Regulating, etc., West One Hundred and Sixty-eighth Street.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging West One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, from Broadway to Fort Washington avenue, and objections of J. N. Butterly, filed by Harry G. Smith, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 13, 1910.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Sewer in Post Avenue, etc.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Resident Physician resulting from the examination held on March 10, 1910, be and the same hereby is established as of April 6, 1910, the date on which the rating of the papers was completed.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 1, submitting the applications of twenty-four persons employed in the Labor Class in the Board of Water Supply who had taken part in the examination for promotion to Axeman, held on February 4, 1910. The report stated that the records of the Commission did not show that the examination had been ordered; that there was no communication on file either in the office of the Commission or in the Board of Water Supply which would authorize the examination; and that the applications had doubtless been accepted through a misunderstanding on the part of the Application Clerk. The Examiner recommended that the examination papers be filed and that the applicants be notified of the action taken. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 6, relative to communications, dated April 1 and 5, from Mr. Frederick Dressel, a Clerk in the Administration Bureau under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens, who complained that he had not been notified for the examination for promotion to third grade Clerk, held April 1. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to reply to the communications and state that the examination had been requested for Mr. Louis J. McNally, under the provisions of paragraph 22 of Rule XV., there being less than three persons eligible for promotion in the Bureau.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, dated April 5, in response to the Commission's inquiry as to what disposition had been made of the case of Charles H. Levy, Assistant Engineer in the Bureau of Highways, who had obtained his original appointment as a Topographical Draftsman through misrepresentation, he having been only nineteen years of age at the time he filed his application. The letter stated that the matter had been carefully investigated and that, as a result of such investigation, the Commissioner was convinced that Mr. Levy was a valuable employee and one who should be retained in the service of the Department; that as the indiscretion upon which the charges were based had been committed prior to the time he entered the service of the Department they could not properly be reviewed by the head of the Department, and that, after considering all the facts, he had reached the conclusion that the best

interests of the City would be served by Mr. Levy's retention in the service. The Secretary was directed to release the payroll of the said employee and the papers were ordered filed.

A letter was presented from Deputy Commissioner E. W. Bemis, of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated April 5, relative to the increase in salary of Edward T. Gunnan and John A. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission in ordering an open competitive examination for third grade Clerk be and the same hereby is rescinded.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary proceed forthwith with an open competitive examination for second grade Clerk (male), and that the persons whose applications for third grad Clerk are now on file in this office be notified that they will be admitted to the examination for second grade Clerk without further application.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the provision of Regulation VII., to the effect that there shall be a maximum age limit of twenty-five years in examinations for second grade Clerk, be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the forthcoming open competitive examination for that position.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the practice of the automatic appeal be applied to the present examination for promotion to Lieutenant of Police in both the mental examination and the total average.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the fact that James J. Martin, No. No. 110 East Eighty-fourth street, who had appeared at the meeting of March 28 to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper by reason of a false statement as to his age, and who had been granted an adjournment in order that he might obtain a birth certificate, had subsequently been certified to the Department of Correction and appointed a Prison Keeper. It appeared that in the application for Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, also in an application previously filed for Patrolman, the date of birth was given as January 1, 1880, while in a letter from the Police Commissioner under date of June 25, 1909, the date of birth was given, according to the General Registry Office, Dublin, as January 1, 1878. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to transmit a statement of the foregoing facts to the Commissioner of the Department of Correction for his guidance in deciding as to permanent appointment of Mr. Martin.

The Secretary submitted, with a request for instructions, a requisition from the Police Commissioner for a list from which to appoint one Police Surgeon. It appeared that Dr. Walter G. Frey and Dr. T. J. Flynn had requested that their names be placed upon a preferred list for positions in Class III. of the Medical Service (Police Surgeon, Coroner's Physician, General Medical Officer, Fire Department), by reason of the fact that in an opinion of Mr. Justice Garretson of the Supreme Court, Second Department, the offices of Coroner and Coroner's Physician had been held to be co-terminus, and their term of office had expired on December 31, 1909. The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Corporation Counsel and request an opinion as to whether the names of Drs. Flynn and Frey should be placed upon a preferred list for positions in Class III. of the Medical Service, and, if so, whether certification for appointment to the vacancy in the position of Police Surgeon should be made from the competitive eligible list for that position or from the preferred list.

