporarily filled with the permit of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Item 11 provides for two additional Watchmen at a wage not to exceed \$2.50 per day, as recommended by the Fire Department, and Item 12 for a Gardener to be employed during the summer at \$75 per month, and probably paid by the Janitor.

It is further proposed to change the title, without change of salary, of three persons now designated as Cleaners to that of Attendants in order to distinguish them from the janitorial staff of Cleaners, inasmuch as the work they do is of an entirely different order, one of them being employed as an Attendant in the office of the Director of the High School Department and the other two as Attendants in the text book supply rooms of the High School and Collegiate Departments, respectively.

The position of Bookkeeper is requested to be established to the end that Philip A. Johann, Clerk, at \$900 per annum, may assume the new title, and thereby have his salary increased to \$1,200 per annum. Mr. Johann was originally appointed on November 11, 1906, as Clerk in the Registrar's office with salary at the rate of \$480 per annum. One year later his salary was increased to \$600 per annum and again in February, 1909, to \$900 per annum. In 1907 he was transferred to the office of the Curator, whereupon the Board of Trustees asked to have the grade of Clerk at \$1,050 per annum established in order to pay him this sum, but the request was not granted. Mr. Johann, who has charge of all the bookkeeping in the Curator's office, is eligible to the salary of a third grade Bookkeeper and the Board of Trustees desires to advance him to the minimum rate allowed for such service.

We would recommend that new positions be established, as requested, in the College of The City of New York, according to the resolution attached hereto.

Gentlemen—On January 10, 1910, the President of the Borough of The Bronx addressed a communication to your Board requesting your approval of the establishment of the positions of Consulting Engineer and of Chief Engineer of Highways. On February 23, 1910, the President submitted a further communication in which he asked for permission to withdraw that part of the original request which referred to the position of Chief Engineer of Highways and substituted therefor a request to consider the establishment of the position of Chief Engineer of Highways and Sewers with salary at \$5,000 a year. The matter was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, and we would submit the following report:

In a report approved by your Committee, dated February 1, 1910, and approved by your Board on February 4, 1910, we recommended the establishment of the position of Consulting Engineer at \$6,000 per annum, and we suggested that consideration

of the matter of the position of Chief Engineer of Highways be deferred until such time as the plans for reorganization of the engineering forces in the Borough of The Bronx were further developed.

The President states that the position of Chief Engineer of Sewers is now vacant on account of the resignation of the former incumbent. He further states that his present plan is to bring the supervision of the engineering work of both sewers and highways under one head. It is therefore the intention of the President to have one head for the two Bureaus, and at the same rate of compensation as that paid to the Chief Engineer of Sewers and now proposed to be paid to a Chief Engineer of Highways and Sewers. While producing better results, the President will add nothing to the payroll cost of the two Bureaus.

In view of the facts stated, we recommend that the Board of Aldermen be requested to approve of the establishment of the position of Chief Engineer of Highways and Sewers, whose compensation shall be at the rate of \$5,000 per annum. The resolution is appended.

#### GENERAL ORDERS.

Alderman Baldwin called up General Order No. 11, being a report and resolution, as follows:

Nos. 163 and 354.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which were referred on February 1, 1910 (Minutes, page 229), the annexed ordinance to regulate the cold storage of perishable foodstuffs, and on March 1, 1910 (Minutes, page 581), the annexed protest from the New York Produce Exchange, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That two public hearings were held on February 9 and February 16, 1910, very largely attended by the most influential representatives of the interests which appear to be affected, if not alarmed, by the proposed ordinance. The arguments in opposition were in the direction that cold storage was beneficial, enabling quantities of perishable food to be preserved during plentiful seasons for use when in the natural course they could not be procured, also that the system was actually economical for the ultimate consumer. Both these positions were strenuously denied by those who approve the Ordinance, notably by a delegation of housewives.

The object of the Ordinance is, as stated by the introducer, Alderman Dowling, to permit the consumer to learn exactly what is placed before him for sale. There is no desire to entail an unnecessary hardship on any business or trade. Special interests must bend to the demands of the public, and this Ordinance, if adopted, would tend to afford protection to the public against the gambling in food products, which has been widely intimated, by their retention for a lengthy period in cold storage until an artificial scarcity is created.

