A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 1, submitting the applications of twenty-four persons employed in the Labor Class in the Board of Water Supply who had taken part in the examination for promotion to Axeman, held on February 4, 1910. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 6, relative to communications, dated April 1 and 5, from Mr. Frederick Dressel, a Clerk in the Administration Bureau under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens, who complained that he had not been notified for the examination for promotion to third grade Clerk, held April 1. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to reply to the communications and state that the examination had been requested for Mr. Louis J. McNally, under the provisions of paragraph 22 of Rule XV., there being less than three persons eligible for promotion in the Bureau.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, dated April 5, in response to the Commission's inquiry as to what disposition had been made of the case of Charles H. interests of the City would be served by Mr. Levy's retention in the service. The

A letter was presented from Deputy Commissioner E. W. Bemis, of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated April 5, relative to the increase in salary of Edward T. Gunnan and John A. Hannon, Clerks in the Bureau of the Water Register, Borough of Brooklyn, from \$1,050 to \$1,200 per annum, from March 1, and stating that as William F. McClure and Daniel D. Comes, the only other Clerks in the Bureau who were eligible, had waived their right to compete, there were less than three Clerks in the Bureau eligible and willing to compete for such promotion. Resolved, That the action of the Commission in ordering an open competitive examination for third grade Clerk be and the same hereby is rescinded.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary proceed forthwith with an open competitive examination for second grade Clerk (male), and that the persons whose applications for third grad Clerk are now on file in this office be notified that they will be admitted to the examination for second gracd Clerk without further application.

Resolved, That the provision of Regulation VII., to the effect that there shall be a maximum age limit of twenty-five years in examinations for second grade Clerk, be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the forthcoming open competitive examination for that position.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the practice of the automatic appeal be applied to the present amination for promotion to Lieutenant of Police in both the mental examination and

the total average.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the fact that James J. Martin, No. No. 110 East Eighty-fourth street, who had appeared at the meeting of March 28 to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper by reason of a false statement as to his age, and who had been granted an adjournment in order that he might obtain a birth certificate, had subsequently been certified to the Department of Correction and appointed a Prison Keeper. It appeared that in the application for Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, also in an application previously filed for Patrolman, the date of birth was given as January 1, 1880, while in a letter from the Police Commissioner under date of June 25, 1909, the date of birth was given, according to the General Registry Office, Dublin, as January 1, 1878. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to transmit a statement of the foregoing facts to the Commissioner of the Department of Corection for his guidance in deciding as to permanent appointment of Mr. Martin.

The Secretary submitted, with a request for instructions, a requisition from the Police Commissioner for a list from which to appoint one Police Surgeon. It appeared that Dr. Walter G. Frey and Dr. T. J. Flynn had requested that their names be placed upon a preferred list for positions in Class III. of the Medical Service (Police Surgeon, Coroner's Physician, General Medical Officer, Fire Department), by reason of the fact that in an opinion of Mr. Justice Garretson of the Supreme Court, Second Department, the offices of Coroner and Coroner's Physician had been held to be co-terminus, and their term of office had expired on December 31, 1909. The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Corporation Counsel and request an opinion as to whether the names of Drs. Flynn and Frey should be placed upon a preferred list for positions in Class III. of the Medical Service, and, if so, whether certification for appointment to the vacancy in the position of Police Surgeon should be made from the competitive eligible list for that position or from the

A report was presented from the Record Clerk, dated April 15, stating that Nathan Holzer, of No. 300 South First street, Brooklyn, who had been appointed to the position of Process Server in the Law Department on April 7, had given the date of his birth as February 5, 1893, while in his application the same was set forth as January 5, 1884, and in the preliminary sheet of his examination papers as February 5, 1883. The Secretary was directed to summon Mr. Holzer before the Commission to explain the discrepancy in his statements.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions, dated April 14, relative to the request of the Corporation Counsel that Mr. Charles J. Druhan, of the Brooklyn office of his Department, be given a non-competitive examination for promotion from the position of Junior Assistant to that of Deputy Assistant, and recommending that the examination be ordered in accordance with Rule XV., paragraphs 10 and 22. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions, dated April 14, relative to the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, that an examination be held for promotion to the position of Permit Clerk, at \$1,800 per annum, in the Bureau of Highways of his Department. and recommending that an examination be held for the position, to be open to all third grade Clerks under the Superintendent of Highways, in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 8. The recommendation was adopted.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated April 14, enclosing copy of an opinion of the Acting Corporation Counsel, dated April 9, relative to the signing, by the Auditor of the Department, of the certificate on the payroll required to be signed by the head of the Department. The letter stated that a considerable part of the Commissioner's time and that of the Deputy Commissioner was consumed in the signing of payrolls, which time should be devoted to other important matters; that the Corporation Counsel had stated that, in his opinion, there was no legal objection to the signing of the certificate by the Auditor, provided that the Comptroller would agree and the Civil Service Commission would suspend its rule requiring the certificate of the head of the Department to all payrolls. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to state that the provision of the Civil Service Rules referred to was not merely a provision of the rules of the Commission, but a provision of the Civil Service Law itself, which the Commission had no power to suspend; that, as there was some doubt in the minds of the Commission as to whether the Corporation Counsel's opinion really met the situation, it would be glad to have a conference with the Commissioner and the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of devising a method that would meet the requirements

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated April 12, stating that the dismissal of Francis McCarthy, a Patrolman on the Aqueduct, on February 1 1910, had been rescinded. The Secretary was directed to amend the records accord-

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated April 13, relative to the action of the Commission in cancelling the examination for promotion from Laborer to Axeman in that Department, and calling attention to a letter addressed to the Commission under date of October 28, 1909, requesting the holding of said examination; also stating that during October, 1909, all the Foremen, Assistant Foremen and Laborers employed by the Board of Water Supply had been notified that men with those titles who had been employed not less than three years would be eligible to take an examination for promotion to Axeman, and that promotion applications should be filed at the office of the Commission. After consideration of the matter, it appearing that all the persons eligible were given a fair opportunity to file applications, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission on April 8 in cancelling the examination for promotion from Laborer to Axeman in the Board of Water Supply, be and the same hereby is revoked, and the Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions is hereby authorized to rate the papers in the said examination and establish a list.