A report was presented from the Record Clerk, dated April 15, stating that Nathan Holzer, of No. 300 South First street, Brooklyn, who had been appointed to the position of Process Server in the Law Department on April 7, had given the date of his birth as February 5, 1893, while in his application the same was set forth as January 5, 1884, and in the preliminary sheet of his examination papers as February 5, 1883. The Secretary was directed to summon Mr. Holzer before the Commission to explain the discrepancy in his statements.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions, dated April 14, relative to the request of the Corporation Counsel that Mr. Charles J. Druhan, of the Brooklyn office of his Department, be given a non-competitive examination for promotion from the position of Junior Assistant to that of Deputy Assistant, and recommending that the examination be ordered in accordance with Rule XV., paragraphs 10 and 22. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions, dated April 14, relative to the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, that an examination be held for promotion to the position of Permit Clerk, at \$1,800 per annum, in the Bureau of Highways of his Department, and recommending that an examination be held for the position, to be open to all third grade Clerks under the Superintendent of Highways, in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 8. The recommendation was adopted.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated April 14, enclosing copy of an opinion of the Acting Corporation Counsel, dated April 9, relative to the signing, by the Auditor of the Department, of the certificate on the payroll required to be signed by the head of the Department. The letter stated that a considerable part of the Commissioner's time and that of the Deputy Commissioner was consumed in the signing of payrolls, which time should be devoted to other important matters; that the Corporation Counsel had stated that, in his opinion, there was no legal objection to the signing of the certificate by the Auditor, provided that the Comptroller would agree and the Civil Service Commission would suspend its rule requiring the certificate of the head of the Department to all payrolls. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to state that the provision of the Civil Service Rules referred to was not merely a provision of the rules of the Commission, but a provision of the Civil Service Law itself, which the Commission had no power to suspend; that, as there was some doubt in the minds of the Commission as to whether the Corporation Counsel's opinion really met the situation, it would be glad to have a conference with the Commissioner and the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of devising a method that would meet the requirements of the law.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, dated April 13, requesting authority to appoint a person to take charge of the laundry at Kings County Hospital, under the title of "Laundryman (Hospital Helper)" at a salary of \$600 per annum, in view of the fact that the position of Laundryman at Kings County Hospital was not designated in the Budget schedule. On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated April 12, stating that the dismissal of Francis McCarthy, a Patrolman on the Aqueduct, on February 1, 1910, had been rescinded. The Secretary was directed to amend the records accordingly.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated April 13, relative to the action of the Commission in cancelling the examination for promotion from Laborer to Axeman in that Department, and calling attention to a letter addressed to the Commission under date of October 28, 1909, requesting the holding of said examination; also stating that during October, 1909, all the Foremen, Assistant Foremen and Laborers employed by the Board of Water Supply had been notified that men with those titles who had been employed not less than three years would be eligible to take an examination for promotion to Axeman, and that promotion applications should be filed at the office of the Commission. After consideration of the matter, it appearing that all the persons eligible were given a fair opportunity to file applications, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission on April 8 in cancelling the examination for promotion from Laborer to Axeman in the Board of Water Supply, be and the same hereby is revoked, and the Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions is hereby authorized to rate the papers in the said examination and establish a list.

Letters were presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated April 13, requesting authority to appoint James Riley, of No. 424 West Fifty-seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, as Laboratory Assistant, with salary at the rate of \$600 per annum, pursuant to the provisions of paragraphs 3 and 4 of Rule XII. A report was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, dated April 13, relative to the complaint filed in the office of the Commission to the effect that Inspectors of Incumbrances had been laid off for lack of work and Inspectors of Regulating, Grading and Paving assigned to perform the duties of the said position. The report stated that there was very little incumbrance work in the Borough of The Bronx; that the Inspectors of Regulating and Grading devoted nearly all their time to the work of regulating and grading, and probably once or twice a month might report on an incumbrance; that the Inspectors of Incumbrances had been laid off in the interest of economy as there was not enough work in the Borough for one Inspector of Incumbrances. The report was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated April 13, requesting authority to employ Mr. William A. Corcoran, of No. 99 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII, for a period of one year, as an Inspector of Furniture and Equipment for the New York Public Library, at a total compensation of twenty-five hundred dollars, and setting forth the circumstances under which the services would be rendered.

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Mr. William A. Corcoran, No. 99 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, be and he hereby is excepted from examination, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII, to render expert services in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for a period of one year, as an Inspector of Furniture and Equipment for the New York Public Library, at a total compensation of two thousand five hundred dollars.

BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

During the quarter the elevated railway train and surface car service was maintained with only one serious delay, resulting from the derailment of an elevated railway train at the easterly end of the Manhattan terminal on February 15, 1910. Through train service was entirely suspended from 6.16 a. m. to 8.20 a. m. Passengers were, so far as possible, transferred to surface cars. For a time the promenade was closed and the roadways opened to pedestrians.

A new entrance and passageway leading from North William street, under the bridge approach, and connecting with the subway station at Park row, was constructed during the quarter and opened to public service March 23, 1910.