A great deal of the opposition is based on the application of the Ordinance to single fowls and fishes. It is recommended that it be provided that tags shall be placed on barrels, boxes or packages which may contain fowls, fish or game, and not on the actual carcasses. Further suggestion has been made that the operation of this Ordinance will force the cold storage plants out of the City in order to successfully compete with outside plants which cannot be regulated by a city ordinance. This objection may be met by an amendment to section 2; under such provision cold storage foodstuffs of every character, no matter where they had been stored, would have to be tagged in a manner to afford the information to the purchaser which this Ordinance seeks to impart, and unfair competition from sources outside the City limits would be eliminated.

In regard to the constitutional power of the local legislative body to pass an ordinance of this kind, the Committee is informed that the City of Chicago recently adopted an ordinance imposing severe restrictions on the bakers of that city, which has been held operative by the Court of Appeals of Illinois, and a very stringent bill has been introduced in the House of Delegates of Maryland on the lines of this proposed Ordinance.

Beside the approval of the Ordinance manifested at the public hearings, a large number of messages and letters approving this Ordinance have been received by your Committee from different parts of the City, and many inquiries from other municipalities asking for copies of the proposed ordinance, averring that it is a step in the right direction for the public interest.

Your Committee believes that with the alterations appearing in a substitute Ordinance herewith presented, "the greater good of the greater number," will be conserved, that the consumers will benefit, and the conductors of the cold storage system, by adjusting their methods to imperative demands of the public, will discover that they too are benefited.

Your Committee therefore recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted, and the communication placed on file.

#### (SUBSTITUTE.)

AN ORDINANCE for the purpose of establishing a system of record in relation to cold storage detention of perishable provisions in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The carcass of any animal, or any part thereof, domestic fowls, fish or game, intended for use as human food, placed in cold storage in The City of New York, shall have securely fastened thereon, or in the case of fowl, fish or game upon the barrel, box or package containing same, a tag bearing the date of reception of such carcass, or part thereof, in plain letters and figures, such tag to be stamped in equally plain letters or figures when each such carcass, part thereof, or in the case of fowl, fish or game the barrel, box or package containing same, is removed from cold storage, giving the date of removal, which tag shall be prominently displayed by the retailer to all prospective purchasers.

Sec. 2. On each box, can or other container of perishable provisions placed in and coming from cold storage there shall be placed a tag or slip bearing dates as provided in section 1 of this ordinance, which shall be displayed by the retailer for the scrutiny of any prospective purchaser.

Sec. 3. Any failure on the part of any proprietor of a cold storage plant or any person engaged in retailing foodstuffs as herein described to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, before any magistrate, either upon the confession of the party or competent testimony, be fined in a sum not less than fifty dollars (\$50) and not more than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) for each offense, and in default of payment thereof may be committed to the city prison by such magistrate until the same be paid.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### (ORIGINAL.)

AN ORDINANCE for the purpose of establishing a system of record in relation to cold storage detention of perishable provisions in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The carcass of any animal, or any part thereof, domestic fowls or game, intended for use as human food, placed in cold storage in The City of New York, shall have securely fastened thereon a tag bearing the date of reception of such carcass, or part thereof, in plain letters and figures, such tag to be stamped in equally plain letters or figures when each such carcass, or part thereof, is removed from cold storage giving the date of removal, which tag shall be prominently displayed by the retailer to all prospective purchasers.

Sec. 2. On each box, can or other container of perishable provisions placed in and coming from cold storage there shall be placed a tag or slip bearing dates as provided in section 1 of this ordinance, which shall be displayed by the retailer for the scrutiny of any prospective purchaser.

Sec. 3. Any failure on the part of any proprietor of a cold storage plant or any person engaged in retailing foodstuffs as herein described to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, before any magistrate, either upon the confession of the party or competent testimony, be fined in a sum not less than five dollars (\$5) and not more than fifty dollars (\$50) for each offense, and in default of payment thereof may be committed to the city prison by such magistrate until the same be paid.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution Unanimously Adopted by the Board of Managers of the New York Produce Exchange at a Meeting Held February 15, 1910.