Letters were presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated April 13, requesting authority to appoint James Riley, of No. 424 West Fifty-seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, as Laboratory Assistant, with salary at the rate of \$600 per annum, pursuant to the provisions of paragraphs 3 and 4 of Rule XII. The appointment was approved for a period of fifteen days, and the Secretary was directed to summon the candidate for a non-competitive examination through which to qualify for provisional appointment.

On the Manhattan anchorage substantial progress has been made, 900 cubic yards of concrete were placed and 950 cubic yards of granite were set. The contract for the construction of railings, stairs and electrical equipment is about 70 per cent, com-

To complete the towers and suspended superstructure, there remains to be erected some ornamental castings and the completion of the centre locks at the centre of the river span, also large castings which fit around the cables at the anchorages. These

castings cannot be erected until the completion of the anchorages. Sidewalks on both sides of the main suspended span have been completed. The reinforced concrete slabs on the Brooklyn suspended span have been completed, but mastic has not yet been placed. Work is now being carried on placing the slabs in the easterly side of the Manhattan suspended span. Practically all track material has been delivered and placed in approximate position, and the work of bolting and spiking down is well under way. About 90 per cent, of the iron work for the railings and stairways has been delivered and about 55 per cent, of the railings and all stairways have been erected.

Practically all of the material for the electric lighting equipment has been delivered at the site, and the work of installation is about 30 per cent, completed,

During the quarter two fires occurred on the Brooklyn side span in the trackwork timbers. The first fire occurred on March 19, 1910, and was caused by a hot rivet dropping from the upper deck on the railroad ties. The fire caused comparatively little damage and did not damage any of the Bridge, with the exception of some paint in the steelwork.

The second fire occurred March 25, 1910, and also started in the creosoted timbers of the lower track work and was occasioned by a spark from the tar kettles which were being used at the time to place the mastic wearing surface on the sidewalks. This fire did a considerable amount of damage to the stringers and floor beams of the bridge on the westerly side of the Brooklyn side span between panel points Nos. 12 and 42. Repairs are in progress.

### Maintenance.

On December 31, 1909, the roadway of the Manhattan Bridge was opened to public service. Pedestrians were permitted to cross the Bridge until 5 p. m., when the roadway was restricted to vehicular traffic only. This traffic has continued to increase steadily since the roadways were opened.

Madison Avenue Bridge Over Harlem River Connecting Madison Avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Manhattan, With One Hundred and Thirtyeighth Street, The Bronx.

The construction of this bridge is progressing. Work that was suspended on account of severe weather has been resumed. On the Manhattan side at the Fifth avenue approach, the railing has been erected and the work completed, except the street pavement. On the Madison avenue approach the greater part of the sidewalk railing has been erected between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and the river, and this section is practically completed, except the car tracks and roadway pavement. The shelter houses on the rest piers, Manhattan, are about three-fourths finished, and the iron work of the fixed and draw span completed, including electrical equipment and most of the engine room.

On The Bronx approach conditions remain as for the last quarter owing to the weather conditions of the past season preventing work on masonry construction.

# DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

### Report of Transactions, April 18 to April 24, 1910.

Communications Received.

From Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Assistant Secretary transmis copy of communication from the State Commission of Prisons, which reads as follows:

"State of New York, "State Commission of Prisons, Office at the Capitol, "Albany, April 6, 1910.

"Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

"Gentlemen-I am directed by the State Commission of Prisons to call your attention to subdivision 3 of section 46 of the Prison Law, which makes it the duty of this Commission to approve or reject plans for the construction and improvement of buildings for penal institutions used for the detention of sane adults charged with or convicted of crime or detained as witnesses or debtors. This provision of law is well known to the Commissioner of Correction and the officials of important prisons, but it is frequently unknown or forgotten by the officials in charge of the erection of station houses and minor prisons.

This letter is simply to call your attention to the fact that it includes buildings for any of these purposes. Plans should be approved before the contract for construction is let: failure to do so causes sometimes unnecessary expense and embarrassment. There have been some recent cases in your city where contracts for police stations have been let before approval.

"Your co-operation is requested in the enforcement of this law.

Mr. Martin asserts that the truth of his statements will be established when evidence which he is expecting from Dublin, Ireland, arrives. Letter acknowledged. Copies of letter sent to Warden of Harts Island

and to Mr. J. J. Martin. From Municipal Civil Service Commission-Acknowledging letter in regard to increasing salaries of certain Keepers, entitled to same by length of service, and stating that if Patrick Donnellan, Archibald Camp, Frederick Fassig and Thomas J. Keating are the only Keepers eligible for promotion, their salaries may be increased without further examination. Salaries of above named Keepers to be increased from dates when eligible.

From the Comptroller-Receipt for security deposits accompanying Pro posals for Manufacturing Purposes opened on April 21, 1910. On file.

From the Comptroller-Returning voucher in favor of William Farrell & Son for coal, and requesting that a deduction of \$37.14 be made, as coal was ordered in 1909 and charged to 1910 appropriation. Commission does not oppose bill if date when the Department of Correction shall leave Blackwells Island is fixed at January 1, 1914, instead of January 1, 1912. Mr. McGoldrick asked to call on Commissioner.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as con-tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