This decrease has been more than offset by the income from roadway tolls on the Manhattan Bridge, the receipts from the roadways on that bridge for the quarter being \$11,458.39. As one of the main objects in building the Manhattan Bridge was to relieve the congestion on the Brooklyn Bridge, the decrease of tolls on the Brooklyn Bridge reflects the extent to which relief has already been afforded by the Manhattan Bridge.

WILLIAMSBURGH BRIDGE.

The cleaning and painting of the steelwork in the Brooklyn and Manhattan anchorages has been completed.

The painting of the ladders in the south leg of the Brooklyn tower, the Manhattan approach floor system, the pipe railing on the north side of the south roadway, and all benches on the footwalk, is nearly completed.

The roadways and footwalks were kept in good condition for traffic during the past quarter.

No delays or accidents occurred which could be attributed to neglect on the part of the Department.

Repairs to Medina stone pavement on roadways at various points on the bridge have been made as required.

The repair of the north footwalk near expansion joints is progressing.

The only serious delay on the tracks of any of the railroad companies operating across the bridge during the last quarter was due to a fatal collision on the elevated tracks on January 5, 1910, resulting in the death of two of the train crew.

The paving in trolley tracks in the subway station, between Loops Nos. 7 and 8, south side, has been completed.

Bronze railing was erected on the north and south sides of the Metropolitan railroad tracks at the Manhattan approach as a safeguard to pedestrians.

The new runaway gate is practically completed and will be in operation in a few days.

QUEENSBORO BRIDGE.

Construction.

Under a supplemental agreement, dated August 6, 1909, with the Williams Engineering and Contracting Company for furnishing the four attics on the main piers and the tiling in the anchor pier shafts, the work in the shafts was 96 per cent. completed and the attics about 75 per cent. completed on March 1, 1910. There has been no work done under this agreement since March 9. On March 12, J. Van Vechten Olcott was appointed Receiver for the Williams Engineering and Contracting Company.

Plans and specifications have been completed for stairways and elevators in the anchor piers, with modifications as recommended by the Comptroller, for five hanging platforms for painting and inspection, and for permanent toll houses, police shelters, telephone, etc. Application has been made to the Board of Estimate for funds with which to do this work, and also to paint the bridge. The specifications for the platforms are in the hands of the printer.

Plans for reconstructing the outer tracks on the lower floor to adapt them to underground trolley service, with extension of the same along the Queens plaza, have been drawn.

Some preliminary plans have been drawn, showing methods of making elevated railroad connections at Second avenue, Manhattan and Jackson avenue, Queens.

Maintenance.

On October 5, 1909, the New York and Queens County Railroad Company discontinued the operation of local surface cars over the Bridge and inaugurated a through service, which has since been in operation.

Report of Transactions, April 18 to April 24, 1910.

Communications Received.

From Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Assistant Secretary transmits copy of communication from the State Commission of Prisons, which reads as follows:

"State of New York,
"State Commission of Prisons, Office at the Capitol,
"Albany, April 6, 1910."

"Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

"Gentlemen—I am directed by the State Commission of Prisons to call your attention to subdivision 3 of section 46 of the Prison Law, which makes it the duty of this Commission to approve or reject plans for the construction and improvement of buildings for penal institutions used for the detention of sane adults charged with or convicted of crime or detained as witnesses or debtors. This provision of law is well known to the Commissioner of Correction and the officials of important prisons, but it is frequently unknown or forgotten by the officials in charge of the erection of station houses and minor prisons.

"This letter is simply to call your attention to the fact that it includes buildings for any of these purposes. Plans should be approved before the contract for construction is let; failure to do so causes sometimes unnecessary expense and embarrassment. There have been some recent cases in your city where contracts for police stations have been let before approval.

"Your co-operation is requested in the enforcement of this law.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Transmitting resolution in regard to "Labor" division of the Commission, and forwarding blank applications to be filled out by persons who are to be appointed in non-competitive class. Also asking for a list of all employees in the Department, who are in the non-competitive class, with title, address, date of appointment, etc. Letter acknowledged. Provisions of resolution will be carried out. List asked for transmitted to Municipal Civil Service Commission on April 18, 1910.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Acknowledging receipt of request from Department of Correction for additions to classification of non-competitive positions. Secretary states that there will be a public hearing on the matter at 10 o'clock a. m., on April 25. Commissioner of Correction asked to be present. Commissioner will attend.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Transmitting names of three Keepers who have passed the necessary examination for promotion to position of Head Keeper, two of the number being veterans. All have been placed on regular promotion list received from the Commission under date of January 14, 1910.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Reporting appearance before the Commission of James J. Martin, summoned to show cause why his name should not be removed from eligible list of prison keepers, etc., on account of a false statement as to his age. Mr. Martin asserts that the truth of his statements will be established when evidence which he is expecting from Dublin, Ireland, arrives. Letter acknowledged. Copies of letter sent to Warden of Harts Island and to Mr. J. J. Martin.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Acknowledging letter in regard to increasing salaries of certain Keepers, entitled to same by length of service, and stating that if Patrick Donnellan, Archibald Camp, Frederick Fassig and Thomas J. Keating are the only Keepers eligible for promotion, their salaries may be increased without further examination. Salaries of above named Keepers to be increased from dates when eligible.