Resolved, That the bill now pending before the Board of Aldermen known as No. 161, and entitled "An ordinance for the purpose of establishing a system of record in relation to cold storage detention of perishable provisions in The City of New York," is a menace to the business of the provision dealers of the New York Produce Exchange for the following reasons:

First—The provisions of this bill are absolutely impracticable.

Second—This bill is absolutely unnecessary, ample authority now being vested in the Board of Health to protect consumers of provisions in this city from the sale of goods not in prime condition.

Third—That if the terms of this ordinance were enforced, an unnecessary burden of additional expense would be put on consumers of provisions, incurred in the tagging of goods prescribed in the measure.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From January 16 to January 22, inclusive, the following operations were performed, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their assistants were present:

Bellevue Hospital.....	58
Gouverneur Hospital.....	17
Harlem Hospital.....	15
Fordham Hospital.....	13

In accordance with the rules, a fire drill was held at Bellevue Hospital on January 18, at Fordham Hospital on January 20 and at Harlem and Gouverneur hospitals on January 21, 1910.

Since the last meeting it has been necessary to supply, in four instances, special Nurses for a temporary period in order to properly care for special cases, such as an isolation case of mumps, a post operative case and cases in extremis. Your approval is asked for.

Dr. J. B. Byrne, a member of the house staff, Bellevue Hospital, was taken ill with diphtheria and sent to the Minturn Hospital on Sunday, January 23. Your approval is asked for.

In view of the recent discussion as to the liability of the City in regard to the payment of Minturn Hospital bills, it is recommended that definite permission to incur liability in such cases be obtained from the Comptroller. These cases of contagious disease among the doctors and nurses come up very frequently, and must be taken somewhere out of this institution. It has always been customary to send them to the Minturn Hospital, where they are cared for at \$20 a week. Were we to take care of them here it would cost us \$42 a week with maintenance for special Nurses. If they are not sent to the Minturn Hospital, and are not taken care of here, it will be necessary for them to go into the public wards of the hospitals of the Department of Health, which does not seem right. As these cases are constantly arising and must be attended to, it will be well to have a definite ruling on the subject, and for that reason the above recommendation is made.

The work in the Payroll Bureau of this Department is increasing constantly, and in view of the fact that the "change notices" should be sent out more promptly, it will be necessary to have an extra assistant in that office. It is therefore recommended

that a Typewriting Copyist be employed at the rate of \$600 a year, and that the establishment of that grade be requested.

On January 2 the Gouverneur Hospital ambulance, driven by John J. O'Neill and accompanied by Dr. Carr, Ambulance Surgeon, knocked down and passed over a boy by the name of Abraham Rosenberg, nine years old, living at No. 306 Madison street. I am informed by Mr. Collins, Foreman of Drivers, that Mr. O'Neill has been in the service nearly six years and is a thoroughly competent driver. O'Neill reports that the boy ran in front of the horse, that he was driving at a slow speed and that it was in no way his fault. Dr. Carr reports likewise. The boy sustained several contusions of the legs and arms of a slight nature, and also a fracture of the right clavicle. The child was immediately taken to the hospital and dressed, but afterwards removed to his home.

An employee of the Hotel Belmont, whose daughter is ill in Bellevue Hospital, has expressed on a number of occasions his gratitude to the hospital, and to the nursing staff in particular, for the excellent care given to his child, and requests that he be allowed to present to the hospital two large barrels of china which was condemned and thrown out by the hotel on account of being slightly nicked and damaged.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of special nurses reported by the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the removal of Dr. J. B. Byrne to the Minturn Hospital was approved, as was also the transfer of a Pupil Nurse reported upon verbally by the General Medical Superintendent.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved, To request a ruling from the Department of Finance relative to the power to send Physicians and Nurses who contract contagious diseases in the performance of their duties to the Minturn Hospital for treatment.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved, To employ a Typewriting Copyist at \$600 per annum in the payroll bureau as recommended by the General Medical Superintendent, and to request that this grade of position be established.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved, To approve the report in regard to the injury to a boy by a Gouverneur Hospital ambulance.

