

QUEENS GARAGE NAMED AFTER FALLEN SANITATION WORKER FRANK JUSTICH

The Department renamed Queens West District 1 Garage the "Frank Justich Garage" after Sanitation Worker Frank Justich, who died in the line of duty on January 26th, 2010, when he was servicing a corner litter basket and was struck and pinned by a tractor trailer truck.

Sanitation Worker Justich, an 11-year veteran, is survived by his wife Stacy, and two daughters, Faith, and Felicity. The Department was joined at the ceremony by the Justich family and several local elected officials.



"Sanitation Worker Justich was a beloved member of this Department, who was always ready with a kind word, a smile, or a personalized piece of artwork for his co-workers and his family alike," said Sanitation Commissioner John J. Doherty. "He was committed to keeping this city clean and safe, a testament to how much he loved this city and Department. Sanitation Worker Justich will live on with the renaming of this garage in his honor."

Harry Nespoli, president of Local 831, Uniformed Sanitationmen's Association, also spoke at the ceremony.

A bronze plaque was placed inside the garage and a sign was unveiled over the garage entrance commemorating the event.



DEPUTY COMMISSIONER VITO A. TURSO HONORED AS DSNY COLUMBIA ASSOCIATION'S "ITALIAN-AMERICAN OF THE YEAR"



Vito A. Turso, Deputy Commissioner for Public Information Affairs, Community was honored "Italian-American of the Year" by the DSNY's Columbia Association at their 46th Annual Dinner Dance. Also honored that night were Joseph Siano, retired Sanitation Worker assigned to Queens West Borough and past DSNY Columbia Association President who received the "Anthony M. DeSantis Award", and Frank Zito, retired Supervisor assigned to the Bureau of Waste Disposal, who received the "Renzo Ferrari Public Service Award." Commonly referred to as "The Voice of Sanitation," Mr. Turso - a former journalist - joined the Sanitation Department in 1978 as Director of Public Affairs, where he served throughout former Mayor Koch's three terms in office. When Mayor Dinkins was elected, Mr. Turso was promoted to Deputy Commissioner for Public Affairs and Community Relations at the Department of Correction, where he served proudly into the administration of former Mayor Giuliani. In 1994, he became Deputy Commissioner for Public Affairs at the Department of Environmental Protection.

In 1995, he left government to become an Executive Vice President for corporate and government affairs at Dan Klores Communications, a major Manhattan public relations firm, where he represented well-known entertainers, elected officials, and labor organizations.

In 2002, with the election of Mayor Bloomberg, he rejoined the Sanitation Department - - along with Commissioner Doherty - - as a Deputy Commissioner where he is in charge of communicating the Department's important mission and message to the public through the media, community boards, the DSNY web page, neighborhood organizations and the DSNY's Division of Customer Service and Government Relations.