From the Comptroller—Receipt for security deposits accompanying proposals for Manufacturing Purposes opened on April 21, 1910. On file.

From the Comptroller—Returning voucher in favor of William Farrell & Son for coal, and requesting that a deduction of \$37.14 be made, as coal was ordered in 1909 and charged to 1910 appropriation. At least 80 per cent. of this coal was consumed in 1910. It was ordered in December, when the institution was in need of coal, and appropriation for 1909 had been exhausted.

From Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Stating that the lighting of the Jefferson Market Prison is, in some sections, very poor. Department recommends changes which will improve conditions. The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity does not insist upon the use of any particular appliances, but that they be equal to those recommended. Report of Department Inspector that such changes are "desirable," and that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has power to recommend them. Letter acknowledged. Warden to make requisition for material. Work will be proceeded with.

From Assistant Corporation Counsel in Charge of Legislation—Asking for attitude of Commissioner of Correction on certain bills which have been introduced in the Legislature and which may affect the Department of Correction.

Senate Bill Int. 866, Paragraph 1040—"To amend the City Charter in relation to the Department of Correction." "Uniformed Force," etc. Bill discriminates unjustly. Does not cover one-half of those employed. Would approve of a pension bill something like that of the Health Department, but is opposed to bill above designated.

Senate Bill, Int. 639, Paragraph 688—"To amend Charter in relation to Department of Correction." Commission does not oppose bill if date when the Department of Correction shall leave Blackwells Island is fixed at January 1, 1914, instead of January 1, 1912. Mr. McGoldrick asked to call on Commissioner.

Copies of bills in re "Inferior Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction" and "Department of Correction." On file.

"An act to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure Generally"—("Insane Criminals," etc.) Bill approved.

From Department of Public Charities—Asking for a detail of prisoners to assist Department of Water Supply, etc., which Department is putting in a new system of water mains in Metropolitan District, Blackwells Island, and in locating old pipe lines. Copy sent to Warden of Workhouse, with request to furnish men, as suggested.

From Department of Public Charities—Thanking the Commissioner of Correction for the detail of prisoners assisting in planting trees, etc., around Metropolitan Hospital. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., for week ending April 16, 1910, agreed with specifications of the contracts. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reports, census, labor, hospital cases, punishments, etc., for week ending April 16, 1910. On file.

From City Prison, Manhattan—Report of fines received at City Prison during week ending April 16, 1910: From Court of Special Sessions, \$60; from City Magistrates' Courts, \$126; total, \$186. On file.

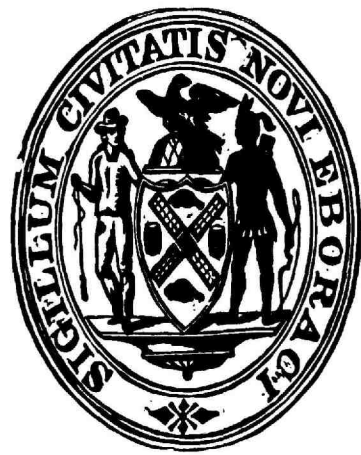

The proposed amendment to the "new plan" between the centre line of Fifty-third street and the southerly side of Sixty-third street, New York Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, comprises the following:

The establishment of a marginal street, wharf or place 150 feet in width, distant 350 feet westerly from and parallel to the westerly line of First avenue, and extending from the centre line of Fifty-third street to the southerly side of Sixty-third street.

Also the establishing of a bulkhead line between the centre line of Fifty-third street and the southerly side of Sixty-third street and distant 500 feet westerly from and parallel to the westerly side of First avenue. Also the establishing of one new pier 60 feet in width, two new piers 125 feet in width and four new piers 150 feet in width, with lateral extensions to said piers 75 feet in width outshore of and adjoining the proposed bulkhead line.

The establishing of these piers will create one slip of a width of 200.353 feet; five slips of a width of 250 feet each and one slip of a width of 232.18 feet.

Also additional area for water-front improvement 350 feet in width, extending from the westerly side of First avenue to the easterly side of the proposed marginal street, wharf or place, and from the northerly side of Fifty-seventh street to the southerly side of Sixty-third street.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