As it was considered inadvisable to receive the china which had been offered, it was, upon motion, duly seconded and carried,

Resolved, To decline the present with thanks. The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of changes in help at Bellevue Hospital for the weeks ending November 5, 13, 20 and 27, 1909, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, these were referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

Mr. Farley made a report in regard to the proposed fire alarm system for Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals and presented letters which had been received in regard thereto from the State Charities Aid Association, Mr. Ross, fire expert, and the American District Telegraph Company. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To continue this matter with the Building Committee for further investigation.

The Building Committee reported progress in regard to the extension of the balconies at Fordham Hospital, and upon motion, duly seconded and carried, a communication, dated January 18, received from Mr. R. F. Almirall in regard thereto, was referred to that Committee.

Mr. Farley reported that after consultation with the General Medical Superintendent it had been arranged to have the specifications for painting of Gouverneur Hospital prepared by the Supervising Engineer. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The Building Committee recommended that the estimate received from the P. J. Carlin Construction Company for the changes in the boiler house, amounting to \$325, be accepted, inasmuch as the work had been certified by the architects to be necessary and the price justified. The Medical Board shall receive all applications for appointment, which shall be in such form as the Board of Trustees may prescribe, and thoroughly examine the qualifications of all applicants to fill vacancies or otherwise on the medical staff of the hospital, and shall report in writing, with recommendation, to the Board of Trustees on all such applicants.

2. Such report and recommendation shall thereupon be referred to a Conference Committee, consisting of two members of the Board of Trustees, appointed by the President, and of two members of the Medical Board of the hospital, appointed by such Board, for consideration and report to the Trustees.

Rule Adopted January 28, 1908.

3. All applications for appointment on the medical staff of any hospital in this Department shall be made in writing, and give the date and place of graduation, both in medicine and arts, if so graduated; whether an interne in a hospital, if so, when and where; whether connected with any out-patient department, if so, when, where and in what capacity; whether connected with any hospital as a member of the attending or assistant attending staff; whether connected with any medical college, if so, in what capacity. Publications, if any.

4. The applications shall be accompanied by endorsements from three or more regular physicians in good professional standing.

5. Applications for the position of Attending Physician, Surgeon or Gynecologist shall be from men of not less than ten years' professional experience. Application for appointment to the positions of Assistant Attending Physician, Surgeon or Gynecologist shall be from physicians of not less than five years' experience; for Adjunct Assistant Physician, Surgeon or Gynecologist, from men of not less than three years' professional experience, except that such standards shall not be exacted in cases of persons already in the service (excluding the house staffs of the several hospitals) who may be recommended for promotion.

6. The Medical Boards of the several hospitals shall request the editors of the medical publications in New York, the "New York Medical Journal" and the "New York Medical Record," to publish a notice that applications to fill vacancies on the attending staff of the Fourth Division at Bellevue, and the attending staffs of the three allied hospitals (Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham) will be received by the Medical Board up to a date two weeks subsequent to the notice. Such notice shall also be posted on the bulletin board of the hospital affected.

7. All applications when so received shall be transmitted to the Board of Trustees in compliance with the rule of June 25, 1906.

Mr. O'Keeffe, of the Committee on Finance, recommended that the request submitted by the Bookkeeper at last meeting for the transfer of \$18.33 within the appropriations for 1907 and \$3,028.41 within the appropriations for 1906 be approved, as both of them had been recommended by the General Medical Superintendent and were necessary. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make these transfers accordingly.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported that no action was necessary in regard to the request of J. M. Knopp for the return of his deposit, inasmuch as his deposit had been released by the rejection of all bids for the temporary office building and repairs to Registrar's office.

Dr. Brannan recommended against the supply of milk and eggs to children in the dispensary, and stated that he doubted the advisability, as well as the legality, of doing so. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was adopted, and it was

Resolved, To inform the Convalescent Relief Committee accordingly.

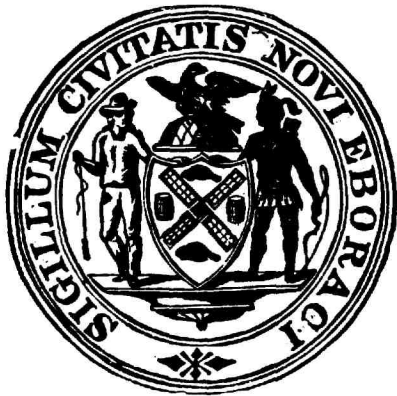
