

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held July 28, 1880.

Present—Commissioner Vanderpoel and the Comptroller of the city.

Absent—Commissioner Dimock.

Five proposals were received for furnishing material, labor, etc., for building a new wooden pier at the foot of Thirty-second street, East river, as follows, to wit:

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held July 30, 1880. Present—Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

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The minutes of the meetings held 21st and 28th instant were read and approved.

On motion, the bids for building a wooden pier at Thirty-second street, East river, opened in the presence of the Comptroller of the city on the 28th instant, were taken up for consideration,

and the following resolution adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That the contract for building a new wooden pier at the foot of Thirty-second street,
East river, be and is hereby awarded to Ross & Sanford, of 104 Hudson street, Jersey City, N. J.,
their bid for doing said work being the lowest under proposals publicly opened the 28th instant;
provided that the Comptroller shall advise this Department that the said parties are not in default or arrears to the Corporation.

A communication was received from Edward Elliott and others, complaining that the pier at Forty-sixth street, North river, was so continually encumbered with brick and sand as to prevent its use for commercial purposes, and, being read, and the Secretary being directed to instruct the Superintendent of Docks for the district to have the pier kept free from incumbrances hereafter,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That John H. Benner, lessee of pier at Forty-sixth street, North river, be and hereby is notified that the brick and sand now stored upon the said premises must be removed therefrom within three days after date of receipt of this notice, complaint having been made to this Department that said materials obstruct the free use of the pier, and that hereafter the said premises must be kept free from any similar obstructions, and no material permitted to remain stored thereon

A communication was received from the Pilot Commissioners advising that a report had been received stating that the steamboats "Nellie White" and "Kill von Kull" were in the habit of drawing their furnace fires nightly into the slip at Rector street, North river; and, being read,

Resolved, That the form of specifications and contract as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for dredging the slip in front of Bellevue Hospital, Twenty-sixth street, East river, be and the same is hereby approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting hids for doing said work inserted in the papers proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

Whereas, By virtue of the terms and conditions of a public sale held March 13, 1879, there was granted and assigned to Thomas Fitzpatrick, he being the highest bidder therefor, for a term of three years from the said 1st day of May, 1879, at a yearly rent or sum of \$1,100, all the wharfage and cranage privilege arising or accruing from the use and occupation of that certain wharf property known and designated as pier at Twenty-eighth street, East river, in the City of New York; and

Whereas, In and by the indenture agreed to be made by said Thomas Fitzpatrick, between the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting through its Department of Docks, of the first part, and himself of the second part, it is expressly agreed and provided between the parties thereto, that in the event of the said yearly rent or sum of money, or any part thereof, remaining unpaid for the space of ten days after the same should have become due and payable in accordance with the terms thereof, it should be lawful for the said Department of Docks to serve, or cause to be served, upon the said Fitzpatrick, a notice in writing declaring that the said grant and assignment so made as aforesaid had become utterly null and void; and thereupon to have again, repossess, and enjoy said wharfage rights and premises in all respects and in like manner as though such grant and assignment to said Fitzpatrick had never been made or executed; and

Whereas, The said Fitzpatrick has failed and neglected to pay the said rent or sums of money in and by said proposed indenture agreed to be paid in accordance with the terms thereof, and is now largely in arrears to this Department on account thereof; therefore, it is

That the Trustees of the Floating Chapel, moored at the southerly side of Pier 40, East river, be and hereby are notified, that unless the dredging ordered to be done under resolution adopted by this Board on February II, I880, shall be commenced and proceeded with to the satisfaction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department within fifteen days after the receipt of this

notice, a penalty of \$50 per day will be imposed for each and every day after the expiration of the said fifteen days, until the completion of the work of dredging ordered.

An Act in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven percentum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine percentum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-fine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-fine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-fine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, in the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-ine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring 1: payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
